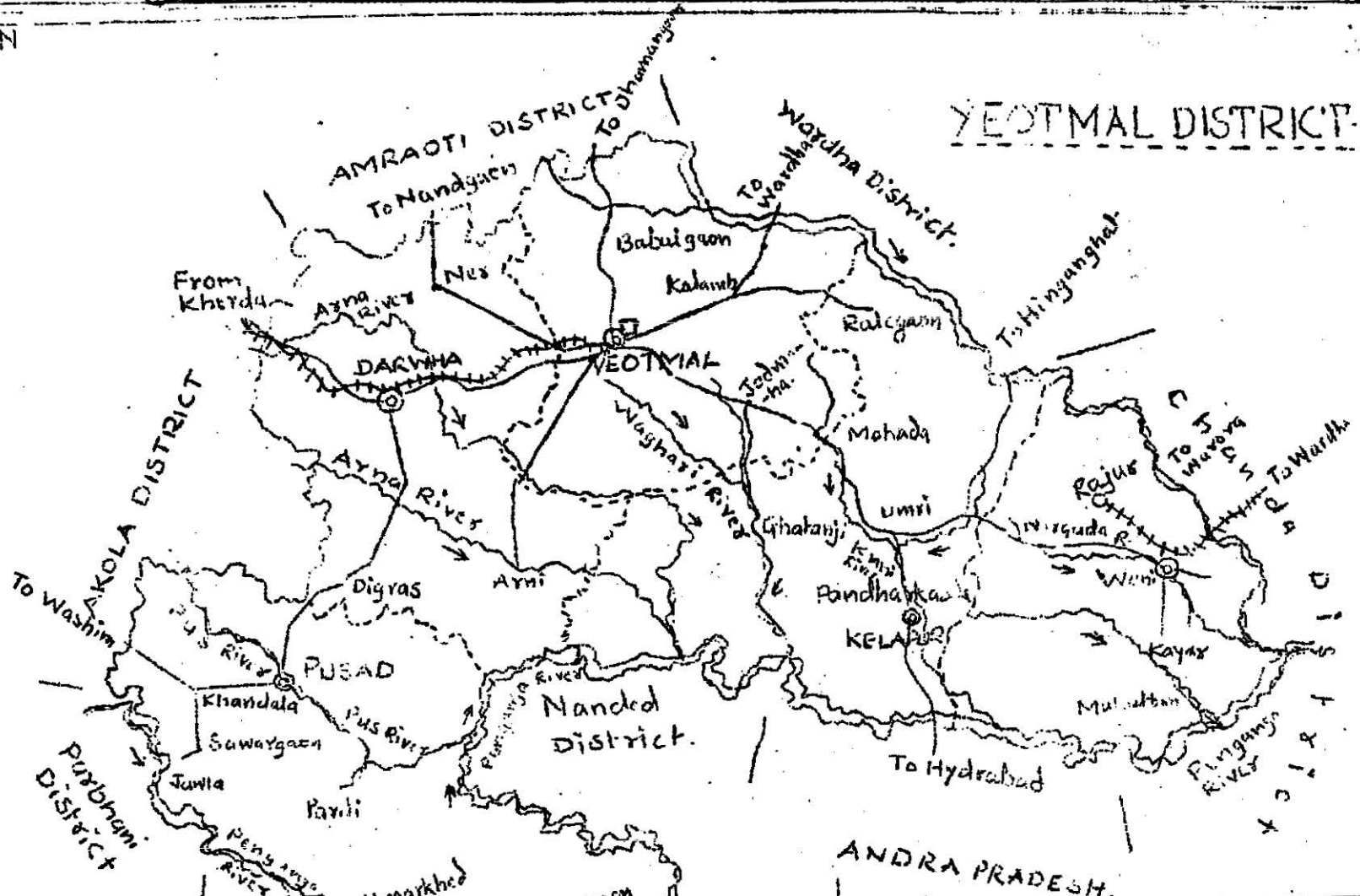

CHAPTER - I

I N T R O D U C T I O N

1.1 Location

Yeotmal district is one of the four southern districts of Vidarbha. It lies between 19° 25' & 20° 42' North Latitude and 77° 18' & 79° 9' East Longitude. Most of the district belongs to the Balaghats i.e. the southern plateau of Berar.

1.2 Boundaries

It is bounded by Amravati district in the North, Akola and Parbhani districts in the West, Nanded district and Andhra Pradesh in the South and Chandrapur and Wardha districts in the East. The district is quite extensive in size and ranks 2nd in Nagpur region and 8th in Maharashtra. The district has a natural boundary as the Wardha river in the north east separates it from the districts of Wardha and Chandrapur & by the Painsanga in the south which separates it from Nanded district and Adilabad district of Andhra Pradesh.

1.3 Administrative Set-up

The district is divided into 5 talukas for administrative purpose at present. The Collector is in-charge of the district. He is responsible for general administration, law and order, land revenue and civil supplies. He is assisted by Resident Deputy Collector and four Deputy Collectors at headquarters and five Sub Divisional Officers of the Deputy Collector's rank grade posted at five sub divisions. There is one revenue sub division for each taluka. The Tahsildar assisted by few naib-Tahsildars is in charge of the taluka and assist the Sub Divisional Officer in his duties.

The judiciary is entirely separated from the executive and the District and Sessions Judge is the head of the judicial department in the district. However, the Collector continues to be the District Magistrate but the powers are limited to security, law and order. The District and Sessions Judge is assisted by one Civil Judge (Sr. Division) and five Civil Judges (Junior Division) and first class Judicial Magistrate whose head-quarters are at taluka places. The police force in the district functions under the District Superintendent of Police assisted by two Deputy-Superintendents. In addition to these there are various District heads of the offices under various department too.

Local Bodies, Panchayat Samitis and Zilla Parishad:

With a view to promote democratic decentralisation and secure greater participation of the people in the developmental activities in the district, the Zilla Parishad and 14 Panchayat Samitis have been formed in the district on 1st May, 1963. The area under the jurisdiction of the Zilla Parishad is the entire rural area of the district, excluding municipal jurisdictions for promoting developmental activities. There are 8 municipalities to look after the development of urban areas. The area of the Panchayat Samiti is the area of the corresponding community development block.

There are 49 directly elected councillors. Out of these two seats are reserved for scheduled castes and five for scheduled tribes. There are five associated members who are presidents of five co-operative societies conducting business in the district. Elected chairman of 14 Panchayat Samities are also ex-officio councillors of the Zilla Parishad. At block level the Panchayat Samiti consists of elected and coopted councillors from area of the block. The Zilla Parishad is headed by its President assisted

by Vice President both of whom are elected from the elected councillors. An officer in the senior I.A.S. scale works as Chief Executive Officer of the Zilla Parishad. The Zilla Parishad comprises various departments and the heads of these departments at district level are officers of Class-I or Class-II service under State Government. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer works as Secretary to Zilla Parishad. The Zilla Parishad functions through a standing committee presided over by the president and the six subject committees viz. finance, works, agriculture, co-operation, education, and health. At the Block level the Panchayat Samities have elected chairman and vice-chairman. The Block Development Officer works as Secretary of the Panchayat Samiti which do not have subject committees. There are 1931 village Panchayats in the district. There are elected members from the villages or the group of villages. The Sarpanch is elected from these elected members who look after the developmental activities at his village level.

1.4 Area and territorial changes

The area of the district is 3517.2 sq. Kms. (5219.0 sq. miles) which is 14.5 % of the total area of Nagpur Region and 4.4 % of the total area of Maharashtra. It's maximum length from east to west is 192 Kms where as the maximum breadth from north to south is 160 Kms.

Yeotmal district, which is one of the four districts of Berar, was handed over by the Nizam to the Government of India in 1903. Up to 1863 it was a part of East Berar district. In 1864, new Wun (Wani) District was formed by separating Yeotmal, Darwaha, Kelapur, and Wani talukas from East Berar district. In 1905 Pusad taluka from Basim district was transferred to this Wun district and new Yeotmal district was constituted. There were no major changes in the

constituents of the district till 1953 when the district was transferred to the then ^{bilingual} state from Madhya-Pradesh due to State Reorganisation. Now it is a part of Vidarbha of Maharashtra State since 1st May 1960.

1.5 Topography

The whole district is covered by the Balaghat broken by broad river valleys and partially surrounded by plains. The Central portion of the district is a plateau with steep ghats, with an elevation of 1000'-1500' above mean sea level. Both Wardha & Painganga rivers and their tributaries provide strips of plains in many parts along their course. The width of these plains varies from 5 to 14 miles.

1.6 Hills, river system, Soils etc

The main system of hills is the Ajanta mountains. The whole district is occupied by small east-west ranges of these mountains. The off shoots of Ajanta ranges are at places broken by the broad valleys of the tributaries of the Painganga.

The chief rivers of the district are the Wardha and the Painganga, both of which flow along north-eastern and southern boundaries of the district respectively. They have numerous tributaries which traverse the heart of the district. The bed of the Wardha is broad and deep but the banks are overflowed by floods many a times. The Wardha has two big tributaries, viz. Bembla and Nirguda. The Bembla flows across the north of Yeetmal taluka below the ghats. The entire course of the Nirguda is in Wani taluka.

The Painganga has six important tributaries viz, the Pus, the Arunavati, the Adan, the Waghadi, the Khuni and the Vidarbha. The Pus flows through Pusad taluka, the Arunavati and the Adan through Darwaha taluka, the Waghadi through Yeotmal and Kelapur talukas and the Vidarbha through Wani taluka. All these rivers maintain flow for a greater part of the year. These rivers are flooded in rainy season but there is little water in them in summer season.

The soil of the district as a whole is uniformly good in texture and varies in colour from black to dark brown. They are, however, slightly inferior in productive capacity to those in Akola, and Amravati districts of Vidarbha.

Three defects are commonly seen in the soils of the district, viz. (1) a mixture of pieces of chunkhadi (limestone) (2) Sloping surface and (3) an excessive admixture of sand. However, the soil varies from very fertile alluvial tracts in valleys to hilly & hard parts on the plateaus.

In Wani taluka the soil is uniform but coarse texture and of a radish colour.

In Kelapur taluka and central and southern parts of Yeotmal taluka and hilly parts of Pusad taluka, the soil is of coarse gravelly or loose friable texture and of a colour varying from light brown to grey.

In Western parts of Yeotmal taluka and middle part of Darwaha and Pusad talukas rich fertile alluvial soils are found.

Coal and limestones are only important minerals found in the district. There is only one coal field near Pisgaon in Wani taluka, extending over 12 square miles. The reserves are estimated at 240 million tonnes. The limestones can be better utilised for production of cement and in near future a cement factory will come up in the district. A third mineral i.e. farashi stones are found in Kelapur taluka of the district.

1.7 Climate, Temperature & Rainfall:

The climate of the district is in general hot and dry. Generally, there is a breeze in the summer season rendering it tolerable and pleasant. The temperature ranges from 15° C (59° F) in winter to 41° C (105° F) in summer.

The southwest monsoon brings rain to Yeotmal district. The rainy season lasts from June to October. In the month of August the intensity of rainfall is highest. The rainfall varies from 889 m.m. (35 inches) to 1125 m.m. (45"). In the past few years the monsoon was very irregular. It is also not uniform in the district. It increases from West to East. Wani in eastern parts gets in average of about 1125 m.m. of rains and the lowest is in Darwaha in Western parts, which gets about 889 m.m. of rain. The central region covering Yeotmal taluka gets on an average nearly 1090 m.m. of rain.

There is no tract in the district which can be regarded as a chronic scarcity area.

Explanatory NoteClimate and Rainfall:-

Explanatory notes on certain tables are given below:-

Table No. 1

"Normal rainfall" in column 3 denotes the average rainfall during the years 1965 to 1966.

1.1 The climate of the district is in general hot and dry. The winter is moderately cold. There is generally a breeze in summer seasons thus rendering it tolerable and pleasant. The data is collected from Yeotmal and Pusad centres in the district. In 1966 the highest temperature 46.3° C. recorded in the district was at Yeotmal centre during April. The lowest temperature recorded was 12° C. at Pusad centre during January.

1.2 The rainy season starts from June and lasts upto the end of October. The rainfall is not uniform in the district. It increases from West to East. During 1966 Yeotmal and Wani centres got more than normal rain and but other three centres received less than normal rainfall. It was highest at Wani centre (1099 m.ms.) and lowest at Darwaha (335.5 m.ms.). Darwaha and Pusad talukas received lesser rainfall than in 1965.

2. Area and Population:-Table No. 3:-

The terms "rural" and "urban" under column 3 are defined as follows according to 1961 census.

A town or an urban area is defined as a place which has

1. a municipality, a cantonment or civil lines
- or

2. (i) A population of 5,000 or over
and

(ii) At least 3/4 or more of male workers are engaged in non-agricultural pursuits.

Rural population is a population of all villages in a revenue unit.

A "village" is a statutorily recognised village having a defined boundary and separate land records. Hamlets, Wadies or Padas have, therefore, not been shown as separate villages. On the other hand statutorily recognised villages having no population have been shown separately as "uninhabited" villages. Villages also includes forest villages comprising mostly forest labourers and their families.

Table No. 5 :-

Town is a urban area as defined under table No. 3.

Table No. 6 :-

A person is classified as a worker if

(a) in case of seasonal work like cultivation, live stock, dairying, household industry, etc, he has had some regular work of more than one hour a day throughout the greater part of the working season, and

(b) in the case of regular employment in any trade, profession, service, business or commerce, he was employed during any of the 15 days preceding the day of enumerator's visit to the household.

Workers are classified in to the following nine categories of economic activity:-

1. As cultivator
2. As agricultural labourer
3. In Mining, Quarrying, Livestock, Forestry, Fishing, Hunting and Plantations, Orchards and allied activities
4. At household Industry

5. In Manufacturing other than Household Industry
6. In construction.
7. In Trade and commerce.
8. In Transport, Storage and Communications
9. In other services.

Table No. 7:-

"Mother tongue" is defined as a language spoken by the person's mother to the person in his childhood or mainly spoken in the house. Dialects have been included in the main language on the basis of Grierson's Classification.

2.1 The total geographical area of the district is 13,517 sq.kms. (5219 sq.miles). The district population was 9,31,982 during 1951 census, and it has increased to 10,98,470 during 1961 census., showing an increase of 17.86%. The percentage of increase is more in urban areas than rural areas. The density of population in Darwha taluka was highest (91 per sq.km) and lowest in Kelapur taluka of the district (70 per km) during 1961 census.

2.2 In terms of area and population the district ranks 8th and 25th respectively in Maharashtra. Out of 1924 villages in the district, 295 are deserted. Out of 1629 populated villages in the district 56% have population less than 500, 28% are in the population range 500 to 999, while the remaining 16% have population above 1000. The urban population of the district is 13% of the total district population. It is distributed in eight towns in the district. Yeotmal is the biggest town in the district with a population of 45,587.

2.3 As per 1961 census record there are 543 workers per 1,000 persons in the district. The working population is classified into 9 major classes. The Agricultural occupation covers 85% of the working population. In rural areas the percentage of agricultural population is as high as 91%. In urban areas the working population is covered mostly by non-agricultural occupations, such as Household Industry (13%), Trade and commerce (17%) and Services (31%). Among the non-workers 63% are infants and children not attending school, 19% are students, while 16% are engaged in domestic duties.

2.4 According to age group during 1961 census 40.6% of the population was in age-group below 15 years, 25.2% of the population was within the age group 15 to 29 years, 28.6% was in the age group above thirty but below 60 years and remaining 5.6% was above 60 years of age. The mother-tongue of the majority of the people is Marathi, (70.5%) & 2.8% of the population had Hindi as their mother tongue. The percentage of Telugu speaking persons was 3.00% and Urdu speaking persons was 6.00%. The remaining 17.7% people had Gujarathi, Kannad, Kokkani, Sindhi and others languages as their mother tongues. By religion the population -

comprises 84.0% of Hindus, 8.8% of Buddhists, less than 0.5% of Jains and remaining 6.7% of the other religions such as Christians, Sikhs and others.

2.5 The scheduled castes accounted for 4% of the district population during 1961 census as against 14% during 1951 census. The sudden decrease is due to mass adoption of Buddhism by them. The scheduled tribes population is 14% of the district population. They are distributed mainly in Yeotmal, Kelapur and Wand talukas of the district. The scheduled tribe population is more in Kelapur taluka than in other two talukas.

3. Agriculture :

Table No. 9:-

For definition of terms used in columns 5 to 10 are as follow :-

1.(i) Total Geographical area by

(a) Professional Survey.

(b) village papers

(ii) Forest . All actually forested areas on the lands

classed or administered as forest under any legal enactment including State forests, whether State owned or private.

1.(iii) Barren and unculturable land

All barren and unculturable land like mountain deserts, etc (land which cannot be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost) is classed as unculturable whether such land is in an

isolated block or within cultivated holding)

2. Land put to non-agricultural use

1.(i) All lands occupied by building roads, and railways or under water, e.g. rivers and canals and

(ii) other lands put to uses other than agricultural.

3. Culturable Wastes

All lands available for cultivation, whether or not taken up for cultivation or abandoned after five years for one reason or the other. Such lands may be either fallow or covered with shrubs and jungles which are not put to any use. They may be assessed or unassessed and may be in isolated blocks or within cultivated but not cultivated for five years in succession is also included in this category, at the end of the five years.

4. Permanent pastures or other grazing lands

All grazing lands whether permanent pastures and meadows or otherwise.

5. Land under miscellaneous tree crops and groves not included in the net area sown

All cultivable land which is not included under net area sown but is put to some agricultural use. Lands under casurina trees, thatching grass bamboo bushes and other groves used for fuel etc, which are not included under "orchards" will be classed under this.

6. Current fallows :-

Lands which are left fallow during the current year only.

7. Other fallow lands

All lands which were taken up for cultivation but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and not more than one year and not more than five years. The reasons for keeping such lands fallow may be

inter alia one of the following:-

inter alia one of the following:-

1. Poverty of the cultivators,
2. Inadequate water supply,
3. Malarial climate,
4. Silting of canals and rivers, or
5. Unremunerative nature of farming etc.

● Net area sown :-

Net area sown represents the area sown to crops counting areas sown more than once in the same year only once. This represents the difference between the total geographical area and sum of area under forests, barren and unculturable land, land put to non-agricultural uses, culturable waste, permanent pastures and other grazing lands, miscellaneous tree crops and groves, not included in net area sown, other fallow land and current fallows.

● Area sown more than once :-

Area sown with two or more than two crops, and counted more than once in the same year.

● Total cropped area :-

This is the total of Net area sown and area sown more than once.

Table No. 15 :-

The cost of minor irrigation is upto a maximum of Rs. 20 lakhs.

Table No. 16 :-

The cost of a Medium irrigation project ranges between Rs. 20 lakhs to Rs. 5 crores whereas that of a Major irrigation project it is Rs. 5 crores and above.

3.1 The district has 13,52,997 hectares of geographical area. During 1965-66, net area cultivated was 57%. The remaining area is distributed amongst Forest (20%), uncultivated land (8%), land under pastures, miscellaneous trees etc. (9%) and fallows land (6%).

As compared to year 1964-65 there is not much significant change in the net area sown. The area under forest has decreased by 2% and decrease in Non-Agricultural by 1%. There was an increase in the land covered by permanent pastures as new areas are being developed for this purpose. The area sown more than once was to the tune of 0.0% with respect to net area sown during 1965-66.

3.2 During 1965-66, there is an increase in the area under food crops as compared to previous year. There is an increase in the area under food crops during 1965-66 as compared to the previous year. In 1964-65 area under food crops was 51.65% of the total cropped area but in the year 1965-66 it was 52.8% of the total cropped area. This is because there was decrease in the area under non-food crops. Out of total gross cropped area 40.1% was under cereals, 11.8% under Tur and other pulses, 4.2% under Cotton and other fibres, 4.1% under Ground nut and other oilseeds remaining area was under fruits and miscellaneous food crops and tobacco and other narcotics.

3.3 Well irrigation is by far the main source of irrigation in the district. Nearly 93% is irrigated by wells and 7% by tanks and other sources. The total irrigated area is just 0.95% of the gross cropped area. There is a significant increase over previous year as during 64-65

only 0.61% of the gross cropped area was irrigated. There were 7,613 wells during 1965-66 which provided irrigation to the crops. Darwha taluka (3,582) has highest (687) number of irrigation wells but Wani taluka (687) has lowest number of irrigation wells in the district. But Wani taluka had utilised 93% of their available irrigation wells for irrigating the crops as against 64% of the utilisation of Darwha taluka. Saikheda project, Ningoor tank project and Pua river project when completed will create an additional potential for irrigation to the tune of 23,000 hectares. As per 1966 live stock census there were 889 oil engines and 1471 electric pumps in use.

4. Animal Husbandry & Forest

Table No. 14

In the reserved forests broadly speaking every thing is an offence that is not permitted while in the protected forest nothing is an offence that is not prohibited.

4.1 As per 10th Livestock census carried in 1966, the livestock population in the district has decreased by 2.6% over 1961 livestock census. Similarly the poultry population has come down to half in 1966 as compared to 1961 Poultry population. It is observed that the cattle population is highest as compared to buffaloes and goat population. Out of total livestock 69.13% were cattle, 20.72% were goats, 8.41% were buffaloes, sheep 0.51% and other comprising horses, camel, donkeys etc. formed 1.23%. The bovine population (cattle and buffaloes) per 10 hectares

of cultivable land was 9.09 during 1961 which decreased to 8.54 during 1966. The availability of Poultry per 100 persons is just 21 during 1966 as compared to 41 in 1961.

4.2 The veterinary facilities are increasing day by day. They are available through one Hospital, 14 dispensaries and 60 ^{aid-}aid-centres. There are 19 veterinary doctors. But during 1966-67 the total number of animals treated has reduced by 5.6%. This can be due to the reduction in the livestock mortality during 1966-67 as there were less attacks due to various livestock diseases. There were 18 insemination centres functioning in the district as a programme of key-village scheme. During 1966-67, 646 animals were benefitted by this scheme. The figure has been reduced over last year by nearly 8% as sufficient semen was not available to meet the demand. There are 24 slaughter houses functioning in the district and a total number of 36,036 animals were slaughtered during 1966-67 of which sheep and goats formed a major share of 83%.

4.3 As previously stated, 20% of the geographical area is under forests. Of the total forest area 75% is under "reserved" forest, and 5% under "protected" forest. This 80% forest area is under the control of forest department. The remaining 20% area is "unclassed" and is under the control of revenue department. The total value of forest produce has increased during 1966-67 by nearly 9.5 lakhs of Rs. as compared to 1965-66. Timber, fuel wood, bamboos, grass and other forest products are the main sources of forest revenue.

5. Industries, Employment and Electricity:-

5.1 Cotton ginning and pressing is the main industry in the district. At the end of 1966 there were 49 ginning and pressing factories, out of the total of 83 factories. Out of 42 factories 3 factories were closed and 30 factories were working which employed 6,742 workers during 1966. Out of the 30 working factories, it is observed that in 45 factories the persons engaged were less than 50. In 14 factories the workers employed were more than 50 but less than 100. In 19 factories the employment of workers was between 100 to 400. There was only one factory where more than thousand workers were employed, (Ginning factory with 1,322 workers). As per 1961 annual survey of Industries the production capital of 39 working factories amounted to Rs. 11.7 lakhs, out of which 42% a major portion was invested in ginning and pressing industries. The gross out-put of these 79 working factories amounted to Rs. 351 lakhs and the value added by these factories was Rs. 54 lakhs.

5.2 The registration of persons in the Employment Exchange has increased during 1966-67 as compared to previous year by 10%. The live register showed 2,795 registration at the end of March, 67. It is increased by 1% during the year.

During 1966-67, 604 vacancies were notified out of which 567 were filled in. The percentage of placement is 80%. Only one person was employed by private sector during the year. From the volume of employment, it is observed that 225 establishments were reporting their employment. In all 75% were employed in public sector, and

25 in private sector. Services sector had 77% of workers, 3% in Trade, Commerce and miscellaneous, 14% in manufacture, 3% in construction, nearly 2% in electricity gas water and sanitation and 1% in transport and communication industry. There were 6,977 Government employees in the district as per 1966 employees census. There were 28 class-I, 101 Class-II, 4217 class-III and 2631 class-IV employees in the district as on 1-7-1966.

5.3. Considerable progress has been made in respect of rural electrification. There were only 47 villages electrified as on 31-3-61. But during the 3rd plan period considerable progress has been made and on 31-3-1967 there were 236 villages electrified giving benefit to 2,63,244 persons living in the villages together with 1,38,525 persons living in 8 towns in the district. Total domestic consumption during 1966-67 was 3,025 thousand k.w. Industrial consumption was 3,654 thousand k.w. Consumption for agriculture accounted for 2,243 thousand k.w. Total consumption in the district amounted to 11,168 thousand k.w. including commercial and small power and public lighting.

Co-operation :-

The cooperative movement which started as a credit movement for agriculturist has now blossomed into diversified economic activities, such as Co-operatives of farming, housing, marketing, industry, warehousing etc. The total number of societies in the district has increased by 33 societies as compared to 1965-66. There were 870 agricultural credit societies and 402 Non-credit societies in 1965-66. During 1966-67 two agricultural credit societies and 31

non-credit societies were formed in the district. The primary agricultural societies have covered almost all the villages in the district. There were 602 primary agricultural societies with 1,05,901 members with a share capital of Rs. 115 lakhs.

Cooperative movement still continues to be a predominantly credit movement as primary agricultural credit societies accounted for more than 50% of the societies in the district. There has been an overall increase in membership, share capital loans advanced during 1966-67 as compared to previous year in respect of these societies. The average amount of loans advanced per member was Rs. 145 during 1961-62 which increased to Rs. 319 during 1965-66 and during 66-67 the amount advanced per member worked out to Rs. 446/-

At the end of 1966-67 the overdies were 41.7% of the loans outstanding as compared to 40% during 1965-66. During 1966-67 the percentage of recovery was just 26% as against 29% during the previous year.

Amongst agricultural credit societies the cooperative farming societies were other important co-operatives in the District. There were 154 cooperative farming societies functioning in the district in 1966-67 as against 169 during 1965-66 which formed 15% of the total number of societies. Industrial co-operative societies account for 6% with 55 societies and housing societies account 4.7% with 53 societies. There were 14 agricultural marketing societies. These societies have undertaken purchase and sales of agricultural produce and distributing of agricultural requisites such as improved

seeds and chemical fertilizers, pesticides and improved agricultural implements. The total value of sales affected was Rs. 5.94 lakhs of agricultural requisites, and Rs. 32.5 lakhs of agricultural produce. Out of this 68% was on agency basis and 32% on ownership basis. There are 9 Regulated markets in the district, Except the Regulated market at Bori all are Regulated markets for cotton and other agricultural produce. Regulated market at Bori¹ for cotton only.

Medical and Public Health

As per 1961 census 1,79 persons were engaged in Medical and Public health services in the district out of which 40% were doctors. Out of the total male doctors in the district 56% were in rural areas with only 4% female doctors in rural areas. During 1966 there were 13 Hospitals including 25 maternity homes and 53 Dispensaries inclusive of 27 Allopathic, 27 Ayurvedic and 17 rural medical relief centres. There were 14 Primary health centres. On an average there was one hospital, one allopathic dispensary, and 2 Ayurvedic dispensaries, per lakh of population in the district. There were in all 383 beds available in the district, out of which 226 were for females and 157 for males. There were 69 Doctors, 27 Aidiyas and 111 nurses available during 1966 and the total patients treated were 16,087 indoor and 5,59,910 - Out door. There is an increase in indoor patients as compared to previous year by 15% but the out-door patients treated had decreased by nearly 30%. The birth rate per thousand of population was 46.08 per thousand

as against 47.3 during 1965 (Birth rate calculated in 1961 population) But there was an increase in ^{death} birth rate as compared to previous year. It was 22.20 per thousand as against 16.3 during 1965. There was an increase in infant deaths during 1966. During 1965 the infant mortality was 107 per thousand live births but during 1966 the infant mortality works out to be 129 per thousand.

There were 2,31,350 of re-vaccination and 50,579 primary vaccination and 4,09,170 cholera inoculations cases.

During 1966, 79% of the deaths were by other un-specified causes, 9% by ~~Dys~~ Dysentery and Diarrhoea, 6% by Respiratory diseases, 1% by Pneumonia, 2% by T.B. and nearly 1% by accidents. There were 47 deaths due to suicide and 15 due to cholera.

8. Education.

8.1 As per 1961 census the literate population was only 23.48% in the district. Thus percentage of literacy in rural areas was 20.38%. In Yeotmal taluka the literacy percentage was highest (27.58%) in the district due to Yeotmal town. Literacy by educational standard was very poor. In rural area out of the total number of literate 53% were without any educational qualification, 41% were having education upto primary standard while only 1% had attended matriculation and above qualifications. In urban areas 35% of literate were without any educational standard. 56% were of primary level while 9% had the educational standard of matriculation and above. Day by day educational facilities are increasing and more

persons are taking benefit, As compared to the year 1965-66, there was an increase of 3.2% in primary school and 5.3% in the number of students at primary level during 1966-67. Yet there are 206 villages without any primary school though primary school were provided to 55 new villages during 1966-67. These 206 villages are having population less than 200. In case of Secondary schools the increase was more marked as the number of schools has increased by 10.6% and the number of students by 6.07% during 1966-67. The increase at college level was more in both institutions, and students. There were adequate facilities of trained teachers at both primary and secondary levels.

During 1966-67 educational concession to the tune of Rs.18 lakhs were given to 91 thousand students of backward classes. In the previous year, the corresponding figures were 23 lakhs with 84 thousand students getting the benefits. Out of the concessions granted 7% was for primary students, 68% for secondary students, 23% to college students and remaining 2% students for special education. During 1966-67 the advantage of the economically backward classes concession of free education was taken by 32 thousand students and Rs.22 lakhs were spent for them. Out of the total number of students taking advantage of economically backward classes concessions 4% were at/pre-primary, 86% of the students at secondary stage and the remaining 10% at higher and special courses. Nearly Rs.53 per head were spent on secondary level and Rs.227 per head at higher level as economically backward classes concessions.

9. Transport and Communications.

9.1 In the district the total railway mileage is 17.71 kms. under broad gauge, and 60.40 kms under narrow gauge. The broad gauge line connects Wani town with Majari station on Delhi Madras Grand Trunk route while narrow gauge connects Yeotmal with Murtizapur railway station on Bombay Calcutta mainline. The total mileage at the end of March, 67, was 1488.20 kms. There is an increase of 30 kms. of road mileage during the year 1966-67. Out of this road mileage 62.36 kms. pertains to National Highways (Nagpur to Hyderabad) and 416.61 kms. pertains state highways and the remaining 1009.23 kms. of roads are district roads of all types including village roads. Out of the total road mileage in the district as on 31-3-67, Nearly 39% were black-topped, 52% were water bound macadam roads and remaining 9% were of lower types. There were 145.92 kms. of roads belonging to 8 municipalities in the district. The total number of motor vehicles in operation in the Yeotmal district were 1120 at the ~~xxxx~~ end of March, 67 as against 1043 at end of March, 1966. Out of the total number of 1120 motor vehicles 303 were motor cars, 5 taxi-cars, 147 motor cycles and scooters, 98 stage carriages both petrol and diesel, 360 lorries both public and private carriages, one ambulance and 3 school buses, 56 trailers, 133 tractors and 14 other vehicles.

9.2 The public transport facilities are provided by State Transport and in the Amravati S.T. division in which Yeotmal district is included there were 158 routes covering a route distance of 8437 kms. There

were 180 operating fleet and 158 vehicles per day were running on these roads. The income per day worked out Rs. 43 thousand and income per vehicle per day worked out to nearly Rs. 271. Nearly 54 thousand passengers travelled per day.

9.3 During 1966-67, 8 post offices at the village level were closed but the telegraph offices increased by one and total number of village post offices was 268 and there were 14 telegraph offices in the district. During 1966-67 there were 24 post offices, 1 telegraph and telephone exchange per lakh of population in the district. During 1966-67, 11080 radio licences were issued and renewed in the district. There are nearly 8 hundred ~~th~~ telephones in the district. The Rural Broadcasting Department has installed radio sets in 42 more villages during 1966-67 and there were 803 villages in the district having such radio sets and 6.5 lakhs of people living in rural areas of the district get benefitted by these radio sets. Thus by 1966-67 the Rural Broadcasting Department has provided radio sets to 68% of the rural population of the district.

10. Local Bodies.

10.1 The total revenue receipts of Zilla Parishad Yeotmal decreased by 15.2% during 1966-67 as compared to previous year's receipts. This is due to less receipts of grants from Government during the year. It is seen that nearly 92% of the income is derived from Govt. grants and 8% accrues self raised resources. Out of the self-raised resources local fund cess contributed nearly

and another 56%, 20% was contributed by education, 8% by Building and Communication and remaining 16% was fetched by other taxes, fees etc.

The total expenditure of the Zilla Parishad for 1966-67 was nearly Rs. 476 lakhs. On an average the Zilla Parishad has spent Rs. 49 per head of rural population to which it is affording the benefits of development.

The following table gives the percentages of total expenditure/Heads of expenditure for 1965-66 and 1966-67.

Thus during 1966-67 it is observed that there is an increase in the expenditure on "General Administration" and "Education". But for other heads except for "Medical and Public health" and "Social welfare" there is decrease in the percentage of expenditure as compared to 1965-66.

10.2 There were 1085 Village Panchayats in the district. During the year 1966-67, 54 new Village Panchayats were established. The total income of V.Ps. has been decreased during 1966-67 and it was Rs.32 Lakhs as against Rs.34 Lakhs in 1965-66. The expenditure of Rs.32 lakhs was made by V.Ps. during 1966-67. This shows the financial position of V.Ps. whose main source of income was Govt. grants which has been reduced considerably during the year.

It is observed that the expenditure on "administration", "welfare" and "sanitation" and health" has increased. But the expenditure on public works which is the main activity of Village Panchayat has decreased during 1966-67 as compared to 1965-66, along with expenditures on "Social and moral promotion".

10.3 The financial position of the 8 municipalities in the district has considerably improved during 1966-67. Their total income was Rs. 51.57 lakhs during 1966-67 as against Rs. 40.76 lakhs during 1965-66. Out of the total of Rs. 62 lakhs, 23% was from Govt. grants, 44% from octroi and other taxes, 7% from municipal properties and remaining 23% from other sources. The total expenditure of Rs. 50 lakhs was incurred by the municipalities during 1966-67 forming - 17% on administration and cost of collection of taxes, 3% on public safety, 30% on public health, 17% on public works, 22% on public instructions and the remaining 21% on other activities.

11. Plan and Community Development.

11.1 The Annual Plan 1966-67 was implemented in the district through district level schemes. A Budget Provision of Rs. 168.51 lakhs was made and the expenditure incurred during the year was of Rs. 167.88 lakhs. Thus 99.62% of the Budget provision was utilised during the year by implementing various district level schemes in "State" and "Local" sectors. The schemes of vital importance were included in various programmes for the year. The progress of schemes under various Heads was as follows:-

Agricultural Programme-

An expenditure of Rs. 88.20 lakhs was incurred on the various schemes under this Head. This expenditure formed 83.20% of Plan provision for this Head. The schemes of agricultural production received a good response, from the cultivators, The Hybrid campaign was a success in the district. As a measure of soil conservation 64,000 acres of area was bunded in the district during 1966-67. Under minor irrigation schemes 25 community wells, were constructed and 14 irrigation wells were deepened by means of boring. In all 8 bandharas and 32 lift irrigation schemes were completed during the year at the cost of Rs. 27.58 lakhs and an additional area of 1800 acres was brought under minor irrigation. One supplementary cattle breeding centre was established and 9 premium bulls were located at different places and 5.60 kms. of forest roads were constructed. In all 1800 acres of plantation of general utility timber, 305 acres of fuel plantation, 200 acres of bamboos and 60 acres of soft wood plantation was made during the year 1966-67.

Co-Operation and Community Development.

The expenditure of this Head of development was Rs. 22.42 lakhs. Out of this Rs. 8.51 lakhs were spent for schemes on cooperation and Rs. 13.91 lakhs were spent on community development projects in 14 Community Development/Block in the district. In all 15.2 kms. of roads were constructed under rural man-power project scheme.

Industry and Mining :-

An amount of Rs. 3 thousand was spent under this Sub-Head. This amount of expenditure was incurred for development of handloom industry in the district.

Transport and communications :-

During the Annual plan 1966-67 Rs. 16.21 lakhs were spent for development of district roads. In the beginning of the year 1966-67 there were 1258.01 kms. of roads which meant 10.78 kms. road length per 100 sq. kms. Four new bridges were constructed during the year.

Social Services :-

The expansion of social services was given a due importance during the Annual plan 1966-67 and an amount of Rs. 40.79 lakhs was spent on it.

In the beginning of the year 251 villages were without Primary Schools. During 1966-67 Primary Schools were opened in 55 villages and 232 teachers were appointed to meet the demand of the primary education in the district. One Polytechnic with capacity of 60 students was established at Yeotmal. Under "Public Health" stress was laid on Malaria eradication programme and Family Planning. During the year 1966-67, Rs. 7.95 lakhs/spent for public health schemes. An amount of Rs. 81 thousand was also spent over various housing schemes. Under village housing scheme 18 houses were constructed and 21 Gaothans were provided with housing sites. For backward class development an amount of Rs. 4.22 lakhs was spent.

12. Prices :-

The prices of almost all the important commodities have increased during the year as compared to previous year. The following table gives the average prices of important commodities for the year 1965 & 1966

Thus it is seen that there is an increase in prices of all the important commodities. It was highest (54%) in the case of oil and least (3%) in the case of Bajra.

13. Miscellaneous :-

13.1 On an average there was one police station for 71 inhabited villages in the district. During 1966,

1673 fewer cases were decided in the district court as compared to previous year. Out of the total cases disposed of there were 71% criminal cases and 29% civil cases. There were 14 permanent cinema theatres and 11 touring talkies in the district. The total seating capacity of permanent theatres was 11,673 and that of touring talkies it was 11,815. There were 30 banking offices located in 8 towns and 9 villages in the district. All the Panchayat Samiti quarters have banking offices. On an average there is one bank for a population of 33,000. The net collection of small savings was Rs. (-) 11.60 lakhs at the end of the year as against Rs. 41.57 lakhs at the end of the previous year, due to heavy withdrawals in N.D. certificates and postal savings. Out of the total demand for 1966-67 for land revenue collection was 94.25%. Wani taluka fetched 99.1% of its total demand. Arrears were highest in Darwaha taluka (10.51%). There are 12 marathi weeklies in the district with no daily news paper. There were in all 42 printing presses in the district at the end of 1966-67.

13.2 General Elections were held in 8 assembly constituencies and one parliamentary constituency, during February, 1967. For Parliamentary Constituency 76.73% of votes were polled. For Assembly Constituencies the percentage of votes polled varied from 81.79 in Pusad Assembly constituency to 65.78% in Ralegaon Assembly Constituency. The average number of votes polled in the Assembly Constituencies was 74.59% of the total votes.

C H A P T E R - III

In this chapter, the progress of development covering the period from the year at the beginning of the third five year plan i.e., 1960-61 and the year 1966-67 has been reviewed by presenting talukawise sectorial trends based on certain indicators of development. Comparative talukawise figures for 1960-61 and 1966-67 (for agricultural activities (1960-61 and 1965-66) have been given to bring out the pace of development. Thus the span is of six years for all the activities except agricultural activities where the span is of five years.

Indicator No.1

Percentage of gross sown area :-

1.1. The following table shows the percentage of gross sown area to net sown area sown for 1960-61 and 1965-66.

It is seen from the above table that the area sown more than once is quite negligible during 1965-66. As compared to 1960-61 there is little increase by 0.18% in the area sown more than once. There is a decrease in the double cropped area in Yeotmal, Kelapur and Wani tahsils during 1965-66 as compared to 1960-61. The percentage of double cropped area was highest in Kelapur tahsil and lowest in Yeotmal tahsil in 1965-66.

Well irrigation is the main source of irrigation and irrigation facilities are very meagre in the district.

Indicator No. 2

Productivity of important crops.

The productivity of the crops is dependent on the equitable distribution of rain as the irrigation facilities which are very meagre in the district.

During the year 1965-66 there is decrease in the productivity of most of the crops as compared to 1960-61 except slight in case of Cotton.

The production of majority of the crops was less as the crops were damaged considerably during the year 1965-66. The production has negligibly increased in case of Cotton only by 10 bales. The decrease in production ranges from 5% in case of groundnut to 81% in case of Bajara. The percentage decrease for other commodities, except Cotton, was between 5% to 81%.

4.1. It is seen that the irrigated area is very small in the district. It was just 0.40% of the net area sown during 1960-61. It has increased to 0.89% during 1965-66. In all the tahsils the irrigated area has been nearly doubled during 1965-66 as compared to 1960-61 except for Kelapur. The increase is due to the increase in the number of irrigation wells and pumping facilities made available to the cultivators. In Pusad tahsil the increase in the irrigated area is remarkable followed by Darwha tahsil which ranks 2nd in this regard while Wani tahsil ranks 5th and the last.

4.2. It is also seen that the area irrigated more than once had increased from 1.88% during 1960-61 to 7.65 during 1965-66. The increase in the gross irrigated area is more significant for Wani and Darwha tahsils. Pusad and Kelapur tahsils have a little increase in the gross irrigated area while Yeotmal tahsil had no increase in area which was irrigated more than once during 1960-61 and 1965-66.

It is seen that nearly 55% of the gross cropped area was under food crops during 1960-61. It is reduced to 52.88% during 1965-66. There is a decline in area under food-crops in every tahsil of the district. During 60-61 Wani tahsil had 61.77% of the gross cropped area under food crops. It has decreased by 2.78% during 1965-66. Darwaha tahsil has more than 50% of its gross cropped area under non-food crops. Generally the tendency of the agriculturist is to grow non-food crops being cash crops.

It is seen that during 1960-61 as high as 89.12% of the gross irrigated area was under food crops. But the percentage has decreased to 80.05% during 1965-66. Irrigated area under food crops is decreasing year after year as the agriculturists are growing more and more non-food crops under irrigation. During 1965-66 Pusad had maximum irrigated area under non-food crops. During 1960-61 Kelapur tahsil had maximum area irrigated under non-food crops. But it has considerably decreased during 1965-66 and has the lowest irrigated area under non-food crops. There is significant increase in the irrigation of the non-food crops for Wani, Yeotmal, Pusad, Darwaha tahsils in the district.

6.1. Agricultural credit which plays an important part in development of agriculture increased considerably from Rs. 108 lakhs during 1960-61 to Rs. 525 lakhs during 1966-67. The increase is nearly five times. Amongst tahsils Pusad tahsil was made available the maximum amount of the agricultural credit to cultivators in 1966-67. The lowest credit was received by the cultivators in Wani tahsil in that year. Considering the cultivators' population in the district, as per 1961 census agricultural credit made available per cultivator during 1966-67 works out to be Rs. 258. There were 613 agricultural credit societies working in the district during 1966-67.

It is seen that the overdues have increased year after year. During 1961-62 the amount of overdues was more than Rs. 5 lakhs and it increased to Rs. 265 lakhs during 1966-67. Darwha tahsil had the maximum amount of overdues and Wani tahsil had the lowest amount of overdues amongst the tahsils in 1966-67. The percentage of recovery worked out 26 for the district as a whole during 1966-67. The highest percentage recovery was made by Yeotmal and Pusad tahsils (29) and the lowest percentage recovery is of Darwha tahsil (23). The agricultural produce marketed through 9 marketing committees in the district was of the value of Rs. 1,750 lakhs during 1966-67.

The average agricultural wage rates have increased from Rs. 1.71 during 1963 to Rs. 2.32 during 1966 for males in the district. In females wage rates also there is an increase from Rs. 0.79 to Rs. 1.09 during that period. The increase in 1966 was of 35% for male wages and 37% in respect of female wage rates as compared to 1963. Among the three centres Kalamb centre had the maximum wage rates for field labour. Ner centre had the lowest wage rates prevailing amongst these three centres.

 It is observed that the agricultural wage rates for other skilled labours as well as other agricultural labours had been increased during 1963 to 1966. The percentage of increase in 1966 over 1963 was of 31.6 for carpenters, 26.7 for blacksmith, and 46.8 for cobblers. Kalamb centre in general had the maximum wage rates during 1966. In case of herdsman there was slight decrease in the wage rates for men in 1966 over 1963. In case of other agricultural labours the increase was of 40.2 % for men and 56.5% in case of women labours.

The livestock population per hectare of cultivable land has decreased from 1.07 in 1961 to 0.98 in 1966. The livestock population per hectare of cultivable land is highest in Wani tahsil and lowest in Kelapur tahsil for 1966. During 1961 it was highest in Pusad tahsil while it was lowest in Kelapur taluka. The decrease is steep in Kelapur tahsil and least in Darwha and Wani tahsils in the district in 1966 over 1961.

As per 1961 livestock census poultry per 100 persons in the district worked out to 41 which sharply decreased to 22 21 during 1966. Amongst tahsils the poultry per hundred persons is highest in Want tahsil while it is lowest in Pusad tahsil. The decrease in poultry was highest in Kelapur tahsil (58%), while it is least in Darwaha and Yeotmal tahsils (43%).

According to 1961 census it is estimated that the district had on an average 189.64 poultry birds as against 129.01 in Vidarbha and 137.40 in Maharashtra. Similarly the district had 1.75 % improved fowls to total number of fowls as against 1.07 % in Vidarbha and 1.69% in Maharashtra. It is also estimated that the number of eggs produced in the district is 47 as against 61 in Vidarbha and 84 in Maharashtra.

As stated earlier the progress of rural electrification is very rapid in the district. At the end of second plan only 1.56 % of the villages were electrified. But during third plan period considerable progress has been made in rural electrification work and 9.82 % of villages in the district were covered upto the end of third five year plan. During the year 1967, 5.33 % of additional villages were electrified to give impetus to the agricultural production in the district. Darwha tahsil had the maximum number of villages electrified (25%) at the end of 1967 but Wani tahsil had just 3.12 % of villages

electrified. The rate of progress is very rapid in Pusa tahsil as there is an increase of 14.16% during the third five year plan while the progress is negligible in Wani tahsil.

It is observed that registration of candidates had decreased during 1966-67 by 23% as compared to 1960-61. Same is the case with the vacancies notified to the Employment Exchange. During 1966-67 only 691 vacancies were notified as against 926 in 1960-61 vacancies notified to the Employment Exchange resulting in a decrease of 25%.

It is observed that during 1960-61 the percentage of vacancies notified to registration done was only 15 and the placements formed only 9 % of registration. This shows that only 59% of vacancies notified were filled in by candidates registered with Employment Exchange. During 1966-67 though the percentage of vacancies notified to registration was the same, the position increased in respect of placements of candidates and the percentage of placements to vacancies notified also increased to 82%. During 1966-67 only 18% of vacancies notified were filled in by recruitment of open market candidates not registered with Employment Exchange as against 41% during 1960-61.

It is seen from the above table that at the end of 1961, 53,416 out-door and 1,084 indoor patients were treated per lakh of population in the district. The indoor patients treated in the hospitals had increased sharply during these years and during the year 1966, 2,330 indoor patients were treated per lakh of population. However, during 1966 the number of out-door patients treated in the hospitals in the district has considerably decreased to 43,115.

The indoor patients treated in Darwha tahsil has been decreased due to conversion of hospital at Darwha into Primary Health Centre.

The growth of primary education in the district during the third five year plan was noteworthy. There were 56 thousand boys attending primary schools during 1960-61, and their number increased to 87 thousand during 1966-67. The increase is of 54% as over 1960-61 position for boys. In case of girls the position is much better.

There were 26,568 girls attending primary schools during 1960-61. At the end of 1966-67 the number has been increased by 84 % and there were 48,856 girls attending primary schools. The increase in the number of primary schools was from 1,158 to 1,629 during the same period 1960-61 to 1966-67.

The facilities for secondary education had greatly increased and high schools were started in remote places in the district for giving an impetus to secondary education. It is observed that the number of boys and girls attending secondary schools was more than double in 1966-67 over 1960-61. There were 13,768 boys and 3,992 girls attending secondary schools during 1960-61. This number has been increased to 27,130 boys and 9,057 girls by the end of 1966-67. There were only 59 secondary schools in 1960-61. The number of secondary schools has increased to 114 by the end of 1966-67 showing an increase of 93% in 1966-67 over 1960-61.

There were 2.2 banking offices in the district serving every 1 lakh of population of the district. The position has improved and now there are 2.7 banking offices per lakh of population at the end of 1966. The increase being of 23% in 1966 over 1961. Yeotmal tahsil had the highest number of banking offices available as it is the district head-quarters. In Kelapur tahsil banking facilities available were lowest where only 2 banks functioned. In Wani tahsil also the increase in banking facilities per lakh of population in 1966 was of 235% over 1961. It is observed that except for Turmeric average prices, the average prices of all other important commodities have increased during 1966 as compared to 1963. The increase is least for average price for of Gur (1%) and highest for average prices of Gram dal (125%). Jowar and Rice was not available in open market and hence the increase for the above commodities are not given. It is seen that average prices of food grains have shot up and in cases they are more than double of what they were during 1963. So also the average prices of other essential commodities such as groundnut oil (135%), meat (66%), dry chillies (78%) plantains (85%), Charcoal (58%), Fire-wood (41%), and washing soap (36%) had increased considerably causing hardships to the people. The average prices of tea increased by 23%, for Supari and Tobacco the increase was of 29% and 13% respectively in 1966 over 1963.

CHAPTER - IV

Due to recession in the national economy the annual plans were visualised in place of usual five year plans. The annual plan 1966-67 was the 1st such plan. The object of this ^{plan} was to utilise the available resources to the maximum possible extent for the schemes of shorter durations of an year.

For Yeotmal District the Budget provision of Rs. 168.51 lakhs was made.

Thus it will be seen that a major portion of the budget was allotted for agricultural programme to boost agricultural productivity in the district by implementation of schemes, such as, soil conservation, Minor irrigation, propagation of improved

agricultural practices, etc. " Social services shared 17.27% of the total budget allotment . Co-operation and community development was allotted 10.38% of the total allotment and Transport and communication received 8.92% of it "Industry and Mining" and "Information & publicity" received accounted for less than 1% of the total allotment.

4.4 Agricultural production.

More than eight lakhs of rupees were spent on schemes relating to agricultural production. These schemes received a good response from the cultivators. The Kharif and rabi campaigns were organised under intensive cultivation programmes, Procurement and distribution of improved high yielding seed was also undertaken, along with distribution of fertilizers, pesticides and fungicides. The Hybrid Jawar campaign was a success in the district. The district got first place in the whole of the state in this campaign. The table below will give an account of actual achievements in the district under different schemes.

4.5. Soil Conservation :-

Due to the fact that the Vidarbha region has limited resources of irrigation the programme of construction of bunds for preservation of soil moisture was undertaken. As a major measure of soil conservation 64,000 acres of area was bunded in the district during the year 1966-67.

4.6. Minor irrigation :-

With the limited irrigation resources, minor irrigation programme is more important in Yeotmal district. During the year under report 25 community wells were constructed at the cost of Rs. 1.40 lakhs and 14 irrigation wells were improved by means of boring.

In all 6 bandhāras were started and an amount of Rs. 10.00 lakhs was spent. In all 34 lift irrigation schemes were completed during the year at the cost of Rs. 17.58 lakhs. An additional area of 1,800 acres was brought under minor irrigation.

4.7. Animal Husbandry :-

During the annual plan 1966-67 construction of two veterinary hospital buildings was undertaken and Rs. 16 thousand were spent during the year. One supplementary cattle breeding centre was established at the cost of Rs. 9 thousand and 8 premium bulls were supplied to the sub-centres. Under the mutton development scheme 4 sheep breeding centres were established.

Under poultry development block, Rs. 1.44 lakhs were spent for establishing 1 breeding centre, 1 food supply depot, and 1 collecting and marketing unit. Loans were granted to 15 poultry keepers.

4.8. Forests :-

The area under forests in the district was 3,08,325 hectares, nearly 24% of the area of the district. The schemes under this sub-head were of the nature of development of forest areas and new plantation of economic utility such as teak, and other utility timber, Bamboos, etc. In all 1,800 acres of plantation of general utility timber, 805 acres of fuel plantation, 200 acres of bamboo plantation and 60 acres of soft wood plantation was carried and maintained. Under the scheme of fodder development 250 acres were developed and a

fencing to 1,180 acres were completed. Nearly 8.60 kms. of forest roads were constructed.

4.9

Fisheries:-

As the new tanks and bandharas are coming up, the inland fisheries can be developed to a great extent. In this district the programme included the supply of pre-requisites to the fishermen and for netting purposes on subsidised rates. One fishermen's society was organised and Rs. 4,000 were spent on the fishery development scheme in the district.

4.10

Warehousing and Marketing :-

Under these schemes 8 marketing societies were assisted with a financial aid of Rs. 27,000/-.

4.11.

2. Co-operation and community development :-

During the five year plans, the cooperative movement in the State has taken a tremendous stride. The cooperative credit societies together with processing and marketing societies were assisted with share capital and loans for expanding agricultural credit. During the annual plan 1966-67 Rs. 8.51 lakhs were spent on "Co-operation". For development of cooperative marketing in the district an amount of Rs. 5.10 lakhs was spent and 6 societies were given share capital, and loans to 20 societies were advanced. 20 godowns were sanctioned for preserving the agricultural produce. On cooperative farming societies Rs. 1.30 lakhs were spent in organising 7 farming societies and in giving loan and subsidy to

other 30 societies in the district.

One consumers cooperative store was established with two primary societies and Rs. 2.11 lakhs were spent on them.

4.12 Under the community development programme the expenditure incurred amounted to Rs. 13.91 lakhs. Various community development schemes were undertaken in the jurisdiction of the 14 community development and 1 tribal development block.

Financial assistance to the local development works programme was given to the tune of Rs. 1.23 lakhs and in all 137 wells were constructed during the year. 7 labour contract societies were assisted with subsidy. In all 15.2 kms. of roads were constructed under the rural man power projects and Rs. 72 thousand were spent on these projects.

4.13.....3. Industry and Mining :-

An amount of Rs. 3,000/- was spent on this head for development of handloom industry. The expenditure was in the form of rebate on the sale of handloom fabrics.

4.14. 4. Transport and communication :-

As the district is not well served with railways, roads have a significant importance in the development of the district. In the beginning of the year there were in all 1,438.01 kms. of roads which meant 10.78 kms. of road per hundred square kms. During the annual plan 1966-67 Rs. 16.21 lakhs were

spent for development of district. Rural roads and 4 bridges were constructed over the district roads for communications throughout the year.

4.15. 5. Social Services :-

The expansion of social services was also given due importance during the plan period.

Rs. 40.79 lakhs were spent during the annual plan 1966-67.

"Under general education" expansion of primary education was given more importance. In the beginning of the year 1966 there were 261 villages without primary schools in the population ranges of 0-400. During the annual plan 232 teachers were appointed. For improvement of science education an amount of Rs. 15,000/- was spent.

One polytechnic with a capacity of 60 students was established at Yeotmal with an expenditure of Rs. 5.46 lakhs.

An amount of Rs. 7.95 lakhs was spent for various schemes of vital importance under public health and Rs. 3.24 lakhs were spent for malaria eradication programme. Family planning programme was given more importance and Rs. 4.58 lakhs were spent for organising camps for vasectomy and tubectomy operations and loop insertions. During the year in all 1,416 operations were performed and 2,759 loop-insertions were made.

Under water supply and drainage schemes an amount of Rs. 16.84 lakhs was spent.

An amount of Rs. 81,000/- was spent over various housing schemes. Under village housing scheme 18 houses were constructed and 21 gaothans were provided with housing sites.

Backward class welfare schemes were given a financial assistance in the form of grant to various institutions run by them to the tune of Rs. 4.22 lakhs.

For labour and labour welfare one technical institute has been established during the year at Yeotmal.

6. Information and Publicity :-

Under these head the schemes of rural broad casting was implemented and an amount of Rs. 23,000/- was spent for installation and maintenance of the community radio sets given to Gram-panchayats.
