#### Indian Tea Association.

#### Duars Labour Rules.

Rule 1.—If coolies shall, when indebted, leave a tea estate belonging to any member of the Indian Tea Association who shall have subscribed these rules under the management of A and be found on another estate belonging to any other member of the said Association who has subscribed these rules under the management of B, THEN, if at any time within three calendar months from the date of the arrival of the coolies on B's estate, A shall write to B stating that the coolies were employed under A's management, B shall thereupon either turn such coolies out of his estate or pay to A the money due by the coolies at A's estate, whichever B prefers.

Note.—In the application of the foregoing rule an account of the money due by and to the coolies at A's estate authenticated by A shall be accepted by B as correct.

Rule II.—If a recruiter authorised in writing by A, the Manager of an estate belonging to any member of the Indian Tea Association who shall subscribe these rules, to recruit coolies for such estate shall be sent by A to a recruiting district for coolies, and on his return from such recruiting district with or without coolies, such recruiter shall proceed to an estate belonging to any member of the Association who shall subscribe these rules in the management of B, then, if at any time within six months from the date on which the recruiter on his return shall proceed to B's estate, A shall write to B informing him of the fact that the recruiter was employed by A to recruit coolies for the estate under his management, B shall, in his option, either retain the recruiter and coolies and repay to A the recruiting expenses incurred and the advances made by him (A), or he shall turn the recruiter and coolies out of his estate on being repaid by A the recruiting expenses incurred and the advances made by him (B).

- NOTE A.—A recruiter to be considered as such under the foregoing rule must for at least three calendar months immediately preceding have been under the employment of the manager who grants him a recruiting certificate or an advance of money. Or a recruiter may be engaged in his own country provided he has not previously taken a recruiting certificate or an advance for recruiting purposes from any other employer or estate.
- Note B.—In the application of the foregoing rule a statement authenticated by A of the cost of recruiting coolies and of the sums advanced or paid by A to or on account of the recruiter and coolies if any shall be accepted by B as correct and vice versa, provided that the amount claimed as cost of recruiting shall in no case exceed Rs.3 per adult.
- Definition.—In the operation of the above rules it is understood that the words coolie or coolies include sardars and all servants of a ten estate drawing less than a pay of Rs. 20 per mensem.
- Rule III.—The questions to be determined by arbitration under the above rules and any dispute touching the true intent or construction or the application or the incidents or consequences of these

other wise in relation to the premises shall be referred to two indifferent persons or an umpire to be appointed in manner hereafter mentioned, and the following provisions shall apply to such reference:

- (1) An arbitrator shall not be deemed to have been appointed unless he shall have signified in writing his willingness to act as arbitrator in the reference.
- (2) Either of the parties concerned may by notice in writing require the other of them to refer the question or dispute to arbitration. The party giving such notice shall therein state the name and address of the arbitrator appointed by him. The party receiving such notice shall appoint an arbitrator and intimate in writing the name and address of such arbitrator to the arbitrator appointed by the party giving such notice. If the party receiving such notice shall for 10 days after the receipt thereof neglect or refuse to appoint an arbitrator and to intimate the name and address of such arbitrator in manner aforesaid, the party giving such notice may report the matter to Darjeeling and Duars Sub-Committee of the Indian Tea Association, hereafter in these rules referred to 'as the Sub-Committee, and the Sub-Committee shall thereupon appoint an arbitrator on behalf of the second party to the reference, and the arbitrator so appointed shall have the like powers to act as if he had been appointed by such party.
- (3) In case an arbitrator who shall have been appointed shall die and neglect or refuse or become incapable to act as arbitrator before an award shall have been made as to the matter referred, the surviving or continuing arbitrator shall report the fact of such death, neglect, refusal or incapacity to the Sub-Committee, and the Sub-Committee shall thereupon appoint some other person to be arbitrator in the place of the arbitrator so dying, neglecting or refusing or becoming incapable to act, and the arbitrator so appointed shall have the same powers and authority as the arbitrator in whose place he shall have been appointed.
- (4) Before entering on the business of the reference the arbitrators shall appoint an umpire to act in the reference. In case the arbitrators who shall be appointed shall not appoint an umpire before entering on the business of the reference, or in the event of an umpire appointed by them dying or neglecting or refusing or becoming incapable to act as umpire before an award shall have been made as to the matter referred, the arbitrators shall report the matter to the Sub-Committee and the Sub-Committee shall thereupon appoint an umpire who shall have the like power to act as if he had been appointed as umpire by the arbitrators before entering on the business of the reference.
- (5) Superintendents or Managers of tea estates in the Duars district shall be the only persons eligible to act as arbitrators or umpires.
- (6) The arbitrators shall make their award in writing within three weeks after entering on the business of the reference or on or before any later date to which the arbitrators by any writing signed by them may from time to time enlarge the time for making their award and the umpire shall make his award within three weeks after the original or extended time for making the award of the arbitrators shall have expired, or on or before any later date to which the umpire may from time to time enlarge the time for making his award.
- (7) Arbitrators shall each receive a fee of Rs. 32 and an umpire shall receive a fee of Rs. 64 for acting in the business of the reference. The fees of the arbitrators and umpire except as to the amount thereof, and all travelling and other expenses incurred or paid by the arbitrators or umpire, shall be in the discretion of the arbitrators or umpire who may direct to and by whom such fees and expenses or any part thereof shall be paid.
- (8) The award which shall be made by the arbitrators or umpire shall be final and binding upon the parties to the reference respectively.
- (9) Neither of the parties to the reference shall make any objection to the award of the arbitrators or umpire by reason or on account of any technical or legal defect therein or any informality, omission, delay or error of proceeding in or about the same or in relation thereto or on any pretence, suggestion, charge or allegation of collusion or confideracy or on any similar or other ground.

Rule IV.—These rules shall be binding on members of the Indian Tea Association who shall subscribe the same in the like manner and to the same extent as the rules of the Association are binding on such members save that if any member of the Association who shall have subscribed these rules shall be desirous of withdrawing from his submission thereto, he shall be at liberty so to withdraw on giving to the Sub-Committee six calendar months' notice of his intention so to do.

Rule V.—Mombers of the Indian Tea Association who shall subscribe these rules may by a resolution passed by a majority of not less than three-fourths of such members as may be present in person at a meeting of such members of which one month's previous notice shall have been given, from time to time alter all or any of these rules, or make new rules to the exclusion of or in addition to these rules and any rules so made shall be deemed to be of the same validity as if they had been originally contained herein and shall be subject in like manner to be altered or modified by any subsequent similar resolution. The Sub-Committee may by notice at any time convene a meeting of the members of the Indian Tea Association who shall have subscribed these rules for the purpose of considering and passing any proposed alterations or exclusion of or any addition to these rules. Such notice shall specify the place, day and hour of meeting, and the rule which it shall be proposed to alter or exclude or the addition, if any, which it shall be proposed to make and such notice

shall be given one month before any meeting by letter addressed to each member of the Indian Tea Association who shall have subscribed these rules and who shall not have previously withdrawn his submission thereto.

The undersigned agree to abide by the above Rules.

#### Specimen of Agreement between a Maistry and Planter.

Momorandum of Agreement entered into this 6th day of May 1903 between the manager of A-tea estate and M-maistry of-village,-taluq, Coimbatore district.

This is to certify that the said M—maistry does hereby contract and agree to work on the A—estate with a gang of 20-able-bodied coolies, of which 10 are to be men and 10 are to be women.

To weed, dig, manure, farm, etc., and to do any estate work that may be required of me and my coolies.

That I am to receive pay at the rate of 10 per cent. on the earnings of my coolies, provided, I have my full gang otherwise according to the wish of the manager whose decision I agree to accept as final. Rate of pay for men Rs. 6 and good able-bodied women Rs. 4 as existing in the district. That I must have my full gang every day, viz., 10 men and 10 women, on the roll-call. In the event of my coolies being short, sick, or unable to do any work, I agree to get substitutes instead. That I and my coolies agree to work for a period of 11 calendar months from date of our arrival on the estate on 15th June 1908.

That I and my coolies shall submit to discipline and promptly obey all lawful ~ lers which may be received from persons in authority over myself and my coolies.



In consideration of the above agreement I the said M—maistry do hereby acknowledge to have received an advance of Rs. 100 only. That I agree to repay the above advance in the 5 following instalments:—

Witnesseth that in consideration of the sum of Rs. 60 this day advanced to me for work to be done under this contract and to be repaid by deduction from the sums to accrue due to me for the services I hereby agree to render, I, the said C labourer do hereby contract with the said Mr. to do all such works on or in connection with the P estate in the Nilgiri district by labourers for the period of 10 months from this date to 8th August 1903, by myself and together with 12 other labourers, I and the said 12 other labourers receiving in payment thereof the wages current for similar work in the Nilgiri district.

#### No. 14.—(MADRAS.)

Specimen of complaint under section 2, Act XIII of 1859.

Sheweth that petitioner advanced P maistry the sum of Rs. 140 on the 30th June 1903 to work on H estate with 40 coolies for a period of one year, but the defendant has failed to keep to his agreement, and has only 5 coolies now working for the estate. So petitioner prays for a warrant for his arrest and that he may be ordered to perform the contract.

#### No. 15.—(MADRAS).

Specimen judgment in case under Act XIII of 1859 against a maistry.

The accused received an advance of Rs. 140 and had agreed in writing with the complainant to work on H estate from 20th July 1903 to 20th July 1904 with a gang of 40 coolies, and this he failed to do. He admits the contract and advance, but pleads that sickness had prevented him from fulfilling the terms of his contract. This is the ordinary excuse which he cannot substantiate. He is found guilty of wilful breach of his agreement, and is directed at the option of the complainant to work from this day till the 20th July 1904 with a gang of 40 coolies and to pay court costs, Re. 1-4-0.

#### No. 16.—(CEYLON.)

#### Scheme for Labour Agency on the Coast.

I. That all estates joining the Labour Agency do subscribe 10 cents per cultivated acre for not less than two years.

II. That in terms of resolution (V) Government be asked to contribute Rs. 11,000 per annum, being half of the proposed salary of European Agents.

[Resolution (5) referred to:—"That a recruiting agency be formed on the Coast, to which estates be asked to subscribe at the rate of 10 cents per cultivated acre per annum, and that Government be asked to pay half the salary of the Agent, and that the details of the scheme be left to a small Sub-Committee."]

III. That an Agent be appointed on a salary of Rs. 12,000 per annum with two European Assistants.

IV. That the duty of the Agent will be:—(a) to establish offices at Trichinopoly, Madura, and elsewhere, as may be decided; (b) to travel through the surrounding districts, keep disries, collect information, forward a report every fortnight together with copy of disries to the Committee in

Ceylon. This report to be circulated to subscribers. (c) On the application of a Kangani for money. to satisfy himself as far as possible as to existence of coolies ready to go to Ceylon and to communicate with the Superintendent direct.

- V. Recommendations to subscribers.
- (a) That the subscribers should advise the Agent of all sums, say, over Rs. 250 sent to the Coast together with the name of Kangani, Village, Taluk, and as many particulars as possible.
- (b) That Superintendents may remit money direct to the Agent to be handed over to the Kangani; should be (the Agent) be satisfied with his bená fides, no liability to be attached to the Agent for money advanced.
  - (e) That subscribers should keep the Agent supplied with a certain number of tin tickets.

Specimen Agreement under Section 492, Indian Penal Code, and Act XIII of 1859.

#### EIGHT-ANNA COURT-FEE STAMP.

#### CONTRACT BETWEEN LABOURER AND EMPLOYER.

This contract made under the provisions of section 492 of the Indian Penal Code between (herein below described and hereinafter called the Labourer) of the one part and (hereinafter called the Employer) on the other part, WITNESSETH, that the said Employer doth hereby agree and promise to pay for and on account of the said Labourer all here feeding, clothing and transit or other charges to and to deport the said Labourer free of all cost to the Estate of the said Employer, also to pay to the said Labourer monthly wages of Rs. 4 from the date on which the said Labourer commences to labour on account of the said Employer the said wages to be calculated and paid according to the actual amount of daily work done.

And this Contract further witnesseth that in consideration of the abovementioned promises covenanted for and made by the said Employer, the said Labourer doth hereby agree and promise to proceed forthwith to, and to remain and labour on the Estate or Estates of the said Employer in any legitimate work on the Estates of the said Employer in the District of and to carry out to the best of his ability all legal orders and instructions of the said Employers for the term of THREE years from the date of this Contract, deducting always one day's leave per week, i.e., for the term of 939 full working days of 10 hours each, and any extra privilege or sick leave taken within the term of three years by the said Labourer will be worked out by the said Labourer after the expiry of the said three years.

And the said Labourer doth hereby further agree and covenant that in the event of any breach of the above Contract on his the said Labourer's part, then the abovementioned charges of feeding, clothing and transit and other expenses incurred on his her, the said Labourer's behalf, amounting to not more than Rs. 50 by the said employer, shall and will be considered as an advance or loan legally recoverable from him her, the said Labourer, by the said Employer, and the said Labourer will in such case render himself liable under the Penal Provisions of Act XIII of 1859.
