#### A BILL INTITULED

AN ORDIANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT CONSTITUTION POWERS DUTIES AND FUNCTIONS OF THE BRITISH GUIANA RICE MARKETING BOARD AND FOR PURPOSES CONNECTED WITH THE MATTERS AFORESAID.

E it enacted by the Governor of British Guiana with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council as follows:

This Ordinance may be cited as the Rice Marketing Ordinance, 1945.

2. In this Ordinance,

'the Association" means the British Guiana Rice Producers Association being an association of rice producers to be established by the authority of the Governor for the protection of the interests of rice prolucers under an enabling Ordinance to be hereafter enacted:

#### PROPOSED RICE MARKETING BOARD BILL

Regulations, 1940, and the regulations amending the same;

"rice factory" or "factory" means any premises in which padi is Manufactured into rice by mechanical power, and includes any place, building, machinery or equipment used in carnection with or in relation to such premises for the storage of padi or rice or the manufacture of rice; "rice producer" means—

- (a) any landlord of rice land and any tenant of a holding of rice land within the meaning of these terms as defined by section two of the Rice Farmers (Security of Tenure) Ordinance, 1945;
- (b) any rice farmer who cultivates his own land or any land let or leased to him or which is otherwise lawfully occupied by him notwithstanding that the provisions of the Rice Farmers. (Security of Tenure) Ordinance, 1945, are thereto inapplicable;
- (c) any manufacturer:

"the Secretary" means the Secretary appointed under this Ordinance:

"section" means a section of this Ordinance.

#### CONSTITUTION AND ADMINISTRATION.

3. (1) There shall be established a Board under the name and style of the British Guiana Rice Marketing Board (hereinafter in this Ordinance referred to as "the Board").

(2) The Board shall be a body corporate with perpetual succession, the power to have and use a common seal and the power to hold lands without the licence of the Governor in Council.

(3) The Board may sue and be sued in the name of the British Guiana Rice Marketing Board.

4. (1) The Board shall consist of sixteen members.

(2) Subject to the provisions of subsection (3) of this section the members of the Board shall be appointed by the Governor, and shall be—

(a) four persons who are officers in the public service;

(b) eight persons who are rice producers; and

- (c) four other persons (not being officers in the public service or rice producers) of whom two shall be members of the Legislative Council.—
- (3) The persons to be appointed under paragraph (b) of subsection (2) of this section shall be selected from the members of the council or other governing body of the Association; provided that until the Association has been established or where for any reason the Association ceases to function or fails to elect a council or governing body, or there is an insufficient number of members of the council or governing body of the Association, the Governor shall select such rice producers for appointment as in his discretion he considers fit.
- (4) The members of the Board shall be appointed for two years, and they shall be eligible for re-appointment.
- (5) The Governor shall appoint a member of the Board to be Chairman of the Board and another to be Vice-Chairman.
- . (6) The Chairman shall preside at all meetings of the Board which he attends, and in his absence the Vice-Chairman shall preside. In the absence of both the Chairman and the Vice-Chairman from any meeting of the Board the members present may elect one of their number to be Chairman of the meeting.

#### R.A.F. STRIKE IN INDIA

MR, ATTLER TO MAKE STATEMENT

Approximately 6,000 R.A.F. personnel amending including about 1000 Indiana were reported yesterday to have halted work at two air stations in Campore, the biggest R.A.F. maintenance centre in India. To emphasize "We want to go home demands". The strike began on Saturday but representative of strikers met on Sunday and offered to resume work for ten days if they were satisfied that full publicity had neen given in the United Kingdom to the demands formulated earlier at Mauripur, near Karachi, These demands included speed up in demobilization and trebling of shipping allocations for repatriation, more information on sailing dates and greater use of naval shipping.

Dailing with other points he observed: legislation is an argument of very serious I. L. O. for discussion in this Conference. import, and labour will have to take note of it, At the same time, the question is, about the faith behind the argument. Is it a bona fide argument? #### AGREEMENT ON 48-HOUR WEEK IN FACTORIES

New Delhi, Nov. 27: - The Indian Labour Conference consisting of the representatives of Central and Provincial Governments, important States and Employers' and Workers' organisations unanimously supported the principle of the 48-hour week in India's factories. There was, more or less, complete agreement in regard to the Government's proposals for the statutory provision of industrial canteens and for the amendment of Workmen's Compensation Act.

The Labour Department's memorandum on the reduction of working hours pointed out that it was both unjust and unwise to feronce, the Hon'b'e Dr. Ambedkar said deny the worker a reasonable amount of that the Government do not at present spare time away from the factory, which propose to make any alterations beyond was indisposable for the building up of changing its name to "Indian Labour Con citizenship and for the maintenance of his

physical efficiency. It emphasised that the present-was an opportune moment for taking up this question because there was a need for giving relief to factory workers who had been put to a great strain during the wac. Moreover, shorter hours would lead to greater employment. The memorandum made it clear that the reduction in hours should not be accompanied by any reduction in basic wages or dearness allowances unless there was a fall in prices. The rates of piece-workers should be adjusted on the principle-that a piece-worker should earn not less than a time-worker.

The Conference also discussed today the organisation and functions of the Employment Exchanges set up by the Libour Department to help the resettlement and . employment of demobilised Services personnol and discharged war workers during the transition period. The Labour Department's memorandum on the subject recorded that Employment Exchanges can only give useful assistance if they are in possession of informations regarding the employment opportunities available or likely to be available. The use of the Employment Exchange organisation, it continued, will prove of mutual benefit to employers and employment seekers and will ensure satisfactory distribution of manpower among various branches of production. It will also facilitate the mobility of labour, both occupational and geographical, and will sobviate any bottle necks in the supply of various categories of workers,

#### RECENT CONSTITUTION-AL CHANGES AND ISSUES AND THE QUESTION OF SELF. GOVERNMENT FOR BRITISH GUIANA

This race suspicion in politics would be, if it continues to exist. one of the 3 main causes why we would never get, anywhere to Self Government,

The other two causea are [1] Large vested interests who would dread the result of the masses having to control their own economic and other destines; and [2] The British Government's attitude towards the Colonies, orystalised in the following statement of the West India Royal Commission Report:— "The claim for independence is irreconsilable with that control which. though not necessarily in its present form, : must continue to be exercised in the interests of the home taxpayer, over the finances of Colonies receiving substantial assistance from funds provided by Parliament." So long as financial control remains in the hands of the British Government so long will it and must it deny self-Government to British Guiana. The long terms plans at the moment, good as they are spells one thing-that Self Government is a remoted possibility.

It seems perfectly clear also that past present and future commitments of the Imperial Government must have its quid pro quo in their being able to control trade and industrial relations between Great Britian and her colonies, . Industrial development in the past has been nil in Spite of great possibilities sin British Gniana. I strongly believe that economic sulvation will come with the development of more industries in the colonies just as I also be lieve that Political development will be quickened by such industrial development.
