Recent called messages reaching these; parts from India and England indicate the possibility of a solution to the long standing Indian political situations

We, However, removed as we are, by thousands of miles from India cauno: assess the situation realistically or make any prediction on the outcome of the deliberations that will take place as from Monday, the 25th of this month.

We are happy to know that the working Committee of the Indian National Congress will take part in these discussions and that the Congress president Dr. Manhana Kalam Axad is making every effort to pull the full weight of Congress at the Conference. It is indeed unfortunate that the main leaders of India's political life, were in prison for about three years and has just been released; a factor which will be ever present at the conference. Whatever the outcome we are certain of one fact that Indians and for that matter the peoples of the world, have complete confidence in the Indian National Congress and therefore whatever decisions, they will arrive at will have to meet with the approval of all.

India with one fifth of the world's popur lation and ranking fourth among the great Industrial Nations of the world cannot continue in her present political situation and Indians as well of the British are convinced

We pray and hope that a satisfactory solution will be reached at the Conference table on Monday. We do so because we are fully aware of some the difficulties that lie in the path of the negociations, the main problem being the demand by the Indian people of "Complete Independence;" and the framing of a constitution to suit themselves.

COLONIAL APPOINTMENTS

We have read with deep concern recent despatches that four thousand English. men are to be recruited to fill posts in British Colonies. We cannot understand the policy of the English Government in this respect are we to understand that the native population will not be given an opportunity to do something for themselves. The main bindrance in the develop of the Colonies has been the packing of the Government Departments with men who have no interest in the welfare of the native population.

Outstanding examples of such a situation can be seen in British Guiana in the Department of Agriculture and Education It is time the colonists as well as the British Government realise that the preservation of things as they stand at present] cannot survive With any degree of dignity and, honour for all concerned and therefore the earlier the native population take their proper place in the functioning of their respective 'country the better for them.

Now we want to make another point clear when we say native population, we mean just what we have said we do not mead local whites with a little native blood in them and who thinks himself more of an Englishman than the one that comes from England.

5,000,000 Govt. Loan

Chance For Guianese Investors

The Government of British Guiana invite applications for \$5,000,000 three and one half per cent Debentures to be issued at par on the let day of January 1946 under the provisions of the General Local Loan Ordinance No. 25 of 1941.

The loan is required to defray in part the cost of War Services and for such other public purposes as the Secretary of State and the Legislative Council may from time to time approve, as well as for the redemption in par of outstanding 4% chonds of the 16th and 18th issue under Loan Ordinance No. 6 of 1916.

The Loan is secured on the general revenues and assets of the Colony, and the principal will be repaid at par on the first day of January, 1986, but the Government of British-Guiana-will have the option of redemption at par on or after the first day of ...January, 1976, on giving six calender month's notice in the Official Gazette.

Debentures will be of the denominations of \$1000, \$5,000 and \$10,000, will bear interest at the rate of 3½ per cent per anuum payable half-yearly, and will be , transferable by deliver, Each debenture will have attached thereto coupons for the half yearly interest payable thereon. Repayment of the debentures and payment of the interest thereon will be made at the Colonial Treasury. Georgetown.

Application will be closed on 1st November 1945 or on such earlier date as may -be notified in the Official Gazette,

Mr. Ram Ratan Gupta, member of the Indian industrialist deputation, told the Chamber of Manufacturers at a reception recently: "If Australia wishes to capture the Indian market, she must make herself better known. "Their intention was not merely to restore India's economy to the 1939 position; the Bombay Plan showed that Indian public opinion was ready for a considerable step forward. The delegation had seen greater industrial development in Australia than it expected. The delegation will fly to Tasmania on March 4.

Indian Adviser To Japanese Dies In Tokyo

Nationalist Who Tried To Kill British Viceroy

Rash Behari Bose (not to be confused with Subas Chandra Bose, the ex-President of the Indian National Congress and now head of the so-called Free India Government with headquarters at Singapore), is reported to have died at Tokyo at the age of 60 Rash Behari Rose was one of the most actorious Indian terrorist. He had to estape from India to Japan in 1912 after throwing a bomb at Lord Harding, the then Viceroy of India.

Adviser to the Japanese Premier

Bose became a naturalized Japanese cititen and organised the so-called "Indian Independent League of East Asia" an organisation had branches in various Japanese beaports where he contacted Indian seamen calling at these ports in British ships before the war. He also maintained branches of his Indian Independent League in Manchuria, China the Philipines, Java, Malaya and Singapore.

When Japan attacked the British and Americans. General Tojo who was then Japan's chief War Lord appointed Rash Behari Bose his "advisor" to the provisional government of Free Independent India. But when his vival, Subas Chandra Bose, escaped from Bombay and arrived in Tokyo, the Japa dropped Rash Behari and installed Subas Chandra as head of the "Free India Government."

Subas Chandra Bose

Subas Chandra Bose, who was educated at Cambridge University, held a government appointment in India before he up with the Gandhi movement. joined Shortly before Gaudhi issued his "Quit India' notice to the British, Bose disappeared from India and turned up in Japan. Nobody knows how he got away from the British Secret Servicement who had been shadowing him night and day. But it is generally believed in London that he was smuggled out of the country in a Japanese After meeting top ranking submarine politicians. Japanese generals and Bose suddenly turned up in Berlin and was given the rank of "Indian Ambassador" by Hitler Ironically enough, Dr. Goebbels arranged for himself and John Amery. son of the S-cretary of State for India to deliver a series of broadcast tulks against British rule in India.

After the German defeat at Stalingrad, Bose realising that Hitler's days were numbered disappeared from Berlin as suddenly as he had appeared in the Reich.

On his arrival back in Tokyo Tojo took him up and made him head of the so-called "Free India" government at Rangoon. Burma With the death of his namesake, Subas Chandra Bose, is today, the most prominent India revolutionist outside the Gandhi camp.

NO FUTURE FOR INDIANS IN B.G.

Government's failure to provide Land Settlement creates much dissatisfaction among the people of the Colony

The Future of the Indains in British Guiana looks gloomy, the only solution is that all Iudiaus must be prepared to leave for India at short notice with their families; We will do our best to ask the Indian Government to give us a place for land settlement in India and in a few yearswe will require the greatest culture we have partly lost. We cannot call ourselves-Guianese in this way, in British Guiana we are fast losing our language and culture. Government does not want to give 'us-Land Settlement but wants us to be slaves, although the V-E victory was celebrated, this Government is content that in B.G. there must be slaves, why is the Government content to let us remain in slavery no one can understand. Why is the Government not doing anything about land settlement? When there is horrible congestion in Sugar Estates everyday I see before my eyes someone coming to me with "Notice to quit." and the poor people have no place to go, Government must make it publicly known that there will be no Land Settlement so that we will know and understand what to. do. The Overseer did not turn up that day, with the result that the workers did no work on Wednesday, the whole day being wasted

Our correspondent emphasises the fact that the management of Bath estate is in the habit of effering no work until Wednesdays and Thur days so that the workers will abs forced to do task work at their prices,

When the matter was reported in writing to the Labour Inspector on the 2nd and 17th May be replied in writing on the 19th May as under :-

> "This is to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of 17th May and in reply say that from your information the Manager made no breach of the Law which reads :---

> "Section 18. When any employer " offers work to an employee, he shall "inform him either at the time of the offer or as soon thereafter on the same day as may be practicable, whether he is to be paid for his services by the task or by the day, and at what rate for the task or day, as the case may be. I am assured " by the management that every endeavour is made to give prices, as "soon as work is given out, but semetimes this is not practicable."

The Labour Inspector conveniently omitted to refer to the report dated 2nd May when the price was not given until following day.

It is understood that the workers are going to ask a Trade Union to make representations in these matters.
