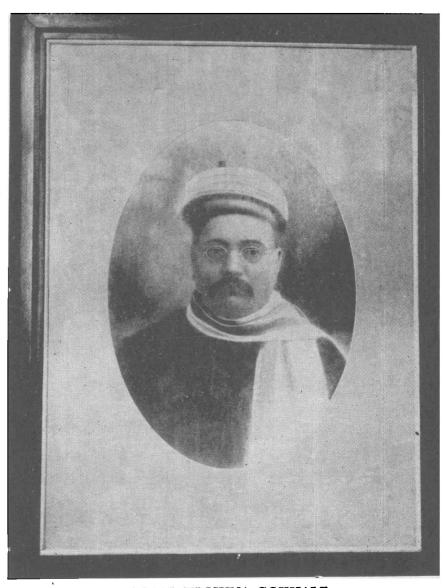

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RAJAJI

Sri C. Rajagopalachariar, popularly known by affectionate abbreviation as Rajaji, was born in the year 1878 in Torapalli, a village near Hosur, Salem District in the State of Madras. was a student of the Central College, Bangalore, and completed the B.A. course in the Presidency College, Madras. He took his B.L. degree from the Law College in Madras and joined the bar in 1900. His early practice as a lawyer was in Salem and later in Madras upto 1919. He was a delegate to the Indian National Responding to the call of the Congress at Calcutta in 1906. Mahatma in 1920 he joined the non-cooperation movement for the independence of India. He edited Mahatma Gandhi's weekly Young India during the latter's imprisonment. He was General Secretary to the Indian National Congress in 1921-22, and a member of the Congress Working Committee from 1922 to 1942 He suffered imprisonment on five and again in 1946-47. different occasions in Congress campaigns between 1921 and 1942.

He was Vice-President of the Dakshina Bharat Hindi Prachar Sabha, Madras, and in the wake of the political reforms under the Government of India Act, 1935 and the Congress decision to contest elections, he became Prime Minister of Madras from 1937-39. He resigned the Prime Ministership in October, 1939. along with other Congress Ministers throughout the country and He however resigned from the rejoined the national struggle. Congress in April 1942 on account of differences of opinion but was soon back in its fold in 1944 and in September of that year he assisted Mahatma Gandhi in the Gandhi-Jinnah talks. A the end of the national struggle in 1946, when the Interin Government was formed, he became a member in the Governor General's Council from September 1946 to August 15, 1947 Following the disturbed political conditions in Bengal, he became Governor of Bengal in August 1947, and later, in succes sion to Earl Mountbatten, Governor-General of India it November 1947, and, after transfer of power was the firs

Governor General of Free India from June 1948 to January 26, 1950, the date of the inauguration of the Indian Republic. He was Minister without portfolio in the Government of India for a brief period, May-December 1950 and Minister for Home Affairs from January to November 1951.

The difficult political situation in Madras in 1952 called him from his retirement and he became Chief Minister of Madras, from 1952-54. He was given the highest award of Bharat Ratna in 1954. From then onwards, he was chiefly concerned with guiding the nation's affairs through numerous articles in newspapers, which paved the way, particularly after the Avadi Congress, for the founding of the Swatantra Party as an all-India party by him. Interested in world peace, he led the threemen Indian delegation on behalf of the Gandhi Peace Foundation to America, England and Italy in October 1962 to canvass support for the banning of nuclear tests.

His publications, which are a perennial source of thought, wisdom and enlightenment, are both in Tamil and English. Important among his Tamil books are: Socrates, Kutti Kadhaigal, Kannan Kattiya Vazhi, Aureliussin-Atmachintanai, Upanishada-Palagani, Abheda Vadam, Vyasar Virundhu, Chakravarthy Thirumagan, Valluvar Vachagam and others, some of which have been translated into other Indian languages. His English books include Jail Diary, Ramayana, Mahabharata, Kamba Ramayana-Ayodhya Kanda, Cripps Mission, SatyamEva Jayate-Vols. I, II and III, Voice of the Uninvolved, Hinduism - Doctrine and Way of Life, and others.

The G. I. P. A. has much pleasure in making available to the public, as Public Affairs Pamphlet No. 7, this brochure containing chiefly the instructive and inspiring address delivered by Dr. C. P. Ramaswami Aiyar on the 8th of January 1966 as Rajaji Birthday Lecture.

Many requests have been received for the speech from members of this Institute and from the public, and we trust this publication will be widely welcomed as a contribution to the Indian political literature of our day — particularly by the younger generation who are separated from the times of Gokhale by so much as half a century.

This year, as it happens, is the year of the centenary of Gokhale's birth, and the G. I. P. A. is happy to open the Centenary Celebrations with this publication.
