C H A P T E R . - I .

I N T R O D U C T I O N .

1.1. INTRODUCTION & LOCATION :-

The district is one of the eight districts of Vidarbha , which according to the " MAHABHARAT " was the Kingdom of Damayanti who was married to Nal. It has also a mention in " MAHABHASYA ", " YOGINITANTRA", "BHLGWAT PURAN " and BRIHATSAMHITA".

According to the Historical records it was once ruled by the Gonds with their capital at Deogarh in Chindwarah district of Madhya Pradesh . In 1702, Bhakt Bula-nd of Gond dynasty founded the city of Nagpur . Burhan Shan was probably the last of the Gond Rulers, after which the area passed into the hands of Bhonsale dynasty which ruled till 1853 , after which it was annexed by lord Dalhousie . The district , as at present , was formed in 1854. In 1861 the country with Saugar and Narbada territories was formed into the Central Provinces by Lord Canning , with Nagpur as its capital . The district lies between  $20^{\circ}-36'$  and  $21^{\circ}-43'$  North latitude and  $78^{\circ}-15'$  and  $79^{\circ}-57'$  East Longitude .

1.2 BOUNDRIES :- The district is triangular in shape with Chindwara district of Madhya Pradesh on the North Bhandara district on the east , Chanda district to the south and Amra-wati and Wardha districts on the west . It has total area of 3834 Sq.miles (9930 square Kilometers forming 3.24% of the total area of Maharashtra with a population of 15,12,807 . forming 3.82 % of the population of Maharashtra.

1.3. ADMINISTRATIVE SET UP :-

The district comprises 5 sub-divisions or Talukas viz .Nagpur, Katol, Saoner,Ramtek and Umrer . The Collector as the head is in charge of General Administra-tion , Law and Order , treasury , Land Revenue and Civil Supp-lies . He is assisted by a resident Deputy Collector in his office and by Deputy Collectors who look after different bran-ches . The Collector is the District Magistrate .One of the Deputy Collectors is also vested with the Magisterial powers and is designated as the Additional District Magistrate .



A Sub-Divisional Officer is put incharge of the Administration in each of five talukas.

The Sub-Divisional Officer is assisted by a Tahsildar in his administrative functions. The taluka is further divided in revenue circles, each being put in charge of a Revenue Inspector.

Beside the Collectorate, there are many other District offices of different departments, dealing in departmental matters.

For promoting development of democratic institutions and for securing greater participation of the people on development plans and local and Government affairs, a district level body, known as "Zilla Parishad" constituted with the Councillors, chosen by elections from electoral divisions, was set up on 1st May, 1962. There are 44 Councillors with no nominated members. Out of these 44 Councillors one seat has been reserved for Scheduled caste and a woman councillor has been co-opted by the elected councillors. There are five associate councillors who are chairmen of five federal Co-Operative Societies. The Parishad has jurisdiction corresponding to district boundaries excluding municipal towns. The parishad is presided by the President who is elected amongst the councillors.

The area under the jurisdiction of the Zilla Parishad is entire district, excluding Municipal/<sup>contonment.</sup> and Corporation areas. A Panchayat Samiti area corresponds to the Block area.

The work of the Zilla Parishad is carried out through a set of seven Subject Committees. For administration, there is a competent machinery headed by the Chief Executive Officer of Senior I.A.S. rank. He has been vested with full Administrative powers for carrying out the Provisions of the Act and is assisted by Officers of various departments. The Finance branch of the Zilla Parishad is controlled by the Chief Accounts and Finance Officer and this branch works on the lines of the Finance Department in the State Government.

At the Block level the Panchayat Samiti comprises all elected and co-opted councillors from areas of the Block and a chairman of a Co-operative Society in the area of the Block as a co-opted member. Two Sarpanchas from each electoral division who are elected by members of Village Panchayat are elected as members of Panchayat Samiti. The Block Development Officers work as secretaries of Panchayat Samitis with Executive authority vested in them.

Except for a few safe-guards, the developmental and administrative functions of Government are now devolved on Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis and the state Government has thus divested itself of the responsibility of local activities.

#### 1.4 AREA AND TERRITORIAL CHANGES :-

The area, number of Villages, population, etc. covered by each taluka is shown in the following table.

Nagpur district previously included areas which now are partly in Wardha and partly in Bhandara districts. The area now constituting Wardha district was separated in 1862. There were only four tahsils upto the year 1908, when a new tahsil was created with its head Quarters at Saoner. There were no major changes in the boundaries of the district or talukas from 1911 onwards. With reorganisation of states, the district was transferred from Madhya Pradesh to bilingual Bombay State & subsequently formed part of Maharashtra since 1st May, 1960. of

1.5 TOPOGRAPHY :-

The district can be broadly divided into the following three zones . (i) The hilly area in the north , (ii) the plateau region in the west and (iii) the Kanhan and Wunna basins in the centre, south and east, The western zone comprises mainly Katol taluka and accounts 16 percent of the total geographical area of the district . Low rainfall and light soils help the growth of major crops such cotton & jowar. The north west region of the taluka is in particular suitable for orange cultivation . The central portion of the two river basins is known for its deep black soils and wheat cultivation . The hilly zone in the north comprising Ramtek taluka has heavy rains and Khardi soil , where rice is cultivated.

1.6. HILLS , RIVER SYSTEM , SOILS. :-

The main system of hills is the Satpuda and its offshoots.

In the north , a strip of the Satpuda hills is included within the district , narrow on the west but winding to a breadth of twelve miles or more towards the east.

A few miles to the south of the main Satpuda range are two minor lines of hills to the west and east of the PENCH river . Those to the west lie between Bhingarh and Parsivani, terminating in the peak of Tokari. East of the PENCH are the Mansar hills and after a gap of a few miles come the well-known Ramtek hills, rising to 1400 feet at Ramtek. Three miles east of Ramtek, the Sur river has forced a passage through the hills, but beyond it they continue as the Ambagarh range of Bhandara.

The second main hill range extends along the South-east of the district from Khargarh on the Wardha river to the junction of Wardha and Chanda with Nagpur . It separates the valley of the Kar from that of Jam up to Kondhali and further south-east forms the water shed between the later river and the Bor.

The third main range runs north wards through the Katol tahsil from Kondhali to Kelod, separating the Wardha and Wainganga valleys . The highest part of it is at Pilkapar.

The general slope of the district except in Katol tahsil is towards east or south east. The slope in Katol is, however, towards the west.

The Wardha and the Wainganga are the Chief rivers of the district. The Wardha flows along the part of the Western border and controls the drainage system of the Western part of the district. The Wainganga flows along the part of the eastern border and controls the drainage system of the Central and eastern portions of the district. It forms the district boundary with Bhandara district for some distance.

Among the important tributaries of the Wardha are the Jam and the Wunna. The Jam flows through Katol tahsil and joins the Wardha on its border at Jalalkheda. The Wunna flows along the northern base of the Kanmas, plateau in Nagpur tahsil. It then takes southern course, and passes out of the district at Ashta to join the Wardha river in Wardha district.

Kanhan is the most important tributary of the Wainganga. It rises in the Satpuda hills in the north and after flowing South-east joins the Wainganga on the eastern border of the district at Gondpipri. It receives the pench, the Kolar and Nag rivers in its course. Pench, Kolar and Nag are important tributaries of the Kanhan river. The Kanhan river provides water to Nagpur city, and lands situated on its banks are **very** fertile.

The main soils of the district are Kali (Medium deep black cotton), morand (comparatively light depth light brown in colour), Khardi (Shallow, mixed with sand and hence of grayish colour) and bardi (red gravel with boulders). Medium deep black soil is found around Kalmeshwar and Saoner, in the Wardha Valley and in the Nagpur and Kamptee Plains. The principal soil of the district is known as morand. It is very suitable for cotton and jowar and is found in all tahsils. In the northern part of Ramtek tahsil especially in the Valley of the Sur river, the morand soil is of very light colour. Khardi is the regular rice land in the eastern part of the district. Bardi is found on the summits and slopes of hills, principally in the Katol tahsil.

1.7- CLIMATE , TEMPERATURE AND RAINFALL:-

The climate of the district is dry and salubrious . Nagpur city is , however one of the hottest places in India and May is the hottest month of the year .

The rainy season starts from the second week of June and lasts up to the end of September . It is followed by sultry weather in October , Cold season from November to February , and hot weather from March to May . Though the cold weather is of a short duration, the climate during this season is extremely pleasant. In summer although days are hot , the nights are comparatively cool. Maximum temperature recorded at Nagpur in the year 1965 was  $41.8^{\circ}$  C in May and minimum as  $12.5^{\circ}$  C . in December - 1965.

Rainfall is not uniform in all parts of the district . It is comparatively light in the west and heavy in the east. It gradually increases from west to east. The average rainfall on western most tahsil of Katol is 995.26 m.m. while it is 1103 m.m. in Ramtek tahsil which is eastern-most.

The rains start in the second week of June but they are very weak at the out-set. Occasionally there are long breaks in July and August . Hail Falls occasionally in January , February and early part of March , sometimes in large stones , causing damage to spring crops .

The seasonal distribution of rainfall is more or less uniform in all parts of the district. About 85% of rains are received during the period from June to September. The cold weather rains are advantageous to the rabi crops , provided they are light and well distributed . Showers in hot months are accompanied by dust -storms of considerable severity.

The cold weather rains are beneficial to Rabi crops. The district has rarely suffered on account of shortage of rains . The Food Finding Committee appointed by the Government of Bombay in 1960 has opined that the district is free from famine and scarcity conditions.

I-POPULATION.

The population of Nagpur district, according to 1961 Census is 15,12,807, forming nearly 3.82 percent of the population of Maharashtra. The rural areas of the district account for 47.93 percent of the total population whereas the remaining 52.07 percent is found in urban areas. Nagpur district is relatively more urbanised than the state where in the percentage of urban population is 28.22. This high percentage of urban population is mainly due to Nagpur city and Kamptee. The population of Nagpur district has nearly doubled (101.46 %) during last 60 years since 1901 and has increased by 22.54 percent during the decade 1951-61.

The density of population per Sq. Kilometer for Nagpur district is 152 (395 per Sq. mile). which is higher as compared to Maharashtra which is 129 (334 per Sq. mile) Among the tahsils density is highest in Nagpur tahsil with 394 persons per Sq. Km (1022 per Sq. mile) and lowest with 75 persons per Sq. Kilometer (195 per Sq. mile) in Rantek tahsil. Because of Nagpur city the density of population is highest in Nagpur tahsil.

The distribution of population by size of villages shows that about 73.22 percent of the total number of villages have less than 500 population, whereas in Maharashtra as a whole only 47.72% of the villages have less than 500 population each. This shows that the district comprises mostly of small villages. The average population per Village in 1961 works out to '439' for the district as against 792 for Maharashtra. The number of villages per '100' Square Kilometers is about 17 in the district as against 12 in Maharashtra.

No scheduled Tribes have been enumerated in Nagpur district during the 1961 census, while the total scheduled caste population in the district in 1961 forms 3.60 percent of the total population of the district.

The

The proportion of scheduled castes has decreased from 18.11 percent in 1951 to 3.60 percent in 1961; because a large number of persons belong to Mahar caste have returned themselves during the 1961 census as Buddhist or "Nava - Eudha".

The concept of dependency which was adopted during the 1951 census has been abandoned for economic classification at the 1961 census. Instead, the population has been classified as workers and non-workers. The workers are further classified into nine categories of economic activity. The population of workers in Nagpur district is '46.5' percent whereas it is 47.9 % in Maharashtra. The proportion of workers in different categories of economic activity for Nagpur district differ significantly with those for Maharashtra state as a whole because of a very high proportion of urban population in district. The percentage of persons classified as cultivators and agricultural labourers is '44.9' and '10.1' respectively, <sup>and</sup> these two categories together account for '25 percent' of the population of Nagpur district. It is quite low as compared to corresponding percentage of 33.5 % for Maharashtra.

## II-AGRICULTURE :-

The proportion of net area sown to the total geographical area in the district during the year 1964-65 was about 54.2 percent. The district has considerable lower percentage of areas under barren and unculturable waste and old and current fallows. The proportion of permanent pastures to the total geographical area is comparatively much higher being 11.7%. The percentage of forest land is about 18.7 % in the district out of which 9.7 is accounted for by Rantek taluka and 5.4% by Umarer taluka.

The proportion of net area sown to the geographical area ranges between 40 percent in Rantek taluka and 68 percent in Saoner taluka. Rantek taluka has very high proportion of areas under forest being <sup>3</sup> 37.2 percent. and hence the proportion to net area sown is substantially low in that taluka.

The proportion of fallow land is low in almost all the talukas. On the other hand the proportion of culturable waste is very high in all talukas except in Sacher accounting for 2.5 percent of its total geographical area.

During 1964-65 the proportion of food crops to the gross cropped area was about 77.7 percent. The proportion of area under jowar was the highest amongst the food crops. The percentage of area under jowar to the gross cropped area and to net cropped area was about 39.5 percent and 40.2 percent respectively. The proportion of wheat and paddy to the gross cropped area is about 13.9% and 4.7% respectively during that period whereas the proportion of pulses to gross cropped area is about 12.8%.

The area under non food crops was about 22.3 percent of the gross cropped area. Among non food crops cotton and oil seeds are the main crops which covered most of the area under non-food crops.

The proportion of gross irrigated area to gross cropped area was about 5.8 percent while proportion of net irrigated area to net sown area formed about 5.8 percent. The proportion of area irrigated by wells, tanks and Government canals accounted for 48.7%, 21.2% and 23.7% respectively and remaining 6.4% of the area was irrigated by other sources. Out of the gross area irrigated about 98.1% was under food crops and 1.9% under non-food crops. Rice, wheat and Fruits and vegetables and miscellaneous crops are important crops under irrigation.

III-ANIMAL HUSBANDRY, FOREST AND FISHERIES, LIVESTOCK.

LIVE STOCK:-

Total number of livestock animals in the district according to livestock census 1966 was about 851458 out of which 89.7 percent were enumerated in rural areas. The live stock population increased by about 4.7 during the period 1961 to 1966. Cattle formed of 67.4% of the total livestock population being the highest, the



The number of goats being next in numerical order ~~formed~~ 20.7% percent of the total Livestock population, while of buffaloes accounted for with 7.3 percent of the total live stock population. Poultry however recorded a decrease of about 19.6 percent in 1966 over that in 1961.

An artificial insemination centre works at Telanghedi for development of livestock. An animal Geneticist section with a well equipped laboratory has also been working at Nagpur and cater to the Artificial incemination centre and sub-centres.

The central poultry farm located at Nagpur undertakes poultry breeding, management and research in poultry science.

The livestock mortality has decreased in 1965-66 due to increased facilities in the district as compared to the year 1961-62. However the same increased in the case of poultry due to Ranikhet disease and other causes.

FOREST:-

The area under forests is about 18.7 percent of the total area of the district. Out of the total area under forest 47.4 percent is under reserved forest, 34.0 percent is under protected forest and the remaining 18.6 percent is under unclassed forest. The forest area has increased by about 2.1 percent during 1961-62 to 1965-66. The value of forest produce has increased by 10.6 percent during 1965-66 as compared to the previous year but however it fell by about 8.3 percent as compared to the year 1961-62. Though the quantity of timber has increased from 301500 C.ft in 1961- to 339770 C.ft. in 1965-66 the value has decreased by about Rs. 69900.

FISHERIES:-

Fishing activities in the district are naturally restricted to inland waters only, rivers, tanks and Ponds being the principal sources. The commercially important varieties of fish found in the district are Murrail, Dhudkya, Botri, Padhan, Tambu, Karradi, Peshti, etc.

At some places the fishing activity is carried on through Co-Operative Societies which have been given financial assistance in the form of loan and subsidy to fishermen. The Fisheries Department has also provided loans and subsidy to individuals for the fishing activity.

#### IV INDUSTRY ? EMPLOYMENT, MINING & ELECTRICITY.

##### INDUSTRY:-

Nagpur city is an important industrial centre in Maharashtra. Industrial development has taken place mostly at Nagpur city and at a few smaller towns. Of the total working factories in the district about 88 % of them are located in Nagpur alone.

There are a number of large scale units such as Cotton textiles, Cotton Ginning and Pressing, saw Saw mills, Paper and Straps Board, Ceramics, Ferro-Manganese, Steel rolling etc. Out of the total factories about 51.5 percent are saw mills employing approximately 4.9 percent of the total workers. The percentage of factories manufacturing machinery other than electrical machinery works out to about 8.3 percent employing 3.7 percent of the total workers. The factories engaged in spinning, weaving, and finishing of Cotton Textiles though account for only about 1.67 percent of the total number of factories has a maximum number of workers, forming 47.6 percent of total number of workers.

##### EMPLOYMENT EXCHANGE :-

The registration of persons during 1965-66 has gone up by 11541 (near by 69.4%) as compared to 1964-65. During 1965-66 about 52 percent were placed in employment out of the total number of vacancies notified as against 62 percent during previous year. About 27 percent of the candidates placed in employment during 1965-66 belong to scheduled castes and scheduled Tribes as against only 16 percent during previous year. However the number of employers using employment exchange has gone down by 22 percent during the year 1965-66.

MINING :-

The district is outstandingly rich in mineral wealth. In addition to known occurrences in the district large areas still remain unexploited for preliminary prospecting. The valuable minerals like Manganese, Coal, Limestone and Dolomite, White Clay, Ochres Mica etc., are found in the district.

ELECTRICITY :-

The only power generating station in the district is at Kaperkheda, which supplies power to other districts also. Due to the failure of Baras Power Station more supply is diverted to its area of coverage and hence during the year 1965-66 this affected electric supply in the district.

The proportion of electricity used for industrial purposes is about 45.6 percent of total electricity consumed which is nearly same as compared to previous year.

All the 12 towns are electrified covering a population of 787700. Out of the total number of villages in the district about 25 percent of them have been electrified up to the end of the year 1965-66. The total population covered by electrification works out to about 73.1 percent and this high percentage is obviously <sup>due</sup> to coverage of entire Nagpur city.

V-CO-OPERATION :-

The co-operative movement has made great strides during the last three plan periods. By the end of 1965-66 all the villages in the district have been covered by agricultural credit societies. The movement which was in the beginning mainly restricted to agricultural credit has now covered other fields of economic activity such as dairying, fisheries, farming, marketing, industrial etc. However the movement still continues to cater to agricultural credit and Agricultural Credit Societies accounts for 37 percent of the total number of societies claiming 24 percent of the membership of all societies and claim 16 percent of the share capital of all types of societies.

The number of societies of all types has decreased by 1 percent during the year 1965-66, while their Membership decreased by 3.9 %, Share Capital increased by 29.6%<sup>and</sup> Working Capital decreased by 16.9 %. Amount of loan advanced during the year has increased by about 40.9 percent.

Some of the important types of Co-operative Societies besides agricultural Credit Societies in Nagpur district are Weaver's Societies, Housing Societies and Consumer's Co-operative Stores, as their account for 10 %, 14% and 12 percent of the total number of societies respectively.

There has been increase in the membership, share capital, reserve and other funds, working capital and loan advanced in respect of agricultural co-operative societies in the year 1965-66 as compared to the previous year.

## VI. MEDICAL AND PUBLIC HEALTH .

As per 1961 Census 3461 persons were engaged in medical and public Health Profession in the district. Out of these 35 % were Doctors . Out of the total male doctors in the district 15 % were in rural areas and only 6 % of the female doctors were in rural areas. At the end of 1965 there were 19 Hospitals 8 maternity homes and 130 dispensaries. In addition to this there were 13 primary health centres in the district. On an average there are about 1.25 hospitals and 8.6<sup>per</sup> dispensaries /lakh of Population in the district. Similarly on an average there are 182 beds per lakh of population in the district . The birth rate has gone down from 36.7 per thousand during 1964 to 36.3 per thousand during 1965.

The death rate has also gone down from 14.7 per thousand during 1964 to 13.2 per thousand during 1965 as per the registration by Public Health Department.

The infant mortality rate was (9.9) per thousand live birth during 1965 as against 11.7 during 1964. The survey of the drinking water supply sources conducted during 1963-64 revealed that 7.7 % of the total villages were without any drinking water source while 22.4 % of the <sup>villages</sup> were with inadequate water supply. Wells the main source of drinking water supply in villages while there were 7 villages piped water supply in the district.

VII-EDUCATION :-

As per the 1961 Population Census the district has highest literacy percentage (35.15) % in the Nagpur Division and ranks second in Maharashtra due to Nagpur city. The percentage of literacy among males and females in the district as per 1961 Census was 48.06 % and 21.26% respectively.

The number of Primary and Pre-primary educational institutions in the district has increased by about 10.2 percent and the number of primary school going childrens has increased by 6.8 percent during year 1965-66. Primary education has now covered almost all the villages in the district. (The scheme of compulsory education has been made applicable to <sup>1120</sup> villages upto the end of the year.) The number of secondary educational institutions has gone up by about 5.1 % during the year while the number of secondary /school<sup>going</sup> children has gone up by about 14.0 % during the year 1965-66. Among the students, boys have recorded an increase of 12 % and girls have recorded an increase by about 17.0 percent.

There are very good facilities for higher education in the district. Nagpur city is an important centre of college education in Maharashtra. Almost all types of colleges have been established & facilities for Medical, Engineering, Agriculture and Veterinary courses are also provided in Nagpur city. As the demand for higher education is increasing day by day, new colleges are being opened and the intake capacity of the existing colleges is also being increased to meet the growing number of admission seekers. All these higher institutions are affiliated to Nagpur University.

VIII- TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATION :-

The district is well served by rail. The central and South-Eastern Railways operate in the district. There is no change in the length of Railway routes. The existing railway length in the district is 3.4 Kilometers per 100 Sq. Kilo meters and 22.1 Kilometers per lakh of population.

The district is also well connected by roads with adjoining districts of Wardha, Chanda, Bhandara, Amravati and to some of the districts places in Madhya Pradesh. The district Head quarters is connected with all taluka places in the district. The road length is nearly the same during the year -1965-66 as compared to the year 1964-65. The road length in the district during the year 1965-66 is 9.8 Kilometers per 100 square Kilometers and 64.2 Kilometers per lakh Population. The length of road per 100 Sq. Kilometers is maximum in Nagpur taluka and it is the lowest in Ramtek taluka. It is below the average of the district in Umrer and Ramtek talukas as both these talukas have large areas under forest. The road length per lakh population is highest in soner taluka while it is lowest in Nagpur taluka.

The percentage of road length under National High Ways, State High Ways, Major District Roads, Other District roads and village roads to the total road length during the year -1965-66 is 22.7, 23.4, 19.3, 26.0 and 8.6 respectively. Similarly according to the surface classification of road length it is found that 0.4 % of roads are of cement Concrates 60.4 % are black topped, 34.2 % are water bound macadam and the remaining 5.0% are of granular material and of lower type.

A substantial part of the passengers and goods traffic is handled by Maharashtra State Road Transport Corporation in the district. It has made considerable progress by increasing the number of routes. The State Government is also taking necessary steps to nationalise all the Passenger

road transport year after year . Figures of the no. of routes , route distance , average route distance, earning of vehicles and number of passengers travelled indicate that the State Transport Corporation has made considerable progress during the year .The number of motor vehicles in operation in the district has also gone up by 34% during the year.

Nagpur is a centrally situated city in India and as such is an important air ~~ports~~ The aerodrome is situated 5 miles away from the city & is located at Sonegaon village merged in Nagpur Corporation . Plans coming from Bombay, Delhi, Calcutta & Madras touch this air port.

#### IX- LOCAL BODIES.

Zilla Parishad :- Out of a total revenue receipts of Rs. 332 lakhs of Nagpur Zilla Parishad during 1965-66, 95.8 percent of it was by way of Government Grants, while only 4.2 percent was from self raised resources. Out of the receipts from self raised resources 63.1 percent were from local fund less; 2.9 percent from taxes ; while 34.0 percent of it was realised from other heads. The Zilla Parishad has spent on an average Rs. 44.95 per person during 1965-66 as against Rs. 33.34 during 1964-65 taking into consideration 1964 rural population. Out of the total revenue expenditure during 1965-66 6.9 percent was spent on General Administration, 49.6 percent on Education, 2.8 percent on Medical and Public Health, 13.7 percent on Agriculture and Animal Husbandry, 2.1 percent on Social Welfare, 6.8 percent on Community Development, 8.7 percent on Buildings and Communication, and 9.4 percent on other miscellaneous heads .

During the year 1965-66 there were 651 village Panchayats in the district. The income and expenditure per village panchayat was Rs. 6162 and

Rs. 6085/- respectively during 1965-66. Out of the total income of village panchayats 65.6 percent was from Government Grants and other grants, 14.9 percent was from taxes and 9.5 percent from other sources..

There were 10 Municipalities and one Municipal Corporation and one Contonment Board in the district during the year 1965-66. Out of the total income of all Municipalities and contonment Boards during 1965-66, 76.9 percent was from rates and taxes while 10.5 percent was from Government grants and 12.6 percent from other sources. Out of the total expenditure of Municipalities 8.1 percent was on General Administration and cost of collection of ~~rate~~ taxes, 4.6 percent on public safety, 30.1 percent on public health and Convenience, 23.9 percent on Public Works, 20.2 percent on Public Instructions and 13.1 percent on Other matters. The Municipalities on an average collected Rs. 26.00 per person by way of taxes during 1965-66.

**X. PLAN AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT :-**

The total expenditure on district level schemes was slightly more than the total plan provision. The total expenditure under different heads is shown in the following table.

From the above table it is seen that out of the total expenditure during the plan period "Agricultural Programmes" accounted for nearly 34.4%. "Social services" accounted for 30.7% "Co-operation and Community Development" accounted for 9.2%, and "Industry and Mining" and "Transport and Communications" accounted for 8.0 percent each upto the year 1964-65 the expenditure was too low except on most of the heads of development.

By the end of the year 1965-66, three Medium irrigation projects were nearly completed. Expansion of the Regional Engineering college, Nagpur Veterinary college was also nearly completed. New Ayurvedic Mahavidyalaya was started during the Third Plan period at Nagpur.

New Ayurvedic Mahavidyalaya was started during the IIIrd plan period at Nagpur.

Community Development :-

The programme of community development was introduced in the district in October, 1953 with the inauguration of 3 Blocks, viz. Mauda, Kalameshwar and Narkhed. By the end of 1965-66 4 blocks were in stage-I, 5 blocks in Stage-II and 4 blocks in Post stage- II.

XI. PRICES. :-

In the year 1965-66, Nowar, Rice, wheat, sugar, etc. were controlled commodities under Statutory Rationing and hence these were not marketed in Nagpur city being rationed area. The prices of these commodities were fixed by Government and no remarkable change in their prices of these commodities was observed. As compared to the corresponding prices in the month of January, 1965 the price of Gram dal, Groundnut oil, Vanaspati, Charcoal, etc. have showed an upward trend while Arhar dal, Gur, Chillies, etc. have shown downward trends.

The average consumer price index has increased by about 3.1 % during the year 1965 over that of 1964. The price trend in rural areas of the district was identical with the price trend at Nagpur city.

XII- MISCELLANEOUS :-

Police and Crime :-

The number of cognizable offences and non-cognizable offences have shown an increase by about 7.0% and 10.2 % respectively.

Courts:-

The number of civil cases decided in the courts have decreased in respect of both original and appellate sides.

Life Insurance :-

The number of policies issued during the year 1965-66 have increased by about 6.5% with an increase by about 5.5 % in the amount insured.

Small Savings :-

The target of small savings collection fixed for the district could not be achieved during the year 1965-66 and only 77.8% of it was fulfilled.

Land revenue and other taxes :-

The land revenue demand including previous arrears slightly decreased during the year as compared

to previous year. Arrears have increased by about 30.5 percent during the year.

The value of properties transferred during the year was nearly more than double as compared to previous year.

C H A P T E R . - III.

Important Indicators

In this chapter the progress of development covering roughly the period of Third Five Year Plan has been reviewed by presenting talukawise sectorial trends based on certain important indicators of development. Comparative talukawise figures for 1961-62 and 1965-66 or 1960-61 and 1964-65 as the case may be have been given to bring out the pace of development.

Indicator No. 1:- Percentage of gross sown area.

The district accounted for the lowest percentage of area sown more than once to the net area sown in Nagpur division as well as in Maharashtra during 1961-62 when it stood last amongst the 26 districts of Maharashtra and as 8 th district of this Region. The district ranks 7 th amongst the eight districts of Vidarbha in this respect during 1964-65. The following table shows the percentage of gross cropped area to net cropped area.

The proportion of double cropped area is lower because except Rantek & Umrer tahsils a major portion of the area under cultivation is under cotton. Kharif Jowar and some other cereals and pulses and as such no rabi crop can be grown in these lands. Most of the cultivated land in Rantek and Umrer is under paddy.

in Kharif season and Jowar is grown in rabi season.

Rabi crops like Wheat, Gram etc. are also grown as double crops in the paddy area and hence the percentage of double cropped area in these two talukas is slightly higher than in the other talukas. The irrigation facilities are at present very meagre in the district. Canal irrigation in Ramtek & Umrer talukas depends on the rains, while oranges are generally grown on well irrigation where the possibility of a second crop is ruled out for 3 to 4 years.

Indicator No. 2:- Productivity of important crops.

The productivity of crops generally depends on equitable distribution of rains in the absence of adequate irrigational facilities. The year 1960-61 was supposed to be the best agricultural year in which the outturn of crops has broken all the past records. After 1960-61 the productivity and outturn have improved during the year 1964-65 as compared to the year 1961-62. As far as the yield rates of total cereals & total pulses in 1961-62 is concerned. The district has 7th & 4th place respectively in the division.

Total outturn of important crops for the year 1960-61 and 1964-65 is given in the following table

From the above table it is seen that the productivity of total food-grains has decreased by about 12.8 percent during 1964-65 as compared to the year 1960-61. The productivity of Non food crops has also decreased to some extent except in the case of <sup>groundnut</sup> cotton which has increased slightly.

Indicator No. 3:- Gross Value of agricultural Production.

As relevant price data required are not available the gross value of agricultural production could not be calculated.

Indicator No. 4:- Percentage of irrigated area.

The district ranks third in Nagpur division in so far as irrigation is concerned. During 1964-65 the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area was highest in Saoner taluka while in Nagpur taluka it was the lowest. During 1964-65 the district ranked in 3rd amongst the eight districts of Vidarbha on the basis of percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area being only 101.1. The following table shows the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area.

Though area under irrigation has increased in the year 1964-65 the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area in most of the talukas has decreased in that year. This is mainly because of the tendency of cultivators to take cash perennial crops like oranges etc.

The irrigation facilities in rabi season in Ramtek and Umarer talukas mainly depend on the availability of water in the canals.

Indicator No. 5:- Changes in the Crop Pattern.

During the past five years from 1960-61 to 1964-65 the percentage of area under food crops has decreased from 79.35 percent to 77.70 percent respectively. The percentage has mainly decreased in Katol, Saoner and Nagpur talukas. The following table shows the area under food crops and non-food crops in each talukas during the years 1960-61 and 1964-65.

The area under cotton has increased in all the talukas during last 5 years. Cotton is the most important cash crop in Katol, Saoner and Part of Nagpur taluka. Area under Oil Seeds has also increased in some talukas. Under food crops area under chillies and oranges has also considerably increased at the cost of other cereal & food crops as they are the main cash crops of the district. The district had 97.56 percent and 98.07 percent of the total irrigated area under food crops during 1960-61 and 1964-65 respectively. Umrer taluka has maximum irrigated area under food crops. Percentages of irrigated area under food and non food crops are given below.

The area irrigated in Ramtek and Umrer talukas is mostly under Rice and wheat which accounts for higher percentage of area irrigated under cereals. Area irrigated in other talukas mainly consists of oranges, Chillies and food grains. Among non-food Crops Cotton is the main irrigated non-food crop particularly in Katol and Saoner talukas while in Nagpur taluka the irrigated area is mainly under cotton and miscellaneous non-food crops.

In general in Ramtek and Umrer talukas most of the area irrigated is under food grains while in other talukas it is under other food crops such as oranges, chillies etc. which are cash crops.

Indicator No.6:- Increase in agricultural credit and Outstanding dues.

Agricultural credit, plays an important roll in development of agriculture. During last five years there is an increase of about 97.69 percent in the loans advanced. The following table shows the percentage increase in agricultural credit during 1963-64 and 1965-66. Talukawise break up of loan advanced for the year 1961-62 & 1962-63 is however not available.

The percentage increase in loan advanced in 1965-66 as compared to 1961-62 & 1962-63 works out to 97.69 % and 80.67 respectively. The percentage increase in conspicuously higher in Unrer and Rantek talukas than the district average. It is least during the above period in Saoner & Katol talukas as seen from the above table. The percentages of loans overdue to loans outstanding in Katol, Saoner, Rantek, Nagpur and Unrer talukas during 1965-66 were 21.71, 23.08, 14.91, 15.34 and 14.29 respectively. The percentage of over dues to loans outstanding during the year 1961-62 was

21.64 percent and it has decreased to 18.18 percent during the year 1965-66. percentage of overdues in 1965-66 has decreased by about 4.46 percent as compared to the year 1961-62 thereby toning up the financial position of credit societies .

Indicator No. 7 :- Agricultural Wage Rates.

Agricultural Wage rates were collected regularly from June 1963 for the centres Parseoni in Rantek taluka , Kuhi in Unrer taluka and Dhapewada in Saoner taluka . Since January 1964 Parseoni centre was replaced by Mouda in the same taluka.

The agricultural wage rates in Nagpur district are slightly more in case of males while they are lower in case of females than the corresponding average agricultural wage rates in Nagpur division.

As it is generally found that no Carpenters, Black smiths, Cobblers and Herdsmen are employed in rural area on daily wage basis the wage rates for these categories are not available.

The wage rates for males are more at Kuhi and less at Mouda while for females the rates are higher at Mouda and lower at Dhapewada centres during the year 1965-66. The wage rates both for males & females at Khhi have been increased during the year as compared to the year 1963-64.

The average increase in the wage rates for males from 1963-64 to 1965-66 is 43% at Mouda, 50% at Dhapewada and 50% at Kuhi and that for females, it works out to 124% at Mouda, 72% at Dhapewada and 70% at Kuhi. The average increase in the wage rates in the district from 1963-64 to 1965-66 is found to be 4.5% <sup>for</sup> males and 80% for females.

Indicator No. 8 :- Livestock per Hectore of Land.

Livestock still continues to play an important roll in agriculture. The livestock population (Bovine & Ovine) in the district was 803424 according to 1961 census.

The cultivable land has decreased by about 0.2 percent during 1964-65 as compared to 1960-61. The talukawise livestock (Bovine & Ovine) per hectare of cultivable land is given in the following table.

The livestock (Bovins & Ovine) per hectore of cultivable land in the district remained unchanged in 1960-61 & 1964-65. The livestock per hectore of cultivable land is highest in Rantek taluka (1.18) followed by Saoner & Nagpur talukas & equally lowest in Katol and Umrer talukas.

Indicator No. 9 :- Poultry as compared to Population

Poultry population in the district according to 1966 livestock census is 176899 which has decreased by about 19.6 percent during the year 1966 as compared to 1961. The talukawise poultry per person during the years 1961 & 1966 is given in the following table.

Poultry per person is highest in Ramtek taluka in 1966 and lowest in Nagpur taluka. It is less in Nagpur taluka due to sizable population of Nagpur city. As compared to the 1961 Live stock Census poultry has decreased in Ramtek, Umrer and Katol talukas while it has increased in Saoner and Nagpur talukas.

Indicator No. 10:- Per capita Consumption of Electricity.

The only power station in the district is located at Khaparkheda which supplies electricity to other districts of the region. This power station is connected by grid system with Ballarshah and Paras. As Paras power station was out of order and supply of electricity to the area served by Paras was also made from the Khaparkheda Power Station which affected the regular, normal supply to the district. Due to this the consumption of electricity in the district.

during 1965-66 was comparatively much lower than that compared to the year 1961-62, The per capita consumption of electricity in the district is highest as compared to other districts in the division mainly due to rapid industrialisation taking place in Nagpur city.

The decrease per capita consumption will be still higher if actual population during 1965-66 is taken into consideration.

Indicator No. 11 Increase in the No. of candidates enrolled in Employment Exchange and Vacancies notified.

During 1965-66 enrollment in the employment exchange has increased by about 18.8 percent as compared to the year 1961-62. The increase in vacancies notified has shown an increase of 7.6 percent while placement has shown a decrease of about 6.4 % during the year as compared to the year 1961-62. Out of the total no. of candidates placed in employment during 65-66 about 26.8 % belonged to the scheduled castes and scheduled tribes.

Indicator No. 12:- Increase in indoor and outdoor patients treated in hospitals.

The indoor patients treated in different hospitals has shown an increased of about 29.52 percent during the year 1965 as compared to the year 1961. The out door patients treated in hospitals and dispensaries as during 1965 has shown a decrease of about 13.01 percent. The indoor and out door patients treated during 1964 has shown an increase of 23.65 percent ~~increase~~ and 13.74 percent decrease respectively. Talukawise increase or decrease of the patients treated in hospitals and dispensaries during the year 1964 as compared to the year 1961 is shown in the following table. Talukawise break-up of patients treated for the year 1965 is not however available.

The increase in indoor patients treated, is mainly due to increase in the number of primary health centres in different panchayat samities and additional facilities in the existing institutions. In the Nagpur City there are good facilities for indoor patients. Also No. of beds have increased to some extent.

The decrease in out-door patient treated is mainly due to Various Schemes such as Malaria Erradication Programme, Small - Pox Erradication Programme, B.C.G.Vaccination etc. implemented during the third plan period and other increased medical facilities which have resulted in decrease in death rate.

Indicator No. 13:- Increase in the number of students in different categories.

The number of students attending Schools have increased in almost all the categories of education. In following table percentage increase in no. of boys and girls in primary and secondary stage during 1965-66 over their corresponding number in 1961-62.

Stages although the percentage of students in secondary in that taluka was found to be much lower than in other talukas. There were only 202 and 615 girls attending secondary schools in 1961-62 and 1965-66 respectively in Ramtek tahsil/<sup>which</sup> comparison mostly forest areas, with lower density of population. It is also remarkable to note that in the district as a whole the percentage rise in the case of girls both in primary & secondary stages ~~doubled~~<sup>of</sup> the corresponding rise in the case of boys during 1965-66 over 1961-62.

Enrollment in higher education has shown an increase in the case of Boys of about 11.15 and decrease in the case of girls by about 10.41 percent/ during the year 1965-66 as compared to the year 1964-65 . Enrollment in special schools has also shown an increase of about 4.14<sup>32.48</sup> percent in the case of *boy* girls <sup>respectively</sup> during the year 1965-66 as compared to the year 1961-62.

From the above table it is seen that the road length per 100 sq.Kms. has increased from 8.06 Kms. in 1961-62 to 9.79, Kms in 1965-66. The road length per 100 Sq.Kilo meters (the road mileage per 1000 Sq. miles) and the road length per lakh of population considering the road length as on 31-3-1962 the district ranked 18th & 23rd respectively in Maharashtra. The length of road per 100 Sq. Kilo meters is highest in Nagpur taluka while it is lowest in Ramtek taluka. The road length per 100 Sq. Kilo meters is below the corresponding district average in Ramtek and Umrer talukas due to large forest areas in these two talukas.

Indicator No.15 :- Increase in banking facilities in proportion to population.

The district has better facilities of banking as compared to other districts of the Nagpur division. There were 38 banking offices in the district during the year 1961. The number has gone up to 51 during the year 1965. The following table shows the banking offices per lakh of population.

The banking offices per lakh of population have gone up from 2.58 during 1961-62 to 3.37 in the year 1965-66. Similarly the population per banking office has decreased from 38790 to 29663 from 1961-62 to 1965-66. There are 15 places where banking facilities were available in the district in these year 1965-66. Due to the rapid industrialisation of Nagpur city and surrounding areas banking facilities have more concentrated in the Nagpur city.

Indicator No. 16:- Prices.

Prices of different essential commodities have shown an up ward trend during the year 1965 as compared to the year 1962 in the district. In the year 1965 Nagpur city and Yampetee town were <sup>statutorily</sup> declared as rationing areas and hence Rice, Jowar, and Wheat were not sold openly in the market from 1965 onwards. <sup>percentage</sup> increase in prices of some important commodities at Nagpur/ city is given in the following table.

CHAPTER - IV  
THIRD FIVE YEAR PLAN.

The Third Five Year Plan was the first Plan for Maharashtra and offered greater opportunities for refreshing the State's economy and reorienting it into all sided growth. This plan represented a phase in a programme of long term development designed to transform radically the economy of the State during the three or four successive plan periods. It also contemplated to rectify the various imbalances and even out the existing regional disparities.

During first two plans smaller amounts were spent for the development of Vidarbha region as compared to the western areas of the state and as such additional allocation were made for the Third Plan Programme for Vidarbha to make good the shortfalls. The additional allotments were used for accelerating the progress under irrigation, primary education and roads.

Total Third Plan outlay for the Nagpur division was originally fixed as Rs. 88.12 crores and was subsequently revised to Rs. 96.41 crores for augmenting production during the Emergency. The allocations for the district level programmes of this district amounted to total of Rs. 718.42 lakhs. The Agricultural Programmes were given priority with a total outlay of about 34 percent of the total provision. The programme included under Social Services were allotted about 38 percent of the total provision; while 7 percent of total allocations were set aside for road development programmes.

All the plan programmes were mostly implemented as per the targets in district and the total expenditure made amounted to Rs. 607 lakhs.

Agricultural Programme :-

The different schemes under agricultural programmes, specially aimed at improvement in the agricultural productivity for Soil Conservation, Minor Irrigation, propagation of Improved Agricultural practices, and improved implements, development of crops etc. were undertaken and implemented. The programmes of development of Dairy, Forests, Inland Fisheries and Animal Husbandry were also included as other agricultural programmes. The table below shows the allotments and total expenditure on various programmes in the district:-

Agricultural Production :-

As against the total provision of Rs. 69.17 lakhs for the various schemes the total expenditure incurred in the district was Rs. 65.12 lakhs. The schemes relating to development of crops viz - cotton, horticulture etc. were predominantly implemented in the district. And additional seed farm was established. The programme of propagation of plant protection schemes received special response. The schemes relating to agricultural production received further momentum with the Emergency, when the production programme

... were of vital importance for the economy. For intensive cultivation, special ~~organisations~~ were organised for propagating the use of improved seeds, fertilizers and improved methods. The table below gives an account of actual physical achievement in the district under programme.

**Soil Conservation :-**

Another important plan activity under ~~agricultural~~ was bunding programme for moisture conservation. Under this programme bunding on 85 thousand acres of area in this district against the target of 58 thousand acres was done during the plan period. The total cost of bunding works amounted to Rs. 41.08 lakhs.

**Minor Irrigation :-**

Minor irrigation works were under taken on priority basis, particularly after the Emergency, with a view to boost up particularly production of food grains.



As many as 2025 new wells were constructed in the course of the plan period. A total no of 1154 pump-sets were installed for irrigation purpose. The repairs to old irrigation wells and renovation of Ex-malguzari tanks were also under taken on a large scale thus the additional irrigation potential of wells was about 2500 acres. The total cost of the tanks completed was Rs.43.29 lakhs, while the total expenditure on minor irrigation amounted to Rs.45.07 lakhs.

Animal Husbandry :-

~~Different~~ veterinary services were already made available during the first two Plans. Therefore during the Third Plan, more emphasis was focussed on the improvement and development of available cattle breeds. Five cattle breeding centres were established in the district and 93 Premium bulls were also located at different places in the district for servicing, and twelve artificial insemination centres were also started. The construction of veterinary dispensaries in different parts was also undertaken and the total expenditure on all these programmes amounted to Rs.2.21 lakhs, as against a total provision of Rs.1.88 lakhs.

Dairy Development :-

The programme under this head had emphasised more on milk production in milk pockets in rural areas. There were programmes for intensive development of milkshed areas, for increasing milk yields by introducing improved breeds and for better management by strengthening arrangements for milk collections and marketing.

Town milk supply scheme for Nagpur was already started during earlier plan period. During the Third Plan its full development was envisaged. Accordingly the expansion works were taken up and the capacity of daily handling of milk was steadily increased to 7500 litres. Co-operatives of milk producers were formed and financial assistance was made to these organisations for increasing the daily supply of milk to urban areas where town milk supply schemes were operating.

Forests :-

About 18.7 percent of the total area of the district is under forests. Teak is the main species of timber commonly found all over the forest areas. The total forest revenue is about Rs.90 lakhs annually. A total amount of Rs. 18.42 lakhs had been spent on different schemes for development of forests. The programmes completed comprised plantation of valuable trees on an area of 1855 acres, afforestation of soil conservation on 540 acres plantation.

Fisheries :-

For development of fisheries in inland waters, different schemes aimed at increased in the production of fish and improvement of Socio-Economic conditions of the fishermen were implemented and a total expenditure incurred on them amounted to Rs. 1.36 lakhs. About 60 lakhs of fingerlings were stocked in impounded waters in different tanks in the district.

Co-operation and Community Developments :-

Co-operation :-

Co-operative movement has taken tremendous strides in the State. The State Five Year Plans have sought the promotion of Co-operative organisations through financial supports for under taking different economic activities in the form of subsidieries, share capital investment and loans according to the needs. The programme during the Third Plan was concerned mainly with the development of Co-operative marketing. The credit facilities to agriculturists through Co-operative and Co-operative farming were also extended.

And out lay of Rs.23.78 lakhs was fixed for the activities under co-operation in the district against which the total amount spent was Rs. 17.45 lakhs.

Over twelve lakh of Rs. were spent on developing , marketing facilities such as constructions of godowns etc . Agricultural credit advanced was to the tune of 6 crores of Rs . on short term loans , Rs. 12 lakhs on medium terms loans and Rs. 72 lakhs on long term loans . The memberships of agricultural credit societies increased by 2890. For accelerating co-operative farming . 6 societies were newly formed with membership of 77, and the total financing to such societies amounted to Rs. 61 thousands. After the rising trend in prices during Emergency, a tempo was created to organise consumers co-operatives , when over to 200 such consumers stores were started in the district . In this district a co-operative of transport service workers / <sup>viz</sup> Auto Rikshaw Drivers was formed which received financial help <sup>of</sup> a lakh of Rs.

#### Community Development :-

Community Development programmes were continued during the Third Plan Period , under the new fold of Panchayat Samities , with the provision of Rs 81.43 lakhs. As against this provision actual expenditure of Rs. 99.14 lakhs was incurred . A total expenditure on Community Development Projects was Rs. 80.49 lakhs , the number of the projects being 13 in the district . About 10 lakhs of Rs. were paid as assistance to rural local bodies for Local Development works programmes.

#### Small Scale and Cottage Industries :-

Nagpur district accounts for a highest index of industrial concentration among the

districts of vidarbha region. The district level programme on industrial development was entirely devoted to Small Scale Industries only, for which Rs. 40.02 lakhs were allotted for this district. A total expenditure of Rs. 48.87 lakhs was made out of which ~~about~~ 47.0 lakhs of Rs. were spent for the co-operative of hand loom weavers. For encouraging rural industrialisation, a scheme for helping artisans, craftsman, persons engaged in traditions to form into co-operatives was implemented.

Transport and Communications :-

Programme for road development had also a significant place in the plan. Among the districts of the division, transport facilities were quite satisfactory for this district. At the end of Second Plan, the index of road length and railway length were 8 kilo-meters and 3.5 kilo meters per hundred Sq. Kilo meters areas. During Third Plan, road works of about two hundred kilo meters were completed, taking up the total length of roads to about 1000 Kms. There by index was improved to <sup>about</sup> 10 Kms. per 100 Sq.Kms. The total expenditure on road development works was Rs. 47.93 lakhs in this district.

Social Services :-

As in case of other districts the programme for General Education was emphasised as an important aspect of development. The total amount spent on this programme was Rs. 47.57 lakhs of which Rs. 47.44 lakhs were expended on programme of primary education alone. By the end of Second Plan, as many as 384 villages of the district had <sup>no</sup> schooling facilities

Some 200 new primary schools were therefore started during Third Plan period covering largely many of these villages . The number of primary schools and secondary schools in the district were <sup>1563</sup> 264 and 226 by the end of the plan period .

Under the programme for technical education the expansion of polytechnic was taken up. A new building for the hostel of the polytechnic was completed . Expansion works of the polytechnic was also taken up in order to increase the intake capacity.

The programme under Public Health included mainly measures for control and Erradication of epidemics and communicable diseases. It may be mentioned that these control measures have shown tangible results. A total expenditure on these measures in the district was Rs. 25.51 lakhs . The number of B.C.G. vaccination performed during the Five Year period worked out to over 12 lakhs. In addition, Rs. 6.14 lakhs were spent on another important programme viz, Family Planning Programme, which was launched on a large scale as it was necessary to put to curb on uncontrolled growth of population. Some 11 thousand operations were performed in the district during the course of plan period.
