

REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF DISTRICT LOCAL  
BOARDS IN THE NORTHERN DIVISION  
FOR THE YEAR 1938-39.

*Read* letters from the Collectors in the Northern Division, forwarding with their remarks Reports of the District Local Boards during the year 1938-39.

### 1. Number of Local Boards.

There was no change in the number of District Local Boards but the 33 Taluka Local Boards existing in 1937-38 were under the orders of Government abolished with effect from 1st April 1938 as part of the scheme for the revision of the constitution of the District Local Boards.

### 2. Area and Population.

The area and population of the District Local Boards during the year under report remained the same.

### 3. Constitution.

The constitution of all the District Local Boards in the Division was altered in the following respects :—

(a) The system of nomination was abolished and all seats made elective,

(b) Elective representation consisted of Muslims and non-Muslims, Muslim representation being provided from separate electorates. In the non-Muslim representation seats were reserved for women, Harijans, Backward Tribes and Christians.

The total number of members of the reconstituted Boards was 247 as against 188 of the former Boards.

### 4. Elections.

In the general elections that followed the reconstitution in more than 66 per cent. of the total number of seats there was no contest.

### 5. Meetings.

The total number of meetings held by the out-going and in-coming Boards during the year under report was 63 as against 56. The average percentage of attendance was 83.71 as against 79.7 in the preceding year.

The number of meetings held by the Boards was not less than the number prescribed in section 35(1) of the Bombay Local Boards Act. The Kaira and Surat District Local Boards transacted urgent business by circulation.

Only one meeting in the Surat District proved abortive for want of quorum.

In all 8 meetings were adjourned. Of these one in Ahmedabad was adjourned as a mark of respect to the late President Sardar Diwan Bahadur Motilal T. Shah, and 2 in Kaira for the late Maulana Shaukat Ali and Kamal Pasha.

### 6. Income.

The aggregate income of Local Boards in the Division (excluding opening balance and debt) rose from Rs. 45,34,746 to Rs. 53,57,888. The reasons for increase or decrease in the main sources of revenue are explained below :—

(a) *Local rates.*—The receipts increased from Rs. 7,85,825 to Rs. 9,81,539. The increase was contributed to by all the Districts except Thana and Bombay Suburban District. The main reasons are (1) collection of arrears of Local Fund Cess during the year under report and (2) full collection of the cess of the year.

(b) *Education*.—Receipts rose from Rs. 26,08,544 to Rs. 29,59,908. This was mainly due to larger Government grants for Primary Education and receipt of the share of the Government grant for Primary Education payable to non-local authority municipalities.

(c) *Medical*.—There was an increase of Rs. 17,398 because of more grants from Government for the subsidized medical practitioners and nurses.

(d) *Civil works*.—Receipts increased from Rs. 7,29,328 to Rs. 7,89,843. For the increase the Ahmedabad, Kaira and Broach Districts were responsible.

## 7. Expenditure.

The aggregate expenditure of the Local Boards chargeable to current income increased from Rs. 46,47,359 to Rs. 48,93,935. The increase or decrease under the main heads of expenditure is explained below :

(a) *Administration*.—Expenditure decreased from Rs. 1,58,226 to Rs. 1,43,095 and was due to the abolition of the post of Chief Officer in Ahmedabad, abolition of taluka Local Boards in the case of the Kaira and Thana Districts and less travelling Allowance to members of the Boards.

(b) *Education*.—Expenditure showed an increase from Rs. 28,03,827 to Rs. 30,94,798. This increase was contributed to by all the District Local Boards except Broach. The main reasons were (1) the transfer of schools of non-local authority municipalities to the Boards of Ahmedabad, Panch Mahals, Surat and Thana, (2) to the adjustment of Rs. 28,400 paid to the District School Board, Kaira, in advance from its share of local cess and (3) to the separation in the Bombay Suburban District of the Provident Fund account of School Board employees from the Primary Education Fund Account.

(c) *Medical*.—Expenditure rose from Rs. 3,03,598 to Rs. 3,12,703. The main reasons were the employment of additional nurses and subsidized Medical Practitioners, the opening of new dispensaries and increased expenditure on the purchase of medicines and combating epidemics in Ahmedabad, Kaira, Surat and Bombay Suburban Districts.

(d) *Civil works*.—Expenditure fell from Rs. 12,29,241 to Rs. 12,05,204 and was mainly due to the absence of scarcity conditions in the Panch Mahals and a smaller Government grant, the fact that expenditure was not incurred on new buildings such as had been incurred in Broach and Bombay Suburban Districts and the construction of less original works in Thana.

## 8. Closing balances.

The aggregate balances of all the District Local Boards in the Division amounted to Rs. 14,02,730 as against Rs. 16,29,418 in the preceding year. The fall was shared by the Ahmedabad, Kaira, Panch Mahals, Broach and Surat Boards.

If the balances of District School Boards and Debt Account of the District Local Boards and School Boards are included in the closing balances of the District Local Boards the prescribed minima were everywhere maintained.

## 9. Primary Education.

Marked changes in the sphere of Primary Education were introduced during the year. The administrative Officers and Supervisors of Local Boards were transferred to the Educational Department. A minimum educational qualification was prescribed for membership of School Boards. A District School Building Committee was formed in each district and Government formulated a cheap building scheme.

Another important feature of the year was the transfer of control of primary education in the non-local authority municipal areas to District School Boards.

These changes resulted in an increase by 133 in the number of schools in the Division, the District Local Boards, Ahmedabad, Panch Mahals and Thana being the chief contributors.

The Ahmedabad District Local Board opened 69 reading rooms with the help of a contribution from the District Village Improvement Committee. The District Local Board has sanctioned the opening of 100 Reading Rooms during the current year.

In Kaira District the incomplete school buildings at Nawagam and Boriavi were completed and additions and alterations to 10 more school buildings carried out.

The District Local Board, Panch Mahals, introduced a shift system in some selected schools. Apart from Primary Schools the Board maintains two Special Institutions, viz., two Central Schools one at Muvalia and the other at Ambli. Agricultural bias course has been introduced in both these schools. The Sir Purushottamdas cheap building scheme was accepted by the Board in 1937. In addition to the number of schools maintained by the District Local Board, the Bhil Seva Mandal, the Kelavni Mandal and Missions are conducting 48, 24 and 25 schools respectively.

The Surat District Local Board has only 295 school buildings of its own and has to run 138 schools in rented or rent free buildings. There were 390 Sir Purushottamdas Thakordas libraries. In the interests of Primary Education the District Local Board, Surat, resolved to levy additional Local Fund cess of 3 pies and to use the estimated income of Rs. 40,000 on expanding Primary Education.

In Thana, 23 new schools were opened in villages with populations of 1,000 or over, but some schools had to be closed for want of adequate attendance. Out of the 563 schools only 169 are accommodated in buildings owned by the Board while the rest are in rent free or rented buildings. Government have contributed Rs. 5,000 for the construction of school buildings and the District School Building Committee has resolved to construct 10 school houses.

The District Local Board has introduced the shift system in some villages. Vocational training in 12 vocational classes is being given. The Board conducts two boarding houses for Depressed Classes and one for the Aboriginal Tribes in Mokhada where clothes, books, etc., are given free. In addition each student receives a scholarship. His Excellency the Governor visited the Mokhada Boarding House and saw the facilities given to boys and girls of Aboriginal Tribes.

In Bombay Suburban District the District Local Board has resolved to construct three school buildings.

### 10. Medical and Public Health.

In order to combat malaria the Ahmedabad District Local Board convened a conference of doctors, vaidas and social workers and decided on the distribution of a special Allopathic mixture and special Ayurvedic pills. It is claimed that nearly 75 per cent. of the population has been served in this manner. With the help of the students of the Kadwa Patidar Vidyarthi Bhuwan and the Seth Chimanlal Nagindas Vidya Vihar hostels a three weeks programme of village cleaning was instituted. In this way 8 villages were thoroughly cleaned.

There were stray cases of Cerebro Spinal Meningitis fever in Ahmedabad and its suburbs. The Medical Officer in charge of the Lord Harris Travelling Dispensary gave the necessary help under the direction of the Board.

Precautionary measures were taken by the District Local Board, Kaira, against an outbreak of plague in the Borsad and Thasra Talukas. There were cases of small-pox in some villages but by mass vaccination the disease was kept under control. As an experimental measure the District Local Board made arrangements with Dr. Santuram M. Dave, L.C.P.S., to treat eye-cases free of charge twice a week at the Board's dispensaries at Alindra and Matar. The experiment has proved satisfactory and so the District Local Board has

with Dr. Santuram's co-operation extended the arrangement to the Mahudha Thasra and Ode dispensaries.

With the help of the contribution given by the Thakor of Metral the District Local Board, Panch Mahals, continued the dispensary at Mora, (Taluka Godhra).

An outbreak of cholera occurred at Jhanor (Taluka Broach), Sengpur, Asarma and Samore (Taluka Ankleshwar). Preventive measures were immediately taken and inoculations carried out on a wide scale. Under the orders of the District Magistrate, Broach and Panch Mahals, the Narbada, Kim and Amaravati rivers were closed to fishing as the epidemic had broken out in villages on the banks of the rivers. There were outbreaks of cholera in Mandvi Taluka and Pardi Mahal of Surat District, but the precautionary and preventive measures taken by the Board checked the spread of the disease.

Owing to poor attendance the District Local Board, Thana, had to close two of its Ayurvedic dispensaries. As usual the Board opened anti-malarial dispensaries. Cholera broke out in a number of villages and the Board spent Rs. 4,287 on preventive and precautionary measures.

There was an outbreak of an epidemic of typhoid in Chembur village (Bombay Suburban District) and cholera at Anik and Esar. Here too prompt action was taken. The N. J. Wadia Dispensary at Andheri is to be turned into a hospital and negotiations for the purpose are going on.

### 11. Veterinary Dispensaries.

Two new Veterinary Dispensaries, one at Dhansura in the Ahmedabad district and the other at Palghar in the Thana district were opened.

There were 43 cases of epizootic diseases of cattle in the Surat district. Necessary preventive measures were taken.

### 12. Civil Works.

The following table shows the Government grants to District Local Boards and the amount spent by them from these grants and their own funds on local public works :—

By the appointment of an Engineer, the District Local Board, Ahmedabad, could utilise the major portion of the total grant of Rs. 1,10,867 (including the balance from previous years) leaving a balance of Rs. 7,837. The Andheri-Kurla road was asphalted by the Executive Engineer, Thana Division, out of the grant from the Petrol Fund.

The amount spent from Local Fund appears to be higher than usual. This is so because some Boards have included under this item Government grants for abolition of tolls and also grants for village Approach roads.

### 13. Water Supply.

The following table shows the Government grants to District Local Boards for the improvement of village water supply and the amounts spent by them from these grants and from their own funds :—

As Government did not sanction a grant for village water supply in Precarious tracts and as the special grant for the improvement of village water supply is not conditional on the provision of a certain percentage from local funds there is a decrease of expenditure from local funds for village water supply.

#### 14. Standing and other Committee.

All the District Local Boards appointed Standing Committees. The District Local Board, Ahmedabad, had in addition a Civil Works Committee for preparing projects and checking plans and estimates. It also appointed four Sub-Divisional Committees for supervising the Board's works. In the Kaira District a Dispensary Committee was appointed for every dispensary. Bombay Suburban District also had a Works Committee. In Thana and Bombay Suburban District there were also village Panchayat Committees.

#### 15. Village Panchayats and Village Sanitary Committees.

The total number of village panchayats in the Division remained unaltered except for the establishment of a Village Panchayat at Att in the Surat District.

The Village Panchayats in the Kaira district and the Broach Sub-Division are reported to have shown progress. In particular the case of the village panchayat of Palej may be mentioned. It had a total income of Rs. 11,738 (including an opening balance of Rs. 4,278). It has devoted itself to construction of pucca roads and culverts, lighting and sanitary arrangements and maintains an Ayurvedic Dispensary entirely from its own funds.

The four Village Benches in the Broach Sub-Division disposed of 23 Civil suits and 28 Criminal cases during the year as against 19 Civil suits and 52 Criminal cases in the preceding year. The two Village Benches in the Thana district are also reported to have worked well.

#### 16. Audit of Accounts.

The following are some of the main irregularities brought to notice:—

It was found in the District Local Board, Panch Mahals, that in order to prevent a Government grant from lapsing false bills had been prepared and a stamped receipt obtained from the contractor for money he had not received. There was no actual mis-appropriation as the amount of the bills was kept on hand in the Petty Cash Book and was paid out to the contractor in instalments during the following year. But it should have been apparent to the persons responsible that they were all severally and individually criminally liable in one form or another. As a matter of fact action could not be taken against any of the persons because of a defect in the Local Boards Act.

On the eve of the expiry of its term the Taluka Local Board, North Daskroi, rushed through a transaction for the purchase of certain property on behalf of the Board at a cost of Rs. 84,000. As the transaction was reported to be suspicious inquiries were made and it was found that the President of the Taluka Local Board, North Daskroi, some members and a clerk of the Board could be charged with criminal offences.

Here too no prosecution could be launched because of the provision in the Local Boards Act whereby legal action was not maintainable unless instituted within 3 months of the date of the action complained of.

While making payments on account of work on the Chikhli-Dehgam Road it was detected that fictitious names had been entered in the Muster Roll. Payment was therefore not made to any persons except those who appeared before the Chairman of the Taluka Committee.

Owing to slackness of supervision during the construction of a foot bridge over the Kalu River at Chopri in the Murbad Taluka the contractor did not complete the work within the prescribed time with the result that the bridge was damaged by floods during the monsoon and a loss of Rs. 5,000 suffered by the Board.

The financial position of the District Local Boards, Panch Mahals and Thana, is reported to be unsatisfactory. In the case of the Panch Mahals the average expenditure exceeds the average income during the past three years while in the Thana district the cause is said to be the absence of proper budget foresight.

Other irregularities are of a routine nature such as (1) want of completion certificates, (2) irregular payment of travelling allowance, (3) deviation from sanctioned estimates and (4) purchase of stock without calling for tenders.

### 17. General Remarks.

The year has witnessed notable changes of Government policy. The general elections following on the elimination of all but elected seats resulted in the emergence of an almost entirely new set of members on the Boards, who while giving evidence of zeal and enthusiasm in the discharge of their duties not infrequently lack the experience of the older men who have been displaced.

Another notable change of Government policy related to Village Water Supply and the provision of Village Approach Roads. The grants made by Government were handsome but it is feared that there has been a good deal of misapplication and waste mainly because it was the exception rather than the rule for a District to have a well considered programme and because many Boards in their eagerness to show what could be done budgeted for works which were not strictly necessary and could not be hoped to be completed within the financial year. Government have since altered the procedure for the preparation of the water supply programme and it is hoped that the results will be satisfactory.

Reference has been made earlier in the report to the peculiarity of the existing law relating to the prosecution of members and servants of local boards. It may be emphasised that because of this peculiarity there is never likely to be any prosecution of a member or servant for an offence unless the law is amended, for the period of limitation is so short as to preclude any possibility of planned offences being brought to light until too late.

Apart from the above the working of the Boards in the Division has been satisfactory on the whole and the various Presidents deserve commendation for their labours in the past year. The Collector of Ahmedabad has remarked that a Chief Officer is necessary for the District Local Board, Ahmedabad. The post was abolished in favour of an Engineer. Ahmedabad is not the only district in the Division which lacks a Chief Officer.

*Read* letters from the Collectors in the Central Division, forwarding with their remarks Reports of the District Local Boards during the year 1938-39.

### 1. Number of Local Boards.

There was no change in the number of District Local Boards, i.e. seven only, the Taluka Local Boards being abolished with effect from April 1938.

### 2. Area and Population.

The area and population of the District Local Boards remained the same, viz. 37,162 square miles and 6,059,798 persons respectively.

### 3. Constitution of the Boards.

With the abolition of the Taluka Local Boards with effect from April 1st, 1938, the constitution of the District Local Boards was revised in accordance with Government Notification, General Department, No. 7830/IV-C (I), dated February 15th, 1938. Under the new constitution nominations were dispensed with but separate electorates were retained for the Muhammadans, while for the women, Harijans, Backward Tribes and Indian Christians seats were reserved in the General Constituencies. The total number of members of each District Local Board was as under :—

### 4. Elections.

General elections were held in accordance with the revised constitution during the year under report in all the districts. Information in the prescribed form as regards the elected seats, the number of voters and the number who actually voted is enclosed.

### 5. Meetings.

The total number of meetings held by the District Local Boards was 63 as against 57 held during the previous year.

The average percentage of attendance of the members at the meetings was 83.27 as against 75.53 in the preceding year.

The number of meetings adjourned for want of a quorum and for other reasons was 16 as against 8 during the previous year.

All the boards held the requisite number of meetings prescribed by section 35 (I) of the Act.

There were no flagrant cases of adjournments of meetings as referred to in Government Resolution, General Department, No. 1689/33 of May 7th, 1937.

## 6. Income.

The following statement shows the increases and decreases under each of the main heads of revenue and compared with the preceding year :—

The increases in Satara and Sholapur and decreases in West Khandesh, Nasik and Poona, being negligible, call for no remarks. The decrease in Ahmednagar is due to the encashment of Government securities and utilising the proceeds thereof for the construction of school buildings. In East Khandesh it is due to the fact that the amount of deposit together with interest thereon was kept in deposit as no necessity for taking it for expenditure was felt like the last year.

*Police.*

The decrease of Rs. 27,042 is mainly shared by East Khandesh (Rs. 5,806) and West Khandesh (Rs. 24,313), Ahmednagar and Poona show an increase of Rs. 3,186 and 2,219 respectively. No remark has been offered by the District Local Board, East Khandesh, as the decrease is below 5 per cent. The decrease in West Khandesh is due to the fact that shares of cattle pound receipts transferred to the Taluka Local Boards were shown last year under this head. The increase in Poona is due to the close supervision of cattle pounds while in Ahmednagar it is due to the favourable season of the year and receipt of larger amounts of the Public Conveyance Fund.

*Education.*

The increases are mainly due to the restoration of full Government grants without any cut. The decrease in Satara is under contributions from municipalities and other miscellaneous receipts which is mostly counterbalanced by Government grants. In Nasik it is normal as the share of the Local Fund Cess paid to the District School Board is shown under its proper head of local rates.

#### Miscellaneous.

The decrease of Rs. 3,82,168 is shared by all the districts except Nasik but East Khandesh is mainly responsible by the decrease of Rs. 3,37,835. In East Khandesh it is due to the fact that the District Local Board which had withdrawn last year over Rs. 3 lakhs from the fixed deposits for the pay of the primary teachers did not feel the necessity of withdrawing any fixed deposits for the current expenditure for the year under report. The decrease in all districts is due to the discontinuance of Government grant under " Clerical Establishment ".

The decrease in Ahmednagar is due to the fact that the preceding year was a famine year and a scarcity grant of Rs. 88,857 was received from Government. It is also due to the reduced amount of grant for the abolition of tolls. In East Khandesh reduced receipts of grants under Motor Vehicles Tax Act and income from the sale of trees and grass are the main causes of the decrease. In West Khandesh the decrease is attributable to the water supply and village approach road grants being shown under the head " Suspense Account ". It is also due to the cattle pound share being shown by the abolished Taluka Local Boards in the preceding year under this head. In Satara no substantial grants for specific and famine works were received and hence the decrease. In Nasik, Sholapur and Poona it is due partly to the reduced receipt of Government grants and partly to the undertaking of less original works.

#### Industries.

The increase of Rs. 25,698 is shared by all the districts. The sub-head is newly created. The increase is mainly due to the enforcement of the Weights and Measures Act in all the districts except East Khandesh.

The increase in Ahmednagar and the decreases in West Khandesh and Sholapur are negligible. In East Khandesh the increase is due to the payment of arrears of Land Revenue refundable to the municipalities. In Poona it is due to the refunds of excessive amounts. In Nasik it is partly due to the adjustment of uncashed cheques of the abolished Taluka Local Boards and partly to the refund of the excess grant under the Motor Vehicles Tax Act. The decrease in Satara was due to the fact that no arrears were paid this year to any of the Municipalities.

In Ahmednagar, West Khandesh, Poona and Satara the increases are partly due to the restoration of cuts in the pay of teachers and partly to the increase in the number of primary schools. In Sholapur it is due to the amalgamation of Barsi and Pandharpur municipal schools with the District School Board. No remarks have been offered for the decrease in East Khandesh. In Nasik it is a matter of form inasmuch as expenditure on account of the payment of Local Fund Cess to School Board was directly not shown under this head but was shown on the receipt side under "Local Rates".

There has been a negligible increase and decrease in East Khandesh and Satara respectively. The increase in Ahmednagar is due to the purchase of lands of the defaulters in toll cases. The decrease in West Khandesh is due to the fact that the balance of the abolished Taluka Local Boards and expenditure in connection with the Weights and Measures were debited last year to this head while it is now debited to the proper head. In Nasik it is attributable to the non-payment of grants to the educational and other institutions while in Poona it is due to the reduced expenditure owing to the abolition of the Taluka Local Boards. In Sholapur the Board attributes the decrease to the creation of new sub-head "Industries" for debiting expenditure in connection with the operation of the Weights and Measures Act.

The increase in Ahmednagar is due to the payment of arrears of pay (Rs. 4,700) to the Executive Engineer of the Board in accordance with the decision of the High Court. It is also due to more allotments being placed at the disposal of the Board by Government for provisional works. The decrease in all other districts is due to the reduced expenditure on original works.

### Famine Relief.

There has been a decrease of Rs. 88,857 in Ahmednagar due to the winding up of famine relief works.

### 8. Closing Balances.

The aggregate closing balances of the Boards amounted to Rs. 16,06,099 as against Rs. 14,81,098 in the preceding year. The increase is in Ahmednagar, West Khandesh, Poona and Satara. The following statement shows how much of the closing balances belong to each District Local Board :—

The closing balances are far in excess of the statutory minimum in all the districts except Nasik. In Ahmednagar it is due to large deposits and unspent balances of Government grants for village water supply and local public works. No reasons have been assigned for the excess in East Khandesh but taking into consideration the increasing liabilities of the School Board the excess appears to be reasonable. In West Khandesh balances out of Government grants account for the excess. Poona has given no reasons. In Satara the excess is due to the share of the Local Fund Cess payable to the School Board and large unspent balances of Government grants. Also an amount of Rs. 1,15,538 and Rs. 13,151 remained unspent under Civil Works and Medical. The District Local Board, Sholapur, has given no reason for the excess.

### 9. Primary Education.

In East Khandesh, West Khandesh, Satara and Sholapur Districts the number of primary schools increased by 12,57,157 and 186 respectively while in Ahmednagar, Nasik and Poona their number decreased by 32, 4 and 12 respectively. The decrease in Ahmednagar and Poona is due to the classes being included in the regular schools. The number of pupils increased and decreased in the several districts as shown below :—

The abnormal increase in the number of schools and students in Satara is due to the addition of voluntary schools (151) with 5,465 students. In the case of Sholapur District the number of schools and students has increased due to the abolition of School Boards of Barsi and Pandharpur municipalities and the schools under the charge of those bodies have been taken over by the District School Board. The decrease in the number of students in East Khandesh is due to the encouragement by Government of private enterprise in opening more private schools.

It is gratifying to note that there was no trouble in any district regarding admission or seating of the depressed class children. The appointment of a Special Organiser in East Khandesh facilitated the increase in the number of pupils belonging to the Aboriginal Tribes and the Scheduled Classes.

All the Boards continue to take a practical interest in encouraging education among the intermediate and depressed classes by means of the grant of scholarships and other facilities, with the result that the number of pupils increased in Ahmednagar and West Khandesh.

The number of Agricultural Bias classes was the same as last year in all the districts, the number of pupils having slightly increased in all cases.

The District School Board, Poona and Ahmednagar, have been co-operating with Government in pursuing the policy of liquidating mass illiteracy by encouraging private institutions and persons to open as many private schools as possible.

The Ahmednagar Board has constructed 12 buildings. Out of 666 schools 203 are being held on the District School Board's own buildings. The Board has also agreed to contribute Rs. 5,000 in connection with the scheme formulated by Government according to which Government would sanction Rs. 5,000 to each district on the condition that the Board sanctions an equal amount for the construction of school buildings.

## 10. Medical and Public Health.

During the year epidemic of cholera broke out in East Khandesh, West Khandesh and Satara Districts. There were also cases of small-pox in West Khandesh, Satara and Sholapur and of plague in Satara. Prompt and sufficient measures were taken by the District Local Boards to combat the epidemics.

The District Local Board, Nasik, appointed one Chief Medical Officer of the qualifications of an Ayurvedic Vaidya for the periodical inspection of the Ayurvedic dispensaries. In Sholapur the number of Medical Relief centres established by the Board increased from 75 to 76. Out of these 65 centres were working satisfactorily. The Board also held three classes for training dais and trained 63 dais gathered from different parts of the district.

## 11. Veterinary Dispensaries.

The number of the Veterinary Dispensaries maintained by the District Local Boards remained the same as that of the last year excepting in West Khandesh where the number of seven was increased to eight. The dispensaries are reported to have been working satisfactorily.

### 12. Civil Works.

The following statement shows the Government grants paid to the Boards during the year and the amounts spent from these grants and from their own funds on local public works and village approach road works:—

Grants-in-aid as such to District Local Boards have now been discontinued from 1938-39 and the provision for ensuring an adequate water supply in the rural areas is now dealt with under the general Village Water Supply Scheme. The amounts specified in the statement represent the grants-in-aid given under this head and also include the amounts remaining with the Boards as unspent balance during the preceding year.

Large sums were provided under the Village Water Supply Schemes but for several reasons they could not be fully utilised.

#### 14. Standing and other Committees.

(a) *Standing Committees.*—All the District Local Boards appointed Standing Committees as required by section 36 (1) of the Act.

(b) *Works Committees.*—All the District Local Boards except East Khandesh and West Khandesh appointed Works Committees.

(c) *Budget Committees.*—All the District Local Boards except Ahmednagar appointed Budget Committees.

(d) *Dispensary Committees.*—The District Local Board, Ahmednagar, East Khandesh and Satara, appointed Dispensary Committees.

(e) *Veterinary Dispensary Committees.*—The District Local Board, Ahmednagar, East Khandesh and Satara, appointed Veterinary Dispensary Committees.

(f) *Village Panchayat Committees.*—These exist in West Khandesh, Poona and Satara.

(g) *Sanitary Committees.*—These have been appointed in Satara and Poona.

#### 15. Village Panchayats and Village Sanitary Committees.

##### *Village Panchayats.*

The total number of village panchayats has increased from 350 to 355. In all seven new panchayats came into existence while two were abolished. The seven panchayats are distributed in the several districts as under :—

As observed in the last year's report no material progress was made in the improvement of the financial position of the majority of the panchayats. The main reason is the unwillingness of the panchayats to recover direct taxes e.g., House-tax by coercive measures with the result that they were in heavy arrears. With scanty resources at their disposal it is extremely difficult to set the panchayats in working order although some efforts in that direction are made by District Local Boards. It is however hoped that under the new Panchayats Act the compulsory levy of house-tax and the independent position of the secretaries appointed by Government will accelerate the recovery of the Village Panchayats' dues and thereby improve the financial condition and general administration of these institutions.

##### *Sanitary Committees.*

The number of Sanitary Committees decreased by one in the Nasik District where the sanitary committee at Deola was converted into a panchayat.

There are Sanitary Committees only in the districts of Nasik, Poona and Satara as shown in Statement No. V.

#### 16. ; Audit of Accounts.

There were no serious irregularities detected in audit requiring special mention.

## 17. General Remarks.

### (i) ADMINISTRATION OF THE BOARDS, AND APPRECIATION OF THE WORK OF LOCAL BOARD OFFICERS, MEMBERS AND STAFF.

The general remarks of the Collectors on the administration of the Boards in their districts are reproduced below.

*Ahmednagar*—(Mr. W. G. Hulland).

“The administration of the Board as a whole during the year under report has been very fair. Though solvent, however, the Board's financial position leaves much to be desired. It is now in the unenviable position, particularly with regard to roads of not being able to secure funds for both original works and current repairs.

There was difference between the President, Mr. K. B. Deshmukh, M.L.A., and the Provincial Congress Committee, which did not, however, in any way affect the Board itself. Mr. Deshmukh has been deprived of his membership of the party, but retains the confidence of the majority of the Board. His relations with the undersigned have been uniformly cordial, and party politics have fortunately not interfered with the day to day administration. I have met with ready co-operation from members of all shades of opinion, and so have other Government officers.

There has been a very ready response to my efforts to speed up the disposal of the Board's office work and there has been a marked improvement in this respect during the year under report. There is no doubt that the permanent staff of the Board is good and is doing well under able guidance.”

*East Khandesh*—(Mr. D. G. Chambers).

“The present body shows numerous signs of administrative inexperience, but I think it is honestly trying to do its best for the area in its charge. In particular, the lack of factious disputes is gratifying, though possibly a more lively opposition to the majority party would be beneficial. I have every hope that the present President Mr. R. B. Patil will do very well indeed.”

*West Khandesh*—(Mr. V. Isvaran).

“The activities undertaken by the Board during the year under report and detailed in the Administration Report show a successful year's working for which the President of the Board Mr. S. T. More, Bar-at-Law, and his colleagues deserve commendation. The administration of the Board was ably conducted by Mr. More who was all along keen over maintaining a high standard of administration of the Board and improving the working of the various Village Panchayats in the district. Except for the illegality committed in connection with the Presidential election referred to at the beginning of the Administration Report and in which the Collector had to take action under section 124 (2) of the Act the working of the Board during the year was satisfactory. Party factions are always a serious hindrance in the smooth working of any Local Board administration. It is earnestly hoped that the members of the Board will show a spirit of co-operation, above petty factions and act in the interest of the public in general fully realising their responsibility towards the public and Government.”

*Nasik*—(Mr. A. P. LeMesurier).

“I note with approval that the members of the Board have taken a keen interest in finding out corruption in the Public Works Department of the Board. However before I can associate myself with the President's commendation of the members named in his report, I await a final reply to certain questions which I have had to ask concerning the expenditure of funds allotted for work under the Village Improvement Scheme. Until all such questions are dealt with as ordinary business of the Board and not as questions of party politics little progress is likely to be achieved. The present administration has certainly taken on a dubious heritage from its predecessors.

But so long as each successive administration regards the transactions of past administration as of no concern, there can be no continuity and responsibility. The principle of common zeal and succession cannot be sufficiently emphasised.

As regards the other departments of the Board there is no reason why they should not work well, provided certain suggestions which I have made in my inspection notes are followed. At present references are apt to be delayed.

Relations between myself and the Board have been only fair. I am glad to acknowledge the Board's co-operation during the inspection of the office. But in the subsequent matter of Village Approach Roads I am compelled to complain of evasion."

*Poona*—(Mr. E. W. Trotman).

"The administration of the Board on the whole was found to be satisfactory due to the efficient management of the President, Mr. More. No cases of serious mismanagement were noticed during the year under report."

*Satara*—(Mr. W. N. Bakhtiyar).

"The administration of the Board continued to be unsatisfactory. The Board showed some promptness in the disposal of the correspondence owing to the tightening of the control by the Collector's office. The financial condition of the Board was unsound during the year under report. Owing to the unsound finances of the Board it was not possible for it to maintain sufficient number of independent dispensaries in the district and hence the action of the Board in discontinuing the grants to the Municipalities is not justifiable. Owing to the discontinuance of the grant the Wai Municipality is now charging two annas per day to every patient from the local board area and a great hardship is being caused to the agriculturists and the poor who can hardly afford to pay the fee. The action taken by the Wai Municipality is likely to be followed by other municipalities and inconvenience to patients from local board area is inevitable. Complaints against the discontinuance of the grants are being received in numbers and the action of the Board has also been criticised in various meetings held in Wai Taluka. The President has been requested to put up this question for the reconsideration of the Board and the decision of the Board in the matter is still awaited.

The important features of this year is that the Congress party has been in majority in this Board and the administration is being run on party system and congress principles."

*Sholapur*—(Mr. D. Symington).

"As the finances of the Board were not sound the posts of Chief Officer and Engineer were combined. Consequently Mr. Salukhe, the District Local Board Engineer, has been doing the work of Chief Officer in addition to his own since February 1939. It is more than likely that the combination of these two posts must affect the efficiency of the Board's administration. The late submission of this administration report thereby holding up the divisional report is a case in point.

The administration of the Board was on the whole fair during the year under report but the general atmosphere is one of inaction."

*Commissioner's remarks.*

The fundamental problem before all the Boards remains the financial. With the income of the Local Rates stationery, the Government grant dwindling and the responsibilities of the Board expanding, it is becoming increasingly difficult for the Boards to meet the normal demand and the future outlook does not appear hopeful. The Collector also states that though solvent, the Board's financial position leaves much to be desired. It is now in the unenviable position particularly with regard to roads of not being able to secure funds for both original works and current repairs.

These remarks were made with special reference to Ahmednagar but they apply equally to all the Boards. The position of most of the Boards is rapidly deteriorating. The really urgent necessity is in these circumstances early orders on the Kale Committee's proposal.

(ii) PROVISION OF EQUAL FACILITIES FOR DEPRESSED CLASSES.

The action taken by the District Local Boards is as follows :—

*Ahmednagar.*—The Board continued to provide equal facilities to all classes without any distinction of caste and creed regarding the use of schools, dispensaries, dharmashalas and public wells. However the Board could not give full response to the orders of Government about putting up notice boards on all public wells as it expressed its inability to provide immediately Rs. 12,500 required for the purpose. It therefore decided to spread the work over three to four years by making a provision of Rs. 3,000 to 4,000 each year. The Board has decided to spend Rs. 1,000 during the current year.

*East Khandesh.*—The Board provided equal facilities to the depressed classes in the use of schools, public wells, hospitals, etc. Though notice boards put up near some public wells were removed by some mischief-mongers belonging to the respective localities all such wells were practically open to all classes of the public. However in order to guard against this trouble the Board has provided adequate amount for inscribing the required notices with block letter on all public wells. The progress made by it however was slow. The Collector has issued instructions to the local bodies to take up this question in earnest.

*West Khandesh.*—The boys of the depressed classes are allowed to sit along with boys of caste Hindus in class rooms in all Primary Schools under the control of the Board. The Board fixed notice boards to 69 public wells. Its proposal to paint letters on stones fixed in the parapet wall of wells that "the well is open to all caste alike" instead of fixing wooden notice boards, has recently been approved by the Commissioner.

*Nasik.*—As in the previous years the Board allows no caste distinctions to be observed in the case of dharmashalas, wells, schools, under its control. The work of putting up notice boards to the above effect was satisfactory during the year.

*Poona.*—The District Local Board put up notice boards on about 250 wells. Usual facilities to the Harijans continued in respect of water supply, admission of their children in the school and employment of qualified candidates in the Board's service.

*Satara.*—The Board afforded equal facilities to the Harijans in the matter of primary education. Dharmashalas and public water supplies were thrown open to them. The Board however failed to put up notice boards on the public wells in accordance with the orders of Government.

*Sholapur.*—Notice boards were erected on public wells declaring that they are open to all alike. For the information of the public these facts were published in the local newspapers. In addition the President, District Local Board, made experiments at various villages by collecting people of all castes and making them draw water from public wells.

*Read* letters from the Collectors in the Southern Division, forwarding with their remarks Reports of the District Local Boards during the year 1938-39.

### 1. Number of Local Boards.

The number of the District Local Boards remained unchanged during the year under report. The 44 Taluka Boards functioning in the several talukas of Bijapur, Dharwar, Kanara, Kolaba and Ratnagiri districts were abolished with effect from 1st April 1938.

### 2. Area and Population.

There was no change in the area and population of the District Local Boards during the year under report.

### 3. Constitution.

There was no change in the constitution of the District Local Boards except in the case of the Dharwar District Local Board which was reconstituted with effect from 1st February 1939 as follows:—

Abolition of nominations, increase in the strength and reservation of seats for women and Harijans are the notable features of the new Board.

### 4. Elections.

There were no general elections except in Dharwar and Bijapur districts. The general elections in the Dharwar District were held in December 1938 and those in Bijapur in March 1939. The newly elected Board in the Bijapur District, however, came into office from 1st June 1939.

### 5. Meetings.

The District Local Boards held in all 49 meetings during the year under report as against 52 in the previous year. Out of the meetings held 18 were adjourned as compared with 23 in the previous year. There were no meetings that proved abortive for want of quorum. All the Boards complied with the provisions of section 35 (1) of the Bombay Local Boards Act, 1923, prescribing the minimum number of meetings.

The average percentage of attendance of members at the meetings fell from 83.87 in the preceding year to 77.35 in the year under report. The fall in the percentage of the Kanara District Local Board from 85.50 to 67.12 is unsatisfactory. Belgaum District recorded the highest percentage of attendance, viz. 86.66.

There were no cases of adjournments of meetings as referred to in Government Resolution, General Department, No. 1689/33, dated the 7th May 1937.

Business was transacted by circulation of the agenda under section 41 (1) of the Act, four times by the District Local Board, Belgaum, and twice by the District Local Board, Kolaba.

## 6. Income.

The aggregate income of the District Local Boards exclusive of the opening balance and debt was Rs. 53,25,832 during the year under report as compared with Rs. 47,28,582 in the previous year.

The important variations are explained below :—

(a) *Local Rates.*—The income rose from Rs. 7,90,884 to Rs. 11,19,595. Increases were recorded by Bijapur, Kolaba, Ratnagiri and Kanara districts, the figures of the increase for the respective districts being Rs. 4,18,662, Rs. 2,776, Rs. 1,334 and Rs. 59. This was partly covered by a decrease of Rs. 85,658 in Belgaum and of Rs. 8,462 in Dharwar. The heavy increase in Bijapur District is due to collection of the arrears of Local Fund Cess which had been suspended in previous years owing to scarcity conditions and also to assignment of the cess on "Nukasan" for the years 1935-36 and 1936-37. The decrease in Belgaum is due to the fact that in the years 1936-37 and 1937-38, suspended Local Fund Cess was collected in addition to the demand of those years. In Dharwar the decrease is due to less collections of the cess.

(b) *Education.*—The increase from Rs. 30,16,506 to Rs. 33,55,388 is shared by all the districts, the figures of increase for each being—

It is occasioned by the restoration of the 8 per cent. cut in the Government grants for Primary Education. The sale of Government securities in respect of Primary Education Fund added some revenue also at Dharwar.

(c) *Medical.*—The improvement from Rs. 58,403 to Rs. 61,612 is mainly contributed by Dharwar and Bijapur districts.

(d) *Civil Works.*—The rise from Rs. 5,75,480 to Rs. 5,89,194 is mainly brought about by Bijapur which recorded an increase of Rs. 98,439 although Belgaum, Kolaba, Ratnagiri and Kanara showed a decrease of Rs. 43,579, 23,379, 9,735 and 8,842 respectively. The increase in Bijapur was due to the receipt of additional grants from Government for scarcity village roads and water supply works. The reasons for the decrease in other districts are :—

(1) Half the Government grants due to the District Local Board, Belgaum, under section 9 (1) of the Motor Vehicles Tax Act was withheld pending recovery of the excess amount paid in previous years.

(2) Non-receipt of Government grants under section 9 (4) of the Motor Vehicles Tax Act in Belgaum and Kolaba districts.

(3) Reduced Government grants for local public works in Belgaum, Kanara and Ratnagiri districts.

(4) Fall in the income from ferries, toll and lands in Belgaum and Kanara districts.

### 7. Expenditure.

The aggregate expenditure of Local Boards chargeable to current income rose from Rs. 48,87,272 in the previous year to Rs. 51,14,960 during the year under report. The increase or decrease under the main heads is explained below:—

(a) *Administration*.—There was a decrease from Rs. 1,75,695 to Rs. 1,64,846. It occurred in Ratnagiri (4,942), Kanara (3,821), Dharwar (3,821), and Bijapur (1,640) districts. Kolaba recorded an increase of Rs. 2,072 and Belgaum of Rs. 1,303. The decrease in Ratnagiri is mainly due to the amalgamation of the posts of (1) the Chief Officer and the Engineer and (2) the Head Clerk and the Accountant. In Kanara and Bijapur it has been attributed to the abolition of the Taluka Local Boards. In Dharwar, it is due to (1) the fact that in the previous year certain outstanding increments were sanctioned and arrears paid, (2) savings in the pay of the Chief Officer on account of fresh appointment on lesser pay, and (3) less expenditure on contingencies due to the abolition of the Taluka Local Boards.

The increase in Kolaba was due to the restoration of the cut in the pay of establishment and to the increased expenditure on travelling allowance of members and staff, and that in Belgaum was due to the payment of arrears of pay and increment due to the staff as also to the increased expenditure on travelling allowance to the members and the staff.

(b) *Education*.—This head records an increase from Rs. 33,26,728 to Rs. 35,08,864 shared by Belgaum (Rs. 44,539), Dharwar (Rs. 1,15,376), Kanara (Rs. 5,261), Kolaba (Rs. 7,970) and Ratnagiri (Rs. 14,156). Bijapur alone showed a decrease of Rs. 5,166. The increase was due to (1) payment of increased grants to the District School Boards in Belgaum and Kolaba, (2) payment of outstanding pay of primary school teachers and the restoration of the 5 per cent. cut in their pay, at Dharwar, (3) opening of new schools and appointment of additional teachers at Kanara and (4) restoration of grants to aided primary schools and transfer of primary schools at Vengurla and Chiplun from the control of Municipalities concerned to that of the District Local Board, Ratnagiri. The decrease in Bijapur is reported to be due to adjustment of deposit amount in respect of school buildings transferred to civil works.

(c) *Medical*.—The reduction from Rs. 2,73,355 to Rs. 2,63,286 is shared by all the districts except Kanara. Economy on Local Board dispensaries in Ratnagiri, absence of epidemics in Dharwar and Kolaba districts and the closure of an Ayurvedic dispensary in Kolaba have brought about the decrease in these districts. In Belgaum the decrease was under (1) grants to sanitary committees, (2) contribution for vaccine lymph, (3) epidemic charges and (4) vaccination establishment.

(d) *Civil Works*.—The expenditure rose from Rs. 9,00,302 to Rs. 10,09,480. Bijapur, Belgaum and Kanara have contributed an increase of Rs. 85,706, Rs. 52,744 and Rs. 2,808 respectively; while Ratnagiri, Kolaba and Dharwar showed a decrease of Rs. 12,174, Rs. 10,992 and Rs. 8,912 respectively. The districts which showed

increases have spent more on communications, water supply, buildings and establishment, while those showing decreases spent less on these items than in the preceding year.

### 8. Closing Balance.

The aggregate closing balance of all the Local Boards in the Division amounted to Rs. 19,50,850 as against Rs. 18,08,889 in the previous year. The closing balances are in excess of the prescribed minimum. This is chiefly due to accumulation of balances of the District School Boards and other deposits and advances.

### 9. Primary Education.

In compliance with the provisions of the Bombay Primary Education Amendment Act, 1938, the posts of the Administrative Officers of the School Boards have been provincialised and the supervising staff has been transferred to the control of Government.

The number of primary schools in Belgaum District rose from 736 to 764. But the number of pupils decreased by 1,791 consequent upon the opening of some schools started by private enterprise which led to the withdrawal of some of the pupils from the neighbouring Local Board schools. The need for providing new school houses within its area was impressed on the President of the Bijapur District Local Board last year. As a result some new school houses have been constructed and four more are under construction.

In Dharwar 19 more schools were opened. The number of "one-man" schools and aided schools also increased by 39 and 36 respectively.

In Kanara 26 new schools have been opened and 36 additional teachers appointed. The attendance improved by 1,125. Scheduled Class pupils were awarded scholarships amounting to Rs. 1,187 and clothing and prizes of the value of Rs. 488 were distributed amongst them.

The number of schools maintained by the District School Board, Kolaba, rose from 403 to 415, but the number of English classes fell from 7 to 6. The night classes continued during the year.

The number of primary schools increased by 34 in the Ratnagiri District. The management of primary schools within the Municipal limits of Chiplun and Vengurla has been taken over by the District School Board from the Municipalities concerned, as those Municipalities ceased to be local authorities.

### 10. Medical and Public Health.

Plague broke out in 25 villages and cholera made its appearance in 8 villages in the Belgaum District. Preventive measures were immediately taken by the Board with the result that the epidemics were soon stamped out. The Bijapur District was generally free from epidemics in spite of scarcity conditions in the first half of the year. The Dharwar District Local Board maintained its own public health staff. The sanitary staff visited 399 villages for purposes of improvement in general sanitation and wherever necessary for organizing anti-plague measures. The public health of Kolaba, Kanara and Ratnagiri was on the whole satisfactory.

### 11. Veterinary Dispensaries.

Outbreaks of epizootics were reported from the Belgaum District. But preventive measures, such as inoculations, etc., adopted by Veterinary Assistant Surgeons checked their spread.

## 12. Civil Works.

The following table shows the Government grants to District Local Boards for the improvement of communications and the amount spent by them from these grants and their own funds :—

The District Local Board, Belgaum, constructed new roads of the total length of 27 miles and 7 furlongs. The District Local Board, Bijapur, continued the scarcity works, commenced in the preceding year, during the year under report and constructed a total road length of 55 miles. Two more roads are still under construction in this district.

## 13. Water Supply.

The following table shows the Government grants to the District Local Boards for the improvement of village water supply and the amounts spent by them out of these grants and their own funds :—

The District Local Board, Belgaum, carried out improvements to 7 water supply tanks, completed 9 wells and took 8 bore holes. The District Local Board, Bijapur, constructed 3 wells and 1 tank. The District Local Board,

Dharwar, repaired 17 tanks and 27 bore wells. The District Local Board, Kolaba, executed 13 water works. In addition to this expenditure the District Local Boards undertook the execution of village water supply works out of the special grants sanctioned by Government to the District Committees for village water supply and approach roads.

#### 14. Standing and other Committees.

All the District Local Boards in the Division had appointed standing committees as required by section 36 (1) of the Bombay Local Boards Act. There were Veterinary Dispensary Committees in Belgaum and Kanara, Medical Dispensary Committees in Belgaum, Kanara and Kolaba, Rules Committees in Kolaba and Ratnagiri, and a Public Health Committee, a Village Panchayat Committee and a Budget Committee in Ratnagiri, Belgaum and Bijapur respectively.

#### 15. Village Panchayats and Village Sanitary Committees.

The number of village panchayats remained unchanged in Belgaum, Dharwar, Kolaba and Ratnagiri. But there was a decrease by one in Kanara and Bijapur each. A large number of panchayats are being formed in accordance with the provisions of the Village Panchayats Amendment Act, 1939. The working of the majority of the existing panchayats was not satisfactory, the main reasons being inadequate finances and lack of civic interest.

The number of village sanitary committees in the Division fell from 88 to 84. There was a decrease by two in Kolaba and by one each in Kanara and Dharwar.

#### 16. Audit of Accounts.

The accounts of the District Local Boards of Bijapur, Kolaba and Ratnagiri were audited during the year under report. No serious irregularities requiring special mention here were noticed. The finances of the majority of the Boards were not in a satisfactory condition.

#### 17. General Remarks.

The working of all the Boards was on the whole smooth and satisfactory and their conduct generally free from communal bias.

Epidemics and epizootics were successfully combated wherever they broke out. Anti-epidemic measures adopted by the Boards have gone a long way in preventing their outbreaks. Special mention must be made of the work of the sanitary staff employed by the Dharwar District Local Board which carried on general sanitation work in 399 villages and disinfected the water sources in a number of villages.

In the sphere of primary education all-round progress has been recorded. The response to the policy of Government to open schools in all the villages with a population of more than 1,000 is perceptible. A special feature of the year is the introduction of physical education in all the primary schools by the District Local Board, Belgaum.

The Boards are alive to the needs of the Scheduled Classes. They have thrown open to them all their schools and wells. Wherever necessary, special schools and wells have been provided for them. Pupils from these classes are being encouraged by the award of scholarships and distribution of prizes and clothing, etc.

Scarcity conditions in the Bijapur District continued up to the end of September 1938. The Board helped the relief by continuing the works which it had started in the previous year. However, the financial position of the Boards is in no way satisfactory. The audit notes are not carefully and properly attended to. The consideration of the suggestions for retrenchment in expenditure and improvement in finances is postponed from time to time without tangible results. The Ratnagiri District Local Board has a chronic cry about its low finances and has been able to carry on by the temporary octroi tax sanctioned from time to time. It is of the utmost importance that the Board should raise the local fund cess so as to put its finances on a stable basis.

The administration of the village panchayats in the Division was much hampered for want of funds. Public aversion to the increase in taxation rendered the prospects of improving their finances gloomy.
