CHAPTER--I

1.1 Introduction and location.

The district of Aurangabad occupying an area of 6,454.9 Sq. miles (16,718.2 Kms.) is situated in upper Godavari basin and in the extreme north-west of Marathwada with a population of 15,32,341 according to 1961 census. The district was known as Paithan in different Vedic Epic and Puranic ages. The Royal edicts of Ashoka also refer indirectly to a city in Marathwada Petenikas i.e. the people of Paithan. The articulate history of the Deccan begins with Satavahana power which in 2nd Century B.C. saw the emergence of the Marathwada as a seat of mighty empire of the Satavahanas with their capital at Pratisthana (Paithan).

The district of Aurangabad has a long chequered and hoary past. In addition to its legendary background it was ruled by Kolarians, Satavahanas, the Parthians of Gujarat, the Chalukyas, the Rashtrakutas and the Yadavas. It was under the strain of Muslim invasion and between 1318 and 1347 it was a part and parcel of Delhi sultanate under Muhammed Tughlaq. Subsequently it formed part of the Bahamani Kingdom and Nizam Shahi Kingdom of Ahmednagar. From 1724 to 1956 it formed part of Hyderabad State and since 1956 it is included in Maharashtra.

Amongst the notable Hindu writers of the District mention may be made of Salivahana, Mukund Raja, Dhanoba, Hemad Pant, Atmakavaka, Janardhan Pant, Ekanath, Ramadas Swami, Mukteshwar Amrit and Mahipati.

Aurangabad which was a great city in the past was founded on the site of village Khirki by Malik Ambar, the Prime Minister of Murtaza Nizam Shah who was an abyssinian foreigner.

The first Mughal emperor lies buried in Kabul a foreign land, the second in Delhi, the third in Sikandra, the fourth in Lahore, the fifth in Taj at Agra and the last lies satisfied in this soil. After paying a visit to Aurangabad in 1913, Porter entered the following remark in his diary.

"Here endeth India" as he found the journey between Samarkand to Aurangabad a long and trying one.

The district forms 5.5% of the total area of the State and 3.87% of the population of Marathwada. A small area in the north and north-west lying beyond the Satmala hills is actually situated in the Tapi basin. The northern portion lying between /and the central hill range known as Jalna hills the Satmala hills/is an upland plateau. The southern portion is comparatively low terminating at banks of the Godavari. In general the district slopes down towards the south and south-east. The district lies between the parallels of 19° 17' 30" and 20° 40' 10" north latitude and between 74° 40' and 76° 40' east latitude.

1.2 Boundaries.

It is bounded on the north by Jalgaon district on the east by Parbhani and Buldhana Districts, on the south by Bhir district and a portion of Ahmednagar district and on the west by Nasik district and again by a portion of Ahmednagar district. The maximum length of the district from the north to the south is about 100 miles (161 K.Ms.) and from east to west is about 130 miles (201 K.Ms.).

1.3 Administrative Set-Up.

Aurangabad district is divided into three sub-divisions which are further subdivided into talukas and Mahals as detailed below.

Zilla Parishad.

With a view to promote the development of democratic institutions and to secure greater participation of the people in development activities in local and Government affairs one Zilla Parishad and 12 Panchayat Samities have been established in 1962. The areas under the jurisdiction of Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samities correspond to the District and taluka boundaries respectively. The municipal towns are however not covered by them including the area of Aurangabad cantonment. The Zilla Parishad covers 92.7 percent of the area and 85.56 percent of the total population of the district.

The number of Villages and population included under the Zilla Parishad and each Panchayat Samiti alongwith the number of councillors and co-opted members are shown below.

Two Subject Committees are presided over by the Vice President and four by two Chairmen elected by the Zilla Parishad to preside over two specified Subject Committees each. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer works as Secretary of the Standing Committees while the District Heads of Departments work as Secretaries to the Subject Committees concerned. The co-ordination between the Sub-Committees is achieved through Standing Committee. The co-ordination between the subject committees is achieved through the Standing Committee which includes the Chairman of all the Subject Committees. The Panchayat Samitis consist of all the co-uncillors who are elected from the electoral divisions including the Block co-opted councillors and associate members. It is presided over by the Chairman who is elected by the Panchayat Samiti from amongst its members. The Block Development Officer works as Secretary to the Panchayat Samiti.

The Chief Executive Officer of Zilla Parishad and the Block Development Officer look after the development work in their jurisdictions.

#### 1.4 AREA :-

The district of Aurangabad covers an area of 6314 Sq. miles according to the figures supplied by the Surveyor General of India and 6454.9 Sq. miles according to figures supplied by State Land Records and Survey Department. Its area in sq. K.Ms. is 16,718.2 Sq. Kilometres as per figures of State Land Records and Survey Departments. The rural area of district covers 6,350.5 Sq. miles or 16447.9 sq. K.Ms. as per figures of State Land Records and Survey Departments. The urban area of the district covers 104.4 sq. miles or 270.3 sq. ^{Kms.} K.Ms. Rural area forms 98.4% and urban area in the district accounts for 1.6% of its total area..

During the period 1901 to 1941 the district or its talukas underwent no major changes in boundaries. In 1950 twenty five enclave villages of Nasik, East Khandesh and Ahmednagar were transferred to Aurangabad district. Consequent upon the integration of Jagirs the taluka boundaries were reconstituted in April 1950 and the new mahals of Khuldabad and Jafferabad were created. Soegaon Mahal was carved out in 1953 by transferring 37 villa-ges from Sillod taluka and 30 from ~~Parbhani~~ taluka.

/Kannad

With the re-organisation of States on 1.11.56 the district was transferred from the erst-while Hyderabad State along with the rest of Marathwada to Maharashtra.

#### 1.5 Topography.

In general the district slopes down towards south and south-east. The general elevation above sea level varies from 2000 to 2200 feet on the north and 1700 to 1900 feet towards the south.

#### 1.6 Hills & River System Soils.

Aurangabad district is divided into the Balaghat or uplands to the north and Pavanghat or lowlands to the south the latter terminating in the valey of the Godavari. The hills of Balaghat are /^a continuation of the hill range of the same name in Vidharbha. There are important and noted hills projections like Daultabad, Ajantha, Chowka and Jyotsna. All these hills in the district have a terrace like appearance with flattened summits. The hills of the district comprise Satara, Mahadeo, Maholi Kunkura Surpanth, Satmala, Ajantha ghats and Aurangabad hills. Their average height is about 2,000 feet above the sea level but in places they also reach a height of about 3,000 feet. These hills consist mostly of trap rock with nodular limestone at some places.

The most important river of the district is the Godavari which runs along the southern boundary for about 127 miles separating Aurangabad, Ahmednager and Bhir districts, its tributaries are Shivna rising in the Kannad hills, the Dhenda rising near Daulatabad, Dudhana flowing from the hills east of Aurangabad, Kham which rises near Khuldabad and passes through the heart of Aurangabad town and Dheku which passes through Vaijanpur taluka. The Virbhadra flows through Paithan taluka and the Gahati passes through Ambad Taluka. The river Purna which is the biggest tributary of the Godavari rises from the Kannad hills and flows through the northern talukas of the district. The Jui passes through Bhokardan taluka. The other small streams and Nallas are Yela, Sabhanga, Virbudra, Kasner, Nanni, Dheri, Wagera, Sonuj, Bala, Hewra, Arnavati and Gulduth.

The prevailing soil of Aurangabad district is black cotton soil of "Regur" formed by the weltering of the Trap rock.

The geological formation of the district are 1. Middle traps of Deccan Territory 2. The older Alluvial deposits of the Godavari and 3. The modern alluvial deposits of the Godavari & the other rivers forming the upper layer. The black cotton soil is rich in plant nutrients such as lime, Magnesia, Iron and alkalis on which cotton and some of the dry crops flourish well. It swells and becomes sticky on wetting by water while on drying contracts and develops numerous cracks. The soil varies greatly both in its texture and depth. In the hilly tracks in the north it is deep and fairly rich. In the Godavari valley, specially along the river banks it is very deep and fertile.

#### 1.7 (1) Climate.

The Climate of Aurangabad is pleasant and agreeable during the greater part of the year. The climatic year may be divided into three short seasons, a moderately warm wet season from June to September, a cool dry season from October to February and a dry season from March to May.

The rainy season which lasts from June to September is warm and pleasant during rains as the temperature does not fall below  $79^{\circ}$  and normally ranges between  $21^{\circ}\text{C}$ . to  $36^{\circ}\text{C}$ .. The winter season is comparatively dry and starts from November and ends in February. January is the coldest month of the year. The mean maximum temperature in the month of May rises even as high as  $41^{\circ}\text{C}$ .. Occasionally hot dry winds prevail in April and May. During summer, the days are hot but nights are fairly cool. Thus the climate of Aurangabad is pleasant, charming and healthy.

#### (11) Temperature.

At Aurangabad Centre, the mean maximum temperature was highest in April ( $39.6^{\circ}\text{C}$ ..). The same was highest in the month of May ( $39.4^{\circ}\text{C}$ .) in the year 1965. The Chikalthana Centre has indicated the highest temperature in the month April ( $39.1^{\circ}\text{C}$ .) for the year 1961 and in May ( $39.1^{\circ}\text{C}$ .) for the year 1965. As regards mean minimum temperature in the month of December was the coolest for all the two years under review except the mean minimum temperature at Aurangabad Centre in the year 1965. The range between mean maximum and mean minimum was highest in February, 1961 and 1965 at Chikalthana; whereas the range of the same temperature were highest in the month of March for the year 1961 and in

The table given below indicates the mean temperature in 3 seasons of the years 1961 and 1965 for both the centres of Chikalthana and Aurangabad.

It may be noted that due to difference in altitude and topography rainfall is unevenly distributed in different parts of the district. On the basis of the district normal rainfall according to variation in rainfall, the district can be classified into three distinct tracts namely (1) where the rainfall exceeds 750 millimetres (2) rather in sufficient rainfall tract with rainfall ranges between 650 to 750 millimetres and (3) poor rainfall tract with rainfall below 650 millimetres.

The following table gives the talukwise normal rain (average of last 34 years between 1922-23 to 1955-56 as compared to the rainfall during the year 1961 and 1965.

From the table above it is evident that during 1961 rainfall exceeded 750 millimetres in the talukas of Sillod, Ambad, Aurangabad and the three Mahals of Jafferabad, Khuldabad and Soegaon. It ranged between 650 to 750 millimetres in Kannad, Bhokardhan and Gangapur whereas it was below 650 millimetres in Vaijapur, Jalna and Paithan. In the year 1965 seven talukas had rainfall below 650 millimetres. Among these talukas Jafferabad had the lowest rainfall of 327.1 millimetres and Ambad had a highest of 1350 millimetres in 1965 in the district.

The Fact Finding Committee appointed by the Government of Bombay in 1960 reported that the rainfall is not dependable in the following areas which are likely to be affected by scarcity conditions as follows.

Area	Estimated frequency
1. Vaijapur taluka	Once in ten years.
2. Gangapur taluka	Once in ten years.

Thus the south western Region of the district generally recording poor rainfall is more susceptible to crop failures due to inadequate, irregular and untimely rains. The rainfall is unevenly distributed in the district leading sometimes to scarcity conditions.

CHAPTER-II

Table No. 1.1

This table indicates the rainfall in millimetres, number of rainy days and normal rain-fall for the year 1961 and 1965. The total rain fall received in this district during the year 1965 was less when compared to the rainfall received in the year 1961. Rainfall is not uniform in all parts of the district and the areas of assured rainfall are the talukas of Kannad, Jalna and Ambad and Soegaon Mahal. Generally the taluka of Kannad and Kh-uldahad mahal receive more rains as they are covered by forests. The rains in the district are received mostly from the south-west monsoon from June to September with a few intermitent show-ers in October also. The south western portion of the district comprises the areas of scarcity conditions which prevail there once in ten years or so. The seasonal distribution of rainfall is more or less uniform in/ almost all areas.

Table No. 1.2

This table deals with temperature Statistics in Aurangabad district. The data on maximum, minimum and mean monthly temperature are shown in the table. The minimum temperature is generally reached in the month of December or January. The temperature figures show that in the year 1965 Summer and Winter seasons were more severe compared to those seasons in 1961. Similarly variations in temperature have been more than the variation in the year 1961.

Table No. 2.1

This table presents taluka wise rural and urban population in Aurangabad district according to 1961 Census and variation in the population during the last ten years. The area of the district and each of its talukas is also shown in the table. The district forms 5.46% and 3.80% of the State's area and population respectively. The highest percentage decade variation in population during 1951-61 was observed in Soegaon mahal being 47.48% and lowest was found in Ambad taluka being 22.85%. Similarly the density in Aurangabad taluka is the highest being 334 persons per sq. mile and the lowest density of population is found in the Soegaon mahal being 164 persons per sq. mile due to lack of comparison major/as portion of it is a hilly tract.

The district ranks 23rd in Maharashtra in terms of density of population.

Table No. 2.2

This table indicates classification of villages according to population ranges as per 1961 Census in Aurangabad district. A "Village" is a statutory recognised village having a defined boundary and separate land records. As many as 1512 villages out of 1871 inhabited villages in the district have population below 999 denoting that above 80% of the villages in the district are small villages only four villages namely 1. Shivar in Vaijapur taluka. 2. Jamkhed in Ambad taluka 3. Shivna in Sillod taluka 4. Phulmbri in Aurangabad taluka have population ranging between 5000 to 9999.

Table No. 2.3

This table indicates talukwise classification of towns according to population ranges of 1961 Census. A "Town" or urban area is a place which has a municipality a cantonment or civil line or a population of 5000 and over and at least 1/3th of male population is dependent on non-agricultural pursuits. In all 85.86% of the population of the district lives in rural areas whereas 14.14% constitute urban population as against 71.8% rural and 28.2% ^{urban} population in Maharashtra. Khuldabad is the only one town having a population below five thousand and conversely there are no villages in the district with a population of 5000 and over. There are only two large towns namely Jalna and Aurangabad. The former is a commercial centre and the latter is a regional headquarter in addition to being an educational centre.

Table No. 2.4

This table presents the number of workers in each taluka of this district as per Census of 1961.

As is evident from this table the active labour force in the district constituted about 53% of total population and 82.63% of the working population is engaged in agriculture showing that agriculture is the most important economic activity in the district. Only 2.89 of the population is engaged in manufacturing industries which reveals the backwardness of the district in the field of organised industries. The district ranks 5th among the 26 districts of Maharashtra in so far as the number of workers engaged in agriculture, industry including agricultural labourers as percentage of total workers is concerned.

Table No.2.5:-

This table indicates the number of non-workers in each taluka in this district according to Census of 1961. The total population of non-workers constitutes 47.09% of the total population of the district. ( 20% in rural and 27.08% in urban areas).

Table No.2.6.:-

This table indicates the sexwise population of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes in each taluka of the district. The Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes according to 1961 census formed 6.05% and 1.60% respectively of the total district population. The population of Scheduled Castes decreased from 13.76% of total population in 1951 to 6.05% of the total population in 1961 because most of the persons belonging to "Mahar" caste got themselves converted as "Nav-Budhas" prior to 1961 Census. The population of Scheduled Tribes enumerated in 1961 is found predominantly in 4 talukas of Gangapur, Vaijapur, Kanned and Ambad, whereas the population of Scheduled Castes is spread in all the talukas of the district. The Bhils formed 97.97% of the Scheduled Tribes population of the district in 1961 Census and the Andhs, Gonds and Pardhans were microscopic numerically.

Table No.2.7:-

This table presents the population of Urban areas in Aurangabad district as per 1961 Census. The town of Aurangabad inclusive of Aurangabad Cantonment forms 40.50% of total urban population. The importance of Jalna town is mainly due to its being a commercial centre and it accounts for 30.5% of total urban population of the district.

3.- AGRICULTURE/

TABLE NO.3.1:-

The table indicates land utilization Statistics in Aurangabad district in 1964-65 as compared to that in 1961-62. The net area sown during 1964-65/ ^{was} 79.22% of the total geographical area, the same during 1961-62 was 79.75%. However, there has been an increase of 1.1% in the total gross cropped area in 1964-65 as compared to that in 1961-62. While the total fallows during the year 1964-65 constituted 5.23% of the total geographical area, the same formed 5.10% of the total geographical area in 1961-62. The area under other unculturable land excluding fallow land constituted 6.4% of the total geographical area in 1964-65, the same formed 5.97% during 1961-62. The area not available for cultivation during 1964-65 was 4.37% of the total geographical area, the same was 4.17% during 1961-62. The area under forest was 5.18% of the total geographical area in 1964-65 as against 5.05% in 1961-62.

While the highest net cultivated area was found in Ambad taluka during 1964-65 followed by Jalna constituting 13.88% and 12.55% of the net cultivated area in the district respectively. the least net cultivated area sown was found in Soegaon taluka with only 2.83% of the total net cultivated area of the district.

TABLE NO.3.2 :-

This table deals with area under different crops in each taluka in the district in 1964-65 as compared to 1961-62. It is evident from the table that the food crops dominated the cropping pattern of the district as the food crops constituted 72.47% of the total gross cropped area during 1964-65 in the district. The area of total non-food crops during 1964-65 formed only 27.53% of the total gross cropped area. Of the total area under food crops the area under Jowar during 1964-65 was 45.25% which is the highest among the food crops. The highest area under the total non-food crops was covered by Cotton followed by the area under total oil seeds during 1964-65, the respective percentages being 55.42% and 41.81% against the area of total/ ^{non-} food crops.

While the highest area under total food-crops for 1964-65 was found in Ambad taluka constituting 13.11% of the total food crops in the District, the lowest area was found in Soegaon taluka forming only 2.21%.

TABLE NO.3.3

This table indicates the yield per hectare and outturn of principal crops in Aurangabad district during the year 1964-65 as compared to that in 1961-62. The yield per hectare in respect of total cereals in the district for the year 1964-65 recorded an increase of 0.86% over the yield in 1961-62. Similarly the outturn of total cereals in the district during the year 1964-65 increased by 5.15% over that in 1961-62. The out-turn of total pulses in the district showed a decrease of 8.02% in 1964-65 as against 1961-62. The out-turn of Cotton for the year 1964-65 increased by 2.29% over 1961-62.

TABLE NO.3.4:-

This table indicates the area irrigated by different sources in each taluka of this district. The increase in the net area irrigated in 1964-65 over the year 1961-62 was of the order of about 31.83%. The gross irrigated area increased by 21.12% in the year 1964-65 over the gross irrigated area during the year 1961-62. The well irrigation constituted major source of irrigation in the district as it accounted for 99.93% and 95.32% of the total net irrigated area in the district in the years 1961-62 and 1964-65 respectively. The cultivation in the district depends exclusively on rains. More irrigation facilities were found in Aurangabad taluka. Irrigation by Government Canals was found only in Sillod, Bhokardan, Jafferabad, Vaijapur & Paithan talukas and area irrigated by wells was least in Soegaon Mahal because of the hilly area due to which fewer number of wells were found there.

TABLE NO.3.5

This table indicates the area irrigated under different crops in each taluka of the district. Area irrigated under food crops accounted for 94.39% and 93.09% of the gross area irrigated respectively during the years 1961-62 and 1964-65 and the area irrigated under non-food crops formed only 5.61% and 6.91% of the gross irrigated area respectively during the years 1961-62 & 1964-65.

Among the total irrigated area, cereals covered 58.47% and 47.99% in the year 1961-62 and 1964-65 respectively. Sugarcane crops occupied 17.76% & 13.14% of the gross irrigated area during 1961-62 and 1964-65 respectively.

TABLE NO.3.6 (A)

This table indicates the number of irrigation wells in each taluka of the district in 1964-65 and 1961-62. The total number of wells in the district during 1964-65 increased by 30.75% as against 1961-62. The number of wells in use in the district during 1964-65 also increased by 33.89% over 1961-62. The highest number of wells in 1964-65 were found in Jalna taluka, forming 19.04% of the total number of wells in the district. The lowest number of wells in 1964-65 was found in Soegaon taluka forming only 1.48% of the total number of wells in the district.

TABLE NO.3.6 (B)

This table gives the information regarding the Minor Irrigation works in the district as on 31-3-1966. Eight works were completed in the State sector including one work completed by Co-operative Society with the gross area commanded to the extent of 4,503.34 Hectares. No work seems to have been completed in the local sector.

TABLE NO.3.6 (C)

This table indicates major and medium projects in the district as on 30-6-66. No major project was undertaken in the district during the period 1961 to 1966. Out of the 8 medium projects, ^{two projects} namely Dheku and Jui were completed in 1960. The gross area commanded under Dheku and Jui was 3784.40 and 3256.00 hectares respectively.

TABLE NO.3.7:-

This table indicates the distribution of households engaged in cultivation classified according to the nature of ownership, in the district in 1961 Census.

The total number of cultivating households in the district was 31,935 of which the cultivating households holding land from Government formed 86.52% of the total cultivating households.

TABLE NO.3.8:-

This table gives the information regarding agricultural wage rates of the three selected Centres viz. Bidkin, Ajantha & Mahalgaon villages in the district during the years 1965 & 1966. The average wage rate of carpenters at Bidkin and Ajantha centres showed an increase while the same has decreased in Mahalgaon Centre in 1966 as against 1965. The average wage rate of blacksmith remained constant at Rs. 3=50 at Bidkin centre during the year 1965 and 1966. The wage rates of the field labourers showed an increase at Bidkin centre during 1966 as against 1965.

TABLE NO.3.9 :-

This table indicates the agricultural implements in each taluka of the district in 1966. Iron ploughs formed 83.45% of the total ploughs in the district in 1966. Electric pumps formed 4.22% of the total number of pumps used for irrigation. The total number of Tractors in the district was 131 in 1966 of which the highest number of 26 was in Gangapur taluka.

TABLE NO.3.10:-

This table deals with data regarding famine and scarcity conditions and relief works undertaken in Aurangabad District during the year 1965-66. The total number of villages affected by famine and chronic scarcity in the district during 1965-66, numbered 1337 covering a population of 9,03,243. The largest number of villages affected were found in Paithan taluka. During the same year, full suspension of land revenue was granted to 958 villeges in the district. The estimated loss on account of failure of crops in the district during 1965-66 amounted^{to} about Rs. 87 lakhs.



4. LIVESTOCK.

TABLE NO.4.1.

This table indicates the talukawise figures of livestock in the district as per 1966 Census. It is observed that the cultivable area per pair of bullock works out to 7.16 hectares. The poultry per 1000 population as per 1966 Census comes to 131.

TABLE NO.4.2.

This table deals with veterinary statistics in the district during 1961-62 and 1965-66. One dispensary and 4 Aid centres were newly established in between the period of 1961-62 to 1965-66, effecting an increase of 8 doctors and 4 Stock-men. As much as 81.74% increase is observed in animals treated during the above period.

TABLE NO.4.3.

This table gives the diseasewise livestock mortality and out-break of important epidemics and attacks due to these epidemics in the district during the years 1961-62 and 1965-66. It is observed that in the year 1961-62 cattle were more affected by diseases of foot and mouth, while no noteworthy out break of diseases among Bovine population had taken place during the year 1965-66. There was a decrease in number of deaths in both cattle and bovine population and sheep and Goats during the year 1965-66.

TABLE NO.4.4.

This table furnishes the total number of slaughter houses and animals slaughtered in the district during 1961-62 and 1965-66. The total number of slaughter houses in the district during 1965-66 increased to 6 as against 4 during 1961-62. The number of animals slaughtered in Slaughter Houses increased by 26.49% in 1965-66 over that in 1961-62.

TABLE NO.4.5.

This table indicates the forest area in this district. The total forest area during the year 1965-66 has increased by 3889 hectares thereby registering about 1.34% increase as compared to the forest area in the year 1961-62.

According to administrative convenience four different ranges have been formed. The Kannad^{and} Ajantha forest ranges formed about 60% of the total/area under forest excluding Revenue forest.

TABLE NO.4.6.

This table indicates major and minor forest products in the district during the years 1961-62 and 1965-66. The value of the timber produced during 1965-66 increased by 6.78% as against 1961-62. The total value of forest products also increased by 0.83%.

5. EMPLOYMENT, INDUSTRY, MINING & ELECTRICITY.

TABLE NO.5.1

This table gives the information regarding employment in factories in the district during the year 1964. The average daily number of workers employed in Cotton, Ginning and Baling factories formed 37.99% of the total number of workers employed in the district during 1964. Next in importance is the Tobacco manufacturing industry which engaged 13.29% of the average daily number of workers employed.

TABLE NO.5.2.

This table indicates the distribution of factories according to categories of Industries and the number of workers. Majority of factories in the district come under the category of factories employing labourers ranging between 20 to 99. The Aurangabad mills in Aurangabad town employed labourers between 500 to 999. This factory alone employed daily average of 1680 workers in 1963 and 750 in 1964.

TABLE NO.5.3.

This table indicates the distribution^{of} factories according to categories of days worked in Aurangabad district for the year 1963-64. The factories which worked more than 6 months are those engaged in Spinning, Weaving and Finishing of Cotton Textile, Rice Mills, Flour Mills, Sugar factories, Tobacco, Stone dressing and crushing etc. The rest of them mostly compressing Cotton, Ginning & baling are purely seasonal in nature.

TABLE NO.5.4.

This table deals with Statistics relating to Handloom & powerloom industry in the district, for the years 1964-65 & 1965-66. There were 180 hand operated and 92 power operated looms in the district during the year 1965-66, as against 180 and 96 hand operated and power operated looms during 1964-65. It is worth noticing that all the power operated looms were located in Aurangabad taluka in Aurangabad town itself. The largest number of hand operated looms i.e. 87 was located in Jalna taluka for both the years, followed by Gangapur, having 74 looms for both the years.

The production of power looms for the year 1965-66 increased to the extent of 0.79% as against the production in 1964-65 although the number of looms decreased by 4 in 1965-66 as compared to the previous year. While the production of handloom in 1965-66 increased in Aurangabad taluka, the same decreased in Gangapur taluka. There was no production in Jalna and Ambad talukas for both the years under review, as the hand looms did not operate.

The average daily employment in power looms decreased by 3.78% in 1965-66 as against the previous year. This is consistent with the decrease in the number of power operated looms in 1965-66. While the average daily employment in hand looms in Aurangabad taluka remained constant for the years 1964-65 & 1965-66, the average daily employment in Gangapur taluka decreased by 25% in 1965-66 as against the previous year.

TABLE NO.5.5.

This table gives the Employment exchange Statistics in the district for the years 1961-62 and 1965-66. The number of registrations during 1965-66 recorded an increase of 44.09% over that of 1961-62. The number on Live Register at the end of 1965-66 showed an increase of 89.93% as against 1961-62. The number of candidates placed in employment recorded an increase of 25.71% in 1965-66 over 1961-62.

TABLE NO.5.6.

This table deals with the occupational distribution of total registration & placement in Employment Exchange in the district during the period from 1963-64 to 1965-66. The registration and placement under the group of clerical and related workers formed 31.60% and 53.89% of the total registration and placement respectively in the district in 1965-66 as compared to 30.50% and 59.97% in 1963-64.

TABLE NO.5.7.

This table indicates the changes in the volume of reported employment in different industries during 1965 & 1966. The number of reported employees under the group services during 1966 formed 61.77% of the total number of reported employees under different industries as compared to 65.15% during 1965.

TABLE NO.5.8.

This table gives information regarding industries in the district according to 1961 Census. The sugar factories and refineries and the spinning and weaving factories constituted 20.49% and 9.02% respectively of the total number of industries in the district, the value of their respective gross output being 20.97% and 20.57% of the total value of goods produced in all the industries in the district according to 1961 Census.

TABLE NO.5.9.

This table gives the information about generation and consumption of electricity in the district during 1964-65 and 1965-66. The electricity generated during 1964-65 was 4428 thousand K.W. and the electricity purchased during 1965-66 was 106118 thousand K.W.. The total consumption during 1965-66 increased by 41.15% as compared to 1964-65.

TABLE NO.5.10.

This table gives the number of towns and villages electrified and population covered in the district. The number of towns and villages electrified by 31-3-1966 were 10 & 172 respectively as against 6 & 4 by 31-3-1961. The total population covered by the towns and villages electrified by 31-3-1966 also showed an increase of 111.49% over 31-3-1961.

6.CO-OPERATION.

TABLE NO.6.1.

This table deals with the number of different types of co-operative societies working in the district during 1965-66. Out of 1616 co-operative societies, 1286 were credit societies and 330 were non-credit societies during 1965-66. Out of 1286 credit societies, 1256 were agricultural credit societies and only 30 were non-agricultural credit societies. Out of 330 non-credit societies, 99 were non-agricultural ^{non-}credit societies and 241 non-agricultural non-credit societies.

TABLE NO.6.2.

This table gives statistics relating to co-operative banks in the district during 1961-62 & 1965-66. The share capital of the District Central Co-operative Bank during 1965-66 increased by 163.48% over that during the year 1961-62. The short-term loans advanced during 1965-66 by the Central Co-operative Bank increased by 192.88% over that during 1961-62. The share capital of the District Development Bank with taluka Branches in 1965-66 also registered a tremendous increase of 1948.89% over that of 1961-62. No District Industrial Co-operative Bank was organised and registered in the district by the end of 1965-66.

TABLE NO.6.3.

This table gives the information regarding Primary Agricultural Credit societies in each taluka of the district during 1961-62 and 1965-66. The individual membership of the primary agricultural credit societies in the district during 1965-66 increased by 70.54% over 1961-62, the percentage increase of share capital being 179.35%. The loans advanced by these societies during 1965-66 showed an increase ^{of} 237.1% over 1961-62. The percentage of recovery during 1965-66 was 78.2 as against 73.5 during 1961-62. The highest number of societies during 1965-66 were found in Ambad taluka followed by Vaijapur and Jalna talukas, the least number of societies being in Soegaon taluka.

TABLE NO.6.4.

This table deals with other Co-operative Societies of different types in the district during 1961-62, 1964-65 & 1965-66. Among the agricultural non-credit societies the agricultural marketing societies during 1965-66 numbered 14 with a share capital of Rs. 21.58/^{Lakhs}. Among the Non-agricultural credit societies, the number of Salary earners Societies increased from 24 in 1961-62 to 29 in 1965-66 with the percentage increase of 116.82% in their share capital. Among the non-agricultural non-credit societies, the number ^{of} Handloom weavers societies decreased from 17 in 1961-62 to 8 in 1965-66. The number of other industrial societies increased from 56 in 1964-65 to 64 in 1965-66, the percentage increase of share capital being 58.94%.

TABLE NO.6.5.

This table deals with operations of primary Co-operative marketing societies in the district. There was one Co-operative Marketing Society at district level and 13 societies at primary level in the talukas during 1965-66. The total value of sale of agricultural produce of primary ^{societies} during 1965-66 has increased by 100.04% over that in 1961-62. The highest sale of agricultural produce both in 1961-62 and 1965-66 was in Sasegaon taluka.

TABLE NO.6.6.

This table indicates the operations of other co-operative societies of different types in the district during 1961-62 and 1965-66. The value of agricultural produce marketed by Agricultural Marketing Societies during 1965-66 increased by 291.12% over that in 1961-62. The value of milk and milk products purchased and sold by societies during 1965-66 showed a considerable increase of 1602.48% and 1473.69% respectively. The value of purchase and sale by the consumers stores during 1965-66 recorded an increase ^{of} 799.79% and 804.92% respectively over 1961-62.

TABLE NO.6.7.

This table gives the number of registered money lenders and loans advanced by them in the district during 1961-62 and 1965-66. The number of money lenders in the district decreased from 237 in 1961-62 to 173 in 1965-66. The loans advanced by the money lenders also decreased by 38.49% in 1965-66 as against 1961-62. The highest number of money lenders were found in Jalna taluka both during 1961-62 and 1965-66.

7. MEDICAL & PUBLIC HEALTH.

TABLE NO.7.1

This table indicates the number of persons engaged in medical and public Health services in Aurangabad district according to 1961 census. The percentage of female Surgeon Physicians to their total number was very ^{meagre} being only 4.13%. The number of medical personnel per / : population in the district was 33 as against 55 for Maharashtra.

TABLE NO.7.2.

This table indicates data of medical facilities available in the district. The figures relate to facilities provided by Govt. and other aided institutions. The number of private hospitals, dispensaries and practitioners is not shown in this table. The number of hospitals is shown as decreased by one in 1965 as civil hospital, Aurangabad has been merged in medical college hospital, Aurangabad. The number of dispensaries remained unchanged during 1961 and 1965. Number of Health centres remained at two during both the years, one at Aurangabad as T.B. Clinic and another at Jalna. The number of primary health centres increased by 142.86% during the year 1965 as compared to the year 1961. The number of Vaidyas remained constant at 15 during both years under review. There is an increase by 51.75% in the number of beds during 1965 as compared to 1964. The number of out-door patients treated decreased by 37.55% during the year 1965 as compared to the year 1961.



TABLE NO.7.3.

This table gives disease-wise classification of number of in-door and out-door patients treated in the years 1961 and 1965. Dysentery, diarrhoea, tuberculosis of lung, diseases of the circulatory system, diseases of blood and spleen, disease due to deficiency or disorder of nutrition or metabolism, diseases of urinal organs excluding tumoury, injuries general and local, diseases of the respiratory system other than pneumonia and tuberculosis, diseases of digestive system excluding diarrhoea dysentery and tumours etc. were the main ailments for which out-door and in-door patients treated. The in-door patients and out-door patients treated showed decrease and increase by 2.73% and 206.39% respectively in the year 1965 over the year 1961.

TABLE NO.7.4.

This table indicates the birth and deaths registered in Aurangabad district during the years 1961 and 1965. The number relating to infant mortality is also shown in this table. There has been decrease in the number of births, deaths and infant deaths registered has also decreased by 33.29 over the year 1961. The percentage decrease in births registered was 25.08 and number of deaths registered has also decreased by 33.29 over the year 1961. The decrease in the percentage of infant deaths was about 39.07 during 1965 as compared to the year 1961 in Aurangabad District.

TABLE NO.7.5.

This table indicates the data regarding number of deaths in Aurangabad district due to important causes since 1961 to 1965. The number of deaths due to cholera showed a decrease except in the years 1963 and 1964 and reached to the minimum number of 3 deaths during 1965. The number of deaths due to small pox showed an increase during the year 1965 as compared to the year 1961 but the same has been decreased during 1965 as compared to the year 1963 and stood at 85 deaths in the year 1965. The death due to plague is nil through out all the years from 1961 to 1965 as this disease has been fully controlled. The number of deaths by diseases such as fever, ^{dysentery}, diarrhoea, periparatory and other different causes has also showed a decrease during the year 1965 as compared to the year 1961. The total number of deaths during the year 1965 decreased by 33.29% as compared to the year 1961.

TABLE NO.7.6.

This table gives vaccination cholera inoculation statistics in the district during the year 1964 and 1965. The number of primary vaccination below one year and above one year increased by 21.06% and 45.81% respectively in 1965 over 1964. The number of cholera inoculations decreased by 73.88% in 1965 over 1964.

TABLE NO.7.7.

This table indicates the statistics on B.C.G. vaccination in Aurangabad district during the year 1964 and 1965. A good number of cases were tested and vaccinated during 1964 and 1965. The negative cases came down to 26 during 1965 as compared to the negative cases existed about 8642 in 1964. The total positive cases during the year 1965 were about 49.72% of the total cases tested and the total absent cases were about 50.22% during the year 1965.

TABLE NO.7.8.

This table indicates the hygienic drinking water supply source available in rural areas of Aurangabad district. Out of the total number of 1879 villages and 141 hamlets 17.83% of total villages and 66.74% of total hamlets were without any drinking water supply source and 27.10% of total villages/21.27% of total hamlets had inadequate water supply in the district.

8. EDUCATION.

TABLE NO.8.1.

This table denotes the number of literates and percentage of literacy in each taluka of the district according to 1961 census. The percentage of literacy in the district was 17.88% which ranked the district as 21st among the 26 districts of Maharashtra. The percentage of literacy in rural and urban areas of the district was 14.27% and 39.76% respectively. In respect of literacy in rural areas, Soegaon taluka took a lead, the percentage of literacy being 18.36% while the percentage of literacy in Bhokardan taluka being the least i.e. 12.38%. Taking into consideration the urban areas in the district the literacy percentage of 46.32% was highest in Aurangabad taluka while the literacy percentage of 27.00% was the lowest in Ambad taluka.

TABLE NO.8.2.

This table indicates the position of education in rural areas in each taluka of the district according to 1961 census. In all, 95.72% of the rural population of the district was illiterate. Amongst the literates in rural areas 12.03% were literates without any educational standard.

The percentage of rural population having education . upto Matriculation and above was 0.28 .This indicates that the rural population in the district is backward in education.

TABLE NO.8.3.

This table presents the distribution of urban population according to educational standard in 1961 census. It is observed that 60.24% of the urban population was illiterate.The percentage of literates without any educational standard was 15.91%.Persons having educational standard upto primary and Matriculation formed 17.36% and 4.34% respectively of the total urban population.The technical and non-technical diploma holders formed 00.17% where as graduates and post-graduates other than technical formed 00.63% of the total urban population.Technical graduates and post graduates formed 0.35% of the urban population.

TABLE NO.8.4.

This table gives the number of institutions,pupils and teachers in the district during the years 1961-62 and 1965-66.The number of primary schools rose from 1313 in 1961-62 to 1878 in 1965-66.The total number of pupils in primary schools increased by 47.13% in 1965-66 as against 1961-62.The percentage of increase in respect of primary teachers was 59.65 during the same period.The number of institutions under secondary education increased by 68.42% during 1965-66 over 1961-62.The increase of pupils in secondary schools was 97.07% in 1965-66 over 1961-62.

TABLE NO.8.5.

This table gives the statistics relating to benefits and concessions given to students of backward classes in the district during 1965-66. The percentages of Schedule Castes, Schedule Tribes and other backward classes in the total enrolment of 1965 were 36.76%, 8.13% and 55.11% respectively. The percentage of grants to students of Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribes and other backward classes formed 68.23%, 1.18% and 30.59% respectively to the total concessions granted.

TABLE NO.8.6.

This table gives the information regarding the concessions of free education to economically backward classes in the district during the years 1961-62, 1964-65 and 1965-66. The total number of beneficiaries in 1965-66 increased by 31.50% over 1964-65. The total concessions granted during 1965-66 increased by 10.85% over 1964-65.

TABLE NO.8.7.

This table gives the expenditure on primary education by way of grant-in-aids to local bodies in the district during 1964-65 & 1965-66. It is observed that Zilla Parishad is the only recipient of grant-in-aid. The total grant-in-aid, 1965-66 increased by 1108.13% over 1964-65.

TABLE NO.8.8.

This table presents the classification of towns and villages without primary schools or schooling facilities by population range in the district during 1961 and 1966. The total number of towns and villages with schools in the district during 1966 increased by 37.85% over 1961. The total number of towns and villages without schools decreased to 192 in 1966 from 658 in 1961.

9. TRANSPORT & COMMUNICATIONS.

TABLE NO. 9.1.

This table indicates the length of railway route in Aurangabad district as on 31-3-1964 and 31-3-1965. The approximate average railway length per 100 sq. kms. works out to 6.2 and average railway line per lakh of population works out to 1.004% k.m.

TABLE NO. 9.2 (A).

This table gives the road length excluding municipal roads according to category and surface of the roads in the district as on 31-3-1961 and 31-3-1966. The total road length in the district as on 31-3-1966 has increased by 25.75% as against 31-3-1961. The average road length as on 31-3-1966 works out to 7.3 per 100 sq. kms. The surface under black topped as on 31-3-1966 increased by 84.64% over that on 31-3-1961. The surface under cement concrete remained the same during the above period.

TABLE NO. 9.2 (B).

This table indicates the length of municipal roads surface-wise in the district as on 31-3-1961 and 31-3-1966. The total length of roads under municipalities in the district as on 31-3-1966 increased by 21.37% over that on 31-3-1961. The highest road length was found in Aurangabad municipality followed by Jalna municipality. The least road length was in Gangapur and Khuldabad municipalities. The surface of municipal roads in the district under different classifications, such as cement concrete, black topped and water bound macadam as on 31-3-1966 increased by 10.91%, 270.34% and 20.48% respectively over the surface on 31-3-1961.

TABLE NO. 9.3.

This table deals with the information regarding Motor vehicles in operation in Aurangabad region as on 31-3-1961 and 31-3-1966. The total number of vehicles under different categories in operation as on 31-3-1966 increased by 41.12% over that on 31-3-1961.

TABLE NO.9.4.

This table gives the operational statistics of Nationalised Road Transport in Aurangabad Division as on 31-3-1961 and ³¹⁻³1966. The route distance in the Division as on 31-3-1966 increased by 252.72% over the same on ^{on}31-3-1961. The average service distance per day in the Division as/31-3-1966 increased by 417.54% as against the average service distance per day on 31-3-1961. The average daily earnings also increased by 239.49% during the same period.

TABLE NO.9.5.

This table deals with traffic census on important state highways, major district roads and other district roads in the district conducted in May, 1965. The traffic census was conducted at 27 count posts on state highways and at 14 ^{count} posts on major district roads and other district roads. The total traffic intensity per 24 hours was found highest at Aurangabad count post, the lowest being at Paithan count post on the state highways in the district.

TABLE NO.9.6.

This table deals with Postal, Telegraph and Telephone statistics in the district during 1961-62, 1964-65 and 1965-66. The number of post offices and letter boxes has increased in 1965-66 by 11.46% and 26.09% respectively over that ⁱⁿ1961-62. The number of telegraph offices and Telephones increased by 54.54% and 77.94% respectively in 1965-66 over 1961-62.

TABLE NO.9.7.

This table gives the position of the availability of postal facilities in Aurangabad district as on 31-3-1966. Out of 1879 inhabited villages in the district 312 villages had post offices located with in the villages them selves, the percentage of these villages to total number of villages works out to 16.60. The number of villages served with postal facilities within a distance of 3 kilometres was 216, being 11.50% of the total villages. The number of villages served with postal facilities within a distance of 3 to 6 kilometres was 891, that is 47.42% of the total villages. The number of villages having postal facilities at a distance beyond 6 kilometres was 460, that is 24.48% of the total villages.

The number of villages where post offices were located within the villages was highest in Ambad taluka, that is 39, followed by Jalna, Kannad and Aurangabad talukas having 34, 33 and 32 villages respectively. The least number of villages where post offices were located within the villages were in Jaffarabad and Soegaon talukas that is 8 and 9 respectively.

The highest number of villages where postal facilities were available within a distance of 3 kilometres was in Gangapur taluka that is 11, the least number being in Soegaon taluka, that is 6 only.

The number of villages served with postal facilities within a distance of 3 to 6 kilometres was highest in Paithan taluka, that is 98, the least number of villages in this category being in Soegaon taluka having only 25 villages.

The number of villages having postal facilities at a distance beyond 6 kilometres was highest in Ambad taluka with 72 villages under this category, the least number of villages being 15 in Khuldabad taluka.

The total number of villages served with postal facilities under all the categories mentioned above was highest in Ambad taluka having 215 villages followed by Jalna and Gangapur having 210 and 204 villages respectively.

The least number of villages having postal facilities under all the categories was in Soegaon taluka having only 57 villages. The number of villages having postal facilities was only 72 in Khuldabad taluka.

TABLE NO. 9.8.

This table denotes the rural broadcasting statistics in the district as on 31-3-1965 and ³¹⁻³1966. The total number of villages in the district in which a receiving set was installed by the Rural Broadcasting Department by 31-3-1966 was 405 as compared to 251 by 31-3-1965. The highest number of villages where receiving sets were installed by 31-3-1966 was observed in Aurangabad taluka, followed by Jalna, Vaijapur, Gangapur and Paithan talukas. The rural population of villages having receiving sets in the whole district by 31-3-1966 has increased by 47.21% as compared to the previous year.

The rural population of villages having receiving sets by 31-3-1966 has been highest in Jalna taluka, followed by Paithan, Vaijapur, Ambad, Gangapur and Aurangabad talukas. The rural population of villages having receiving sets by 31-3-1965 was highest in Paithan taluka followed by Ambad, Jalna, Gangapur and Aurangabad. Of all the talukas in the district the rural population of the villages having receiving sets by 31-3-1966 and by 31-3-1965 was considerably less in Solgaon, Kannad and Bilload talukas. The total number of Kano Panch Forams in the district by 31-3-1966 was 46, the figure for the previous year being the same.

#### 10. LOCAL BODIES.

##### TABLE NO. 10.1.

This table deals with the Income and Expenditure of local bodies in the district during 1961-62 and 1965-66. The total income of the Village Panchayats in Aurangabad district during 1965-66 increased by 132.24% over the income in 1961-62. The expenditure of the village Panchayats increased simultaneously by 195.16% during the same period. The income and expenditure by the Municipalities and Cantonment board in the district increased in 1965-66 by 159.63% and 158.24% respectively over 1961-62.

##### TABLE NO. 10.2.

This table indicates the Panchayat Samitiwise Income and Expenditure of Village Panchayats in the district during the years 1961-62 and 1964-65. The total income of the Panchayat Samities in the district during 1964-65 increased by 94.29% over the income in 1961-62. While the highest total income was in Panchayat Samiti, Bilload, the lowest was in the Panchayat Samiti, Khuldabad. The total expenditure of the Panchayat Samities in the district during 1964-65 also increased by 150.19% over the expenditure of 1961-62. The highest total expenditure was incurred by the Panchayat Samiti, Bilload and the lowest expenditure was incurred by Panchayat Samiti, Khuldabad.

TABLE NO.10.3 (A).

This table gives the headwise receipts of the Zilla Parishad, Aurangabad district during 1964-65 and 1965-66. The total self-raised resources of the Zilla Parishad increased by 38.32% in 1965-66 over the same in 1964-65. The total revenue receipts including Government grants increased by 28.74% in 1965-66 over the receipts in 1964-65.

TABLE NO.10.3 (B).

This table presents the headwise expenditure of the Zilla Parishad during 1964-65 and 1965-66. The total revenue expenditure of the Zilla Parishad increased by 19.58% in 1965-66 over the expenditure in 1964-65. The expenditure under education in 1965-66 was 38.89% of the total expenditure which constituted the highest percentage followed by the expenditure on Buildings and Communications which formed 16.35% of the total expenditure.

TABLE NO.10.4.

This table deals with the Income and Expenditure of municipalities in the district during 1961-62 and 1965-66. The total income of all the municipalities in the district in 1965-66 increased by 192.65% over the income in 1961-62. The highest income in 1965-66 was by Aurangabad Municipality, followed by Jalna Municipality, constituting 47.42% and 34.39% of the total income of the municipalities. The total expenditure incurred by all the municipalities in the district during 1965-66 also increased by 193.52% over the expenditure in 1961-62. The expenditure incurred by Aurangabad and Jalna municipalities during 1965-66 constituted 49.99% and 29.57% respectively of the total expenditure.

TABLE NO.11.1.

This table indicates the expenditure in the Third Five Year Plan on District level schemes in the district from 1961-62 to 1965-66. The distribution of Third Plan Expenditure on the major heads of development in the district during 1961-62 to 1965-66 on district level schemes was as under :-

The above figures indicate that the expenditure under Agricultural Programme constituted 48.32% which is the highest percentage of expenditure incurred on district level schemes in the Third Five Year Plan whereas the expenditure under the head Industry and Mining formed the lowest percentage of expenditure. No expenditure was incurred on information and publicity during the Third Plan period.

TABLE NO.11.2.

This table gives the important physical achievements in the Third Five Year Plan period in Aurangabad district. Under the programme of agricultural development an Agricultural School was established during the plan period and about 1005 iron ploughs were distributed. The area brought under improved Cotton variety, improved Sugarcane and improved Oil Seeds was 1.04, 0.24, 0.05 lakhs of acres respectively during the Plan period, from 1961-62 to 1965-66.

Under the sub-head Land Development, 2.23 Lakhs of acres of land was brought under consolidation in 142 villages in the district. About 2.70 Lakhs acres of land was bunded during the Third Plan period in the district. Under sub-head minor irrigation 8,173 irrigation wells were constructed and 4,836 pumpsets were installed. Under the sub-head Animal Husbandry, one building for veterinary dispensary was constructed & six breeding Centres were started. Under dairy development 2,000 litres of milk were handled per day and 12 societies of breeders were organised during the Third Plan period. Under the sub-head forest, sandal wood plantation was effected over 1000 acres and afforestation for Soil Conservation was done over 5000 acres. Under sub-head fisheries, stocking of carp fry and netting of fish was done to the extent of 33.78 and 0.44 lakhs respectively during the Third Plan period. Under the sub-head co-operation, long term, short term and medium term loans were advanced to the societies to the extent of Rs. 709.51, 1295.07 and 18.99 lakhs respectively during the Plan period. The whole of Aurangabad district was brought under C.D. Programme during Third-Five Year Plan. Under the sub-head general education 2,310 teachers for primary schools were appointed and 3,123 primary teachers were trained. Under the sub-head Public Health, 2 Primary health centres were opened. Twenty villages were covered by housing project scheme.

TABLE NO. 11.3.

This table indicates the C.D. Programme in the district as on 31-3-1966. In all, there were 20.50 number of blocks of C.P. pattern covering an area of 16447.8 sq. kms. with population of 13.15 lakhs spread over 1879 inhabited villages in the district.

TABLE NO. 11.4.

This table indicates the expenditure incurred in different stages of blocks in the district, as on 31-3-1966. The expenditure of Stage-I/N.E.S. and C.D. Blocks in Aurangabad district increased from Rs. 182 Lakhs to Rs. 206 Lakhs, from 31-3-1965 to 31-3-1966, the percentage of increase being 13.13. The increase in expenditure was highest in Jalna block followed by Aurangabad, Gangapur, Paithan, Kenned Part-II and Ambad P-II.

The expenditure of stage-II blocks in Aurangabad district increased from Rs. 18.6 Lakhs to Rs. 25.6 Lakhs from 31-3-1965 to 31-3-1966, the percentage of increase being 37.67. The increase in expenditure was highest in Soegaon block followed by Ambad P-I, Bhokardan P-I, Jafferabad, Khuldabad, Ambad P-II, Bhokardan P-II, Sillod P-II and Vaijapur P-II blocks.

The expenditure of Post stage-II blocks in Aurangabad district increased from Rs. 2.37 Lakhs to Rs. 5.61 Lakhs from 31-3-1965 to 31-3-1966, the percentage of increase being 136.71. The increase in expenditure was highest in Sillod P-I followed by Vaijapur P-I and Kannad P-I blocks.

Of all the blocks in the district, comprising stage-I/ N.S.S. and C.D., Stage-II and Post Stage-II, the highest expenditure was found in Jalna block followed by Kannad P-I, Ambad P-II, Vaijapur P-I, Paithan and Aurangabad blocks. The least expenditure was found in Sillod P-II and Vaijapur P-II.

TABLE NO. 11.5.

This table gives the physical achievements on selected items in all the blocks of Aurangabad district during the year 1964-65 and 1965-66. The distribution of fertilizers in 1965-66 decreased by 38.43% over 1964-65. The quantity of improved seeds distributed showed an increase by 36.32% in 1965-66 over 1964-65. The number of improved agricultural implements supplied to the cultivators indicated an increase by 67.78% during 1965-66 as against 1964-65. The number of predegree animals supplied decreased by 58.79% in 1965-66 as compared to 1964-65. The number of improved birds supplied showed an increase of 15.57% in 1965-66 as compared to 1964-65. Under family planning programme the number of persons under gone operations showed a decrease of 53.56% in 1965-66 as against 1964-65.

12. PRICES

TABLE NO.12.1.

This table indicates the average retail prices of important commodities at district headquarter, in Aurangabad district during 1964 and 1965. The average retail price of Wheat (Med.) for the year 1965 was Rs. 1.32 as compared to Rs. 1.08 during 1964. The average retail price of Wheat (Coarse) Potia increased from Rs. 0.91 in 1964 to Rs. 1.22 in 1965. The average retail price of Bajra (local) also increased from Rs. 0.63 in 1964 to Rs. 1.01 in 1965. The average retail price of Gram (Whole) increased from Rs. 0.82 in 1964 to Rs. 1.36 in 1965. The average retail price of Gur decreased from Rs. 1.11 in 1964 to Rs. 0.83 in 1965. The average retail price of Groundnut Oil increased from Rs. 2.46 in 1964 to Rs. 2.90 in 1965. The average retail price of Vanaspati also showed an increase from Rs. 3.58 in 1964 to Rs. 4.20 in 1965. The average retail price of Goat-meat increased from Rs. 3.00 in 1964 to Rs. 3.38 in 1965. The average retail prices under clothing and miscellenous items of consumption also recorded an increase in 1965 as compared to 1964.

TABLE NO.12.2.

This table deals with the operations of regulated markets in the district during 1961-62 and 1965-66. In all, there were 6 regulated markets in the district. The main commodities generally sold in these markets were Wheat, Jowar, Gram, Moong, Tur, Cotton, Groundnut, Sesamum and Safflower etc. The turnover of all commodities in all the 6 markets in the district showed a decrease of 46.35% in 1965-66, over 1961-62, the percentage of decrease in value of turnover of all the commodities during the same period, being 10.67.

TABLE NO.12.3.

This table presents the consumer price Index numbers for working class in Aurangabad district for 1949, 1951, 1956 and 1960 to 1965 with the base year from August, 1943 to July, 1944. The average consumer price Index rose to 188 in 1949 and further increased to 205 in 1951. The price Index declined to 182 in 1956 and showed continuous increase from 1960 onwards. The consumer price Index rose from 298 in December, 1964 to 316 in December, 1965.

13. MISCELLANEOUS.

TABLE NO.13.1.

This table gives the strength of police force and Crime statistics in Aurangabad district during 1961 and 1965. While the number of cognizable crimes reported increased by 11.03% in 1965 over 1961, the number of non-cognizable crimes decreased by 5.63% during the same period.

TABLE NO.13.2.

This table gives the cases disposed in Civil and Criminal courts in Aurangabad district during 1961 and 1965. While the original cases under Civil courts increased by 11.13% in 1965 over 1961, the appellate cases decreased by 24.78%. On the criminal side, the original cases increased by 42.46% in 1965 over 1961, the appellate cases decreased by 23.18% during the same period.

TABLE NO.13.3.

This table gives Cinema Statistics in Aurangabad district in 1964 and 1965. The number of permanent talkies in the district were 16 during the years 1964 and 1965. The average number of seats per theatre in the year 1964 and 1965 was 725 and 708 respectively.

TABLE NO.13.4.

This table gives the number of banking offices in Aurangabad district as on 31-3-1966. The bank offices were located in 29 towns and villages in the district covering a population of 2.62 lakhs.

TABLE NO.13.5.

This table indicates the number of Joint Stock Companies in Aurangabad district during 1961-62 and 1964-65. The total number of joint stock companies decreased from 14 in 1961-62 to 12 in 1964-65.

TABLE NO.13.6.

This table furnishes the information on number of insurance policies issued and amount insured in Aurangabad district during 1964-65 and 1965-66. The number of insurance policies issued increased by 3.71% in 1965-66 over 1964-65. The amount insured also increased by 15.87% during the same period.

TABLE NO.13.7.

This table gives an account of the collection of Small Savings in Aurangabad District during 1964-65 and 1965-66. The gross collection increased by 76.56% in 1965-66 over 1964-65.

TABLE NO.13.8.

This table furnishes the information regarding the land revenue collection in the district for the years 1961-62 and 1965-66. The land revenue collection in the district for the year 1965-66 was only 76.230% of the total demand. This is far less than the collection made during 1961-62 which was cent-percent of the demand. Of all the talukas in the district the collection of land revenue in Ambad, Sillod and Bhokardan talukas during 1965-66 was only 56.73, 1.40 and 47.33 percent respectively of the demand as against the collection for the year 1961-62 which was cent percent of the demand. In case of Sillod the amount was suspended due to scarcity. The collection of land revenue in respect of Aurangabad, Vaijapur and Gangapure has been cent percent of the demand both for 1961-62 and 1965-66. The collection of land revenue for the remaining talukas i.e. Kannad, Soegaon, Jafferabad, Khuldabad, Jalna and Paithan falls short of the demand for 1965-66 although the collection in 1961-62 was cent percent.

TABLE NO.13.9.

This table gives the number of documents registered and Income and Expenditure therefrom and value of property transferred in each taluka of the district during 1964 and 1965. The number of documents registered decreased by 64.26% during the year 1965 over the year 1964. The value of property transferred also decreased by 37.63% in 1965 over 1964. The net income from registration increased by 150.64% in 1965 over the income in 1964.

TABLE NO.13.10.

This table furnishes the statistics relating to general election held in 1962 in the district. The percentages of votes polled to total electorates for Aurangabad and Jalna parliamentary constituencies was 51.00 and 40.00 respectively. The percentage of votes polled for Aurangabad Assembly constituency was 55.91, which was the highest among all the Assembly constituencies in the district followed by Gangapur constituency the percentage being 53.33.



TABLE NO.14.

This table gives the trends in selected Indicators of development in the district. The total gross cropped area in Aurangabad district in 1964-65 increased by 1.13% as compared to the gross cropped area in 1961-62. The percentage increase during 1962-63 and 1963-64 was still more i.e. 5.61 and 6.29 as against the area in 1961-62. The net cropped area in the district for 1964-65 decreased by 0.60% as against the net cropped area for 1961-62. However, the net cropped area for 1962-63 and 1963-64 had shown an increasing trend by 0.51% and 0.92% respectively as compared to the area in 1961-62.

The net area sown per agricultural worker for the year 1964-65 was 1.92 hectares as against 1.94 hectares for 1961-62. The figures for 1962-63 and 1963-64 being 1.95 hectares.

The percentage of area sown more than once to net area sown for 1964-65 was 6.87 as against 5.04 for 1961-62, the percentages for the year 1962-63 and 1963-64 being 10.39 and 10.63 respectively. The percentage of net irrigated area to net area sown for 1964-65 was 5.09 as against 3.83 for 1961-62, the percentages for the same for the years 1962-63 and 1963-64 being 4.84 and 5.32 respectively. The percentage of gross irrigated area to gross cropped area for 1964-65 was 5.39 as against 4.50 for 1961-62, the percentages for 1962-63 and 1963-64 being 5.08 and 5.40 respectively.

The total livestock in the district decreased by 5.59% in 1965-66 as compared to that in 1961-62. The net cropped area per pair of bullocks (male cattle over 3 years) was 5.88 hectares in 1965-66 as against 5.86 hectares in 1961-62.

The number of workers employed in registered factories per lakh of population in the district for 1965-66 was 386 as against 411 in 1961-62.

The number of villages electrified in the district rose from 15 in 1961-62 to 172 in 1965-66. The percentage of villages electrified to total number of villages in the district also rose from 0.46 in 1961-62 to 8.70 in 1965-66.

The number of Agricultural Credit Societies in the district increased from 1108ⁱⁿ 1961-62 to 1256 in 1965-66. The number of non-agricultural societies rose from 54 to 271 during the same period. The membership of Agricultural Credit Societies showed an increase of 141.83% in 1965-66 over the membership in 1961-62. The percentage^{of} increase in the membership of non-agricultural societies in the district was 301.20 during the same period. The working capital of Agricultural Credit Societies in the district rose by 1196.47% in 1965-66 over that in 1961-62. The percentage increase of the working capital of non-agricultural societies in the district was 424.31 in 1965-66 over that 1961-62. The loans advanced by Agricultural Credit Societies in the district for the year 1965-66 increased by 976943% over that in 1961-62. The loans advanced by non-agricultural societies decreased in 1965-66 by 46.56% as against the loans advanced in 1961-62.

The number of students in Primary and Secondary institutions increased from 1961-62 to 1965-66 by 47.41% and 97.07% respectively. The number of students in the higher institutions in 1965-66 increased by 5.00 percent as against 1961-62. The percentage of primary school going children to total population in the district rose from 6.77 in 1961-62 to 9.97 in 1965-66.

The number of beds per lakh of population increased from 37 in 1961-62 to 40 in 1965-66. While the number of out-door patients treated decreased by 48.39% in 1965-66 as against 1961-62, the number of in-door patients increased by 15.72% during the same period. The birth rate increased from 18.3 per thousand of population in 1961-62 to 29.0 in 1965-66 in the district.

The death rate also increased from 7.0 per thousand of population in 1961-62 to 11.7 in 1965-66.

The length of roads (extra Municipal) in the district increased from 717 Kms. in 1961-62 to 1219.73 Kms. in 1965-66. The length of road per lakh of population rose from 46.79 Kms. in 1961-62 to 79.60 Kms. in 1965-66.

The number of Post Offices increased from 281 in 1961-62 to 321 in 1965-66. The number of Telegraph Offices also increased from 9 in 1961-62 to 17 in 1965-66.

The population in the district has been fully covered since 1961-62 under the Community Development Programme.

The number of Village Panchayats in the district rose from 976 in 1961-62 to 994 in 1965-66. The number of Banking Offices also rose from 22 to 43 during the same period.

NOTES ON SELECTED INDICATORS.

Indicator No.1 Percentage of gross sown area to net sown area for the years 1960-61 and 1964-65.

The total cropped area of the district in the year 1961-62 was 13,62,187 hectares which works out to 83.71% of the geographical area whereas the same in the year 1964-65 was 13,77,573 hectares which comes to 84.66% of the geographical area. It means that 15,386 hectares of additional land was brought under cultivation during the period under review, the percentage of increase being 1.13.

2. This increase in the gross cropped area is not observed in all the talukas of the district. The gross cropped area decreased during 1964-65 in the talukas of Soegaon, Jafferabad, Gangapur, Paithan, Vaijapur and Ambad as compared to the same for the year 1961-62. The table below gives the percentages of Gross cropped area to net cropped area in each taluka of the district during 1961-62 and 1964-65.

3. It is observed that the double cropped area in the district is negligible because of lack of irrigation facilities and scarcity of rains during the months of November and December.

The comparative position of 1961-62 and 1964-65 denotes that except in the case of Kannad Bhokardan, Vaijapur, Aurangabad and Jalna talukas there was a decrease in percentage of gross cropped area to net cropped area. This is mainly due to the fact that the increase in double cropped area is not observed in the same proportion as in case of net cropped area.

Indicator No.2 Productivity of important Crops.

The following table gives the yield rate of important crops in the district, during 1964-65, as against the same during 1961-62

2. It is observed that the yield rate in respect of rice and Bajra during 1964-65 has considerably increased by 27.34% and 43.39% respectively as compared to the yield rate in 1961-62. While the yield rate of Kharif Jowar has increased by 8.60% the yield rate of Rabi Jowar has decreased by 17.15%. The percentage increase in the yield rate of wheat is only 0.22%. ~~Among the non-food crops the highest increase is observed in Cotton, it being 372.80%. There is slight decrease in the yield rate of sugarcane.~~

Indicator No.3 Gross value of agricultural production.

In Aurangabad district where no considerable minor industrial units exist agriculture is the only important economic activity and it is interesting to study the changes and trends in the gross value of agricultural produce. The gross value of important crops of the district during the year 1961-62 and 1964-65 is given in the following table.

2. The value of agricultural produce has been arrived at by multiplying the total produce by harvest price.

3. It is evident from the table that except in the case of Jowar and cotton the value of all other commodities has increased considerably.

4. The increase in the value of production is due to the increase in the prices rather than the increase in the produce.

Indicator No. 4 Percentage of Irrigated Area.

More emphasis was given on irrigation programme in Second and Third Plan period. Different medium projects such as Dheku Jui, Khelna, Jiverkha, Dudhna, Koli etc, and minor projects such as Shiwa anicut, Purna anicut, Kasner tank, Yerbhadra anicut, Dawasgaon tank etc. were started and completed during this period and additional area was brought under irrigation. More over well sinking and lift irrigation were started simultaneously on very wide scale. Due to all these measures the area irrigated during 1964-65 increased by 12,958 hectares over the area in 1961-62, the percentage of increase being 21.12. The percentage of gross area irrigated to gross cropped area in 1964-65 works out to 5.39 as against 4.50 in 1961-62.

2. The table below indicates the talukawise area irrigated by canals

3. During the year 1961-62 not a single hectare of land was irrigated by Government canals while 2,925 hectares of land was irrigated by Government canals in 1964-65. The talukas of Vaijapur, Sillod, Bhokardan, Jafferabad and Jalna were benefited by these canals.

5. In Aurangabad district the net area irrigated by wells is increased by 12816 hectares

i.e. by 25.79 percent during the period of 1961-62 to 1964-65.

This increase is spread over in all the talukas of district except talukas of Jafferabad, Vaijapur and Aurangabad where a slight decrease has taken place in the net area irrigated by wells.

Indicator No.5 Changes in the Cropping pattern(total & irrigated)

The important food crops of the district are Jowar, bajra, wheat, green, gram, black gram and tur, while the important non-food crops are cotton, safflower and ground-nut, sugarcane & fruits are also grown in some parts of the district. The table below indicates the talukawise percentage increase/decrease for the important crops/groups of crops, during the period of 1961-62 to 1964-65.

2. From the above table it is evident that the area under total cereals increased by 28,667 hectares the percentage increase being 4.20 percent. The special Kharif and Rabi campaigns and hybrid programme implemented during the Plan period gave impetus to the cultivation of cereals. The area under jowar in the district increased by 35,226 hectares. This percentage increase is as high as 8.45.



The area under wheat increased by 4,836 hectares i.e. by 6.15%. However the area under bajra decreased by 5.87%. The area under total pulses however declined by 8,883 hectares i.e. by 3.33%. But for tur, gram and black gram the area under all other pulses decreased. However this decrease is very considerable for green gram, it being as high as 14,344 hectares, i.e. 17.98%. The main reason for decrease in the area of green gram is scanty and insufficient rains during the months of June and July, 1964. The area under tur is increased by 5,731 hectares. The area under black gram is however more or less constant, the increase in acreage being only one hectare.

3. As already stated above the important non-food crop of the district is cotton. Next to jowar the acreage under cotton is highest in the district. The percentage of area under cotton to the total cropped area for the years 1961-62 and 1964-65 comes to 14.49% and 15.26% respectively. The area under cotton increased in talukas of Kannad, Silled, Bhokardan, Khuldabad, Vaijapur, Aurangabad, Jalna and Ambad while the same decreased in the talukas of Soegaon, Jafferabad, Gangapur and Paithan. Other important non-food crops in the district comprised oil seeds, ground nut and safflower. It is observed that the area under total oil seeds decreased by 15,936 hectares i.e. by 9.19% during the period under review. There is considerable decrease in the area of safflower to the extent of 8.43%, mostly because of increase in the area of rabi jowar and wheat. The area of ground nut also decreased by 2.45%.

4. There is no concentrated area under sugarcane in any of the talukas of the district. This is not an important crop as its percentage to ^{total} cropped area was as low as 0.80% and 0.71% during the years 1961-62 and 1964-65. It is ^{under} observed that area/Sugarcane decreased by 1,136 hectares i.e. by 10.42 percent.

2. The table indicates that there has been considerable increase in the amount of loan advanced so also dues outstanding. Though percentage increase varies from taluka to taluka, increase in loan advanced is observed in all talukas except Soegaon and in case of dues outstanding is observed in all talukas except Khuldabad.

Indicator No. 7 Agricultural wage rates.

The table No.3.8 of the Abstract deals with the agricultural wage rates of the selected centres of the district in the year 1965 and 1966. From the table it is evident that average wage rates of carpenters of Ajantha centre in Sillod taluka were the highest i.e. Rs. 4.86 and ^{RS. 5.00} as compared to the average rate of carpenters of Bidkin in Paithan taluka and Mahalgaon in Vaijapur taluka in the year 1965 as well as in 1966 respectively. The wage rates of blacksmiths at Ajantha centre were also higher than other two centres of the district i.e. Rs. 4.88 & Rs. 4.00 for the years 1965 and 1966 respectively.

2. The average wage rates unskilled field labour (males) in Ajantha, Bidkin & Mahalgaon centres in the district during the year 1965 were Rs. 1.21, Rs. 1.81 and Rs. 2.14 respectively. The average wage rates in the same centres during the year 1966 were Rs. 0.88, Rs. 2.15 and Rs. 2.25 respectively.

Indicator No. 8 Livestock per hectare of Land.

In an agricultural country like India the importance of working cattle can scarcely be exaggerated. The livestock have an important bearing on the total output of agricultural production. As agriculture is a non-mechanised industry in India, the cattle supply the most important motive power for almost all agricultural operations, such as ploughing, lifting of water and transport of produce to the market.

2. The table below indicates the cultivable area and number of working bullocks only and its ratios.

From the above table it is evident that highest cultivable area per pair of bullocks is found in Ambad taluka whereas the lowest area per pair of bullock is in Paithan taluka. The cultivable area of the district as a whole comes to 7.16 hectares per pair of working bullocks. The cultivable area per pair of bullocks is varying between 5.40 and 9.61 hectares. As against total cultivable area of 13,79,511 hectares the total bovine and ovine population in 1966 was 12,77,064. The bovine and ovine population per 100 hectares of land works out to 92.

Indicator No.9 Poultry as compared to population.

During Third Plan period a special programme for poultry development consisting of training for poultry breeding and supply of improved poultry and loans for poultry keeping was chalked out and implemented. As per the census of 1966 total number of poultry in Aurangabad district was 2,01,249 as against 2,22,775 during the year 1961. This indicates a decrease of 21,526 over the period 1961-66.

2. The table below indicates taluka-wise number of poultry per 1000 population as per the census of 1961 and 1966.

3. It may be observed from the above that the ratio of poultry to the population as per 1966 Census was highest in Soegaon taluka while the same was lowest in Ambad taluka. The range of variation was considerably wide as the maximum ratio was 218 while the minimum was 95 only.

Indicator No.10 Per Capita Consumption of Electricity.

Consumption of electricity not only for domestic purposes but also for industrial and agricultural purposes has now become more common than what it was in the last decade. Due to the establishment of recent power stations the electricity has reached to the doors of residents of cities for domestic consumption and for industrialists as a power, so also to the residents of villages both for domestic lighting and power for agriculture mainly for irrigation of land.

2. In Aurangabad district the total consumption of electricity during 1964-65 was 7,926 thousands K.W. while the same for 1965-66 was 11,188 thousands K.W. during the year 1965-66. This shows that even during the shortest period of one year the electricity consumption increased by 3,262 thousand K.W. The increase in the consumption of electricity is observed in all the fields of consumption, for instance, domestic commercial, public lighting etc. except industrial. This increase is more prominent in the field of agriculture which comes under item 'Other purposes' in the Abstract table No.5.9. The per capita consumption in the year 1964-65 was 5.17 K.W. while the same during 1965-66 was 7.30 K.W.

3. The table below indicates the percentage distribution of electricity consumed for the years 1964-65 and 1965-66.

4. The main reason for percentage increase in the consumption of electricity for the domestic purposes is the increase in rural electrification. It may be observed from table No.5.10 of the Abstract that only 4 villages were electrified by the end of 1961-62 while as much as 172 villages were electrified by the end 1965-66. Similarly as against 6 towns electrified upto the year 1961-62 all the 10 towns in the district were electrified upto the year 1965-66.

Indicator No.11 Increase in the number of candidates enrolled in Employment Exchange and vacancies notified.

One of the important items of achievements for the Third Plan period was creation of employment for those who are un-employed or under employed. Though the account of employment generated in all the spheres during Third Plan in the district could not be given here, efforts are made to study the registrations and placements during the year 1961-62 and 1964-65. The total number of candidates who enrolled their names for employment in different categories of services during the year 1961-62 was 10619 while the same during the year 1965-66 was 15,300. This denotes that the enrollment increased by 4,681 that is by 44.08%. As against the number of persons enrolled the number of vacancies notified during the year 1961-62 was 2,005 while the same during 1965-66 was 2270. The increase in vacancies notified was negligible as compared to the increase in enrollment. It may be observed that as against the increase of 4,681 in the number of enrollment increase in vacancies notified was 265. The percentage increase in number of vacancies notified was 13.21 whereas the same for enrollment comes to 44.08.

Indicator No.12 Increase in indoor and out-door patients treated in hospitals.

The table No.7.2 of the Abstract indicates medical facilities available in the district for the years 1961 and 1965 and shows the number of hospitals, maternity homes, dispensaries, rural health centre, doctors, nurses, beds available and in-door and out-door patients treated.

3. The comparative figures for Kannad, Soegaon and Gangapur are not given as the comparative figures are not available for these talukas. From the above statement showing talukawise indoor patients treated during the year 1961 and 1965 it is clear that the number of indoor patients has decreased in Sillod & Vaijapur where as the same has increased in Aurangabad, Jalna, Paithan, Ambad, Khuldabad and Bhokardan. It may be observed that Aurangabad and Jalna accounted for the highest number of in-door patients where better medical facilities are available on account of the location of Medical College hospital at Aurangabad and hospital at Jalna.

From the above table it is evident that the number of out-door patients treated decreased in respect of Kannad, Sillod, Soegaon, Bhokardan, Jafferabad, Gangapur, Paithan and Ambad talukas whereas percentage of the out-door patients treated increased in respect of Khuldabad, Vaijapur, Aurangabad and Jalna talukas.

Indicator No.13 Increase in the number of students in different categories of Schools.

The number of primary schools in Aurangabad district during the year 1960-61 was 1313, while the same during the year 1965-66 was 1878. Out of 565 newly opened schools, 466 schools were opened in the villages where there were no schools upto year 1960-61. In spite of these efforts 102 villages were without primary schools by the end of March, 1966.

2. Significant increase was observed between the number of students attending primary schools in Aurangabad district during the year 1960-61 and the year 1965-66. During the year 1960-61, 1.04 lakhs students were attending primary schools, while this number during 1965-66 rose to 1.53 lakhs. This shows increase of 52.03% in the number of students during period of five year 1961-66. In case of primary education the ratio of boys to girls for 1961-62 and 1965-66 works out to 10.0 : 2.9 & 10.3 : 3.6 respectively. This indicates progressive attitude towards women's education. The percentage increase in number of boys and girls in 1965-66 over the same in 1960-61 comes to 39.86 and 71.87 respectively.

3. The increase in the number of students in secondary school is also encouraging. As many as 52 secondary schools were opened during the period of 1961-62 to 1965-66. Number of students attending secondary schools increased from 19352 to 38957 in case of boys while from 5713 to 10438 in case of girls during the period between year 1961-62 to 1965-66. The percentage increase comes to 101.30 in case of boys and 82.70 in case of girls.

4. The data for higher institutions for the year 1961-62 is not available and hence comparison for the year 1961-62 and 1965-66 cannot be made. It may however be observed that in the year 1965-66 as many as 17 institutions were functioning with the strength of 6972 male and 608 female students.

5. Similar increasing trend is observed in case of special schools also. No. of institutions have increased from 7 in 1961-62 to 20 in 1965-66. The increase in number of boys and girls attending special schools during this period is from 493 to 1638 and 156 to 278. The percentage increase comes to 232.25 and 78.20 in case of boys and girls respectively.



Indicator No. 14 Increase in road length per 100 Sq. kilometres.

The table below indicates type-wise length of road mileage as on 31-3-1961 and 31-3-1966.

2. It is observed that the total length of roads in the district, under all the categories, as on March, 1966 increased by 25.75% as compared to the total road length as on March, 1961. The length of Major District Roads and other district roads during the period for 1-961 to 1966. increased by 37.84% and 6.87% respectively. The road length under State Highways during the same period increased to the extent of 3.93%. The length of road per 100 Sq. k.m. in the district rose from 5.79 in 1961 to 7.30 in 1966.

Indicator No.15 Increase in Banking facilities in proportion to population.

1. The District Co-operative Bank plays an important role in mobilizing the idle capital from rural areas and providing credit facilities to the rural folk. Though the number of scheduled banks has increased from 8 in 1961 to 11 in the year 1965-66 the number of co-operative banks increased from 20 in 1961 to 32 in the year 1965-66. The branches of District Co-operative Bank were opened at not only taluka places but also at many other villages where weekly markets and other transactions take place. The total population of the district as per 1961 census is 15,32,343 and this means per 35,636 population one bank is functioning. Actually most of the scheduled banks were concentrated at Lurangabad town which is the headquarter of the Region and at Jalna which is an important commercial centre. Actually banking needs of rural population are fulfilled by co-operative banks only. In the year 1965-66, 29 towns were covered by 43 banks which included 11 scheduled banks and 32 co-operative banks.

Indicator No. 16 Prices.

The collection of weekly prices at the district head quarter was started from November, 1962. The position of prices in the first week of November, 62 and in the first week of November, 65 is discussed as below

2. This table covers major items of food and it is evident from the table that there is an all round increase in the prices. During the year 1965 rice was not available in the open market. Jowar was also not available in the market but it was supplied through fair price shops in sufficient quantity. Wheat though available in the market in sufficient quantity the prices in November, 65 were as high as Rs. 1.55 per kg. the increase being as high as 171.93% over prices in November, 62. Similarly bajra was available in open market at the price of Rs. 1.15 per Kg. In short the prices of all the cereals increased during this period unprecedentedly.

But for the prices of gram dal the prices of other pulses increased but this rise was not as steep as in the case of cereals. The prices of gram dal however rose from Rs. 0.65 per kg. in the year 1962 to Rs. 2.00 per kg. in the year 1965. The prices of other pulses increased in between 25% and 87.50%.

The prices of other important commodities of food items also increased considerably. For instance prices of sunflower oil increased by 76.10% that of vanaspati by 62.33% of milk by 89.39%. while the prices of Mutton rose by 40.00%. The sugar was not available in open market its controlled price however increased by 16.36%.

The prices of other important group that is clothing also showed considerable upward trend. The prices of important varieties of cloth are given in the table below.

CHAPTER-IV

PLANNING PART-I

The Third Plan which was implemented from the year 1961-62 has been completed in the year 1965-66. In spite of various natural calamities such as Panshet flood severe draught in 1965-66 and foreign invasions all efforts were made to fulfill both financial & physical targets laid down in the Plan. In the following paragraphs efforts are made to discuss the sub-head wise progress of the expenditure without making a reference to budget as the budget for various schemes has been changed from time to time:

During the period from 1961-62 to 1965-66 amount of Rs.872.74 Lakhs was utilised for booking expenditure on different district level plan schemes in the District. It is needless to state that main head of expenditure in this District is Agricultural Programme. Due to lack of transport facilities and little interest of administrators in the development before 1948 this District has not made any head way in the field of Industries. Out of total working population 82.62% of population is engaged in cultivation which shows that/economy, and hence considerable stress was given to mobilise and improve agricultural resources. The table below indicates headwise expenditure during Third Plan period.

Out of total Third Plan expenditure of Rs. 372.74 Lakhs Rs. 421.70 Lakhs i.e. 48.32% were spent on Agricultural Programmes in the Aurangabad District. This expenditure was booked on Agricultural production, Land Development, Soil Conservation, Minor Irrigation, Animal Husbandry, Dairy Development, Forest, Fisheries and Ware-housing and Marketing sub-heads of development. The sub-head wise expenditure has already been shown in the Abstract Table No. 11.1. The progress of expenditure on different schemes under the above mentioned sub-heads is discussed below.

#### AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTION:

The Schemes which are directly related to the cultivation of Land have been included under this sub-head. To impart technical training to the cultivators a scheme of the Establishment of New Agricultural Schools and Strengthening of Existing Agricultural Schools" was implemented in the District from the year 1964-65. The expenditure to the extent of Rs. 4.78 Lakhs was booked on this scheme during the years 1964-65 and 1965-66 by way of establishing Agricultural School at Harsool from Aurangabad Taluka.

It was proposed to supply improved agricultural implements such as Iron plough, sprayers etc. On subsidy to the cultivators.. through scheme for "Propagation of Improved Agricultural Implements". This scheme was implemented from the year 1964-65 & during last two years of plan expenditure to the extent of Rs. 0.62 Lakhs was booked. It was observed that due to low rate of subsidy and cumbersome method of claiming the amount of subsidy not more than 0.62 Lakh Rs. could be spent on this scheme.

About 12 percent of total cultivated area is under cotton in this District. Though cotton is the main commercial Crop in the District, to procure and distribute pure improved seed Scheme of "Co-ordinated Cotton Extension" was implemented in the District from the year 1963-64. This was a staff scheme and amount of Rs. 1.80 lakhs was utilised for this scheme.

To supply the improved strains of sugarcane a Zonal Statron has been established at Vaijapur in this District under the scheme "Development of Sugarcane". Amount of Rs. 1.31 lakh was utilised for this scheme during the last four years of Plan.

"Oil seed Development" was the another Staff scheme implemented in the District for the propaganda and improvement in Oil seed production. Amount of 0.23 Lakhs Rs. was utilised under this scheme.

For bringing additional area under horticulture, interest free loans were advanced to the cultivators under the scheme "General Horticultural Development". Amount of Rs. 4.98 Lakhs was utilised during the Five Year Period.

It is a recognised fact that compost is a cheap and easily available manure by which yield per acre can be increased. It was envisaged to give subsidy on use of san seed and rural and urban compost under the scheme "Local Manurial Resources". The expenditure of Rs. 1.24 lakhs was booked on this scheme.

Most of the cultivators are not aware of recent methods of controlling Pests and diseases. Implements and chemicals for crop protection have been distributed under the scheme "Plan protection Services". Expenditure of Rs. 1.10 lakhs has been booked on this scheme.

To supply improved seed and with a view to increase the yield rate, taluka seed farms where pure seeds are generated have been established during Second Plan. In the Aurangabad District eleven Seed Farms were established during Second Plan Period and it was proposed to establish one additional Seed Farm and complete the construction works on the established Seed Farms during Third Plan. Expenditure to the extent of Rs. 6.76 Lakhs was booked on this scheme.

Additional Scheme of Kharif and Rabi campaign was included in the Plan during the year 1964-65 and 1965-66. Under this scheme more stress was laid on bringing more and more area under hybrid production. Maze, Bajra, Jowar and Wheat were the crops under per view of this scheme. Amount to the extent of Rs. 16.45 lakhs was utilised on this scheme during the last two years of Plan.

### LAND DEVELOPMENT/

"Consolidation of Holding" is the only scheme implemented under this sub-head. To prohibit fragmentation of land and to consolidate the existing small holdings, staff for consolidation has been appointed under this scheme. Amount of Rs. 0.22 Lakhs was spent on this scheme.

### SOIL CONSERVATION/

Programme of soil conservation constitutes important item of agricultural development. To stop the further erosion of soil the programme of contour bunding was launched on wide scale in this District. The expenditure of Rs. 294.55 Lakhs was booked on this scheme.

### MINOR IRRIGATION/

Though well irrigation is rather uneconomic for want of suitable irrigation projects majority of cultivators are required to depend up on well irrigation. The availability of water not only affects the yield rate, assured water supply also changes the condition of cropping pattern. In view of this fact quite bold programme of well digging was launched under the scheme "Construction of New Wells and Repairs to old Wells". Loans were advanced to the cultivators for digging of well and on completion of well subsidy to the extent of Rs. 500 per well was given. The expenditure to the extent of Rs. 18.57 Lakhs was incurred on this scheme.

The Mote irrigation is very un-economic not only because irrigation of land to the full capacity of well is not made but also because the expenditure on animals specially bulls is un-economic. To reduce manpower utilisation and to make the maximum utilisation of water scheme for use of "Pump Sets" has been implemented. As in the case of wells the programme of pump sets envisaged advancement of loans and subsidy for installation of pump sets. The expenditure of Rs. 13.44 Lakhs was booked under this scheme.

For advancing loan under the scheme Co-operative Lift Irrigation provision was made in Third Plan. Loans to the extent of Rs. 0.62 Lakhs were advanced to one Co-operative Lift Irrigation Society in taluk Kannad.

The Small Bandhams irrigating landless than 200 acres have been undertaken under the scheme "Minor Irrigation Works". In addition to the completion of spill-over work of projects already undertaken during Second Plan it was proposed to start and complete some additional works also. Amount of Rs. 29.36 Lakhs was spent on this scheme.

#### ANIMAL HUSBANDRY

Though bullock is the main power of agricultural industry the livestock in the District is weak and boney and cultivators pay very little attention to maintain the health of livestock. With a view to improve the quality of livestock and to provide medical facility following schemes were undertaken.

Amount of Rs. 2.90 Lakhs was spent on the scheme "Construction of Buildings for and Establishment of Veterinary aid Centres". This amount was utilised for construction of buildings for stockman centres and dispensaries with a view to provide medical aid to the livestock at the places near by villages.

Under the scheme "Supplimentary cattle Breeding Farms and Organisation of Breeders Societies improved "Devani" cows and one bull is located in the villages. It is presumed that this will facilitate the increase in the population of improved breed. The expenditure to the extent of Rs. 0.68 Lakhs was booked on this scheme.

To improve the quality of next generation of bullocks and cows from the existing generation a scheme for hybrid production was undertaken. Under this scheme one Devani bull was supplied to village panchayats and individual cultivators on half cost subsidy. In many of the villages from the district these bulls are supplied and they are rendering services to country cows. Amount of Rs. 0.81 lakhs was spent on this scheme.

#### DAIRY DEVELOPMENT

The programme of Dairy Development in the District consists mainly of "Town Milk Supply Scheme". The scheme "Pilot Milk Supply Scheme" has already started functioning and the daily milk supply is on increase. The building for Dairy at Aurang bad has been built during the Plan period.

As much as Rs. 40.92 Lakhs expenditure was booked on this scheme.

With a view to increase the collection of milk and supply supplementary occupation to the cultivators loans for purchase of buffalo were advanced under the scheme "Loans for Cattle Purchase". During last four years of plan loans to the extent of Rs. 2.49 lakhs were advanced under this scheme.

Milk producers Societies supplying milk to the Government were assisted by way of paying managerial subsidy under the scheme "Organisation of Milk producers societies and Federations". The amount of Rs. 0.29 Lakhs has been utilised for paying subsidy to the societies during last four years of plan.

#### FOREST/

The percentage of land under forest in Murgambad District is only 5.35. The main reason for such a low percentage is scarcity of rain fall. More over except for ^{some} part of Kannad taluka and Soegaon mahal there are no considerable hilly tracts, in the district.

A scheme to bring the village grazing lands under plantation a scheme was implemented by giving assistance to Village Panchayats for afforestation and development of pastures and grants were placed at the disposal of Village Panchayat for making arrangements for Plantation and watering to the plants planted in village "Gairan".

As very few Village Panchayats paid response to this scheme, amount of Rs. 0.03 lakhs only was booked on this scheme.

As the Sandal Wood is found in valleys at foot hills in some part of the District it was decided to bring additional area under Sandal Wood. Amount to the extent of Rs. 0.75 lakhs was utilised under the scheme "Plantation of Valuable Trees".

Under the scheme "Afforestation for Soil Conservation" a programme of plantation of trees was undertaken and expenditure to the extent of Rs. 0.62 lakhs was booked on this scheme.

FISHERIES

To develop the supply of inland fisheries various schemes were included in the Second and Third Plan period.

Expenditure to the extent of Rs. 0.15 lakhs was booked on the scheme "Stocking of tank with carp fry". Under this scheme different reservoirs in the District were stocked with carp fry imported from out-side the District and after their full growth these reservoirs were harvested.

Managerial subsidy to the co-operative societies of fishermen was provided under the scheme Development of Co-operative fisheries. Amount of Rs. 0.10 Lakhs was utilised for giving this subsidy.

Loans to the co-operative societies and individual fishermen were advanced under the scheme "Grant of loan to fishermen and fishery co-operatives". Loans to the extent of Rs. 0.10 lakhs were advanced under this scheme..

No expenditure was booked on the scheme "Assistance for purchase of fishery requisites" as the fishermen in this area are backward and reluctant to adopt new methods of catching of fish.

No expenditure was booked on the scheme "Preservation Marketing and Transport facilities of Fish" as financial position of none of the Co-operative Societies was sound enough to purchase a truck and refrigerated cabinet proposed to be supplied under this scheme.

Similarly no expenditure was booked on the scheme "Grant of loans to local bodies for construction of Fish Market" because none of the Municipal councils or city Municipalities have applied for this loan.

WARE-HOUSING & MARKETING/

Under this sub-head only one scheme i.e. "Development of Agricultural Marketing" was implemented during Third Plan period. Under this scheme it was proposed to regulate additional markets. The expenditure of Rs. 1.67 lakhs was booked on this scheme.

CO-OPERATION AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT /

In addition to the programmes directly connected with the development of agriculture additional schemes of developing the social cultural and financial sides of rural areas were undertaken under this Head of development. Co-operation and Community Development were the only two sub-heads under this Head of Development. The progress of expenditure on these two sub-heads is discussed below:-

CO-OPERATION/

The schemes for developing the activities under the co-operative field specially concerned with the agricultural activities have been taken under this sub-head of development.

Under the scheme "Extension of Agricultural credit" long, medium and short term loans were advanced to the multipurpose and service co-operatives working at village level through the Central Financing Agency i.e. District Central Co-operative Bank, Aurangabad. In addition to the loans share capital contribution & managerial subsidy was also given to some of the societies as per rules and regulations. Total amount of Rs. 12.44 lakhs was spent on this scheme.

Linking of Co-operative credit with the co-operative marketing is basically essential and hence programme of Extension of agricultural credits was rightly followed by the development of agricultural marketing. In addition to the development of agricultural marketing societies at all the important marketing centres in the District programme of construction of medium and small size Godowns was also undertaken. Expenditure of Rs. 19.25 lakhs was booked on this scheme during the Third Plan period.

Both the schemes "Co-operative Farming in Pilot Areas" & "Co-operative Farming outside Pilot Areas" were implemented in the District. Amount of Rs. 0.94 lakhs was spent on the former while the amount of Rs. 0.30 Lakhs was spent on the latter during the period of Third Plan.

In addition to these schemes some additional schemes were included in the Plan during the last two years of Plan. With a view to give impetus to the well digging programme a scheme "Financial Assistance to Co-operative Societies for wells crash Programme" was included in the Plan and amount of Rs. 0.34 lakhs was utilised for this scheme.

To mobilise the supply of food grains from the rural areas the scheme of "Construction of Godown" was implemented during the year 1964-65 and 1965-66. Expenditure to the extent of Rs. 1.60 lakhs was booked on this scheme.

One more additional scheme i.e. "Co-operative Consumers Article" was also implemented during the last two years of Plan and expenditure of Rs. 0.25 lakhs was booked on this scheme.

#### COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT/

As already stated above under this sub-head the programme of General welfare of the rural population have been undertaken. It was proposed to cover whole of the District under the programme of Community Development Blocks. Except, Aurangabad, Jalna and Gangapur talukas all other talukas were covered under C.D. Programme by end of second Plan. Jalna with 3 C.P.A. pattern, Aurangabad with 2½ C.P.A. pattern and Gangapur with 1½ C.P.A. pattern were inaugurated as Stage-I blocks during Third Plan period. As much as 148.98 Lakhs Rs. were spent on this scheme.

Another scheme included in this head was "Financial Assistance to local bodies for rural development programmes". The programme of drinking water supply was undertaken under this scheme and amount of Rs. 2.15 lakhs was spent during last two years of Plan.

As whole of the District was covered by the Village Panchayats no amount was spent on the scheme "Financial Assistance to Village Panchayats".

#### INDUSTRY & MINING/

To reduce the disguised unemployment in the agriculture sector and to maintain continuous flow of consumer goods at village level, considerable importance has been given to the development of Small Scale Industries. ## SOCIAL SERVICES/

The Programme of Education, Technical Education, Public Health, Water Supply and Drainage, Labour and Labour Welfare, Housing, Social Welfare etc. have been included under the main Head Social Services. The progress of schemes included in this sub-heads is discussed below.

### GENERAL EDUCATION

Illiteracy and ignorance is the main obstacle in economic growth of the country and therefore under the sub-head General Education, schemes providing adequate educational facilities at all level of population have been included. Establishment of at least primary schools in all villages in the District is considered as the minimum standard and efforts were made for expansion of secondary and higher education.

A scheme "Normal Expansion of Primary Education and Extension of universal free and compulsory Education" was implemented with a view to provide free and compulsory education to the children between age group of 6 to 11. New schools were opened in the villages and appointment of additional teachers was also made in the existing schools. The expenditure booked on this scheme during the Third Plan period amounts to Rs. 50.83 Lakhs.

The programme of training for un-trained teachers was included in the scheme "Basic Training of Primary Teachers" un-trained teachers were deputed for training by giving stipend. The total amount spent on this scheme is as much as Rs. 21.46 Lakhs.

Programme of building construction was undertaken under the scheme "Construction of Building for Primary Schools" and amount of Rs. 4.67 lakhs was utilised.

With increase in primary education more and more students are taking admissions in secondary schools and it has become necessary to open additional classes in Government secondary schools where-ever they exist. The scheme of "Provision of additional classes in Government Secondary Schools" was rightly included in the plan and amount of Rs. 21.63 ^{lakhs} was spent on this scheme.

Scholarships to the extent of Rs. 0.99 Lakhs were given to the students studying in Secondary Schools under the Scheme "Scholarships to Secondary Schools."

#### TECHNICAL EDUCATION/

To meet growing demand of technical personnel for development works schemes of extension of technical education facilities have been undertaken under this sub-head of development.

The provision for extension of existing Polytechnic has been made during Third/^{Plan} and expenditure to the tune of Rs. 9.95 lakhs was booked on this scheme.

Two hostel buildings for students of Government Polytechnic and Engineering College students have been constructed during Third Plan by utilising the amount of Rs. 6.03 Lakhs.

#### MEDICAL & NURSING/

Only one scheme i.e. "Expanding facilities in civil Hospitals" was implemented during the last year of Plan under this sub-head, and amount of Rs. 0.12 lakhs was utilised under this scheme.

#### PUBLIC HEALTH/

It is said that "Prevention is better than cure" and the programme of making arrangements for prevention of diseases such as Malaria, Small Pox has been undertaken under this sub-head. More over scheme of "Primary Health Centres" and Family Planning have also been undertaken under this sub-head.

To provide medical aid to the rural population the Primary Health Centres have been established at various Places in the District during Second and Third Plan period. The work of construction of buildings on Primary Health centres was completed during Third Plan. Amount of Rs. 2.40 Lakhs was utilised for this purpose.

The scheme of "National Malaria Eradication programme" is also being implemented since the beginning of First plan. Under this programme, spraying of D.D.T. has been continued during Third Plan. Expenditure of Rs. 23.39 Lakhs was booked on this scheme.

The scheme of "Strengthening of Establishment for vaccination against Small Pox" was continued for primary and revaccination against small pox. Amount of Rs. 3.36 lakhs was utilised for this purpose during Third Plan period.

The rate of increase in population is relatively very high and all efforts are being made to control this enormous growth. The programme of Family Planning is being implemented since Second Plan. Loop, Vespectomy operations, use of contraceptives and oral contraceptives is made very popular and these facilities are being made available at the door of houses of population at all level. As much as Rs. 6.85 Lakhs were utilised during Plan period for this programme.

#### WATER SUPPLY AND DRAINAGE/

Only one scheme viz. Village Well Water supply scheme" is implemented under this sub-head. There are many villages in this district where water is not either at all available or it is not in sufficient quantity. The programme of drinking water wells has been started since First Plan. The amount of Rs. 11.49 lakhs was utilised for the same purpose during Third Plan period.

#### HOUSING/

The housing is not only a problem of cities but it is really a problem of villages also. Various schemes for improving the conditions of housing in rural areas and urban areas as well have been implemented during the period of Third Plan.

The scheme of "Subsidised Industrial Housing" was included in Third Plan. It was proposed to give loan for construction of houses to the employees of Industries. The employees of Jay-Hind Printing Press, Aurangabad have been benefited by this scheme and expenditure to the extent of Rs. 0.22 Lakhs has been booked on this scheme.

Under the scheme "Low Income Group Housing" Loans for construction of houses were advanced to individuals and the Co-operative housing societies. Though no new advances were granted during the Third Plan period the second and third installments to the loanees to whom loans were sanctioned during Second plan period were given. During Third plan expenditure to the extent of Rs. 3.11 lakhs was booked under this scheme.

The scheme of establishment of model villages in 17 villages in Aurangabad District was undertaken vide scheme "Village Housing Project" and amount of Rs. 7.75 Lakhs was utilized for this purpose.

Scheme of "Extension of village Gothans and provision of house sites" was implemented for resettlement of villages affected by flood in irrigation projects. Expenditure of Rs. 1.79 lakhs was booked on this scheme.

#### SOCIAL WELFARE/

Only one scheme i.e. "Welfare Extension Projects" was continued during Third Plan, and the expenditure of Rs. 0.86 Lakhs was booked on this scheme

#### LABOUR AND LABOUR WELFARE/

The expenditure on only one scheme i.e. "Technical and vocational training" was booked during Third Plan period. This expenditure was booked on establishment of Industrial Training Institute at Aurangabad Expenditure of Rs. 4.67 Lakhs was booked under this scheme.

CHAPTER-IV  
PART-II

The progress of expenditure has already been discussed in the first part of this chapter. Now it is proposed to discuss the physical targets achieved during Third Plan under each sub-head of development.

AGRICULTURAL DEVELOPMENT/

One Agricultural School was started during the year 1964-65 at Harsool in the taluka Aurangabad. Under the scheme of improved implements 1,005 iron ploughs and 1,101 dry farming sets were supplied to the cultivators. The total area brought under improved Sugarcane and improve Oil Seeds during Third Plan period amounted to 1,04,412, 24,930 and 5,240 acres respectively. Horticultural Plantation was done over 1,249 acres while the area of 2,207 acres was covered under rejuvenation programme. Compost collected in urban areas amounted to 49,451 tons while area of 3,823 acres was brought under green manuring. For protection of plants 770 sprayers and 269 dusters were supplied to the cultivators. Under the programme of intensive food crops area of 1,68,891 acres was covered while area of 8,23,000 was covered under the programme of propagation of improved agronomic practices. As per schedule one seed farm at Pakhora from taluka Gangapur was established.

CONSOLIDATION OF HOLDINGS.

Programme of consolidation of holdings was taken over in 142 villages and area of 2,23,000 acres was consolidated.

SOIL CONSERVATION .

The achievement under soil conservation programme in this district was quite significant and as much as 2.70 lakh acres of land was bunded during the five years of plan.

MINOR IRRIGATION.

The work of construction of Minor irrigation projects has been undertaken under this sub-head. The particulars of Tanks for which work was completed and for which work was in progress are given below tank-wise.

KASNER PROJECT.

This project with estimated cost of Rs. 8.38 lakhs was started in the year 1961. This project is in Aurangabad taluka and the work of the project has been completed in every respect. As against the proposed 1200 acres area to be irrigated maximum area of 701 acres has been irrigated so far.

YERBHADR PROJECT.

The work of this project from taluka Paithan was started in 1959 and completed during the period of Third Plan. The estimated cost of the project is Rs. 4.16 Lakh. As against the potential of 1000 acres area of 450 acres was irrigated.

SHIVNA ANICUT.

Work of Anicut project on Shivna in taluka Kannad was started in 1954 and completed during Third Plan. Total cost of project is Rs. 89.96 Lakh and area to the extent of 550 acres has been irrigated by it as against the potential of 700 acres.

DAWARGON TANKS.

The work of this project from taluka Ambad was started during IInd Plan and was completed in Third Plan. Expenditure of Rs. 8.23 lakhs was required for completion of this project and it has irrigated area of 413 acres as against the potential of 1200 acres.

YELGANI BANDHARA.

Work of this Bandhara was started and completed during Third Plan. This Bandhara from Paithan taluka was constructed at the cost of Rs. 3.30 Lakhs and it has created the potential of 1050 acres.

SANJUL TANK.

This project from Aurangabad taluka is started in the year 1965 and its work is in progress. As against the cost of Rs. 15.55 lakhs 1680 acres potential will be created.

NIRGUDI TANK.

Work costing of Rs. 14.19 Lakhs has been started in 1965. This project is located in Khuldabad taluka. Potential of 1350 acres will be created by this project.

SOEGAON TALK.

This scheme from Soegaon taluka was started in 1965. As against the cost of Rs. 15.75 lakhs irrigation potential to the extent of 1425 acres will be created.

ANTHAN NICUT.

This project from Sillod taluka is started in the year 1965. As against the estimated cost of Rs. 3.98 lakhs it is expected that irrigation potential to the extent of 1000 acres will be created.

DEOGACH TALK.

This project is from Paithan taluka and the work was started in the year 1961. Proposed area to be irrigated by project is 1070 acres and its estimated cost is Rs. 10.99 Lakhs.

ANIMAL HUSBANDRY.

Work of construction of two dispensaries at Gangapur and Bhokardan is completed while the work of two more dispensaries at Soegaon and Paithan is in progress.

During Plan period as many as 6 cattle breeding centres with 297 Deoni cows and 25 bulls have been established at different places in the district.

Total numbers of 165 premium bulls have been located in the District for serving the country cows.

DAIRY DEVELOPMENT.

During the month of February, 1962 the Pilot Milk Supply Scheme started functioning at Aunangabad. During last year of Plan as much as 6.18 lakh liters of Milk was collected and supplied to the consumers. In the year 1965-66, 25 Milk distribution centres were functioning and the milk was supplied at the rate of Rs. 1.50 per litre.

To increase the collection of milk 12 societies of breeders were organised.

FOREST.

The programme of afforestation was taken up by three Village Panchayats in the District. Two of them were from Taluka Paithan while one from taluka Soegaon.

Area of 1000 acres was covered under the programme of Sandal Wood plantation while area of 500 acres was brought under afforestation under the programme of afforestation for Soil Conservation.

#### FISHERIES.

Under the scheme "Supply of fishery requisites" 43 Kg. of Nylon twine was supplied to fisherman.

Four nursery units for production of fish were established and as much as 33,78,000 carp fry were stocked during the period of Third Plan. After harvesting of tanks stocked with these carp fry 44,000 Kg. of fish was made available.

During Plan period managerial subsidy was given to five co-operative societies and 3 new societies were organised.

#### WARE HOUSING AND MARKETING

Only one market was regulated and loans were advanced to four marketing Committees under this sub-head of Development.

#### CO-OPERATION.

Under the scheme "Extension of Agricultural Credit" long term loans to the extent of Rs. 769.51 lakhs short term loans of Rs. 1295.07 lakhs and medium term loans of Rs. 18.99 lakhs were advanced to the different co-operative societies in the District. Under the same scheme managerial subsidy of Rs. 15.50 was given to the Central Financing agency viz "District Central Co-operative Bank". During these five years as much as 12 and 27 new branches of Land Development Bank and District Central Co-operative Bank respectively were opened. Membership of co-operative societies was increased by 4,57,746.

Under the scheme "Development of Co-operative Marketing" five new marketing societies were organised and 32 rural godowns and 11 medium godowns were constructed.

Twelve new co-operative agricultural societies were organised in Pilot area while three co-operative farming societies were organised out side Pilot area.

## COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

By inaugurating new stage-I blocks of 8.5 C.P.M. pattern during Third Plan period whole of the District was covered by the Community Development Project scheme.

Under the scheme of "Financial Assistance to Rural local Bodies for Rural Works Programme" the work of construction and repairs of old drinking water wells was undertaken. Both together about 12 wells were brought in to use.

## IRRIGATION PROJECT

The progress of medium and major irrigation projects located in the district is given below project-wise.

### SUKHANA PROJECT

This project with estimated cost of construction of Rs. 107.00 lakhs is located in Aurangabad taluka on Sukhana river. The work of the project is in progress and it is likely to be completed by end of Year 1967. It is expected that area to the extent of 2,520 hectares will be brought under irrigation.

### DHUKU PROJECT

This project on Dhuku river from Vaijapur taluka was completed by 1960 and irrigation potential to the extent of 2680 hectares was created by the same. In the Third Plan expenditure of Rs. 5.09 lakhs was booked on this scheme mostly towards cost of land acquisition. The estimated cost of project is Rs. 40.41 lakhs, actual area to the extent of 1,636 hectares was irrigated by this project in the year 1965-66.

### JUI PROJECT

This project from Bhokardan taluka is on Jui river. The project was completed in the year 1960, with estimated cost of Rs. 36.03. As against the potential of 2,180 hectares, area to the extent of 1286 hectares was irrigated during the year 1965-66. The provision in Third Plan for this scheme was made mostly for payments towards land acquisition.

Contd..



KHELNA PROJECT.

This project on Khelna river in Sillod taluka was started during Second Plan period and was completed in the year 1966. As against the irrigation potential of 3,360 hectares, area to the extent of 1,288 hectares was irrigated during the year 1965-66. The estimated cost of construction of this project comes to Rs. 76.49 lakhs.

GALATHI PROJECT.

The work of this project on Galathi river near Ambad town was completed in every respect by middle of the year 1966. The estimated cost of project comes to Rs. 77.91 lakhs. Only 2,623 hectares of land was irrigated during the year 1965-66 as against irrigation potential of 4,600 hectares.

JIVRAKHA PROJECT.

This project is situated on Jivrakha river in taluka Jafferabad. The work of the project was completed in the year 1966 at the cost of Rs. 41.61 lakhs. It has created irrigation potential of 1052 hectares and actual area to the extent of 300 hectares was irrigated during the year 1965-66.

SMALL SCALE INDUSTRIES.

As already stated above only two schemes were implemented in this sub-head. Two societies of handloom weavers were organised. Under this sub-head assistance by advancing loans to small scale industries was also rendered.

TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATION.

Work of 10 roads started during Second Five Year Plan with estimated cost of Rs. 6.29 lakhs and providing 150.25 miles of road and one work of bridge at Malunja on Deogaon Toka road was completed during Third Plan.

In addition to completion of these spill over works work of 131.61 miles of five major District Road with estimated cost of Rs. 66.25 lakhs and C.D. works on Bhokardan, Jafferabad road were started and kept in progress.

Contd..

All these works were supervised and executed in local sector. In addition to these works six schemes three with estimated cost of Rs. 12.90 lakhs 15 miles of major district roads and 7.62 miles of other district roads, and three works of C.D. works on Gangapur, Vaijapur road Rahatgaon, Vivgaon, Shastpimpalgaon road and Jafferabad Develgaon were also completed.

#### GENERAL EDUCATION:

Appointment of 2,310 teachers was made under the schemes expansion of Primary Education and compulsory Primary Education. As much as 3,123 teachers were trained vide scheme of Basic Training of Primary Teachers'. During the plan period 162 class rooms were constructed for primary schools. Appointment of 306 teachers was made to meet the additional requirement of teaching staff in secondary schools.

#### TECHNICAL EDUCATION.

Polytechnic at Aurangabad was developed by making appointment of additional teachers purchase of equipments and extension of building. Two hostel buildings were also completed.

#### PUBLIC HEALTH.

The expenditure on primary Health Centre was incurred mostly on completion and construction of buildings for health centres and staff quarters;

One unit of National Malaria eradication Scheme was continued during Third Plan period. Appointment of 27 additional vaccinators was made for primary and revaccination against Small Pox. During Five years as many as 3,36,969 primary vaccinations and 14,57,405 revaccinations were given.

#### WATER SUPPLY AND DRAINAGE.

Programme of construction of drinking water wells was taken up in the taluka of Paithan, Ambad and Jafferabad. During these five years work of 261 wells was completed.

HOUSING SCHEME.

As already stated assistance for housing of workers of "Jai-Hind Printing Press" was rendered under the scheme "Subsidised industrial Housing". No fresh loans were sanctioned under the scheme low income group housing. The scheme of establishment of model villages was implemented in 20 villages in Aurangabad District.

SOCIAL WELFARE.

Under the scheme "Welfare Projects" 20 Balwadies, 10 literacy centres, 8 maternity centres and 4 Arts and crafts classes were working.

LABOUR AND LABOUR WELFARE

Industrial Training Institute was established at Aurangabad during Second Plan. Expenditure in Third Plan was incurred on provision of equipment in this training Institute. One Employment Information and Assistance Bureau was established at Ambad and one University Bureau was established in Marathwada University at Aurangabad.
