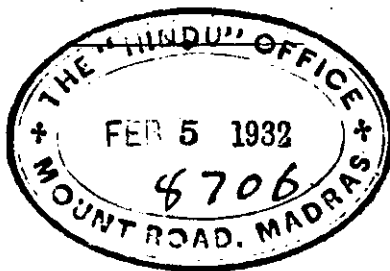

PREFATORY NOTE

This volume contains all Letters and papers received from England in 1747-1748. The documents are printed in the order in which they are found in volume No. 51 of the series known as "Public Despatches from England".

The years adopted in dating the letters are what are called "Old Civil Years", and to convert a date of that old style into the corresponding historical date, the following rules should be observed:—

- (1) When any day from 1st January to 24th March (inclusive) is followed by figures denoting a single year, add one to them.

Example—25th February 1690 = 25th February 1691.

- (2) When any day from 25th March to 31st December (inclusive) is followed by figures denoting a single year, make no alteration.

Example—25th June 1690 = 25th June 1690.

- (3) When any day in the year is followed by figures denoting two years, adopt the second of these two.

Example—25th February 1690-91 = 25th February 1691.

25th June 1690-91 = 25th June 1691.

The original manuscript volume has been mended in this office and is in a fair state of preservation.

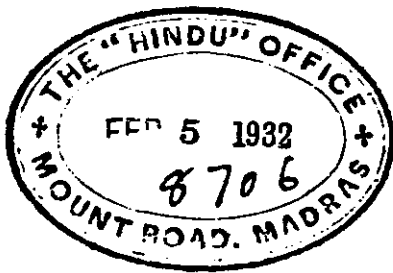

1. On the 20th. of April, the Porto Bello Sloop brought Us your Advices of the 17th. October 1746 and by Letters from Bombay received Overland, We learn with great Satisfaction that You had Repulsed the French, and continued in Possession of the Place in December last.

2. Having taken the Same into Serious Consideration; We have Judged it proper upon such a surprizing Revolution in our Affairs, as the loss of Madrass, to Constitute Fort S^t. David our Head Settlement, and to Appoint John Hinde Esquire to be President and Governour of Fort S^t. David, and all our Settlements and Affairs, on the Choromandell Orixa and Sumatra Coasts, with the Advice and Concurrence of Edward Croke, Stringer Lawrence, Charles Floyer, William Holt, Alexander Wynch, and Thomas Cooke Jun^r. as his Council, and a Commission is accordingly enclosed under Our Seal; in the Ship Porto Bello's Packet.

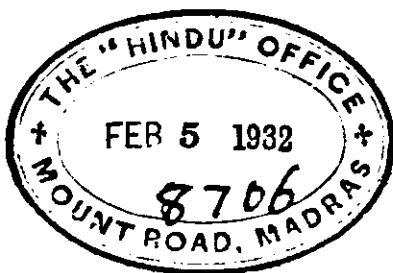

OUR GOVERNOUR AND COUNCIL
AT FORT S^t. DAVID.

1. We wrote last the 16th. October 1747 although the same went by Eleven Different Ships, yet as they sail'd in company, We judge proper to send Copy thereof enclosed.

2. As does also a List of Ships that We thank God are returned to Us, in safety this Season.

3. By M^r. Hugonin We received your Advices dated the 10th. January 1746, and by the Ship Lapwing your Letters dated the 2^d. and 15th. May last, with a very deep Concern for M^r. Hinde's Death.

4. We have taken up the Ship Orford Burthen 300 Tons Captain Edmund Smyth, for Persia and Bombay, We are fitting out also Our own Ships Dolphin Burthen 380 Tons Captain George Newton and Lapwing 300 Tons Captain Francis Cheyne.

5. This comes by the Ship Hardwicke Captain John Samson, We have put on board Three Hundred Bales of Broad Cloth, with Fifty Tons of Iron, both designed for the Bengal Market, you are therefore to land them and forward the same by the Best Conveyance that offers, unless any part are wanted on the Coast.

Thirty Bales of Long Ells and Seventy Tons of Lead, with the other Articles noted in the Invoice to be designed for China, are therefore to continue on board, and with Twenty Five Chests of the Treasure, likewise such Articles as you have on hand proper for the Canton Market, are to be consigned by Regular Invoice and Bills of Loading unto Messieurs Lascoe Hide, John Burrow, Thomas Sandys, Samuel Blount and William Fead or such of them as are Resident at Canton, giving the Commander Orders to make the best of his way thither and obey their Orders.

7. Letters of this Tenour come also by Our Ships Scarborough, Duke of Dorset and Wager chiefly Laden with Naval and Victualling Stores for His Majesty's Squadron, which must be landed or delivered to the Commander in Chief with all Possible Expedition and thereupon the said Ships must be hastned away to China forwarding on them thither the Lead and Long Ells that are on board, with the other Articles noted in the Invoices to be designed for China, continuing on each Ship Twenty five Chests of Our Treasure, adding such Articles as are proper for the China Market, and consign the Duke of Dorset to the same Supra Cargos as are beforementioned for the Hardwicke.

8. The Scarborough and Wager you are to consign unto Mess^{rs}. Frederick Pigou, Thomas Shore, Samuel Court, Alexander Hume and Benjamin Torin the Supra Cargos of those Ships or such of them as are resident at Canton, giving the Captains Sailing Instructions accordingly.

9. These Four Ships must in all Events be sent to China, as must also the Four Ships mentioned in Our Letter of the 16th. October last, whether they arrive Early or Late, that you may not be Overburthened with Tonnage, and as We shall reckon, with the Blessing of God, upon having all the Eight Ships from Canton and take Our Measures accordingly.

10. The said Four Ships as mentioned in Our Letter of the 16th. October are to be consigned thus, in case they are not dispatched before this comes to hand.

11. The First and Third that arrives in China to the Chief and Second of M^r. Pigous Sett of Supra Cargos, the Second and Fourth, to the Chief and Second of M^r. Hide's Sett and the Four following Thirds viz^t.

} dispatched by you, who are to take passage accordingly, on the said respective ships, but if they are dispatched, they must go on to China upon the same Ships as from hence.

12. In case of the Death or Absence of either of the Chiefs, M^r. Shore is to be Chief of that Sett

13. If the Four Ships mentioned in Our Letter of the 16th. October are not sent to China before this comes to hand, besides the Cargos mentioned in Our said Letter, You must put Ten Chests more of Treasure on board each of those Ships, consigning the same to the Supra Cargos as beforementioned, and in case those Ships are sailed to China before these Ships arrive, you are then to forward on them the said Treasure for the Service of those Ships, consigning it to their SupraCargos accordingly.

14. As we are greatly in debt at Bengal, you must forward thither all the Money that can possibly be spared after reserving sufficient for the carrying on Our Investments upon the Coast and for other Necessary Occasions, embracing any Good Conveyance that offers to transmit the same.

15. We entirely approve of your dispatching the Britannia to Us in May, and shall be highly pleased if the Bombay Castle or some other Ship was sent Us in September, Callico's and Bettellees being in Great Demand in Europe, We would have you go on securing all the Cloth and other Articles you are able conformable to Our last List of Investment until We send another, duly observing Our Orders of the 24th. July last as to the Fine Species.

16. M^r. Monson informs Us that the Three Setts of New Merchants Ballances at Fort S^t. George amounted to about Sixteen Thousand Pagodas when the Place was taken, which Ballances, or what is really due, We rely upon your best Care to recover agreeable to the Promise before Us, as also the Money due from the Old Merchants, which by the Calculate of Quick Stock dated the 31st. January 1745 stood thus viz^t.

Foxall at the same Salary and other Allowances as he received at Madrass until We think fit to reinstate him, training up one of Our Covenant Servants of a Good Genius under him to learn the Art, and thereby be able to carry on the Business whenever it may be requisit.

18. The Nabob and his Sons deserting Us at the time of your Greatest Distress must caution you against placing too much Confidence in the Countrey Powers, parting with no more of Our Money to them than shall be judged necessary.

19. We rely on the Good Promise made Us that Our Money shall be laid out to the Best Advantage in carrying on the Works which were deemed requisit for the defence of the Place, hoping that as Our Estate was at stake, with your own property, Liberty and every thing that is dear and valuable, those Works were well adapted to that End, and that you have benefited by M^r. Hinde's Worthy Example, so as to defeat all further Attempts of the Enemy, in Confidence whereof We confirm Charles Floyer Esq^r. President and Governour of Fort S^t. David and All Our Affairs on the Choromandel, Orixia and Sumatra Coasts, directing that the Council consist thus viz^t.

Mr. Edward Croke Second, and to remain as such, whose declining the Presidency on account of Infirmitys is well pleasing to Us.

Major Stringer Lawrence, Third and to remain as such.

A Commission is enclosed accordingly in the Hardwicke's Packet, each of you on receipt hereof must take an Oath to be True and Faithful to the Company, noting the same upon Consultation, and write to your Friends here to give the Usual Security, and in case of Vacancys they are to be filled up with the next in Standing, according to the List of Covenant Servants transmitted to Us by the Lapwing, which Disposition must continue until We can determine whether any of Our late Servants at Madrass shall be reinstated in Our Service, or not.

20. In reply to your Recommendations of Mr. John Hallyburton We choose to wait the Issue of the Embassy to Nizam Mulmuluck before We determine any thing concerning him.

21. As the Lieutenants on the Fort St. George Establishment did not forfeit their Honour by its Loss, and on Your continuing the Officers in their former Commissions, the Lieutenants behaved very well in the Two Actions with the Enemy, We leave it to You to grant Captains Commissions to such of them as you judge proper; Be sure to encourage Ensign Clive in His Martial Pursuits according to His Merit, any Improvement he shall make therein shall be duly regarded by Us. You may rest assured that All the Recruits We can raise shall be sent by every Conveyance.

22. An Accurate Correct Account must be transmitted to Us [by] every Ship of Our Quick Stock remaining upon hand at their Departure, inserting therein the Cash, Bullion, Europe and Indian Goods, Stores and Good Debts then at your Place and the Several Subordinates upon the Coast, deducting the Debts owing by Us, all of You attesting the same, it being of Great Importance for Us to have a Clear Insight of Our Affairs.

23. Our Cash, Bullion and Rupees must be kept by the President Second and Fourth except a Running Cash of Twenty Thousand Pagodas for Current Services by the President, and the Accounts of each must be Monthly laid before the Whole Council, to whom the Ballances are to be produced entering the same upon Consultation.

24. Regular Muster Rolls of the Military Certified by the Proper Officers, List of Marriages, Christnings and Burials sign'd by the Chaplains, of the Inhabitants Men, Women and Children, attested by the Secretary must be transmitted Annually in September, and by the January Ships.

25. Having suffered greatly by the Number of Priests and Popish Inhabitants at Madrass, who have acted a very Treacherous Part to Us continually in that place, especially when it was attacked, therefore We strictly forbid your suffering any Romish Church within Our Bounds, Or any of their Priests to dwell among you, or that Religion to be openly professed, and in case any Papists have crept into places of Trust in Our Service, they must be immediately dismiss'd. You are not to deem this Order to affect the Armenians of the Greek Persuasion.

26. We are informed that although Our late Governour Hinde turned out of the Companys Bounds an Italian Padre under a Guard, yet since Mr. Hinde's Death, by Mr. Lennox's Influence he was permitted to return, We are dissatisfied with that Proceeding and require Mr. Lennox to return home.

27. We are come to a Resolution that the Ship Delawar shall proceed from your place to Benjar, in order to keep up Our Claim to that Trade and thence to China, but she must first be sent by you to Tellicherry for Sandal Wood, therefore write by Express Cossids to Bombay and the Chief and Council at Tellicherry to provide upon Our Account Two or Three Hundred Candy or what more can be got ready, which with Ten Chests of Silver that you are to put on board is to be her Cargo, We shall send Mr. George Mandeville and Mr. John Goodere from hence to go as Second and Third Supra Cargos, and shall give the further needful Orders by a future Conveyance, but in case of the Delawar's miscarriage another of Our Ships must be sent on

this Voyage, as We are intent upon discharging You of that Great Burthen of Tonnage We have sent and shall be further obliged to consign unto you.

28. We approve of Your employing several that were Our Late Servants at Madrass as We shall of such others that may be wanted to carry on Our Business until We can determine about reinstating them in Our Service.

29. When Mr. Prince, Mr. Saunders, or Others come from the Northern Settlements to your place, you must appoint such of Our Servants to supply their places as you judge to be the most proper.

30. We having consigned the Ship Dolphin Captain George Newton to Bombay, with directions to be sent thence to Bengal, but the Captain will be order'd on sailing from Bombay to call first at your place, that so You and the Admiral may send the Needful Advices to Bengal by him.

31. If by any Advices of French Ships, or by any Accident the Dolphin should be put by going to Bombay, the Captain is then directed to make the Best of his way to your place or Bengal, on his coming to you, the Ship is to be sent down to the Bay, whence she is to be returned home to Us.

32. Monsieur La Bourdonnaye with Five French Ships arrived from Loando St. Pauls at Martinico some time ago, where he left them and retired to Eustatia, whence he took passage on a Dutch Ship, that by Stress of Weather put into Falmouth, where he was taken Prisoner of War by Captain Bladwell of His Majestys Ship the Mercury, and will soon be conducted to London.

33. Whatever French Prisoners, or other Europeans shall be taken in their Service, in case there is no opportunity to Exchange them, We would have you send home all you can upon Our returning Ships, not sending more than Fifteen on a Ship, detaining the others till an Opportunity offers.

34. We have been applyed to by M^{rs}. Medeiros to order the payment in Bengal of the three following Bonds viz^t.

One dated the 17th. June 1745 for Pagodas 5000.

One dated the 18th July for Pagodas 15000.

One dated the 1st. August for Arcot Rupees 30000.

all said to be Outstanding for Money lent by her Husband to the late Governour and Council at Fort St. George.

35. We shall be very glad when all just Demands of this Sort are discharged, having no sort of pleasure in paying so large an Interest [as] Eight $\frac{1}{2}$ Cent, but as We directed in Our Letter of the 24th. July last, that Whatever demands might be made on you for money borrowed or taken into Cash at Madrass, you should state the same clearly to Us, and wa[it] for Our answer before you comply'd therewith, and as We are not yet in a Capacity to distinguish the Nature of the Several Claims which may be made upon Us, We are under a necessity of Waiting for further Advices from You, not doubting but you will be Full and Explicit, not only with regard to [this] but All other demands which may be made upon Us. This is all We can say at present, except that you may let M^{rs}. Medeiros know, that when hereafter We may give directions for satisfying her demands, We shall order the mony to be paid on the Coast and not in Bengal. We are

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT S^t. DAVID PER DOLPHIN, DATED FEBRUARY 10, 1748
[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 51, pages 65 to 68*].

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL
AT FORT S^t. DAVID.

1. The Ship Scarborough carryed Our last dated the 13th. January, the Duke of Dorset and Wager will soon follow with Letters of the like Tenour.

2. This comes by Our own Ship Dolphin, Burthen 380 Tons Captain George Newton Commander, consigned to Bombay with Directions to be sent thence to Bengal, but the Captain will be ordered on sailing from Bombay to call first at your place, that so you and the Admiral may send the Needful Advices to Bengal by her.

3. If by any Advices of French Ships, or by any Accident the Dolphin should be put by going to Bombay, the Captain is then directed to make the best of his way to your place or Bengal, on his coming to you, the Ship is to be sent down to the Bay, whence she is to be returned home unto Us.

4. You are to Supply the Dolphin with the Needful Stores and Provisions.

5. On the Captain offering to pay any Money into Our Treasury upon his own account, you are to receive the same granting Certificates for the Amount, acting in like manner with respect to the Commanders of the other Ships.

6. We have been applyed to by M^r. Medeiros to order the payment in Bengal of the Three following Bonds viz^t.

One dated the 17th. June 1745 for Pagodas 25000.

One dated the 18th. July for Pagodas 15000.

One dated the 1st. August for Aroot Rupees 30000.

all said to be Outstanding for Money lent by her Husband to the [late] Governour and Council at Fort S^t. George.

7. We shall be very glad when all just Demands of this Sort are discharged, having no sort of pleasure in paying so large an Interest as Eight $\frac{1}{2}$ Cent, but as We directed in Our Letter of the 24th. July last, that whatever Demands might be made on you, for Money borrowed or taken into Cash at Madrass, you should state the same Clearly to Us, and wait for Our Answer before you complied therewith. And as We are not yet in a Capacity to distinguish the Nature of the Several Claims which may be made upon Us, We are under a Necessity of waiting for further Advices from You, not doubting but you will be Full and Explicit not only with regard to this but all other demands which may be made upon Us, this is all We can say at present, except that you may let M^r. Medeiros know, that when hereafter We may give directions for satisfying her Demands, We shall order the Mony to be paid on the Coast and not in Bengal.

8. We send this also by the Ship Lapwing, to carry Advices to Admiral Boscawen, which are to be left at your Place, if the Admiral is not on the Coast,

whereupon she must without Delay be sent to Bengal with all her Treasure or Rupees in lieu, unless you have an Absolute Occasion for part thereof, not waiting for the Coinage of them, as she is to be dispatched home to Us from thence with all Possible Expedition.

9. Having put on board the Wager Fifty Chests of Treasure, We judge proper now to order, that besides the Stocks already directed to be sent on Our Ships to China, you add thereto Sixteen Chests more of Our Treasure, dividing the Risque equally, and consigning Two Chests of them to each Ships SupraCargos.

10. In case you are in want of Servants, to carry on our business, you may order some of the Writers from Bencoolen to remove, and take their Standing upon Your Establishment.

11. We have engaged Captain Alexander Delavaux to be Chief Engineer of all Our Settlements and Captain of the Train of Artillery thereunto belonging at the Salary of Two Hundred Pounds Sterling £ Annum to commence from Christmas last to be paid him at Nine Shillings a Pagoda, he hath not received any part of his said Salary, We having given him a Sum of Money as a Bounty, in order to equip himself for Our Service; On his arrival in India, he is to have an Apartment in the Fort wherever he resides, with Diet Money, a Pallankeen and Servants, the same as allowed to One of Our Council, and his Travelling Charges, from place to place, when sent on the Company's business, are to be defrayed at the Company's Expence. He takes passage on Our Ship the Lapwing, and is commanded by Us to obey all such Orders as shall be given him by the Governour of the Settlement whereat he shall reside. We direct You to regard him according to his Rank and order that the same Military and other Honours be done to him as are usually done to those in Council.

12. We have given Separate Instructions to Our President with relation to the Engineer, and You are, whenever he requires it of you, to give him all the Facility and Assistance in your Power to carry them into execution.

13. We have entertained Thomas Heath as a Writer in Our Service, and put him under the Care of the Engineer, to be trained up in that Profession, in which We propose to continue him, he is to rise in his Rank in common with Our other Covenanted Servants and to be encouraged accordingly, that he may prove a Useful Servant to Us hereafter in that way; as it is very difficult to engage Good Engineers in England it will be agreeable to Us to raise some in Our own Service.

14. Especial Care must be taken to settle Regular Accounts with [the] Admirals, for such Money, Stores or Provisions, as are advanced or Furnished to His Majestys Squadrons from time to time, obtaining Bills of Exchange for the Amount drawn upon the Commissioners of the Navy or Victualling, after the Rate of Six Shillings and Six Pence a Weighty Dollar, as settled on the breaking out of the War; And in case of Arrears by the Loss of Madrass or otherwise, see to it that such Unadjusted Articles are duly accounted for by the Proper Officers on the Spot, and obtain Bills of Exchange for the same as aforesaid, not referring any Particular to be settled here.

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL

1. We wrote last the 24th. of July 1747 by Five Conveyances.
2. Since then We have taken up the Ships

3. Upon Our Strenuous Application His Majesty hath been Graciously Pleased to send a Strong Squadron of Men of War, under the Command of the Honourable Rear Admiral Boscawen with these Our Ships whereon this Letter is sent.

4. Such of them as come to your Place the Commanders are Ordered to Deliver all Our Packets, Treasure and Goods on Board unto you immediately on their first Arrival and to Obey your Orders when the Admiral hath no further Service for the Ship.

5. You are thereupon to Act according to the Circumstances and Situation of Our Affairs by Dispatching such of them as you are able with proper Cargoes Home unto Us from your Place, sending the others to fill up at Fort S^t. David or to Bombay as may be most for Our Interest, which Settlements are directed in the Strongest Terms to forward unto you all the Surplus Treasure they can possibly spare, for the carrying on Our Investment, Bengal Goods more especially the Fine and Flowered Species being much Wanted and in great demand.

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL
 OF BOMBAY.

1. Your Advices dated the 17th. March 1746 and 21th. April 1747 came to hand the 3^d. of October, the Furnishing Fort S^t. David with Men, Money and Stores was rendering Us the best Service and We approve of the Ship Warwick being sent with Pepper to Bengal.

2. We wrote last the 24th. of July 1747 by Five Conveyances.

3. Since then We have taken up the Ships

4. Upon Our strenuous Application His Majesty hath been Graciously Pleased to send a Strong Squadron of Men of War, under the Command of the Honourable Rear Admiral Boscawen with these Our Ships whereon this Letter is sent.

5. Such of them as come to your place the Commanders are Order'd to Deliver all Our packets, Treasure and Goods on Board unto you, immediately on their first Arrival, and to Obey your Orders when the Admiral hath no further Service for the Ship.

6. You are to Act according to the Circumstances and Situation of Our Affairs, by Dispatching some of them with proper Cargoes Home unto Us from your Coast as fast as you can, sending others to Bengal or Fort S^t. David, and whereas Our Investments at the Bay, are of the Highest Importance to Us, Bengal Goods being in great demand and our Servants there must be much Straitned by the want of Money, We strictly enjoyn you to send thither all the Surplus Treasure that can possibly be Spared by the best Conveyances that offer.

7. The Ship Durrington Captain Richard Crabb must in particular be laid in for a Voyage to Mocha, Appointing M^r. Sewell chief, the Captain Second and One of Our Servants Third, to Purchase a Loading of Coffee for Our Account, Directing them to Dispatch her to Us therewith, procuring all the Freight Silver they can for your place, in case of M^r. Sewells Death such a Person as Governour Wake shall Judge proper, must be Appointed Chief, and We will pay them a Commission of Five $\frac{1}{4}$ Cent on the Nett proceed of the Coffee here in England to be Divided thus.

Two and a half to the Chief.

One and a half to the Captain and

One ½ Cent to the Third. We rely upon Yours and their best Care to make the Voyage turn out well for Us, by securing a Good Freight and Loading a proper Mallabar Cargo for the Mocha Market, Negotiating Bills drawn from Mocha on Surat or Bombay, at the most favourable Exchange, and purchasing the Coffee at Beetlefukee on the best Terms possible, to which end the Chief and Third must go up thither.

8. The present distracted State of Affairs in Persia requires Our property to be Withdrawn from thence in the Securest manner; Our Servants must no longer Reside at Spahaun upon any pretence whatsoever.

9. On M^r. Brady declining to proceed We have Entertained the Reverend M^r. Stephen Lushington to be Our Chaplain of Bombay upon the Usual Terms of Salary, Diet and other Appointments, he is extraordinary well Recommended to Us and We expect that all due Encouragement will be given him.

10. We have advanced and Lent him Fifty pounds on his Bond to repay the same out of his Growing Salary, which comes enclosed ½ Stretham.

11. Whatever Orders you may Receive from Harry Gough Esq^r, Richard Chauncy Esq^r: Alexander Hume Esq^r. and William Mabbott Esq^r. Our Secret Committee for the Current Year, or any Three of those Gentlemen for the Security of Our Ships, must be strictly Complied with and Obeyed.

12. In case Rear Admiral Boscawen or the Commander in Chief of His Majestys Forces should require your Assistance in Attacking the Enemy any where near You, We hereby Order you to give it him to the utmost of your power, and to put under his Command what Military, Marine or other Force you can possibly procure or spare consistent with the Safety of your place.

13. The Ship Durrington having Surplus Kintlage on Board, as she was originally designed for China, you may permit the Captain to dispose of all above half Kintlage at your place to any Europe Ship that may want it, and the Supra Cargoes that go to Mocha on that Ship are to come home upon her. COPY OF GENERAL LETTER TO FORT MARLBOROUGH, DATED JANUARY 16, 1747.
[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 51, pages 81 to 86*].

OUR DEPUTY GOVERNOUR AND
COUNCIL AT FORT MARLBOROUGH.

• 1. We wrote last the 15th. August 1746 by Our Ship Norfolk, that Sailed from Plymouth the 20th. September, Copy of Our said Letter is enclosed.

2. The Ship Queen Caroline We thank God arrived safe the 25th. August, by her came to hand the Advices from Your Place dated the 10th. June and 1st. March 1745 whereof due Notice shall now be taken, as We proceed under the Usual heads.

FIRST OF SHIPPING.

3. This comes by Our Ship Grantham Burthen 498 Tons Captain Walter Wilson Commander Order'd first to touch at Our Island S^t. Helena to land some Stores, whence She will be Dispatched Unto You.

4. The Copy of the Granthams Charterparty will be forwarded to You by the Governour and Council of S^t. Helena, on perusal thereof You may perceive the heavy Demorage that We are obliged to pay this War time, therefore We strictly enjoyn You to Incur as little as possible.

5. The Stores from the Ship Orford might have been Landed in Ten days at least, and thereby the Captain have Sailed much sooner for Benjar, whereas She stayed near a month before the Dispatches were Delivered, So that the whole time was flung upon Us, If the Commanders make any needless Delays, after Sailing Orders are given them, they must Answer the same to their Owners.

6. As Pepper sufficient for a Bengal Ship was reserved, We entirely approve of the Surplus Tonnage put on board the Queen Caroline, and would have You act in the like manner for the future upon all singular Occasions.

7. In case our Factors on the Norfolk not being able to load her for Europe, should in consequence of Our Orders Consign the Ship to You, and thereby You are overburthened with Tonnage We Direct that the Grantham be sent away, with what money and Pepper can be spared to Bengal, to be filled up there.

8. The sending our Brilliant Snow to refit at Batavia, and our Servants One after another to Benjar, have been Costly Affairs to Us, the latter is already forbidden, and the former must be avoided as much as possible, Keeping the Expence of Our Vessells within due bounds, and strictly Examing [*sic*] the Accounts, allowing no Item whatever that is not Just and reasonable.

9. On settling the Queen Carolines Account, the difference of Pepper in dispute with the Captain Shall be equitably adjusted, but from this Instance, the Utmost Exactness is requisite both in Shipping and Landing our Goods, thereby rendering it altogether Impracticable for the Officers of the Ships to Impose upon You.

SECONDLY OF GOODS FROM EUROPE.

10. Fifteen Chests of Treasure all new Mexico Dollars are consigned to You upon this Ship, perceiving with Satisfaction the Currency of milled money, is in a great measure accomplish'd, Sundry Stores in Compliance with Your Indent are also on board as d^{r} Invoice and Bill of Lading enclosed.

11. Whenever any Articles are not duly deliver'd by the Captains, they should pay for the same according to Charterparty, on failure thereof the Owners of each respective Ship must be Debted, for the Amount upon Your Books, and not the Captains, Writing Off to account Current Fort S^t. George, all such like Accounts before the Books are Closed.

12. In Order to prevent any Deficiencies or Embezlements of Stores for the future, Two of Our Trusty Covenant Servants jointly, must take Charge of all Wares and Stores, as the former consist but of few Articles, and hereby they will become responsible One for the other.

THIRDLY OF INVESTMENTS.

FOURTHLY OF COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

13. The several parts of the Coast enjoying perfect Peace and Tranquility for a considerable time, a large encrease of Pepper in fruitful seasons, may thence be reasonably expected.

14. We observe that Surveys had been taken of Different parts, and Conferences held with the Leading Men who generally promise well, while You are Feasting them, but little regard their Engagements on return home, We Enjoyn that every

thing in Your Power be exerted to Excite a Spirite of Industry among them, rooting Out, if possible, all manner of Gaming, and every other Obstacle thereto.

15. To accomplish so desirable an Event a Prudent Covenant Servant instead of Bugguese, should go upon the Surveys, with a Power to Reward Industrious Planters upon the Spot, by bestowing agreeable Tokens, which though of small value, may have the desired effect, Shewing at the same time a suitable contempt of the Indolent.

16. We have no Objection to your Courteous Deportment towards the People of Madura, You did well however in not entering into any Engagements with them, as that might embroil Us with the Dutch, which must be studiously avoided, giving no Umbrage to them by a Trade in Opium, among their Dependants or in their Territorys, under any pretence whatsoever, that our Commerce may not be Obstructed.

17. We observe the ill useage of the Dutch, with respect to our Sloop Mary, was occasion'd by Your People going with Opium into One of their Ports, which hath so blended Our Affairs with your Illicit Trade, We cannot demand that Satisfaction of the Dutch which We should otherwise require.

18. As to their other haughty Claims and Demands, You may as occasion Offers in a Friendly manner, let them know that Your Masters the English East India Company, are determined to carry on their Trade, according to their antient custome and practice, and in all their other matters Conduct according to the Law of Nations, being well Assured, they shall therein be protected by their King and Parliament.

FIFTHLY OF BUILDINGS AND REVENUES.

19. We are glad the Fortifications at your Place, and the Buildings at Moco Moco, are in good forwardnes, and We approve of the Lodgings at the latter, being raised One storie to free them from Dampness, let every thing be compleatly Finished out of hand in a Substantial manner, and a strict Military Disipline be kept up.

20. We recommend it to you to procure an Able Tilemaker from Batavia, that so Our Warehouses may be not cover'd with combustable Cooly Cayos.

SIXTHLY OF FACTORS, WRITERS, OFFICERS AND THEIR ACCOUNTS.

21. Our Orders by the Ship Orford respecting Mr. Greenslate, We observe were duely obey'd, and the Balance of our Cash justly deliver'd over to his Successors, both at Mocha Mocha, and Fort Marlborough.

22. We are concerned for the Death of Mr. Rigg our late Deputy Governour.

23. Application having been made to Us by his Father Sole Executor and Administrator Thomas Rigge of Morton near Edinburgh Esq^r. We direct that the produce of his Estate, after all just Demands are satisfy'd, be received into our Cash without delay, and that Certificates to Us be granted for the Amount at the same Rate as We allow to Our Covenant Servants, payable to the said Thomas Rigge, Unto whom the Accounts relating to the Estate must be Transmitted from time to time, We have given the like Directions to Fort S^t. George, with respect to such part of his Estate as may be there.

24. Our Cash for the future must be kept under three Different Locks, by the Deputy Governour and the Two next in Council Upon the Spot at Fort Marlborough, and on passing the Account monthly, the Several Vouchers for each entry, and the Balance in Specie, must be produced to and Examined by the whole Council, due Entry being made upon Consultation how they find the same.

25. The out Residencys monthly Accounts, should be regularly examined and past, not Postponing the same so as to be done in a hurry, whereby the needful Observations cannot possibly be made, nor the exceedings in Expences Curtailed.

26. When affairs come to be settled at Pooloo Pesong, the Charges must be kept within due bounds, perceiving they run high and Exceed the preceeding Year, Two Thousand Two Hundred Dollars, Amounting in the whole to Eight Thousand Nine

hundred ; which is a great Sum, though We are very willing to make Allowances for New Settlements, not doubting You will reduce them in due time, or Encrease the Quantity of Pepper in proportion to such a Charge.

27. We judge it proper to forbid all manner of Gaming in any Shape whatsoever, by Our Servants Civil or Military, hereby annulling, and making void all Wagers that may be lost thereby, conformable to our Laws here, in Order the more effectually to Root out such a pernicious Practice, and that a proper Example may be set to the Natives.

28. The Reverend M^r. Joseph Burges is Entertained by Us to be Our Chaplain at Fort Marlborough, at the Usual Salary, Gratuity, Diet, Accomodations and Advantages annex'd to that Office, he must take Place, and be stationd next the Youngest of Council according to the Practice at Our head Settlements, We expect that he will be suitably countenanced and Encouraged, on his behaving in a becoming manner, We have lent him Fifty Pounds, his Bond comes enclosed, to repay the same out of his growing Salary.

29. We permit M^r. Roger Carter to remove to Fort S^t. George, and to take his standing in Our Service upon that Establishment, according to Our promise made to his Father, having given the needful Directions thither accordingly.

30. You must be very Explicit in the Body of Your Advices, as to the Certificates granted Upon Us, and not refer for the particulars to a seperate Paper in the Packet, Entering also upon Consultation that each Sum is duly paid into Our Cash, the time when, by whom and to whom each is payable, as is always practised in a Correct manner at Our head Settlements.

31. In case William Winter and Thomas Higgs Soldiers at Your Place, have served their contracted time, and are desirous of a Discharge, Do You grant it accordingly ; Unless You can[*sic*] Engage them to Relist.

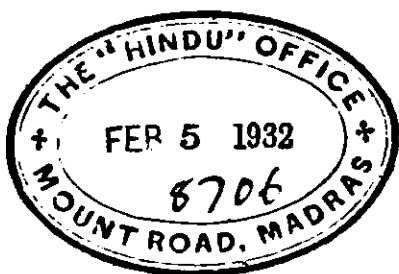

33. We have Entertaind M^r. James Le Marchant a Factor, Samuel Kingston and George Scott Writers Upon Your Establishment, who together with all Our Servants must be kept Close to Our Business and not sufferd to be Indolent nor allowed to spend their time in any vicious Courses. We are

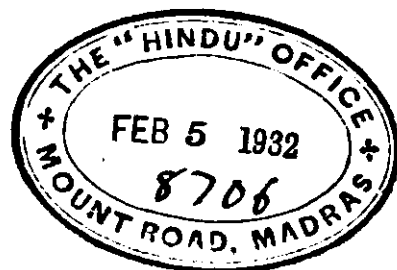

TO ALL PEOPLE to whom these Presents shall come, The United Company of Merchants of England, Trading to the East-Indies, Send GREETING. WHEREAS *in* and by an Act of Parliament made in the Fifth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, It is (amongst other Things) Enacted, That if any of his Majesty's Subjects should, from and after the twentieth Day of February, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighteen, sail, go, or repair to, or be in the East-Indies, in the Countries and Parts of Asia and Africa, or in such Places of Asia, Africa and America, or any of them beyond the Cape of Bona Esperanza to the Streights of Magellan, where any Trade or Traffick of Merchandize is or may be used or had, contrary to the Laws then in being, or the Tenor of the said Act, such Persons, so offending, should be liable to such Punishment as by any Law in being might be inflicted for such Offence; and that it should and might be lawful to and for the United Company of Merchants of England, Trading to the East-Indies, and their Successors, to take, arrest and seize, or cause to be taken, arrested and seized, such Person or Persons, being a Subject or Subjects of his Majesty, his Heirs or Successors, at any Place or Places where he or they shall be found, within the Limits or Places aforesaid; and the Person and Persons so taken, arrested and

seized, to send and remit to *England*, there to answer for the Offence aforesaid, according to due Course of Law. *And it was in and by the said Act provided and enacted, that the said Act should continue in force for five Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament, and no longer.* AND WHEREAS in and by an Act of Parliament made in the ninth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George, the said Act of the fifth Year of his said late Majesty was further continued in Force for Seven Years, from the 25th Day of March, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Twenty-three, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament. AND WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made in the fifth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty the said first mentioned Act is revived, and further continued in Force for seven Years, from the first Day of May, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Thirty-two, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament. AND WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made in the thirteenth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, the last recited Act of the fifth Year of his present Majesty is continued till the first Day of June, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Forty-Seven. AND by another Act of Parliament, made in the twentieth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, the same Act is further continued from the Expiration thereof until the twenty-fifth Day of March, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty; as in and by the said Acts, Relation being thereunto had, may more fully appear. NOW KNOW YE, That we the said United Company do (by virtue of the Power granted to us by the above-mentioned Act, and Acts of Parliament) hereby Authorise and Empower Captain William Bresseu Commander of the Ship Fort St. George and the Commander for the time being pursuant to the Powers of the said Acts to take, arrest, and seize, all and every Person and Persons, being Subject or Subjects of his Majesty, his Heirs or Successors, offending against the Laws aforesaid, within the Places aforesaid; and the Person, and Persons so taken, arrested and seized to send and remit to *England*, to answer for his or their Offence, according to due Course of Law. IN WITNESS whereof the said United Company have hereunto caused their Common Seal to be affixed, this sixteenth—Day of October in the Year of our Lord One Thousand Seven Hundred and forty seven.

ORDERS AND INSTRUCTIONS GIVEN BY THE COURT OF DIRECTORS OF THE UNITED COMPANY OF MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND TRADING TO THE EAST INDIES TO CAP. FRANCIS CHEYNE COMMANDER OF THE SHIP LAPWING OR TO THE COMMANDER FOR THE TIME BEING.

1. We the said Court of Directors reposing special Trust and Confidence in your Ability, Courage and Integrity have appointed you to be Commander of the Ship Lapwing Burthen 300 Tons hereby requiring you to Observe and Comply with these Our Orders and Instructions.

2. So soon as you have received these Our Dispatches We direct that you make all possible Expedition and Ply your Voyage with the first Opportunity of Wind and Weather, and Sail directly for Fort St. David in the East Indies whereto you are Consigned. On your Arrival you must deliver to Our Governour and Council there, Our Packets to them, and all the Bullion, Goods and Merchandizes and in all things to follow from time to time the Orders of Our said Governour and Council for your further Proceedings.

3. You must keep up the Worship of God on Board, and good Order among your Men, taking care of their Healths.

4. Immediately put the Ship in the best Posture of Defence, Quarter the Men, Trust no Colours, avoid speaking with any Ship at Sea, be constantly Exercising the Seamen and Soldiers at the Great Guns and Small Arms to make them Expert.

5. Advise Us by all opportunities of every Occurrence worthy Our Notice directing your Letters to the Secretary, by Dutch Ships, send them under Cover directed to Mess^{rs}. George Clifford and Sons Merchants at Amsterdam.

6. In case you should by any Accident be Obligated to Furnish yourself with any Stores out of His Majestys Yards or Ships of War before you are clear of *England*, or at Sea, send Us an Exact Account of what you receive, when and where they were

delivered you and by whom, the very first opportunity, and a Duplicate by another Conveyance to prevent all Disputes.

7. Exact Journals are to be kept by you and your Officers of all Transactions and Occurrences to be deliver'd Us on your return, inserting every thing therein worthy of Our Observation, take strict care that no part of the Ships Stores or Provisions are Wasted or Embezled, but on the contrary be Frugal of every thing, We positively Forbid your suffering the Men to run out more than one One Third of their Wages, upon any Pretence whatsoever.

8. We require and order that you do not directly or indirectly either for yourself or any other Person carry out any Bullion, Goods or Merchandizes, but what you shall be licenced by Us, or some Committee by Us appointed for that purpose, shall licence you to carry, and that you use your utmost Endeavours to prevent all your Officers and Seamen from carrying out any Bullion, Goods or Merchandizes without the like Licence, the Boatswain, or in his Absence the Superior Officer on Board is to keep in a Book for that purpose, a true and perfect Account of every Parcel of Goods that comes aboard, or is delivered out of the Ship, as well the Companys as any others with the Marks and Numbers.

9. Give strict Orders and see to it that the Goods are well Stowed, and if any Salt petre is put on Board, it must be thoroughly beat that so the ship may bring Us the more Tonnage, which will redound to your Credit.

10. Clean the Ship as often as you have opportunity while you remain in any Port or Place during the present Voyage.

11. Notwithstanding any part of these Instructions, you must Obey all such Orders as you shall receive from our Secret Committee Harry Gough Esq^r. Richard Chauncy Esq^r. Alexander Hume Esq^r. and William Mabbott Esq^r., or any Three of those Gentlemen, and also the Secret Committee for the time being.

12. Enclosed is Our Printed Indulgence to the several Commanders and Officers of the Ships that are Freightd by Us, and We hereby put you and the Ships Company on the like Footing, in proportion to the Lapwings Tonnage, when compared with those Ships of 498 Tons.

13. On your offering to pay any Money into Our Cash at either of the Head Settlements, the same will be received and Certificates granted for the Amount, which We will pay at the same Rates allowed to Our Covenant servants.

14. We have put on Board Six Gallons of Brandy for each Soldier, which must be duly distributed among them in proper Quantitys for their Refreshment and Support.

15. We direct that you receive on Board Captain Alexander Delavaux Chief Engineer & Captain of the Train, and M^r. Thomas Heath Writer, affording them all needful Accomodations during the Voyage, Entertaining them at your Table with every thing but Wine, for which We will make you an allowance of Fifty Pounds, you are also to receive on Board the Captains Domestick Servant allowing him the Ships Provisions. PORT OF LONDON the 21st. day of July 1747 It is agreed by & between Francis Taylor master of the Tryal Snow belonging unto the United Company of Merchants of England Trading to the East Indies and the several Seamen & Mariners whose Names are hereto subscribed in manner & form following that is to say.

THAT in Consideration of the Monthley Wages (Computing after the rate of 12 months in the Year) against each respective seaman and mariners Name set such monthley wages to Commence from the day of the date of every such seaman and mariners Entring on Board of the said Ship as Expressed against their respective Names They the said mariners respectively shall & will serve the said United Company from the day they shall respectively enter on Board the said Ship The time of such Entring to be taken to be on the several Days Wrote or Expressed against their respective Names in Navigating the s^d. Ship from the Port of London untill their arrival at Fort William in Bengal in the East Indies and their Discharge by the said Companys President or Chief and Council there And in Case they shall not be Discharged by the said Companys President or Chief & Council at Fort William aforesaid upon their arrival there Then the said Mariners at the monthly Wages afores^d. shall continue to serve the said Company in Navigating the said Snow to & from such other Ports or places in the East Indies as the said Companys President or Chief & Council at Fort William aforesaid shall direct until they shall be Discharged from the said ship AND the said Master doth hereby agree with and hire the said Seamen and mariners for the Voyages aforesaid at such monthly Wages to be paid in manner following That is to say Two months pay thereof to be in hand paid unto them before their Departure from the Port of London by way of Impress and the residue thereof to be paid within Ten days after the arrival of the said ship at Fort William aforesaid or within Ten days after the said mariners and seamen shall be Discharged from the said Companys service And that the said Wages shall not be demanded or sued for by the s^t. mariners before any of the respective times aforesaid unless the said mariners shall be sooner Discharged AND it is further agreed by & between the said master and mariners THAT WHEREAS the said Mariners have severally & respectively received Impress beforehand that is to say, pay or Wages for Two Months that they are respectively to retain the same to their own Use in all Events altho' within the space of two Months next after the time they shall severally enter on Board the said ship she sho^d. happen to miscarry or be cast away (which God forbid) in the said Intended Voyage EXCEPT that in Case any of the said mariners in any of the said Voyages or at any time before the Expiration of the time herein before contracted or agreed for shall Desert the service of the said Snow after their signing of this agreem^t. It is agreed that the said Mariners & every of them their Exors & Admors shall and will return & Pay back the said Impress money so received by them respively either to the said master or to M^r. Henry Crab Boulton paymaster to the said Company or to their Paymaster for the time being at the said Companys House in London commonly called the East India House Or to the said Companys President or Chief at Fort William afores^d. And save and Except any of the said Mariners shall happen to be pressed or entred in His Majesty's service before the end of the two months for which such Impress money hath been reced by them respectively In which case It is agreed that the said Mariners and every of them their Exors & Admors shall & will return & pay back either to the said master or to the Paymaster of the said Company at the said Companys House so much of the said Impress Money received by them respectively as shall not have been earned by them respively at the time they shall so happen to be pressed or entred into his Majestys service AND it is hereby further agreed by & between tne said master & Mariners in Consideration of the said Impress money to the said mariners severally and respectively paid by the said master That in Case the said ship shall by the Damage of the Sea or any other Accident whatsoever be disabled or lost in any of the said Voyages That they the said Mariners or any of their respective Execors Admors or Assigns shall not have or receive or be entitled to have or receive Claim or Demand any Wages or Salary for the Voyage in which she

shall be so Cast away either from the said master or from the said United Company of Merchants of England Trading to the East Indies And that notwithstanding any thing herein Contained to the contrary or any Custom Law or Usage whatsoever now in force that can shall or may be pretended or insisted upon or intitle them or any of them the said Mariners to any Wages or Salary whatsoever or in any other manner than is herein & hereby specified and Expressed or otherwise howsoever AND as well the said Master as the said mariners severally and respectively Do Acknowledge and Declare this Writing to Contain and Express as well the Wages such of the said Mariners is to have for the said intended Voyages as the said Voyages & times for which they were respectively shipped to perform the same IN WITNESS whereof they the said master and Mariners each and every of them have hereunto set their hands and seals pursuant to an Act of Parliament made in the 2^d. Year of the Reign of King George the 2^d. Intituled an Act for the better regulation and Government of Seamen in the Merchants Service.

At a Court of Directors of the United Company of Merchants of ENGLAND,
Trading to the EAST-INDIES, Holden the 15th of NOVEMBER, 1734.

WHEREAS We the said Court of Directors are willing to give all fitting Encouragement to the Commanders, Officers, and Seamen, on Board the Ships which shall, from Time to Time, be Employed to and from the East-Indies, and other Limits of the Company's Charter, [We] do hereby Declare as follows; viz.

That the Commanders, Officers, and Seamen may Export in Bullion, or such Goods as shall be allowed by the Court of Directors, or any Committee appointed by them, each of them the Sums or Values hereunder-mentioned, so as the same be for their own proper Use and Account, and not for the Account of any other Person or Persons whatsoever; and so as the same be invested in the Goods and Merchandizes hereby declared to be allowed, and not in any of the Goods or Merchandizes reserved for the Trade of the said Company, except as hereunder-mentioned. Provided, That each Person Exporting all, or Part of the said Sums or Values, or Importing the

Produce of them, do not take up more of the Ship's Tonnage, than the limited Proportion allowed to such Person, as his Part or Share of the *Charter-Party Allowance*. *Provided also*, That the Commanders, Officers, or Seamen, shall not be allowed to dispose of their Privilege to any other Person or Persons whatsoever, or to make Use of the Privilege allowed to any other; *viz.*

The Commander Three Hundred Pounds, Chief Mate Sixty Pounds, Second Mate Forty Pounds, Third Mate Thirty Pounds, Purser Thirty Pounds, Fourth Mate Twenty Pounds, and to all other Chief Officers, as Surgeon, Boatswain, Gunner, Carpenter, Steward, and Quarter-Master, each Fifteen Pounds, the Midshipmen Ten Pounds upon every Hundred Tons, the Ship they serve in shall be Lett for; and to all other Seamen the Value of Ten Pounds only each Man, be the Ships more or less in Burthen.

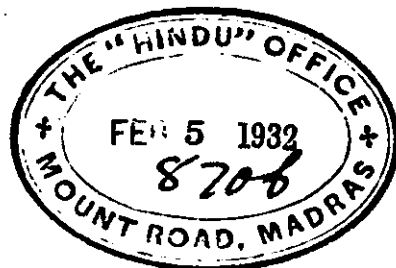
