APPENDIX.

Notes to supplement, correct and enlarge the information contained in the A Volume Gazetteer of the Jubbulpore district.

285. The total strength of the Police force is 806 Officers and men. A Special Armed Reserve of 75 Constables, 6 Head Constables and two Sergeants is stationed here for drill and discipline. This force is primarily a Provincial Reserve; it may be called out to quell riots or disturbances that may occur in any part of the Provinces, but in ordinary times it is available to assist the District Police in the discharge of their duties at headquarters. The force employed in the Cantonments is an European Inspector, 2 European sergeants, 1 Sub-Inspector, 6 Head Constables and 40 Constables. The District staff comprises a District Superintendent, 2 Assistant District Superintendents, a Deputy Superintendent, 7 Inspectors, 4 Sergeants, 36 Sub-Inspectors, 101 Foot Police Head Constables, 1 Mounted Police Head Constable, 638 Foot Police Constables, 9 Mounted Police Constables and 6 Boy Orderlies. The Railway Police are now a separate body under a separate Superintendent and members of the District force are no longer deputed to duty on the railways. The native ranks are recruited chiefly from the neighbouring district of the United Provinces. The predominant castes are Muhammadans, Brahmans and Rajputs. The total annual cost of the Police force of the district is approximately Rs. 1,73,309. The district is divided into 23 circles including the City, Cantonment and Civil station houses. In the Jubbulpore tahsil station houses are located at Garha, Panagar, Kundam, Barela and Bargi; in Patan tahsil at Patan, Shahpura, Katangi and Belkhera; in Sihora tahsil at Sihora, Majholi, Majhgawan, Dhimar-khera, Sleemanabad and Bahuriband; and in the Murwara tahsil at Murwara Shartala, Barwara Barhi and Bijeraghogarth.

Note on the Excise Administration in the Jubbulpore district for Gazetteer as called for in the Deputy Commissioner's Endorsement No. M-471, dated the 26th April 1912.

Since April 1905 the new contract Distillery system was introduced in this district and a Distillery was established at Katni. In the year 1911-12, i.e., from 1st April 1911 this system was extended throughout the district, the old outstill area was brought under the contract supply system with a rate of Re. 0-15-0 duty and now there are 4 kinds of duties prevalent in this District:—

Opium, Ganja and Charas have also an enhancement of duty from Rs. 23-8-0 to Rs. 6-0-0, and Rs. 12-0-0 to Rs. 27-8-0, Rs. 7-8-0 and Rs. 16-0-0 per seer, respectively, with effect from April 1912.

A temporary distillery set up at Jubbulpore in the year 1909-10 will soon cease in the next year.

2. *Country liquor.*—Undoubtedly a vast improvement is noticed in the Excise Revenue since the new system was first introduced. The gross and net revenue has risen from Rs. 2,76,958 and Rs. 2,47,489 in the year 1905-06 to Rs. 4,02,721 and Rs. 3,68,564 in the year 1911-12 respectively. The consumption of liquor gives an increase from 48,286 proof gallons to 65,782 proof gallons, apparently because of the conversion of the whole district under the contract supply system. The agricultural prospects were generally flourishing except in the year 1908-09. The system worked better and gave much scope for improvement. Special attention was devoted to the breaking up of vend circles by the Deputy Commissioner and the Excise Staff for the last 2 years and in the year 1912-13 there are left altogether 223 shops grouped in 191 vend circles. Difficulties are experienced in securing independent bidders in the Murwara tahsil for small shops.

3. *Foreign liquor.*—The sales of Foreign liquor is greatly restricted to the Jubbulpore town where a large European population and native literate gentlemen indulge in it freely. New shops are opened in the Cantonments and Civil line. There are in all 5 licences issued under F. L. 1 and 7 under F. L. 2 for sale of Foreign liquors in the District from April 1912, of these in Jubbulpore town alone there are 5 licences in form F. L. 1 and 4 in form F. L. 2. Since the last 3 years licences are also issued to the Canteen tenants for the sale of Foreign liquors at the Military Canteen.

There is a Brewery at Jubbulpore belonging to Messrs. Mackinnon and Co. In order to encourage their trade they have been permitted to open an agency at Sadar and another at the Gun Carriage Factory, but it is still doubtful if the sales show any improvement. It is, I am given to understand, not palatable to the taste of the European troops who prefer English beer to it. The licensees of Foreign liquors do not sell beer as it is said not to keep well if stored for sometime. The natives of the Jubbulpore district do not consume beer.

4. *Tari.*—The Tari trade was revived in 1909-10 and the contract for 5 years was given to a Madrasi, but the trade is again getting dull, there being only the sale of 1,019 gallons in the first 4 months of the year 1911-12 and the shops were left uncared for during the rest of the year, perhaps because the Tari drink is not much appreciated by the inhabitants of the Jubbulpore town.

5. *Opium and hemp drugs.*—The consumption of opium gives an increase from 1,426 seers in the year 1905-06 to 1619½ seers in the year 1911-12. This increase is due to the fact that Government opium is preferred to Foreign opium and to the better supervision by the Excise Officers. This has brought to light the real demand for opium by the people of this district.

The sales of Ganja have fallen from 3,429 seers in 1905-06 to 3,220 seers in 1911-12. This was chiefly due to the growing demand for Charas in the place of Ganja, but the consumption of the former is being checked since the year 1911-12 by taxing the drug more heavily.

The sales of Charas have gone up from 246 seers in the year 1906-07 when the Charas shops were first opened in this district, to 584 seers in the year 1911-12 for the reasons explained above.

The sales of Bhang are always fluctuating as they generally depend on the number of marriages amongst the high caste Hindus. This drug is patronized chiefly by the high class Hindus leaving in the Jubbulpore town.

At the close of the official year 1911-12 the number of Educational Institutions in the district was 215 attended by 17,537 pupils. This total included the Government College with 210 students; 4 High Schools with 321 pupils; 7 Anglo-Vernacular Middle Schools for boys with 902 pupils and 2 for girls with 117 pupils.

Vernacular Education was imparted in 17 Vernacular Middle Schools with 1,931 pupils, of whom 1,543 were boys and 1,363 girls.

Secondary School teachers are trained at the Training College and Primary School teachers at the Normal Schools. The Training College contained 29 students, the Normal School for Men contained 85 and the Normal School for Women 37 students.

The Engineering School was closed in 1911.

Page 245, Para. 213, 2nd line should read—“.....and its importance does not appear to have been much affected by the construction of the Railway from Nainpur and Mandla... ..”

*.....The road crosses the Gaur river over which a fine submerged Bridge has recently been constructed, at Goriaghat..... ..
(The old Sohagpur road) is metalled up to mile 28½, that is to say, as far as Kundam, the remainder to the border of.....”*

The sentence beginning “an estimate.....”ana ending“... each year” should be omitted and the following substituted.—“An estimate is prepared each year for constructing a certain number of Bridges on this road so that in the course of a few years, the length up to Kundam which has recently been metalled will also be fully bridged. During the last 4 years some 20 bridges and culverts have been constructed.”

After the words “.... at Gwarighat about 5 miles from Jubb” add “Preliminary investigations are now in hand with a view to finding out if it is possible and bridge the river here at a not too prohibitive cost.”

Page 246.—The most important of the gravelled roads are the Jubbulpore Patan Road (19 miles) which is being metalled and bridged and attract.

Para. 214 should read—“ the total length of the metalled roads in the district is 129 miles and of unmetalled roads 389 miles.”

The Public Works Department look after 126 miles of metalled and 138 miles of unmetalled roads while the remainder.....

The construction of metalled roads and unmetalled roads cost the Public Works Department 12'00 and 4.61 lakhs respectively.

The Public Works Department spend Rs. 56,000 in maintaining metalled roads and 14,000 on unmetalled roads.

Pages 176—177, Jubbulpore Gazetteer, Volume A.

The Barera Kalan tank in the Sehora tahsil, the construction of which was sanctioned by the Government of India in 1908, has now been completed at a total cost of Rs. 1,06,000. It was allowed to fill for the first time in 1911 when the water in it rose to 19' over sluices ill level. During the year 1911-12, 45 acres of Rabi were irrigated and 208 acres of Sugarcane. Every drop of the water in the tank was in this manner utilized.

Fifteen minor Government tanks have in all been constructed during the period 1901 to 1911, at a total cost of Rs. 6,29,051, and the total area which it is estimated can thus be irrigated per annum is 22,674 acres of Rabi and Kharif.

..... Jubbulpore garrison consists of two British Infantry regiments, three batteries and an Ammunition Column, one Native Cavalry regiment and two Native Infantry regiments..... (Then follows "On the outskirts of the city.....").

Chapter X, Page 312-313 and Passage S. 274.—After the words "Posted to Jubbulpore":—

..... In 1903 the Sub-Divisional System was introduced, Jubbulpore tahsil constituting one sub-division, and the two tahsils of Sihora and Murwara another. In 1910 Jubbulpore tahsil was divided to form the two tahsils of Jubbulpore and Patan, but the sub-division remained unaltered. When the

available staff allows of it being done, these charges are sometimes divided into two. Each sub-division is placed in charge of an Assistant who exercises the powers of a Sub-divisional Magistrate. The Jubbulpore Municipal area constitutes another sub-division in charge of two Assistants exercising Executive and Magisterial functions respectively over it.

The Civil Judicial Staff consists of a District Judge, Subordinate Judge, Judge of Small Causes Court, and Munsiff, at headquarter, and Munsiff at Sihora and Murwara. In Patan, Sihora and Murwara tahsils, the respective Tahsildars are invested with the powers of an extra Munsiff, while in Jubbulpore both the Tahsildar and the Additional Tahsildar are Additional Judges to the Court of the Munsiff. Jubbulpore..... (Then follows .. "Jubbulpore is the headquarter of the Superintending ..").

Chapter X, Page 313 and Passage S. 275.—After the words and "403 patwaris ..".

.....The headquarters of the Revenue Inspectors are at Shabpura and Patan in Patan tahsil, at Bargi, Panagar, and Kundum in the Jubbulpore tahsil,.....(then follows .. "At Umaria, Majhgawan.....")

Chapter X, Page 314, Passage para. 276.—For present paragraph read:—

The fluctuation in the civil litigation of this district is very marked. The number of suits instituted rises and falls by thousands. In 1862, 2,438 suits were instituted. Within a period of 9 years it rose to 5,240. The year 1879 had 6,044 suits. After 7 years the number rose to 8,553. It then gradually decreased to 5,549 up till 1894. From that date until 1902 there was some stability in the figure which was about 5,500. In 1903 the figure was 4,836, and for the last decade the average number has been about 5,800. In 1913 it amounted to 6,292. Suits for money or movable property have increased with a corresponding decrease in suits under the rent law and title and other suits.

Money suits arising within the limits of the Cantonment and the Jubbulpore tahsil are tried by Small Cause Courts. About three-quarters of the total number of suits are for sums not exceeding Rs. 100.

(Remainder of paragraph is to be kept as before up to the words "not much resorted to" on page 315. After these words read:—)

The criminality of the district appears to be steadily decreasing year by year, in spite of the fact that on account of its accessibility by railways on all sides, and proximity to several Native States it is especially liable to the invasion of the outside criminal. In 1873 the proportion of offences to population was 1 in 160, and since then has decreased to 1 in 300 in 1901 and 1 in 543 in 1911, the figures of reported offences for that year being 1,372 in a population of 745,892. To deal with the criminal work thus entailed, there are 15 Stipendiary Magistrates (including one Cantonment Magistrate and 11

Honorary Magistrates). Owing to the introduction of the Sub-Divisional System the original criminal work of the District Magistrate is practically nil, and the Treasury Officer does not usually take any criminal cases. Ordinarily the percentage ... (as before, down to the words "a matter of necessity" after that, substitute for the words ... " and it is this that accounts for the high criminality of the district" the words ... " and a large proportion of the cases in the district are attributable to this source." (Remainder of paragraph as before.)

Chapter X, Page 316 and Passage para. 278. For present paragraph read:—

Up to 1905 the system in force for the supply of country liquor was the Sadar distillery system supplemented by outstills. In April of that year the new contract distillery system was introduced, and a central distillery was established at Katni. With the exception of a small hilly tract to the east of the district and the portions of the Murwara tahsil bordering on Native States, where the physical features of the country appeared to render the continuance of outstills advisable, the contract distillery system was extended to the whole district.

In 1911 the outstill system was finally abolished and at the same time the duty on liquor was largely enhanced throughout the district, with the exception of the tract bordering on and covered by the former, outstill tract as it existed after the changes of 1905. In this latter tract rates were considerably

reduced in order to lessen as far as possible the inducements to smuggling. The rates at present in force are :—

Under the contract distillery system the liquor distilled from the flower of Mahua tree is supplied by the contractor to Government at a fixed price. The revenue is realized partly from a direct duty on liquor issued from Government warehouses and partly from licence fees for the right to sell ; this right is sold annually by auction. The income derived from country liquor in this district is large and is steadily increasing. In 1902 the revenue from the source amounted to Rs. 86,053 ; in 1906-07 it had increased to Rs. 2,22,430. The incidence of revenue per head of population had increased from Re. 0-2-1 per head in 1901-02 to Re. 0-5-3 in 1906-07. In 1911-12 the revenue from this source had increased slightly, the figure being Rs. 2,90,321, but in 1912-13 this figure was nearly doubled, being then Rs. 4,09,092. The number of liquor shops has risen from 157, in 1906-07 to 223 in 1912-13.

The incidence of revenue per head of population has risen to Re. 0-10-4 per head, and there are now 2,835 persons to every one liquor shop.

The increased demand for liquor is a sure indication of the growing prosperity of the labouring classes, particularly at Jubbulpore itself. In the rural areas the demand varies directly with the circumstances of the agricultural season. There is also a considerable demand for foreign liquor in the district which is due to the comparatively large European population. The revenue derived from licence fees for the sale of foreign liquor has increased from Rs. 2,995 in 1907 to Rs. 3,279 in 1912-13. A considerable revenue is derived from the duty on beer, which is manufactured largely for the use of European troops at Messrs. Meckinnon and Co.'s Brewery at Jubbulpore. Duty at the rate of one anna per gallon realized a revenue of Rs. 7,460 in 1906-07. But of late the outturn from the brewery has been steadily decreasing, the greater part of the beer consumed in Jubbulpore being now supplied from the Mussoorie branch of the same firm.

Chapter X, Page 317 and Passage para. 279.—For present paragraph read :—

The right of retail sale of opium and ganja is leased annually by auction under the supervision of the Deputy Commissioner. The increase in revenue derived from country liquor has been accompanied by an increase in that

derived from these drugs, this is largely due to better supervision by the Excise Officers, as the result of recent reforms of Excise Administration. In 1901-02 the revenue derived from opium and ganja amounted to Rs. 31,879 and Rs. 16,798 respectively ; in 1906-07 it had increased to Rs. 45, 140 and Rs. 28,643. The figures for 1912-13 were :— Opium, Rs. 57,358-0-2 ; Ganja, Rs. 42,121-10-6. In 1906-07 three shops for the sale of Charas were opened in Jubbulpore city a revenue of Rs. 2,428 was realized from these. In 1912-13 the revenue from Charas was Rs. 17,290-15-3, and the number of shops 7 ; in the same year there were 6 shops for the sale of Bhang, the revenue from which amounted to Rs. 2,670.

*Chapter X, Page 317 and Passage para. 280 (Registration).—*For present paragraph read :—

The district has five Registration Officers including that of the District Registrar at Jubbulpore and the Sub-Offices at headquarters, Patan, Sehora and Murwara. The office of District Registrar is vested in the Deputy Commissioner. Each Sub-Office has a special salaried Sub-Registrar. In the decade ending with the year 1911 the average number of documents registered annually was 2,038 and the receipts averaged Rs. 9,209. In recent years there has been a considerable increase both in the number of documents registered and in the receipts. The figures for the year 1912 and 1913 are as follows :—

A widespread knowledge of the 1904 amendment of the Tenancy Act, the general prosperity of the district, the extension of town limits and the opening up of Co-operative Credit Banks, are the main causes for this increase in registration. The great majority of registered documents relate to sales or mortgages of land.

*Chapter X, Page 318 and Passage para. 281. —*For present paragraph substitute :—

The Jubbulpore Council with its three Local Boards for the tahsils of Jubbulpore, Sihora and Murwara, came into existence in 1883. Consequent on the division of the Jubbulpore tahsil into two tahsils of Jubbulpore and Patan a separate Local Board was formed for the Patan tahsil and its constitution was sanctioned in 1913.

The members of the District Council and the Local Boards are mostly non-officials. Four Tahsildars, one additional Tahsildar and three Naib-Tahsildars are members of the Local Board and with the exception of the additional Tahsildar attached to the Jubbulpore tahsil all are office bearers. Senior Assistant or Extra-Assistant Commissioner is a Member and Secretary of the District Council. The presiding officers are elected and a non-official is the presiding officer of the District Council. The average annual income of the District Council is now Rs. 1,17,000.

During the last decade the expenditure on education has increased by nearly 50 per cent and on Civil works by about 35 per cent. Veterinary dispensaries are a new institution which may be expected to call for increasing amounts yearly. The District Council maintain 110 primary schools, 5 middle schools, 5 serais, 62 cattle pounds, 3 Veterinary dispensaries, one is shortly to be opened at Patan, 194 miles of road, and contributes to the upkeep of 8 dispensaries besides allotting sums to the repairs of tanks and wells, and the planting of trees. The Local Boards are advisory to the District Council. Each member is responsible for general inspection work and especially for supervision of all expenditure within the limits of his circle. Recently the Local Boards have been given independent powers over the expenditure to a limited extent, and this principal may be expected to be extended in the future.

Chapter X, Page 319 and Passage para. 282 (Municipalities).—From the beginning up to the words “constituted in 1864” read as before—after that read :—

It contains an area of 8.61 square miles with a population in 1911 of 79,009. It includes the suburb of Garha $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles to the west of the city proper. The Municipal Committee is composed of 25 selected and 7 nominated members.

The principal sources from which Municipal Funds are derived are Octroi, water rate, conservancy cess, tolls and dues from markets and slaughter-houses. The total income of the Municipality for the year 1913-14 excluding loans, advances and deposits was Rs. 3,82,561 falling at Rs. 4-13-6 per head of the population. The expenditure for that year was Rs. 3,10,312 which excludes Rs. 61,022 on account of repayment of loan and Rs. 22,094 on account of advances and deposits. Sihora was created a Municipality in 1867. The Committee includes 6 elected and 2 nominated members. The Municipal income derived mainly from a haisiyat or property tax, latrine tax, cattle registration fees pounds, and weighmen's fees. The total income for 1913-14 was Rs. 7,729 and the expenditure Rs. 7,845. The chief items of expenditure were in connection with conservancy and the maintenance of a Municipal Middle School and a dispensary

The Murwara.....granted to weighmen. The total income of the Municipality in 1913-14 was Rs. 23,116 and the expenditure Rs. 22,830. The Municipality maintains a middle school, Branch school, and a dispensary; for the rest conservancy and sanitation absorb the available funds.

Chapter X, Page 319 and Passage para. 283.—For present paragraph read:—

In the year 1906-07, only two villages in the district, Patan and Panagar, were under the Village Sanitation Act. In October 1909, the Act was applied, to a third village, Barela. The Act was introduced into Patan and Panagar, and also into six others in the district in 1893, but beyond the official notification no further action was taken until 1901-02. In that year Panchayats were formed under the Act in Patan and Panagar and the idea of extending the Act to other villages was temporarily abandoned. The Sanitation Committee depend for their funds on voluntary registration of cattle sales, weighmen's fees and dues levied in bazar stalls. The income from these sources has risen rapidly since the Act was first introduced. In 1901-02 the receipts of the Patan Committee were only Rs. 219. In 1906-07 they stood at Rs. 732, while for 1912-13 the amount received was Rs. 2,643. This, however, includes a Government grant of Rs. 1,010. Rs. 250 contributed by the District Council, and Rs. 630 donations. The ordinary sources of income give the following results:—

The Committee has acquired a large site in the centre of the town for a bazar.

Income needs to be increased considerably, the levy of "Haisiyat" tax has been sanctioned and introduced.

Between the year 1901-02 and 1906-07, the funds of the Panagar Committee increased from Rs. 703 to Rs. 2,965. The receipts for 1912-13 were Rs. 2,045. The principal source of income was the registration of cattle, which brought in Rs. 1,789. The Panagar Committee has spent Rs. 3,320 in the construction of drains, and Rs. 1,381 on the improvement of roads. The conservancy establishment consists of 12 sweepers, with several carts.

With regard to Barela, the receipts for 1912-13 were Rs. 490 as against Rs. 587 in 1911-12. The chief sources of income are weighmen's fees and bazar dues. Practically all the income is spent on conservancy.

Chapter X, Page 320 and Passage para. 284.—For present paragraph read:—

The roads and buildings of the District are under the charge of the Executive Engineer, Jubbulpore Division. There are 264 miles of road in the district in charge of the Public Works Department. The total value of the buildings in the district borne on the books of the Public Works Department is Rs. 24,62,765 and the maintenance charges are Rs. 24,000 and Rs. 78,000 for buildings and roads respectively. The water works at Jubbulpore are under the charge of the Public Works Department. The reservoir holds 145 millions cubic feet of water between the weir level and the low water level. The capital cost sunk at different periods in the construction and subsequent improvements of the water works is up to date Rs. 13,43,267. The principal buildings at Jubbulpore are the Jail, constructed at a cost of Rs. 6,10,240, the District Court House cost Rs. 3,11,397. The new Circuit House cost Rs. 62,391, and the Residency now used as the residence of the Commissioner, Jubbulpore Division, built at a cost of Rs. 34,210. The total number of buildings in charge of the Public Works Department is at present 83.

Chapter X, Page 321, and Passage 285.—For present paragraph read:—

The total strength of the Police force is 826 Officers and men, including 10 Sowars. A special armed reserve of 75 Constables, 6 Head Constables and 2 Sergeants is stationed in Jubbulpore for drill and discipline.

The force is primarily a provincial reserve; it may be called out to quell riots or disturbances that may occur in any part of the province, but in ordinary times it is available for other duties at headquarters. The force employed in the Cantonment is:—1 European Inspector, 1 Sub-Inspector, 4 Head Constables and 27 Constables under the supervision of the Cantonment Inspector.

The District staff comprises 1 District Superintendent, 2 Assistant District Superintendents, 1 Deputy Superintendent, 6 Inspectors, 34 Sub-Inspectors, 87 Head Constables and 499 Constables. In addition to this a force of 10 Sowars is maintained at headquarters.

The predominant castes recruited in the Police force are Muhammadans, Brahmins and Rajputs. The total annual cost of the Police force of the district is approximately Rs. 1,80,000. The district is divided into 22 circles,

including the City Cantonment and Civil Lines. In the Jubbulpore tahsil station house are located at Garha, Panagar, Kundam, Barela and Bargi; in the Patan Tahsil, at Katangi, Patan, Shahpura and Belkhera, in the Sihora tahsil at Sihora, Majholi, Sleemanabad, Bohriband, Dhimarkheda and Majhgawan and in the Murwara tahsil, at Murwara, Bhartala, Barwara, Barhi and Bijeraghogarh.

*Chapter X, Page 321 and Passage para. 286 (Kotwars).—*For present paragraph read:—

At the last Settlement 1,721 kotwars were appointed for 2,534 villages. The total amount of their remuneration was fixed at Rs. 69,811. The figures for 1913-14 were as follows:—

The Central Jail at Jubbulpore is a first class Jail with accommodation for 1,197 males and 72 females; in addition, the Jail Hospital can accommodate 103 males and 5 females.

Observation cells are provided for 52 males and 2 females. The average daily number of convicts in 1909 was 970; in 1910; 1911 and 1912 the average has declined to 904, 821 and 773 respectively.

Weaving is the principal industry carried on in the Jail. The bulk of the articles manufactured are Bhagri cloth, Latha cloth, pagri cloth, and blankets, but durries and carpets are also made in considerable numbers. The Jail was formerly famous for the manufacture of tents, but this industry has been discontinued some years ago. The Jail has of late obtained large contracts for the supply of satrangis, mattress-cases, pillow-cases and covers, bhagri cloth, dusters and towels for the Commissariat Department of the Indian Army. The Jail staff consists of a Superintendent, a Deputy Superintendent of Factories, 3 Jailors 10 Assistant Jailors, 2 Hospital Assistants, 1 Compounder, 13 head warders and 57 warders and apprentice warders; 1 matron and female warder are in immediate charge of the female convicts. The average annual expenditure for maintenance of the Jail is Rs. 66,554, and the average income and expenditure of the factories amount to Rs. 1,30,625 and Rs. 1,27,173 respectively.

*Chapter X, Page 325 and Passage para. 289 (Dispensaries).—*For present paragraph read:—

The District has eighteen dispensaries. The majority of which are maintained from Dispensary Funds. Of these eighteen the following are

located in Jubbulpore itself, the Victoria Hospital, with its City and Civil branches, the Garha Dispensary, the Elgin Hospital, the Sick Children's Hospital (opened on January 12th, 1914), the Cantonment Hospital, the E. I. Railway Dispensary, the B. N. Railway Dispensary and the Police Hospital. The remaining dispensaries are situated at Sihora, Murwara, Bijragogarh, Patan and Panagar. At this latter place there are 2 Dispensaries, one for males and another for females, maintained by the Church of England Zenana Mission, which are doing very good work. The Victoria Hospital has accommodation for 64 inpatients; the institutions at Sihora, Murwara, and Patan are equipped for 7, 10 and 6 in-patients respectively. The Police Hospital has 24 beds. The average daily number of in-door patients treated at the dispensaries during the decade ending 1911 was 72.75 and that of out-door patients 562.55. The total number of operations performed in each of the last three years was as follows:—

The major operations are chiefly for calculus and cataract: a full list of them would include most of the operations of surgery. The average yearly income of all dispensaries is Rs. 67,550, including Government grants and special donations.

There is also the Elgin Hospital for women, one of the institutions under the management of the Countess of Dufferin's Fund; it is situated in the Molony Gunj ward of Jubbulpore City and is in charge of a lady doctor with a staff of 2 female Sub-Assistant Surgeons, 1 Midwife, 2 Ward Dhais, 1 Cook, 1 Chaukidar, 1 Dhobi and 2 sweepers. The Hospital has accommodation for 18 in-patients. The daily average number of in-door and out-door patients in 1912 and 1913 was as follows:—

The number of operations performed in 1912 was 242 and in 1913, 185. In the former year there were 16 important obstetric operations, while in the latter year this number dropped to 8.

Chapter X, Page 325 and Passage para. 290 (Vaccination)—From "Vaccination is compulsory".....to..... "Every year" to remain as before. After that read:—

The staff consists of two Assistant Superintendents, 17 Vaccinators, and an apprentice vaccinator. The Sub-Assistant Surgeons at the outlying dispensaries do not vaccinate children 4.19 per cent of the population are reported to be protected during 1913-14. The figure shows a marked decrease from that given

for the year 1901, which was approximately 20 per cent. The cost of vaccination in 1913-14 was Re. 0-2-4 per child successfully vaccinated.

Chapter X, Page 326 and Passage para. 291 (Veterinary Dispensary).—
For present paragraph read :—

A veterinary dispensary was first opened in Jubbulpore in the year 1899. In 1904 it was removed from the small building allotted to it in the beginning to more spacious premises on the border of the Civil Station to the town. In the year 1913 there were altogether three veterinary dispensaries in the district. One was opened at Murwar in the year 1910, and it has now a permanent building on the north side of the town. The other was opened at Sihora in 1913 and a site has been selected for a permanent building on the east side of the town. There are also proposals to start a Veterinary Dispensary at Patan. For this purpose a site has already been selected to the east of the town. Each tahsil in the district will thus have its own dispensary. With the increase in the number of dispensaries, two more veterinary assistants have been added.

Jubbulpore is also the headquarter of the Veterinary Inspector, Jubbulpore Division.

All the dispensaries are maintained by the District Council, Jubbulpore, except as regards the salaries of the Veterinary Assistants whose posts have been provincialized since March 1909.

The Municipal Committee, Jubbulpore, has a separate Veterinary Assistant who looks after its slaughter-house, but their cattle are treated in the Veterinary Dispensary, for which the Committee makes a contribution of Rs. 300 a year.

The Jubbulpore dispensary treats on an average 25 cases daily, Murwar 9 and Sehora 7. The demand for the prophylactic treatment of agricultural stock is steadily increasing as the people are more fully realizing the advantages of the system.
