Government Admits - Inefficiency

Capt. L. D. Gammans Opposed to Race, Religion and Colour Distinction in Civil Service

SUJGESTION FOR MASS

"PROGRESS HAS BEEN PATCHY"

Captain L. D. Jammans, M. P. who visited this colony earlier this year, bas written an article in the "London Times" suggesting six principles for Unity and reform within the British Empire. This Member of Parliament admits in Suggestion No 5 that race religion, and colour bar exist in the Empire. Here are Captain Gamman's six suggestions: ...

- (1) The establishment of a Colonial Development Board in London upon which each Colony would have direct representation. The Colonial Welfare and Development Act as a welcome move in this direction, but its limitations are that it is far too short-term in its application; it does not necessa-rily apply to the whole of the Colonial Empire; it does not integrate the economies of one colony with those of another; and it savours to a certain extent of the almoner's purse. In four directions in Particular I do not believe that we can afford haphaard development-secondary industries, broadcast ing, intercolonial air communication, and the investment of British capital,
 - (2) A Colonial Defence Council. I is doubtful if Great Britain alone is now able to assume responsibility for the defence of the Colonial Empire. The Colonial peoples are both willing and competent to play their part, if encouraged to do so. ...
 - (3) A more dynamic approach towards educations. In the short-term sense this means a mass attack on illiteracy. But education must do more than merely-making people literate. Any educational policy is a failure unless it raises the standard of agriculture, upon which the colonial peoples largely depend, encourages power of leadership, and engenders pride in local traditions and cultures.
- (4) A minimum standard of social *services. More has been done in this direction than is generally realised, but progress has been patchy. There but progress has been patchy. There is surely a basic minimum of health and hospital services, as well as such things as workmen's compensation, without which we should not be satisfied.
- [5] The creation of an Imperial Civil Service to which any British subject with the necessary-qualifications can aspire without distinction of race, religion or colour,
- [6] A common Imperial currency to take the place of the present hotchpotch of sterling, rupees, and local dollars of varying denominations.

Plan For Development of Hinterland And Coastland

As Presented to the Hinterland Development Committee

1. The sugar estates of the colony should keep only the essential amount of labourers necessary to run the estates with a double or treble shift so as to ensure a steady working capa-city and to provide by this means for unseen exigencies. This would also unseen exigencies. This would also give a weekly distribution of wages to all workers of steady employment in fixed jobs. Surplus population unemployed to be removed to other employments or put aside for later consideration.

"With a set number of employees the estates should provide good and well drained lands and help them to build houses payable by instalments with community grazing pastures, play grounds; recreation centres, farm lands, ricefields and other amenities to promote satisfaction, loyalty and a sense of live and die ownership on the estate lands, to work for the estates as if they were their own. This would mean a co-operation bitherto unknown. Villagers having their fixed abode as proprietors must be encouraged to embark on as many projects they could possibly afford, so as to employ and encourage the superfluous labourers unwanted by the estates.

There are many who would prefer to remain in the villages whilst the adventurous must be allowed to seek their fortunes di bar with the government or in the interior.

A similar social welfare programme as that of the estates should be initiated to provide a self contained community either by oc-operative societies, individual efforts or by the help of government. One potent factor should be forcefully in mind and that is to strictly discourage litigation where money useful to the poor is uselessly spent-

Bureaus for help and information must be set up and Arbitration ins ead of Law should be the criterion for a people- aspiring to decency and pros-

perity for the dignity of the Empire Government Public Works depart-

ment should absorb some of the setate surplus labour as was done by the villeges and secure them by proper living conditions as is envisioned to be done by both the estates, and the villages, In towns, and oities, where many

varied interests especially commercial. and industrial companies employ numberless labourers similar provisions as those of the estatas villages and government must be provided so as to have a uniform system humane and beneficial to both the employers and the employees for mutual anoperation and satisfection for colonial progress. This would naturally keep the coastal population confined to domestic employment without veriation or fuctuation into a kind of routinism. All the coastal people will have been employed in some definite work eliminating the necessity to search for labour or that of labour searching for work. (To be continued)

The Hon. J.A. Luckhoo K.C.—Nominated Member and supposed INDIAN MOUTH PIECE in the Governor's Executive Council, to the surprise and astonishment of the masses, particularly the Indian Community, dubs the masses as being incompeter and not ripe for UNIVER-SAL ADULT SUFFRAGE forthwith.

We cannot be annoyed with Mr Luckhoo for expressing this opinion of his, and perhaps of his friends, for it is a divine privilege for an individual to enjoy his opinion, but when it is considered that as the Indian Mouthpisce in the Executive Council, this opinion will be taken as reflecting the opinion of the Indian people of the Colony, it is at once clear that Mr Luckhoo has done the 140 000 odd Indian in this Colony and grievous wrong for no one is more familiar than Mr Luckhoo of the fact that all Indian Organisations representing the Indian people in this Colony are firm, and unanimous in their advocacy of the introduction of Universal Adult Suffrage forthwith.

It is a departure from our policy to write in this mood of those whom we would like to claim as ours, but under the circumstances it is inevitable. It took a Deputation to inform His Excellency the Governor Sir Gordon Letnem K.C.M.G. that the opinion expressed by Mr Luckhoo was his own opinion and not that of the Indian Community whom he ostensibly is
