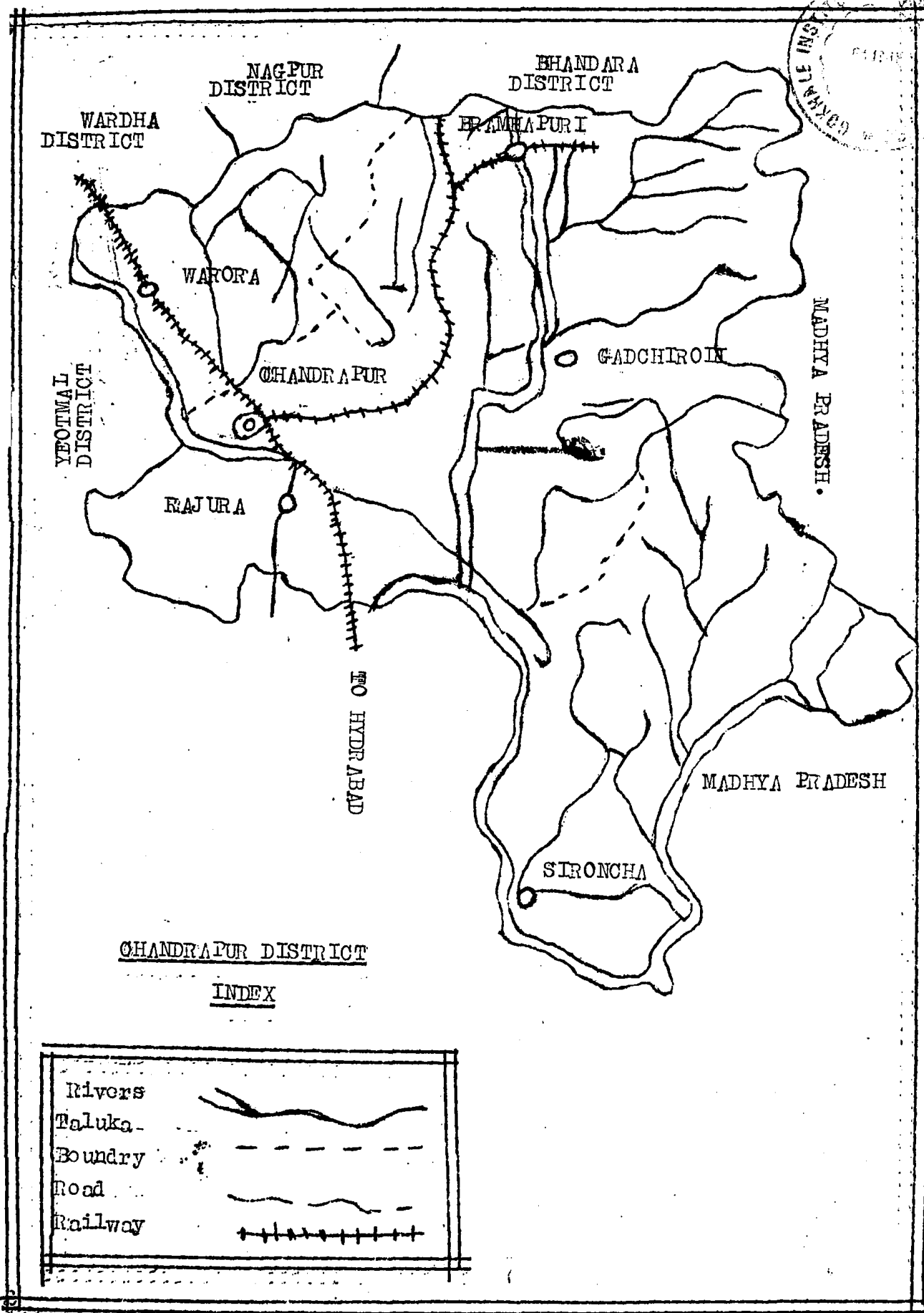

## CHAPTER-I

### I. Introduction.

#### 1.1 Brief History & Location.

Chandrapur district forming part of the kingdom of Raghuji Bhonsle was finally annexed by the East Indian Company in 1854. The Bhonsle dynasty had acquired the district from the Gond Kings and ruled the territory from 1751 to 1853 when Raghuji Bhonsle died heirless in 1853 and Nagpur district was created for administrative purposes by the the Company. Prior to the reign of Bhonsle dynasty, the district was under the rule of the Gond King from about 1240 to 1751. The Gond King Ballarshah founded the Chanda fort. The early history of Chandrapur district, prior to the rule of the Gond Kings, has to be pieced together from different inscriptions found in the district. The Gond Kings occupied this territory from Mana Kings of Wairagarh. Earlier to Manas, Budhist Kings known as Kosala Kings were ruling over this part whose capital according to one source was Chandrapur and from other source was at Bhadrawati and Wairagarh. However, it is in connection with Kosalas that we arrive at the first authentic historical record in the history about the district. Hsiun, Tsiang, the Chinese pilgrim records that he visited the capital of Kosalas in 639 A.D. It is also conjectured that a strong Kingdom ruled in the early days at Bhadrawati with flourishing civilisation existing there.

Chandrapur district lies in the Godawari basin and was formed as an independent district in 1854. Upto 1874 the district comprised only of three tahsils of Mul, Warora and Bramhapuri. In 1874 upper Godawari district of Madras was abolished and four talukas were adjoined to Chandrapur district to form one tahsil with Sironcha as its headquarters. The Zamindari estates from Bramhapuri and Chandrapur were merged into a new Tahsil with headquarters at Gadchiroli. In 1907, three tahsils of Cherala, Albaka and Nagpur were transferred to Madras State.

In 1956 with the reorganisation of States, the district was transferred from former Madhya Pradesh to Bilingual Bombay State. At present it is a part of Nagpur Division of Maharashtra State since 1 st May 1960.

In March 1959, Rajura Tahsil of Nanded district was transferred to Chandrapur district and was notified as an independent district and division under the Collector Chandrapur and the Commissioner, Nagpur Division, Nagpur respectively. Now it has become a tahsil of Chandrapur District under the Collector, Chandrapur and its connection with the Aurangabad Division is completely revoked.

The District with a population comprising the Marathas, Telugu and Gonds is of peculiar interest from linguistic and anthropological points of view. It has also many other claims to

distinction. In mineral wealth it is remarkably rich, as it possesses vast Forests and its area under Govt: Forests is bigger than the entire area of a few other districts in Maharashtra.

Its system of agriculture is usually varying and in some respect unique in the Division. The system of irrigation is very extensive and its sporting possibilities, though no longer what they were in the past, are still unsurpassed in few parts of the country.

The District lies between  $18^{\circ}.41'$  and  $20^{\circ}.50'$  north latitude and  $78^{\circ}.48'$  and  $80^{\circ}.55'$  east longitude.

#### 1.2 Boundaries :

Chandrapur district is bounded by Wardha, Nagpur and Bhandara districts on the north, Madhya Pradesh on the east, Andhra Pradesh on the South south west, Yestmal and Wardha districts towards the west and north west. The whole of the Western and Southern border is uninterruptedly bounded by the Wardha, the Pranhita and the Godawari rivers. The Indrawati river flows along south east boundary of the district.

#### 1.3 Administrative set up :

The Wainganga river cuts the district into two halves. The eastern portion comprises, Sironcha and Gadchiroli Taluka, which are in term of area, two largest talukas in the State, occupying together 59.1% of the total area of the district. The Western portion consists of four talukas of Bramhapuri, Chandrapur, Rajura and Warora and accounts for

the remaining 40.9 % of the area of the district. Administratively the district is presently divided into the six talukas or Revenue Divisions. The area, number of towns, 1971 census population and the percentages of area and population of each taluka are shown in the following table.

This district forms part of the Nagpur Division and the Collector is its administrative head. He is assisted by Resident Deputy - Collector and some Deputy Collectors in his office

and six Deputy Collectors known as Sub-divisional Officers who hold the charge of six revenue sub-divisions and have their headquarters, at each of the six Taluka headquarters. The Sub-divisional Officer is assisted by one Tahsildar and few Naib-Tahsildars depending upon the size of the Tahsil and volume of work. The Tahsil is divided into revenue circles and further Sub-divided into Patwari halkas comprising 4 or 5 revenue villages in each.

Zilla Parishad set-up :

With a view to promote democratic decentralisation and to secure greater participation by the people in development plans and Local Government affairs the Govt. of Maharashtra enacted the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samiti Act of 1962 to establish in each district an autonomous institution of Zilla Parishad at the district level and Panchayat Samities at the Taluka or Block level.

Accordingly a Zilla Parishad and 18 Panchayat Samities were established. The Zilla Parishad covers the entire district except Municipal towns. The urban areas such as Ghugus and Sasti which do not have Municipal Councils, however are included under the jurisdiction of Zilla Parishad and Panchayats Samities concerned. The Zilla Parishad covers 99.68 percent of area of the district and 90.63 percent of its total-population.

The Zilla Parishad consists of 51 elected councillors and out of them 3 seats are reserved for scheduled castes and 8 for scheduled-

tribes. In addition, a woman councillor has been Co-opted by the elected councillors. There are five associate councillors who are Chairmen of the federal Co-operative Societies five ~~associate-councillors-who-are~~ conducting business in the district. The elected Chairmen of Panchayat Samities are also ex-officio councillors.

The Panchayat Samiti at the Block level consists of all elected and Co-opted Councillors from the area of the Block and a Chairman of Co-operative Society conducting the business of purchase and sales of Agricultural Produce in the area of the Block, as an associate member and a Chairman of a Co-operative Society conducting business in Agriculture in the area of the Block as a Co-opted member. The Sarpanchas elected by the members of village panchayats are also elected members of Panchayat Samiti.

Two Sarpanchas from each electoral division in the area of the Block are thus returned to each Panchayat Samiti.

The first election of Zilla Parishad was held in 1962 and after the term of five years, second election was held in 1967. The Third election of the Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samities was held in 1972. The President and Vice-President have been elected by the elected Councillors.

A Officer of I.A.S. cadre works as Chief Executive Officer to execute Powers and functions of the Zilla Parishad. The Block Development-



Officers act as Secretaries to the Panchayat Samities. The Zilla Parishad functions through a standing Committee presided over by the President and six subject Committees for Education, Finance, Health, works, Agriculture & Cooperation and Social Welfare. Two Committees are presided over by the vice-president and other four by the three Chairmen elected by the Zilla Parishad. Committee for Social Welfare is under one Chairman only. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer, works as Secretary of the Standing Committee and District Heads of Departments as Secretaries to the subject Committees concerned.

#### 1.4 Area :

Chandrapur district has a total area of 25641 square kilometres (10088.3 Sq. miles). The length at the northern extremity from east to west is about 192 Kms. while the length from Southern point to the northern base is about 240 Kms. In term of area, the district is the biggest in the whole of Maharashtra State.

#### 1.5 Topography.

The District is broader on the north and gradually tapers down towards the south. Topographically the district can be divided into the following four Zones:-

1) The plain fertile region in the west in the Wardha valley with its rich black Soil and moderate rainfall with Cotton, Jowar and Wheat as the main crops. This Zone includes western half of Warora and Chandrapur Talukas and the whole of

Rajura taluka and accounts for about one sixth of the total area of the district.

2) The Western upland hilly region lies between Wardha and Wainganga basins. It comprises parts of Warora and Wainganga Taluka and a major part of Bramhapuri taluka. It has sandy soil and sufficient rainfall. Rice, Jowar and irrigated sugarcane are the main crops. Numerous hills have facilitated the construction of tanks for irrigation purposes. This zone makes about one-sixth of the area of the district.

3) The Wainganga basins - This zone comprises of the eastern parts of Bramhapuri and Chandrapur talukas and western part of Gadchiroli Talukas. It has the fertile black soil, sufficient rainfall and rice being the main crop.

4) The Eastern uplands - This region comprises of major part of Gadchiroli Taluka, and the whole of Sironcha Taluka. It is hilly and has thick forests, heavy rainfall and large tribal population. Rice is the main crop. It makes nearly half of the total area of the district.

#### 1.6 Hills, River system, Soil ect :-

The soil of the district falls into clearly defined tracts and each of these tracts display cropping pattern of a wholly different kind. The most fertile tracts are found in the Wardha and in the Wainganga valleys. The varieties of soil in the district are numerous and are known by many local

names but they could be grouped under the following representative classes, viz:- Kali, Kanhar, Bors-  
Kanhar, Morand, Khurdi, Wardi, Retari or Bardi,  
Pandhari and Kachhar which is found in Sironcha  
Taluka along the banks of Godavari.

On the extreme west, on the left bank  
of the Wardha and subsequently the Godavari, there  
is a broad strip of black soil known as Kali which  
is retentive of moisture and suitable for Cotton,  
Wheat, Gram, Jowar and Linseed. Further in the  
interior but immediately adjoining this open tract  
there is a range of small hills with poorer soil at  
their feet and in the intervening strips. This  
soil is of little use without irrigation.

It is an ideal soil for rice and  
sugarcane. Further eastward and on the either bank  
of the Wainganga the black loam reappears and is  
accompanied by a few rice growing villages.

Towards the east of Wainganga valley,  
the soil becomes poor and hills are abundant. Rice  
is the staple crop of this tract.

The main rivers of the district are  
the wainganga, the Wardha, the Pranhita, the Indra-  
wati and the Godavari. The whole of the western  
border is uninterruptedly bounded by the Wardha.  
During its course in the south easternly direction,  
the Wardha river receives the Wainganga at Villages  
Seoni on the right bank and the Earai on on the left.  
After the confluence with the Wainganga the combined  
stream is known as the Pranhita. The Pranhita join

the Godavari near Sironcha. Further south at the southern corner of Sironcha taluka, the Indrawati flows into the Godavari along the south east boundary of the district.

The Wainganga enters the district near the centre of the northern boundary and slices it into two unequal parts, the Western part containing Warora, Chanda, Bramhapuri and Ratura and the eastern part comprising of Gadchiroli and Sironcha Talukas.

Save in the extreme south, the Wainganga is the recipient of numerous tributaries on either banks and ultimately received the drainage of the entire central portion of the district. The Chief rivers flowing from north to south, the Kathani & the Potphodi meeting from the left and the Andhari on the right.

The Wardha, the Pranhita and the Godavari are the perennial rivers of the district.

The whole of eastern portion of the district and the southern portion, all along the eastern border is hilly and forms part of the eastern upland natural zone. The important hill ranges lie in the south. They are mainly the Tipagrah Range, the Sirkonda near Sironcha, the Gadulgatta hills which is a continuation of the eastern Ghats and the Surjagadh hills.

To the south-west of Surjagadh hill, beyond Indrawati river lies the famous Bhamragadh hill which over-looks confluence of three mountain

rivers and is noted as an unrivalled beauty spot in the district.

The Tipagarh range rises to an elevation of 609 metres and Sirkonda range is 548 metres above sea level. The other ranges in Sironcha taluka attain a height of 609 to 914 metres.

The highest peak in the district is in the Gadulgatta ranges i.e. 967 metres. The western upland comprises the main ranges of Chinur and Mul hills. They are of little height and serve as Watersheds between the numerous valleys formed by the tributaries of the Wardha and the Wainganga. The Chinur hills commence east of Chinur in the north of Warora Taluka and stretch southwards with breaks from north to south with an average elevation of 137 metres above the surrounding plain. The range is 32 Kilometres in length and 9.6 Kilometres in breadth. The highest peak is 409 metres.

The Mul hills run east and parallel to Chinur hills and form a boundary between Warora and Bramhapuri Tahsils.

The general height of the plain country is about 274 metres above sea level in the north of the district falling to 200 metres at Chanda and 649.6 metres at Sironcha.

#### 1.7 Climate, Temperature and Rainfall :-

Chandrapur district is considered to be one of the hottest district of Maharashtra. Chandrapur town, the district headquarters is slightly hotter than Nagpur city. The nights are cool

upto end of April and are uncomfortable in the months of May and June which are considered to be the hottest months of the year. The immense heat combined with high Percentage of humidity due to the large forests in the district makes the climate uncomfortable. Winter is equally severe.

The highest temperature on record is 48.4 degrees centigrade on 18 th May 1897 and the lowest 2.8 degrees centigrade on 10 th January, 1899.

Generally, May is the hottest month of the year. The temperature recording is done at Chandrapur, Bramhapuri and Sironcha. During the year 1974 the highest temperature recorded at these centres was 41.8°, 41.5° and 41.6° centigrades respectively. The minimum temperature was 11.4° and 12.6° centigrades respectively at these centres during the year 1974. Winter is more severe in December.

The South western Monsoons are the chief source of rain in the district which is divided in to three rain-fall Zones viz:- (1) The eastern zone comprising Gadchiroli, Sironcha and Bramhapuri talukas having heavy and assured rainfall, the mean rainfall being about 1524 milimetre or 60 inches. (2) The central zone comprising Chandrapur and Rajura talukas with sufficient rains with the normal rainfall being 1302 m.m. or 50 inches. (3) The western zone comprising Warora taluka having moderate rainfall, having normal rainfall of 1143 m.m. or 45 inches. The monthwise rainfall figures are shown in Table No. 8. The rainfall during the year 1974 was less in all the talukas of the district as compared to the year 1973.

CHAPTER - II.

( Explanatory notes on the scope and limitations of the Statistical Data Presented in the Part- II of District Statistical Abstract ).

I. Purpose :- The abstract part of this publication gives exhaustive statistical data on important Socio-Economic indicators of development. Tables on almost all important topics are presented in this part, so that the publication could serve as a reference book. Talukawise data have been displayed as far as possible for inter taluka comparison. In most of the tables, data for 1974-75 have been indicated while for few tables comparative data for 1973-74 & 1974-75 or even for earlier years are given. In the tables wherein data for 1974-75 could not be presented the same for the latest years, for which that was available have been shown. In case of population 1971 and Livestock 1972, the data for latest Census have been presented. All the data are collected from the State & Central Government Offices, Local bodies, and other relevant agencies. The footnotes below each table indicate the source from which the data have been collected.

II. District at a Glance :- This table presents a birds eye-view of the Socio Economic Indicators of development in Chandrapur district and State under different heads, such as area, population, agriculture, animal husbandry, education, transport and Communication, Plan & C.D. Programme,

Local Bodies and other miscellaneous Statistics.  
Reference year of the data is also indicated in the table.

### III. Concepts, Scope and Limitations :-

The Statistical tables presented in the District Statistical Abstract are grouped into 13 Parts. The concepts of the tables and the scope and limitations of the data presented under each group are explained below :-

#### 1. Area and Population:-

In all 7 Tables i.e. Table Nos. 1 to 7 are included in this section. Data for 1971 population census for the district as a whole as made available from the Primary Census Abstract of 1971 is given in all the tables. Reference period of 1971 population Census was sunrise of 1 st July 1971.

The Table No.1 indicates area in square kilometres, population density in Sq. Km; number of inhabited and uninhabited villages, number of towns, number of occupied residential houses, number of households and sexwise population as per 1971 Census for the rural and urban areas for the district as a whole. The area of the district as supplied by the Surveyor General of India is less than the area of 1961 census and is therefore, to be treated as provisional.

Table No.2 shows decadal variation in population of the District since 1951.



Table No. 3 gives classification of inhabited villages according to different population ranges. The term village (i.e. rural area) used in the table denote a statutory recognised village having a well defined boundary and separate land records. Hamlets, Wadis or Padas have, therefore, not been shown separately as villages. On the other hand, statutory recognised villages having no population have been shown separately as "Uninhabited" villages. Villages also include forest villages comprising mostly of forest labourers and their families. Total population of the villages in each range is also indicated in the table.

Table No.4 gives classification of towns and urban area according to different population ranges. Total population of the towns and urban area in each range is also indicated.

For any place to be recognised as an urban area (town) for the 1971 census, it was to have a municipal corporation or an area under a municipal council or a cantonment or a civil line. If it did not have any of these urban local bodies to administer its affairs, the following empirical tests were applied, (a) a minimum population of 5,000 (estimated for 1971); (b) a density of not less than 400 per Km<sup>2</sup> (1,000) per sq.mile); (c) 75 per cent of the male working population pursuing occupations falling outside agriculture; (d) the place should have according to the Director, of Census operations of the

State, a few pronounced urban characteristics and amenities.

The towns having municipalities are suffixed with letter "M" whereas the urban areas without municipalities are not suffixed with any letter.

Table No.5 gives number of workers classified into 9 categories alongwith total number of non-workers.

Table No.6 gives distribution of population according to (A) Age groups and (B) Religion separately for Rural and Urban areas, and for the district as whole as per 1971 Census.

2. Climate:- Only two tables are included under this section pertaining to rainfall and temperature at the selected centres in Chandrapur district.

The table No.8 gives monthly rainfall and number of rainy days in each month at the selected centres for the year 1974. The data are collected through Revenue agency. A day is treated as a "Rainy day" if during the 24 hours, the rain gauge recorded a minimum of 2.5 M.M. of rainfall. Annual rainfall for each centre is also indicated in the table. "Normal rainfall is the average rainfall over a period of ten years for four centres and of nine years for centres Warora and Rajura.

Table No.9 gives monthwise "Maximum" and "Minimum" and also annual temperature as recorded at selected centres for the year 1974. The data

are supplied by the Government of India's Regional Meteorological Centre at Nagpur. The maximum and minimum temperature recorded daily during the month at selected centres.

### 3. Agriculture :-

In all 12 tables i.e. Table Nos. 10 to 21 are included in this section.

Table No. 10 indicates talukawise figures of land utilisation under the standard heads of land uses for the years 1972-73 & 1973-74. Against each taluka the break-up of the total geographical area according to different types of land uses is shown. Major constituents of the Geographical area are Forests, area not available for cultivation i.e. Land put to non-agricultural uses, Barren and unculturable Land; Other uncultivated land excluding fallow land i.e. culturable waste, permanent pastures and other grazing lands, land under miscellaneous tree crops etc. not included in area sown; Fallow land i.e. current fallows, other fallows and lastly net area sown, area under 'Forest' included all actual forest areas of lands classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests whether State owned or Private. If any portion of such land is not actually wooded but put to some agricultural use, that portion is included under the appropriate heading of cultivated or uncultivated land as the case may be 'Land put to non-agricultural uses stands for all land occupied

by buildings, roads and railways or under water etc. rivers and canals and other land put to uses, other than agriculture. 'Barren and unculturable land' covers all barren and unculturable land like mountains deserts etc. Land which cannot be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost is classed as 'barren and unculturable land' whether such land is in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. 'Culturable waste' includes all land available for cultivation whether not taken up for cultivation or taken up for cultivation once, but not cultivated during the current year and last five years or more in succession. Such lands may be either fallow or covered with shrubs and jungles which are not put to any use. They may be assessed or not assessed and may lie in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. Permanent pastures and other grazing lands cover all grazing lands, whether they are permanent pastures and meadows or not. Village common and grazing lands within forest areas are included under this head. 'Land under miscellaneous tree crops etc. not included in the net area sown' includes all cultivable land, which is not included under net area sown, but is put to some agricultural use. Land under casurina tree, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other for fuel etc; which are not included under 'Orchards' are classed under this category. 'Current fallow' comprise of cropped areas, which are kept fallow during the current year. 'Other fallow' land includes all lands which were taken up for cultiva-

tion, but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and not more than five years. The 'net area sown' consists of net area sown with crops and orchards. Area sown more than once being counted only once. The 'gross cropped area' represents the sum total of area under all crops. The difference between the total gross cropped area and net area sown is accounted for by the area sown more than once during the same year with the same or different crops.

The table No.12 gives yield per hectare and outturn in hundred metric tonnes for important crops for the years 1972-73 & 1973-74. The yield rates and outturn for 1973-74 are worked out on the revised forecast and may be treated as provisional. The production of sugarcane is in terms of gur while cotton production is in terms of bales of 180 Kgs. each.

The Table No.17 gives the information on Major & Medium Irrigation Projects in this district. Both completed and incomplete projects have been covered in this table. Position in this table is as it was 30 th June 1974. The cost of Medium irrigation project ranges between Rs.20 Lakhs to 5 crores, whereas that of a Major irrigation project, it is Rs. 5/- Crores and above.

Table no. 18 deals with monthly agricultural wage rates in 1974. This data is collected fortnightly throughout the year from three sele-

ected Rural Centres viz:(1) Sindewahi (2) Mul and  
(3) Kothari.

Table No. 21 will provide the history of famine and scarcity areas under each Revenue circle in each taluka by giving the no. of villages affected during the years 1970-71 to 1974-75. The data in this table relates to Agriculture year while data for table No. 20 is for financial year. Hence villages affected as given in Table 20 will not tally with table 21.

#### 4. ANIMAL HUSBANDRY AND FORESTS :-

A) Animal Husbandry :- In all 5 Tables i.e. Table 22 to 26 are included in this section.

Table No. 22 gives talukawise number of various types of Livestock and Poultry as enumerated in the district in the Livestock Census, 1972. The census is conducted throughout the country on an uniform basis of concepts and methods of enumeration once in 5 years. However, the Livestock Census, 1972 was conducted after a period of 6 years. During the livestock census operations, the livestock and poultry were enumerated by house to house enquiry. Particular care was taken to enumerate livestock and slaughter houses, stray animals and animals in transit. Sex and age-groupwise classification of the livestock is also indicated in the table.

B) Forest :- The table No.26(A) gives details of area in different types of Forests during the year 1974-75. Data regarding forests under the control of State Government's Forest-

Department and those under the control of the State Government's Revenue Department are shown separately. The areas under Forests are classified according to legal status into reserved forests, protected forests and unclassified forests. The legal status refers to the classification of forests under the Indian Forests Act, XVI of 1927. Reserved forests are those that are intended mainly for timber production, where in the rights of grazing and cultivation are seldom allowed.

In protected forests, the restrictions are not so rigid, Right of grazing or cultivation is allowed, but certain limitations and restrictions are imposed. The unclassified forest refer to the inaccessible forest or unoccupied waste. The forests which are taken by Government from Local bodies or Private individuals for management on lease basis are called leased Forests. There is no classification of Ex-Proprietary forests as such but in Nagpur division some Private lands containing valuable forest are taken over by Government under section 29 of the Indian Forests Act, which are not yet classified as per tripartite classification and they are termed as ex-Proprietary. The Forest area shown in the Table No.26 may not tally with the area under Forest shown in Table No.10. The two sets of figures differ due to the following reasons.

(i) In the Indian Forest Statistics Returns, the whole area including non-wooden

area under the control of the Forest Department is taken as area under Forests, while in Agricultural Statistics, it is classified according to its actual utilisation.

(ii) The Forest Department returns are meant to serve a definite administrative purpose to indicate the ownership of the forest areas and the actual utilisation of these areas is not so important from the point of view of Forest Department, as it is in the land utilisation statistics under Agricultural statistics.

(iii) The Forest Department returns relate to financial year and Agricultural statistics relate to the agricultural year.

5. Employment, Industry and Electricity :-

In all 9 Tables i.e. Table No. 27 to 35 are included in this section.

The Factory statistics shown in Table 27, 28 & 29 cover following types of factories registered under the Factories Act, 1948:-

(1) Those employing ten or more workers working with the aid of power (Section 2(i)).

(2) Those employing twenty or more workers and working without the aid of Power (Section 2 (ii) and

(3) Those registered under section 85 of the Act, under which the State Government makes applicable the provisions of the Act, even



though the above conditions are not fulfilled. However, Statistics of the Defence Factories are excluded.

The Table No. 32 gives occupational distribution of total registrations and placements in the employment exchange for the year 1974-75 and according to Standard National classification.

#### 6. Co-operation :-

In all 8 Tables i.e. Table No.s 36 to 43 are included in this section.

The Table No. 38 gives talukawise number of Primary agricultural credit societies, their membership, share capital, Reserve and other funds, working capital, Loans advanced and recovered, Loans, outstanding and overdues and percentage of recovery to total loan advanced for the year 1974-75. 'Working Capital' includes paid up share capital, deposits and borrowings. Loans outstanding include outstanding in respect of loans, Cash credits and overdrafts and the amount of outstanding bills purchased or discontinued. 'Overdues' referred to amount of loan or instalments which were due for collection but which were not actually collected and for the repayment of which no extension has been granted by a competent authority.

The Table No.43 gives talukawise number of registered money lenders in each taluka and loans advanced by them during 1974-75. Separate figures of loans advanced to traders and non-

traders have been furnished in the table. The transactions of money lending in the State are regulated under the provisions of Bombay Money Lenders Act. No money lenders shall carry on the business of money lending except in the area for which he has been granted a licence, and except in accordance with the terms and conditions of such licence. The information for loans advanced to traders and non-traders as given in cols. 4, 5 & 6 of the table 43 relates to those money lenders who have submitted the returns.

#### 7. Medical and Public Health :-

In all 5 Tables i.e. Table No.44 to Table No. 48 are included in this section.

The Table No. 44 given in this section indicates talukawise number of hospitals, dispensaries, maternity homes, Health centres and Primary Health Centres, doctors, nurses, vaidyas, beds and total number of indoor and outdoor patients treated for the year 1974. The Table covers all the State and Central Govt. medical institutions, and also institutions owned by municipalities and local bodies engaged in providing medical facilities. Private clinics run by private bodies or individuals are however, not included in the table.

The Table No. 45 provides vital Statistics such as number of registered births and deaths in the district for the year 1974. Table No.48 relates to Family Planning Programme for the year 1974-75 in this district .

### 8. Education:-

In all 5 tables 49 to 55 are included in this section.

The Table No. 49 gives sexwise number of literates and percentages of literacy separately for rural and urban areas and for males and females. As per 1971 census definition, a person was classified as a literate if he was able to read or write a simple letter in any language. Educational levels in urban and rural areas are shown in the Table No.50 & 51 separately according to 1961 census as these data for 1971 census are not yet available.

The Table No.52 gives information regarding number of educational institutions according to types for the year 1973-74. Sexwise enrolment and number of trained and untrained teachers in these institutions, is also indicated in this table. The classification of institutions according to type is slightly different from stage of education. There are at present many secondary schools, which also impart education in primary course. Nevertheless, the entire enrolment of students is included under 'Secondary' education. Primary institutions provide education for standard I to IV or standards I to VII/VIII or less and teach the curriculum approved by the Education Department. The secondary institutions coach the students for Standard VIII to X or XI/XII with or without lower

standards. Higher education is education after passing secondary school certificate examination, which leads to a Degree examination.

The Table No.53 presents data on the number of beneficiaries amongst backward classes such as scheduled castes, scheduled Tribes and other Backward classes for the year 1973-74. Beneficiaries for this Table are persons who are getting educational concessions of either type such as scholarships, freships etc.

#### 9. Transport and Communications :-

In all 7 tables i.e. Table No.s 56 to 62 are included in this section.

The Table No.56 gives total railway length as at the end of March 1975 according to type of routes - Broad Gauge, Meter Gauge and Narrow Gauge. The railway length is measured between the first and last stations within the district boundary. The figures of length of each type of route are, therefore, approximate and not accurate.

The Table No. 59 deals with operational statistics of Nationalised Road Transport in Chandrapur S.T. Division.

The Table No. 60 presents the results of the traffic census on important roads conducted by Building & Communication Department, Government of Maharashtra. Data of the number of vehicles is according to categories and location of count-post. Type of surface and total traffic intensity in tons

per 24 hours are also indicated in the table .

#### 10. Local Bodies :-

In all 4 Tables i.e. Table Nos.63 to 66 are included in this Section.

The Table No.63 gives abstract of income and expenditure of local bodies such as Village Panchayats, Zilla Parishad and Municipalities for the financial years 1965-66 and 1968-69 to 1974-75. The number of village Panchayats includes number of independent village Panchayats as well as group village Panchayats.

#### 11. Plan & Community Development :

In all 5 Tables i.e. Table Nos. 67 to 71 are included in this Section.

The Table No.67 gives total expenditure during Fourth Five Year Plan and for the year 1974-75. Similarly Table No. 68 provides important physical achievements during Fourth Five Year Plan and for the year 1974-75.

#### 12. Prices :-

In all three Tables viz: Table Nos. 72,73 & 74 are included in this section.

Table No. 72 gives month and spot wholesale prices per quintal for the important agricultural commodities for the year 1974 for each of the regulated markets.

Table No.73 gives monthly average retail prices of various commodities at district headquarter, Chandrapur. The average prices under

each commodity are shown from the month of January to December for the year 1974, along with units and varieties of commodities for which prices have been quoted. The data are regularly collected by District Statistical Office, every week on Friday by visiting the selected shops. As the information collected for the given commodities is restricted to only one quotation and that too only from one shop at District Headquarter, the average price for individual commodity cannot be said to be fully representative, but the data may prove useful as a broad indicator of the trend in changes in retail prices over the period of time.

Table No.74 gives consumer price index numbers (revised series) for working class of Nagpur centre published by the Office of the Commissioner of Labour, Bombay. Monthwise data for the year 1974-75 commencing from April and also average for the year 1974-75 have been given in this table. The base year for calculating price index (New Series) is 1960. The Index Number of wholesale prices are issued by the Economic Advisor to the Government of India. The base year for the same is 1952-53. The method of construction of the index is given in the Appendix to Index Numbers of wholesale prices in India revised series (1956) issued by the Office of the Economic Advisor to Government of India. The equivalent of old Index Numbers can be obtained by multiplying the new index by 5.22 as Multiplier.

13. Miscellaneous :

In all 11 Tables i.e. Table No. 75 to 85 are included in this Section.

The Table No. 78 gives talukewise cinema Statistics for the year 1974-75. Number of permanent, Semi-permanent and Touring Theatres and the seating capacity per show has been indicated in this table.

The Table No. 85 provides Trends in selected indicators for 1950-51, 1960-61, 1966-67 & 1970-71 and 1973-74 & 1974-75 about development in Chandrapur District.

C H A P T E R - III.

Important Indicators of Development :

In this Chapter an attempt has been made to present certain important indicators of Development by presenting certain selected trends to indicate the impact of development and the disparity, if any, between talukas. The indicators worked out show the comparative position during the year 1960-61, the year before the commencement of the Third Five Year Plan, and the year 1974-75 or 1973-74 in a few cases, where data for the year 1974-75 is not available.

Indicator No. 1 : Percentage of Gross Area Sown to Net Area Sown :

The proportion of gross area sown to net area sown indicates the extent of area sown more than once. The double cropping is solely related to availability of irrigation facilities, mainly from tanks and the paddy fields which retain sufficient moisture after monsoon to enable the cultivators to take second crop of Wheat, Gram, Lakh and Linseed. The second crop is locally known as "Utera" and sown by broadcasting method including crops like linseed, Lakh and other pulses. The district has got a large number of small size tanks which are locally named as "Bodies" but all these tanks are only able to irrigate paddy crop in Kharif season and used as a protective measure. Double irrigated crop is not very much practiced



and second crop is generally taken in the irrigated area of paddy fields. Comparative percentage of gross area sown to net area sown for the year 1960-61 and 1973-74 are given in the following table :

It can be seen from the above table that there is no improvement in taking second crop in a period of twelve years except in Gadchiroli taluka. The percentage of double cropping appears to be more practiced in all the paddy grown talukas. As Rajura being the non paddy crop area the double cropping appears to be very slightly practiced. The percentage of gross cropped area to net area sown is higher in Bramhapuri and Gadchiroli talukas than the district average. Though Sironcha taluka is mainly the Paddy growing tract the double cropping appears to be not practiced in that area. The fact that the cultivators who are mostly tribals do not understand the economical aspect of double cropping.

Indicator No. 2 :- Productivity of Important Crops:

Agriculture is the most important activity and among the least productive, though it is the primary occupation of 80 percent of the working population.

The programme for agricultural development have all along received a high priority. The average annual food grains production from the first plan period rose from 2.62 Lakh metric tonnes to 3.18 Lakh metric tonnes by the end of third plan period and the same was increased to 3.46 Lakh metric tonnes upto the year 1970-71. The increase in food production was mainly due to increase in area under improved agricultural practices. A comparative picture for the base year 1960-61 and 1973-74 of some important crops is shown in the following table.

The production of food grains has shown a sizeable increase i.e. 50.31 percent in the year 1973-74 over the year 1960-61. The production of Rice remarkably increased by 88.26 percent over the year 1960-61. Similarly wheat, Jowar, gram, Cotton and sesamum shows increase in production in the year 1973-74 over the year 1960-61 while the production of Tur and Linseed declined in the year 1973-74 over the year 1960-61. There is very little scope for extending the crop area in this district. However the area under irrigation can be increased considerably and would significantly increase the production capacity of the land.

Indicator No.3 : Gross Value of Agricultural Products :

Though the district ranks second in whole of Maharashtra in case of percentage of gross area irrigated to gross area sown, it stands 22 nd in case of Gross value of Agricultural product per hectare. The data available for the year 1967-68 reveals that the gross value of agricultural product

per hectare is Rs. 402 for this district as against Rs. 540 for the State as a whole. The main factor responsible for such poor productivity of land is that a majority of cultivators are small holders having land less than 5 acres, who are unwilling to adopt the methods of improved agricultural practices because of uneconomic holding size.

Indicator No. 4 : Percentage of Irrigated Area :

The district has high percentage of area under irrigation and stands second in rank in whole of Maharashtra. The Paddy is the main crop of the district and irrigation to this crop is adopted as a protective measure after the monsoon season is over.

High percentage of area under irrigation in the year 1973-74 is found in Branhapuri (44.65), Gadchiroli (34.52) and Chandrapur (21.66) Talukas than the district average (18.02). The Table below shows the taluka wise percentage of net area irrigated to net area cultivated during the years 1960-61 and 1973-74.

It appears from the above table that the percentage of net area irrigated to net area cultivated rose from 15.88 in 1960-61 to 18.02 in 1973-74 in the district as a whole. A significant rise in the percentage of net area irrigated to net area sown is observed in Gadchiroli Taluka only. In Sironcha Taluka the percentage of net area irrigated to net area sown is decreased from 5.50 in 1960-61 to 5.30 in 1973-74. Percentage decrease may be due to sizeable increase in net area sown where as the net irrigated area shows slight increase in the year 1973-74 over the year 1960-61. The table below shows talukawise percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area during the years 1960-61 and 1973-74.

It is seen from the above table that the practice of taking two successive irrigated crops is not in vogue in major part of this district and hence the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area is found to be only 100.86 during the year 1973-74. The practice of taking two successive irrigated crops does not appear to be followed in Chandrapur, Gadchiroli, Rajura talukas because the water resources which are available at present are just enough to irrigate any single crop. It is however possible to irrigate larger area if the efficiency of water use is increased. There appears to be considerable scope for reducing the seepage and other losses in carrying water from the reservoir to the fields, as well as by reducing the per hectare consumption of water without effecting yields. The potential benefits by way of increase in the area which can be served by the available water resources, could be very substantial and could be worthwhile for the district to investigate these possibilities.

Indicator No.5:- Changes in Cropping Pattern.

The Chandrapur district mainly grows food crops and has 81.88 percent of the gross cropped

area under food crops and remaining 18.12 percent area under non-food crops during the year 1973-74. Among food crops, Rice occupies 28.86 percent of the total food crop area. Jowar is the second major food crop of the district and accounts for 29.41 percent of the total food crop area during 1973-74. Jowar is sown both in Kharif and Rabi seasons. Pulses are also sown in sizeable proportion accounting for 14.72 percent of the total food cropped area in 1973-74. Among non-food crops, oil seeds and cotton occupy 11.83 percent and 5.95 percent respectively of the area under non-food crops in the year 1973-74. The following tables give taluka-wise food and non-food crops for the years 1960-61 & 1973-74.

It is seen from the above tables that there is no change in the cropping pattern of the district and also within talukas since the year 1960-61. An increase in the food cropped area is observed in Bramhapuri Taluka in the year 1973-74 over the year 1960-61. A decrease in food cropped area is observed in Warora, Gadchiroli, Sironcha and Rajura in the year 1973-74 over the year 1960-61.

An increase in rice crop is observed in Chandrapur, Waroda and Bramhapuri Talukas, while area in Jowar crops increased in Bramhapuri, Gadchiroli and Sironcha Talukas in the year 1973-74 over the year 1960-61. There is a marked difference in the cropping pattern of eastern and Western talukas of the district. The talukas viz: Bramhapuri, Gadchiroli, Sironcha and Chandrapur have more than 87 percent of the gross cropped area under food crops in found in Rajura (62.01) and Waroda (69.53) which is less than the district average (81.38). The fact that Waroda and Rajura talukas are the rain shadow areas where cotton and oil seed crops are the major non-food crops which cover sizeable area. It is also observed that within talukas the changes from food crops to non-food crops

and vice versa are marginal and mainly depend on rainfall.

Indicator No. 6:- Increase in Agriculture credits - and outstanding dues.

The Cooperative movement was primarily started to provide easy credit facilities to the cultivators as the inadequacy and high cost of finance are the major obstacles in the way of rapid development of agriculture. To meet this end, extension of Cooperative credit to the village level is made by the District Co-operative Bank through primary agricultural credit Societies (Service Cooperatives) which provide short term loans to the cultivators to facilitate them to carry out different agricultural operations with more ease and confidence. The second agency engaged in meeting the agricultural needs of the cultivators is the District Land Development Bank which finances the cultivators directly by granting them long term loan. The total agricultural credit made available to the cultivators by the Service Co-operatives and the District Land Development bank, together was of the order of Rs. 332.38 lakhs in 1974-75. The table below indicates the loans advanced by the Primary credit Co-operative Societies and outstanding dues during the years 1961-62 and 1974-75.

The primary agricultural credit societies had advanced loan to their members to the tune of Rs.270.55 Lakhs in the year 1974-75 showing an increase of 339.20 percent over the year 1961-62. Whereas the amount of loans outstanding in the year was to the tune of Rs.342.58 Lakhs thus showing an increase of 128.49 percent over the year 1961-62. As the scarcity conditions were prevailing in the consecutive three years previous to 1974-75 in this district the amount of loan advanced and amount of loan outstanding show a steep rise. However the percentage increase of loan outstanding during the year 1974-75 was less than 1973-74 in which the same was 134.15 percent.

Indicator No. 7 :- Agricultural Wage Rates :

Agricultural Labour is one of the important classes of workers. As per 1971 Census the percentage of Agricultural Labourers to total workers was 35.17. The data on agricultural wage rates are being collected from selected cultivators in the three centres viz: Kothari, Mul and Sindewahi

in Chandrapur district. The annual average of wage rates for the years 1964 and 1974 collected from these three centres are shown in the table below :

It is seen from the above table that agricultural wage rates of male and female workers show a noticeable increase at all centres in the year 1974 over the year 1963. The increase in agril: wage rate in case of male and female agril: workers at Kothari is surrounded by cash crop area such as cotton and Chillies the wage rates of male and female workers appears to be higher.

Indicator No. 8 :- Livestock per hectare of Land:-

Animals besides providing most of the draught power required for agricultural operations are an important source of food and raw material. Bovine population comprises the population of sheep and goats. The following table gives total livestock (excluding Pigs, Horses & Ponies) per hectare of cultivable land in each taluka.

Livestock per hectare of cultivable land is found to be higher in Sironcha, Gadchiroli and Bramhapuri talukas than the district average. The reasons for higher ratio are that (1) the talukas viz: Bramhapuri, Gadchiroli and Sironcha are mainly paddy growing tracts where the requirement of draught animals is generally higher than the other tracts and (2) the percentage of cultivable area is comparatively much less because of most of the area is covered with forest.

Indicator No. 9 :- Poultry as compared to Population.

Development of Poultry is essentially a cottage industry without being linked up with commercial hatcheries, Commercial feed industry and organised marketing of poultry products. Much stress has been given in the plan periods in popular-

ising poultry keeping specially in rural areas as an additional source of income and also to bridge over food shortage.

As per 1961 Livestock Census, Poultry keeping was flourishing well in Chandrapur district accounting for 319 birds per 100 Households. Per capita poultry during the year 1961 worked out to 0.66. However poultry in 1972 as per livestock Census decreased considerably. The per capita poultry in 1972 was worked out as 0.51. The table below gives talukawise position of poultry per 100 households in 1961 and 1972. The number of households enumerated in 1961 and 1971 censuses has been adopted for working out poultry birds kept per 100 Households.

The poultry keeping appears to be more popular in Tribal areas such as Gadchiroli, Sironcha and Rajura talukas having considerable tribal population. In almost all talukas except

Warora and Rajura Talukas number of poultry birds per 100 households shows considerable decrease in the year 1972 over the year 1961. The overall decrease may probably be the result of lack of good market in the vicinity to promote this industry and also due to decrease in the gap between the rate of consumption and the rate of production.

Indicator No. 10 :- Per capita consumption of Electricity.

Rural electrification has a special significance in the development of the Rural Economy.

Apart from providing power for agricultural purposes small consumers, industries and domestic use, it helps in modernising the outlook of people, living in Rural areas.

The district has not made any significant progress in Rural Electrification as compared to other districts of the state. By 31 st March 1961, only 353 villages and 5 towns were electrified whereas on 31 st March 1975 their corresponding number increased to 523 villages and 7 towns. The per capita consumption of electricity for domestic purposes as well as total electricity consumption inclusive of all purposes for the years 1960-61 and 1974-75 are shown in the table given below.

It can be seen from the above table that the per capita consumption of electricity in the year 1974-75 was 112.28 K.W.H. which is somewhat high because of heavy electrical consumption by Ballarpur Paper Mill, A.C.C. Factory, Ghugus and Defence Project, Bhadrawati. However the per capita domestic consumption during 1974-75 is as low as 2.94 K.W.H. The percentage increase in per capita domestic consumption during the year 1974-75 over the 1960-61 is mainly due to increase in number of electrified villages as well as increase in number of household consumers.

Indicator No. 11 :- Increase in number of candidates enrolled in Employment Exchange.

The media of employment exchange is being utilised both by employment seekers as well as employers. Due to increase in number of educated persons and due to various employment avenues created in the development process, the number of registrations, and the number of vacancies have increased considerably after 1960-61. The comparative figures of registrations, vacancies notified and placements for the year 1960-61 and 1974-75 are as follows :-

Thus it can be seen that percentage increase in number of Registration is very high over 1960-61 level. Similarly corresponding percentage increase in number of vacancies notified and number of placements is also very high over 1960-61 level. The fact that increase in registrations with the Employment Exchange is mainly due to (1) the growth of population (2) Changes in the age composition of the population and (3) the behaviour of participation rates because of spread of Education. The rapid industrialisation of the district and comprehensive development started in the district since third and fourth plan increased the number of vacancies and placements which shows the immense increase in percentage of registrations, vacancies notified and placement during 1974-75 over the year 1960-61.

Indicator No. 12 :- Increase in the Outdoor and Indoor Patients treated.

The district has made significant progress in providing curative and preventive health services over the last two decades. Life expectancy has increased considerably and the death rate has

declined to 13.00 per One thousand population as compared to the year 1947. The achievement has been mainly due to better availability of medical and health facilities in the district as compared to pre independence period.

In table No. 44 the data on the Indoor and Outdoor patients treated in public sector hospitals, dispensaries, primary health centres and maternity homes is compiled and given for the years 1974. As the data prior to the year 1963 was not available talukawise and also because of incomplete coverage, the data for the year 1963 is given as a base year for comparison with the year 1974 in the following table.

The above table indicate that number of Indoor patients treated show a upward trend in all talukas and district as a whole. An increase in indoor patients treated may be due to increase in number

of beds during the corresponding year 1974. The indoor patients treated per bed during the year 1963 and 1974 worked out as 16 & 32 respectively. Similarly there is an overall increase in outdoor patients in almost of talukas except Waroda Taluka in the year 1974 over the year 1963.

Indicator No. 13 :- Increase in number of Students in different categories.

Much stress was given on the development of education under Social Services during Plan periods. The primary education was made compulsory during the third plan. As such tremendous increase in both the number of Institutions and pupils enrolled has been noticed since 1960-61. Remarkable progress was also noticeable in education of girls where the percent increase in number of students was 206.79 and 355.57 respectively for primary and secondary standards in the year 1973-74 over the year 1960-61. The increase in number of /girls students is mainly due to increase in number of primary, and secondary schools in rural areas and also because of change in traditional outlook of villagers who were not very much keen in the past to send their wards to schools. The comparative figures of number of institutions and number of students for the years 1960-61 and 1973-74 are given below.

The above table indicates that the Primary and Secondary Schools have increased by 92.44 and 142.62 percent respectively by March 1974 over the strength as at the end of March 1961 while the percentage increase in students during the decade is 115.45 and 164.04 respectively. The college education facility has also increased enormously by the end of the year 1973-74 and number of colleges increased to 15 as three new colleges were opened during the year 1973-74. The percentage increase in students attending colleges was 1570.99 by the end of the year 1973-74 over the year 1960-61.

Indicator No. 14:- Increase in road Mileage per 100 Square Kilometers.

The road development programmes for the Third and Fourth Five Year Plans had been formu-

Laid in accordance with the broad objectives laid down in the Twenty Years Road Development Plan for the period 1961-81, which had been drawn up by the Chief Engineers of the state and the Central Government. The broad objectives of this plan was that no village in a developed and agricultural area should remain more than four miles from a metalled road and more than one and half miles from any type of road.

Facilities of Transport and Communications are poor in this district. In fact, this is one of the main reasons for the economic backwardness of this district or otherwise it is a potentially rich district. The position has improved considerably since 1960-61. The road length per 100 Sq. kilometres of area rose from 2.54 Kms. as on 31.3.61 to 11.49 Kms. as on 31.3.1975. Comparative figures for the years for these two reference periods are given in the table below :

Indicator No. 15 :- Increase in Banking Facilities in proportion to population.

There is a substantial increase in number of scheduled banks and its branches since 1961 as the number of scheduled banks increased from 7 as on 31 st December 1960 to 27 as on 31 st March 1974 showing the percentage increase as 285.71 Similarly the cooperative Banks increased by 8 during the same period showing percentage increase as 40.00. The comparative position of banks and population served by them during these two reference periods is shown in the following table.

It is seen from the above Table that though the number of banking offices show a noticeable increase, the corresponding figure of banking offices per lakh population does not show a sizeable increase. The fact that due to increase in population in the last decade the number of banking offi-

ces per lakh population show a marginal increase. It is also found that out of 55 banking offices 20 banking offices are located in 5 towns and remaining 35 banking offices are located in 22 villages.

Indicator No. 16 :- Prices :

The price collection work at the district head quarter was started in November, 1962 since the declaration of emergency in the country. The prices of some important essential commodities are obtained every week, ending Friday from the selected shops. These price quotations are concerned to selected shops only and hence they can not be said to be fully representative, but, still they serve as broad indicator of trends in the prices over a period of time. The following table shows the average yearly prices for the year 1963 and 1974 respectively of some important commodities.

The prices of Rice, Wheat, all types of pulses except udiddal, & Sugar in 1974 are more than three times the prices prevailing in 1963, while the prices of Ground nut oil in 1974 is more than four times than those prevailing in 1963. The prices of Gur, Meat and Washing soap in 1974 are more than double the prices prevailing in 1963. Thus the prices of almost all commodities have shown sizeable increase in the year 1974 over the year 1963.

CHAPTER - IVANNUAL PLAN - 1974-75.

General :- The Fourth Five Year Plan has been officially announced to have commenced from 1st April 1969. However the process of Planning is continued through the Annual Plans keeping in view the broad policies and programmes contemplated for the Fourth Five Year Plan, 1973-74 was the fifth year of the Fourth Plan. In the Fourth Plan period Chandrapur district was also witnessed scarcity during the successive three years i.e. 1970-71, 1971-72 & 1972-73 like various parts of the state. About 1193, 509 and 764 Villages in this district were affected by scarcity during these three years respectively. During the fifth year 1973-74 of the Fourth Plan because of sufficient and timely rain fall the agricultural production particularly the paddy crop was slightly higher than normal expectations. The irrigation tanks were full even after the Kharif harvest of paddy crop and the cultivators under the command area were encouraged to take the second crop of summer paddy.

District Planning :- The importance of district Planning has all along been emphasised by the Planning Commission for ensuring rational utilisation of resources, reduction of intra-state imbalances as well as proper Co-ordination and implementation of development programmes. For which Government has established Planning Boards

at the District levels. Resources survey of district were carried out to facilitate District Planning which would be an important feature of the Fifth Five Year Plan. Out of the total Fifth Plan outlay, an amount of Rs. 4283 Lakhs has been allotted to Chandrapur district and the District Planning Board has formulated Draft Fifth Five Year Plan 1974-75 to 1978-79 within the allocation of this district.

Draft Fifth Five Year Plan thus formulated has accorded very high priority to the development of agriculture, irrigation and power as well as to the National Programme for Minimum Needs and the State's Fifteen Point Programme as the impart of all of which would be hopefully to act as a tonic to the sagging agricultural economy, stimulate rural prosperity by harnessing power and irrigation and to eliminate curse of poverty. The percentage distribution of the Fifth Plan outlay of Chandrapur district in the sectoral programmes would subserve these objectives.

Tribal Sub-plan :

In addition to the exercise in District Planning with District as the basic unit Government has also undertaken the task of formulating development plans on area basis for certain special areas like the Tribal and Hilly and inaccessible areas in this district with an aim to integrate development of this area for accelerating Socio-Economic development of the people living in Tribal areas.

Annual Plan 1974-75 :

The outlay of the Annual Plan 1974-75 for the District level Programmes of this district was of the order of Rs. 465.85 Lakhs, against which the total expenditure incurred amounted to Rs. 425.77 Lakhs. Irrigation & Power were given the highest priority in this district. About 33 percent of the total Annual Plan outlay was earmarked for the various Irrigation projects & Power. The Programme for Agriculture, Cooperation & Community Development shared 28 percent of the total Annual Plan outlay, Social Services accounted for a total outlay of about 15 percent of the total Annual Plan outlay of the district. Industry & Mining shared 10 percent while Transport & Communications shared 4 percent of the total Annual Plan outlay. Miscellaneous programme including other programme of Employment Guarantee scheme were allotted 10 percent of the total Annual Plan outlay in the district.

The overall performance under various programme was substantial. The provisions set aside for all most all programmes were spent except Industry & Mining & Miscellaneous programme. Expenditure against Irrigation & Power and Social Services was over & above the allotment placed for during the year.

AGRICULTURAL PROGRAMME :-

The various schemes under Agricultural Programme were specially aimed at improvement of agricultural productivity. The district was covered under intensive cultivation of food crops particularly of paddy crop because of its maximum irrigation potential for increasing the food production. Soil Conservation measures, Minor Irrigation works Development of Forest and Fisheries were the other programmes, that were implemented in the district. The following table indicates the allotment and expenditure on these various programmes.

AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTION :

The sub-head of Agricultural Production under Crop Husbandry was provided with an allotment of Rs. 12.10 Lakhs during the year 1974-75, against which an expenditure of Rs. 3.89 Lakhs was incurred over the schemes of establishment of Taluka seed Farms grant of subsidy for local manure production, Integrated Area Development Scheme including Community Wells, Resettlement of Landless Agricultural labourers on forest lands. Provision was also made for Model colonisation scheme and Pesticides aerial spraying but no expenditure was incurred against these two schemes. The details of important achievements under various activities were as follows :

Under the scheme development of Small farmers 744 hectares of area was covered under Integrated Area Development Scheme benefitting the 1471 small holders. Loan to the tune of 0.50 lakhs was distributed to the cultivators under this scheme. So also subsidy for construction of Community Wells in Small holders block was given for 4 wells. 49 families were benefitted covering 118.60 hectares of area under the scheme for re-settlement of land-less Agricultural labourers on Forest land.

#### MINOR IRRIGATION :

Minor Irrigation works play an important role in the agricultural economy of the district. There are large number of Ex-Malguzari Tanks in the district. The programme of renovation of these tanks for providing quick irrigation facilities was launched on a large scale. New Irrigation wells and repairs to old wells were also taken up. The total expenditure on these minor irrigation works was of Rs. 50.46 lakhs as against the total provision of Rs. 53.15 lakhs. In all 106 New wells and one tank were constructed, while 26 irrigation pumpsets were installed during the period under review. Besides, 6 lift Irrigation works from rivers and streams were completed in the district. Irrigation potential of 2169 hectares covered under Minor Irrigation works in state & local sector schemes.

### SOIL CONSERVATION :

Under the soil conservation measures contour bunding and terracing were completed in an area of 1470 hectares & 1135 hectares respectively, while area of 2512 hectares was covered under Nalla bunding/Nalla plugging/Nalla Training in area which were already covered by Contour-bunding. The total expenditure incurred on these works was of Rs. 17.73 lakhs.

### ANIMAL HUSBANDRY :

During the period under review 9 Premium Bulls were distributed, 14297 animals were castrated and 1995 improved birds were supplied.

### FORESTS :

Forests form one of the most important resources of the district and their abundance is a striking feature. Forests cover about 56 percent of the district's total area as against 20 percent in the state. The development programme of forest was therefore of quite important. In all Rs. 23.60 lakhs have been expended on the various forest development schemes in the district as against the total allocation of Rs. 27.68 lakhs. The plantation of valuable trees such as Teak was done on 831 hectares area. In addition to this plantation of Fodder resources on 30 hectares area completed during the year. Under Forest Communications new road of 10 kms. has been constructed. Besides, Improvement of 20.50 Kms. existing road, Black-topping of 8 kms, and 1 Bridge work have also been completed during the year under review:

FISHERIES :

The aim of the programme was to increase production of fish and to improve the Socio Economic conditions of the fishermen working in the field. The district is naturally endowed with good potential of water resources. District has 5 perennial rivers all measuring 672 kms. In addition to above there are four seasonal rivers in the district. There are 2380 tanks brought under pisciculture covering 11674 hectares (average) area. An expenditure of Rs. 1.54 lakhs was incurred on various schemes as against the annual plan provision of Rs. 1.77 lakhs earmarked for this sub-head. During the year under report 57 lakhs fingerlings were stocked and 758 Metric Tonnes fish was netted.

COOPERATION AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT :COOPERATION :

Cooperative movement has taken tremendous strides in Maharashtra. The State Five year plan has sought the promotion of Cooperative Organisations through financial supports, for undertaking different economic activities in the form of subsidies, share capital investments and advancing loans according to needs. The Programme was continued during the Fifth Plan period and was concentrated mainly with the development of Co-operative Marketing. Credit facilities were taken up to the doors of the agricultural Cooperatives and Cooperative farming.



An outlay of Rs. 0.52 lakhs was fixed up for the schemes under Co-operation against which total expenditure of Rs. 1.00 lakh was incurred i.e. over & above the allotted during the year under review. Under the scheme Development of Coop: Marketting additional share capital to three existing marketting societies was assisted. Short term loan to the tune of Rs. 204.18 lakhs was distributed to the members of the primary agricultural credit societies. Medium Term loan of Rs. 67.04 lakhs & Long Term loan of Rs. 61.83 lakhs was also distributed during the year under review.

#### COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT.

Community development was described as a method of rural extension and as an agency through which the transformation of the social & economical life in villages was to be initiated. The concept of Rural extension has broadened into that of Panchayat Raj. One of the principal tasks in the Fourth plan was to ensure the growth and working of Panchayat Raj so as enable each area to realise its maximum development potential on the basis of local man power and other resources, Co-operative self help and Community efforts and effective use of the available resources and manpower.

During the plan year under review the blocks as shown below were functioning.

(1) Stage I - Nil. (2) Stage II - 2.00 (3) Post stage-II - 12.50 and (4) M.D.P. & T.D. Blocks - 6.00 .

During the Plan year under review, the provision made for the programme was to the tune of Rs. 9.76 lakhs. Whereas the expenditure incurred was of Rs. 9.73 lakhs. Composite programme for women and Children was continued in the district in the five selected blocks. Special Nutrition Programme was also continued during the year under review in 11 Blocks. Similarly Applied Nutrition Programme was continued in the seven selected blocks. Besides, Gram Safai- Programme in 24 Villages was implemented under the scheme during the year.

#### MAJOR & MEDIUM IRRIGATION PROJECTS :

As high priority was given to the irrigation projects during the Fifth Plan Rs. 152.25 lakhs were earmarked during the Annual Plan 1974-75 for the continuing Major & Medium Irrigation Projects Viz: Itiadh & Dina, Chargaon, Anal Nalla respectively and new medium Irrigation Project Chandai Nalla Project. Against which the expenditure of Rs. 139.27 lakhs was incurred.

Under power projects Rs. 22.97 lakhs were expended during the plan year under review against the scheme of Rural Electrification including Normal Development. In which 32 villages were electrified and 288 pumps were installed.

#### INDUSTRY AND MINING .

##### SMALL SCALE INDUSTRIES :

Development Programme for Small scale industries aimed at helping the small scale and

~~Cottage industries~~ to overcome the handicaps such as capital resources, lack of knowledge of modern technique, method of production and improvement of marketing of products. The provision made available for this sub-head during the year under review was of Rs. 44.70 Lakhs against which an expenditure of Rs. 27.39 lakhs was incurred. Out of which Rs. 23.74 lakhs were incurred against the scheme package scheme of incentives which was administered by SICOM to provide financial incentives for development of Industries. For the Development of handloom industry rebate subsidy for the sale of handloom cloth was continued to be given to the 18 cooperatives in the district and Rs. 0.80 lakhs were spent against the scheme. Financial Assistance worth to Rs. 1.25 lakhs was given to Block level village Artisans & multi-purpose Coop: Societies.

#### TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATIONS.

Road Transport has much significance in this district as it is major means of Communications since railway facilities are ill equipped. The total road length in the district as on 31 st March 1975 was 2946 Kms. Which in other words meant 11.10 Kms. of road per 100 Sq.Kms. of area.

During the Fifth Plan an item Road Development was to be covered under minimum Needs Programme and accordingly outlay of Rs. 18.70 lakhs was fixed in the Annual Plan 1974-75 against this sub-head of Road Development in this district. Against which an amount of Rs. 18.07 lakhs was

expended. In which 45 Kms. of new roads 44 culverts and 49 kms. of Rural Roads were constructed.

SOCIAL SERVICES :

GENERAL EDUCATION :

The programme of General Education was emphasised as an important aspect of development. Elementary Education was included as an item of Minimum Needs Programme during Fifth Plan as of National importance. During the Annual Plan 1974-75 total amount of Rs. 7.89 lakhs was spent on this programme of General Education, out of which Rs. 2.45 lakhs were spent on Primary Education. During the year under review 35 Rooms in Primary Schools were constructed while 8 New Primary Schools were opened.

Health :

During the year under review Rs. 1.67 lakhs were spent against Minimum Needs Programme for Health over & above the allocation fixed of Rs. 1.63 lakhs for the year.

Nutrition Programme :

Under the scheme of Special Nutrition Programme implemented in 11 Blocks in the district for pre-school Children and pregnant lactating mothers Rs. 0.74 lakhs were spent during the year, while Rs. 1.21 lakhs were spent against Applied Nutrition Programme in seven blocks in the district.

Water Supply & Drainage :

Under the water supply and drainage scheme the amount of Rs. 62.84 lakhs was expended on

~~rural and urban water supply schemes. Out of which,~~  
 Rs. 50.17 lakhs were spent on Rural Water supply.  
 470 New Drinking water wells were constructed  
 during the year under review and piped water supply  
 scheme in 4 villages completed.

Housing :

Under the sub-head of housing out of total provision of Rs. 2.59 lakhs for the year, the amount of Rs. 1.47 lakhs was expended. Under Rural housing, against the scheme Extension of Village Gaothans and provision of housing sites four villages were completed, while in the scheme of provision of house sites to landless workers in rural areas 7663 house sites were provided.

Welfare of Backward Classes :

Under the sub-head out of the total provision of Rs. 12.59 lakhs, the amount expended was Rs. 3.08 lakhs during the year under report. The Programmes such as Grants of Tutition & Examination fees to S.C. & S.T. students, Award of Scholarships to S.C. & S.T. students, construction of B.C. Hostels, Construction of Irrigation Wells, Financial Assistance to industrial Cooperatives, Subsidy to B.C. Agriculturist for Development of land purchase of fertilizers and agricultural implements, Grant of loan-cum subsidy to Backward classes for cottage industries & professions, Housing aid to Backward classes were the major schemes implemented during the year.

Besides, for launching a 15-Point Programme opening of Ashram shala complexes with an area development approach for the welfare of Adivasis four Ashram Schools were opened in the district during the year under review.

Labour & Labour Welfare :

Against the apprenticeship training scheme of Craftsmen training Rs. 0.14 lakhs were spent during the year under report benefitting one institution.

MISCELLANEOUS :

Information & Publicity:

Under this sub-head Rs. 0.11 lakhs were allotted for the scheme of Rural Broadcasting against which Rs. 0.01 lakhs were spent. 20 Rural Radio sets were installed in the rural areas during the year under report.

Other Schemes :

Item of providing a guarantee of employment in manual work for the rural population was included under 15-point Programme. Accordingly Employment Guarantee scheme was implemented in this district during the year under review. Provision of Rs. 45.00 lakhs was made for this scheme against which expenditure of Rs. 32.05 lakhs was incurred. The work for 9.73 lakhs mandays was provided under the scheme during the year in this district.
