Sir,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Administration Report on the working of Co-operative Societies in the Province of Bombay for the year ending 30th June 1939. A separate chapter dealing with Rural Development is also included in this report.

I. ADMINISTRATION.

GAZETTED STAFF.

Registrar, Co-operative Societies and Director of Rural Development.

2. I worked as Registrar from 1st July 1938 to 5th December 1938, when Mr. Bhansali officiated as the Secretary to Covernment, General and Educational Departments. Mr. Bhansali resumed charge of the post of the Registrar on 5th December 1938 and held it for the remainder of the year. In view of the reorganisation of work relating to rural development sanctioned under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 15/33, dated 8th March 1939, the designation of the Registrar of Co-operative Secieties was changed to that of "The Registrar of Co-operative Societies and Director of Rural Development".

Deputy Registrar.

The post of Deputy Registrar, Co-operative Societies, was held in abeyance from 1st July 1938 to 5th December 1938, when I was acting as Registrar, and thereafter during the period of my leave from 5th December 1938 to 11th April 1939.

Deputy Director of Rural Development.

To enable the Registrar of Co-operative Societies to perform satisfactorily his duties as Head of the Reorganised Co-operative and Rural Development Department, the post of Deputy Director of Rural Development was created under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 15/33, dated 15th March 1938. Mr. K. V. Joshi, who was working as Deputy Director of Agriculture, South Central Division, Poona, in the Agricultural Department, was appointed to hold this post. He took charge of the post on 5th April 1939 and continued to hold it for the rest of the year.

Assistant Registrar, Land Mortgage Banks.

A temporary post of Assistant Registrar, Land Mortgage Banks, was created under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 8, 20/6/17755, dated 27th June 1938, in lieu of the post of the Deputy Registrar, which was held in abeyance. The post was held by Mr. N. P. Bhagwat from 1st July 1938 to 28th February 1939 and by Mr. N. V. Nayak from 1st March 1939 to 6th April 1939, when the post was ordered to be abolished in accordance with the terms of the said Government Resolution.

Personal Assistant to the Registrar, Co-operative Societies and Director of Rural Development.

Mr. D. A. Shah was Personal Assistant throughout the year except for short periods from 19th September 1938 to 2nd October 1938 and from 25th April 1939 to 24th May 1939, during which period he was on leave. Mr. J. G. Saldanha, Office Superintendent, acted as Personal Assistant in addition to his own duties during these periods.

Assistant Registrar, Co-operative Finance.

The post of Assistant Registrar, Co-operative Finance, was created under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No 548,39, dated 28th April 1939, to enable the Registrar to discharge his statutory duty of audit and to advise him in matters relating to co-operative finance, banking, etc. Mr. N. V. Navak was appointed to hold the post from 7th April 1939 to 31st May 1939. Mr. K. R. Kulkarni was in charge of this post thereafter, till the end of the year.

The Chief Marketing Officer, Bombay.

The post was created under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 991/33, dated 12th June 1939, and Dr. T. G. Shirname of the Bombay Agricultural Service, on reversion from the Imperial Council of Agricultural Research, took over the charge of the post on 27th June 1939 and continued to hold it till the end of the year. The Chief Marketing Officer is intended to organise co-operative marketing in Bombay, keep himself in touch with the Bombay market and be a liaison officer between the marketing organisations, traders and consumers in Bombay and the co-operative sale and multi-purpose societies in rural areas.

Divisional Superintendent of Agriculture, Deccan Canals, Belapur. Road.

This post was transferred to this Department under orders contained in paragraph 2 of Government Resolution Revenue Department, No. 15/33, dated 8th March 1939. Mr C. P. Patil, who held this post in the Agricultural Department, was transferred to this Department with effect from 15th April 1939 and continued in this post till the end of the year.

Cotton Superintendents, Dharwar and Surat.

These posts were transferred to this Department under orders contained in paragraph 2 of Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 15/33, dated 8th March 1939. Mr. V. C. Pavate and Rao Saheb G. P. Pathak, who held these respective posts in the Agricultural Department, were transferred to this Department with effect from 15th April 1939 and held these posts till the remainder of the year.

Assistant Registrars, Co-operative Societies and Rural Development Officers.

In order to give effect to the scheme of Rural Development outlined under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 15/33, dated 8th March 1939, five additional posts of Assistant Registrars and Rural Development Officers were created by Government under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 401/39, dated 8th April 1939, thus increasing the number of Assistant Registrars from five to ten. The designation "Assistant Registrar, Co-operative Societies" was also changed with effect from 1st April 1939 to "Assistant Registrar and Rural Development Officer". The postings in the redistributed charges were actually made from 1st June 1939.

Special Auditors of Co-operative Societies.

3. In accordance with orders contained in paragraph 23 of Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7363/33, dated 15th March 1938, the Registrar has to comply with the statutory obligations of auditing the accounts of every society at least once in a co-operative year. In order to fulfil this obligation and to cope with the increasing audit work, a temporary post of an additional Special Auditor, Co-operative Societies, was created at Bombay under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 8672/28, dated 29th August 1938.

SUBORDINATE STAFF.

4. In accordance with orders contained in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 15/33, dated 8th March 1939, the propaganda and demonstration work done by the Agricultural Department was transferred to the reorganised Co-operative and Rural Development Department. This change necessitated also the transfer of the propaganda staff of the Agricultural Department consisting of 45 District Agricultural Overseers, 30 Agricultural Sub-Overseers, 29 Permanent Kamgars and 50 temporary Kamgars to this Department. In addition, the staff in charge of Shikar and Pig-killing work, seed-multiplication and seed distribution, and work in connection with issue of licenses under the Cotton Transport Act was transferred to this Department. The designations of Agricultural Overseers and Agricultural Sub-Overseers were also changed to "Rural Development Inspectors" and "Assistant Rural Development Inspectors" respectively.

The two remaining temporary posts of Agricultural Organisers sanctioned under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 3289/33, dated 22nd April 1936, under the Sugar Excise subsidy scheme of the Government of India, were abolished with effect from 1st March 1939, in view of the decision of the Government to terminate the scheme under its Memorandum. Revenue Department, No. 3289-A/33-IV, dated 10th February 1939. Of the 7 posts of Auditors ordered to be retrenched under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 8672/28, dated 9th -May 1938, five were held in abeyance before the close of the year. Consequent on the classification of the societies into the categories of "major" and "minor" in accordance with orders contained in Government Resolution. Revenue Department, No. 7363/33 of 15th March 1938, the number of societies which could be classified as "minor!" increased and as reduction was effected in the staff of Auditors, the strength of sub-auditors had to be reinforced to enable the audit stail to do the audit work. Creation of 24 posts of sub-auditors was, therefore, sanctioned under Government

Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 8672/28, dated 9th May 1938. The divisional Assistant Registrars were given the assistance of Auditors (vide Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 8672/28, dated 10th September 1938) for some time and these Auditors were withdrawn when the new charges of Assistant Registrars and Rural Development Officers came into force from 1st June 1939.

SPECIAL TEMPORARY STAFF.

5. Consequent on the winding up of the Nasik and Kaira District Central Co-operative Banks and the general stagnant condition of the areas financed by these two Banks, the necessity of reconstructing these areas was felt. Accordingly, two officers in the Auditor's grade were appointed as Reconstruction Officers for these two areas. These posts were sanctioned by Government under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 9106/33, dated 5th October 1938 and Government Resolution, Revenue Department No. 7846/33, dated 4th August 1938, respectively. An officer of the rank of a sub-auditor was also appointed temporarily, for Reconstruction Societies of Ahmedabad, primarily to look after the work of the recovery of Government loan advanced to these societies.

The agency of the Special Recovery Officers for the recovery of co-operative societies' dues was continued practically throughout the year. Under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 3483/28, dated 1st April 1939, the recovery of the dues of co-operative societies was ordered to be suspended till the next collection season. This necessitated discontinuance of Special Recovery Officers in certain areas. Effect was, however, given to these orders only after the close of the year but some of the posts of Special Recovery Officers particularly those in Gujerat, where scarcity conditions were prevailing, were ordered to be held in abeyance. In view of the large number of arbitration awards and liquidation orders pending unexecuted in the Nasik and West Khandesh districts, two posts of additional Special Recovery Officers at Malegaon and Dhulia, respectively were created.

The posts of Special Supervision Officers for Dohad Taluka and Jhalod Mahal in the Panchmahals and Taloda Taluka in the West Khandesh district were continued throughout the year. These officers are intended to control, guide and supervise the working of the Bhil Societies in the partially excluded areas in their charge.

The posts of Special Liquidation Officers at Poona, Dharwar, Sholapur, Bijapur and Jalgaon, were continued throughout the year. Similarly, the post of the Special Liquidation Officer, Belapur, created on 1st July 1937, for liquidation work of societies in the canal area of Ahmednagar district, was continued throughout the year, but the headquarters were changed from Belapur to Kopergaon. A feature of the liquidation work during the year was that a number of the Auditors, who were liquidators of a number of societies, were relieved of this work to enable them to carry out their statutory duties of auditing the societies.

The Bunding and Shikar Staff, appointed under Government Resolutions, Revenue Department, Nos. 2623/33 of 11th October 1937, 28th November 1938 and 2624/33, dated 31st May 1938 respectively, were continued throughout the year.

HONOBARY WORKERS.

The cost on account of their travelling allowance was Rs. 2,003.

12. The policy of Government in stamping out evils of corruption was scrupulously followed and every complaint received from the public was promptly investigated. Departmental enquiries were ordered in two cases, of which one related to a subordinate officer in foreign service as a Land Valuation Officer of a Land Mortgage Bank. In a number of other cases preliminary enquiries were also held to determine if there was sufficient prima facic evidence to order departmental enquiries. There was only one case in which complaints of inadequate payment for supplies, while on tour or otherwise, were made.

H. SUMMARY OF GENERAL PROGRESS.

SBASON.

13. The season was only slightly better than that in the previous year. The monsoons were not evenly distributed and were particularly disappointing in the North Gujerat Districts, where the crops were adversely affected. The excessive rains in October wrought damage to the standing kharif crop in the Nasik, East Khandesh and some other districts, though it proved slightly beneficial to Rabi crops. Owing to continued depression, the agricultural produce did not fetch good prices. A redeeming

feature, however, was a rise in prices of some commodities particularly Gul in the canal tracts.

In spite of the order for the winding up of the affairs of the Kaira District Central Co-operative Bank, there was an increase in the number of membership and working capital of Central Banks.

Though the number of agricultural co-operative credit societies increased, there was a decrease in their membership partly due to the policy of rectification and consolidation pursued by the Department and partly due to the fact that the members of newly registered societies are smaller in number than those of cancelled societies. Their working capital as well as reserve and other funds, however, show an increase. There was an all round progress in the working of non-agricultural societies.

It is particularly noteworthy that a major portion of the finance given by agricultural societies continues to be of a short-term nature. The societies also advanced loans for improvement of lands and redemption of old debts, but these types of loans are now generally dealt with by Land Mortgage Banks which are the appropriate agency for giving long-term credit secured by immoveable property. There has been a distinct fall in the amount of loans advanced for debt-redemption during the year under report as compared with the previous year. The loans advanced for land improvement by co-operative credit societies are usually for small works requiring small medium-term loans.

17. During the year under report, 100 new societies were registered and 67 were ordered to be wound up. A feature of the year's working is a satisfactory increase in the registration of Thrift and Credit Societies. The following table gives a classified list of societies registered and taken into liquidation during the year:—

A policy of cautious expansion of the credit movement in rural areas was followed during the year. Fifty-six registration proposals were received.. Four of them were refused as the Registrar was not satisfied about their soundness, and 52 new societies including 7 multi-purpose societies were registered. On the other hand,

45 societies were ordered to be wound up. The year thus records an increase of 7 only in the total number from 3,702 to 3,709 societies.

Notwithstanding an increase in the number of societies, there is a decrease in the total working capital which is due to the all round decrease in the Bank loan outstanding, members' deposits and "other outside liabilities" including non-members' deposits. The decrease in members' deposits is partly due to their conversion into share capital in consequence of the adoption of share system bye-laws by a large number of societies and partly due to the set off of members' dues in the process of repayment. It is noteworthy, however, that the decrease in members' deposits is largely counterbalanced by the increase in their share capital. The decrease in membership is due to the cancellation of societies, and also due to the process of weeding out undesirable members who very often act as a clog to the proper working of the societies. The Reserve and other funds record a satisfactory increase, though it must be stated that certain factors have militated against the accumulation of a bigger reserves. The concession scheme which has been in operation for a fairly long period has resulted in permanently lowering the rate of interest, leaving a comparatively narrow margin for profit. Secondly, amounts representing losses due to bad debts or non-recovery of interest are being written off against the Reserve Fund.

Fresh finance records a further decrease to the extent of over 6 lakhs as compared with the figures of the previous year. It may be pointed out in this connection that the figure has a direct relation with recoveries as the policy adopted at present is to allow fresh finance mostly for current agricultural needs to the extent of repayments, with a cut of 5 to 10 per cent. when the outstanding loans are in excess of the present needs or repaying capacity. A combination of several factors has thwarted the progress of recoveries which though in several districts including the canal tracts of Poons and Ahmednagar record an increase over the previous years do not show any appreciable improvement for the whole Province. Deterioration is particularly marked in East Khandesh where owing to the unfavourable condition of the agricultural season and suspension of coercive processes, recoveries were below expectations. There has also been a fall in the figure of recoveries in the Satara District. An impression had gained ground in certain quarters that under the agricultural debt relief

legislation, substantial relief would be forthcoming by way of remission of principal outstanding, etc., and this impression has been partly responsible for a fall in recoveries, which otherwise might have been better. Government orders curtailing and regulating the use of coercive processes for recoveries of co-operative societies dues have had a similar effect.

The decrease in the total loans outstanding is partly due to the cancellation of a fairly large number of societies and also due to the adoption of a policy of cautious finance.

It will be noticed that there is marked improvement in the precerious and backward tracts, which can be attributed to the better prices obtained for the agricultural commodities in the canal tracts. There is a slight improvement for the Province as a whole.

21. Audit Classification.—In spite of vigorous efforts made in recent years to collect overdues through various devices such as collective and individual concession schemes, substantial improvement has not been achieved. The position in regard to overdues is naturally reflected in the audit classification awarded to societies which is disclosed by the following statement:—

The large increase in the number of D class societies, though calling for serious attention, should not be taken to mean a corresponding change in the financial position of the societies as this increase is mainly due to the structer classification enforced at audit which is now based mainly on the percentage of overdues. Separate figures compiled with regard to percentage of overdues in agricultural credit societies (excluding land mortgage banks) reveal that out of the 3,722 societies, there are as many as 244 societies having no arrears, 132 societies having arrears up to 5 per cent.,

- 138 societies having arrears ranging between 5 to 10 per cent., 431 societies with arrears ranging between 11 to 25 per cent. and 590 secieties with arrears ranging between 25 to 50 per cent.
- 23. During the year under report, the process of classification of debts into frozen, bad and doubtful debts which was introduced during the previous year as one of the measures calculated to clarify the financial position of societies and central banks, and to facilitate measures for rehabilitation, wherever necessary, was continued through the agency of the supervisors, Bank Inspectors and Auditors. These investigations were completed in 3,687 societies out of the total number of 3,709 societies. The following statement gives an analysis of the classification of the debts into frozen, bad and doubtful debts:—

^{24.} It will be noticed from the above figures that the total of the debts under column 7 works out at 11.6 per cent. of the total loans outstanding. The previous year's figures for doubtful and bad debts for 3,392 societies, wherein the classification of debts was completed, were Rs. 19,76,485 and Rs. 11,91,127 respectively as against Rs. 19,33,553 and Rs. 10,30,923 for 3,687 societies for the year under report. There is a distinct improvement in the positionparticularly regarding bad debts which can be considered satisfactory in the existing circumstances. On the basis of classification of debts, the usual measures designed to arrest deterioration in societies were put into force during the year. the case of doubtful debts recoveries were allowed to be credited against principal. Bad debts were allowed to be written off against reserve funds in several cases. The total losses written off in this manner during the year amounted to Rs. 44,417. The recovery of frozen debts was stimulated by grant of liberal concession in interest and through coercive measures in the case of contumacious defaulters. The process of liquefaction of societies' dues, which has now been in operation for over two years, has helped to a certain extent in clarifying the position of societies regarding the reality of their assets in the form of loans outstanding. As already pointed out in the last report, the measure of success in the work of rehabilitation depends to a large extent upon the sympathy and readiness of the central financing agencies to lend a helping hand to the financially weak societies by granting concessions to them, commensurate with the concessions which the societies are advised to grant to their indebted members. While it is gratifying to note that some of the financing agencies have willingly extended their co-operation, a few have not shown the same readiness.

25. Concession Schemes.—Side by side with the process of classification of debts, the policy of granting concession to the borrowers of societies on collective as well as individual basis, continued to be in operation throughout the year. The scale of concession varied for different tracts according to the financial position of societies and the accumulation of overdue interest. In addition to these concessions, the societies were advised to amend their bye-laws providing for a lower rate of interest in the case of members paying punctually. The following statement indicates the extent to which concessions were availed of on individual and collective basis:—

Owing to the cancellation of three societies, the number of societies has decreased from 69 to 66. There was a greater demand for loans in all the three canal areas which is evidenced by an increase of about Rs. 37,000 in the total figure of loans advanced during the year under report as against the loans advanced during the previous year. Total recoveries on account of principal and interest are about Rs. 48,000 more than the previous year's which can mainly be attributed to better prices obtained for Gul which is the principal money crop grown by cultivators in these areas. Better recoveries, especially on account of interest, can be considered to be encouraging for an area which has been stagnant for years. Under the concession scheme, remissions in interest were given to the extent of 40 per cent. on cash recoveries of interest. The amount locked up in lands shows a decrease by about Rs. 60,000. This decrease is partly due to the sale of lands and also due to the winding up of one society which had large acreage of land in its possession.

In the Panch Mahals, the demand for fresh finance was less than the demand during the previous year. There is also a consistent decrease in recoveries and in the amount outstanding at the end of the year as compared with corresponding figures of the previous year. A noteworthy feature of the movement in the Bhil tract in the Panch Mahals is the finance for seed and other domestic requirements of members in kind. For this purpose, a special agency of shop-agents has been brought into being, and supply in kind provided through the agency. Recoveries in kind were also made through that agency. The idea underlying the arrangement is to convert these agencies into Purchase and Sale Unions. During the year under report such an agency at Garbada was converted The following into a Purchase and Sale Union. illustrate the progress achieved under the system of advances and recoveries in kind:-

The position of the Bhil Societies in the West Khandesh District is not satisfactory and notwithstanding an increase in membership, there has been a reduction in the owned, borrowed and working capital. Fresh finance during the year under report is less by about 66 per cent. as compared with the figures of the previous year, though recoveries show a slight increase. The position with regard to overdues, which work out at about 91 per cent. of the loans outstanding, is extremely unsatisfactory. This state of affairs can mainly be attributed to the fact that proper arrangements for the sale of the produce of the agriculturists are at present lacking and the produce is forcibly taken away by the sowkars.

Under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 4869/33, dated 29th June 1939, orders were issued by Government on the proposals contained in Mr. Symington's report on the measures to be adopted for improvement of the economic condition of the Bhils and other aboriginal tribes in Partially Excluded Areas. The orders of Government on the chapters relating to rural credit, advocate the desirability of the adoption of the co-operative method, as it is educative and gives scope for non-official assistance. Government has also agreed that adequate supervision should be provided at Government cost. Steps are accordingly being taken to implement these orders by appointment of the necessary staff and for organisation of Purchase and Sale Unions in the Bhil tracts, wherever necessary.

28. Other Societies.—In addition to the above societies which cater for the Bhil population in West Khandesh and the Panch Mahals, there is a number of other credit societies which cater for the needs of employees of local bodies. Their membership though

largely consisting of backward classes is not, however, exclusively restricted to those classes. The following table gives some salient figures about the position and working of these societies:—

(B) MULTI-PURPOSE SOCIETIES.

- impending debt relief legislation, 29. In view of the instructions were issued during the year indicating the lines on which steps should be taken to reorganise the credit machinery in rural areas. Past experience has shown that without linking up credit with marketing an encouragement of thrift, credit societies can do only a limited good to the agricul-It has been, thereof, realised that it is necessary to organise an agency in villages which while providing finance for current cultivation needs would undertake also the marketing of agricultural produce. The organisation of village Multi-purpose Societies on an extensive scale is, therefore, contemplated, and during the year instructions were issued to the departmental staff to take steps to organise one or two such multi-purpose societies in each taluka to start with. The principal village in the area of operation of a Multi-purpose Society would have has a weekly bazar or a market of minor importance and would possess good facilities for communication with major agricultural markets. The area of operations of the Society would be restricted to a radius of about five miles from its registered office. Thus about five or six societies organised at suitable centres would cover a whole taluka. The Multi-purpose Society would provide short-term finance required by its members for current cultivation needs. It would also provide, to a limited extent, intermediate term finance required by the members for such agricultural needs as the purchase of bullocks, carts and agricultural implements. The Society would, moreover, make advances against the pledge of members' agricultural produce. In addition to the provision of credit the Society would supply to its members agricultural requirements (such as seed and manure) and also domestic and other requirements and would make arrangements for the sale of their agricultural produca. Thus, the Society would cater to the needs of the members in most matters relating to agriculture and would play an important part in rural economy. The existing Agricultural Credit Societies or the Agricultural Thrift and Credit Societies, which are now being registered, will continue to supply the credit needs of the agriculturists, and will arrange for the marketing of their members' produce and the supply of their members' requirements, through Multi-purpose Societies Sale Societies.
- 30. For want of suitable personal or for other reasons, it may not be possible to organise village thrift and credit or multi-purpose

societies in certain areas or groups of villages. In order that agriculturists from such areas or villages may not suffer for want of finance, central banks may admit as nominal members individual agriculturists whose debts are under examination by debt adjustment boards or whose debts have been adjusted under the Debt Relief Legislation and who are not members of any society dispensing credit. Such nominal members would be granted crop finance by the central financing agencies. Similarly where it is not possible to organise sale societies or multi-purpose societies for the marketing of agricultural produce at major market places, etc., central financing agencies would be advised to open sale shops or depots and do the work which sale societies or multi-purpose societies might have done for agriculturists.

During the year under report, a beginning was made with regard to the organisation of Multi-purpose Societies in rural areas and as already pointed out, 7 such societies were registered. Though the number of the societies was small, some of them have made a promising strat. The Nerandra Multi-purpose Society in the . Dharwar District collected a share capital of Rs. 650, had a membership of 44 and its area of operations extended over 10 villages. The Society arranged for the sale of milk on behalf of its members, thereby making a profit of Rs. 34. It also purchased kerosene tins worth Rs. 484 for distribution among its members. Cotton seed worth Rs. 138, and groundnut oil worth Rs. 88 were also supplied to of members. The Society was able to show a profit of Rs. 162 at the close to the year. The Rattihalli Multi-purpose Society registered in January 1939, enrolled 133 members and collected a share capital of Rs. 2,625. Loans to the extent of Rs. 9,805 were advanced to the members. The Society also arranged for the supply of domestic and agricultural requirements consisting of kerosene tins, cotton seed and sulphur dust. The Society was given a grant of Rs. 100 by the Department.

(c) SUPERVISION.

31. The number of District Boards of Supervising Unions stands at 16. Kolaba, Ratnagiri and Broach continue to be without any board. Ninety-one Supervising Unions and one society have been affiliated to these Boards. Four Unions were ordered to be wound up during the year as a result of the fact that the areas served by the Nasik District 'Central Co-operative Bank and the Kaira District Central Co-operative Bank were placed under the

Reconstruction Officers; while one Union viz. the Borsad Taluka Co-operative Supervising Union in the Kaira District was converted into a Banking Union. The staff of the Boards of Supervising Unions consists of 6 senior supervisorts, 106 supervisors and 19 assistant supervisors. The Boards have been useful in exercising a certain amount of supervision and control over the working of the Unions. Like the Unions, however, they too labour under financial difficulties and cannot perform their functions satisfactorily.

The number of Supervising Unious including Guranteeing Unious stands at 112. The number of societies affiliated to them was 3,505.

32. During the year under review, it was felt that there was a certain amount of overlapping in the work done by supervisors of surpervising unions and bank inspectors. With a view, therefore, to devise ways and means to economise, and avoid unnecessary duplication of agencies, the question regarding co-ordination of different agencies for supervision and inspection of societies was discussed at an informal conference of central financing agencies called by the Registrar at Poons. It was, however, not possible to arrive at an agreed solution, and for the present, arrangements sanctioned under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 10056/28, dated 15th April 1936, are being continued.

During the year under report the Unions continued to render material help in the classification of loans into frozen, bad and doubtful debts.

(D) LAND MORTGAGE BANKS.

33. A separate statement B (1) showing the operations of land mortgage banks is appended.

(i) Primary Land Mortgage Banks.

34. The number of land mortgage banks working in the Province at the close of the year was 14. During the year, Government sanction was received for the establishment of 9 more land mortgage bank of which one bank viz. Gadag Co-operative Land Mortgage bank in the Karnatak was registered by the close of the year.

There was a steady increase in the business of the land mortgage banks during the year although all did not show uniform progress. In summarising the activities of the land mortgage banks, distinction has to be made between the three old land mortgage banks and

other banks established in recent years. Of the old banks, two have become involved in heavy arrears. As regards the bank at Dharwar, the position has become rather critical. Its affairs were subjected to a special inquiry. A report was submitted to Government detailing measures necessary for improvement of its affairs and Government has directed that its affairs should be closely watched and a further report be made in January 1940. In the case of the new banks, all of them except one have had a smooth career. Mismanagement occurred in Hubli Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank which made it necessary for the Board of Directors of the bank to be removed and the management of the bank was placed in the charge of a Board nominated by Government. Criminal proceedings were started against some persons connected with the management of previous Board who were alleged to have indulged in shady transactions.

85. A statement showing the position with regard to the working of primary land mortgage banks during the year is given below:—

From the statement it will be seen that during the year under report the number of members increased from 7,654 to 9,095. The amount of loans advanced to members has gone up from Rs. 13,60,470 to Rs. 20,90,748 which are exclusive of loans advanced by the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Bank prior to the establishment of the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank and not yet taken over by the latter. The number of loan applications received by the primary land mortgage banks during the year was 990 and 632 applications were forwarded to the Provincial Land Mortgage Bank for sanction of loans. The total amount outstanding with the members of the primary banks at the end of the year was Rs. 23,03,577.

- 36. Out of the total loans advanced to the borrowers by the primary banks, Rs. 2,88,656 inclusive of interest were due for repayment. Rs. 74,377 in principal and Rs. 1,02,980 in interest were recovered during the period leaving a balance of Rs. 1,11,299 to be recovered and the amount overdue from the members in all the banks is Rs. 89,997 including interest as against Rs. 60,658 at the end of the previous year. The overdues are specially heavy in the case of old banks viz., the Pachora, Broach and Dharwar laud mertgage banks. Steps have been taken to institute arbitration proceedings against the defaulters and to obtain awards against them. Where the borrowers show valid causes for default, extensions are granted provided full interest due is paid by them. Reports were called for from the banks with regard to the causes The banks of default and steps necessary to minimise defaults. emphasised the necessity of special and summary powers for the recovery of their dues. They pointed out the instance of the Province of Madras where such powers were given, and expressed the view that the existing procedure of arbitration is necessarily dilatory and not suited to the conditions of land mortgage banks. These and other suggestions made by the land mortgage banks with regard to the steps necessary to increase the utility of land mortgage banks formed the subject of a special report submitted to Government.
 - 37. From the reports received from the primary land mortgage banks, it is seen that 7 banks were able to show profits in their working during the year.
 - 38. The year under report being the fourth year of the working of the banks, no subsidy from Government was given as subsidy was made available for the first three years only. In spite of the subsidies, it was not possible for several primary banks to balance their budgets and the result was that deficits continued to accumulate. This was the position in banks in which business done was not adequate and the expenses were heavy. The deficit banks, therefore, pressed their claims for additional subsidy from Government to enable them to wipe out the deficits.
 - 39. The tendency towards a gradual fall in the number of loan applications observed last year, persists. The reason generally attributed for the decrease, is the rigidity of the test applied by the land mortgage banks in granting loans. The impending legislation for scaling down and adjustment of debts was also partially responsible for the paucity of applications as it was felt that there would be compulsory scaling down of debts due from agriculturists to the Sowkars and that the relief obtained under the Agricultural Debters Relief Act would be more substantial than that secured by voluntary conciliation effected through land mortgage banks.

40. At present, conciliation of the debts of applicants is attempted through the Conciliation Boards set up by the primary banks with the approval of the Department and the Bombay Provincial Land Mortgage Bank. The remissions reported to have been obtained by conciliation effected during the year in respect of debts redeemed through loans advanced by the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank amounted to Rs. 1,41,379, the total amount of loan advanced being Rs. 8,10,460.

(ii) Provincial Land Mortgage Bank.

41. Sir Govindrao B. Pradhan, Kt., continued as the elected President of the bank. Mr. V. B. Mardhekar continued to work as the Managing Director.

Seven meetings of the Board of Directors and nine meetings of the Executive Committee were held during the year. There was no material change in the constitution of the bank. The paid up share capital of the bank increased from Rs. 394,700 to Rs. 4,21,000. Shares of the paid up value of Rs. 2,50,260 were held by individuals and the remaining by co-operative societies and primary land mortgage banks. The increase was due mainly to the purchase of more shares by the primary banks on the basis of 5 per cent. of their borrowings from the bank as required by the bye-laws of the bank.

- Loan operations.—During the year the bank received 703 loan applications for Rs. 11,52,089 recommended by primary banks out of which 646 loan applications for Rs. 9,34,500 were sanctioned and 28 loan applications for Rs. 73,650 were rejected. The remaining applications were pending consideration at the end of the year. The bank received, since its inception, 2,174 loan applications 37,58,052 out of which 1,807 loan applications for Rs. 25,54,050 were sanctioned after reducing the amount of loan applied for by Rs. 4,96,637. 114 loan applications for Rs. 3,56,825 have been rejected so far and 145 loan applications for Rs. 1,65,050 were cancelled subsequently owing to failure of the applicants to comply with some of the conditions, on which loans were sanctioned. 103 loan applications for Rs. 1,85,490 were pending consideration at the close of the year some of which were awaiting further information from the primaries. The total amount of loans advanced since the inception of the Bank was Rs. 21,14,290 to 1,547 applicants recommended by 13 land mortgage banks.
- 43. The minimum and maximum limits for loans sanctioned by the bank to an individual, are Rs. 400 and Rs. 10,000 respectively. The minimum limit in case of Kaira District Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank, Limited, Nadiad, has, however, been kept at Rs. 300 as a special case. No exception was made in the case of the maximum limit, though applications from individuals asking for loans in excess of Rs. 10,000 each, were received. Out of 1,547 loans for Rs. 21,14,290, advanced by the bank since its inception, 301 loans for Rs. 1,34,355 were for sums below Rs. 500, 611 loans for Rs. 4,84,265 were for sums between Rs. 500 to Rs. 1,000,

- 405 loans for Rs. 6,13,090 were for sums between Rs. 1,000 to Rs. 2,000, 194 loans for Rs. 6,17,580 were for sums between Rs. 2,000 to Rs 5,000 and 36 loans for Rs. 2,65,000 were for sums between Rs. 5,000 to Rs. 10,000.
- 44. The loans advanced by the bank were mainly for redemption of old debts and a very few loans were for improvement of lands and purchase of lands. Out of 1,547 loans advanced so far only 6 loans for Rs. 9,800 were for purchase of lands, 17 loans for Rs. 20,800 were for improvement of lands, 38 loans for Rs. 51,200 were for joint purposes of redemption of debts and purchase and improvement of lands. The majority of loans granted were for amounts less than Rs. 2,000.

The Provincial Land Mortgage Bank was able to recover from the primary banks the instalments of loans due from them except in the case of Hubli and Pachora Co-operative Land Mortgage Banks which remained in arrears for small amounts.

- 45. Debentures.—The first issue of debentures of Rs. 20,00,000 at 3½ per cent. guaranteed by Government, which were floated towards the close of the previous year, was kept open for public subscription up to 31st August 1938. Till then a sum of Rs. 16,76,200 was received as subscriptions. Towards the close of the year the bank, having felt the necessity of raising further funds, approached the Trustee and Government for permission to extend the period for receiving subscriptions in respect of the unsubscribed portion of the debentures viz. Rs. 3,23,800. Government was, however, placed to take up the whole of this portion itself and thus the whole of the first issue of Rs. 20 lakhs was completely subscribed. In accordance with the terms of the Debenture Trust Deed, the Provincial Land Mortgage Bank has made the necessary provision for Sinking Fund out of the receipts for the year 1988-39.
 - 46. Some progress was made in the work regarding the transfer of the assets and liabilities of the Land Mortgage Department of the Provincial Co-operative Bank to the Provincial Land Mortgage Bank, during the year. A large number of cases relating to the Broach and the Pachora Land Mortgage Banks were transferred to the Provincial Land Mortgage Bank. Out of 80 cases of loans advanced by the Provincial Co-operative Bank through the Pharwar Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank, 56 cases were accepted by the Provincial Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank for transfer subject to fulfilment of certain conditions, 27 were rejected and 3 cases were pending consideration at the close of the year.
 - 47. The bank showed a profit of Rs. 5,825-10-11 for the year. This profit, together with the balance of profit of the previous years, was utilised towards writing off the debit balance of preliminary expenses account amounting to Rs. 5,670 and a small balance was carried over. Government was pleased to grant a subsidy of Rs. 1,721-14-10 to the bank during the year.

(e) AGRICULTUBAL NON-CREDIT SOCIETIES.

48. General conditions.—During the year under report, five new societies were registered, while the affairs of three societies were ordered to be wound up.

The following paragraphs deal with some of the important types of non-credit societies.

49. Cotton.—The Cotton Sale Societies, both in Karnatak and Gujarat, continue to play an important part in making arrangements for the sale of the cotton crop. With the registration of five more societies, the number such societies increased from 29 to 34. The following table gives the main statistics:—

A regrettable feature in the working of the societies in Dharwar District was a serious mismanagement of the affairs of the Hubli Co-operative Cotton Sale Society, as a result of which Government had to resort to the extreme step of suspending the elected board of directors and nominating a new board under Rule 48 of the Bombay Co-operative Societies Rules. The Gadag Cotton Sale Society continued to work satisfactorily. During the year, it sold 30,000 dokras for Rs. 8,92,404 and earned a total commission of Rs. 17,667, the net profit realised by the Society being Rs. 6,642. The recent orders of Government that individuals should not be selected for distributing seed in the area of operations of the Sale Societies would, it is expected, serve as a stimulus to these societies. The Bailhongal Cotton Sale Society in the Belgaum District came to grief owing to mismanagement, and an enquiry under Section 43 of the Co-operative Societies Act is pending.

In Gujarat the Sonsak Group Co-operative Cotton Sale Society sold the largest quantity of cotton, viz., 31,955 maunds, the price realised being Rs. 2,65,364. Next to it was the Talad Group Co-operative Cotton Sale Society which sold 29,928 maunds of

- 45. Debentures.—The first issue of debentures of Rs. 20,00,000 at 3½ per cent. guaranteed by Government, which were floated towards the close of the previous year, was kept open for public subscription up to 31st August 1938. Till then a sum of Rs. 16,76,200 was received as subscriptions. Towards the close of the year the bank, having felt the necessity of raising further funds, approached the Trustee and Government for permission to extend the period for receiving subscriptions in respect of the unsubscribed portion of the debentures viz. Rs. 3,23,800. Government was, however, placed to take up the whole of this portion itself and thus the whole of the first issue of Rs. 20 lakhs was completely subscribed. In accordance with the terms of the Debenture Trust Deed, the Provincial Land Mortgage Bank has made the necessary provision for Sinking Fund out of the receipts for the year 1938-39.
- 46. Some progress was made in the work regarding the transfer of the assets and liabilities of the Land Mortgage Department of the Provincial Co-operative Bank to the Provincial Land Mortgage Bank, during the year. A large number of cases relating to the Broach and the Pachora Land Mortgage Banks were transferred to the Provincial Land Mortgage Bank. Out of 86 cases of loans advanced by the Provincial Co-operative Bank through the Pharwar Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank, 56 cases were accepted by the Provincial Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank for transfer subject to fulfilment of certain conditions, 27 were rejected and 8 cases were pending consideration at the close of the year.
- 47. The bank showed a profit of Rs. 5,825-10-11 for the year. This profit, together with the balance of profit of the previous years, was utilised towards writing off the debit balance of preliminary expenses account amounting to Rs. 5,670 and a small balance was carried over Government was pleased to grant a subsidy of Rs. 1,721-14-10 to the bank during the year.

(e) AGRICULTURAL NON-CREDIT SOCIETIES.

48. General conditions.—During the year under report, five new societies were registered, while the affairs of three societies were ordered to be wound up.

The following paragraphs deal with some of the important types of non-credit societies.

49. Cotton.—The Cotton Sale Societies, both in Karnatak and Gujarat, continue to play an important part in making arrangements for the sale of the cotton crop. With the registration of five more societies, the number such societies increased from 29 to 34. The following table gives the main statistics:—

A regrettable feature in the working of the societies in Dharwar District was a serious mismanagement of the affairs of the Hubli Co-operative Cotton Sale Society, as a result of which Government had to resort to the extreme step of suspending the elected board of directors and nominating a new board under Rule 48 of the Bombay Co-operative Societies Rules. The Gadag Cotton Sale Society continued to work satisfactorily. During the year, it sold 30,000 dokras for Rs. 8,92,404 and earned a total commission of Rs. 17,667, the net profit realised by the Society being Rs. 6,642. The recent orders of Government that individuals should not be selected for distributing seed in the area of operations of the Sale Societies would, it is expected, serve as a stimulus to these societies. The Bailhongal Cotton Sale Society in the Belgaum District came to grief owing to mismanagement, and an enquiry under Section 43 of the Co-operative Societies Act is pending.

In Gujarat the Sonsak Group Co-operative Cotton Sale Soc'ety sold the largest quantity of cotton, viz., 31,955 maunds, the price realised being Rs. 2,65,364. Next to it was the Talad Group Co-operative Cotton Sale Society which sold 29,928 maunds of

cotton and realised Rs. 2,32,294. During the year under report the cotton Sale Societies were permitted to amend their bye-laws so as to facilitate the sale of cotton under different conditions. The amended bye-laws authorised societies to have recourse to hedging under certain conditions. The societies are now in a position to protect themselves against a lack of demand in the local market or a fall in prices of cotton.

Among the Ginning Societies, the Purushottam Co-operative Ginning Society had another year of successful working. The Society ginned 133,128 maunds of cotton and earned ginning charges amounting to Rs. 36,381. It is, particularly noteworthy that the society's ginning rate has been progressively reduced since its inception and stood at Rs. 3-4-0 per bhar during the year. The society has also installed a huller for processing of tuber and a grinding mill. Its receipts from the hire of these machines amounted Rs. 1,563 during the year. The Sayan Group Co-operative Ginning Society ginned 36,060 maunds of cotton and realised Rs. 21,084 as ginning charges. The Farmers' Co-operative Ginning and Pressing Society pressed 15,021 bales and earned Rs. 48,818 as pressing charges. Its net pressing rate per bale was Rs. 2-4-0 which compared favourably with the rates of other private pressing factories. The society has also installed a groundnut decorticator and a grinding mill. It receipts from all these sources amounted to Rs. 14,790.

A special mention requires to be made of the following societies:--

Chilly.—The Byadgi Chilly Sale Union with its branch at Ranchennur had another year of usefull activities. It sold chillies worth Rs. 23,728, Kapas and cotton worth Rs. 20,226 and other agricultural produce of the value of Rs. 9,063 and realised a profit of Rs. 930.

Mango.—The two Mango Sale Societies at Malwan and Vengurla made arrangements for the sale of mangoes at Bombay but owing to a bumper crop and inefficient arrangements with regard to gardening, etc., it did not work at a profit.

Fruits and Vegetables.—The Raver Taluka Co-operative Fruit Sale Society continued to make steady progress. It sold fruits and vegetables of the value of Rs. 1 lakh and realised a profit of Rs. 5,671.

The principal business of the Society is to give advances against the security of garden crops including lands. The Rahuri Fruit Sale Society which is more or less a society of dealers in fruits did a good amount of business by selling fruits worth Rs. 70,857 and earned a commission of about Rs. 9,400. Its working, however, is not satisfactory and its practice of giving advances to persons who sell fruits through the Society, results in the accumulation of arrears. The Southern Gujrat Vegetable Growers' Association works more as a Transport Society than as a Sale Society. During the year the association received Rs. 22,430 as transport charges and realised a net profit of Rs. 8,121. The bulk of this profit is intended for distribution amongst the members in proportion to the transport charges paid by them.

Eggs.—The Yelloor Egg Sale Society continued to concentrate its activities on the sale of eggs and on improvement of poultry. The Society was, however, not able to realise much profit on its sales for want of a suitable agency in Bombay for the sale of improved varieties of eggs.

Arecanut.—The two Arecanut Sale Societies in the Kanara District continued to maintain steady progress. The Kumta Arecanut Sale Society sold goods worth Rs. 1,02,935 and earned a commission of Rs. 1,606. The special feature in the case of this Society is that sales are in cash and as such the society is able to secure a larger turnover with proportionately small working capital. The Sirsi Totagars' Sale Society sold beteinuts worth Rs. 52,437 and earned a commission of Rs. 2,169.

Paddy.—With financial facilities from the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Bank, the Palghar Co-operative Paddy Sale Society could help its members to store and sell their paddy in favourable markets and show profit on the year's working.

- 51. Cattle Breeding Society.—Out of 19 such societies in the Province, eleven are situated in the Maland tract in the Dharwar District, where good grazing and water facilities are available. The Shidenur Cattle Breeding Society in this tract continued to be the most outstanding institution of the type. With a grazing area of 200 acres, it maintained 100 cows and 2 stud bulls. Its business has developed so much as to enable members to sell some of their animals thereby making cattle breeding a subsidiary industry. In the Belgaum District, the two cattle breeding societies—one at Ainapur and the other at Sadalga—did good work.
- 52. Dairy Societies.—The total number of Dairy Societies was 8 with a total membership of 991. The number of milch animals owned by these societies was 983. The quantity of milk supplied by members during the year was 601,817 lbs. and the total sales amounted to Rs. 53,549. The Bombay Co-operative Supply Union incurred a loss of Rs. 1,601 on the year's working while others realised a net profit of Rs. 1,912.
- 53. Fencing Societies.—The total number of Fencing Societies was 14, comprising a membership of 1,498 and a share capital of Rs. 20,871. The Dharwar District continued to lead in this type of

co-operative activity. Out of the 11 societies in the District, 6 have got full wire fencing and the other five have stone-walls. The total cost of the fencing is Rs. 54,213, the area enclosed being 19,042 acres. Societies, with stone-wall fencing, have not shown satisfactory results, as the stones require constant repairs. The Societies have now decided to replace the stone-walls by wire fencing.

54. Crop Protection Societies.—The number of these societies increased from 23 to 24. These societies have proved a useful agency in protecting crops from theft, fire, etc., by employment of watchman. The activities are mostly concentrated in Khandesh where the societies continue to make steady progress. Another district where the utility of crop protection is being recognised is Satars. The total membership and area under protection in the two districts of Khandesh and in the Satars District was as under:—

In East Khandesh, the cost of watching the crops is calculated at Re. 0-3-6 per acre.

- 55. Dam Construction Societies.—The Mutta and Balkali Dam Construction Societies in the Honawar Taluka of the Kanara District continued their useful work.
- 56. Land Improvement Society.—With the cancellation of one society in the Dharwar District, the number of these societies decreased from 10 to 9. The total membership was 504 and the area covered by schemes of land improvement was 4,571 acres. The Yelawigi Waddars Society had another year of successful working. It was instrumental in bringing 210 acres of waste land—divided into 21 plots—under cultivation. The members grow paddy, cotton, Jowar, sesam and chillies. It is rather remarkable that Waddars who belong to a non-agricultural backward community should practically demonstrate what co-operation can achieve in the matter of joint land improvement.
 - 57. Irrigation Societies.—The Tambwe Irrigation Society in the Satara District is a model institution of the type in this Province. The main activities to the Society are directed towards the supply of irrigated water for cultivation and the Society was instrumental in bringing a total area of 50 acres under irrigation.

A noteworthy feature is that the pumping plant is set up by a contractor at his own cost and the Society is to meet only the recurring expenses which are fixed at 1/5th of the produce of cane. The successful working of the Society has given impetus to the organisation of similar lift irrigation schemes in the district and attempts in this direction are in progress.

- 58. Machinery and Implement Societies.—There are 27 such societies, of which ten are situated in the Poona division and seven in the Dharwar District. These societies had a membership of 1,143. The value of the total sales effected by these societies amounted to Rs. 6,589. The main business of the societies is to give implements on hire. This resulted in a total income of Rs. 14,149 to the societies. The net profit earned by the societies amounted to Rs. 1,246.
- 59. Purchase and Sale Unions.—The West Khandesh Purchase and Sale Union, with its two branches at Shirpur and Dondaicha, continued to make satisfactory progress. There are three cotton market centres in West Khandesh, at each of which the Union has its office. The Union decided to open a branch at Nardhana which promises to develop into a marketing centre. At the same time, it has also been decided to split up its two branches at Shirpur and Dondaicha into two independent societies as desired by some members. The Union deals in all kinds of agricultural produce and during the year the total turnover amounted to Rs. 3,47,519, which enabled the Union to realise a net profit of Rs. 3,168 and wipe out its previous year's loss of Rs. 1,659. At Lasalgaon in the Nasik District, which is another important marketing centre, the Purchase and Sale Union disposed of agricultural produce valued at Rs. 1,26,133 and earned a commission of Re. 981. The Amalner Taluka Co-operative Purchase and Sale Union, with its area of operations extending over three talukas of Amainer, Parola and Chopda, sold Kapas weighing 5,187 maunds for Rs. 35,032 and groundnuts to the extent of 14,322 maunds for Rs. 32,235 and earned a commission of Rs. 1,343. The Varna Valley Co-operative Purchase and Sale Union transacted good business through its four branches at Islampur, Sangli, Kolhapur and Takari. Its total sales during the year amounted to Rs. 3,04,072 and the Union earned a commission of Rs. 7,369.

The need for linking up the activities of crop finance with the marketing of the produce of agriculturists has already been emphasised in the paragraphs dealing with multi-purpose societies. In the new scheme of agricultural finance and marketing, the Sale Society or Union would play a very important part in planned rural economy. In view of the immense potentialities of these co-operative organisations, instructions were issued during the year under report emphasising the need for reorganising and strengthening the position of the existing Sale Unions and Societies so as to make them fit for the important work ahead.

60. Taluka Development Associations.—The following statement gives the main statistics regarding the working of Taluka Development Associations:—

61. The year under report witnessed a reorientation of the policy governing the working of the existing associations and registration of new associations. While some of the associations have no doubt done commendable work by way of introduction of improved methods of agriculture, etc., it has been thought that the extensive area of operations of Taluka Development Associations has restricted their utility and that with a taluks as a unit it is not possible to achieve any real and intensive progress in rural development. On an examination of this question, orders were issued by Government under Government Resolution, Department, No. 8240/33, dated 23rd June 1939, laying down that the existing taluka development associations should be continued but that no new associations should be formed without the special sanction of Government. The Registrar has also been asked to examine the working of such of the associations as are not working efficiently and suggest what modifications in their constitution and personnel are necessary. In the light of Government orders, instructions were issued to Assistant Registrars and Rural Development Officers to examine the working of taluka development associations and to organise better farming societies in areas where demand for taluka development associations is forthcoming.

Incidentally a Better Farming Society of the type contemplated, embracing so many varied activities benificial to the agriculturists, would play an important part in the new scheme of finance and marketing visualised under the Debt Relief legislation.

62. Better Living Societies.—The number of societies remained unchanged at 34. They have a total membership of 2,456. Some of the societies are stagnant but others which are working have been undertaking multi-farious activities such as distribution of medicines, improvement of sanitation, construction of roads, opening of libraries,, destruction of wild animals, etc. As some of the Better Living Societies tend to lenguish for want of funds and lack of a comprehensive programme, steps for their conversion into Better Farming Societies which include amongst their objects, better living activities, are in progress.

In the sphere of rural reconstruction, the Kallabe Rural Reconstruction Society is a model institution of the type and has concentrated on promoting sanitation and other activities such as providing communications, digging wells, killing wild animals etc. The Society was awarded the Sir Fredrick Sykes Challenge Shield for excellent work in connection with rural development activities.

63. Joint Cultivation Societies.—Under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 2457/24, dated 19th January 1939, a scheme for creating a co-operative colony of landless people on a large plot of waste land measuring about 3,628 acres belonging to the Zankaria forest in the Broach and Panch Mahals District, was sanctioned by Government. The scheme contemplates the registration of an agricultural co-operative society and the grant of Government assistance in the form of loans for bringing the land under cultivation, at a rate of interest not exceeding 51 per Other outstanding features of this scheme are that no assessment is to be levied for the first three years and the repayment of the Government loan is to commence from the date on which the colonists begin to pay ass essment and that at the end of 10 years the colonists are to be given full occupancy rights in the lands assigned to them subject to the conditions that the lands will be impartible and inalienable except with the permission of the co-operative society and Government. Steps for registering the Zankharia Co-operative Joint Cultivation Society are in progress.

The Collectors of the different districts have also been directed by Government to send lists of available waste lands in their districts to the Registrar, Co-operative Societies, and Director of Rural Development, for preparation of schemes for co-operative farming in suitable areas, and the matter is receiving the attention of this Department.

(2) Banking in General.

64. In modification of the orders that the use of the word "Bank" should be restricted to societies which do the business of banking as defined in section 277-F of the Indian Companies

Act and have a paid-up share capital of not less than Rs. 20,000, Government has directed under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7363/33, dated 13th May 1939, that existing co-operative societies which do banking business as defined under section 277-F of the Indian Companies Act and are authorised to use the word "Bank" in their name and whose paid up share capital is more than Rs. 10,000 but less than Rs. 20,000 should be allowed to use the word "Bank" up to the 30th June 1941.

65. The following table indicates the extent to which Inland Exchange business is done through co-operative banks:—

- 67. The easy tone of the money market continued throughout the year. The central bank's form of Quarterly Finance Statement was under revision during the year.

^{69.} During the year under report the resources of the Bank increased by Rs. 10 lakhs. The bulk of this increase is due to a rise in the deposits held by Central Banks and Societies. The total amount invested by way of overdrafts, cash credits, loans and other advances declined from Rs. 98, lakhs to Rs. 90 lakhs. This decline is due to a reduction of Rs. 15 lakhs in ordinary loans, cash credits and overdrafts, against which there was an increase of Rs. 7 lakhs in advances against agricultural produce and loans outstanding from societies in liquidation.

The position of the Bank in respect of liquid resources is satisfactory. The demand liabilities of the Bank on account of current and savings bank deposits amount to Rs. 1,01,84,423, and time liabilities on account of fixed deposits amount to Rs. 77,42,369. Against these liabilities the Bank held at the close of the year Rs. 13-31 lakks as cash on hand and in banks, Rs. 40 lakks as deposits with approved banks, and Rs. 65-43 lakks in Government and other authorised securities.

- 70. The Bank's position in respect of doubtful and bad debte was strengthened by the transfer of Rs. 1,40,017 from the Sundry Creditors' Account and Rs. 52,853 from the year's profit. The reserve for doubtful debts now amounts to Rs. 5,17,146.
- 71. The profits of the Bank were Rs. 1,09,725 as against Rs. 1,08,890 for the previous year. The Bank declared a dividend of 4 per cent. The Bank has earmarked Rs. 10,000 for donation to Sir Lalubhai Samaldas Memorial Fund. Out of this amount Rs. 5,000 were donated to the fund during the year.
- 72. In the Deccan Canal area, repayments from societies were better this year than for several years past. This improvement is due to a rise in the price of jaggery which continues to be the most important money crop on the canals, and to the efforts of the special staff which the Bank appointed with a view to stimulate the recovery of frozen outstandings. Recovery of dues from societies in liquidation, however, continues to constitute a problem for the Bank. The dues from societies in liquidation increased by Rs. 3 lakks on account of the cancellation of a few more alliliated societies.
- 73. The work regarding the transfer of the assets and liabilities of the Land Mortgage Department of the Bank to the Bombay Provincial Land Mortgage Bank has substantially progressed and final settlement is awaited.
- 74. During the year under report, Sir Chunilal V. Mehta resigned his chairmanship on account of pressing business pre-occupations. In his place Mr. R. G. Saraiya, who has been connected with the management of the Bank for many years and is a prominent businessman of Bombay was elected as Chairman of the Bank. Mr. V. L. Mehta continued to guide activities of the Bank ably as Managing Director.

(4) District Central Banks.

75. Owing to the liquidation of the Kaira District Central Co-operative Bank, Limited, which was ordered to be wound up at the beginning of the year, the number of Central Banks decreased from 12 to 11. The following table gives comparative figures relating to the operation of the banks:—

The number of individual members, deposits individuals, reserve and other funds record a satisfactory increase. The decline in the number of society members, the paid up share capital and the amount of deposits held by societies is mainly due to the winding up of the Kaira District Central Co-operative Bank, which had 143 societies as members, Rs. 62,650 as share capital and Rs. 39,000 as deposits held by societies. The reduction in the figure of profits is partly due to the fact that under the concession schemes, the Banks are trying to give as much relief to the societies as possible. Cost of management has also gone up by 20 thousand rupees owing to the increase in the strength of the establishment of some of the Banks. The total working capital rose by a little over 4 lakhs and the Central Banks continued to have a plethora of funds. Out of the total working capital amounting to Rs. 2,99,34,387, Rs. 1,04,79,160 only are on loans with societies which clearly shows that the bulk of the agricultural credit societies for whose benefit the Central Banks

are primarily intended are not in a position to absorb the major portion of these funds. Plenty of surplus funds, however, are a source of strength as they enable banks to stand the strain, if any, due to change of circumstances. In order to utilize some of these funds to the mutual benefit of the banks and affiliated societies, the necessity of the District Central Banks interesting themselves in the organisation of arrangements for the supply of agricultural requisites and sale of agricultural produce by organising Purchase and Sale Societies at suitable market places with a view to encourage crop loans and make advances in kind, was emphasized. It was also pointed out that pending the formation of such supply and sale organizations, the Banks themselves may undertake the work strictly on a commission basis.

- 77. The position as regards unauthorised arrears has deteriorated. Unauthorised arrears show an increase of more than 8 lakhs over the past year's figure. This increase was mainly due to unfavourable agricultural seasons in some districts like the East Khandesh.
- 78. The Kaira District Central Co-operative Bank was ordered to be wound up, during the year under report. The affairs of the Bank had been in a precarious condition for a number of years and several attempts to resuscitate its working proved abortive. The position of primary societies in the area served by the Bank was far from satisfactory. The number of societies in "C" and "D" class was very large and overdues both of principal and interest from the members to societies were very heavy, resulting consequently in heavy overdues from societies to the Bank. Forty-one societies were in liquidation. The Bank was not in a position to raise funds to carry on its business and to provide fluid resources. Neither was it in a position to render any assistance to societies in the work of their reconstruction. Following the liquidation of the Bank, steps were taken for the recommendation of societies in the area that was served by the Bank and Government has already approved a scheme of reconstruction under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7846/33, dated 4th August 1933, appointing the liquidator of the Bank as the Reconstruction Officer for the area. In order that the liquidation of the Bank may not lead to any wrong inference or misapprehension regarding other Central Banks, Government issued a Press Communique, making it clear that the liquidation of the Bank was a necessary preliminary in the process of rectification and reconstruction of the Movement in the Kaira District which was engaging the attention of both the Registrar and Government. It was further pointed out by Government that it had examined the financial position of all the other financing agencies and was satisfied that the position of all these Banks was sound.
 - 79. The Karnatak Central Co-operative Bank continued to be managed by a Board of Directors nominated by Government throughout the year under the Chairmanship of Mr. G. R. Nalvadi.

80. Nominal membership for the purpose of advances against agricultural produce and valuables to members of its primaries other than Urban Banks and Sale Societies affiliated to it, had already been permitted to central banks. During the year under report, the question as to how and to what extent nominal membership can be extended to individual agriculturists, whose debts are under examination by Debt Adjustment Boards, or whose debts have been adjusted was carefully considered. The Registrar suggested that such agriculturists as could not become members of agricultural credit or other primary societies dispensing credit, may according to their deserts, be financed, and that arrangements for the marketing of their produce may be made, by central financing agencies after admitting them as nominal members.

(5) Banking Unions.

81. The Borsad Taluka Co-operative Supervising Union in the Kaira District was converted into the Borsad Taluka Co-operative Banking Union, in accordance with the orders contained in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7846/33, dated 4th August 1938. To begin with, the Union took over only 10 societies in the taluka, for the purposes of finance, etc., while the rest are placed in the charge of the Reconstruction Officer, Co-operative Societies, Nadiad. As the Union was converted at the close of the year, there is nothing special to report about its work.

(6) Non-Agricultural Credit Societies.

82. The year under report witnessed a further increase in the number of societies from 665 to 685 and in the total working capital from Rs. 5,66,81,354 to Rs. 6,03,14,947. Deposits held by members also increased from Rs. 2,57,51,861 to Rs. 2,76,92,451. The position as regards recoveries was also satisfactory.

The number of full-fledged urban banks excluding salary earners' societies with a share capital of Rs. 20,000 and above rose to 52 as against 47 of the last year.

83. The following table shows the main statistics relating to the working of these banks:—

- 85. Salary Earners' Societies.—The number of such societies increased from 331 to 351. Out of a total of Rs. 1,97,26,289 due for repayment, Rs. 1,83,41,355 were repaid leaving Rs. 6,70,294 and Rs. 7,14,640 respectively as authorised and unauthorised arrears and this indicates the financial stability of salary earners' societies and their utility to men of limited means. The salary earners' societies are proving increasingly popular. Their overdues are very limited owing to the facility of recovery through pay-sheets. The provision of compulsory thrift in their bye-laws is a boon to the members in case of emergencies. These institutions have considerable educative value particularly for employees receiving small wages or pay.
- 86. Communal Societies.—Of the total current demand of Rs. 38,68,986 in 94 societies, Rs. 25,58,991 were repaid leaving Rs. 3,41,872 and Rs. 9,38,123 respectively as authorised and unauthorised arrears. As pointed out in the last report, the progress of this type of society has not been, on the whole, satisfactory, as the area of operations of the average society is very extensive. Most of these societies are languishing with heavy arrears as the above figures indicate though there are a few societies like the Shamrao Vithal, the Ismalia and the Daxini Brahmins' Co-operative Banks whose working may be considered as satisfactory.
- 87. Mill-hands Societies.—The mill-hands societies operating in the industrial area in Bombay are doing good work. There were 31 societies of this type in 22 Mills in Bombay City alone, out of 55 societies for the whole Province. Of these 31 societies, the management of 17 societies in 8 Mills is under the supervision of the Welfare Department of Messers E. D. Sassoon & Company, Limited. In the Jacob Sassoon Mill, the Elphinstone Mill and the Edward Sassoon Mill, the societies are organised by the respective departments and the working is carried on by separate Managing Committees. It is a matter of satisfaction to note that a co-operative credit society in the mill area has now come to be regarded as a centre round which various activities for the economic welfare of the labouring population can be built up.

(7) Bombay Co-operative Insurance Society.

89. During the year under report, the society issued 2,502 policies for a total amount of Rs. 27,53,000 as against Rs. 20,20,350 of the previous year. The total business at the close of the year amounted to Rs. 67,87,219 out of which, business worth Rs. 2,94,629 has been reinsured. The life insurance fund increased to Rs. 5,26,733 showing an increase of Rs. 1,60,301 during the year under report. The society paid claims amounting to Rs. 28,826 during the year leaving outstanding claims amounting to Rs. 21,153 at the end of the year. The premium income of the society during the year was Rs. 3,59,463, which, together with the income from interest, rent of the building, etc. amounted to Rs. 3,94,627 as against Rs. 2,86,963 of the previous year.

The society has established branches at Delhi, Lahore, Karachi, Rawalpindi and Madras while it has chief agents at Surat, Ahmedabad, Bangalore and Calcutta. Nadiad and Bilaspur have special agents.

90. In view of the growth of the society's business and also the provisions of the new Insurance Act of 1938, the existing bye-laws of the society require to be revised. During the year under report, the financial year was fixed, under orders of Government, as ending on 31st December every year instead of 30th June, to be in conformity with the provision of clause (1) of Section 11 of the Insurance Act. The society has already been asked to revise the existing bye-laws wherever necessary to conform to the provisions of the Insurance Act.

B. CONSUMERS' MOVEMENT.

(I) Co-operative Stores.

With the registration of two more societies and cancellation of an equal number of societies, the total number of societies remained unchanged. The figures indicate an all round increase in member ship, working capital, sales and purchases, resulting also in a considerable increase in profit.

- 92. The Bombay Baroda and Central India Railway Co-operative Stores, with its share capital of Rs. 17,719, had total purchases of Rs. 1,07,303 and total sales of Rs. 1,19,293, and earned a profit of Rs. 2,207. The Gujerat Ladies' Co-operative Stores mainly confined its activities to the purchase and sale of Khaddar under the aegis of the All India Spinners' Association. The sale of pure Ghee is another speciality of this society. Its turnover for the year amounted to Rs. 32,913 and it made a profit of Rs. 103. The Page Co-operative Stores at Dohad, the Surat City Co-operative Milk Supply Society and the South Indian Co-operative Consummers' Society at Poons continued to make steady progress. The Ankleshwar Sahakari Vilji Mandali, which had a comprehensive programme of electric supply, made a good beginning by collecting a share capital of Rs. 21,895 but could not go ahead with its programme owing to dissensions amongst its members.
- 93. In the rural areas, a new rural store registered during the year at Boramani in Sholapur taluka deserves special mention. The society has collected a share capital of Rs. 190 and secured two donations of Rs. 100, each from the local co-operative credit society and the Sholapur District Central Co-operative Bank. It is gratifying to note that during the short period of its working, the society sold goods of the value of Rs. 2,658, making a net profit of Rs. 68. With the growth of village multi-purpose societies which are also expected to undertake supply of domestic requirements of the villagers, there is not likely to be much scope for the organisation of similar societies in rural areas.

(ii) Housing Societies.

94. During the year under report, 6 new housing societies were registered and 1 society was ordered to be wound up. Thus there was a further increase in the number of housing societies from 93 to 98. Of the new societies registered, 4 were in Ahmedabad, one in Surat and one in Kaira. The society which was ordered to be wound up, was the Dhulia Co-operative Housing Society which was not able to secure a suitable site for building purposes. The following table gives the main statistics regarding housing societies:—

95. The Konkanastha Mahars' Co-operative Colony Limited, at Bandra, which was registered in 1936 on the tenant-ownership system, is the first society in Bombay Suburban area for the backward classes. Till recently, the society could not start work as the question of securing a suitable site for the colony was not settled. During the year under report, Government was pleased to sanction the allotment of certain land out of the former Development Department Suburban Scheme No. VII-Khar, to the society on concessional terms and also a loan of Rs. 15,000 not exceeding three-quarters of the value of the buildings, repayable in 25 years. As a result of this substantial help from Government, the society has made a good beginning by undertaking construction of 3 types of buildings as shown below:—

34 persons have joined the society and 9 buildings (1 of the "A" type, 6 of the "B" type and 2 of the "C" type) are now ready and have already been occupied by the members.

- 96. The chief difficulties experienced by housing societies, particularly those working on the co-partnership system, have been enumerated in the last administration report. After a detailed examination of the financial position of societies financed by Government, 3 societies were selected and proposals submitted to Government last year recommending relief to these societies. During the year under report, Government was pleased to grant relief to these societies by way of reduction in the rate of interest (1 per cent. in two cases and 1 per cent. in the third case) for a period of 10 years, (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 9633, dated 25th April 1939).
- 197. During the year under report, the Bombay Finance (Amendment) Act, 1939, which came into force from 31st March 1939, introduced the Urban Immoveable Property Tax in Bombay. As the new tax is leviable on the properties held by co-operative housing societies in Bombay and as most of these societies are already finding it extremely difficult to balance their budgets, representations were made by them to Government for exemption from the payment of the tax, but Government was of opinion that there was no justification for differentiating between co-operative housing societies and other house-owners in respect of taxation-

(iii) House Reconstruction Societies.

98. The Bhadiad Reconstruction Society, which had repaid all its liabilities to Government, was taken into liquidation, as it had fulfilled the objects for which it was registered. Consequently the number of societies decreased from 25 to 24. All these Societies are situated in Ahmedabad District. The total repayment to Government by these societies amounted during the year under report to Rs. 3,527, as against Rs. 2,677 of the previous year, reducing the balance outstanding from Rs. 37,450 to Rs. 33,923.

Although the figures show a slight improvement, these societies have not much vitality in them. One of the note-worthy exceptions is the Dharwar Machigar Society which continues to do useful work. It sold raw materials worth Rs. 11,305 and made a profit of Rs. 266. Attempts were made during the year to start Medars' (Bamboo workers societies) in the light of orders contained in Government Memorandum, Revenue Department, No. 8791-D/33, dated 22nd June 1939. Other societies which deserve special mention are the Sanikattar Co-operative Salt Sale Society and the Ghadgeri Kajgars' Association. The former sold salt worth Rs. 31,178 and earned a profit of Rs. 787. The latter has been instrumental in reviving the bangle-making industry, though outside competition in the manufacture of finer bangles of both glass and celluloid has to a certain extent, militated against the development of this industry. The concession of supply of firewood granted to the Association by Government has acted as an encouragement to its activities.

Though an analysis of the general figures shows some improvement, the weavers' societies as a class have not made much headway. The main drawback is that most of the societies function as ordinary credit societies and the loans advanced for the purchase of yarn have become frezen. Prospects of their showing better results are remote, unless they take steps to convert themselves into real producers' societies and serve as feeders to the District Industrial Associations. The Hebsur Gudar Weavers' Society which is interested in manufacture of gudars (carpets), however, deserves special mention. It purchased raw materials worth Rs. 18,536 and sold goods worth Rs. 19,421, making a profit of Rs. 216.

(iii) District Industrial Associations.

- 101. Under the scheme for the marketing of handloom products subsidised by the Government of India, 8 District Industrial Associations have so far been established at Ahmednagar, Hubli, Ahmedabad, Yeola, Sholapur, Malegaon, Kamatgi and Belgaum. The aims and objects of these associations are to educate and train the weavers in the manufacture of up-to-date patterns and designs and in the use of improved appliances. Weavers being conservative by temparament, the associations had an uphill task in commencing work and in persuading the members to take to the manufacture of new types and qualities of cloth. Notwithstanding these difficulties, the associations have succeeded so far in introducing new types of woven goods and though their sales are not generally satisfactory, they have served a useful purpose as educative organisations particularly in training the weavers in the importance and value of new designs and new appliances, and familiarising the public with such bandloom products.
 - The Ahmednagar Association which is one of the outstanding institutions of this type had another year of successful working. It has established a dye-house and has also undertaken to work the wool scheme of the Government of India. moreover, been instrumental in organising a producing centre at Vinchur. The total production of the association amounted to Rs. 25,774. The principal handicap of this association as well as others is the absence of ready market for the disposal of handloom products. The working of Industrial Associations at Yeola and Hubli was not satisfactory. The Managing Committee of the former had to be suspended and management had to be entrusted to the Marketing Officer, Handloom products. This arrangement violded satisfactory results. An enquiry under section 43 of the Co-operative Societies Act had to be ordered into the working of the Hubli Association, as a result of which the association is showing signs of improvement. This association has done a good deal of propaganda and has also established a dye-house. The Bijapur District Industrial Association at Kamatgi started work during the year and had 168 members on the roll and Rs. 1,704 as working capital at the close of the year. Under arrangements with the Ali India Spinners' Association, the association confined its activities

to the manufacture of Khadi with the handspun yarn obtained from the Spinners' Association. This arrangement has enabled the Association to overcome difficulties regarding marketing of finished products as the Spinners' Association has undertaken to purchase and market them.

103. The grant-in-aid scheme sponsored by the Government of India was to terminate on the 31st March 1940, has been extended for two years more. The present position is that the financial position of the Sholapur Association is strong and amongst the rest only the Ahmednagar Association has so far made such progress as would indicate some prospects of its being self-supporting. In view of the present stage of development of the associations it would be necessary to continue financial assistance to the associations by way of subsidies and the special staff to guide their activities.

IV. BOMBAY PROVINCIAL CO-OPERATIVE INSTITUTE.

104. No important decisions affecting the constitution and functions of the Provincial Co-operative Institute were taken during the year.

With the advent of the District Rural Development Boards, it was felt that little scope was left for the District Branches of the Institute. They were, therefore, directed to be closed under orders of Government.

- 105. The financial position of the Institute showed no improvement and the position with regard to the mortgage of its building continued to be unsatisfactory. The loan outstanding on 30th June 1937 was Rs. 1,64,000 as against Rs. 1,59,000 on 50th June 1938.
- 106. The Executive Committee met eight times during the course of the year. No Co-operative School was conducted under its auspices during the year. The Central Education Board met thrice, and an examination was held in November 1938.

Twelve conferences, 25 classes for the training of members of Managing Committees and of Secretaries, and 8 Refreshers' classes for Supervisors were held by the Institute, during the year.

107. The Institute gave sanction to the donation of Rs. 46,870 made by 502 Co-operative Societies under Section 42 of the Co-operative Societies Act.

CO-OPERATIVE TRAINING SCHEME.

108. The scheme continued in its second stage. This part of the scheme contemplates the training of the Departmental staff. The usual strength of each batch of Departmental officers deputed for training was 17 consisting of 4 auditors, 5 sub-auditors, 1 agricultural organiser and 5 clerks. The duration of each class was fixed at 4 months. Employees of Central Co-operative Banks

were also permitted to avail themselves of the instruction imparted at these classes organised for the subordinate staff of the Department.

Side by side with these major classes of 4 months, other classes of a shorter duration were also organised for secretaries and

managers of Urban Banks and Land Valuation Officers.

109. Owing to the reorganization of the Department with effect from the 1st April 1939 and the consequent expansion of its activities, particularly after the transfer of the propaganda staff of the Agricultural Department (Rural Development Inspectors and Assistant Rural Development Inspectors) and the appointment of additional Assistant Rural Development Inspectors some of whom were selected from amongst the supervisors of Supervising Unions and propaganda officers of the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Institute, certain important changes in the scheme have become necessary. In accordance with the orders contained in Government Memorandum, Revenue Department, No. 4114-A/33, dated the 8th February 1939, the training of these special officers has now been undertaken at this school and the training of other officers of the Department as well as of employees of Central Banks has been postpened. As the batches deputed for training are to consist exclusively of the Rural Development Inspectors and Assistant Rural Development Inspectors, the syllabus in the usual subjects is modified in such a manner as to make the course in these subjects more elementary as compared with the original course for auditors and other officers of the Department. These modifications were found essential to suit the requirements of this propaganda staff. In addition to these subjects, instruction in other subjects like agriculture, horticulture, veterinary, cottage industries, etc. which is very essential for these special officers for their work of rural development is also provided. A course of theoretical and practical training in the work of land valuation is also included in the syllabus.

In addition to this training, definite periods are allotted for discussions. During these periods, every officer deputed for training is encouraged to express his own views on the different subjects forming part of the syllabus and to add to his stock of knowledge through such discussions.

The system of holding weekly tests for officers under training with a view to ascertain whether they have assimilated the instruction imparted at the classes continues to be a special feature of the scheme.

110. The library of the Registrar containing valuable books on Co-operation and allied subjects has been placed at the disposal of this school. As usual, the time-table provides periods for reading. With a view to see that proper use of the library is made by the officers under training at the time fixed for reading, definite subjects are assigned to them and they are asked to write essays on these subjects. This procedure enables the teachers to know whether the officers have concentrated their reading on the topics given and thus made a real use of the library and the time at their disposal.

111. The scheme continued to remain in the charge of Mr. D. A. Shah, Personal Assistant to the Registrar of Co-operative Societies and Director of Rural Development, Bombay Province, Poona, througout the year.

V. RURAL DEVELOPMENT.

112. The year under report was eventful both for the future of the co-operative movement and of rural development in this province. The question as to how best the rural development work done by the Agricultural, Co-operative and other departments separately could be reorganised so as to avoid duplication of work and secure greater efficiency and more economical use of Government's resources had been engaging the attention of Government for some time, and after consideration of the question. Government came to the conclusion that this object could best be achieved by placing all rural development work and propaganda in the hands of one department with a sufficiently extensive and well equipped Accordingly orders were issued in Government organisation. Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 15/33, datad the 8th March 1939, transferring the entire propaganda work done hitherte by the Agricultural Department to the Co-operative Department and confining the activities of the Agricultural Department Agricultural Research and Education.

The most outstanding feature of the new scheme of rural development is that it recognises the co-operative movement as the most suitable agency for propagands, for disseminating agricultural knowledge and bringing the results of the specialised research work of Departments like the Agricultural Department within the reach of the masses. This decision of Government is in harmony with the resolution passed by the twelfth Conference of Registrars held at New Delhi in 1936, that "the movement should be used for extending the rural reconstruction movement to the fullest possible extent compatible with its principles having regard to the fact that it is the best and in many areas the only means of providing organization without which the movement cannot expect to be permanent".

113. The plans of reorganisation outlined in the Government Resolution referred to above visualise a comprehensive programme of rural reconstruction, so as gradually to pave the way for establishment of a new economic order in villages. One of the most important measures which is calculated to better the conditions of agriculturists is the debt relief legislation to which reference has already been made. The improvement of production by popularising acientific and co-operative methods, the provision for economical and efficient marketing of agricultural produce through regulation of marketing in general and through co-ordinated co-operative marketing in particular, the organisation of supplies to the rural population through the agency of co-operative multi-purpose societies, and through co-operative organisations of rural cottage industries are some of the main features visualised in the new scheme of rural economic development. For propaganda work in villages the scheme contemplates the employment of about 1,000 rural reconstruction workers after training in various subjects affecting rural life.

- 114. One of the first measures adopted by Government was to establish a Provincial Board of Rural Development consisting of officials and non-officials for a period of two years, vide Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 15/33, dated 22nd June 1939). The function of the Board is to advise on general principles and policy regarding rural development, and to facilitate the work of the Board, four committees viz:—
 - 1. Agricultural and Livestock Committee,
 - 2. Cottage Industries Committee,
 - 3. Training and Propaganda Committee,
 - 4. Backward Areas Committee,

have been established. The scheme also provides for the establishment of a separate Board of Rural Development for each district consisting of officials and non-official workers, and orders sanctioning the establishment of these Boards were issued after the close of the year.

- 115. A brochure explaining the rural development plans of Government of Bombay under the new scheme, was also published after the close of the year.
- 116. The activities of the department pertaining to rural development during the period under report (15th April 1939 to 30th June 1939) are summarised in a separate appendix annexed to this report.

VI. MISCELLANEOUS MATTERS.

(i) Act, Rules and Bye-laws.

- 117. Act and Rules.—There have not been any amendments of the Act during the year under report. Rule 24 of the Bombay Cooperative Societies Rules, however, was supplemented by a provision that no society should declare a dividend at a rate exceeding that recommended by its Managing Committee or the Board of Directors as the case may be.
- 118. Bye-laws.—In view of the impending debt relief legislation and change in the basis of liability from unlimited to limited several important changes had to be made in the model bye-laws of the multi-purpose society. Model bye-laws were framed for better farming and joint farming societies. Bye-laws of the former are so framed as to enable the society to undertake various types of agricultural improvement and also include different aspects of better living. The latter type of societies is also intended to bring waste

lands under cultivation. Bye-laws were also framed for Banking Unions, which include among their objects, supervision, marketing of agricultural produce, the supply of agricultural requisites, etc., in addition to providing finance. A Banking Union would also provide constant help and guidance to affiliated primaries in their varied activities.

(ii) ARBITRATION.

119. The total number of arbitration cases filed during the year was 8,843 which added to those pending at the beginning of the year, brings the total to 11,804. Out of these 8,628 were disposed of, leaving a balance of 3,176 at the close of the year. Out of the total loans due from members of all classes of societies amounting to Rs. 7,42,77,043, an amount of Rs. 91,55,021 was involved in arbitration which shows an increase of Rs. 10,56,921 over the figure of the previous year. The loans in which awards have been obtained, but which are still with societies or Assistant Registrars pending execution were respectively Rs. 17,77,103 and Rs. 4,16,052.

122. The number of societies ordered to be wound up, during the year under report was 67. The liquidation work of 27 societies was completed so that the total number of societies in liquidation stood at 782 at the end of the year.

Of the 67 societies taken into liquidation, 1 was a Central bank, 45 agricultural credit, 3 agricultural non-credit, 2 urban credit. 5 salary earners', 3 weavers', 2 housing, 2 consumers' societies and 4 supervising unions.

- 123. The estimated assets and liabilities of the societies in liquidation at the close of the year were Rs. 64,93,757 and Rs. 59,46,655 respectively.

- 125. The bulk of liquidation work was taken away from auditors and sub-auditors and suitable non-officials were appointed in their place. A large number of societies continued with special liquidation officers appointed for the purpose.
- 126. A number of measures were devised for speedy termination of liquidation proceedings and facilities were given to members to get back their own lands. The difficulty of selling the land transferred to societies for want of buyers continues.

(V) CRIMINAL CASES.

130. The total number of offences committed in co-operative societies during the year under report, shows an increase over the previous year. The total number of prosecutions lodged during the year was 22, which together with 19 cases pending at the end of the previous year, brings the total to 41. Out of these 16 cases were decided, 12 ending in convictions and 4 in acquittals,

The question of the prevention of frauds, embezzlements, etc., as well as prevention of benami transactions was carefully examined during the year under report, and it is expected that with the adoption of stringent measures, the incidence of crime will decrease.

(VI) SUSPENSION OF MANAGING COMMITTERS OF SOCIETIES.

131. The number of societies whose managing committees were suspended was 36 at the beginning of the year. The committees of 63 societies were suspended, the period of suspended committees was extended in 16 cases and committees of 28 societies were reinstated, during the year. The number of societies of which committees were under suspension at the close of the year was 81.

(VII) RELATIONS WITH INDIAN STATES.

132. Relations with Indian States continued to be friendly.

(VIII) SCHOOL BOYS' SOCIETIES.

133. These societies are unregistered and are started by school masters of the Educational Department for supplying books, stationery, etc., to school boys. The following statement shows the number of such societies in the Province:—

VII. CONCLUSION.

134. The co-operative movement passed through another year characterised by strenuous activities both on the part of the departmental officers and co-operative institutions. Steps were

taken to implement the orders of Government on the Joint Report submitted by the Registrar and Mr. V. L. Mehta. Accordingly, several measures designed to rehabilitate the movement were adopted, but though these efforts served a useful purpose, unfortunately, it cannot be said that the movement is altogether out of the wood in this Province. The position of the non-agricultural credit as well as the non-agricultural non-credit movement is satisfactory, but the present position of the rural primaries continues to give cause for anxiety. As already stated, a combination of several powerful factors is responsible for this. Agricultural season in several parts of the Province has not been very favourable and the level of the agricultural prices continues to be very low. In addition to these fundamental factors which have seriously affected the financial position and the repaying capacity of the agriculturist, there have been other factors which have added to the problems of the co-operative movement. Coercive processes have been suspended in several districts under Government orders and where they are allowed, their use is subject to many restrictions. In view of this and a general impression that under the agricultural dobt relief legislation, substantial remission of principal outstanding will be forthcoming, even some persons who can afford to pay back their dues have not been very keen about doing so. Government tried to correct this impression by issue of a press-note, which served a very useful purpose, but there exists a certain indifference to discharge obligations, and the work of recoveries has, accordingly, been more difficult. The Department has tried to face the problem in all its aspects and in addition to measures for the consolidation of the present structure of the movement, steps are being taken to the structure by new additions and developments As recommended in the Joint Report, efforts are being made to link. credit with marketing of agricultural produce and encouragement of thrift. It is hoped that marketing and thrift will correct the deficiency of agricultural credit which by itself has been found somewhat wanting during a period of continued depression.

- 135. The agricultural debt relief legislation will bring its own problems of a far-reaching character and would require all the resourcefulness and strength which co-operative institutions can command. The principal object underlying the legislation is to scale down the debts of the agriculturists, so as to bring them within their paying capacity. Though the dues of co-operative societies do not come within the obligatory provisions of the Act regarding the scaling down of debts, yet it is obvious that such an important piece of agrarian legislation is bound to affect agricultural credit societies both directly and indirectly.
- 136. An outstanding feature of the debt legislation is the provision which permits alienation of crops of debtors who are parties to an a ward in favour, among others, of resource societies. This emphasizes the need for devising suitable arrangements in a two-fold direction, viz., in making crop finance available to agriculturists on a reasonably extensive scale and providing facilities with regard to the marketing of their produce. It would be up to

the central financing agencies to realize their responsibilities and play their proper role in this co-ordinated scheme of finance and marketing. It is hoped that by starting a nettwork of multi-purpose societies and sale unions, and the opening of branches or sale shops by central banks where sale unions cannot be organized, it will be possible to have a co-operative organization for the marketing of the produce of the rural population.

- 187. The year under report marked another mile-stone in the eventful history of the co-operative movement. The new scheme of the reorganization of work relating to rural development, has emphasized the potentialities of the movement as a suitable agency for disseminating agricultural knowledge and bringing the results of specialized research within the reach of the masses. This new approach to the solution of the rural problem ought to infuse fresh life into the working of the rural primaries, if thereby it is possible to increase the earning capacity of the agriculturists. It is obvious, however, that while the new arrangement may materially benefit the agriculturists and the primary societies, it also means a heavy, additional responsibility for the departmental officers and co-operative institutions.
- 138. In conclusion, a word of thanks is due to the staff of the Department, both gazetted and non-gazetted, who have performed their strengous duties loyally and willingly.

APPENDIX (B).

DETAILED ACTIVITIES OF THE RURAL DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT.

(1) Prevention of Erosion of Soil.

This activity is confined to the Deccan and Karnatak Districts. In the East and West Khandesh Districts and in the Nasik District the departmental staff with the help of kampars appointed from village improvement grants of the respective districts was able to get bunds constructed on 1,410, 2,711 and 7,559 acres respectively. In the West Khandesh District Taluka Development Associations also interested themselves in this kind of activity and 1,410 acres in 14 villages were protected by construction of small bunds. In the Nasik District aid of a tractor paid out the expense of the village improvement grant for constructing basic bunds helped considerably to speed up the work.

In the Poons and Satara Districts about 432 and 103 acres in 26 and 16 villages respectively were bunded, and in some cases also levelled. Besides this the Bunding Officer, Poons, surveyed and prepared bunding schemes as under:—

In Poons, Ahmednagar and Sholapur Districts one Sub-overseer each was entertained from the village improvement grants. A similar post was sanctioned for the Satara District but it was not filled during the period under report.

In the Bijapur District, there were several applications for surveying and preparing bunding schemes. Out of these, 8 schemes covering an area of 386 acres were surveyed and bunding projects were prepared.

Training classes in Bunding.—Classes for training agriculturists in practical methods of scientific bunding were continued in the Deccan and Karnatak Districts. They were newly introduced in

Gujerat from the current financial year. The subjoined table gives the detailes regarding the classes held:—

(2) Extension of Dry Farming Method.

The dry farming method which consists of :-

- 1. Protecting land with small contour bunds,
- 2. Levelling of land,
- 3. Ploughing once in 3 or 4 years,
- 4. Annual addition of a small quantity of organic manure,
- 5. Harrowing land after every rain in the rainy season,
- Wider sowing.
- 7. Interculturing 3 or 4 times,

is designed to conserve soil as well as moisture. In the scarcity tract, therefore, this should form a main plank of propaganda work.

This activity was confined to scarcity areas of the Deccan and Karnatak Districts. Twenty plots were laid in the Poons District to demonstrate this method. Wider sowing of cotton was recommended in Shevgaon, Pathardi and Newssa Talukas of the Ahmednagar District. In Shevgaon Taluka 5 persons have taken to interculturing of cotton. In Man Taluka of the Satara District 9 plots were arranged to demonstrate the dry farming method and plots for demonstrating wider sowing were arranged at 2 places in Tasgaon Taluka.

In the Bijapur District 5 demonstration plots on holding scale have been arranged. In Nawalgund Taluka and Mundargi peta of the Dharwar District propaganda for the introduction of dry farming method was carried on.

(3) Improvement of soil Fertility.

Efforts to educate the people as regards the utility of organic manures in different forms and application thereof to the soil to improve its fertility were continued. The following paragraphs give a short account of the activities.

- 1. Farm Yard Manure.—Farm yard manure not properly stored loses valuable ingredients. Propaganda for proper storing of this manure in pits was, therefore, carried on. Six hundred and nineteen new pits were made in the Dharwar District and 7 similar pits were made in the Thana District.
- 2. Compost manure.—Efforts for utilizing all farm waste for making compost continued. In West Khandesh, 39 compost pits were made and 950 cart load of this manure were prepared. In East Khandesh 1,500 cart loads of this manure was prepared at different places. In addition to that 400 cart loads were prepared at Taluka Demonstration Centres. A compost man was entertained who moved about in villages and showed people how to make compost manure. In the Belgaum District 122 compost pits were made. In the Kolaba District, 15 pits were prepared and 33 cart loads of manure obtained from them.
 - 8. Sann Green Manure.—The use of sann green manuring for irrigated crops is on the increase. For this purpose 21,320 lbs. of sann seed was distributed in the Ahmedabad District, and 13,060 lbs. of seed was distributed in the Poons and the Satara Districts. In Khandesh, sann green manuring for dry crop wheat is becoming popular and 61,655 lbs. of seed were distributed for this purpose. In the Sholapur District, this practice is making headway and 30 acres in 10 villages are under this crop which would be ploughed in due time. In the Bijapur District a plot of land has been laid out for demonstration purpose. This practice is extending in the Gokak canal tract as well as in the tobacco tract in Hukeri and Chikodi Talukas of the Belgaum District.
 - 4. Bone Manure.—Bones are used in the form of mill made meal. A cheaper method of making bone manure is by charring—partially burning them and then breaking them or grinding them in a pug mill. Bone burning was demonstrated in 52 places in Khandesh. Fifteen such demonstrations were held in the Dharwar District. In the Kolaba District 3 such demonstrations were given.

Nine thousand four hundred and forty lbs. of mill made bone meal was distributed in the Gujerat Districts.

5. Oilcakes and Commercial Fertilisers.—Oilcake manure is generally used for sugarcane and to some extent for dry crop of cotton. The use of oilcakes is increasing but its cost is rather prohibitive and the cake is not available at several places. The imperial Chemical Industries (India) have organised a net work of their agencies in the Province and are responsible for a very large sale of commercial fertilizers—sulphate of ammonia in particular In several places Taluka Development Associations are the distributing agents of the company.

6. Denatured salt.—This manure is mostly used for mango, cocoanut and other fruit trees in the coastal districts. Permits for 13,000 lbs. of this salt were issued in North Kanara and for 73,800 lbs. in Gujerat Districts.

(4) Supply of seed of improved varieties of crops.

Under this head two kinds of activities are carried on. One is intensified production and distribution of improved seed and the other is the supply of seed, which is not locally available, to individual agriculturists from reliable sources.

In the first category are included several cotton schemes most of which are financed from the funds of the Indian Central Cotton Committee.

Cotton.—In the Surat District out of 2,174,217 lbs. of seed of A. L. F. 1027 cotton (22,614 lbs. produced on the Surat farm and 2,151,603 lbs. from controlled area) 1,495,645 lbs. were distributed in the tract south of the river Nurbadda. Departmental depots distributed 972,555 lbs. and the remaining 523,090 lbs. were distributed through co-operative cotton sale societies.

The amended cotton transport act which was passed in the first week of May, created a large demand for A.L.F. 1027 cotton seed. In view of the difficulties experienced by the co-operative cotton sale societies in selling selection IA cotton the societies have gone in for A.L.F. 1027 seed. This holds out prospects of a substantial increase in the area under the improved variety pext year.

In the Broach district a similar scheme with B.D. 8 cotton is in operation.

In Khandesh, a scheme for the extension of Jarila is being worked. 511,536 lbs. of Jarila cotton seed sufficient to cover about 25,575 acres was distributed in all the talukas of the East and West Khandesh districts excluding Navapur taluka and in Malegaon, Satana and Nandgaon talukas of the Nasik district.

In the canal tracts of the Deccan fresh and pure seed of Jarila and Banilla cotton is obtained from Khandesh and distributed to cultivators. 4,775 lbs. of Banilla and 4,475 lbs. of Jarila cotton seed were thus distributed during the period under report.

In Karnatak, two kinds of improved cottons are being extended. These are Jayawant and Gadag No. 1. 6,856,249 lbs. of Jayawant seed purchased from 7 centres and 1,436,087 lbs. of Gadag No. 1 purchased from 2 centres have been stocked for distribution in the ensuing season. The former quantity of seed is expected to cover about 685,600 acres and the latter 143,600 acres respectively.

In addition to the schemes mentioned above, schemes for the multiplication and distribution of pure seed through village seed growers for certain other crops are also in operation in some districts. These are described below:—

Jowar.—Budh Perio No. 53. Surat farm seed was given to selected cultivators at half rates in the four talukas of Olpad. Chorashi, Bardoli and Jalalpore under a 5-year plan. Until last year 80 villages were covered with this type of seed. This year 17,335 lbs. of seed have been distributed in 20 more villages.

Bajri.—Akola. In the Poona district 1,500 lbs. of Akola Bajri seed were distributed to registered seed growers.

Groundaut.—In the Poona and Ahmednagar districts, Spanish peanut, K 1 and K 3, are being recommended and 5,701 lbs. of these improved varieties were distributed to registered seed growers. The produce from these registered seed growers would be made available for distribution to cultivators in the neighbouring villages.

Rice.—In the Thana and the Kolaba districts, seed of improved strains of paddy produced on the Karjat farm and private seed multiplication farms were distributed to 60 registered seed growers whose produce would be made available for general distribution.

In the Dharwar district, 1,600 bags of pure seed from controlled area was purchased from village improvement grant and distributed in the rice growing area of the district.

(5) Extension of improved methods of cultivation and practices.

In Gujarat, seed-drills for wider sowing of crops of cereals, cotton and groundnut, were popularised through agricultural and development associations. The planting of sugarcane by ridge and furrow method and gul making on Poons furnance is becoming popular.

In the Deccan, grading of seed with sieves is being popularised. In the West Khandesh district 1,000 lbs. of graded Bajri seed was supplied to cultivators and the resulting crop demonstrated at several places. Wider planting of other crops is also being encouraged. In the Poona district 8,931 lbs. of Bajri seed was graded for 110 cultivators in 17 villages. In the Ahmednagar district, 5,035 lbs. of Bajri seed was thus graded. In the Satara district, 13,440 lbs. of Jowar and 7,904 lbs. of Bajri seed was thus graded. In the Sholapur district 5,250 lbs. of groundnut seed was graded.

In the Poona district sieves necessary for grading Bajri seeds were kept at departmental depots and 50 cultivators took advantage of the same.

Wider sowing of Bajii and Jowar was advised in the Satara district and as a result wider sowing of Jowar has been adopted in 6 villages in Tasgaon taluka.

(6) Improved Implements.

Improved implements such as iron ploughs are kept for hiring out to cultivators at departmental depots and Taluka Demonstration Centres maintained by the Department. In view of the fact that the charges have been kept sufficiently low, several cultivators take advantage of this arrangement.

The Taluka Development Associations also stock such implements as iron ploughs, sugar-cane crushers and gul boiling pans and hire them out to their members on moderate charges.

Several land holders and sawkars also keep iron ploughs and give them on hire to their tenants or clients.

The implements are also made available to agriculturists through the agency of the departmental staff, as is disclosed by the following statement:—

(7) Fruit Cultivation.

Under this head, two kinds of activities are in progress one is that of giving advice on technical matters and the necessary help of trained persons for carrying out certain operations, and the other is of making reliable plants, seeds, grafts, etc., available. Besides general propaganda staff in the district, there is one Assistant Rural Development Inspector stationed at Jalgaon, specially for this work. Trained malis entertained from village improvement funds worked in the districts of East and West Khandesh, Thana and Kolaba. This staff visited gardens, gave advice and performed horticultural operations. As a result of their activities, more people have taken to fruit farming.

In some districts, small nurseries attached to Taluka Demonstration Centres were maintained where seedlings of trees of economic value were raised for distribution.

Four demonstrations were held in Khandesh districts to show the use of paper bags for fruit as a measure against damage from fruit flies. 5,000 paper bags were distributed on these occasions. 120,000 of such paper bags were prepared by cultivators for their own use.

(8) Control of Insect pests and Diseases of crops.

The following paragraphs indicate the activities with regard to control measures against insect peats and diseases of crops:—

Aphis.—In the Satara and West Khandesh districts, spraying of crops of lucerne and peas with Nicotine sulphate and fish oil rosin soap was done at several places.

Cotton Bollworm.—In Gujarat, propaganda for uprooting cotton stocks immediately after picking of cotton is in progress.

Leafcurl of chillies.—In East Khandesh, in view of the fact that the seed beds were badly affected by the severity of the pest, the departmental staff and the staff of the Taluka Development Association concentrated their efforts on control measures against the pest in 20 villages, and distributed 2 maunds of tobacco leaf for apraying purposes. In the Satara District, demonstration of apraying with tobacco decoction and fishoil rosin soap against this pest on chillies and tomatoes was held at several places. In Kalaghatki Taluka in the Dharwar District also, demonstrations of tobacco decoction were held at several places.

Mango Hoppers.—In view of the prevalence of mango hoppers in large numbers in the Ratnariri District, special staff was entertained to demonstrate dusting of sulphur in three centres namely Vengurla, Malwan and Ratnagiri. At each place 3 or 4 gardens were dusted at Government cost as a demonstration measure.

White ants.—In West Khandesh and Satana, the method of destroying white ants by the eradication of queen ants was demonstrated at several places.

Mango stem borer.—In West Khandesh several trees were treated for stem borer.

Jowar smut.—In Gujerat 975 packets of sulphur dust were supplied to cultivators for treating the Jowar seed with it. In East Khandesh, 6,060 packets of sulphur dust were distributed. In the Satara District, 15,514 lbs. of Jowar seed was treated with sulphur from packets distributed. In the Bijapur District sulphur packets worth Rs. 15 were sold.

Powdery and Downy mildew on grapes.—Dusting the grape vines with sulphur and spraying with Bordeaux mixture, the former for powdery mildew and the latter for downy mildew, continued to be in operation.

Potato rust.—In the Poons District, active help was rendered in showing the use of lime and sulphur wash as a control measure.

Koleroga on betelnut.—In the Kanara District, intensive compaign to combat this disease by spraying with Bordeaux mixture was carried out and about 2,000 acres of betelnut gardens were sprayed.

Betelvine will—In Bassein Taluka of the Thana District 14 demonstrations were arranged. 15 group meetings and 8 classes were held to explain and teach the technique of preparing Bordeaux mixture and its practical utility. Individual gardens were also visited for giving proper advice and guidance. 700 lbs. of copper sulphate and 443 lbs. of good quality of line were supplied to order.

Gumosis on citrus plants.—In the Satara District several trees were treated for gumosis. In the East Khandesh District, 200 trees

were treated. 10 lbs. of creosote oil was distributed free for demonstration purposes and 4 gallons were supplied on payment.

Field Rats.—In West Khandesh, owing to rat pest, burrows were fumigated with cynogas and also chiligas. Lead arsenate baits were also used. These measures helped to a certain extent in mitigating the severity of the pest.

Wild Animals.—The Blue bull (Nilgai) menace is increasing in the Kaira District. 59 of these animals were killed by spikaris. In Khandesh, 6 new gun clubs were organised during the period. 121 hunting parties were taken out and 269 wild pigs and 26 blue bulls were killed. In the Satara District, much spade work was done for forming gun clubs. 2 wild pigs were killed by the Asvali gun club in Wati Taluka. An Assistant Rural Development Inspector has been specially appointed for organising gun clubs in the Satara District. In the Dharwar District, 4 centres have been selected and steps for launching an intensive work, round about these places, are in progress. Attempts are being made in organising the work in Badami Taluka where the wild animals are a source of great damage. In the Kanara District, 3 gun clubs were organised and 14 wild pigs were killed.

(9) Development of Special Tracts.

In the two tail-water valleys, viz., Patalganga and Pej-ulhas through which the water from Hydroelectric works runs, two demonstration farms, one in the Kolaba District and another in the Thana District, are run. Water is pumped at these places by Government and given to cultivators who mostly grow vegetables. Both the farms worked well.

(10) Shows, Demonstrations and Classes.

Shows.—At Surat the department arranged an agricultural stall for a trade and Agricultural exhibition arranged by a private agency. Similarly a stall was arranged at Kerwada at the time of a show held there.

At the Poons Industrial Exhibition, 19 agricultural and 5 co-operative stalls were arranged. Small shows were arranged round about l'aluka Demonstration Centres at Madha and Jeur in Sholapur District. An agricultural and cattle show was arranged at Shinganapur in Satara District. Prizes were given to good cattle and agricultural exhibits.

Two fairly large shows were organised in the Dharwar District of which one was a mango show and the other a cattle show.

Demonstrations.—In Gujerat, the use of the iron plough was demonstrated at five places and the use of the iron leveller at 6 places. Sann green manuring and wider sowing were demonstrated at several places.

In the East Khandesh, demonstrations were held as under :-

Several demonstrations were held in the West Khandesh and Nasik Districts. In the Satara District, 7 demonstrations were held, in addition to 6 demonstrations arranged at the Taluka Demonstration Centres. In the Sholapur District, the Bund former and wider seed drill was also demonstrated at several places.

The use of the iron plough and scrapper were demonstrated in the Bijapur district. In the Belgaum district, Jowar grading, the dusting of Jowar seed with sulphur and improved crops were demonstrated. A large number of demonstrations of manures, implements and control of pests and diseases were arranged. Model for an improved manure pit, co-perative fencing and gun club were exhibited at the time of His Excellency the Governor's visit to Mugad.

In the Thana and Kolaba districts, 4 demonstrations of standing irrigated crops and one of poultry keeping were arranged. In the Ratnagiri District, 12 demonstrations were arranged and several items shown. In the Kanara District spraying with Bordeaux mixture was demonstrated at several places.

Classes.—Besides the 10 bunding classes, described herebefore, 2 classes in horticulture, one in the Satara District and the other in Sholapur were hold. Lectures were given at Adult Education Classes in the Thana District. Two small bunding classes were held in the Belgaum District.

Taluka Demonstration Centres.—In view of the policy advocated during the previous year, several Taluka Demonstration Centres were started to demonstrate improvements of agriculture suitable to various tracts under the guidance of the departmental staff. There were 48 such centres at the end of the period under report, distributed as under:—

Gujerat 9, Decean 22, Karnatak 9, and Konkan 8.

With a few exceptions the centres are doing useful work. At these centres, improved seed, improved implements, insecticides and fungicides and appliances for their use are available to the cultivators.

(11) Regulated Cotton Markets and Work under other Cotton Acis.

Cotton Markets.—Out of the existing few Regulated Cotton Markets, those at Jalgaon and Amalner did not do any work as the season had ended. At Bailhongal, Bijapur and Dhulia, arrivals were as under:—
