Annual Report

On the working of the Co-operative Societies in the Baroda State for the year 1924-25 ending March 1925.

I. ADMINISTRATION AND TOURING.

- 1. Mr. Sevaklal Dalsukhbhai Parikh continued to hold the Office of the Registrar of Co-operative Societies throughout the year under report.

The other subordinate district staff comprised six Auditors and one temporary Organiser in connection with the Kaliparaj Societies of the Vyara Taluka in the Navsari Division. There was one more temporary Organiser to assist the Registrar in the formation and development of the Co-operative Societies for the consolidation of scattered agricultural holdings.
 - 3 The Honorary Workers in the different Talukas of the State consisted of sixteen Organisers Honorary Organisers. of whom seven belonged to the Baroda District, 5 to the Kadi District, 3 to the Navsari District and one to the Amreli District. These Organisers supplemented the work of the Government staff by starting and organising new Co-operative Societies and by developing those that have already been existing as well as by propagating the principles of co-operation in general. Of these Honorary Organisers Raj Ratna Becharbhai and Messrs. Lalubhai, Taljabhai, Purshotambhai, Hemabhai, Ochhavlal and Jethabhai deserve special mention regarding their useful work. As these gentlemen are expected to work only at their leisure and as the Government staff of Auditors is entirely inadequate to cope with the increased work of auditing and inspecting the societies there has arisen an urgent need for augmenting the number of Auditors in the State.

- 4. The Registrar toured in the districts tor 169 days while his Assistant also travelled for 149 days during the year under report.
 - II. SUMMARY OF THE GENERAL PROGRESS.
- 5. 609 Co-operative Societies were in existence at the commencement of the year to which 105 fresh societies were added during the period under report, bringing the total number of societies in the State to 714, of which 45 societies had to be cancelled because of their hopeless condition. Thus the number of current co-operative societies in the State stood at 669 at the close of the year.
- 6. The following Statement furnishes the bird's eye view of the existing Co-operative Institutions in the State:

It may well be noted that the figures exhibit an alround increase in societies, in their members, in their working capital as well as their reserve funds. There was a clear net rise of 60 societies i.e. 9.8 p.c., excluding the cancelled societies, a net rise of 2,928 members i.e. 15.1 p.c., a net rise of 4,26,941 i.e. 15.2 p.c. in the working capital and a net rise of 64,889 i.e., 15.7 p.c. in the reserve fund. It may also be observed that the average number of members per society as well as the average amount of working capital per society also went up from 31.3 to 33 and from Rs 4,607 to Rs. 4,832 respectively. Thus there was both external expansion as well as internal development and consolidation of the cooperative movement of the State during the year under report.

It will be noticed from the above statement that there has been a rise in the number of members, amounts of deposits, share capital, reserve funds and the total working capital in the case of all Co-operative Banks. As the end of the year under report coincided with the full swing of the cotton season a great portion of the arrears at the end of the year was recovered after the termination of the year. It may well be observed here that the Baroda and Mehsana Central Banks should be controlled by the Co-operative Societies affiliated to them so that they may truly be co-operative in spirit. The Baroda Central Bank is specially advised to make early arrangements for taking more respresentatives of the co-operative societies as Directors in the Board of Management. The Petlad Co-operative Bank is a much younger institution and gives promise of the expansion of its operations in course of The Navsari Co-operative Banking Union was entrusted at its request with the propaganda work in the Navsari District in connection with co-operation. The Institution of the group secretaries was also handed over to this Bank which would exercise all powers of appointment and supervision over group secretaries. The Kodinar Co-operative Banking Union i.e. Co-operative Bank of the pure type is managed by the representatives of the societies in the Its career has been uniformly progressive for which its able and energetic Manager Mr. Samant Virbhan may well be congratulated.

8. Besides the Central Co-operative Banks and Banking

Unions mentioned above the requirements of the co-operative societies in certain parts of the State were met by four other agricultural banks which also ministered to the wants of the individual cultivators. The financial position of these agricultural banks is shown in the following table:—

The Vyara Bank advanced loans to the societies of the Vyara and other Talukas as recommended by the Registrar. Bhadran Bank financed the co-operative societies of Bhadran and Petlad Talukas, while the Amreli Bank ministered to the requirements of the societies of the Amreli District excepting those of the Kodinar Taluka. The Songhad Pedhi that was doing the work of recovering the old arrears only has recently been permitted to advance fresh loans to the societies of the Songhad Taluka. Rs. 1,27,997 in all were loaned by these Agricultural Banks to the co-operative societies, while Rs. 81,523 were advanced to the individual agriculturists during the year under report.

It may be noticed from the above figures that during the year under report there was a net rise of nearly 10 p. c. in the number of agricultural societies barring those that have cancelled. Out of 601 agricultural societies in the State 536 were credit societies, while 65 belonged to the class of noncredit societies. It may further be noted that the consolidation as well as the expansion of the co-operative movement have engaged the attention of the Department.

10. The progress of the agricultural co-operative societies in the State may well be summarised in the following comparative table:—

It will be observed that there was a substantial increase in Societies, members, working capital, reserve funds, deposits, in advances, in repayments while a decrease in the percentage of overdues to total outstandings.

It may be noted from the above figures that seeds, manures etc, comprised the lion's share, household pusposes standing next. Then come payments of old debts and encouragement of trade and arts.

12. The number of agricultural non-credit societies at the termination of the year under report stood at 65. These comprised 2 milk societies, 1 Irrigation society, 36 fodder storage societies, 12 grain storage societies,

12 supply societies and 2 societies for consolidation of scattered agricultural holdings. Of these the society of Sokhada village for the consolidation of scattered agricultural holdings deserves a special mention for its unique work done during

the year under report. Although there is a general consensus of opinion with reference to advisability of the scattered agricultural holdings being consolidated the practical work being of an extremely complicated nature is encircled with a net work of difficulties due to the vested interests and the delicate sentiments of the agriculturists as well as to the variety in the quality and productive capacity of the various fields. This consolidation has been made with the entire consent of the members of the society by voluntary exchanges of the fields. The number of Khatedars that came under the operation of consolidation was 53, the survey numbers being 267 comprising about 780 bighas in all. The total number of blocks of these fields before consolidation was 214, which as the result of consolidation was reduced to 149. The results achieved by this process are as noted below:—

It will be noticed that the average number of blocks per each Khatedar has been reduced by about 30 p. c., while the average number of bighas in each block and the average number of survey numbers in each block have been raised by about 45 and 50 p. c. respectively, as the effect of consolidation. This has doubtless resulted in raising the economic values of lands and in enhancing their productive power, as well as in minimising the numerous inconveniences due to the former scattered condition of the fields. Another novel feature of the year under report was the experiment of storing green fodder in Katcha pits by the SILO system through the agency of the various co-operative fodder storage societies in the state In all about a lac and a half lbs. of green fodder was thus siloed in Katcha pits by about twenty societies. This experiment has been highly instrumental in popularising the silo

system of storing fodder in katcha pits amongst the agriculturists of the State. Over and above the green fodder that was put in siloes 58,200 lbs. of hay were also stored by co-operative fodder storage societies during the year under report. The two milk societies purchased 2,05,294 lbs. of milk from their members and disposed of the same in the City of Baroda at a profit of Rs 1,313.

13. There was a rise in the number of Non-agricultural Societies from 57 to 63 during the year under report. These include 33 Weavers' 8 Chamars', 2 Antyajas Societies as well as three Stores and 17 other Urban socie-

ties including 6 societies for Government servants. District claims most of the weavers' and chamars' societies. 3 Store Societies which are located in Baroda District comprised 1 milk store, 1 library store and one general store. Co-operative milk store at Baroda supplied 1,64,509 lbs. of milk during the period under report against 1,33,835 lbs. in the previous year. Of the other urban societies the two Government servants societies at Baroda have been progressing well, their working Capital being about Rs. 80,000 in all. The Teachers' Society of the Navsari District which has been organised by the energetic Educational Inspector of the Division has also been prosecuting its work satisfactorily, its working capital, deposits, and share capital amounting to Rs. 8,369, Rs. 7,342 and Rs. 1,027 respectively. other Urban Societies the Anyoanya Sahakari Mandali of the Baroda City and the Urban Co-operative Bank at Vaso in Petlad Taluka stand out prominently, their working capital having risen from Rs. 1,78,484 and Rs. 1,63,099 to Rs. 2,01,552 and Rs. 1,84,282 respectively at the termination of the period under report. The Managing Directors of these successful societies deserve to be highly congratulated upon the efficient working of their institutions.

Other items of Cooperative work.

The Kodinar Banking Union supplied pure seeds as well as

ploughshares and other agricultural implements to the members of the co-operative societies in the Kodmar Taluka. The Union also arranged to give a loan of the big pans to the members of the societies for boiling jaggery by the Poona furnace system which has resulted in enhancing the paying capicity of the sugar-cane crop of the Taluka.

It will be observed from the above figures that out of 575 societies that have been classed 519 societies i. e. 90 p. c. may be taken as good while 56 societies i. e. about 10 p. c. may be regarded as bad. It has been the steady policy of the Department to weed out the inefficient and hopelessly bad societies every year.

IV. RESERVE FUND.

The reserve fund of all the societies in the State from Rs. 4,10,959 to Rs. 4,75,848. The following figures supply the information regarding the distribution of these funds between Central, Agricultural, and Non-agricultural Institutions in the State.

The reserve fund of the co-operative institutions steadily goes on increasing from year to year. Some of the societies have already begun to invest their reserve funds in safe outside concerns.

It will be noticed that the net-profits of each class of cooperative institutions show an increase during the year under report. These profits do not include the amounts of interest that may have been due to the rural societies from their members but were not actually recovered from them at the end of the year. They will be counted as profits only when they will be actually paid by the members to the societies.

It will be observed from the above statement that the total amount of gross working capital of all the co-operative institutions in the State rose to Rs. 32,32,578 from Rs. 28,05,637 at the end of the year under report. The owned capital of the movement which comprises its share capital, reserve funds and members' deposits comes to Rs. 12,06,011 i.e. 37.3 p. c of the total working capital. It may be noticed here that the total deposits in societies from members as well as non-members which amounted to Rs. 16,21,568 at the end of the year under report against Rs. 14,42,568 during the previous year denote a steady onward march in their progress. Again the amounts of loans directly advanced by Government to the co-operative societies go on steadily dwindling year by year, because Government loans to be advanced directly to the societies are now scrupulously discouraged excepting in very rare cases calling for special patronage. On the other hand the reserve fund of the societies goes on fattening year by year, testifying to the steady development and the solidarity of the movement of co-operation in general.

VI. DISPUTE AND LITIGATION.

19. Eighty-eight fresh suits were filed in the Registrar's office by 21 societies during the year under report as per section 19 of the Rules under the Co-operative Societies' Act. All the suits were disposed of during the period under report. There were no old suits pending at the beginning of the year, nor any in arrears at the close of the year. The total value of these new suits came to Rs. 21,494-6-4 against Rs. 41,176·0-6 in the previous year.

Besides, the Registrar, his Assistant and various Honorary Organisers in the different Talukas also conducted their inspection of the socie-

ties and assisted them in their development by practical advice and guidance which were highly conducive to the consolidation and co-ordination of their work.

VIII. ACTS, RULES AND BYE-LAWS.

The Government on the lines of the Cooperative Societies' Act The bye-laws of the various co-operative institutions were also from time to time amended so as to meet the progressive requirements of their members.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS.

- 22. Three Co-operative Conferences were held each at Sinor, Kodinar, and Kosamba where several subjects pertaining to practical working of the societies were discussed. The first two conferences were convened by the Co-operative Department, while the third was organised by the Navsari Co-operative Banking Union. Such conferences prove eminently successful for popularising the co-operative move ment and propagating the main principles of co-operation amongst the general public.
- Two classes were held, one at Kodinar in the Amreli District and the other at Kalol in the Secretaries' Training Kadi District for imparting training to class. the secretaries and other members of the co-operative societies. It was arranged to give instructions in the theory and general principles of co operation as well as in accounts and practical working of the co-opera-Too much stress cannot be placed on the tive societies. importance of such co-operative classes, as the successful working of the societies and the general spread of the movement chiefly depend on the efficiency of the leading members of the societies which cannot be secured without their being trained in the co-operative law and practice.

- 24. The existence of old debts of the members of the co-operative societies is a great hin-Liquidation of old drance in the way of successful prosecudebts. tion of the movement. The Baroda Government was graciously pleased to afford to sanction one lac of rupees to be advanced to the Baroda Central Co-operative Bank and to earmark the amount for being utilised towards the liquidation of the previous debts of the members of the co-operative societies. The Government advances the money at 3½ p. c. to the Bank which lends the same at 5 p. c. to the societies. The members of the societies receive loans at 6 p. c. from the societies on the security of their landed property. Almost the whole sanctioned amount has been advanced through the agency of the Baroda Central Cooperative Bank, to the members of the various societies for redemption of their old debts. This amount can, however. touch only a fringe of the complicate question of the debts of the agriculturists, which is a highly pressing problem in the rural economy of our country. The Baroda Government, therefore, appointed a committee consisting of Government Official and Non-official members to deliberate and report on the question of Land Mortgage Bank. Committee has submitted its report which is under the consideration of Government.
 - 25. The "Kheti and Sahakarya Quarterly" publishes various instructive articles bearing on Co-operation and Agriculture. This magazine is intended jointly for Agriculture and Co-operation Departments. A proposal for the publication of a separate quarterly solely for co-operative subjects was submitted to the Government but was not sanctioned.
 - 26. Co-operation is essentially a movement of the people. Unless the leaders of the public carry the torch of Co-operation from village to village, nay from house

to house and enlighten the people with reference to the vast potentialities of the movement, Co-operation can never succeed in securing the general uplift of the people. Besides, as the movement goes on progressing year by year, it should depend less on Government assistance and be more guided and worked by the people. It is, therefore, intended to organise a separate non-official independent body of the leading persons interested in the advancement of Co-operation like the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Institute. Arrangements are already being made to found such an association for the Baroda State and it is earnestly hoped that it will ere-long be duly registered under the Co-operative Societies' Act.

The increase in the number of societies and their members, the steady growth of working The value of Cocapital and the reserve funds and the operation. expansion of the co-operative movement in general both on its credit and non-credit side testify to the progressive development of the movement of co-operation in the State. But the real worth of co-operation can never be accurately gauged by mere figures of deposits or amounts of working capital. The co-operation which does not tend to elevate the moral tone of society is, a faked article. The real value of the co-operative movement is, therefore, centred in the moral and the social elevation of the masses that come under its influence. Thrift, self-help, mutual assistance and organisation which are vitally essential for the building up of a nation form the very watchwords of co-operation.

Short Summary of the Annual Report on the working of the Co-operative Societies in the Baroda State for the year ending 31st March 1925.

- 1. Mr. Sevaklal D. Parikh continued to hold the office of the Registrar of Co-operative Societies throughout the year under report.
- 2. Sixteen honorary organisers were working during the year in the charges separately assigned to each.
- 3. 669 Co-operative societies in all were in existence at the close of the year, their total number of members being 22,069, the total working capital being Rs. 32,32,578 and the total reserve fund amounting to Rs. 4,75,848.
- 4. There were three Central Co-operative Banks and two Co-operative Banking Unions in the whole State to finance co-operative societies, the Baroda Central Co-operative Bank continuing to be the co-operative Banks and Banking Unions there were four Agricultural Banks in the State which advanced loans to the individual agriculturists as well as to the co-operative societies.
- There were in all 601 agricultural co-operative societies at the close of the year under Agricultural and nonreport, of which were credit 536 agricultural societies. societies and 65 non-credit societies. The Agricultural non-credit societies comprised 2 milk societies. 1 irrigation society, 36 fodder storage societies, 12 grain storage societies, 12 supply societies and 2 societies for consolidation of scattered agricultural holdings. There were 63 non-agricultural societies during the year under report, including 33 Weavers', 8 Chamars', 2 Antyajas', 3 Stores and 17 other urban societies. The Department has kept its eye both on the consolidation as well as the expansion of the Co-operative Movement.

- Special feature of the successful attempt at consolidation of scattered agricultural holdings through the co-operative society of the village Sokhada; Taluka Padra of the Baroda District. Another novel and noteworthy feature of the year under report was the experiment of storing green fodder in Katcha pits by silo system through the agency of the various fodder storage co-operative societies in the State. In all about a lac and a half lbs. of green fodder was siloed in Katcha pits by about twenty societies.
- 7. Two classes to train the secretaries and other leaders of the co-operative societies were held-one at Kodinar and the other at Kalol during the year under report.
- 8. Three Co-operative Conferences were held each at Sinor, Kodinar and Kosamba where several subjects pertaining to practical working of the societies were discussed. Such Conferences prove eminently successful for popularising the co-operative movement and propagating the main principles of co-operation amongst the general public.
- 9. The increase in the number of societies and their numbers, the steady growth of working capital and the reserve funds and the expansion of the co-operative movement in general both on its credit and non-credit side testify to the progressive development of the movement of co-operation in the State. The real value of the co-operative movement is centred in the moral and social elevation of the masses that come under its influence. Thrift, self-help, mutual assistance and organisation which are vitally essential for the building up of a nation form the very watchwords of co-operation.

Review

ON THE REPORT OF THE

Co-operative Soiceties for the year 1924--25 ending 31st March 1925.

- 1. Mr. Sevaklal D. Parikh held the Office of the Registrar of Co-operative Societies during the year under report.
- 2. The number of Co-operative Societies rose to 669 from 609 existing at the close of the preceding year with an increase of Rs. 4,26,941 in the working capital and of Rs. 64,889 in the reserve funds as compared with Rs. 28,05,637 and Rs. 4,10,959 respectively of the last year.
- 3. It is gratifying to observe that there is a steady rise in the reserve Funds of all the societies which testifies to their able management and sound investments.
- 4. The Co-operative Banks and Banking Unions and the Agricultural Banks continued their work as usual.
- 5. It is satisfactory to note that the Department has given proper care and attention on the consolidation and expansion of the co-operative movement in the Raj. The successful activities of the Department regarding the consolidation of scattered agricultural holdings through the co-operative society of Sokhada and of encouragement of storing the green fodder in Katcha pits by silo system deserve the praise of Government. About a lac and half lbs. of green fodder was siloed during the year under report.

- 6. The net profits of the Central and Agricultural institutions increased from Rs. 14,834 and Rs. 50,890 to Rs. 15,453 and Rs. 58,068 respectively and those of the non-agricultural institutions rose from Rs. 12,754 to Rs. 14,736. The expenses of the Central Co-operative Societies were greater during the year under report. On the whole, the figures of expenses for the agricultural and non-agricultural institutions show an appreciative decrease than those of the preceding year.
- 7. The facts revealed by the table of resources point to the steady progress of the co-operative society in general.
- 8. In spite of the increase in the number of suits filed under the Co-operative Societies' Act, during the year under report there was a considerable decrease in the amount of the value of the suits.
- 9. It is gratifying to note that the Department has in mind the gist of co-operative movement which is entirely a movement of the people and by the people. The organisation of a body like the Baroda Co-operative Institute which the Department has in view will prove the utility and usefulness of co-operation on the above principle.
- 10. Thanks of His Highness' Government are due to

 Mr. Sevaklal for the useful work that
 he has been doing and for his efficient.
 control over the activities of the Department.
