PREFACE TO THE THIRD EDITION.

STUDENTS reading for examinations in Economics and Commerce such as those of the Intermediate and Degree examinations of the University of London, must have clear ideas about the nature of money. This book is designed primarily for such students, and for those preparing for specific professional examinations in Banking and Currency. It will, one hopes, be of service to others also—to the many that must be keenly anxious to understand this money business.

The problems in regard to money are nowadays, and are likely to be for some time, current topics of conversation. Well they may be. For no single cause operates so strongly towards the prosperity or the adversity of a community as its dealing with its money system does.

For the present edition the work has been thoroughly revised and brought up to date and the type has been reset: the book speaks from the end of 1932.
