We feel that Government is lacking in proper planning with regards to the economy of the colony's revenue and expenditure; as a matter of fact it is managed in the most haphazard manner imaginable, leading to continuous speculation, as to the ability of the colony to balance its budget and to promote any long range development scheme.

We are of the opinion that owing to the high taxation levied on the population, the value of a dollar has depreciated to be worth only fifty cents.

Rice Research Scient iscovery

far reaching consequence in the field of nutrition and therefore of considerable importance and utility to countries like Indis, China, Burma, Japan and Malaya, all countries whose staple food is rice, has just been very successfully concluded by a by a scientist in Bangalore.

From the nutrition viewpoint rice presented nurrition experts with a difficult problem, in that, although paddy is rich in vitamin and mineral contents, after it is mitted polished and washed before cooking it is made to lose all those nutritive qualitieg.

The problem of treating paddy to make it retain its vitamin and mineral contents even after milling, polishing and washing has presented nutrition scientists with a difficult problem, Mr. M. A. Srinivasen, former Food Minister, Mysore, having come across in a foreign megazine a process of treating paddy to ensure retention of 90 per cent of its vitamin qualities, initiated a similar line of research in Bangalore. After some months' research, a Bangalore scientist has succeeded at last in standardising a simple process, which is considered by several leading scientists here as superior to any

The process consists in treating paddy in a such manner that one may polish rice as much as possible and wash it thoroughly hefore cooking without in any manner losing its vitamin and mineral contents. This new process enables one to meet the large to mand for polished vice from the gabile. assuring them the maximum nutritional value, assessed at 80 per cent.

545 "I have succeeded beyond expectations", observed the scientist enthusiastically.

The processis estimated to cost one rupee for treating 200 seers of puddy, and the apparatus required can be easily manufactured anywhere. (Times of India)

7 Eight members present at any meeting of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

8 The Board may act notwithstanding any vacancy among the members thereof.

9 The Chairman, Vice-Chairman, or other member presiding at a meeting of the Board shall have an original and a casting vote.

IO A member of the Board shall not take part in or vote on the decision of any matter with respect to any transaction between the Board and himself or between the Board and any person in whose business he is pecuniarily interested whether directly or indirectly.

11 The Governor may grant leave of absence to any member of the Board,

Where leave has been granted, the Governor may, subject to the provisions of paragraphs a, b and c of subsection 2 and of subsection 3 of this section, appoint another person to act in the place of the member of the Board who has been granted such leave.

13 A member may, by writing under his hand addressed to

the Colonial Secretary, resign from the Board.

14 Where a member, without the feave of the Governor, absents himself from three consecutive meetings of the Board, he shall be deemed to have resigned.

15 The Governor may, at any time, revoke the appointment

of a member of the Board.

Where a member of the Board has resigned, or is deemed to have resigned, or where the appointment of a member of the Board is revoked, the Governor may, subject to the provisions of paragraphs a, h and c of subsection 2 and of subsection 3 of this section, appoint another person to be a member of the Board during the abexpired portion of his predecessor's term of office.

A meeting of the Board shall be held on a convenient date in every alternate month in each year and at such other times as may

bo necessary.

The reasonable travelling expenses incurred by members of the Board in attending meetings of the Board or of any committee of the Board or while engaged, whether within or outside the Colony.

INDIAN EMIGRATION

New Delhi, Wednesday,

Emigration from India to other parts of the Commonwealth and Empire is suggested by a commission of inquiry into the 1913 Bengal famine in its final report published today. The analysis indicated that in the absence of major calamities the population would increase from 400,000,000 to 500,000; 000 in the next 20 or 25 years. The report looks forward to the day when the people of India will be able to emigrate as colonists entitled to full rights of citizenship to sparsely populated parts of th Empire. The report says that there is a general tendency for the excess of births over deaths to increace and that great possibilities exist for a futher reduction of the death rate by the development of public health services.
