APPENDIX.

Notes to supplement, correct and enlarge the information contained in the A Volume Gazetteer of the Bilaspur district.

From a geological point of view the Bilaspur district is divided into two portions of contrasted constitution. There is a southern belt running east by south to west by north, with an average width of 20 miles, forming a very flat area at an average altitude of about 1,000 feet. North of this flat region the country is very hilly with peaks exceeding 3,000 feet, that is, more than 2,000 feet above the level of the southern plain. The southern flat area is occupied by horizontal or gently dipping purple shales and limestones belonging to the Raipur series, a member of the Cuddapah system of Algonkian age.*

These rocks, mostly concealed by alluvial and lateritic deposits, constitute a portion of the extensive flat expanse known as the Chhattisgarh basin which, besides the southern part of Bilaspur district, occupies a considerable portion of the Raipur and Drug districts. Raipur shales and limestones prevail throughout this area. It is only along a narrow discontinuous belt bordering their outcrop that the "Chandarpur sandstones", that is, the basal members underlying the Raipur series, become visible, forming a raised rim round the Chhattisgarh basin. In Bilaspur district the Chandarpur sandstones are restricted to a narrow zone extending from about 10 miles east of Bilaspur up to the easternmost boundary of the district. Elsewhere the Raipur series rest directly upon older rocks without the intervention of the basal sandstones.

The northern and hilly part of the district includes a varied assemblage of rock, some of which is older and some newer than the Cuddapah rocks of the southern belt. The rocks older

than the Cuddapah system include Archæan gneisses and slates, the latter belonging to the Dharwar system and locally known as the Chilpi series. The rocks newer than the Cuddapahs, belong to the Gondwana system and include several sub-divisions, *viz.*, the Talchir, Barakar (coal-measures) and Kamthi stages. Of all these rocks occupying the northern area of the district the older ones prevail in the north-western half, which is occupied almost entirely by crystalline and metamorphic rocks, while the Gondwana occupy the north-eastern portion.

The latter rocks form a portion of a vast area of Gondwana beds extending south-eastward into Raigarh, Hingir and Sambalpur. It is only on a geological map illustrating the whole extent of this Gondwana area that the regular north-western strike of its main stratigraphical features becomes readily appreciable. On a map of a single district which isolates a portion of the Gondwana basin, the geological boundaries assume a somewhat confused appearance, and the distribution of the several sub-divisions can best be understood by a reference to the annexed geological sketch map. The basal beds (Talchirs) include greenish sandstones and shales through which are scattered large boulders regarded as of glacial origin. The Barakars include white or grey sandstones interbedded with shales and coal seams. There are two patches of these rocks along the Mand and Hasdo valleys, constituting the Mand and Korba coal-fields, separated from one another by a lofty hill mass, constituted by the massive red sandstones of the Kamthi stage. Intrusive dykes and sills, some of which are of very large size, consisting of basalt and dolerite of the age of the Deccan Trap (Upper Cretaceous) often intersect the Gondwana rocks.

The territories constituting the Bilaspur district come within the area described by Ball in "The Geology of the Mahanadi Basin" (*Rec., G. S. I.*, Vol. X, pages 167 to 186), and by King in "The Chhattisgarh Division" (*Rec., G. S. I.*, Vol. XVIII, pages 169 to 200).

The occurrence of manganese ore—not, however, known to be of any economic value—has been recorded from Ratanpur and Gorakona (*see* L. L. Fernor in *Records, Geol. Survey, India*, XL [1910], p. 334).

No more tanks have been constructed in the Bilaspur district, except Barpali tank. The gross commanded area of this is 3,281 acres, and the culturable area is 2,619 acres. In the 2nd line of the first sentence in paragraph 2 on page 135 of Volume A of the *District Gazetteer*, "three" may be inserted for "two", and in line four of the same paragraph, after "Lormi," substitute "and Barpali".

Irrigation.

The most important traffic routes at present are the railway feeders from Champa to Bamnidhi and Bhatgaon, Champa to Korba, Akaltara to Pamgarh, Akaltara to Baloda and Bhatapara to Mungeli *via* Nandghat.

Roads—Railway Feeders.

The Champa-Bhatgaon road is metalled for the first two miles and partly gravelled for the remaining 21 miles. The important market village of Bamnidhi is situated at a distance of eleven miles from Champa. Much grain from Phuljhar Zamindari and the Janjgir tahsil is brought to Champa station for export along this road. The road from Champa to Korba, a distance of 23 miles, has been aligned and is a cart-track, but it is neither banked, bridged nor metalled. It carries considerable quantities of forest produce both from Korba and Chhuri Zamindaris.

From Akaltara station a road goes south for 10 miles to Pamgarh, and joins the old Sambalpur road in the first furlong of mile 25th; between Bilaspur and Pamgarh on the Sambalpur road is a distance of 24½ miles, of which the first eight miles are metalled and the remaining 16½ miles are gravelled. This is the old Sambalpur road and is provided with very fine avenues, and it is raised and gravelled up to Sheorinarain, a distance of 39 miles from Bilaspur and 15 miles from Pamgarh. An outlet from the Chhuri and Korba Zamindaris is the Chhuri-Balod-Akaltara road. It is gravelled for the first nine miles from

Akaltara to Balod and beyond that it is only a village track. The principal trade route in the Mungeli tahsil is the Mungeli-Nandghat-Bhatapara road, crossing the Sheonath, which runs for nine miles in the district at Nandghat. It is to be metalled throughout as it carries much traffic, grain from the Mungeli tahsil being taken to Bhatapara instead of to Bilaspur, as it is more easily disposed of at the former place which is a very important grain market. From Setganga beyond Mungeli a partly gravelled road goes to Pandaria, the headquarters of the large Pandaria Zamindari. And from Pandaria two roads have been constructed, one going south to Dongargarh station in Khairagarh State and the other east for 41 miles through Lormi to Kota (Kargi Road) station on the Bilaspur-Katni line. It is proposed to make a new road from Lormi to Mungeli, a distance of 19 miles, to facilitate the conveyance of produce to Mungeli from the Lormi forest. In the Pendra Zamindari a road leads from Pendra Road station (Gourela) to Pendra for $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles and another for 14 miles to Amarkantak. A third road has been constructed from Gourella to Kabirchabutra *via* Keochi, a distance of 25 miles, as a part of the Gourella-Dindori road, 75 miles. The road in this length passes mostly through the Pendra Zamindari and the Lormi Reserved Forest, and will ultimately be a principal route for carrying grain from the rich Dindori tahsil and forest produce to Gourella station from the Government Forests beyond Kabirchabutra in the Mandla district, and the Lormi Reserved Forest and Pendra Zamindari Forest in the Bilaspur district. A fourth road has been proposed to be constructed from Pendra *via* Semra, Jatanga and Pondi to Katghora, where a new tahsil is to be opened. It will be a principal route for carrying grain and forest produce from the Pendra, Matin, Lapha and Uprora Zamindaris to Gourella and Champa.

The total length of metalled roads in this district maintained by the Public Works Department is 25 miles and of moorumed 225 miles. The metalled roads consist only of short lengths on the Bilaspur-Mungeli and other roads, and of a few railway feeders.

The maintenance of roads in charge of the Public Works Department costs Rs. 40,829.

Crime is not heavy in the district in proportion to the population, and statistics show a very decided decrease since 1901, compared to the previous ten years. The average annual number of offences reported to the Police in the years 1891 to 1900 was 2,281, and from 1901 to 1910 only 1,219. The average number of cases not cognizable by the Police was 624 for the ten years previous to the reduction of area of the district in 1906, and 515 for the subsequent three years.

The bad famine years showed a large number of offences—2,853 in 1900, 3,134 in 1896 and 5,168 in 1897. In 1896 and 1897 the criminal classes of the district got out of hand for a time, especially the Chamars of the Mungeli tahsil, who, ever ready on slight provocation to take to crime, formed organized gangs for levy of blackmail, poisoning and stealing cattle, committing dacoities and house-breakings. The district at one time had a bad name for cattle poisoning by Chamars; but, although still addicted to this habit, they have much improved in this respect. They are, now, however, expert house-breakers, and their skill in this branch of crime is no way inferior to that of the criminal tribes. On many occasions the houses of Chamars, who were ostensibly ordinary cultivators, were found, on being searched, to contain melting apparatus for the manipulation of stolen property. Cattle theft is another class of crime common in the district, the contiguity of many Native States and the passage of numerous Banjara droves in the north affording facilities for it. The local criminal castes are Chamars, mostly to the west, and Gandas, mostly to the east, of the district in the Chandrapur tract. Failure of crops easily leads to organize crime by either class. Good railway communication brings not infrequent visits of foreign professional criminals. The high road to Puri lies through the district and affords such gentry an excellent disguise and excuse for wandering. Gangs of "Jagannathis," outside railway limits, usually receive close attention from the local Police. In

years of scarcity, hunger occasionally drives the Korwas, the wild hillmen of Sirguja and Udaipur States on the north, east, across the border, to commit grain thefts. The construction of railways has opened up the district and brought in a crowd of foreigners, mostly for legitimate trade. But many an up-country man, who lives by his wits, has found the district a happy hunting ground. Beyond occasionally lending a hand in a riot, he is usually careful to keep clear of the Police; but short of actual crime, there is no sort of rascality for which he is not ready. The "Pardeshi" is much feared by the indigenous people of the district, who are for the most part both timid and ignorant.

The strength of the Police in the district is 533 officers and men and consists of 1 District Superintendent of Police, 1 Assistant District Superintendent of Police, 1 Deputy Superintendent of Police, 6 Inspectors, 35 Sub-Inspectors, 77 Head Constables, 409 Constables and 3 Sowars. Excluding the three gazetted officers and the Police engaged in guards, reserve, training and various duties at headquarters, 370 of all ranks are engaged actually in the preventing and detection of crime, *i.e.*, one policeman for every 21 square miles of area and every 3,098 people, a very small proportion. They are distributed among 25 station-houses, the old system of subordinate outposts having been done away with. The annual cost of the District Police is Rs. 1,35,120.

The district contains, in addition, a body of Railway Police under an Inspector at Bilaspur railway station. The latter has under him one Sub-Inspector stationed at Bilaspur and under him, in charge of the Katni line, three head constables and 25 constables. Of these, 18 constables are stationed at Bilaspur, 3 at Pendra road and 2 each at Akaltara and at Champa. These Railway Police are, of course, under the supervision of the Superintendent, Government Railway Police.

Prior to 1st of May 1888 all Zamindars were responsible for the maintenance and administration of the Police within their estates. But from that date the Zamindars of Pandaria Kanteli and

Champa were relieved of the responsibility, as were the other Zamindars from the 1st September 1892, part of the cost of Police within their estates was added to their land revenue payments to Government.

Note on the Gazetteer of the Bilaspur District (3rd Settlement, 1905 to 1912).

The settlement of 1889-90 expired in 1900-01 and the operations for revision were started by Mr. C. E. Low, I.C.S., Settlement Officer, in 1898. The serious outbreak of famine caused the postponement of the operations. In 1905 the settlement operations were again commenced by Mr. J. E. Hance, I.C.S., and lasted up to 1912. During this period he was chiefly assisted by Messrs. Jaganath and Ravishanker, Assistant Settlement Officers. The area of the present district differs considerably from that at the last settlement. This note refers to the Khalsa area of the newly-constituted district, excluding the portions previously settled and transferred from the Sambalpur district in 1906. There are now 1,687 villages comprising an area of 2,483 square miles. Of the total area 70 per cent is occupied for cultivation, 68 per cent. cultivated and 62 per cent. cropped. Of the occupied area 21 per cent. is held by the malguzars as their home-farm, 3 per cent by plot proprietors (malik-makbuzas) and Government ryots, 74 per cent by rent-paying tenants in absolute-occupancy, occupancy and ordinary rights, and the remaining 2 per cent by revenue-free grantees and privileged tenants. The proportions in which the tenancy area is held in absolute-occupancy, occupancy and ordinary rights are 10, 32 and 58 per cent, respectively.

Third regular settlement and the area to which it relates.

The following statement shows the extent to which the rent-rate rose during the term of settlement, and the enhancement imposed at the revision. The rent-rate for all classes of tenants rose spontaneously by only 2 per cent, and was further enhanced

The following statement compares the assets as fixed at this revision with those of the former settlement. This, however, excludes the portion received by transfer from the Sambalpur district:—

The total assets at the revised settlement are thus Rs. 9·4 lakhs as against Rs. 6·5 lakhs at the former settlement, showing an increase of about Rs. 2·9 lakhs or 44 per cent.

The gross revenue as revised amounts to Rs. 4,94,370 and absorbs 53 per cent of the total revised assets. It exceeds the revenue of Rs. 3,52,262 assessed at the former settlement by Rs. 1,42,108 or by 40 per cent. At that settlement the revenue absorbed 54 per cent. of the gross assets. Excluding the payments by the plot proprietors, the percentage of the malguzari revenue, which amounts to Rs. 4,75,705, absorbs only 52 on the malguzari assets. The revenue rate per acre of the cultivated area is thus raised from Re. 0-5-5 to Re. 0-7-4 or by 35 per cent. Including the portion received by transfer from Sambalpur the total revenue of the district now stands at Rs. 5,11,305.

The assessment imposed on the occupied area of six regularly settled ryotwari villages and the patch cultivation at the head-quarters of the district amounts to Rs. 1,054 with an acreage incidence of Re. 0-10-7 an acre.

This settlement has been announced for 20 years, and will expire on the 30th June of 1929, 1930 and 1931 for the Mungeli, Bilaspur and Janjgir tahsils respectively.
