CRITIQUE

- (1) During 1980-81 facilities for education, both at elementary and at secondary level have been expanded. In an effort to provide for a primary school in every revenue estate in the State, 10 new *primary schools were opened. In addition 96 (Primary) Schools were upgraded to Middle level and 174 Middle Schools to high level. Vocatonal education was introduced in 100 High schools.
- (2) A survey revealed that there were 2,451 primary schools in the State which had no building of their own. Though the responsibility for providing school buildings is that of the local community, the Government decided that buildings for these schools should be constructed by the Government in a phased manner. A sum of Rs. 110 lakhs was provided for this purpose and sites for 400 school buildings were transferred to the P.W.D.
- 3. Furniture worth Rs. 7 lakhs was supplied to 1,600 Government Primary Schools in the State. To indicate in school children the habit of reading, libraries were attached with 80 Primary Schools. A District library at Faridkot was also opened during the year under review. Book Extension Counter and 'Own your own library' schemes were introduced in eleven leading colleges in the State in order to provide effective library service to the students and the teachers.
- 4. Science classes were introduced in Government College, Ajnala (District Amritsar) to meet the needs of the students of the area. Arrangements were made in the Colleges of Education for B. Ed. training to 200 additional students belonging to Scheculed Castes. Guidance Bureaus had been opened in 9 Government Colleges in the State in order to equip the students for competitive examinations.
- 5. During the year 1980-81 the work of the Education Department remained satisfactory.
