2. Direction.—Sri R. Kasturi Raj Chetty, B.A., B.L., Dip., Edn., continued as Director of Public Instruction during the year under report.

3. Touring and Inspection.—The Director toured for 120 days, visited or inspected 460 institutions and

offices and attended 230 meetings.

4. Statistics.—The statement given below shows the number of Public Institutions, classified according to management and their strength as on 1st March 1947 and 1st March 1948:—

The increase in the number of schools can be largely accounted for by public institutions, whose number increased from 9,871 to 10,484, i.e., by 613 or 62 per cent and the enrolment from 618,438 to 698,704 i.e., by 80,266 or 13.00 per cent as against an increase of 6.2 per cent and 9.99 per cent, respectively, in the previous year. The increase was shared by all grades of institutions. The increase in both institutions and scholars is also due to the taking over of institutions in Civil Area, Bangalore, under the jurisdiction of the Department. The number of private schools increased during the year from 578 to 602 but their strength decreased from 10,014 to 10,001.

On 1st March 1948, 64'46 per cent of the population of school-going age attended institutions, both public and private, as against 57'5 per cent in the previous year. The percentage of boys at school was 89'55 of the male population of school-going age and that of girls was 38'0 of the female population of the schoolgoing age as against 80'44 and 33'3, respectively, in the previous year.

On an average, there was one school for an area of 2.65 square miles and for every 661 persons. One out of every 1.55 of the population of the school-going age was under instruction.

5. Expenditure.—The total expenditure, both direct and indirect including that on the University Education, amounted to Rs. 2,14,97,287 as against Rs. 1,54,33,037 in the previous year and was met from the several sources as indicated below:—

The direct expenditure (i.e., excluding the cost on buildings, direction, inspection, scholarships and equipment) was Rs. 1,49,65,853 and the indirect expenditure Rs. 65,31,434. The total expenditure on Aided Institutions, including Civil Area, was Rs. 23,83,510 of which a sum of Rs. 8,50,340 was contributed from State Funds. The average cost of education per head of population was Rs. 2-14-11 against Rs. 2-2-5 during 1946-47. Of this, a sum of Rs. 2-5-8 as against Rs. 1-13-8 during 1946-47 was met from the State Funds. An expenditure of Rs. 7,67,032 (Rs. 7,55,267) was incurred from State Funds on educational buildings excluding those under University.

6. Secondary Education.—On 1st March 1948, there were 127 High Schools with a total strength of 32,736 pupils as against 112 High Schools with 27,565 pupils in the previous year. The total strength of pupils increased by 5,161 or 18.76 per cent (18.43).

Towards the end of official year 1947-48, sanction was accorded to the opening of six Government High Schools and six Municipal High Schools during the year 1948-49. Permission was also accorded for the first time for the opening of eight District Board High Schools during the year 1948-49.

7. Middle School Education.—There were 617 (570) Middle Schools with a total strength of 97,760 (89,754). The scheme of expansion of Middle School Education was continued and sanction was accorded to the opening of 49 Middle Schools, including conversion of 15 New Type Kannada Middle Schools into pucca Middle Schools, during the year 1948-49. In addition to Middle Schools, there were 467 (418) New Type Middle Schools working during the year.

- 8. Primary Education.—The total number of Lower Primary Schools increased from 8,479 to 8,814 i.e., by 355 and the total enrolment from 427,094 to 459,178, i.e., by 32,084. The scheme of expansion of Primary Education was continued and sanction was accorded to the opening of 400 more Primary Schools during the year 1948-49.
- 9. Adult Education.—There were 83 Adult Night Schools with a total strength of 1,893 pupils as against 79 schools with 2,094 in the previous year. The Mysore State Adult Education Council continued its activities during the year. The Council conducted 4,557 (4,457) classes and the total number of persons under instruction was 93,109 (79,010). One hundred and ninety-six new libraries were started during the year bringing the total number of libraries to 1,812 (1,623). The Vidyapeeta or Rural College at Nanjangud continued its activities during the year.

From the year 1941-42, when the Council started its activities 329,019 persons have been made literate. The Council was in receipt of a grant of Rs. 5 lakks during the year.

10. Special Institutions.—There were two institutions that provided training of the secondary grade and six institutions that provided training of the primary grade. The number of commercial institutions increased from 27 to 31 during the year.

On 1st March 1948, there were 82 (87) Aided Sanskrit and Veda Patasalas. Of the 82 Patasalas, 47 were

Sanskrit Patasalas and 35 were Veda Patasalas.

For the education of the defectives, there were two schools, one for the Deaf and Blind Boys at Mysore and the other for the Deaf Mutes at Bangalore, the strength of the former being 97 and that of the latter 17.

There were 16 Industrial Schools, one Engineering School, one Medical School and five Agricultural Schools.

On 1st March 1948, there were 30 Aided Nursery Schools and two Government Schools as against 29 Aided Schools during the previous year. Sanction was accorded to the continuance of the Nursery School Teachers' Training Section in the Maharani's Training College, Mysore, during 1948-49.

The Basic Training Centre at Huttanahalli was continued for the purpose of training teachers. The first batch of 30 teachers trained at the centre were posted to Basic Schools newly opened. Another batch of 80 teachers were deputed for training at the centre during 1948-49.

11. Women's Education.—There were 20 High Schools for girls with a total strength of 3,592 (3,001). In addition, there were 1,221 girls studying in Boys' High Schools making a total of 4,813 (4,086) girls in High School classes.

The number of Middle Schools for girls was 99 (92). The total number of girls in Middle School classes was 19,609 (18,429). There were 54 New Type Middle Schools for girls with the total enrolment of 7,220 pupils and 4 Upper Primary Schools with 580 pupils.

There were 474 (453) Lower Primary Schools with a strength of 44,198 (42,540). Besides, there were 1,02,840 girls studying in the Boys' Lower Primary Schools.

12. Education of Europeans and Anglo-Indians.—There were six institutions for the education of Europeans and Anglo-Indians in the State (excluding Civil Area) with a strength of 1,587 (979). The number of Europeans and Anglo-Indians on the rolls was 526. In addition, there were 122 pupils of these communities studying in the general schools in the State.

13. Education of Muslims.—On 1st March 1948, there were 1,174 separate institutions for the education of the Muslim boys and girls with the total enrolment of 62,282 (59,463). Of the 62,282 pupils in Urdu Schools, 62,239 were Muslims and 43 Non-Muslims. Besides, there were 12,367 pupils studying in general schools making a total of 74,606 (exclusive of the pupils in the schools in Civil Area).

14. Education of Depressed Classes.—Education in all grades is free to these classes and they are exempted from payment of admission, tuition and examination fees also.

There were 450 (426) separate schools for the Depressed classes with a total strength of 16,892 (14,586) pupils. Of these, 11,006 pupils belonged to the Depressed classes. The number of Depressed class boys and girls in the

several grades of institutions was 59,933 (exclusive of the

pupils in the schools in the Civil Area).

There were 49 (46) Hostels and Boarding Homes intended for the boys and girls of the Depressed classes. (If these 11 were Government Hostels and 38 were Aided. Liberal grants are being sanctioned to Aided Hostels, i.e., besides meeting the rent, the establishment and other charges, a grant of Rs. 8 per mensem per boarder is allowed from the year 1948-49.

15. Physical Culture and other General Activities.—
(a) Scout Movement.—The total strength of the movement under the various branches of Scouting was 38,708 as against 36,113 in the previous year.

(b) Physical Culture.—Adequate attention was paid to the Physical Education of the pupils in schools. Satisfactory arrangements were made for group games

and physical drill in schools.

(c) Medical Inspection.—During the year, Medical inspection was in force in all the Government Schools in the cities of Bangalore and Mysore and in 85 Mofussil centres and also in seven Girls' High Schools.

16. Scholarships and Freeships.—A sum of Rs. 2,54,832 was distributed by way of scholarships to pupils studying in High, Middle and New Type Middle Schools and in Oriental Colleges. In addition, 1,732 full free-studentships and 7,353 half free-studentships were awarded in High Schools exclusive of 2,411 full free-studentships enjoyed by scholarship holders.

17. Libraries and Publications.—In addition to Public Libraries in Bangalore and Mysore, there were 49 (52) libraries aided by the Department. There were 31 newspapers in circulation and 79 periodicals published in

the State during the year.

18. General.—The Independence Day Celebration all over the State and in all educational institutions on 15th August 1947 marked a great National event in the history of the State. The Birthday of Mahatma Gandhi, Father of the Nation, on 2nd October 1947 was celebrated in all the educational institutions in the State.

Extension of the scheme of compulsory attendance in the fourth set of nine selected taluks during the year 1948-49 was sanctioned. Sanction was also accorded

to the introduction of Full Compulsory Education in nine District Head-quarter Taluks of the State from July 1948.

To ensure proper and timely supply of furniture to schools sanction was accorded to the opening a Central Wood Workshop during the year. With a view to expedite the construction of school buildings and make the schooling of children effective, the work of construction of Primary School buildings was entrusted to Village Panchayets.

In order to provide the Municipal High Schools with an adequate number of trained teachers, the deputation of 30 teachers, including Head Masters, for training at the Teachers' College, Mysore, was sanctioned to take effect from the year 1948-49. Sanction was also accorded to the starting of a Special Training Centre at Huttanahalli Camp to give an intensive course in pedagogies to 300 teachers.

A movement called "Special Service Camp" was initiated during summer holidays with a view to broaden the outlook of our pupils, enrich and enlarge their experience and to help them to share their advantages with the village folk. It is gratifying to note that there was greater eagerness and enthusiasm among the villagers and good response from the pupils of High Schools and Teachers' Associations.

The work of the Department during the year continued to be satisfactory.

REPORT ON PUBLIC INSTRUCTION IN MYSORE FOR THE YEAR ENDING 30th June 1948.

CHAPTER 1.

IMPORTANT EVENT.

The following is a general summary of the important events during the year under report:—

1. The Birthday of His Highness the Maharaja of Mysore was celebrated in all educational institutions in the State.

- 2. The Independence Day celebration all over the State and in all educational institutions on 15th August 1947 marked a great national event in the history of the State.
- 3. The year also witnessed a political upheaval in the State during the months of September and October and consequently the setting up of Responsible Government on "Vijayadasami Day."

4. The Birthday of Mahatma Gandhi on 2nd October 1947, which was declared a general holiday, was celebrated in all the educational institutions in the State.

5. The sad demise of Mahatma Gandhi, Father of the Nation, on 30th January 1948, was a National mourning and condolence meetings were held all over the State.

6. The XXI Mysore State Olympics for men and women were held in the month of February 1948 as in previous years.

7. The Mysore State Education League held its annual conference at Davangere in the month of February 1948 under the Chairmanship of Sri R. Kasturi Raj Chetty, B.A., B.L., Dip. Edn., Director of Public Instruction, and was opened by the Honourable Minister for Education, Sri D. H. Chandrasekhariah, B.A., LL.B.

High Schools.

1. Twelve Municipal High Schools were opened during the year under report to meet the increased demand of High School education for boys. Four more schools in addition to the above were opened during the year by private agencies and recognition was accorded to them by the Department.

2. Further, six more Municipal High Schools were

permitted to be opened during the year 1948-49.

3. A new departure has been made in the field of High School education in as much as District Boards have also taken up the opening of High Schools under their

management.

4. With a view to afford facilities and to meet the ever growing demand for more High Schools, Government have been pleased to permit the opening of new Government Schools, four for boys and two for girls, during the academic year 1948-49.

5. With a view to broaden the outlook of our pupils, enrich and enlarge their experience, help them to share their advantages with the village folk, a movement called "Social Service Camp" was initiated during summer holidays and it is gratifying to note that there was greater eagerness and enthusiasm among the villagers and good response from the pupils of High Schools and Teachers' Associations. Thirty-eight High Schools and seven Inspectors of Schools organised camps in which 486 pupils and 83 teachers participated.

The teaching of Domestic Science in Government High Schools for girls at (1) Malleswaram, Bangalore City and (2) Mysore has been introduced during the year under report in addition to the existing arrangements in

Vani Vilas Institute, Bangalore.

To popularise the teaching of Domestic Science in all schools for girls and to increase the number of trained teachers in Domestic Arts, four lady teachers were deputed for training in the Lady Irwin College, New Delhi.

With a view to provide the Municipal High Schools with an adequate number of trained teachers, the deputation of 30 teachers including Head Masters for training at the Teachers' College, Mysore, has been sanctioned to take effect from the year 1948-49.

The teaching of Hindi in Government Central High School and Girijamba Mukundadas Girls' High School, Bangalore, was introduced from the year 1948-49. Also the payment of part-time allowance at Rs. 10 per mensem was sanctioned.

Middle Schools.

Thirty-seven Kannada Middle Schools for boys, three Urdu Middle Schools for boys, six Kannada Middle Schools for girls and one Urdu Middle School for girls were opened during the year.

Twenty-three Kannada Middle Schools including two Kannada Schools for girls were ordered to be opened during the year 1948-49.

Further, one Tamil Middle School for girls was sanctioned to be opened at Robertsonpet.

In addition, fifteen New Type Kannada Middle Schools including one for girls, were ordered to be converted into pucca Middle Schools during the year 1948-49.

One hundred and fifty-two additional teachers were sanctioned during the year for meeting the demand of teachers in all general Middle Schools.

And sixty-nine additional teachers with an equipment grant of Rs. 7,300 for opening of higher classes in the Middle Schools started during the year 1946-47 and earlier, were sanctioned during the year.

Revision of scales of pay of the non-graduate teachers of Middle Schools and English teachers of New Type Middle Schools as sanctioned by Government in their G. O. No. Fl. 2010-70—S. & A. 25-47-6, dated 21st September 1947, was given effect to as under:—

- 1. All general teachers and instructors in Practical Instruction classes except Agricultural Instructors:—
 Rs. 40-2-50/E. B. 3-80.
 - Agricultural Instructors:—
 Graduate scale—Rs. 100-8-140-10-200.
 Non-graduate scale—Rs. 55-5-100-10-150.

The lumpsum provision of Rs. 3,000 provided for payment of allowances to part-time teachers for teaching certain optional subjects in Middle Schools was raised to Rs. 6,000.

Government have sanctioned one Agricultural class to be attached to Government Middle School, Gannayakanahalli, Hiriyur Taluk.

A Carpentry class was also sanctioned to be attached to Government Kannada Boys' Middle School, Belur, in Hassan District.

A sum of Rs. 25,000 was sanctioned during the year for providing mid-day lunch to the pupils of Middle Schools.

Government have sanctioned the utilisation of Rs. 50,000 for supply of equipment to Government Middle Schools during 1947-48.

Primary Schools.

In pursuance of the normal annual programme of expansion of primary education, 400 new Primary Schools were ordered to be opened in the several rural parts of the State during the year 1947-48 at a cost of Rs. 1,01,410 per annum recurring and Rs. 60,000 non-recurring.

Eighteen Methodist Mission Primary Schools and two London Mission Primary Schools and one Primary School run by the Labourers' Welfare League, Chamarajapet, were taken over to Government at a total cost of Rs. 25,068 per annum recurring and Rs. 8,950 non-recurring.

Extension of the scheme of compulsory attendance in the third set of nine selected taluks was sanctioned during the year at a cost of Rs 1,51,536 recurring and Rs. 2,52,960 non-recurring.

In connection with the enforcement of the scheme, 23 new Ranges (22 Kannada and one Urdu) were ordered to be opened.

With a view to give greater impetus to the primary education and attendance at school, the scheme of full compulsion was initiated in nine selected hoblis of nine taluks of the State at a cost of Rs. 92,317 recurring and Rs. 1,00,000 non-recurring.

For the successful working of the scheme of full compulsion in the areas during the year 1947-48, certain coercive measures had to be taken and consequently some of the defaulting parents were prosecuted for non-enrolment of their children.

In addition to the scheme of compulsory attendance being made applicable to the fourth set of nine taluks in the State at a cost of Rs. 2,50,919 per annum recurring and Rs. 2,47,620 non-recurring during the year 1948-49, the Government have been pleased to order the introduction of full compulsory education in nine District Headquarter taluks of the State from July 1943 at a cost of Rs. 5,65,256 per annum recurring and Rs 15,52,280 non-recurring. A provision of Rs. 50,000 was provided for mid-day lunch to the pupils of Primary Schools for 1947-48.

Training Institutions.

Government have been pleased to sanction temporarily the scheme of Basic Education in the State and the starting of a basic Training Centre at Huttanahalli at a cost of Rs. 45,062 recurring and Rs. 37,050 non-recurring for the year 1947-48.

The second batch of 80 teachers are under training at the Training Centre and 12 Basic Schools around a compact area of the Centre have been started as an ex-

perimental measure.

The training section for 30 Nursery School teachers as an adjunct to the Maharani's Training College for Women, Mysore, was continued during the year and Government accorded sanction for the training of 30 teachers with a stipend of Rs. 20 for 10 months at a cost of Rs. 8,700 per annum on a three-year basis.

Revision of Scales of Salary, Allowances, etc.

Government have been pleased to order the revision of scales of pay and introduction of uniform scales in both tutorial and ministerial cadres of this Department.

An allowance of Rs. 20 per mensem to teach Telugu in Government High School for Boys in Kolar for a period of three years from the year 1947-48 has been sanctioned.

Government have been pleased to enhance the parttime allowances to Hindi teachers from Rs. 20 to Rs. 30 in High Schools for boys at certain places in the State.

The maximum limit of the rate of Government grant towards Dearness Allowance of the employees of Anded Institutions was enhanced from Rs 5 to Rs. 7-8-0 per head.

Scholarships.

A provision of Rs. 2,54,832 for the award of scholarships to pupils of High, Middle, New Type Middle Schools and in Oriental College, was made as detailed below.—

Over and above these, a provision of Rs. 3,24,000 was made for 1947-48 under "26 Education 10D" "Foreign Scholarships" and seventeen of the scholars who had been selected for higher studies abroad left India during 1947-48.

General.

Government have been pleased to delegate to the District Educational Officers the power of sanctioning one month's advance of pay to officials working under them in case of outbreak of plague.

The existing rates of grants, etc., in the case of the educational institutions in Civil Area, Bangalore, were allowed to continue during the year under report.

The Managing Committees of the Municipal High Schools were empowered to write off the lost or unserviceable articles of furniture, etc., of their schools when the value did not exceed Rs. 100.

The rules laid down in general in the Account Manual of the Government High Schools and Middle Schools were made applicable to Municipal High Schools also.

Government were pleased to direct that the guarantee funds given by the Municipal Councils in connection with the opening of Municipal High Schools be invested in Mysore Government Five-Year Savings Certificates.

The collection of one month's fee for April 1948 in High Schools during the year under report was waived and to make up the loss of fee income, the payment of additional grant equal to one month's fee revenue to all Aided High Schools was sanctioned as a special case.

Additional nine Centres for the S.S.L.C. Examination of April 1948 were sanctioned for the convenience of the

candidates.

The Mysore Riyasat Hindi Prachar Samithi, Basavanagudi, Bangalore City, was allowed a block grant of Rs. 1,000 and a sum of Rs. 5,250 was sanctioned for the Hindi Pracharak Training Vidyalaya for the year 1947-48.

CHAPTER II.

GENERAL STATISTICS.

Schools and Scholars. - On 1st March 1948, there were 11,086 public and private institutions with a total enrolment of 7,08,705 pupils, as against 10,449 schools with 6,28,452 pupils in the previous year. The number of schools increased by 637 or 61 per cent and that of scholars by 80,253 or 12.8 per cent as against 4.9 and 9.7 respectively in the previous year. The increase in both institutions and scholars is also due to the taking over of institutions in Civil Area, Bangalore, to the Department. Thus 146 institutions have come under the jurisdiction of the Department. The percentages of increase of both public and private institutions and scholars for the State excluding Civil Area were 4.7 and 8.8 respectively.

The increase in the number of schools was largely accounted for by public institutions whose number increased from 9,871 to 10,484, i.e., 613 or 6.2 per cent and the enrolment from 6,18,438 to 6,98,704, i.e., by 80,266 or -13 per cent as against an increase of 6'2 per cent and 9.99 per cent respectively in the previous year. The increase was shared by all grades of institutions. The number of private schools increased during the year from 578 to 602 or by 24 but their strength decreased from

10,014 to 10,001 i.e., by 13.

Schools in Civil Area for Boys.

NOTE .—Schools for girls in Civil Area are dealt with in Chapter IX, Education of girls and women.

Consequent on the retrocession of Civil and Military Station, Bangalore, to Mysore Durbar, all educational institutions except the College in Civil Area, have come under the jurisdiction of the Department with effect from July 1947.

There is one First Grade College, viz., St. Joseph's College, Bangalore, with about 500 pupils, affiliated to the University of Madras.

There were 9 High Schools for boys with a total enrolment of 5,646 pupils inclusive of 5 High Schools with a strength of 1,132 pupils meant for European Education. The total number of pupils under instruction in High School classes was 1,274.

There were also 7 pucca Middle and Higher Elementary Schools with an enrolment of 2,375 pupils (670 in Middle School classes and 1,705 in Primary classes), in addition to 9 Middle School sections attached to the above High Schools with a strength of 2,106 pupils, altogether making a total of 2,776 pupils under Middle School Education.

Again, there were 39 pucca Lower Elementary or Primary Schools with a total strength of 7,106 pupils. Added to the above, there were 9 Primary Sections with

a strength of 2,266 pupils attached to the above High Schools and 7 Primary Sections with a strength of 1,705 pupils attached to seven pucca Middle and Higher Elementary Schools thus making a total of 11,077 pupils in Primary classes of the schools for boys.

In all, 15,127 pupils (13,958 boys and 1,169 girls) were under instruction in all the educational institutions for boys in Civil Area. The distribution of the pupils by

1. On 1st March 1948, 64'46 per cent of the population of school-going age attended institutions, both public and private, as against 57'5 per cent in the previous year. The percentage of boys at school was 89'55 of the male population of school-going age and that of girls was 38'0 of the female population of school-going age as against 80'44 and 33'3 respectively in the previous year.

Percentage of Scholars to the total Population.

2. The percentage of boys under instruction to the total male population was 13:43, that of girls to the total female population was 5:69 and that of boys and girls together to the total population was 9:66 an against 12:29, 5:04 and 8:66 respectively in the previous year.

Proportion of Schools and Scholars to Area and Population.

3. On an average, there was one school for an area of 2.65 square miles and for every 661 persons. One out of every 1.55 of the population of the school-going age was under instruction.

Expenditure on Aided Institutions.

The total expenditure on Aided Institutions including Civil Area was Rs. 23,88,510 of which a sum of

Rs. 8,50,340 was contributed from State Funds, Rs. 5,850 from Local Funds, Rs. 7,413 from Municipal Funds, Rs. 7,89,115 from fees and Rs. 7,35,792 from other sources. Of the State grant, a sum of Rs. 11,243 was allotted to Oriental Colleges, Rs. 3,81,566 to High Schools, Rs. 2,08,288 to Middle Schools, Rs. 73,372 to Primary Schools, Rs. 9,863 to Training Schools in Civil Area, Rs. 9,540 to Commercial Schools, Rs. 15,869 to Sanskrit Schools and Rs 91,361 to Buildings and Furniture while the balance was paid to other institutions.

During the year under report, a total expenditure of Rs. 7,67,032 was incurred from State Funds on educational buildings excluding those under University.

Expenditure on Municipal Institutions.

The total expenditure on Municipal Institutions in the State (excluding those in Civil Area) was Rs. 4,34,537 of which a sum of Rs. 87,613 was contributed from State Funds, Rs. 21,566 from Local Funds, Rs. 1,16,428 from Municipal Funds, Rs. 1,91,247 from fees and Rs. 17,683 from other sources

Budget and Outlay.

The sanctioned Budget under "26 Education" provided for an expenditure of Rs. 1,45,05,900 exclusive of the grants to the University and Industrial Schools. Deducting also the allotment of Rs. 8,50,000 for educational buildings, which was transferred to the control of the Public Works Department, the expenditure of which is booked in the Comptroller's accounts, the provision of Rs. 1,45,700 relating to Sri Krishnarajendra Silver Jubilee Technological Institute, and Rs. 63,400 under "9—C. School of Engineering", the accounts of which are included in the Comptroller's Books, the Budget provided for a net grant of Rs. 1,34,46,800 for direct expenditure by the Department. An additional grant of Rs. 10 lakhs was sanctioned during the year. Against the total provision of Rs. 1,44,46,800, the actual expenditure against this provision was Rs. 1,39,06,053 resulting in a saving of Rs. 5,40,747 under minor heads, of which the savings under "Post-War Schemes" amount to Rs. 4,70,683.

It is seen that the District Educational Officer, Mysore, has the largest number of direct charge institutions and offices, viz., 139, while the District Educational Officer, Bangalore City, has 116. The District Educational Officers of Chitaldrug and Tumkur have 92 and 86 direct charge institutions and offices respectively. As regards the inspection work of the heavy districts, it is noticed that the District Educational Officer, Bangalore City District, has inspected 77 institutions and offices, while the District Educational Officer, Mysore, has inspected only 59 institutions and offices. The largest number of institutions left uninspected was in Mysoie District and Bangalore City District. The inspection and touring work of the District Educational Officers was, on the whole, satisfactory.

CHAPTER V.

HIGH SCHOOLS.

Note.—This Chapter deals mainly with the Secondary Education of boys. Secondary Education of girls is dealt with in Chapter IX relating to the Education of Girls and Women.

General.

On 1st March 1948, there were 127 High Schools with a total strength of 32,736 pupils as against 112 High Schools with 27,565 pupils in the previous year. The total strength of pupils increased by 5,171 or 18.76 per cent as against 18.43 per cent in the previous year.

In furtherance of the general policy laid down by the Department, that private enterprise in opening High Schools on a grant-in-aid basis be encouraged as far as possible, six more Municipal High Schools were permitted to be opened during the year 1948-49.

Further progress has been made this year in the field of High School Education as District Boards are also opening High Schools to promote. High School Education in the State. Seven such Schools have been permitted to be started during the year 1948-49 at the following places:—

On 1st March 1948, 27,923 boys and 4,813 girls were studying in High School classes as against 23,479 boys and 4,086 girls in the previous year. The percentage of

increase on the previous year's enrolment for boys and girls was 18'93 and 17'80, respectively. Of the 32,736 pupils in all the High Schools in the State, 13,749 or 42'00 per cent were studying in the I year class, 10,019 or 30'61 per cent in the II year class and 8,968 or 27'39 per cent in the III year class.

High Schools for Boys.

On 1st March 1948, there were 107 High Schools for boys with a total enrolment of 29,144 pupils as against 92 High Schools with 24,564 pupils in the previous year, thus recording an increase of 4,580 pupils. The number of girls in Boys' High Schools is also increasing year by year. There were 1,221 girls in Boys' High Schools on 1st March 1948, as against 1,085 in the previous year.

Of the 107 High Schools for Boys, 19 with a strength of 10,467 were Government Institutions, 56 with 9,490 pupils were Municipal High Schools, 17 with 6,041 pupils were Aided High Schools and 15 with 3,146 were Unaided but Recognised Schools.

(a) Government High Schools for Boys.

In response to the ever growing demand for High School Education, Government have been pleased to sanction the opening of four more Government institutions at the following places during 1948-49:—

Mandya District ... Nagamangala
Tumkur District ... Kortagere.
Chikmagalur District ... Mudigere.
Chitaldrug District ... Molakalmuru.

In the existing 19 Government High Schools, there was an increase in enrolment from 9,700 to 10,467. The average strength per school was 551 as against 511 in the previous year. The average attendance was 88'1 per cent of the total enrolment as against 90'5 per cent in the previous year. The percentage of passes (E.P.S.) for the whole State at the S.S.L.C. Examination of 1948 was 64'8. The results of the Government High School, Chikmagalur, which is far below the State average, cannot be considered satisfactory.

(b) Municipal High Schools for Boys.

On 1st March 1948, there were 56 Municipal High Schools for boys with a total enrolment of 9,490 pupils as against 45* schools with 6,831 pupils in the previous year. The average daily attendance was 82.5 per cent of the number on the rolls as against 88.1 per cent in the previous year. As many as twelve Municipal High Schools were opened during the official year under report bringing the total number of Municipal High Schools to 56.

All Municipal High Schools recorded an increase in their strength. The results of the Municipal High Schools at Davangere, Arsikere, Tarikere, Honnali and Gubbi which were far below the State average cannot be considered satisfactory while the results of the Municipal High Schools at Malur, Malavalli and Chintamani were good.

The rules laid down in general in the Accounts Manual of the Government High and Middle Schools were made applicable to the Municipal High Schools also.

(c) Private High Schools for Boys.

(1) Aided.—The number of Aided High Schools for boys increased from 13 to 17 with a corresponding increase in their total enrolment from 5,242 to 6,041 or by 799. The average daily attendance was 86.74 per cent of the total number on the rolls. Seshadripuram High School and Acharya Patasala High School, Bangalore, recorded a slight fall in strength. The results of Bangalore High School and National High School were very good.

2. Unaided.—The number of Unaided High Schools for boys remained the same as 15 while their enrolment increased from 2,791 to 3,146 or by 355. The average daily attendance was 89.4 as against 92.8 per cent in the previous year. It is gratifying to note that 1,880 pupils (1,676 in High Schools of the State and 204 in High Schools of the Civil Area, have distinguished themselves in tournaments. With the recent appointment of a Superintendent for Physical Culture it is hoped that due prominence will be given to Physical Education in the State.

Hostels, Boarding Homes and Orphanages.

On 1st March 1948, there were 193 Hostels, Boarding Homes and Orphanages against 187 in the previous year. Of these, 12 Hostels (nine for men and three for women) were attached to University Colleges, 11 (4 for boys and 7 for girls) were attached to schools in Civil Area. Of the remaining 14 Hostels (12 for boys and 2 for girls) were Government, 151 (140 for boys and 11 for girls) were Aided and 5 for boys were Unaided.

CHAPTER VI.

MIDDLE SCHOOLS.

The Middle School Education in the State follows a primary course of four years and is of four years' duration. The following are the subjects taught in these schools:— Boys. --

- (1) First language—English.
- (11) Second language—Kannada, Urdu, Tamil, Telugu or English.
- (iii) Elementary Mathematics.
- (iv) History and Geography, and
- (v) One of the following .-
 - (a) Hygiene.(b) Sanskrit.

 - (c) Persian.
 - under Practical (d) One of the subjects included Instruction.
 - (e) Kannada for Muslim candidates, and
 - (f) Hindi.

(i) to (iv) Same as for boys. In addition to the above Domestic Economy and Needle work and Music have also been provided for girls.

There is a Public Examination at the end of the Middle School course, after passing which, a pupil becomes eligible for admission to a High School. The Public Examination is not compulsory in the case of girls who

can take the Middle School Leaving Certificate Annual Examination conducted by the school and on passing it, join the High School course.

General.

On 1st March 1948, there were 617 Middle Schools both for boys and girls with a total strength of 97,760 as against 570 schools with 89,754 pupils in the previous year. The number of schools increased by 47 or 8.25 per cent and of pupils by 8,006 or 9.11 per cent as against 8.8 and 11.3 per cent, respectively, in the previous year. The average number of pupils per school was 158 as against 157 in the previous year. Of the 97,760 pupils in all the Middle Schools in the State, 30,547 or 31.25 per cent were in the I year class, 24,485 or 25.04 per cent in the III year class, 21,016 or 21.50 per cent in the III year class, and 21,712 or 22.21 per cent in the IV year class.

It can be seen from the above statement that 23,881 pupils (19,159 and 4,722 girls) or 20.1 per cent of the scholars receiving Middle School Education are in the Middle School classes attached to the New Type Middle Schools.

Of the 22,611 pupils studying in the I year class of Middle Schools during 1944-45, 21,712 or 96.04 per cent were studying in the IV year class during the year 1947-48. Wastage at the Middle School level recorded a large decrease during the year, viz., from 8.03 to 3.96 which goes to show that the tendency on the part of the pupils joining the Middle Schools to complete the course is growing stronger. Of the 27,806 pupils who were studying in the I year class in 1946-47, 24,485 pupils or 88 per cent continued their studies in the II year class during 1947-48

Schools and Scholars.

On 1st March 1948, there were 518 Middle Schools for boys with a total enrolment of 82,456 pupils as against 478 schools with 75,201 pupils in the previous year. The number of schools increased by 40 inclusive of three of the schools sanctioned in the previous year or 84 per cent and of scholars by 7,255 or 9.64. These 40 Middle Schools are exclusive of 23 New Type Middle Schools for boys sanctioned for 1947-48 which were converted into pucca Middle Schools subsequent to 1st March 1948 with effect from the beginning of the school year 1948-49. There were 4,589 girls studying in Boys' Middle Schools as against 4,134 in the previous year. The following statement shows the number of Middle Schools for boys classified according to managements and languages and the distribution of scholars in these institutions by classes.

It is evident that 481 schools with a total strength of 73,665 were Government Institutions as against 441 with 66,758 in the previous year. Thirty-one with 8,070 pupils as compared to 27 schools with 7,428 in the previous year were Aided Schools and 6 with 721 pupils were Unaided but Recognised Schools as against 10 with 1,017 in the previour year. Classified according to languages, 453 with the strength of 75,652 were Kannada Middle Schools as against 416 with 69,184 pupils in the previous year, 57 with 5,174 pupils as against 54 with 4.912 pupils were Urdu Middle Schools, 6 with 1,441 pupils were Tamil Middle Schools as against 7 with 1,035 pupils during last year. The decrease by one is due to the fall in the number of Unaided Middle Schools and two with 189 pupils were English Middle Schools as compared with one English Middle School with a strength of 70 pupils during the past year.

The increase in the number of Middle Schools mostly relates to Government ones and of these 37 are Kannada Middle Schools and three are Urdu Schools. The number of Unaided Middle Schools have since been reduced by conversion of four of them into Aided Middle Schools thus raising the total of Aided Middle Schools to 31.

In pursuance of the normal annual programme of expansion of Middle School Education, 55 Kannada Boys' Middle Schools including conversion of 21 New Type Middle Schools into pucca Middle Schools and 5 Urdu Boys' Middle Schools including two such conversions were started during the year. One hundred and fifty-two additional teachers were sanctioned on a permanent basis for meeting the demand for additional staff in Middle Schools in general during the year under report. Sixtynine additional teachers were also sanctioned together with an equipment grant of Rs. 7,300 for starting the next higher classes in the New Middle Schools opened during 1946-47 and earlier.

It will be seen from the above that on an average here was one Middle School for boys for every 56.84 square miles and one for every 982 boys of school-going age as against 61.1 square miles and one for every 1,055 boys of schoolgoing age in the previous year. The average number of pupils per school was 159 as against 138 in the previous Judged from the proportion of schools to areas, Bangalore City District, Mandya, Bangalore and Mysore Districts are better served on the average, than Chitaldrug, Shimoga and Chikmagalur Districts. Judged from the number of schools to male population of school-going age, the position of Chikmagalur, Shimoga; Mandya, Bangalore City and Tumkur Districts is better than that of Bangalore, Kolar, Chitaldrug, Hassan and Mysore Districts There are the fewest number of pupils per school in Chikinagalur District, while the average perschool in Baugalore City District is the largest.

New Type Middle Schools

The scheme of starting of New Type Middle Schools was continued. There were 471 schools working during the year with a total strength of 60,378 pupils as against 426 schools with 53,314 pupils in the previous year. Of these, 23,881 pupils were receiving Middle School education in the New Type Middle Schools attached to Primary Schools as against 18,866 in the previous year.

The number of New Type Middle Schools for boys was 413 with a total enrolment of 52,378 as against 366 schools with 45,797 pupils in the previous year and of these schools except one school, all others are Government Institutions. Classified by languages, 359 with 47,242 pupils are Kannada Schools, 53 with 4,852 pupils are Urdu Schools and one with 464 pupils is Tamil School. Of the total enrolment of 52,578 pupils in New Type Middle Schools, 21,485 pupils were studying in the Middle School classes.

Most of the Middle Schools have buildings of their own, but their strength has in general out-grown the accommodation. Classes were generally over-crowded particularly in towns. The opening of a large number of Middle Schools and the inadequacy of accommodation and necessary equipment acted as a set back to the progress of schools. Attempts were, however, made to meet the needs of the schools to the extent possible.

Results of the Middle School Examination.

Twenty-six thousand eight hundredand sixty-one candidates registered for the Middle School Examination of 1948, of whom 26,521 took the Examination and 19,783 passed, the percentage of passes being 74.5 an against 66.7 in the previous year. The details are given below:—

Practical Instruction Classes.

The number of Practical Instruction classes attached to Government High and Middle Schools in the State increased from 64 to 70. These Practical Instruction classes were distributed as follows:—

Two in Government High Schools at Tumkur and Davangere, 59 in Government Middle Schools in the State and the remaining in other institutions. The total number of scholars attending Practical Instruction classes was 3,371, of whom 102 were girls. In addition to the above, instruction in Spinning and Weaving was also provided in the twelve Basic Primary Schools started during the year under report.

From the above statement it can be seen that boys in larger numbers next only to Agriculture are receiving instruction in Tailoring and Carpentry while among women there is a greater tendency towards Agriculture, Tailoring and Needle Work than towards other avocations.

Among the avocations provided in these classes, greater interest is being shown in instruction in Agriculture, seeing that as many as 1,314 pupils are attending these classes of whom 36 are girls.

CHAPTER VII.

PRIMARY EDUCATION.

NOTE.—This Chapter deals mainly with the Primary Education of Boys. Information relating to Girls' Primary Schools is given in Chapter IX.

There are two grades of Primary Schools in the State, Lower and Upper. The course in the Lower Primary Schools is one of four years, at the completion of which a pupil is eligible for admission to a Middle School. There is no public examination at the end of the course. The Upper Primary School has two classes (classes V and VI) in addition to the four classes of the Lower Primary grade in which all the subjects for the Middle School course except English are taught, the medium of instruction being the mother-tongue of the pupil. There is a Public Examination at the end of the Upper Primary course. Pupils passing the Upper Primary Examination may join the Vernacular Teachers' Training School in which a three-year course is provided and after passing a Public Examination held at the completion of that course, become eligible for appointment as teachers in Primary Schools. Pupils passing the Upper Primary Examination may also join Middle Schools and after studying only English for two years take the Middle School Examination. There has been lately a growing demand for the teaching of English in rural areas also. In response to this demand, most of the Upper Primary Schools have been converted into Middle Schools of the new or rural type and wherever necessary Primary Schools are developed into Middle Schools of this type. Primary Schools as a distinct type are almost extinct.

General.

On 1st March 1918, there were 467 New Type Middle Schools and 4 Upper Primary Schools with the total enrolment of 60,378 as against 418 New Type Middle Schools and 8 Upper Primary Schools with 53,314 pupils in the previous year. The average enrolment per school was 128 as against 125 in the previous year.

The total number of Lower Primary Schools increased from 8,479 to 8,814, i.e., by 325 and the total enrolment from 4,27,094 to 4,59,178, i.e., 33,084 or 7.5 per cent as against 96 in the previous year. The average number of pupils per school was 52 as against 50 in the previous

year.

The total number of pupils of all communities in the first four classes of Primary Schools in the State was 4,95,364 (3,37,156 boys and 1,58,208 girls) as against 4,63,420 (3,18,090 boys and 1,45,330 girls) in the previous year. The total number of pupils in the V and VI year classes of Upper Primary Schools increased during the year from 216 (103 boys and 113 girls) to 311 (146 boys and 165 girls). Most of the Upper Primary Schools have been converted into New Type Middle Schools.

Although the programme of expansion of primary education in the State envisaged in the Final Report of the Committee for Elementary Education and approved by Government was for opening of 1,000 Primary Schools in a period of four years at 250 schools per annum beginning with 1941-42, it was found necessary to maintain expansion at even a more accelerated rate to meet the growing demand for more Primary Schools and consequently new Primary Schools are being sanctioned to rural areas at 400 schools per annum from the year 1944-45. Four hundred such schools were ordered to be opened during the year 1948-49 at an estimated cost of Rs. 2,20,417 per annum recurring and Rs. 60,000 non-recurring.

It can be seen from the above statement, that of the total number of 2,06,350 pupils studying in the Primary I year class during 1944-45, only 57,362 pupils were in the IV year class in 1947-48. The dimunition between the classes was 1,48,988, i.e., the wastage of incidence was 72'2 per cent against 72'5 per cent in the previous year. Again, out of the total number of 2,06,350 pupils in the I year class during 1944-45, only 90,695 pupils went up to the II year class during 1945-46. The incidence of stagnation and leakage was 1,15,655 or 56'04 per cent. It is thus seen that the leakage from the I year to the II year and from the I year to IV year continued to increase upto 1946 47 and slight fall in the percentage between I and II and I and IV is noticed in the year under report.

COMPULSORY EDUCATION.

This slight fall in the percentage of wastage was due to the enforcement of full compulsion in the nine selected hoblis of the State at a cost of Rs. 92,317 per annum recurring and Rs. 1,00,000 non-recurring in addition to the operation of the Compulsory Attendance Scheme in the third set of taluks in the State during the year under report. With the enforcement of full compulsion in the nine District Headquarter taluks of the State during the year 1948-49 and its application progressively to one taluk in each District year by year so as to bring the whole State within the scope of its operation within a period of ten years, it is hoped that the incidence of wastage that is now prevalent in Primary Schools will practically disappear.

COERCIVE MEASURES TAKEN.

For successful implementation of the scheme of full compulsion in the selected places of the State, it became necessary to take certain coercive measures against the defaulting parents or guardians of the children in such areas. The institution of these measures resulted in the issue of warning notices to defaulting parents and even prosecutions in some cases.

(A) NEW TYPE MIDDLE SCHOOLS FOR BOYS.

On 1st March 1948, there were 413 New Type Middle Schools for boys with a total enrolment of 52,578 pupils as against 366 schools with 45,797 pupils in the previous year. Of the 52,578 pupils, 41,673 were boys and 10,905 were girls. The average enrolment per school was 127 as against 125 in the previous year. The average daily attendance was 37,946 as against 37,329 in the previous year.

Thus it is seen that there were 359 Kannada New Type Middle Schools with 47,242 pupils, 53 Urdu New Type Middle Schools with 4,852 pupils and one Tamil New Type Middle School with 484 pupils.

LOWER PRIMARY SCHOOLS FOR BOYS.

The number of Lower Primary Schools for Boys increased from 8,026 to 8,340, i.e., by 314 with a corresponding increase in their enrolment from 3,81 554 to 4,84,980, i.e., by 30,426. The average strength per school was 50 as against 48 in the previous year. The increase in the number of schools was mostly due to the opening of new Government Schools under the expansion scheme.

Out of 1,38,554 boys studying in the I year class during 1944-45, only 41,859 or 30°21 per cent continued their studies in the IV year class during 1947-48. The wastage for boys in Primary Schools was 69°79 per cent as against 69°1 per cent in the previous year. Again, out of 1,38,554 boys studying in the I year class in 1944-45, only 63,826 continued their studies in the II year class during 1945-46. The drop from I year to II year is 74,728 or 53°93 per cent. The number of girls studying in Boys' Lower Primary Schools increased during the year from 92,447 to 1,02,840, i.e., by 10,393.

From the above, it can be seen that out of 7,712 Government Primary Schools for the boys and girls, only 1,729 schools were held in suitable type design Government buildings, 1,138 in suitable Katcha Government buildings and 582 in suitable rented buildings and 2,314 in temples, chavadis and rent-free buildings.

Out of 1,489 Aided Schools for boys and girls inclusive of four Upper Primary Schools, 92 schools were held in suitable new type design buildings, 290 in suitable katcha buildings and 33 in rented buildings and 691 in temples, chavadis and rent-free buildings.

Out of a total number of 8,340 Lower Primary Schools for boys with a strength of 4,14,761 pupils, 4,804 schools with an enrolment of 1,49,367 pupils were single-teacher schools while 129 schools with an enrolment of 4,639 pupils were single-teacher schools for girls out of a total of 474 schools with a strength of 44,198 pupils. Again, 772 single-teacher schools were in charge of trained teachers.

With a view to overcome the paucity of trained teachers, a Special Teachers' Training Centre has since been started at Huttanahalli where nearly 300 Primary School teachers are receiving training as an emergency. measure. Sanction of additional teachers to diminish the number of single-teacher schools is receiving the attention of the Department.

Village Indigenous School.

The number of this class of schools increased from 576 to 602 but their strength decreased slightly from 10,014 to 10,001 during the year under report. These schools neither conform to departmental control nor inspection. They are generally opened by private persons and they do not belong to the educational organisation of the State.

Adult Night School,

On 1st Macrh 1948, there were 83 Adult Night Schools with a total strength of 1,893 pupils as against 79 schools with 2,094 in the previous year. Of these, 53 were Kannada Schools with 1,178 pupils as against 51 with 1,319 in the previous year, 26 were Urdu Schools with 589 pupils and one Arabic School with 126 pupils as against 25 with 650 and three with 125 respectively in the previous year.

Adult Education.

The Mysore State Adult Education Council continued its activities during the year under report. Four thousand five hundred and fifty-seven literacy classes were started including 337 classes for women and 591 classes for persons belonging to the Depressed Classes as against 4,457 in the previous year. Of these, 261 were Urdu classes, 27 were Tamil classes and all the rest were Kannada classes. The total number of persons under instruction

was 93,109 as against 79,010 of last year. The number of persons who passed the literacy test this year was 34,327 as against 20,416 last year.

Rural Libraries.

One hundred and ninety-six new Libraries were started during the year under report and distributed among the Districts of the State as follows thus bringing the total number of libraries to 1,812 in the State for the year ended with 30th June 1948:—

Vidyapeetha.

This institution is the first of its kind in the State started to train persons for leadership and vocational training in Cottage Industries like Weaving, Threadmaking in addition to general education. It has also become a centre to train up workers for Adult Education. The one Vidyapeetha or Rural College at Nanjangud continued its activities during the year under report. The first batch of eight students received their certificates after the completion of the five months' course. The second batch of eleven students commenced their studies in March 1948.

The activities of the institution included excursion to historic places and visits to industrial centres of the State. The second batch of students also completed their training at the institution. Again ten selected supervisors of the Adult Education Council were deputed for training at this institution for a period of three months. The training consisted of instruction in Village Rural Reconstruction and Village Sanitation, etc.

The proposal of starting a similar institution at Hassan could not be accomplished during the year and it is hoped that with the acquisition of a plot of land of 14 acres generously donated by Dr. B. A. Sampath of Hassan, the College would soon materialise. It is also gratifying to note that the idea of starting such Colleges is becoming popular in rural areas.

General.

From the year 1941-42, when the Council started its activities, 3,29,019 persons have been made literate. The Government grant of Rs. 5 lakhs to the Council was continued during the year under report.

A. Training Institution for Teachers.

The course of training for graduate teachers leading to the B.T. Degree is provided by the University in the Teachers' College, Mysore. Twenty-five graduate teachers from Government Schools and 5 from Municipal and Aided High Schools were deputed for training in the B.T. Class at Government cost during the year.

The training courses provided by this Department are of two grades, viz., the Secondary and the Elementary. The tormer is intended for teachers in Middle Schools and is of one year's duration. The minimum general educational qualification prescribed for admission to this course is a pass in the S.S.L.C. Examination. The course is followed by a Public Examination in two parts, viz., Theory and Practice. The other course is for teachers in Primary Schools and it is of three year's duration. minimum general educational qualification for admission to this course is a pass in the Upper Primary Examination, the medium of instruction being Kannada or Urdu. During the first two years of this course, the content of instruction is mainly general and during the third year it Two Public Examinations are held, one is professional. at the end of the second year and the other at the end of the third year.

As in the previous year, there were two institutions that provided training of the Secondary grade, viz., the Government Training College for Men and the Government Training College for Women, both at Mysore. There were six institutions that provided training of the primary grades, viz.—

- 1. The Training College for Men, Mysore.
- 2. The District Normal School, Bangalore.
- 3. Do do Tumkui,
- 4. Do do Shimoga-
- 5. The Maharani's Training College for Women, Mysore.
- 6. The Zenana Normal School, Mysore.

Of the 583 students in the several Training Institutions for men, 565 were men and 18 women. Most of them were teachers in Government Primary and Middle Schools deputed by the Department for training at Government cost. Fifty-seven men and 10 women teachers were deputed for the Secondary Grade of training by the management of Aided Schools. Of the private students many were in receipt of stipends from Government.

B. Commercial Institutions.

The institutions providing Commercial Education in the State are all under private management. The number of Commercial Institutions increased from 27 to 31 during the year under report and their strength increased from 1,745 to 2,052. Of the 31 institutions, 19 were Aided and 12 Unaided.

The Inspector of Commercial Schools toured for 88 days and inspected all the 31 Commercial Schools and also the Commerce classes attached to 33 High Schools in the State.

C. Sanskrit Schools.

On 1st March 1948, there were 82 Aided Sanskrit and Veda Patasalas with the strength of 2,080 pupils as against 87 institutions with 2,431 pupils in the previous year. The apparent fall in the strength is due to the fact that Siddaganga College was since made a direct charge institution in January 1948 and the strength of pupils in the Primary, Middle and High School classes of that institution has been accordingly excluded from the calculation.

Of the 82 Patasalas, 47 with the strength of 1,267 pupils were Sanskrit Patasalas as against 49 with 1,497 pupils in the previous year and 35 with 813 pupils as against 38 with 934 pupils were Veda Pasasalas. The classification of pupils in the Sanskrit and Veda Patasalas according to communities is given below.—

In addition, 5,026 boys and 661 girls were studying Sanskrit in general schools. Of the pupils numbering about 985, who studied and offered Sanskrit as their optional subjects for the Middle School Examination of 1948, 89 per cent passed in Sanskrit as against 90 per cent in the previous year.

The Inspector of Sanskrit Schools toured for 151 days and inspected 82 institutions (26 Sanskrit Patasalas, 16 Veda Patasalas and 40 Middle Schools) excluding the Sanskrit Colleges at Siddaganga which was made a direct

charge institution from January 1948.

Of the 49 Sanskrit Patasalas including the institutions at Siddaganga and Melkote aided by Government 2 were of the Collegiate grade, 7 were of the Secondary grade and 40 of the primary grade. The Collegiate and Secondary grade institutions maintained also the primary section. The institutions at Siddaganga, Belur, Tiptur, Birur and K. S. S. Patasala, Mysore have a Vedic Section also and they were in receipt of independent grants from the Muzrai Department. Of the 35 institutions aided by the Muzrai Department, 5 were Veerasaiva Veda Patasalas, 1 Jaina Veda Patasala, I Tajaka Jyothisha Patasala. 1 Divya Prabhandha Patasala, 1 Purana Service, and the rest were ordinary Veda Patasalas teaching only Prayoga The work of the Sanskrit Patasalas was satisportions. factory.

D. 1. The School for deaf and Blind boys, Mysore.

Rajasevaprasakta Sri N. Rama Rao, B.A., B.L., continued as the President of the Committee of Management till he resigned on 11th July 1947. The Committee of Management could not meet to transact business for want of a President. Dr. A. M. Natesh, M.A., A.M.E.D., Dip., in Edn., continued as the Superintendent of the school till 3rd June 1948 when he handed over his charge to Sri T. C. Venkatarangam Pillai on his deputation to United States of America for higher studies. Sri L. Thimmiah succeeded Sri T. C. Venkatarangam Pillai on 28th June 1948 and continued for the rest of the year.

On 1st March 1948, there were 57 blind pupils and 40 deaf pupils studying in this school as against 59 blind and 48 deaf pupils in the provious year.

and 48 deaf pupils in the previous year.

Students have been regrouped according to their individual abilities and attainments. Middle Shool classes

which had been started in the Blind Section are being continued. Industries like Carpentry, Tailoring, Printing and Binding in the industrial Section of the school continued to be provided during the year. Other industries like Rattan weaving and Thablak thread-making taught.

Music continues to be very popular amongst the blind boys, and provision was also made for the teaching of Violin. Of the four candidates, two passed the Music Examination of 1948 in the Junior grade while out of the three candidates appearing for Senior grade examination, only one was successful.

There were 18 pupils receiving instruction in the workshop attached to the institution as in the previous year. Weaving and Tablak thread-making continued to be the important industries in the workshop. Sanction was accorded during the year for starting the following

industries :—

- 1. Handloom Weaving.
- 2. Tapes and Shoe laces.

Attempts are being made to reorganise the school from point of view of both curricular and extra-curricular activities and installation of two power looms is also expected to be completed shortly.

The total cost of articles manufactured was Rs. 1,045 and a sum of Rs. 1,821 was paid as wages to the blind and deaf workers besides Rs. 415 as Dearness allowance.

2. The Municipal Schools for the Deaf and Mutes, Bangalore.

This institution is supported by public subscription and a grant from the local Municipality. The strength of the school was 17, of whom 9 were boys and 8 girls.

E. 1. INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

During the year under report, there were 16 Industrial Schools with the total enrolment of 1,840 pupils (1,694 boys and 146 girls) as against 15 schools with 1,750 pupils (1,669 boys and 81 girls) in the previous year. These schools continued to be under the control of the Director of Industries and Commerce.

2. Engineering School.

On 1st March 1948, the school had an enrolment of 531 pupils as against 402 pupils in the previous year.

The school gave instruction in Civil, Mechanical and Electrical Engineering. This institution continued to be under the control of the Mysore University.

3. Agricultural Schools.

In addition to the Agricultural College at Hebbal, Bangalore, there were 5 Agricultural Schools with the total enrolment of 125 pupils including one girl student as against 4 schools with 97 pupils in the previous year and the institutions continued to be under the control of the Director of Agriculture.

4. Medical School.

On 1st March 1948, the school had an enrolment of 256 pupils as against 235 pupils in the previous, year and this institution continued to be under the control of the Mysore University.

F. NURSERY SCHOOLS.

Dr. Maria Montessori to whom the Nursery School Movement owes a great debt says of the little child that the period between 3 and 6 is the most important period of his age "at which time he forms and establishes his principal functions".

The emphasis laid by the present day psychologists upon the importance of these early formative years has caused a great number of educationists to turn their attention to the "Pre-School Child" and it is being realised that there must be a good and educative environment for the child during the early years.

The movement had been gaining importance during the recent years. It is also gratifying to note that there is a marked enthusiasm for the opening of a greater number of such schools.

• On 1st March 1948, there were 30 Nursery Schools all Aided and 2 Government Schools with a total strength of 1,674 (828 boys 846 girls) as against 29 with a strength of 1,620 (808 boys and 812 girls) in the previous year.

The Government had been pleased to liberalise the rules of grant-in-aid to the Nursery Schools A lumpsum provision of Rs. 2,000 per annum for fresh Nursery Schools run by private agencies was also made during 1947-84 and Rs. 2,766 for the year 1948-49.

The continuance of the Nursery School Teachers' Training Section in the Maharani's Training College,

Mysore was approved at an estimated cost of Rs. 8,770 per annum during 1948-49.

G. Basic Training Centre, Huttanahalli.

This is the first Basic Education Institution of the Wardha Type started by the Education Department in Mysore State. This institution was established mainly for the purpose of training teachers, for being sent to Basic Schools to be started in the State.

The first batch of 50 teachers trained in the Basic Training Centre were experienced teachers, who had already had 3 years of training in general principles and methods of education and who were given an intensive short-time training course extending over a period of about six months. During this period they were also given substantial training in Spinning and Gardening as well as in the idealogy and methodology of Basic Education and Child Psychology with special reference to the formulation and development of schemes of correlated studies and were posted to 12 Basic Schools newly opened in the State around the Training Centre during the year under report.

Another batch of 80 teachers have been deputed for training at the Basic Centre, Huttanahalli during the year 1948-49.

There is also a practising Basic School attached to this Training Centre. The school has an enrolment of 69 children as against 56 in the previous year, distributed over the Prebasic classes-I and II. The children have cotton and gardening crafts provided for them and They practice Card-board work leading to Wood-work. craft for nearly three hours a day and the rest of the time is devoted to Music, Drawing and Art, Physical Education and Drill work and general subjects. Mid-day lunch is provided for the children. Health education is a special feature of their school work. Excursions and nature rambles form an essential part of their weekly time-tables, thus finding ample scope for the three Centres of correlation, viz., Craft, Nature and Society being exploited for practice teaching. The children have their training in Citizenship too. The whole class is treated as a "House of Assembly" electing its own health, assembly and class ministers for carrying on their respective duties for their class every month.

CHAPTER IX.

EDUCATION OF GIRLS AND WOMEN.

The number of separate institutions for girls increased during the year from 634 to 662 and their enrolment from 68,742 including 3,167 boys to 72,190 including 2,938 boys. The increase in the number of institutions was mainly due to opening of Girls' Schools by Government where the need for separate institutions was acute due to overcrowding in Boys' School. In addition 1,21,589 girls were studying in Boys' Schools making a total of 1,90,841 girls under instruction in the State (excluding Civil Area) as against 1,74,324 in the previous year, recording an increase of 16,517. Besides, 10,633 girls (1,169 girls in Boys' Institutions and 9,464 in Girls' Institutions) were studying in the schools in Civil Area thus making a grant total of 2,01,474 girls under instruction for the whole State

A. High Schools for Girls.

In the existing 20 High Schools in the State during the year there was an increase in strength from 3,001 In addition, there were 1,221 girls studying in to 3.592. Boys' High Schools in places where no separate Girls' High Schools existed, making a total of 4,813 girls in High School classes as against 4,086 in the previous year, thereby showing an increase of 727 girls. Of the 20 High Schools for girls, 8 with 2,101 pupils were Government Institutions, 12 with 1,491 pupils were Aided High Schools as against 8 with 1,742 pupils and 12 with 1,233 pupils, respectively, in the previous year. The one Unaided High School for girls, viz., Carmel Convent School, Vontikoppal, Mysore was closed from April while a new Aided Institution was opened in Bangalore City by the bifurcation of the girls section attached to Acharya Patasala Boys' High School into a separate school.

There was general increase in strength in all Government Institutions and Aided ones with the exception of London Mission Girls' High School and Mahila Seva Samaja High School which recorded only negligible fall in strength.

The average attendance in Girls' High School was 84'32 per cent while in Boys' High Schools it was 86'17 per cent. The average number of girls per school was 180 as against 150 in the previous year. One thousand, five hundred and seventy-four or 43'82 per cent of the girls were enrolled in the I year class, 1,080 or 30'10 per cent in the II year class and 938 or 26'03 per cent in the III year class.

B. MIDDLE SCHOOLS FOR GIRLS.

On 1st March 1948, there were 99 Middle Schools for girls with the total enrolment of 15,304 as against 92 schools with 14,553 pupils in the previous year. percentage of boys in Girls' Middle Schools was 1'93 as against 1.80 in the previous year while that of girls in Boys' Middle Schools was 5.89 as against 5.81 in the previous year. The total number of girls in Middle Schools for boys and girls during the year was 19,509 as against 18,429 in the previous year. The average number of girls per school was 152 as against 158 in the previous year, whereas the average enrolment in Boys' Middle Schools was 159. In addition to 19,609 girls in all Middle Schools 4,716 girls were also studying in Middle classes attached to New Type Middle Schools thus making a total of 24,325 girls under instruction in all Middle School classes as against 22,143 in the previous year.

Out of 5,219 girls who were studying in the I year class during 1944-45, only 3,901 or 74.74 per cent went up to the IV year class during 1947-48. The incidence of wastage of 25.26 per cent in Middle Schools for girls continued to be very much higher than that of Boys' Schools, but the wastage was reduced during the year from 30.5 to 25.26 per cent.

Of the 99 Middle Schools for girls. 77 with a total strength of 11,581 as against 70 with 10,591 in the previous year, were Government Institutions, 18 with 3,062 as against 19 with 3,296 in the last year, were Aided Schools and 4 with 661 were Unaided but recognised schools as against 3 with 666 in the previous year. Classified according to languages, there were 80 Kannada Middle Schools with 13,481 pupils as against 74 with 12,830 pupils in the previous year, 16 Urdu Middle Schools with 1,499 pupils as against 15 with 1,402 during the past year and 3 were English and Mixed Middle Schools with 324 pupils as against 2 English Middle Schools with 171 pupils in the previous year.

C. NEW TYPE MIDDLE SCHOOLS FOR GIRLS

On 1st March 1948, there were 54 New Type Middle Schools for girls with the total enrolment of 7,220 pupils and 4 Upper Primary Schools for girls with 580 pupils as against 56 New Type Middle Schools with 6,902 pupils and 4 Upper Primary Schools with 596 pupils in the previous year.

Of the total strength, 30 were boys. In addition, 10,905 girls were studying in the Boys' New Type Middle and Upper Primary Schools, making a total of 18,675 in these schools. Of the 10,905 girls, 169 were in IV year, 278 in III year, 649 in II year and 1,224 in the I year classes of the Middle School section attached to the New Type Middle Schools, 880 in IV year, 1,345 in III year, 2,159 in II year, 4 201 in I year classes of the Primary School section. Altogether, the distribution of girls in all the classes of New Type Middle Schools and Upper Primary Schools both for Boys and Girls is shown below:—

The average enrolment in New Type Middle Schools and Upper Primary Schools for girls was 134 as againts 125 in the previous year.

D. LOWER PRIMARY SCHOOLS FOR GIRLS

The number of Lower Primary Schools for girls increased during the year from 453 to 474, i.e., by 21 and their strength from 42,540 to 44,198, i.e., by 1,658. There were 2,618 boys in the Lower Primary Schools for girls as against 2,890 in the previous year. Besides, the number of girls studying in the Boys' Lower Primary Schools increased during the year from 92,447 to 1,02,840 thereby recording an increase of 10,393. The average enrolment in the Lower Primary Schools was 93 per cent as against 94 per cent in the previous year.

Of the 67,796 girls studying in the I year class during 1944-45, only 15,503 or 22'87 per cent continued their studies in the IV year class during 1947-48. The incidence of stagnation and wastage was 77'13 as against 79'25 in the previous year. Again, out of 67,796 girls in the I year class during 1944-45, only 26,869 or 39'63 per cent continued their studies in the II year class during 1945-46. The drop in enrolment in II year class was 60'37 per cent as against 57'5 in the previous year. Wastage and stagnation in Girls' Schools is higher by 7'34 per cent than that of Boys' Schools.

The Vocational Institute for Women, Mysore.

The strength of the school was 49 on 1st March 1948 as against 44 in the previous year. All the thirty seats allotted for free boarding were filled up during the year. The work of the two sections of the Institute, viz., the Tailoring Section and the Fancy Work Section was fairly satisfactory. The strength of the day scholars and paying boarders has also increased. Out of 23 students that appeared for the examination in Needle Work and Embroidery, 15 passed as against 11 passed out of 17 students that appeared in the previous year. The general condition of the Institute was satisfactory.

Schools in Civil Area for Girls.

The number of schools for girls in Civil Area was 38 with a total enrolment of 10,091 pupils (627 boys and 9,464 girls) during the year under report. Of these, 29 schools with a stiength of 7,962 pupils were Indian Schools while 9 schools with a total strength of 2,129 were for the education of European girls. Of the 29 schools, 4 with a strength of 2,740 were High Schools, 17 with 3,108 were Higher Elementary or Middle Schools and 8 with an enrolment of 1,855 were Lower Elementary or Primary Schools. Out of 9 European Schools, 4 with a strength of 1,268 pupils were High Schools, 4 with 622 and 1 with 239 were Higher and Lower Elementary Schools, respectively. In addition 1,169 girls were studying in Boys' Schools of Civil Area, making a total of 10,633 under instruction in Schools of Civil Area.

Hostels, Boarding Homes and Orphanages for Women

On 1st March 1948, there were 23 Hostels, Boarding Homes and Orphanages meant exclusively for women. There were 1,162 boarders in these Hostels. Of the Hostels, 3 with 154 were attached to University Colleges, 2 with 83 were Government and 18 with 945 were Aided Hostels including 7 with 552 attached to Schools in Civil Area.

Expenditure on Women's Education.

The total direct expenditure on Women's Education of all grades including the University was Rs. 21,29,732 and it was met from the following sources:—

CHAPTER X.

EDUCATION OF EUROPEANS AND ANGLO-INDIANS.

The number of institutions for the education of Europeans and Anglo-Indians in the State excluding Civil Area, Bangalore, remained the same as in the previous year, viz., 6, but the strength increased from 979 to 1,587. The number of Europeans and Anglo-Indians on the rolls was 526. The number of institutions for the education of Europeans in Civil Area was 18 with a total strength of 3,718 (1,902 boys and 1,816 girls). Of these, 5 with 1,132 were Boys' High Schools, 4 with 1,268 were Girls' High Schools, 2 with 302 and 4 with 622 were Middle or Higher Elementary Schools for boys and girls, respectively, while 2 with 155 and 1 with 239 were Lower Elementary or Primary Schools for boys and girls, respectively. The number of Europeans and Anglo-Indians in these schools was 2,395 (1,179 boys and 1,216 girls) while the rest belonged to other castes. Thus the total number of European and Anglo-Indian scholars in all the schools in the State was 2,921 (1,453 boys and 1,468 girls). CHAPTER XI.

Education of Muslims.

On 1st March 1948, the number of separate institutions for the education of Muslim boys and girls remained the same as in the previous year, viz., 1,174 but the enrolment increased from 59,463 to 62,282. The average enrolment in an Urdu Middle School was 914 and in a Primary School 504 as against 971 and 458 respectively in the previous year. Of the 62,282 pupils in Urdu Schools, 62,239 were Muslims and 43 Non-Muslims.

Besides, 16,245 (13,502 boys and 2,743 girls) inclusive of 3,878 pupils (2,521 boys and 1,357 girls) in the Schools of Civil Area, were studying in other general schools, making a total of 78,484 Muslim pupils under instruction as against 70,652 in the previous year. Of these, 48,132 were boys and 30,352 girls.

The total number of Muslims studying in the University and in the several grades of schools recorded an increase.

1. Training Schools for Muslim Teachers.

The number of Training Schools for Muslim teachers was two as in the previous year, viz., (1) the Urdu Section of the Training College, Mysore, and (2)the Zenana Normal School, Mysore for Muslim women teachers, The former had a strength of 87 and the latter 64.

2 Urdu Middle Schools for Boys.

There were 57 Urdu Middle Schools for boys with the total strength of 5,174 students, of whom 19 were non-Muslims as against 54 schools with 4,912 including 25 non-Muslims in the previous year. The total number of boys in Middle School classes including those in general Middle Schools was 6,069 as against 5,798 in the previous year.

3. Urdu Middle Schools for Girls.

The number of Urdu Middle Schools for girls increased from 15 to 16 and their strength from 1,402 to 1,499, of whom one girl belonged to general caste. Besides these, 270 Muslim girls were studying in the Urdu Middle Schools for boys and 35 in general Middle Schools. There were thus 1,803 Muslim girls in Middle School classes as against 1,720 in the previous year.

The total number of Muslim pupils studying in the Middle Schools in the State was 7,872 (6,069 boys and 1,803 girls) as against 7,518 (5.798 boys and 1,720 girls) in the previous year. The increase in the enrolment of boys was by 47 per cent and that of girls by 50. Out of the total Middle School enrolment of 97,760, the number of Muslim pupils was 7,872 the percentage being 805 as against 83 in the previous year. The distribution of pupils in the several classes of the Middle Schools reveals that the incidence of wastage between classes still continues to be higher.

4. Urdu New Type Middle Schools.

There were 53 New Type Middle Schools including Upper Primary Schools for boys with the total strength of 4,852 pupils and 30 New Type Middle Schools for girls including Upper Primary Schools with 2,960 pupils. Besides, 771 Muslim boys and 79 Muslim girls were studying in general New Type Middle Schools.

5. Urdu Lower Primary Schools for Boys.

There were 811 Urdu Lower Primary Schools for boys with the total enrolment of 34,545 as against 829 schools inclusive of 28 Adult Night Schools with a strength of 775 pupils with 33,622 pupils in the previous year. There was an all round increase of 10 schools during the year with a corresponding increase in strength by 1,698 in Government Urdu Schools. Of these, 9,093 were Muslim girls and 21 pupils of other communities. The total number of Muslim boys in Lower Primary Schools including those in Lower Primary Schools for girls was

25,604 and in general schools was 5,608 making a total of 31,212 boys as against 29,295 in the previous year.

6. Urdu Lower Primary Schools for Girls.

The number of Urdu Lower Primary Schools for girls increased from 192 to 264 and the strength from 12,656 to 13,038. The total number of Muslim girls in Lower Primary Schools was 22,699 as against 21,924 in the previous year.

Of the 24,213 pupils in the I year Primary class during 1944-45 only 5,928 or 23.12 per cent were in the IV year class during 1947-48. The percentage of wastage was 75.52 as against 76.88 in the previous year. In the case of girls, out of the total number of 11,209 studying in the I year Primary class during 1944-45 only 2,616 or 23.34 per cent were in the IV year class during 1947-48, whereas it was 25.47 per cent in the case of boys. The incidence of wastage continued to be higher in the case of girls than in that of boys and in the case of all the pupils in Urdu Schools than in that of other schools.

The total expenditure on institutions maintained exclusively for the pupils of the Muslim community was Rs. 10,76,998 or 5.01 per cent of the total expenditure on Education. The direct expenditure on Middle Schools, Primary Schools and Training Institutions meant exclusively for the pupils of the Muslim community was

Rs. 8,93,093 or 5.97 per cent of the total direct expenditure on all such institutions including those for the Muslims.

CHAPTER XII.

EDUCATION OF DEPRESSED CLASSES.

Education in all grades is free to those classes and they are exempted from payment of admission, tuition and examination fees also. Further exemption is allowed to deserving pupils studying in High and Middle Schools from payment of Sports, Reading Room and Medical fees. While they are admitted freely to all general schools, separate schools are also maintained for their benefit wherever necessary.

The Depressed Class Education Advisory Committee consisting of the representatives of these communities and others interested in their educational advancement, with the Director of Public Instruction as Chairman, met twice during the year and considered various subjects brought up by the members or referred to it for opinion by the Department.

Schools and Scholars.

On 1st March 1948, there were 450 separate schools for the Depressed Classes with the total strength of 16,892 pupils as against 426 schools with a total strength of 14,586 pupils in the previous year. While the number of institutions increased by 56 per cent, the strength increased by 15.7 per cent. Of these, 11,006 pupils belonged to the Depressed Classes as against 9,063 in the previous year while the pupils of non-Depressed Classes numbered 5,886. It will be seen from the above that there were 64,760 Depressed Class pupils (49,392 boys and 15,868 girls)

under instruction in the several grades of education as against 47,778 (37,410 boys and 10,368 girls) in the previous year. The number of Depressed Class pupils has therefore increased by 16,982 inclusive of 4,827 pupils of the Depressed Classes, in the various schools in Civil area, Bangalore and the total percentage of increase was 35 5 while the increase for the State excluding Civil area was 25.4. This is a record increase in the number of Depressed Class pupils in the year. The percentage of Depressed Class pupils under instruction to the total population of the community was 4.61.

Hostels and Boarding Homes.

There were 49 Hostels and Boarding Homes intended for the boys and girls of the Depressed Classes as against 46 in the previous year. Of these, 11 were Government Hostels and 38 were Aided. Government sanctioned liberal grants-in-aid to these Aided Hostels. Besides meeting the rent, the establishment and other charges, a grant of Rs. 8 per month per boarder is allowed.

Out of 387 Adikarnatakas and Adidravidas registered for the S.S.L.C. Examination of 1948, 370 sat and 244 passed, the percentage of passes being 65 as against 506 in the previous year. Out of 34 supplementary candidates 23 sat and 20 were declared eligible for College Courses.

CHAPTER XIII.

Physical Culture and other General Activities.

1. The Boy Scouts of Mysore.

Major Y. V K. Moorthy, M.B.B.S., D.T.M., continued to be the Chief Scout Commissioner during the year under report and Sri P. Sıvashankar, B.A., LL.B., continued to work as the Deputy Chief Scout Commissioner.

Sri R. Kasturi Raj Chetty, B.A., B.L., Dip. Edn., Director of Public Instruction, continued as Chairman of the Headquarters Executive Committee, Boy Scouts of Mysore, and presided over the meetings of the Executive Committee.

Sri B. T. Sreenivasa Iyengar, B.A., B.T., continued as General Secretary, Boy Scouts of Mysore, till 5th July 1917 and Sri N. Sreeram, Manager, continued to work as acting General Secretary till the close of the year. He also continued as Secretary of the Headquarters Executive Committee and of the State Scout Council.

2. Twenty-ninth Annual Meeting of the State Scout Council.

The Public Session of the Twenty-ninth Annual meeting of the State Scout Council was presided over by Sri D. H. Chandresekhariah, B.A., LL.B., Minister for Education and Vice-President of the State Scout Council. In connection with the meeting, a Scout Rally was held at the Scout Head-quarters, Bangalore, on 11th June 1948. After review and march-past, the Chief Scout Commissioner, Major Y. V. K. Moorthy, welcomed the Minister and the members of the State Scout Council.

3. District Scout Councils.

All the thirteen District Scout Councils in the State continued to work as usual and have shown good progress not only in strength but also in efficiency. The Head-quarters have great pleasure in recording the satisfactory work done by the councils. Two more councils have been formed, one for the retroceded area (Civil Area, Bangalore) and the other for Davangere as the town is raised to the status of a City.

4. Training Camps.

In addition to three camps held at the Central Training Camp, Dodballapur, 18 training camps were conducted by the various District Scout Councils during the period under report.

Strength and Efficiency.

The total strength of the movement under the various branches of Scouting, as on 15th January 1948, was 38,708 as against 36,113 in the previous year. A high standard of efficiency has been attained by some of the scouts in the Districts of Bangalore City, Tumkur, Mysore and Shimoga.

His Highness the Chief Scout has graciously been pleased to award certificate for scouts who qualify for the

Maharaja Badges.

6. Publications.

In addition to the "Mysore Scout" published by the Headquarters, the publication of the book "Marigala Koogu" also continued for the use of the Cub Packs in the State.

7. Rallies.

Scout Rallies and Boys' camps were held as usual by the District Scout Councils of Bangalore City, Mysore City and Davangere. Along with the Rally, a Conference of Secretaries of all the District Scout Councils in the State was held at Davangere during February 1948 under the Chairmanship of the Chief Scout Commissioner.

The Deputy Chief Scout Commissioner was deputed to attend the Executive Committee of the All-India Boy Scouts Association held at Nagpur during June 1948 when the formation of one Scout Association for the whole of India was considered.

The Girl Guides of Mysore.

The year 1947 opened well for guiding in Mysore State as there was a general spirit of revival of the movement. Schools that had never done guiding before seem to have caught the enthusiasm and started Companies and flocks. To encourage the starting of Guide Companies in schools, an All-State Training was held at Head-quarters from 1st to 15th of March. Fifty to 60 guiders and Patrol Leaders attended the training. The guiders and prospective guiders received specialised training under the All-India Trainer, Miss Chapple.

Another interesting feature of Guiding in the State was the combined Scout and Guide Rally held in Bangalore to celebrate Independence Day. The State Commissioner was present to deliver the Chief Commissioner's message to the Guides. Guides and Blue Birds took a prominent part in the Health Exhibition at Mysore City.

After Retrocession, the Mysore State Girl Guide Association and the Bangalore Assigned Tract Association have merged into one Association with Miss Cotelingam as the State Commissioner and Mrs. Firth, as Deputy State Commissioner.

In January 1948, the All-India Girl Guide Association General Council held its Annual Meeting at Bangalore. Thirty delegates from Bombay, Madras, Jaipur, Bengal, Central Provinces and from States attended the function and were the guests of the State.

A Combined Rally of the Girl Guide Companies and Blue Bird Flocks working in Bangalore (City and Civil Area) was held at the Church of England Zenana Mission Compound on Saturday 22nd February 1948 to celebrate "Thinking Day." Rajakumari L. Desaraj Urs was the Guest of Honour.

C. Physical Culture.

Adequate attention was paid to the Physical Education of the pupils in schools. Satisfactory arrangements were made for group games and physical drill in schools. The lack of playgrounds especially in crowded areas acted as a great handicap in enlarging the sports activities. Arrangements were also made for providing indoor games in some schools.

The Nineteenth Annual Summer School of Physical Education could not be held during the year as Sri A. C. Das was away in London leading a contingent of Sportsmen for the XIV World Olympics.

Grants were paid during this year to the seven institutions which provided courses of Physical Culture training.—

The XXI Mysore State Olympic Games for men and women were held in February 1948. The programme included athletic competitions, weight-lifting and wrestling championships, basket-ball and volley-ball tournaments,

Mid-day Lunch.

A large number of students availed of the benefit of mid-day lunch provided in High and Middle Schools. An enhanced provision of Rs. 50,000 for providing mid-day lunch for pupils of High, Middle and Primary Schools was sanctioned for 1947-48.

D. Medical Inspection of Schools.

Dr. S. Raju Iyengar, L.M.S., L.R.C.P., D.T.S., continued as Chief Medical Inspector of Schools. During the year under report, Medical Inspection was in force in all the Government Schools in the Cities of Bangalore and Mysore and in 85 mofussil centres, in 7 Girls' High Schools and of girls' studying in all the Boys' High Schools. During the year, half-yearly Medical Inspection had been conducted in most of the Nursery Schools.

It is felt that the inspection staff is inadequate in most of the bigger towns and proposals have been sent for the increase of the inspecting staff.

The Chief Medical Inspector of Schools has reported that about 20 per cent of the children examined, suffer from malnutrition and has stressed the need for intensive work in the earlier years of school life. The existing sanitary conditions in Primary Schools calls for considerable improvement. The establishment of better conditions for physically handicapped children, School Clinics and Child Guidance Clinics are some of the important factors which require immediate attention.

CHAPTER XV.

TEXT-BOOK AND SYLLABUS COMMITTEES, LIBRARIES AND PUBLICATIONS.

1. PERSONNEL.

Sri N. S. Venkataram, M. Sc., B.T., continued as the Secretary of the various Text-Book Commuttees, except those relating to Urdu, until the 16th April 1948 when on his transfer as Special Officer, Post-war Development, Sri T. V. Sundaram, B.A., succeeded him.

The total number of committees for selection of textbooks and examination of courses of studies was 18, including five for Urdu, Persian and Arabic.

2. ENCOURAGEMENT TO AUTHORS.

Subventions were paid to authors and editors of books and publishers of Journals out of the provision of Rs 2,500 made under "Encouragement to Authors" during the year under report. Copies of journals and books purchased were distributed among the schools.

3. Encouragement to Sanskrit and Kannada Literature out of the Devaraja Bahadur Charity Fund.

In response to Notification No. D6. of 1946-47, dated 17th July 1946, eleven books, five Kannada manuscripts and one Sanskrit manuscript were received. A Committee was appointed to adjudge the works received in response to the above Notification and recommend award of prizes.

On the recommendation of the Committee at its final meeting on 30th August 1947, prizes were awarded to the following works:—

The prize of Rs. 150 awarded to "Prapanchada - Kathe" by Sri N. Bhadriah has been declined by him on the ground of meagreness of the prize. This amount will be utilised for the award of prizes next year besides the annual allotment of Rs. 700 for the purpose.

4. LIBRARIES.

A. Education Library.

The number of volumes in the Educational Library attached to the Office of the Director of Public Instruction on 30th June 1948 was 4,973 and the number in the Office

Library was 1,997 as against 4,909 and 1,962, respectively in the previous year. The number of books lent out of the library during the year was 738 as against 731 in the previous year. Mr. V. Vedaratna, B.Sc., B.T., an officer of the Department who had been deputed for a year's training in Library Science under Rao Sahib S. R. Ranganathan at Delhi has taken up the re-organisation of the Library.

The number of volumes in the Urdu Section was 1,736 as against 1,725 in the previous year and the number of books lent out during the year was 204.

B. The Public Library, Bangalore.

A grant of Rs. 6,000 was paid to this library during the year. The following is the comparative statement of the Library for the years 1946-47 and 1947-48.

a permanent sum of Rs. 10,000 per annum for the purpose of grant-in-aid to Reading Rooms and Libraries in the State excluding the grants paid to the two Public Libraries at Bangalore and Mysore. Out of this amount, a sum of Rs. 3,000 is reserved for grants to Rural Libraries.

CONCLUDING REMARKS.

With the advent of Responsible Government, Education in the State has received a big push and the year under review has witnessed an intense educational activity unprecedented in the History of Mysore. The educational expenditure which was Rs. 1,54,53,037 when the new Government assumed office, has been stepped up to Rs. 2,14,97,287, i.e., from 15'8 per cent of the total revenue to 21'14 per cent.

In various directions, the present Government has not only accelerated the progress of education but has started the work of consolidation and initiated bold policies. Mysore, no wonder, occupies a unique place in the educational map of India.

Primary Education has progressed considerably. The number of Primary Schools on 1st March 1948 was 8,814 as against 8,479 in the previous year and the total number of pupils in primary schools was 4.9,178 as against 427,094 in the previous year. The Scheme of Compulsory Attendance was extended to the third set of taluks at a cost of Rs. 1,51,536 and recurring Rs. 2,52,860 non-recurring with a view to ensure that all the children of the school-going age are enrolled.

The Middle School Education also registered a marked advance. The number of Middle Schools increased from 570 in 1947 to 617 and enrolment from 89,754 to 97,760. Further, New Type Middle Schools increased from 426 to 471 and the enrolment from 53,314 to 60,378. There was equally remarkable progress in High School education. There were 127 High Schools with a total strength of 32,736 pupils as against 112 High Schools with 27,565 pupils in the previous years. A happy feature of this expansion is the District Boards coming forward to promote High School Education. Seven such schools

were, for the first time, started during the year.

There is a feeling in several quarters that it is time to cry halt to expansion and tackle seriously the problem of consolidation. There is much to be said for this stand. At the same time, the general public awakening as evidenced in the demand for more and more educational facilities has also to be kept in view. The work of consolidation has already begun and our efforts will be directed to make not so much as larger provision but strengthen and improve the schools. And the first step in this direction is the training of the teachers. Special Training Centre has been started at Huttanahally Camp where 300 teachers are undergoing an intensive course in pedagogics. Ninety-five per cent of the teachers in Municipal High Schools are untrained and to save these schools from this unhappy position, the eight-year scheme has been launched. According to this, thirty teachers undergo training each year. It is proposed to start Normal Schools making use of the High School buildings and equipment in the mornings in all District Headquarters where we have not at present Training Schools.

The needs of the schools in respect of equipment and accommodation have to be met in a systematic and comprehensive manner. And the Government, to ensure proper and timely supply of furniture to schools, have sanctioned a Central Wood Workshop this year at a recurring cost of Rs. 55,140 and non-recurring cost of Rs. 2,83,000. And with a view to expedite the construction of school buildings and make the children's schooling effective, Government have entrusted the construction of primary school buildings to Village Panchayets. A sum of Rs. 6,40,000 has been, for this purpose, placed at the disposal of the Panchayets.

Re-organisation of the content of studies needs special attention. With the spread of the Basic Schools, a proper balance between practical activities and literary studies will be maintained. And at the Middle and High School stage there will be scope for diversity of talents to find proper expression and training. It is intended also to provide proper co-ordination between the several stages of education.

In conclusion, I have to record my appreciation of the very strenuous efforts made by all the officers and officials in the Department to keep up the efficiency of the schools. My warm thanks are due to the non-official ladies and gentlemen who co-operated with the Department by serving on its several committees and giving it the benefit of their opinion and counsel. I am thankful also to the generous and public spirited gentlemen who assisted the efforts of the Department by providing or contributing towards the provision of school buildings and furniture or of mid-day meals in school canteens.
