I am forwarding herewith a copy of the general questionnaire of the Industrial and Technical Secondary Education Committee, appointed by Government as per Resolution No. 7653 dated 1st May, 1947, for favour of reply at an early date and not later than 25th August, 1947.

The terms of reference of the Committee are as follows :----

To examine and make recommendations on-

 the pace and nature of progress in technical, industrial and vocational training in the Province below the collegiate stage, bearing in mind particularly,
 (a) the prospective needs of the Province,

(b) the increasing requirements of industrial and technical education consequent on the expansion of primary education,

- 2. the locations of the institutions that may be necessary and the courses of study suitable at each,
- 3. the extent and method of financing the scheme of industrial and technical education and in particular the field for Government and private efforts and the methods of grant-in-aid to private institutions.
- 4. methods of recruitment and terms of remuneration of the staff for the institutions,
- 5. desirability of carrying out surveys to determine the needs of industries in the way of technical personn.l, and
- 6. establishment of Local Advisory Committees.

The Committee will welcome any statements of views or suggestions within the field of enquity referred to it. While replying to the questionnaire you may cover the whole of the field or any particular part of it which lies within your special knowledge. The Committee will, however, feel specially grateful if you will give detailed answers to those questions in which you are particularly interested or with which you are specially well acquainted.

Industrial and Technical Secondary Education Committee, Bombay Province.

QUESTIONNAIRE-'A'.

I GENERAL ORGANISATION.

1. Is it desirable that the various Government and private institutions which are imparting technical and vocational training, should be co-ordinated and developed on the basis of a Provincial programme, which in turn, may be based on a National programme.

2. Is it desirable that this programme should take into account :---

(a) the development of general education, vocational selection and guidance, changes in technique and organisation, the existing and future needs of the industry for technical personnel?

(b) the occupational, cultural and moral interests of the industrial workers, the personnel requirements of the employers, the economic and social interests of the community and the economic policy of the country?

3. In order to promote this co-ordination and facilitate this development should there be a Technical Education Council in the Province?

4. If so, would it be adequate to include representatives of :---

(i) General education ?

(ii) Vocational guidance ?

(iii) Technical education ?

(iv) Planning and Economic Policy ?

(v) Organisations of employers and workers ?

II. VOCATIONAL AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION.

5. Is it desirable to provide for all children, on reaching a specified age, an initiation into the occupational life, within the compulsory educational system by developing, the idea of and the taste for manual work, so as to facilitate their future vocational guidance?

6. If so, what should be :--

(a) the importance of manual work in the school curriculum ?

(b) the nature of such work ?

. (c) the age of commencement of the preparatory course ?

 \dots (d) the duration of the course ?

7. (a) Is it desirable in drawing up programmes to avoid any vocational specialisation and that practical work should nevertheless take into account the nature of the principal occupations and industries of the district?

(b) Do you consider that this preparation may be wholly included in the period of compulsory school attendance ?

(i) if the school leaving age is 14 years.

(ii) if the school leaving age is above 14 years.

(c) What should be the nature of the preparation, specially as regards :----

(i) the relation between the theoretical courses and practical work?

(ii) the degree of specialisation ?

(iii) the relation between the preparation and the duration of subsequent vocational training ?

8. (a) Is it desirable that young workers should receive a full-time vocational education before they enter employment? (Please indicate for which classes of workers such education appears desirable to you.)

(b) Is it preferable that young workers who are already in employment should receive a part-time vocational education ? (Please indicate in which branches of activity and for which classes of workers such education appears desirable to you.)

(For purposes of this question, young workers may be taken to include semi-skilled and skilled workers, charge hands, and foremon.) 9. Where vocational training is given before employment, do you consider that :---

(a) performance of practical work should take place under conditions as similar as possible to those of an actual industrial establishment and under the supervision of persons with practical experience of the trade?

(b) periods of training in the schools should be continued with periods of practical work in an industrial establishment?

(c) some economic assistance should be granted to young and meritorious persons attending the courses of training ?

15. In the interest of industrial workers, is it desirable that facilities should be given for transfer from one school or grade, to another, including access to higher technical education at a University or equivalent institution ?

16. Do you consider that measures should be taken to protect future vocational adaptability of industrial workers ?

If so, should these measures in particular :---

(a) aim at developing theoretical knowledge ?

(b) avoid excessive or premature specialisation ?

17. (a) Do you consider that subjects of general and social educational value should be included in all curricula for vocational and technical education of all grades ?

(b) Do you consider that questions connected with domestic science should be included in the curricula for vocational education particularly for women?

18. With regard to supplementary education do you consider it desirable that :---

(a) the educational establishments should be sufficiently near to the industrial establishments, to be accessible to workers in employment?

(b) should the attendance of workers at school, be included in their normal working hours in the works, especially :----

(i) of apprentices ?

(ii) of young workers who enter industry at an early stage, to enable them, to obtain better posts later?

(iii) of adult workers who wish to acquire a definite technical qualification or to extend or improve their technical knowledge?

III. VOCATIONAL EDUCATION FOR WOMEN.

19. (a) Is it desirable that a sufficient number of vocational schools including schools for domestic science, should be established for the occupations in which women and girls are mainly employed 1

(b) what are the main occupations in which women and girls could be employed ?

(c) should the workers of both sexes have equal rights of admission to all other vocational and technical schools, provided that women and girls are not required to undertake work prohibited by law?

IV. CERTIFICATES AND EXCHANGE OF STUDENTS.

... 20. (a) Is it desirable that certificates issued after examination should be co-ordinated and recognised on a National basis ?

(b) Should there be representation of employers in the organisation of examinations ?

21. (a) Should there be a regional and National exchange of students and apprentices on completing their training, to enable them to acquire wider knowledge or experience ?

(b). Do you consider that the organisation of employers and workers should collaborate in such exchanges ?

V. RECEDITMENT AND EXCHANGE OF TEACHERS.

22. (a) With regard to the teachers responsible for theoretical or practical training what should be the method of recruitment :---

(i) for theoretical subjects ?

(ii) for practical subjects ?

(b) What qualifications should be required, particularly in respect of industrial experience and teaching ability, for the various types of service ?

(c) What methods should be used for training teachers, recruited for teaching in technical institutions?

. (d) Among methods of improving qualifications of teachers and of keeping their knowledge upto date, should the following be included ?

(i) establishment of contacts between industrial establishments and teachers,

(ii) courses in educational institutions for individual teachers,

VI. REGIONAL ADVISORY COMMITTEES.

Note.

1. Each unit will accomodate at a time the number of pupils given under each craft. Each centre is expected to work for 6 hours a day for three shifts, at two hours per shift.

2. The head of the centre, the supervisory and other staff required, will depend upon the size and capacity of each centre.

3. Cost of land and buildings will depend upon the accommodation required for offering instruction in a stipulated number of crafts. Approximate floor areas for different kinds of shops are given in APPENDIX-K.

4. The solaries of staff do not include dearness and other allowances and contribution to the Provident Fund. The recurring expenditure has not been computed to include consorvancy charges, pay of watchmen, electricity charges and office contingencies.

5. Each centre will have one central stores section from which all the necessary tools and raw material will be drawn for purposes of instruction and the finished products and tools returned to the stores at the end of the day's work.
