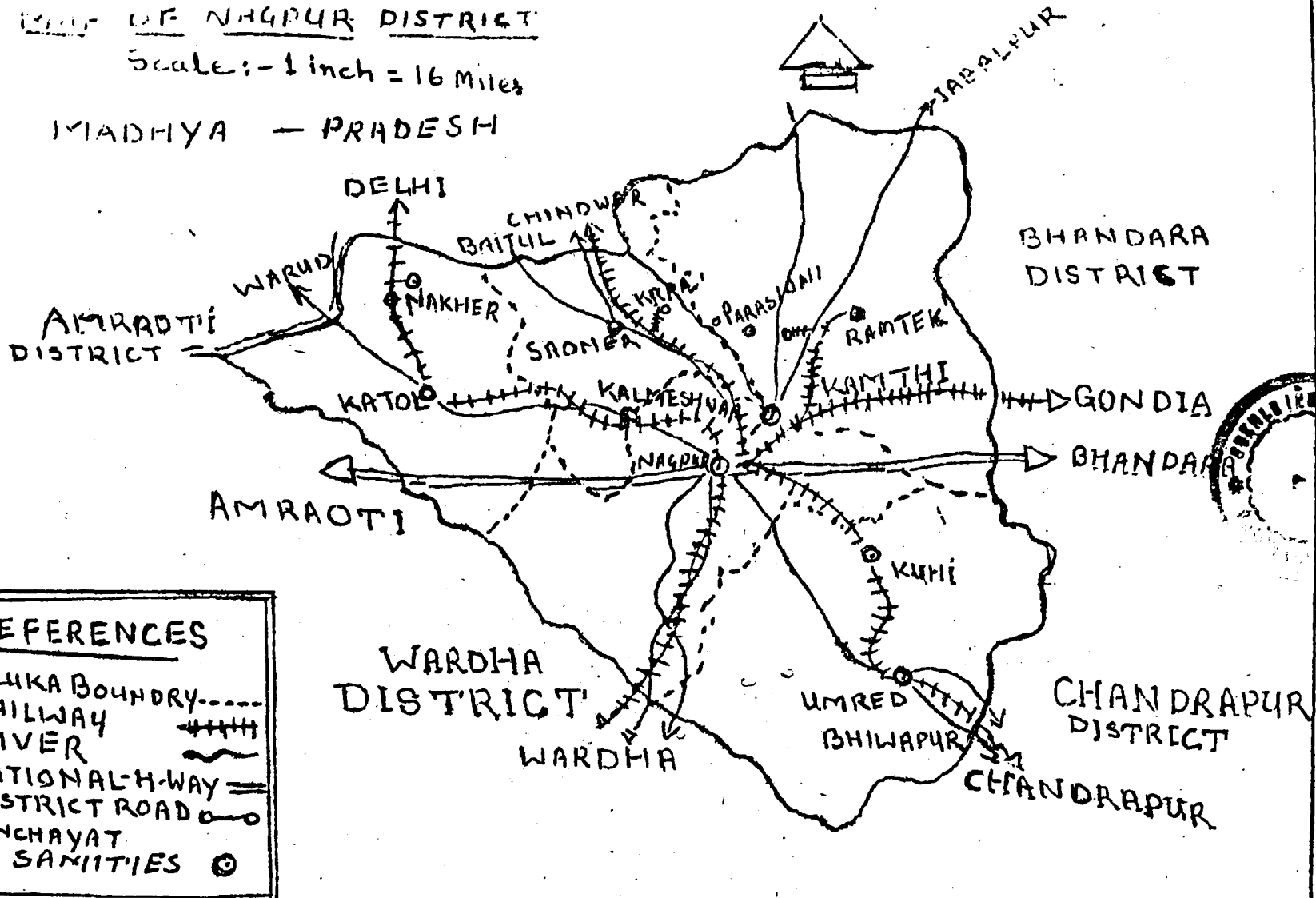

C H A P T E R - 1I N T R O D U C T I O N .1.1 Introduction and Location:-

Nagpur district was one of the Districts of Ex-Madhya Pradesh till the reorganisation of States in 1956 when alongwith the other seven districts of Vidarbha region, it formed a part of the bilingual state of Bombay. The State of Maharashtra came into existence on 1st May, 1960, with Nagpur District as one of its twenty six districts. Nagpur district is one of the important district of the four C.P. districts. The headquarters of the district is at Nagpur which was the capital of Ex-Madhya Pradesh State and now enjoys the status of the second capital of Maharashtra State.

This district lies between $20^{\circ}35'$ and $21^{\circ}44'$ North Latitudes and $78^{\circ}15'$ and $79^{\circ}40'$ East Longitudes and it is triangular in shape.

1.2 Boundaries:-

This district is bounded on the North by the Chhindwada and Seoni districts of the Madhya Pradesh, on the East by Bhandara, on the South and West by Chandrapur and Wardha districts respectively, with a small strip on the north-west by the Amraoti district of Maharashtra State.

The area of the district is 9930 square Kilo Metres (3,834,) forming 3.34 percent of the total area of Maharashtra upto 1969-70 when 10 villages measuring an area of 4,094 hectares or 24.56 Kilometres is transferred to Bhandara district.

The population of the district according to 1961 Census is 15, 12,807 forming 3.62 percent of the total population of the Maharashtra. According to 1971 Census the population of the district is 19,42,688 forming 3.85 percent of the total population of the Maharashtra.

Besides Judicial and Revenue administration, there are district and divisional Officers of other departments with different administrative set up. Nagpur city, being the divisional Headquarters of one of the four Revenue divisions of Maharashtra State, has an office of Divisional Commissioner acting as a co-ordinating agency in between, Divisional Offices, Zilla Parishads and the State Government.

1.4 Police:- The Nagpur city, being one of the biggest cities and second Capital of the State, has got Commissioner of Police to look after the functions such as maintenance of Law and Order, Security to Life and Property of Citizens, to obtain intelligence concerning the Commission of cognizable offences, enforcement of Police regulations for preventing breach of peace etc.

In addition to above there are offices of Deputy Inspector General Of Police, Nagpur Range, Nagpur, Superintendent of Police for Rural areas and city Superintendent of Railway Police and Commandant of Police Force (Reserve). There were 5 Deputy Superintendents of Police, 6 Assistant Commissioners of Police, 2 Superintendents of Police, 1 Asstt. Superintendent of Police, and 44 Inspectors of Police in Nagpur District during the year 1973-74.

There is also a Police Constables Training School at Nagpur which caters to the training of unarmoured constabulary of the districts in the Nagpur Range. It functions on regional basis and is in charge of a Superintendent of the rank of the Deputy Superintendent of Police. He is assisted by the necessary staff of Instructors.

1.3 Administrative Set Up:-

For administrative convenience the district is divided into 5 Sub-divisions or Taluka Viz. Nagpur, Ramtek, Umred, Katol and Saoner. The Collector is the head of the district administration and in so far as the need and exigencies of the district administration are concerned, he is expected to supervise the working of other departments also. He is also district Magistrate. The Collector, being incharge of the district, is entrusted with the work duties regarding General Administration, Law and order, Land Revenue, and Civil Supplies. He is also assigned with the work of Employment Guarantee in the district under State and Local Sectors. He has also to look after the above said work in addition to the Collection of Small Savings and Family Planning, the most important subjects of the present day with the Co-operation of various departments and elected bodies in the district.

The Collector is assisted by Resident Deputy Collector and Deputy Collectors attached to the Collectorate in the working of Revenue administration. A sub-divisional Officer of a rank of Deputy Collector is put in charge of every Sub-Division. A Tahsildar (Mamlatdar) is incharge of every Taluka Office.

Each Tahsil is sub-divided into 4 to 5 revenue circles and revenue circles are further divided into Patwari Halkas for administrative convenience. There are in all 21 Revenue Circles and 373 Patwari Halkas in 5 Tahsils of Nagpur District.

The District and Sessions Judge, Nagpur, is the head of the Judicial Department in the district. The judiciary is entirely separated from the executive. The separation of the Judiciary from the executive has been brought about in the district, in 1959. The District and Sessions Judge is assisted by one Assistant and Additional Sessions Judge and two Extra Assistants and Additional Sessions Judges. They have jurisdiction over the entire revenue district.

Zilla Parishad:- With a view to promote domestic decentralisation and to secure greater participation of the people in the developmental activities, a district level body known as "Zilla Parishad" constituted with councillors chosen by election from electoral divisions with 44 councillors is functioning in the district since 1st of May, 1962. There are 13 Panchayat Samities/are the ex-officio ^{at Block level &} members of the Zilla Parishad. Chairman of 5 Federal ^{the Cha-} Co-operative Societies are also working as the associate ^{irman of} members. The nominated members and the associated members ^{six P.S.} ~~xxxxx~~ have no right of voting while the ex-officio members and co-opted members have full rights of the elected members. Two women members are co-opted and 10 more members are nominated by Zilla Parishad.

The area under the jurisdiction of the Zilla Parishad is the entire district area, excluding Cantonment, Municipal Councils and Nagpur Corporation area. The area under the Jurisdiction of a Panchayat Samiti corresponds to the Block area.

The work of the Zilla Parishad is carried out through 6 subject committees viz. Standing Committee, Agricultural and Co-operation Committee, Work Committee, and Health Committee, Education Committee, Social Welfare Committee. The Chief Executive Officer is the Head of the administrative Machinery in Zilla Parishad. He has been vested with full administrative powers for executing the provisions of the Zilla Parishad Act. He is assisted by officers of various departments. The Finance Branch of the Zilla Parishad is controlled by the Chief Accounts and Finance Officer generally taken on deputation from the Accounts and Treasuries Department and this branch works on the lines of the Finance Department of the State Government.

1.4 Area and the Territorial Changes:-

The area, number of villages population etc. covered by each Taluka according to the 1971 Census is as indicated below:-

The population figures for 1971 Census which are available show that the population of the district has been increased to 19,42,688 of which 10,55,357 is in Urban areas and 8,87,331 in rural areas. There are 10,10,911 males and 9,31,777 females. The percentage increase in population of 1971 census over 1961 census is 28.68 percent. According to 1971 census population, the District ranks first in Vidarbha region and eleventh in the Maharashtra State. The total number of workers in 6,89,276 of which 3,45,319 are agricultural cultivators and agricultural labourers, as per the figures of 1971 Census. The percentage of workers in the district to the total population is 35.48.

1.5 Topography:- The district has an average elevation between 274.50 and 305 metres (900 and 1,000 Feet) above sea level and its relief features are characterised, by and large, by the residual hill ranges of the Satpudas and their detached members enclosing, between them undulating black soil valleys. Much of the topography is typically one of the Deccan Trap having flat-topped and terraced features, low buttressed side and isolated knolls. Eastwards and north eastwards, the landscape change in an interesting manner due to the change in the underlying rocks. The rocks of Gondwana series are not only important because of their coal and manganese deposits, but in their surface expression they present a low rolling topography within a poor soil cover and vegetation.

The greater part of the district is an undulating plateau with a variation in height between 652.70 metres (2,140 feet) above sea level on the upland ridges in the north and about 247.50 metres (900 feet) near the Kanhan river. This plateau surface of the district falls into three district drainage basins. In the North, the upland ranges are an extension of the Satpuda ranges, they are narrow in the west but widen to a breadth of about 19 Kms. (12 miles) towards the east. Immediately south of these upland ranges, stretches the Bhivagad Hills, the western extremity of which lies in the Nagpur district. The historic temple of Ramtek is situated on a spur of this range signifying the Hill of Rama also known formerly as "Sundergiri" Vermilion Mount "Tapogiri" (Hill of Penance) These isolated hills or knolls attain no great altitude.

1.6 Hills, Rivers and Soils:- The main system of hills is the Satpuda and its offshoots. The northern range of hills extends along the whole border, being pierced only in two places where the Kanhan and the Pench rivers have broken through. On the east west, it consists merely of the outlying foothills of the Satpudas, the plateau proper lying behind them in Gaikwad. But from the Kanhan to the Pench, it is the major range of the Satpudas themselves which dominates the landscape and the ascent of the Khamarpani Plateau is made in Nagpur. Along this length the hills are well wooded and picturesque and there is some striking scenery on the Pench river. The old Gond fort of Bhivagad stands on this range. Government managed forests in this district mainly belong to these hills between the Kanhan and the Bawanthari.

A few miles to the south of the main Satpuda range are two minor lines of hills to the west lie between Bhivagad and Parashioni terminating in the peak of Tekadi 503.34 metres (1,669 feet) of the Pench are the Mansar hills, both these and the western range being now denuded of trees, and after a gap of a few miles, come the well-known Ramtek hills, rising to 427 metres (1,400 feet) at Ramtek proper. Timely measures by the Government have helped retaining the wooded character of this range.

Minor Hills:- The second main hill tract extends along the south east of the district from Kharged on the Wardha river, where there are some fine waterfalls, to the junction of Wardha and Chandrapur with Nagpur. They separate the valley of the Kar, from that of the Jam up to Kondhali, and further south east forms the watershed between the latter river and the Bor, ^{Near} Bori, they become the Kauras Plateau, and here terminate to afford a passage for the Wardha river, continuing afterwards southeastwards and dividing the valley of the Nand from the Wainganga Plain. West of the Wunna the range is mostly well covered with picturesque valleys and ravines, among which are narrow strips of rich well-irrigated land of great fertility. But to the east towards Umed the range has lower levels and is uninteresting. It consists of low bare hills which are grass covered and boulder strewn, except where over looking the Nand valley, some excellent teak is grown.

The third main range runs northwards through the Katol Tahsil from Kondhali to Kelod, separating the Wardha and Wainganga Valleys. The highest peak of it is at Pilkapar.

River:- The Wardha and the Wainganga are the main rivers of the district. The Wardha flows along the part of the western border and controls the drainage system of the western part of the district. The principal tributaries of the Wardha are the Bor the Munna, the Jam and the Kar. The Bor rises in the hills near Bazargaon and rushes down a winding and rocky channel between Kondhali uplands and the Kauras Plateau, passing into the Wardha to join the Wunna. Its narrow valley is very fertile and the high well-wooded cliffs on either sides render it a wild and beautiful spot in the whole of the district.

The Wunna rises near the hill of Mahadagad in the Pilkapar range and flows along the northern base of the Kauras plateau past Hingna and Bori, where it is crossed by the Central railway. It leaves the district at Ashta. The small Krishna river joins it at Bori.

The Jam rises among the hills south of Kondhali and flowing northwards into the centre of the Katol Tahsil takes a westernly turn past Katol and joins the Wardha at Jalalkheda. The Kar rises in the same range, but flows directly south-west separating the Wardha and Nagpur districts till it joins the Wardha river at Khargad, the trijunction point of the two districts with Berar. The Mand flows across a small strip in the south of the district and joins the Wunna beyond the border of Wardha.

The Wainganga flows along the part of east-
controls the drainage system
ern/and portions of the of the district. It forms the
district boundry with Bhandara district for some distance.

The Kanhan and Pench are the most important tributaries of the Wainganga, both of which flow, from the Satpuda range in the Chhindwada district and meet near Kamptee where they are also joined by the Kolar. The Kanhan, entering the district near Borgaon takes a south-easterly course past Khapa to Kamptee, where it receives the Pench and Kolar. In its subsequent course, it makes the boundry of Ramtek tahsil and after receiving the Nag river near the hills of Bhivakund, finally empties itself into the Wainganga. The Kanhan river provides drinking water to Nagpur city.

The Kolar rises in the north-east corner of the Katol tahsil and after passing through the rocky part of Lohagad in Pilkapar range, emerges into the fertile plain of Saoner and separates Nagpur from Ramtek tahsil until its place as boundry river is taken by the Kanhan. Its bed is generally rocky. At Patansawangi, it receives the Chandrabhaga, which brings in the drainage of Kalmeshwar Plain.

The other rivers of some important are the Bawanthari, the Sur and the Gaotala Sand, which drains the easter half of Ramtek tahsil. The Sur is remarkable for its shallowness but its fertile properties produce sugarcane and garden crops of the land.

Irrigation project:- By the end of 30th 1973, Medium Irrigation projects viz. Ramtek, Wunna, Pandharabodi, Umri, Khursapar and Kesarnala were completed in this district, and the work of Chandrabhaga project and Kanholi project was in progress. Total estimated cost of the projects is Rs.507.94 lakhs and gross command area is 59,373 Hectares. An area of 20,909 hectares will be irrigated by all these projects after fully completed. The Ramtek Project which has been completed in 1913 at cost of Rs. 29.11 lakhs, was previously treated as Major irrigation project, but as the definition of the major and medium projects have been changed on the cost basis, this project is treated as Medium irrigation project.

A Pench Irrigation project is being constructed in Ramtek Tahsil of Nagpur district at the cost of Rs.36.00 crores, as per latest estimates. The Pench Multi-purpose project comprises of two parts viz (i) construction of storage dam at Totaldoh which includes of a power House at the dam site and would be storing water mostly for irrigation purposes and (ii) construction of pick-up weir at Kamptee-Khori with erection of gate over it Kamptee Khori weir alone can store enough water after erecting gates over it to ensure a water supply of 100 M.g.d. i.e. 50 M.g.d. for super Thermal Station and 50 M.G.D. for water supply to Nagpur city. The water stored in the storage dam at Totalado-h would be let out in the river and picked up at the pick up weir at Kamptee Kheri from where irrigation canals as well as water supply canal would take off. The project will be a boon to Nagpur district for its rapid economic and industrial growth.

Power Generation:- At present the power station at Khaparkheda some 15 Kilometres away from Nagpur city has got an installed capacity of 120 M.W.H. in addition to this there are power generation stations at Paras, Ballarsha, Bhusawal, Bldari and Nasik. The power generated at these power stations will not be sufficient for the ever increasing future need of Maharashtra State. Specially the demand for power in Vidarbha is going to be much more. Therefore, a Thermal Power Station having an installed capacity of 1080 Mg. is being established at Koradi near Khaparkheda.

The work of the schemes has advanced to a great extent and the first generator of 120 M.W. capacity at Koradi power station has been commissioned in June 1974. After completion of this project, there will be no dearth of power in this district and region and a rapid industrialisation of the district can be achieved. In addition to the Koradi Thermal power station at Koradi, Hydro Electrical Power station on Pench river is under construction. The cost of the project is Rs.22.00 crores. This is an inter state project. Civil works of the project are to be executed by the M.S.E.B.(Maharashtra State) and E & M works is to be executed by the Government of Madhya Pradesh. The expenditure so far incurred on this work is, therefore is the nature of commitment. It is expected that in 1978-79, 53 M.W. energy would be generated by this project.

Soils:- The main soils of the district are Kali(Medium deep black cotton)Morand (Comparatively light deep brown in colour) and Bardi (Red gravel with boulders).

Medium deep black soil is found around Kalme-shwar, and Saoner in the Wardha Valley and in the Nagpur and Kamptee Plains. The principal Soil of the district is known as Morand. It is very suitable for cotton and Jowar and is found in almost all the talukas. In the northern part of Ramtek taluka and especially in the valley of the Sur river. The morand soil is of very light colour Khardi is the regular rice land in the eastern part of the district. Bardi is found on the summits and slopes of hills, principally in the Katol tahsil.

1.7 Climate, Temperature and Rain fall:-

Climate :- The climate of the district is characterised by a hot summer, well distributed rainfall and dryness except in rainy season. The winter season sets in from December to February and is followed by the hot season from March to May. The south-west monsoon season is from June to September while the period October- November constitutes the post Monsoon.

Temperature:- The cold weather commence from November and it lasts till February. December is usually the coldest month with the mean daily minimum temperature at 14°C . (57.2°F) In the wake of western disturbances the district is sometimes affected by cold waves when the minimum temperature drops down to 4°C (39°F .) Temperature begins to rise daily maximum temperature at 42.7°C (108.0°F .) Nights are comparatively cooler in summer season. The on set of the south west monsoon at about the second week of June brings well come relief from the heat with a considerable drop in temperature. The temperature shows slight increase in October and there after begins to fall.

Except during the Monsoon season when the humidities are high, the weather is generally dry. The humidities go down to 20 % or less in summer season.

Rain fall:- The district gets rainfall from south-west monsoon originating from the Arabian seas. The average annual rainfall throughout the district amounts to 1016 mm. (40") and 1143 mm (45") perhaps due to the hills and forest tracts in these areas. Rain season usually starts in early June and lasts upto October. Occasional showers also not common. In the severe hot season, the light showers are sometimes followed by severe dust storms. The rainfall during June to September constitutes about 90 percent of the annual total rainfall. The variation in the annual rainfall from year to year is not very large, though the agricultural season is affected from year to year due to vagaries of monsoons. The heaviest rainfall in 24 hours recorded in the district was 330.20 Mms. (13 inches) at Umred on 14th August, 1953. The year 1969-70 was the year of plenty of rainfall.

Famine:- The district has recently suffered on account of shortage of rains after 1947. The Fact Finding Committee, appointed by the Government of Bombay in 1960 has pointed that the district is free from the famine and scarcity conditions. However, during 1972-73 many villages in the district had condition akin to scarcity because of untimely and short rain fall.

1.9 Nagpur City:- The city of Nagpur and ~~its~~ its suburban extensions which now almost reached upto the industrial nucleus of Kanhan from the nerve centre not only of the district but also of Vidarbha. Originally, advantage point of defence, Nagpur grew into an urban centre under the Bhonsales of the Maratha confederacy with the formation of the Central Provinces under the British regime the town acquired a new importance, as the administrative capital. Its growth coincided with the economic development of the surrounding region abounding in cotton crop. As in the case of large cities, Nagpur developed a complex structure based on administrative, economic and social forces, which finds expression in its urban and suburban areas. It draws a greater strength ~~from~~ from the new industrialisation and rightly competes with Bombay and Poona in its economic and Social growth.

CHAPTER - II

Explanatory notes on the scope and limitations of the statistical data presented in the Part-II Statistical Abstract.

I. Purpose:- The abstract part of this publication gives exhaustive Statistical data on important Socio-Economic indicators of development. Tables on almost all important topics are presented in this part so that the publication could serve as a reference book. Talukawise data have been displayed as far as possible for inter taluka comparison. In most of the tables, data for 1973-74 have been indicated with data for 1972-73 with data for 1971-72 or even for earlier years in the tables where in data for 1972-73 and 1973-74 could not be presented, the same for the latest years, for which they were available, have been shown. In case of 'Live stock and Census of Government employees, however, the data for latest Census have been presented. The population data have been shown for 1971 Census and also provisional figures for 1971 census on certain items. All the data are collected from the State and Central Government Offices, local bodies and other relevant agencies. The footnotes below each table indicate the source from which the data have been collected.

II- District at a Glance:

This table presents a bird's eye-view of the Socio Economic conditions of development in Nagpur District and Nagpur division, under different heads, such as area, population, agriculture, animal husbandry, education, transport and communication plan & C.D. programme local bodies other miscellaneous Statistics. Reference year of the data is also indicated in each table.

III- Contents, Scope and Limitation:-

The Statistical tables presented in the District Statistical Abstract are grouped into 13 parts. The contents of the tables and the scope and limitations of the data displayed under each group are explained below.

(1) Area and Population:-

In all 7 tables i.e. table nos. 1 to 7 are included in this section. The figures for 1971 census are also indicated in table No. 1 to 7.

Table No. 1:- This indicates area, No. of Houses and population according to 1971 census, in Rural and Urban areas of Nagpur District. Total area figures of the district as on 1st July, 1971 are as supplied by the Surveyor General of India. Also the area figures of Urban areas are as supplied by Municipal Corporations or Councils. A town or an urban area is defined as a place which has (I) Municipality, 2000 inhabitants or Civil lines or 2(1) a population of 5000 or over and (II) at least 3/4 or more of male workers are engaged in non-agricultural pursuits. The area figures in table No. 1 have been given in Sq.Km. One Sq.Km. is equal to 0.386 square miles.

Table No. 2:- It indicates decadal variations in population since 1951. **Table No. 3** gives classification of inhabited villages according to different population ranges. The term village i.e. (Rural area) used in the table denotes a statutorily recognised village having well defined boundary and separate land records. Hamlet, Wadies, or Padas have therefore not been shown as separate village.

Table No. 4:- This gives taluk wise classification of Towns according to population ranges in 1971 census in Nagpur district.

Table No. 5:- It gives No. of workers and non-workers in Rural and Urban areas of the district according to 1971 census and their classification according to Standard Livelihood classes. The population according to livelihood classes is classified under rural and Urban classification.

Table No. 6:- The table No. 6 gives distribution of population according to (A) Age group (B) Mother Tongue and (C) Religion Separately for Rural and Urban areas and for district as a whole according to 1971 Census. Here "Mother Tongue", is defined as a language spoken by the persons 'Mother' or the person in his childhood or mainly spoken in the house. Dialects, have been included in the main languages on the basis of Hierarchic classification.

Table No. 7:- It gives talukawise details of population of scheduled castes and scheduled tribes in Rural and Urban areas with the population of Males and Females, under above mentioned Categories according to 1971 census in Nagpur district. The scheduled castes notified for this district according to 1971 census are as follows:-

1) Scheduled tribes:- No caste is notified as Scheduled tribe in Nagpur district.

Climate:- Only two tables are included under this section pertaining to rainfall and temperature at the selected centres in Nagpur district.

Table No. 8:- Gives monthly rainfall and number of rainy days in each month at the selected centres for the year 1973. The data are collected through Revenue Agency. A day is treated as 'Rainy-Day' if during the 24 hours, the rain-gauge recorded a minimum of 2.5 M.M. of rainfall. Annual rainfall for each centre is also indicated in the table 'Normal Rainfall' is the average rainfall over a period ranging from fifty to eighty years.

Table No. 9:- Gives monthwise, maximum minimum and also annual temperature as recorded at selected centres for the year 1973. The data are supplied by the Government of India's Regional Meteorological Centre at Nagpur. The maximum and minimum temperature denotes the Maximum and Minimum temperature on any day during the month.

3. Agriculture:- In all 12 tables i.e. table Nos. 10 to 21 are included in this section.

The table No. 10 indicates talukawise figures of land utilisation under the standard heads of Land uses for the years 1971-72 and 1972-73. Against each taluka, the break-up of the total geographical area according to different types of Land uses is shown. Major constituents of the Geographical area are forests, land put to non-agricultural uses, barren and uncultivable land cultivable wastes permanent pastures, land under miscellaneous tree, crops not included in area sown, current fallows, other fallows and lastly net area sown.

Under 'Forests' are included all actually forest areas of land classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests whether state owned or private. If any portion of such land is not actually wooded but put to some agricultural use, that portion is included under the appropriate heading of cultivated or uncultivated land as the case may be. 'Land put to non-agricultural uses, stands for all lands, occupied by buildings, roads and Railways or under water, e.g. rivers and canals and other lands put to uses other than agriculture. Barren and unculturable land covers all barren and unculturable land like mountains, deserts etc. Land which cannot be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost is classed as 'Barren and unculturable Land. When such land is in isolated or within cultivated holding. Culturable waste includes all land available for cultivation whether not taken up for cultivation or taken up for cultivation once, but not cultivated during the current year and last five years or more in succession. Such lands may be either fallows or covered with shrubs and jungles which are not put to any use. They may be assessed or not assessed and may lie in blocks or within cultivated holdings. 'Permanent Pastures' and other grazing lands cover all grazing lands, whether they are Permanent Pastures and meadows or not. Village common and grazing lands within forest areas are included under this head. Land Under Miscellaneous tree crops etc. not included in the net area sown, are included in cultivable land, which is not included under net area sown but is put to some agricultural use. Land under casuri tree, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other groves used for fuel etc. which are not included under 'Orchards are classed under the category 'Current fallows' comprise cultivable areas, which are kept fallow during the current year. Other fallow land includes all lands which were taken up for cultivation, but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and more than five years. The net area sown consists of net area sown which crops and orchards area sown more than once being counted only once.

The gross cropped area represents the sub-total of area under all crops. The difference between the total of gross cropped area and net area sown is accounted for by the area sown more than once during the same year with the same or different crops.

Table No. 11:- Shows the area under different crops in each taluka. It gives break up of the total gross cropped area according to major group of food and non-food crops.

Table No. 12:- Gives yield per hectare and outturn of principal crops in the district.

Table No. 13:- Depicts the picture of talukawise area irrigated by different sources whereas table No. 14 shows an area irrigated under different crops in each taluka. Table No. 15

shows the talukawise number of irrigation wells in the district. A quinquennial census of irrigation wells takes place after every five years. For any intermediate years the village officers are instructed to note the number of new wells constructed or old wells which have gone out of use and thus bring upto date the earlier census figures of number of wells. The minor irrigation works are shown in table No.-16.

Table No. 17:- Gives the information on major and medium projects in this district. Both completed and incomplete projects have been covered in this table. Position in this table is as it was on 30th June 1973. The cost of medium irrigation project ranges between Rs. 25 Lakhs to Rs. 5 Crores, whereas that of a major irrigation project, it is Rs. 5 crores and above.

Table No. 18: Deals with monthly agricultural wage rates in 1973. This data is collected fortnightly throughout the year from three selected Rural Centres in Nagpur District viz. (1) Mouda (2) Kuhi (3) Dhapewada.

Table No. 19:- Deals with agricultural implements in each taluka. The implements are wooden and Iron Ploughs, Carts, Sugarcane Crushers operated with power and Bullocks, oil Engines with pumps for irrigation purpose, Electric pumps for the irrigation purpose, Tractors and Oil Ghannis (Less than 5 Kg. and above 5 Kg.) according to 1972 census.

Table No. 20:- Deals with Famine Scarcity and akin to scarcity data in the district for the year 1973-74.

Table No. 31:- Indicates the position of precarious and other scarcity areas according to the history of scarcity in the district.

4) Animal Husbandry and Forest:-

A) Animal Husbandry :- In all 7 tables i.e. table Nos. 22 to 26 - C are included in this section.

Table No. 22:- Gives talukawise number of various types of livestock and poultry as enumerated in the district in the livestock census, 1972. The census is conducted throughout the country on an uniform basis of concepts and methods of enumeration once in 5 years. During the Livestock Census Operations the Livestock and poultry were enumerated by house to house enquiry particular care was taken to enumerate enumerated Livestock in slaughter houses, stray animals and animals in transit. Sex and age groupwise classification of the livestock is also indicated in the table. The table Nos. 23, 24 and 25 gives talukawise veterinary Statistics, disease wise Live stock mortality and No. of slaughter houses and animals slaughter in them for the year 1973-74.

B- Forest:- The table No. 26 (A) gives details of area in different types of forests during the year 1973-74. Data regarding forests under the control of the state Government's Forest Department and those under the control of the State Government's Revenue Department are shown separately. The areas under forests are classified according to legal status into reserved forests protected forests and unclassed forests. The legal status refers to the classification of forests under the Indian Forests Act XVI of 1927.

Reserved forests are those that are intended mainly for timber production, where the rights of grazing and cultivation is allowed. In protected forests, the restrictions are not so rigid. Right of grazing or cultivation is allowed, but certain limitations and restrictions are imposed. The unclassed forests refers to the inaccessible forest or unoccupied waste.

The forests which are taken by Government from local bodies or private individuals for management on lease basis are called 'leased forests'. There is no classification of ex-proprietary forests as such but in Nagpur division, some private lands containing valuable forest are taken over by Government under section 29 of the Indian Forests Act, which are not yet classified and they are termed as ex-proprietary. The forest area shown in the Table No. 26(A) may not tally with the area under forest shown in Table No. 10. The two sets of figures differ due to the following reasons.

(i) In the Indian Forest Statistics Returns, the whole area including non wooden area under the control of Forest Department is taken as area under forest, while in Agricultural Statistics, it is classified according to its actual utilisation.

(ii) The Forest Department returns are meant to serve a definite administrative purpose and indicate the ownership of the forest areas and the actual utilisation of these areas is not so important from the point of view of Forest Department, as it is in the land utilisation Statistics under Agricultural Statistics.

(iii) The Forest Department returns relate to financial year and Agricultural Statistics relate to the Agricultural

Table No. 26(B):- Gives the information on major and minor forest production in the Distt. during the year 1973-74.

5. Employment, Industry, Mining and Electricity:-

In all 9 tables, i.e. tables Nos. 27 to 35 are included in this section. The factory statistics shown in table No. 27, 28 and 29 cover following types of factories registered under the Factory Act 1948.

- 1) Those employing ten or more workers working with the aid of power (Section 2 m (i).
2. Those employing twenty or more workers and working without the aid of power (Section 2(ii) and 3)
- 3) Those registered under Section 85 of the Act. under which the State Govt. makes applicable the provisions of the Act, even though the above conditions are not fulfilled. However, Statistics of the Defence

Table No. 30:- Deals with the Annual Survey of Industries indicating industriewise working of and reporting factories, employment, fixes, working and produce, capital total value of production, and value added for the year 19 66 . This survey is carried out by the Bureau of Economics and Statistics, Bombay, annually.

Table No. 31:- Shows the employment Exchange statistics for 1973-74.

Table No. 32:- Gives occupational distribution of total registrations and placements in the employment exchange for the year 1973-74 according to Standard National Classification. Table No. 33:- gives the volume of employment in different industries as on 31st March, 1974.

Table No. 34:- Gives the figures of Consumption of Electricity during 1973-74 and table No. 35 gives progress of electrification of towns and villages and population covered in the district during last decade.

6- Co-operation:- In all 8 tables i.e. table Nos. 36 to 43 are included in this section.

Table No. 36:- gives the number of co-operative credit and non-credit societies of different types during the year 1973-74 as on 30th June 1974 in Nagpur district.

Table No. 37:- Presents data of central Co-operative Banks, Urban Banks in the District.

Table No. 38:- Gives talukawise number of Primary agricultural societies, their membership, share capital, Reserve and other funds, working capital, Loans advanced recovered, loans outstanding and overdues and percentage of recovery to total loan - advanced for the year 1973-74. Working Capital includes paid up share capital, deposits reserved and other funds and borrowings, Loans Outstanding includes outstanding in respect of loans, cash credit and over drafts and the amount ~~of~~ of outstanding bills purchased or discounted. 'Overdues' refer to amount of loan or instalments which were due for collection but which were not actually collected and for the repayment of which no extension has been granted by a competent authority.

Table No. 39:- Presents the No. of Societies, their membership, share capital, working Capital and operation respectively for each type of co-operative societies.

Table No. 40:- Shows the operation of Central and Primary Co-operative marketing societies in the district during the year 1973-74.

Table No. 41:- Gives data regarding operation and other co-operative societies of different types in the district.

Table No. 42:- Gives the value of purchases and sales of Agri. produce through regulated markets in the district.

Table No. 43:- Gives talukawise number of registered money lenders in each taluka and loans advanced by them during the year 1973-74. Separate figures of loans advanced to traders and non-traders have been furnished in the table. The transactions of money lending in the state are regulated under the provisions of Bombay Money lenders Act, 1946. According to the Act, no money lender shall carry on the business of money lending except in area for which he has been granted a licence and except in accordance with the terms and conditions of such licence.

7. Medical and public Health:- In all 5 tables i.e. table Nos. 44 to 48 are included in this section.

Table No. 44:- Given in this section indicates number of hospitals, dispensaries, maternity homes and medical facilities available through public and public aided bodies in this district with the number of Health Centres and Primary Health Centres, Doctors, Nurses, Vaidyas, Beds and total number of indoor and outdoor patients treated as well for the year 1973-74. The table does include all the Central Government Medical Institutions and also other private institutions engaged in providing medical facilities. Private clinics run by Private bodies or individuals are however not included in the table.

Table No. 45:- Gives vital statistics such as number of registered births and deaths in this district. Sexwise classification of births, deaths and infant deaths for 1973 is also given talukawise in the district inclusive of the vital statistics.

Table No. 46:- Gives number of deaths due to important causes in Nagpur district during 1973. Table No. 47 gives talukwise statistics of vaccination and revaccination for small pox and cholera inoculation during 1973.

Table No. 48:- Indicates number of sterilisation operations done under vasectomy and Tubectomy with number of I.U.C.D. insertions performed during the year 1973-74 and Family Planning Centres in the district.

8. Education:- In all 5 tables i.e. table 49, 52, 53, 54 and 55 are included in this section. The table No. 50 and 51 have been dropped for the current year. The data in table No. 49 is according to 1971 census.

Table No. 49:- Gives sexwise number of literate and percentage of literacy separately for rural and Urban areas of this district according to 1971 population census. As per 1971 Census definition a person was classified as a literate if he was able to read or write a simple letter in any language.

Table No. 52:- Gives information regarding number of educational institutions according to types for the year 1972-73 and 1973-74. Sexwise enrolment and number of trained and untrained teacher in these institutions is also indicated in this table. The classification of institutions according to 'type' is slightly different from stage of education. There were at present many Secondary Schools, which also impart education in Primary course. Nevertheless, the entire enrolment of students included under 'Secondary' education. Primary institutions provided education for standards I to IV standards I to VII/VIII or less, and teach the curriculum approved by the Education Department. The Secondary institutions coach students for standard VIII to X standards with or without lower standards. Higher education is education after passing Secondary School Certificate Examination, which leads to a Degree Examination.

Table No. 53:- Presents data on the number of beneficiaries among backward classes such as scheduled caste, scheduled-tribes and other backward classes for the year 1972-73 and 73-74. Beneficiaries for this table are persons who are getting educational concessions of either type such as scholarships, freeships etc.

Table No. 54:- Gives number of beneficiaries and financial concession granted to the Economically backward class in respect of Primary Secondary and Higher Institutions in the district during the years 1972-73 and 1973-74.

Table No. 55:- Gives data regarding recurring and non-recurring expenditure under Normal, and Plan heads by different agencies viz. Zilla Parishad, Municipal Councils, Corporations, Cantonment Boards etc. during the year 1973-74 in this district.

9. Transport and Communication:-

Seven In all tables i.e. table Nos. 56 to 62 are included in this section.

Table No. 56:- Gives total railway length as on 31st March, 74 according to type of routes Broad Gauge, Metre Gauge and Narrow Gauge. The railway length is measured between the first and last stations within the district boundary. The figures of length of each type of route are therefore, approximate and not accurate.

Table No. 57:- Gives road length according to different categories and surfacewise for the roads of Zilla Parishad and Building and Communication Department as on 31st March, 1974.

Table No. 58:- Gives the motor vehicles in operation in Nagpur district as on 31st March, 1974.

Table No. 59:- Deals with operational statistics of Nationalised Road Transport in Nagpur division as on 31st March, 74.

For this table, the S.T. Division comprises of (1) Nagpur (2) Wardha (3) Bhandara (4) Chandrapur Districts of Nagpur Region.

Table No. 60:- Presents the results of the traffic census of important roads conducted in Buildings and Communication Department, Govt. of Maharashtra. Data on the number of vehicles is according to categories and location of count-post. Type of surface carriage way, No. of light Medium and heavy motor vehicles and total traffic intensity in towns per 24 hours are also indicated in the table as on May 1972.

Table No. 61:- Relates to communication system No. of post Offices, telegraph offices No. of letter Boxes, telephone numbers, Radio Licences renewed during the years 1961-62, 1965-66, 1970-71, 1972-73 and 1973-74.

Table No.62:- Relates to Rural Broad Casting Statistics as on 31st March, 1974 in Nagpur District.

10 Local Bodies:- In all 4 tables i.e. tables Nos. 63 to 66 are included in this section.

Table No. 63, 64 and 66 Give abstract of income and expenditure of local bodies such as Village Panchyats, Zilla Parishad and Municipalities for the financial years 1965-66, 1968-69, 1969-70, 1970-71, 1971-72, 1972-73 and 1973-1974. The number of Village Panchyats includes number of independent village Panchyat as well as group Village Panchyats.

Table No. 65 A, 65 B, 65 C, give headwise receipts of Zilla Parishad for the financial year, 1972-73 (actual) 1973-74 (Revised.) and 1974-75 Estimates.

11. Plan and Community Development:- In all 5 tables i.e. Table Nos. 67 to 71 are included in this section.

12 Prices:- Only 3 tables i.e. table Nos. 72, 73 and 74 are included in this section.

Table No. 72:- gives monthly average wholesale prices of certain Agricultural Commodities at regulated markets during the years 1973 in Nagpur District.

Table No. 73:- Gives Monthly average retail prices of various Commodities at District Head Quarters during the years 1973 in Nagpur District.

The average prices under each commodity are shown from the month of January to December for the year 1973 alongwith units and varieties of Commodities for which prices have been quoted. The data are regularly collected by the District Statistical Office, every week on Friday by visiting the shops. The average prices of each commodities for the selected year is also shown in the table. As the information collected for the given commodities is restricted to only one quotation and that too only from one shop at Distt. Head Quarters, the average price for individual commodity cannot be said to be fully representative.

But the data may prove useful as a broad indicator of the changing trend in retail prices over the period of time.

Table No. 74:- Gives consumer price index number (revised series) for working class of Nagpur Centre published by the office of the Commissioner, of Labour, Bombay. Monthwise data for the years 1973-74 commencing from April and also averages for the years 1973-74 have been given in this table. The base year for calculating price Index (New series) is 1960. The Index numbers of wholesale prices are issued by the Economic Advisor to the Government of India. The base year for the same is 1952-53. The method of Construction of the index is given in the Appendix to Index Numbers of wholesale prices in India revised series (1956) issued by the office of the Economic Advisor to Government of India. The equivalent of old Index numbers can be obtained by multiplying the new index by 5.22 as Multiplier.

13-Miscellaneous:- In all 11 tables i.e. table Nos. 75 to 85 are included in this section.

CHAPTER -III

Indicator No. 1:- Percentage of of Gross Sown area to net area.

The percentage of gross sown area to net sown area increased during 1972-73 to 102.49 as compared to 101.43 during the year 1960-61. The increase is noticed in all the tahsils in the district.

Indicator No. 2:- Productivity of Agricultural Crops.

Timely and sufficient rainfall or assured irrigation are the necessary prerequisites for good crops. The year 1960-61 was quite good and had brought in bumper crops. The agricultural year of 1972-73 proved to be Normal rains in this district. Comparative figures of outturn of crops in Metric tonnes during 1960-61 and 1972-73 and the percentage increase(+) or decrease(-) of outturn during 1972-73 over 1960-61 has been given in the following table.

The above table shown that though out turn of Gram, Ground nut and cotton, has increased during 1972-73 as compared to 1960-61, overall out turn of total cereals, and total pulses has decreased resulting in a decrease of 54.30 into out turn of total food grains. The out turn of Cotton has shown an increase of 51.4 during 1972-73 over 1960-61.

In general, the overall production of crops during 1972-73 was found to be less than the production of crops during 1960-61.

Indicator No. 3:- Gross Value of Agricultural Products.

As the farm harvest prices of various commodities are not available, the indicator has not been worked out.

Indicator No. 4:- Percentage of Irrigated area:-

The percentage of net irrigated area to net area sown in Nagpur District was 5.17 during 1960-61 which is increased to 5.82 during 1972-73. Low percentage of net irrigated area to area sown indicates that the irrigation facilities are very meagre in the district and needs to be improved. The percentage of net irrigated area to net sown area has slightly increased during 1972-73 as compared to the figures of previous year for the district as a whole. There was slight increase in percentage of net irrigated area to net area sown in the Nagpur district during 1972-73 as compared to 1960-61. The increase was observed in Katol, Nagpur and Saoner tahsils only.

The percentage of gross cropped area to net cropped area in the district has increased to 102.47 during 1972-73 over 1960-61 when it was 102.00.

Indicator No. 5:- Change of crop Pattern.

The types of cropping patterns followed bifurcate the district in two parts. The first part comprises of Katol and Saoner tahsils and part of Nagpur tahsil where mainly Kharif Jowar and Cotton crops are grown. The other part consists of Ramtek and Umred tahsils and part of Nagpur taluka where paddy, rabi-Jowar wheat and linseed crops are predominantly grown.

During 1960-61 the area under food crops was approximately four times to the areas under non-food crops in the district. The areas under food crops during 1972-73 shown decrease as compared to the area under food crops during 1960-61 in all talukas of the district. Reverse is the case with the area non-food crops. The change is due to the tendency of cultivators to grow more cash crops.

Under food crops, areas under or less than chillies have been increased as these are cash crops. Area under oil seeds have also increased under non-food crops. These are also cash crops. The decrease in areas under food crops during the year 1972-73 over 1960-61 was mainly due to the increasing tendency on the part of the cultivators to cultivate cash crops in general. This can be proved from the fact that the area under non food crops is increased in Katol, Saoner and Ramtek Tahsils. Katol, Saoner and Nagpur where cotton is grown 28%, 27% and 24% while it is limited to 4 % in the Tahsil of Ramtek and 8% in Umred where Paddy is the main crop. This can be proved from the fact that the area under non food crops in the Tahsils of Katol, Nagpur and Saoner and part of Nagpur Tahsil where paddy is the main crop. The area under food crops was therefore approximately three times than the area under non food crops during the year 1972-73 in this district.

It is seen that during the year 1960-61 almost all irrigated area was under food crops except 2.44 percent of it which was under irrigated non-food crops. The area under irrigated food crops in 1972-73 decreased slightly to 95.94 percent, while the area under non food crops increased to 4.06 percent as compared with corresponding figures for 1960-61. The increase was greatest in Katol tahsils while it was lowest in Ramtek Tahsil.

Indicator No. 6:- Increase in agricultural credit and outstanding dues.

Agricultural credit is the backbone of the Co-operative movement eventhough it has been enlarged to marketing, processing, Industry, Labour etc. There were 2037 Co-operative Societies in Nagpur district during the year 1973-74 out of which 634 were agricultural credit societies.

The agricultural credit facilities have given by the agricultural credit societies plays a vital role and have paved for a way to bring rapid development in the rural economy. The following table shows the position of loans advanced and outstandings of loan during 1961-62 and 1973-74 in Nagpur District.

The percentage increase in the amount of loan advanced during 1973-74 over the corresponding amounts of loans advanced during 1961-62 worked out to 708.08 percent. On an average Rs. 1.19 lakhs were advanced by each of the agricultural credit Societies during 1973-74 while the loans advanced per member works out to Rs. 829 as against Rs. 493 during 1972-73.

The percentage increase in loans outstandings during 1973-74 over 1972-73 works out to 133.57. On an average Rs. 0.61 lakhs were outstanding loan per Agri. credit Societies during the year 1973-74.

Poultry per person was highest in Umred taluka in 1972 and lowest in Nagpur taluka. It was less in Nagpur taluka due to sizable population of Nagpur city. As compared to the 1961 livestock census poultry population decreased in Ramtek, Umred and Nagpur Tahsils, while it had increased in Katol and Saoner talukas in 1972 livestock Census.

In Nagpur district, electricity is generated in thermal power station at Khaperkheda and at Koradi from where it is distributed to Nagpur and other district in the State. As a consequence of rapid development in rural electrification, the per capita consumption of electricity has increased considerably in the district as it could be seen from the table given below:-

The consumption of electricity has more than double during 1973-74 as compared to consumption of electricity during 1961-62. The number of villages electrified increased from 216 during 1960-61 to 236 at the end of the year 1973-74. The percentage of villages electrified to total number villages in the district works out to 57.6 and to total villages it is 49.7 percent. There is still much scope for the progress to be made in rural electrification. To fulfil this need of the district, as well as the demand from this region, one more super thermal power station with generating capacity of 1080 MWH is being set up at Koradi. The work of this project has made considerable progress during the year under review.

Indicator No. 11:- Increased in number of candidates enrolled in employment exchange and vacancies notified.

In the period of planned development, it is generally presumed that the increase in prices will be near about 20 percent per year. But in the year 1973 the prices of essential commodities have increased over this expectation and it is in few case, more than 100 to 200 percent. This increase in prices is due to Scarcity conditions in the nation and inflation also.

CHAPTER -IV

Progress of Plan scheme during 1973-74

The basic goal of planning, is improvement in the living conditions of the people. The stable and progressive economy could only satisfy the requirement of rapid development. Planning pays good result if all conditions remain unchanged. Unfortunately the rural economy of the Maharashtra State has been affected by the untimely Monsoon. Development of the State can be judged from the increase in per capita income. In order to increase per capita income, growth rate of gross national product should be faster than the rate of increase of population.

The Government of India has given high priority by giving more weightage to the programme of Family Planning out of necessity for checking the rapid birth rate. The experts of the planning have pointed out the fact that achievements and the developments of the planning have been curbed due to constant growth of population. It is, therefore, essential to check up the growth of population and to arrange proper exploitation of the resources for increase in production and set up the tempo of economic activities in general and industrial development in particular to the maximum possible extent. In the present circumstances the planning Organisation has to plan the economic activities based on resources and not on requirements. It is, therefore, seen that in the present planning, all the schemes have been introduced on the priority of necessity and urgency, turning with the resources available. State Government has decided, looking to the need of the day, that the planning should be framed at district level according to the requirements of district with a view of balanced development.

The progress achieved under plan scheme during the year 1973-74 in Nagpur District has been reviewed in the following paragraph.

In all, 133 schemes have been implemented in Nagpur district during 1973-74 as Distt. level Schemes. Total Financial outlay of Annual Plan 1973-74 for Nagpur district is Rs. 300.70 lakhs on District level schemes. Out of which Rs. 154.63 lakhs were for State sector schemes and Rs. 146.07 lakhs were for local sector schemes.

The percentage of financial outlay on state sector and local sector plan schemes was 51.42 and 48.58 respectively. The budget outlay shown in the above table is as per Annual Progress Report 73-74. The total expenditure during the year 1973-74 on all the plan schemes stood at Rs. 218.69 lakhs.

The percentage of expenditure to budget outlay works out to 72.53 percent. No regular budget provision was made for the schemes under the head 'Power'. The Maharashtra State Electricity Board, Bombay spent Rs. 1.37 lakhs as a part of State Government contribution on the schemes of rural electrification in Nagpur during 1973-74. The percentage of expenditure to the budget outlay under Agricultural Programme, Co-operation and Community Development, Irrigation and Power, Road and Transport and Mining and Industry was 94 %, 84 %, 12 %, 119 %, 100 % respectively.

Agricultural Programme:- This head of development include important sub-heads of plans such as, Soil Conservation, Minor Irrigation, Agricultural production, etc. The budget provision, actual expenditure and percentage of expenditure to budget provision under different sub-heads of development are given in the following table.

Agriculture in the State greatly depends upon the nature. The underground and flow irrigation potential being limited, nearly 92 percent of the gross cropped area comes under dry farming methods in this state as on 1971. In Napur district gross cropped area was 558599 hectares, out of this only 41936 hectares was gross irrigated during 1971-72 which comes to 7.5 percent. To bring maximum land under irrigation the Government of Maharashtra has introduced various methods of irrigation i.e. Irrigation from wells; Tube wells, Lift Irrigation and irrigation tank.

The irrigation works costing upto Rs. 25/- lakhs are classified as minor irrigation work. Those costing more than 25/- lakhs are classified as Medium Irrigation works, while those costing more than 5/- crores as Major Irrigation works. ^{but upto} 5 crores

Under the sub-head Agril. production, there were eight schemes in this district. Out of the seven schemes five schemes were under local sector and the same were implemented by the Zilla Parishad, Napur and the remaining two schemes were under the State Sector. These two schemes were under the State Sector and were being implemented through the Divisional Soil Conservation Office. Budget provision for these 8 schemes was Rs. 11.13 lakhs (Rs. 0.25 lakhs under State Sector, and Rs. 10.88 lakhs under local sector) against which an expenditure is of Rs. 9.85 lakhs. has been included incurred.

In State sector Rs. 15000 have been spent for the establishment of taluka seed and an expenditure of Rs. 3000 as subsidy ^{of} _m r- to Municipal Councils for transportation of Town compost against the budget provision of Rs. 5000 has been booked. Target of handling of town compost was 62000 tonnes against which achievement is 31090 tonnes only. In local sector an area of 95922 acres i.e. 38944 hectares has been brought under intensive cultivation against the target of 105020 acres i.e. 43044 hectares. The scheme of Construction of one Agril. school building at Sawangi was in progress, 8 centres for demonstration of multi crop production were in function in this district and an amount of Rs. 0.07 lakhs was spent as plan expenditure on these centres. The programme of Agricultural Development was undertaken by the Zilla Parishad, Nagpur, and an amount of Rs. 0.99 lakhs was spent during the year under review. An amount of Rs. 5.10 lakhs was provided for 'integrated area development scheme' for small holders against which an expenditure of Rs. 5.05 lakhs has been booked. The amount spent was financial aid for construction of 13 community wells, purchase and development of land (2480 hectares) and purchase of milch animals i.e. sheep.

Minor Irrigation:- Budget provision of Rs. 30.42 lakhs was allotted for the schemes under local sector and Rs. 27.62 lakhs for the scheme under state sector. In local sector an expenditure of Rs. 30.42 lakhs, and Rs. 29.12 in state sector has been incurred.

Budget provision of Rs. 29.12 lakhs was made for the schemes under state sector for the purpose of development of irrigation resources. The expenditure actually incurred was 29.12 lakhs. The physical achievement under state sector was subsidy on construction of New Wells 496 and installation of 128 pump sets. The work of 17 Minor Irrigation tanks was in progress during the year.

Soil Conservation is one of the most important programmes in modern Agril. Development. Levelling of land by Contour Bunding, Afforestation for Soil Conservation and Reclamation of Land have been done under this programme. To retain the productivity of land and to control the Soil erosion, the State Government provided an amount of Rs. 33.30 lakhs during 1973-74, against which an expenditure of Rs. 23.31 has been incurred. An area of 10290 hectares was to be banded under the Schemes of "Bunding" and the target to cover an area under schemes of Terracing of Land for Paddy crop was 1000 hectares against this target, the achievements are 6994 hectares and 558 hectares respectively. The Divisional Forest Officer is the implementing authority for the scheme viz. 'Afforestation for Soil Conservation'. Under this scheme an area of 50 hectares has been brought under afforestation. Under the Town Milk supply scheme, 21349 litres of milk has been distributed against the given target of 30000 litres by the Naggur Town Milk Schemes.

Forest :- An additional 20 hectares of land has been brought under plantation of General Utility Timber. Maintenance work of Deer Park, Children park, has been undertaken under the scheme of Nature Conservancy. 20 hectares of land has been brought under plantation under Farm Forestry and plantation in 10 hectares of land under pulpwood species has been done during 1973-74.

Co-operation and Community Development:-

The expenditure under this head of development was Rs. 7.93 lakhs. Under the sub-head co-operation, no financial assistance to Market Committees could be advanced as these co-operative societies did not fulfil the criteria for grant of financial assistance.

Irrigation and power:- The schemes of rural electrification have been implemented under this sub-head by the Maharashtra State Electricity Board. The expenditure incurred on this scheme was from two resources, one from the State Government and another Agril. Refinance Corporation. The expenditure under the rural Electrification scheme from the Government fund is Rs. 1.37 lakhs against budget provision of Rs. 11.45. Additional 109 villages were electrified and connections to 2981 electric pumps were given according to the report during the year under review.

Industry and Mining:- An amount of 16.66 lakhs have been spent against budget provision of Rs. 16.71 lakhs.

Transport and Communication:- Five schemes were implemented under this sub-head during 73-74. An expenditure of Rs.10.82 lakhs was incurred during 73-74 against the budget provision of Rs. 22.88 lakhs. District Roads, Roads in Hilly and Forest area, Village Approach Roads and Roads of Economic Importance were taken for construction during the year. The special addition from last year was the programme of rural employment Guarantee scheme which was lined with other Plan schemes.

Social Services:- Rs. 78.42 lakhs have been spent during the year 1973-74 under the head 'Social Services'. The following table gives the break up of expenditure under the head according to different sub-heads of development.

General Education:- In general education 75 teachers were continued under the scheme of Normal Expansion of Primary Schools during this year. The stress was given on primary education. Fifty two schools were assisted under the scheme of Development and expansion of Non-Government Secondary School in Vidarbha, 43950 students have been benefitted under the scheme of education concession to students of Economically backward class people. Concessions were given to 350 children of primary school teachers. 14 new rooms were constructed during this year. Under the scheme of strengthening of inspecting staff for inspection of schools 6 AMIS were continued, 13 additional teachers were appointed under the scheme of expansion of primary education in the urban area. 155 teachers were trained under the scheme of basic training to Pre-Primary Teachers, and 380 under elementary teachers training. No loan was granted to Voluntary Societies for construction of school buildings during the year.

Technical Education:- Two schemes pertaining to this sub-head on establishment of new polytechnic and expansion of existing polytechnic were implemented under the sub-head "Technical Education" during the year 1973-74.

Medical and Nursing:- Schemes regarding construction of Health centre at Saoner has been implemented during the year 1973-74 in Nagpur District.

Water supply and Drainage:- The budget provision for the schemes under this sub-head was Rs. 6.12 lakhs. 6 water supply schemes for urban areas and 25 Rural water supply schemes (21 schemes to be implemented by the P.H. works and 4 by the Z.P.) were in progress at the beginning of 1973-74. The work of 2 works has been completed by the Zilla Parishad. Total expenditure under this sub-head was Rs. 16.90 lakhs, out of which Rs. 16.30 lakhs under State Sector and Rs. 0.60 lakhs under local sector has been incurred.

Housing:- Budget provision of Rs. 46.70 lakhs was earmarked for 5 housing schemes with intention to provide accommodation on rented basis and hire purchases basis to the Industrial workers, Low Income Group, Middle Income Group, Economically weaker sections and also for Land acquisition and development schemes. An amount of Rs. 15.26 lakhs has been spent on these schemes. The construction work of houses under these schemes was in progress. Two schemes i.e. extension of village Gaothan and Resettlement of person affected or threatened by flood have been implemented during 1973-74 for which an amount of Rs. 1.17 lakhs was earmarked against which Rs. 0.93 lakhs has been spent during the reference period.

Welfare of Backward Classes:- Exemption from payment of tuition fees, examination fees, award of scholarships had been given to 1220 schedule caste and scheduled tribe students and 960 other backward class students under this sub-head during 1973-74 in Nagpur District. Rs. 0.50 lakhs have been spent for loan cum-subsidy to the cottage industries and professions, under which 125 societies were benefited during the year. 61 irrigation wells were constructed for schedule tribes people during the year.

Under this sub-head during the year 1973-74, expenditure incurred was Rs. 1.40 lakhs.

Rural Broad Casting:- 95 Radio sets were installed during this year in Nagpur District as against the target of 100 radio sets to be installed. The achievement is 95 percent. Rs. 0.29 lakhs is an installation expenditure during the year

Centrally sponsored schemes:-

In addition to above schemes, Centrally sponsored schemes were also implemented in the district during the year 1973-74. The budget provision for these schemes was Rs. 32.76 lakhs and expenditure incurred was Rs. 19.93 lakhs.

The schemes include applied Nutrition programme, composite programme for women and pre school children, Grant of tuition fees, examination fees to students of Vimukta Jatis, development of land and construction of irrigation wells for Vimukta Jatis under welfare of Backward classes, District Roads from Central Government Fund and two schemes viz. Family Planning and Malaria Eradication of public Health Department.
