Wage Increase:	Strikes for all causes involving wages, primarily for wage increase, and excepting wage reductions.
Wage Decrease:	Strikes against wage reductions.
Hours:	Strikes involving all questions relating to working time, whether increase, decrease or adjustment.
Others:	Strikes involving all other causes such as discrimination, unionization, sympathy, jurisdiction.
Succeeded:	Result of strike completely or largely satisfactory to the employees.
Failed:	Result of strike complete failure for the employees.
Compromised:	Strike compromised, partly successful.
