The Civil List

The Legislative Council passed an amendment to the Civil List on 28th November which increased the salaries of several Serior Civil Servants including the following:-

The Governor from £5000 to £5,750 which includes contingencies and allowances in lieu of exemption from Customs Duty in addition to a -free farnished residence.

The Colonial Secretary—£1.650
The Attorney General—£1,600 The Colonial Tressurer or Financial Secretary-\$1,400:

One of the reasons for increasing the Governor's emoluments from £5,000 to £5,750 is, we understand, to raise the status of the Colony to that of a first class Colony, similar to Jamaica and Trinidad.

With one exception all the members who were present at the Legislative Council voted for the increases and for raising the status of the Colony.

The Honourable C. R. Jacob whe opposed the passing of the Civil List asked the pertinent question whether the increase of the Governor's Salary would automatically raise the status of the Celony? He thought that it was only reasonable to raise the salaries of the other Senior Administrative Officers to the level of the Trinidad and Jamaica scales if there is to be cooperation with the Governor, and less dissatisfaction among all ranks of the service.

We have been informed on the best authority that the British Gujana Civil Service Association is gravely dissatisfied and their representatives had made strong tepresentations. recently to the Committee which enquired into the renu version of administrative, professional. and technical officers regarding the disparity of salaries that are paid in Tripided and Jamaica to officers of equal rank, experience and ability.

Regarding the dissatisfaction among Administrative Officers, the tollowing comparative figures of salaries should be of interest :-

In Trinidad, ithe Culonial Secretary received £2 000, the Attorney General, £1,750 and the Financial

Municipal Elections

MR. R. B. GAJRAJ SCORES, VICTORY OVER MR. W. S. DERYCK

The Election of Councillor to represent Ward No. 1, Kingston on the Georgetown, Town Council for a term of two years beginning from January 1, 1945 took place yesterday and resulted in a victory for Mr. Gajraja young businessman who defeated the retiring Councillor, Mr. W. S. deRyck by 12 votes for the Kingston seat.

Mr. H. E. Belgrave, Town Clerk, discharged the duties of Returning Officer and the elections were carried out in a most friendly atmosphere. A fairly large crowd was present at the declarations.

For many years, because the seat was not contested the electors of Kingston did not have to record their votes. He owed them a deep debt of gratitude; and promised to give them the best possible service in the Council. He did not propose to become a member of any group or clique but intended instead to work in the best interests of the people.

Continuing Mr. Gajraj moved a vote of thanks to the Returning Officer for the very efficient manner in which the election was conducted,

The Lingua Franca Of India

Both Hindi and Urdu should be weared from certain influences under which they have been functioning and which have made them drift further apart from teach other, and should adjust and reconcile themselves to the needs of the times and to the requirements of the people.

These two points were brought out in the course of a discussion on "What should be the lingua franca of India? —fourth in the A.I R. series, "India To-morrow"—broadcast on April 10 Mr. A. G. Shirreff. Adviser to the Covernor of the United Provinces, who presided over the discussion, was sure that if these two points were constantly and dilligently kept before our minds, they would, in the not too distant fusure, result in the evolution of a common language for India.

Rai Krishna Dass and Rai Bahadur Ram Babu Sexena advocated their respective case for Hindi and Urdu, while Dr. Tara Chand looked upon Urdu and Hindi as two extremes of a single medium of speech, "Urdu goes on absorbing indiscriminately more and more Aracic and Persian words," he said, "while Hindi continues to imbibe a large number of Sanskirt words." Dr. Tara Chand observed that in evolving a national language for India no political or religious considerations should colour our judgment.

The discussion started with the postulate that lingua frança of India should be a language most widely spoken or understood and must be one which had naturally grown from the genius of people. The lingua franca, whatever it might be, should not replace any of the local or provincial languages but should serve as a means to inter-provincial intercourse.

India's War Supplies to . Russia

A graphic picture of the work of Indian troops in corrying war materials for Russia through Persia and Iraq will shortly be available in a film which is now being prepared by a special team of cameramen

The film tells the complete story of a gigantic undertaking from start to finish: from the time goods are larded at a port in Iraq to their final delivery into Russian hands in North-West Persia. The whole journey of some thousand miles by river, rail and road—through varied landscape and weather—shows Indian soldiers at work as engineers, labourers, drivers and sentries, all performing their altotted task with skill and patience, often in the most trying conditions

We wonder what motive is guiding the Management of the B.G. Rice Marketing Board to thus treat the producers of rice.

We cannot and will not allow the B G. Rice Marketing Board to retard the development of the rice Industry which has been built up at the supreme secrifice of misery and starvation by the East Indian population.

We demand an immediate enquiry by the elected Legislative Council into this matter which we consider extremely prejudicial to the rice Industry and the people as a whole of British Guiana and the West Indies.

We have been demanding of Government a change of attitude in Ats manipulations with respect to the entire composition of the B.G. Rice Board and its Management. Government has 'to date given a deaf ear to our demands so that we place the present chaos as the entire responsibility of Government.

Masses Confidence In **Present Governor** Waning

· The Governor refused point black to see representatives of the party and instead ordered police-mounted and foot, to keep guard.

The incident of Monday was related as follows: At about nine-o'clock Mr. Jenaraine Singh received Ltelephone message that he was urgently required as President of the B.G.E.I.A. at the Georgetown Ferry Stelling by a large. party who wanted him to lead them

to Government House. At the Ferry Stelling were presen around four hundred persons from Windsor Forest, Settlement who wanted to place their grievance of an increase of over four hundred per cent land tax before His Excellency and to state their dissatisfaction of Government's intention, to place Windsor Forest under the Local Government Board against the wishes of the entire

population there.

The party under pledge of peaceful behaviour was then led to Government House where the Private Secretary informed Mr. Jenaraine Singh that the Governor will not see the representatives of the party under any circumstances. The instructions from the party which was standing in front of Government House was then conveyed to Sir Gordon Lethem that they (the party) will sit on the avenue opposite Government House until such time as the Governor chose to see their representative even if it took them all day and night. The party. thereupon squatted in the avenue, Mounted, foot and plain clothes police soon after arrived on the scene and

patrolled around the peaceful party. The Hon, Dr. J. B. Singh, Legislative Council representative of the district arrived on the scene, spoke to the party and then interviewed the Governor on his personal capacity. Unfortunately his efforce were fruitless and the dissatisfied party remained seated:

Refreshments were provided at about 1,30 p.m. to the party by members of the British Guiana East Indian Association. While this peaceful party was in the midst of their refreshment; increased number of foot police arrived soon after accompanied by a Supt. of Police and a full lorry load of policemen.

The Superintendent told Mr. Jenaraine Singh to ask the party to disperse but was told to give the orders bimself. His, efforts failed and the entire lorry load and other policemen around. were called to disperse the party. Matters were fast coming to a climax. The object of the party was thwarted. Instructions were given to the seated party that it must now return whence it came and in the same manner without uttering a word of insult or committing violence of any kind.
