On this subject our views are well known: we still maintain the same claim, and while the fight has been lost for the present, His Excellency himself has agreed that universal adult suffrage is the ultimate goal in franchise reform, and we shall never forget it; our efforts to prepare all citizens for it will never be relaxed what clearer example do we need than the people of England, who through the Labour Party. have been clamouring for years for the nationalizing of basic industries of production, and now they are to have it. Had their leaders relaxed after losing the first battle, their cause would, have been lost forever.

As for Sir Gordon's speech at the Hin= doo Religious Society's function two Sundays ago, we must be frank and say we are disappointed. Malice and spite between members of our community there is; we do not deny it, and we dislike it ourselves: we will do our best to eradicate it wherever it shows its ugly head. But Sif-Gordon knows as all Guiana knows that malice and, spite hatred, and love, goodness and badness, godliness, and lawlessness are found in every nation, in: eyery race wherever people live. It has been so from stime immemorial, and it is not confined to any one people. One has only: toread the English newspapers during the flast election to see how malicions and hateful were the charges, exchanges and statements made against each other a by the respective heads of the Conservative and Labour Parties.

As we have stated quite clearly, we dislike the use of these had parts of man's nature, and while we are sorry that reference should have been made to them by Sir Gordon, we must concede that he has a right as a citizen to make these statements if he wants to in much the

same way as we have the right to offer criticism on his statements, and actions It is the Freedom of speech which citizens of Guiana must never permit to be denied them,

It is true that we have not always agreed with His Excellency's policy or his point of view; with his utterances or his method of seeking advice, but, no matter how divergent be our differences on matters politic, we would never think of having recourse to violence. We believed in Mahatma Gandhi's principle of non-violence, and while there may be some among our people who at times cannot subdue the martial spirit ionate in all human beings (and this is a condition common to all mankind) as a whole we perfer to carry on our struggle in a wholesome, constitutional manner, confident in the knowledge that where a cause is just, right will in the end triumph over might.

In conclusion, we wish to assure His Excellency that our people as a whole appreciate his efforts on their behalf, and as; we have said above, while we do-not see eye to eye with him on all occasions, we know that Sir Gordon is motivated by a strong desire, a sincere desire to equitably and deal honourably with all the peoples here, and we trust that the acts of an "irresponsible creature" will not induce him to pass judgement on an entire people. We pray God for His Excellency's health and continued the post admirably. strength, and wisdom in the execution of his difficult task his Governor of British Guinna.

#### INDIAN NATIONAL CONGRESS PARTY ON UNCIO

The Working Committee of the Congress Party, meeting in Simla on July 15, passed a resolution on the United Nations Charten. The Committee regretted the ineffective position allotted to the smaller nations and the placing of the great powers above and beyond the they themselves belped to finme.

Frank and full recognition of the independence of colonial territories is necessary for the laying of a foundation of a stable peace, the Committee declared,

The Committee also noted that the Indian delegates did not represent the Indian people. Resolution said:

These Working Committee welcomes the efforts that have been made by the United Nations to build up an international order to maintain peace and security and to develop friendly relations among the nations based on respect for the principle of equal rights and nelfdeternibation of peoples,

#### STERLING BLOC AND U.S. TRADE

Representative Emanuel Celler, Democrat of New York, a member of the Advisory Board of India League of America, urged the New York Board of Trade on July 27 to conduct immediate and complete investigations into the operations of the sterling bloc pool and its effect as a parrier to United States trade"in many parts of the world. He criticized British monetary policies which have "deprived India of the dollar with which to buy American productivity," Since American currency paid to India by the United States for such strategic materials as mica and manganese is diverted to the Empire dollar pool, "India diverted to the Empire dollar poal, a wonderful performance at the Ursuline is forced, well nigh exclusively, to deal in Convent in aid of charity.

> Mr. Celler then cited as another example the trading situation of the Union of South Africa, the largest producer of gold and always a fertile market for American goods. Why should South Africa be forced to say to American traders: 'You can't export to us, much se we need, your available civilian goods, he inquired.

"What I have said with reference to India and South Africa," he said, "is applicable to Australia, New Zealand, Rhodeias, Pales-I tine, Egypt, B itish East Africa and other Water Street, "

areas."

Representative Celler said he had protested the sterling bloc operations to the-State Department and, while he realized -Britain's position makes it necessary to converse her foreign exchange resources, ha said he felt liberalization of these restrictions should now be in order,

"We deemed it unsporting to murmurduring the European war, he asserted, because the sterling pool then appeared to be a legitimate shield against exploitation and a device to conserve England's war anergies.

"But, thank the Lord, V-E Day has taken its place in history and V-J Day had followed it soon, we hope, and I feel the exporters in the United States are entitled to yell like stuck pigs."
