The same report intimated that hahatmaji was ready to ask the Indian National Congress to join a National Government if this body will be given full control of the Civil Administration. The Vice-roy and the Commander-in-Chief would, it is stated, then have control of the Military.

The Editor: e Editor :-'Indian Opinion " Dear Sir.

This right came directly from Down-ing Street to them and did not require eany go-between or Franchise Commission to convoy it. .

Country Wide Meetings To Retain Sir-Gordon Lethem's Services

RESOLUTIONS PASSED IN DEMERARA BERBICE AND ESSEQUIBO

REQUEST TO BE FORWARDED TO COLONIAL OFFICE

Meetings to retain the Services of His Excellency the Governor Sir Gordon Lethem, K.C.M.G. for one full term of five years, and possibly for another term, are being held everywhere in the Colony. Resolutions supporting this request have been passed at several centres in Demerara, Essequibo and Berbice, and subsequently these prayers of the community will be sent to the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

A meeting held at Craig, East Bank less than a fortnight ago spoke in high . terms of Sir Gordon's schemes introduced since his arrival in the colony in 1941. This meeting was held under the auspices of the Indian Publicity Committee which is an Advisory body to Governments' Bureau of Publicity and Information.

Report has painted a gloomy picture of the illiterates in this Colony, making out that 30,1% of the population of this Colony are illiterate, and more than half-59.2% of Indians cannot read nor write. Would the Commissioners deny that

1. There has been a colony-wide awakening in education, and a marked effort on the part of letterless people to educate themselves.

2. A substantial number of aged people among whom illiteracy is most apparent have passed away thereby reducing the number of -illiterates.

In the face of these facts, apparent to all, is it not erroneous and misleading to tell His Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies that 30.1% of the general population and 59.2% of the Indian population are unable to read and write? Have the Commissioners made any effort to ascertain through Government the figures today? Perhaps it was not necessary to support a Report which to me is more a Literary achievement than a Constitutional Guide.

DISINTERESTED MEMBERS OF THE COMMISSION

As a representative of the BRITISH GUIANA EAST INDIAN ASSOCITION before this Commission, I was hoping to find a conclave of interested Commissioners, with open minds, anxious to listen to witnesses, and sager to obtain information to prepare their minds to report, but to my surprise and disappointment, I discovered after only a few minutes discussion that there was a general lack of interest among members of the Commission, in spite of the Chairman's efforts to whip enthusiasm. Not only were there timely arrivals, but the Commission could not even muster a quorum provoking the following remark from the Chairman-The Hon. Eustace Gordon Woolford K.C. (Vide D.A. 24/4/43.

It is my feeling, and I have consulted everyone present, that " we do not appear to have the power to continue our deliberations. This is the second time on which there was no Quorum, and I cannot help feeling that it is my duty with your consent to report the matter to His Excellency the Governor." India to-day is in a sober and realistic mood. The agitation for complete independence has been tempered, in recent years, by Japan's Imperialist aims and by the possibility of enforced inclusion in the USS.R Bad as British rule has been, not many Indians, so far as we can judge would willingly exchange it for even a veiled control by Japan or Russia. India, in other words, is in a mood to co-operate loyally in the effort to work out a genuine status of reasonable autonomy within the Empire.

Hitler is far more unpopular with educated Indians than Kaiser Wilhelm was in 1914. India as a whole is prepared to do her part in the war.

THEIR OWN AFFAIRS.

In the face of such an attitude, for the Viceroy to say bfuntly that there must be no discussion of dominion status until the war is ended is a blunder of the magnitude of a crime. This is especially true when he did not accompany his ultimatum by any suggestion that pending this decision, India would, of course, be spared the nec ssity of contributing to the war. On the contrary she will be asked to give men and money on a heroic scale. The postponement works only one way: Indians are permitted to pay and die for the Empire, but they are not allowed to consider control of their own affairs within that Empire.

IDEALS OR LOOT?

The development in India is doubly disturbing because of its effect upon neutral world opinion. German propaganda would have us believe that this is not a war between ideologies, but between empires, that England is fighting, not for democracy, but to preserve the encrusted loot of cen-

Urging Universal Adult Suffrage for British Guiana

Six Organisations Cable Secretary of State For The Colonies

Royal Commission Recommendation Must Be Implimented

Six organisations have cabled a resolution to the Secretary of State for the Colonies urging Universal Yault Suffrage for British Guiana. The subject was discussed and total disagreement with the Franchise Commission Report has been expressed.

Here is a copy of the Resolution.

WHEREAS the West India Royal Commission 1938-39 in its Interim Report recommended that "In order to secure that the Elected Element in the Legislative Council should be as truly representative as possible, the object of policy should be the in roduction of Universal Adult Suffrage. Some of us hold that this should be introduced forthwith, others that in should be reached by gradual stages,

AND WHEREAS the British Guiana Franchise Commission 1941 reported in paragraph 43 that "In the circumstances the majority of us regret that we are unable to agree that this Colony, peopled as it is and for the reasons we have already given should embark on so hazardous an experiment without the further examination of the entire problem "that is, the introduction of Universal Adult Suffrage forth with ;

AND WHEREAS these Organisations represent a substantial majority of the people of this Colony;

BE IT RESOLVED that this Conference being of the unanimous opinion aforesaid Cable His Majasty's Secretary of State for the Colonies respectfully requesting the introduction of Universal Adult Suffrage forthwith;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be sent to His Excellency the Governor for his information.

india Owns One-Third in Bank Balances Of **\$12,000,000,000** --

POST WARTRADE WITH BRITAIN

-Motion For Foreign Trade DEFEATED-

India owns, about one-third of the huge bank balances—nearly \$12,000. 000,000—accumulated in Britain by other Nations (including her colonies) for war materials and services.

India's delegates wanted the fund to liquidate these sterling balances so that it could spend them to buy goods elsewhere than in Britain. This proposal worried the British, since they could not possibly pay the huge debt except in goods over a period of years. Other Nations worried because the whole \$8.000,000 000 Fund could have been exhausted in liquidating these sterling balances

An-Indian resolution to liquidate the balances was defeated in Committee on the grounds that the Fund was not being established to haudle such problems. As a result the direction of India's post-war trade will depend on Britains balance of trade: If Britain has a favourable balance and can spare; foreign exchange, India will get her share and can trade with it where she will, Otherwise, India will be forced to do the bulk of this trading with England, TIME.

INSTRUMENTS FOR GENERATING ELECTRICAL WAVES

Sir Jagdish Chandra Bose is dead-His name is known to almost every Indian. The Indian Scientist was born on the 30th November 1858.

He was educated both at Calcutta in Jagdish became Professor of Physics at Calcutta University - when only twenty-seven years old.

He devised a Coherer of the type used in wireless communication in 1896. He also devised several delegate instruments for generating and studying electrical waves, Sir J.C. Bose invented the Crescograph. This device multiply the incidents of plant growth

ten million times. Many of Bose's inventions, have proved themselves invaluable for the development of agriculture every where in the world.

Jagdish Chandra Bose was knighted in 1917.
