PREFACE.

The matter contained in this volume represents immense labour on the part of Mr. Rahalkar and those who worked with him. When a record of this kind was originally proposed, I was very doubtful as to whether it would be possible to collect such information even for Indore City alone. However, Mr. Rahalkar was not daunted and this work is the result of his investigations. That no error should have crept into a volume containing so much statistical detail, and collected, moreover, for the first time, is not conceivable but the figures may be safely taken as a sound basis for examination and discussion, while a commencement has been made for a regular decennial review of the State's resources. Perhaps this review might even be made quinquennially as regards certain statistics, such as statements IV, V, VI, VII, VIII, IX, XIX, XLII, XLIII, XLIV, XLV, LI, LV, LVI and XCIII. Certain statistics are automatically collected for the annual Administration Report and hence are always available.

It is at any rate to be hoped that all the labour expended on this work will not be allowed to remain pigeon-holed away unused and without being periodically brought up to date.

I must offer my congratulations to Mr. Rahalkar for this successful termination of a most laborious task.

INTRODUCTION.

PART I.

General.

"Things don't turn up until somebody turns them up"—Webster.

"There is only one efficient common sense rule for system—keep a record so that the greatest man can handle the job"—E. St. Elmo Lewis in 100%.

At first Mr. K. G. Reshimwale, B.A., was appointed Census Officer but consequent to his transfer to Huzur Office as Secretary to His Highness the Maharaja, I was appointed to his place. When I took over charge of this important Office my greatest ambition was to collect and collate as many statistics as I could, on subjects which were interesting as well as important from the Statistical point of view. The need of statistics was painfully felt and from my personal experience in the Department of Commerce and Industry in which I was working as Secretary, prior to my being appointed as Census Officer, I could see how distressing it was to witness one's utter helplessness in the correct solution of important problems in which the unerring guidance of the statistical data was quite essential. For example, during the difficult period in which the control of Food stuffs within the dominions of His Highness the Maharaja was deemed necessary in the interests of His Highness' subjects, the problem presented many difficulties the solution of which would have been rendered far easier by the aid of correct and reliable statistical data. But the collection and collation of statistics is a very troublesome and cumbrous process. Besides, its immediate usefulness is not always perceived. Moreover, the use of statistics requires expert knowledge of statistics and good understanding and experience of the subject matter for the purpose of which the statistics are collected. Although, therefore, the necessity of statistical data was occasionally felt, and felt very badly, yet no genuine endeavours were made by the State to organize a regular machinery for the scientific and regular collecting and marshalling of the requisite statistics in the State.

I could thus perceive why a bold and an energetic effort was not made to collect the statistics regularly. But at the same time, I was confident that should a beginning be made and the potential value and use of the statistics were practically—not theoretically—brought home to His Highness' Government and if it were shown to them that the task was not so difficult as it might appear at first sight, the latter would readily acquiesce in any practical scheme of statistical organization. With this object mostly in view I made up my mind to take full advantage of the opportunity that the Census of the year 1920-21 presented to me in collecting and collating copious statistics relating to many subjects that seemed to me important and interesting. And I take pride in the fact that thanks to the encouragement and assistance of the Government, the help and co-operation of the several Heads of the Departments of His Highness' Govern-

ment and the energy and zeal of my staff, my expectations have been realised. It would no doubt be ridiculous for me to suppose that the end has been achieved. It is only the means and not the end that has been achieved so far. I do not pretend to say that the statistics I have collected are quite complete and accurate, that the modes and forms of collecting are all that are desirable and that they cover all the necessary field of statistics or that they do not contain any unessential and impracticable statistics. The circumstances under which they have been collected have to be taken into consideration. There was such a short time at my disposal, such an inadequate and untrained staff, and added to this there were the conservatism and superstitions of the people who are extremely loath to give out real statistics and look upon any inquiry of this nature with an amount of suspicion that is almost impossible to overcome in the beginning. I must also confess that I am not an expert statistician and I did not start with the idea of prescribing the lines on which the statistics should be collected in future by the State. As I have already said the main object before me was to collect as many statistics as I could and submit them to His Highness' Government so that when they see the multitude of these statistics and the possibilities that they reveal, if they were regularly and carefully collected and judiciously used, they might be prompted to make active efforts to organise a permanent machinery for collecting and collating requisite statistics. For it is needless to say that the majority of the statistics collected by me, or which may hereafter be collected, represent dynamic, not static events for the things that they symbolise are in a state of perpetual flux. And the justification and the necessity of statistics, too, lie in this. Because their chief service lies in helping comparison and serving as a barometer of the changes that occur in the different departments of life, in different communities, or countries or in different stages of civilization. They have, therefore, to be regularly collected and some of them have to be recorded even daily. Even as regards population statistics which have been hitherto collected at intervals of 10 years, a point has already been raised that changes in the social world occur so rapidly that the decennial census fails to record and exhibit the changes in a manner that may be of considerable practical use to us. And therefore it has been urged in certain quarters that a quinquennial census ought now to supersede the decennial census.

If therefore the statistics that I have collected serve the purpose of forcibly bringing home to His Highness' Government the imperative necessity of organising a permanent statistical machinery for the collection and collation of the statistics that they might select to start with, I shall deem my labours amply rewarded. At the same time I must add that all possible care has been taken to see that the statistics collected approximate as nearly to real facts as possible and I hope that despite their difficulties that might have resulted from causes beyond my control, they would be of material use to the students of Economy and Sociology who, it is confidently hoped, would find in them ample food for thought. Similarly, some of the officers of His Highness' Government would find important and useful statistics pertaining to their several departments collected in this report. It may be expected that they would, at any rate, serve as a guide to them with regard to certain activities of their Departments.

PART II.

Explanatory of the Report.

With regard to the special statistics that were intended to be collected at the time of the Census, the then Chief Minister, Mr. P. Baburao Walewalkar, B.A., LL.B. acting on my recommendation, convened a special meeting to consider this question and in that meeting it was decided to collect statistics, if possible on the following points:—

1. Income of the head of each family.
2. Landed property etc. in the State.
3. Economic condition, that is, rates of grains and wages etc., for the last 10 years.
4. Statistics regarding cattle and conveyances.
5. Statistics about labour class.

Accordingly, four different Economic and Industrial Schedules were drawn up by the Census Department for the purpose. Schedule I contained 44 columns divided into 4 main heads, viz., (a) income, (b) landed property and Jagir etc., (c) cattle, and (d) conveyances and carts in the State. The heading of income was subdivided into 4 columns, i.e. (1) all kinds of unearned income, such as investment securities, interest on capital etc., (2) earnings, such as salary, net profits from the sale of articles manufactured or otherwise, agency commission etc., (3) income from land and (4) total income from all sources. Landed property was also sub-divided into various heads, such as dwelling houses, kothas and shops etc. and other buildings with their approximate values.

Explanation of Schedules.

The cattle statistics are generally collected every year by the Revenue Department of the State. But they collect this information more or less from the revenue point of view only, special attention being devoted by them to bullocks and agricultural stock. Complete and reliable data about the live stock in general and carts and conveyances throughout the State is hardly found in the statistical statements prepared by the Revenue Department. The inclusion of such information in a decennial census was thought desirable and in order to survey the economic condition of the people it was quite necessary that more accurate statistics regarding cattle and conveyances should be collected. Consequently, detailed columns were assigned for the purpose in the Industrial and Economic Schedule I. Conveyances included motor cars, motor-bicycles, bicycles, tricycles and horse-carriages as well as bullock-carts, and hand-carts. Bullock-carts were sub-divided into 3 columns: (1) for hire, (2) for private use and (3) for agricultural purposes. So also horse-carriages and hand-carts were sub-divided into two, (1) for hire and (2) for private use.

Schedule II was drawn up for collecting the average prices of almost all important commodities prevailing in each Mahal of the Indore State during the last decade in order to note the rise in the cost of living of the people inhabiting those places. A circular letter was issued to all the Amins to collect the information in this Schedule by means of local inquiries.

Schedule III was prescribed for collecting statistics regarding the average daily wages in annas of labourers, prevailing in each mahal during the last 10 years. An average for the whole year was taken as the basis for purposes of collecting this information. The column of each year was sub-divided into (1) Males, (2) Females and (3) Children, i.e. those below 14 years of age.

These columns were again sub-divided into (1) skilled, and (2) unskilled.

Schedule IV related to particulars of hereditary occupation and wages etc. of actual workmen (both labour and artisan classes) in factories and industrial concerns, as well as general labour. Agricultural labour has not been included in this Schedule. The principal heads under which these statistics have been collected are:—

- (1) Hereditary occupation of the present workman (2) causes of change if any, (3) his present occupation, (4) difficulties if any felt in it, (5) wages, (6) skilled or un-skilled, (7) training, (8) situation of occupation, (9) birth-place, (10) working hours and (11) general health.

N. B.:—The detailed explanation as to the manner in which the statistics have been collected in this schedule will be found in the explanatory notes attached to the final tables.

Extent of the Enquiry.

The information in Schedules, I, II and III was collected for the whole State; whereas the statistics collected in Schedule IV were confined to the Indore City and the following towns only:—

1. Maheshwar, 2. Khargone, 3. Rampura, 4. Barwaha, 5. Bhanpura, 6. Mahidpur, 7. Tarana, 8. Sanawad, 9. Lepalpur, 10. Gautampura, 11. Kannod, 12. Khategaon, 13. Mandleshwar, 14. Kasrawad, 15. Sendhwa, 16. Garoth, 17. Manasa, 18. Sunel, 19. Jirapur, 20. Narayangarh, 21. Machalpur, 22. Alampur.

These schedules were sent to Colonel Luard, the then Superintendent for Census Operations in Central India in the 2nd week of July 1920 for suggesting the practicability of the statements and forms prepared by this office. While making suggestions for a few modifications in the forms prescribed for the purpose, Colonel Luard thought that to collect information in Schedule I for the whole State would be more difficult than the actual census and it would therefore be far better to confine the enquiries to certain classes or towns only, otherwise it was sure to end in failure. While realising fully the force of Colonel Luard's argument and of his valuable suggestions to restrict this very difficult enquiry, either to a certain class or community or to certain specific parts of His Highness' Dominions, I nevertheless thought that it would be more useful to fully extend the scope of my enquiry and being perhaps a little more optimistic than Colonel Luard, I did not despair of the ultimate results of my enquiries. Consequently I proposed to the Government to collect these statistics for the whole of the State. And in order that the final Census operations may not suffer I proposed to collect these special statistics at the time of the preliminary census. In the 3rd week of October 1920, the Government of His Highness were pleased to sanction the collecting of the proposed industrial and economic-

statistics. Immediately the necessary forms together with accompanying instructions were printed and circulated in the Hindi language.

Since the Mhow Cantonment and the Indore Residency form an integral part of the Holkar State, I addressed the Government of His Highness on the 3rd November 1920 to move the authorities concerned for the collection of the information in Schedules I and II for those areas too. But the First Assistant to the Hon'ble the Agent to the Governor General in Central India informed the Chief Minister in his letter No. 636 dated the 4th February 1921 that no machinery existed for the collection of so much extra information and hence the matter had to be dropped.

An article on the "forthcoming census of Indore State 1921" was An Article Contributed also subsequently published in the Mallari Martand Vijay, a local paper, as well as in the "United India and Indian States" of Madras giving therein all the details of the statistics proposed to be collected and inviting all possible help and co-operation of State Departments in general and the people of the State for fulfilling the object in view. The article was also translated in Hindi by my Head Clerk, Mr. Sobhagsingh Mehta and contributed to the local Paper for the guidance of the Hindi knowing public.

In order to accomplish the difficult task of collecting these statistics I proposed in my Budget poposal for the year 1920-21 that the following special statistical staff should be sanctioned for the purpose and the Government of His Highness were accordingly pleased to sanction the same with effect from the 1st October 1920:—

Special Statistical Staff.

The services of these clerks were, however, actually engaged in the 2nd week of January 1921.

To ensure correctness, detailed personal instructions were given to the staff concerned. Strict instructions and warnings were also given not to harass the people if any of them were disinclined to give out their figures of income. An endeavour was also made to teach the staff as to the persuasive manner in which to approach the people for information so that unnecessary suspicion may not be roused in their minds as to the motive of the Government in collecting these statistics. And I am glad to record that the people gave the necessary information willingly.

Instructions.

With a view to facilitate the collection of industrial and economical statistics in Schedules I and IV, instructions were issued to the Charge Superintendents by a Circular letter to arrange for the collection of the said information concurrently with the preliminary enumeration and to send the returns to this office along with the charge summaries of the preliminary enumeration. As regards the prices of the commodities and wages of labourers as per Schedules II and III a list of commodities for which the average prices prevailed during the last decade, was sent to the Charge Superintendents asking them to ascertain the rates of each year locally and to furnish the same to this office as early as possible.

Similarly, they were asked to furnish the average wages of labourers by means of local inquiry in the parganas.

Other Statistics.

Apart from the special industrial and economic statistics collected through the census agency and the local Revenue authorities the idea of collecting general statistics on several administrative and interesting matters on this occasion also struck me early in January 1921. In order, therefore, to collect the same through the Heads of Departments concerned, various manuscript statements were drawn up and sent to them through the Secretariates concerned for furnishing the requisite information as early as possible. The broad headings under which these statistics were collected are:—

- (1) Temperature and rain-fall.
- (2) Principal crops with their acreage and approximate out-turn.
- (3) Agricultural statistics showing areas under new cultivation, under irrigation and un-occupied land etc., kinds of soils and their assessment rates, number of wells and tanks, ploughs and plough and other cattle, cattle diseases, land revenue demand etc.
- (4) Imports and Exports.
- (5) Industrial concerns; Accidents in the Mills and Factories; Out-turn of cloth manufactured in the mills and the Excise duty realised thereon and Joint Stock Companies &c
- (6) Co-operative Central Banks and Societies.
- (7) Vital statistics including epidemics that prevailed during the last decade with total mortality caused by them.
- (8) Metalled roads and inspection bungalows.
- (9) Educational statistics showing the number of Institutions, students and teachers and the number of students that have passed in the University Examinations during the last decade &c., &c ,
- (10) Statistics of exciseable commodities showing the number of liquor, opium and hemp drugs shops, consumption of liquor and other intoxicants and the actual revenue derived therefrom.
- (11) Libraries, post and telegraph offices, private associations, fairs, marriages registered under the Child Marriage Prevention Act and the Civil Marriage Act and some other miscellaneous statistics.

Generally almost all the statements represent statistics for the last 10 years i. e., 1911-20. Besides the statistics supplied by the Heads of Departments certain information was collected directly by this Office. The statements of population of the State and the number of inhabited

and uninhabited villages as per census of 1921 were also added to these statistics.

The question of enquiry about the size and sex constitution of the family and the sex of the first born also was under consideration for some time. The question of comparative fertility is one of considerable interest and importance in connection with the study of population and the questionnaires of most modern censuses now contain columns for the record of the duration of married life and the number of children born. But the idea of making this enquiry on the present occasion had to be dropped as it appeared to be impracticable and was thought would lead to produce false notions amongst certain classes of the people. However, it was notified for general information in the article on the forthcoming census referred to above that if any earnest social workers came forward, the Census Department would be very glad to help and guide them. It was also suggested that inquiry on the above mentioned subject even though taken up on a limited scale, e. g. (100 families of each main caste) might be of considerable interest. The heads of inquiries were:—

- (a) The age of the parents.
- (b) The duration of marriage.
- (c) The total number of children born alive.
- (d) The total number of children still-born or abortions.
- (e) The total number of children still alive.

It is difficult to say why nobody came forward for this work from a big town like Indore. But the little town of Kannod, the head quarters of the District of Nimawar offered three volunteers.

1. Mr. R. B. Pandit, Public Prosecutor, Kannod.
2. Pandit Shivsevak Tiwari, Sayar Inspector, Kannod.
3. Maulvi Mustafa Hussain, Warehouse Inspector, Kannod.

When they offered their honorary services to collect statistics on the above lines for about 100 families each of (1) Deccani Brahmins including Prabhus, (2) Banias and (3) Mohammedans, necessary instructions were given to them and the manuscript forms were also sent to them. All of them made endeavours to collect the statistics and furnished the returns to this office with whatever information they could collect on the subject.

On examining the registers received, I found that in the first place the number of families entered was so small that it was hardly possible for a casual observer to draw any inferences therefrom. Secondly, the mother's age which was quite essential for having an idea of the productive power of the different communities and the causes that lead to it was not recorded, although a column was reserved for it. In the absence of such an important entry no inferences could be drawn from the number of children—male and female—born to each mother in each family among the different communities. Similarly the mortality of children was also affected by the varying ages of the parents and hence the ages of both the mother and the father were necessary to be recorded.

In view of all these facts no practical use could be made of the inquiry so labouriously made by the volunteers. However, I cannot but express my thanks to the gentlemen who volunteered to collect the information, for their attempts.

Mode of Abstraction & Tabulation of Statistics.

On the occasion of the decennial census of 1921 of the Indore State, the work was divided into two sections, viz. (1) Proper Census on the lines adopted by the Government of India and (2) Special and General statistics collected by the Census Department of the Indore State. So far as the Abstraction and Tabulation work of the proper Census is concerned, the papers were transferred with the necessary staff to the Central Census Office in the Residency where it is being done under the direct guidance of the Superintendent of the Census Operations for Central India though I was required to exercise the necessary supervision as well. But the important work of Abstraction and Tabulation of the special statistics was done in this office. As soon as the proper census (final enumeration) was over and the provisional totals were published, the schedules of special industrial and economic statistics were collected together in this office. The special schedules containing the various particulars recorded by the enumerators for each family can be regarded as "Raw material of the Industrial and Economic Survey", and the final tables as "Manufactured products". All the forms of the Industrial schedules Nos. I, II, III and IV were received in this office from the Charge Superintendents by the end of April 1921. So also the General statistics were received from the Heads of Departments concerned by the 30th May 1921. On receipt of these statistics in this office, they were carefully checked and the mistakes were rectified; and the total of each block given where this was not done by the Census Agency.

As it was the first attempt to collect such copious statistics through the Census Department of the Indore State it was deemed advisable and convenient on this occasion to obtain the figures for the final tables from the raw materials by means of what is known as the "Tick" system in the case of Industrial and Economic Schedule IV which was rather of a complicated nature. A separate abstraction sheet divided by lines into spaces corresponding to the headings of the tables concerned was prepared for each census charge. Each sheet was used for the forms of each Charge-Superintendent and a tick was made in the appropriate column corresponding to each entry therein. When all the forms of a circle had been abstracted, the ticks were counted and the figures thus obtained were added up for the town. This rudimentary method for sorting the information was deliberately adopted on this occasion, as it was less costly and more convenient than the slip-copying system. The figures of income, landed property, cattle, and conveyances, collected in Schedule I, were added up by Census blocks, circles and charges and posted in the manuscript registers opened for the purpose, district by district. Again the totals were added up by districts and by towns separately for each of the main heading. The figures for the Indore City were separately obtained from those of the Indore district in each case. Similarly, the statistics of prices were first checked and in order to have uniformity in the nature of rates supplied by the Charge Superintendents, a ready reckoner of prices was prepared in this office and the statistics were

divided into three parts namely, (1) Agricultural commodities, (2) Industrial commodities, and (3) Cattle. So also the statistics of wages were divided into (1) male (2) female and (3) child, for facility of abstracting the information.

The general statistics on being received in this office were checked and divided into various final statements according to their nature and exigency.

As already stated above the Government of His Highness were pleased to provide in the budget of the Census Department for 1920-21 for five statistical clerks with a view to obtaining better results of the important statistics undertaken by the Department. But since some of the proper staff was transferred to the Central Census Office in the Residency and the Head Clerk of my office had to be reverted to his substantive post in the Secretariate, I had to propose, that some extra temporary staff with a competent man of experience in the line to supervise the work of sorting and posting these statistics and the preparation of the final tables, should be sanctioned for three months with effect from 1st May 1921 in order to enable me to finish entire work of these statistics by the end of September 1921. The Government of His Highness were accordingly pleased to accord sanction to the grant of a special allowance at Rs. 20, p. m. to Mr. Sobhagsingh Mehta, Head clerk, Chief Minister's Office, (Excise, Commerce and Industry Branch) whom the Government of His Highness were pleased to depute to the Census Department as my Head Clerk till the end of March 1921, and who rendered valuable services in the Department, for doing extra work of supervising special statistics &c, in the Census office in addition to his own duties in the Excise Secretariate for six months with effect from 1st April 1921 and to the appointment of extra clerks not exceeding 10 in number at Rs. 20 P. M. for three months only with effect from 1st May 1921. My thanks are therefore due to the Government for sanctioning my proposals in this respect in as much as in the absence of this staff, I would not have been able to finish my work during the current financial year. The work of abstraction, tabulation and compilation of all these statistics was finished in the first week of July 1921 and the final tables were drawn up in a month's time. All these tables were ready by the 15th August 1921.

I have done my utmost to collect all these statistics with a strict economy in expenditure. The total expenditure incurred on all accounts for the purpose of collecting these special statistics amounts to Rs. 4000 in round figure, evidently an insignificant amount considering the volume of the work turned out. The whole time occupied in collecting these statistics, from start to finish is nearly 13 months during which time the work of proper census was also promptly attended to.

It was thought advisable to make the report narrative as far as possible, leaving it open to the readers to draw independent conclusions from the statistical materials presented in the report. And short explanatory notes have been added to each statement describing the process by which the statistics have been arrived at so that the reader may be able to attach due weight to the correctness of the figures before drawing his own conclusions therefrom. However, broad general conclusions have been drawn where they have been deemed most necessary.

General Observations.

It will be evident from what has been said above that the Census Department has made strenuous efforts to collect numerous important statistics within a short period of time and with an insignificant cost to the Government. I have tried to make this statistical report as interesting and useful as I could. If it is not found more interesting, it is because of the nature of the subject-matter of the report, namely, statistics, which is a very dry subject to the ordinary man. I must confess that the report would have been more complete had the statistics regarding Judicial Courts, Police, Prisons, Forests, Crimes &c., and Municipalities, been collected. But the time at my disposal did not permit me to encompass them within the scope of my enquiries. But such and similar other defects are inevitable in any pioneer attempt at a difficult task and I trust that they will be removed in the subsequent effort which, I hope, will be made before long to organise the statistics of the State. As far as the report goes, I would crave the indulgence of His Highness' Government and my readers for whatever short coming that may be found therein.

Acknowledgments.

Nothing now remains but the most pleasant duty of expressing my feelings of indebtedness to all the Heads of Departments and the Census Charge Superintendents who cordially co-operated with me and supplied me with the information with as much care and promptitude as possible. Although, it would be invidious to make any distinctions, yet among Heads of Departments, I must make special mention of Mr. K. B. Tiloo, Director of Land Records, Mr. S. L. Tambe, B. A., Registrar of Co-operative Societies, and Mr. V. Y. Sheode, B. S. (Ihl. U. S. A.), Chemical Engineer, who, besides rendering to me the necessary help in common with the other Heads of the Departments, were kind enough to extend additional help to me. Mr. Tiloo rendered valuable help to me in placing freely at my disposal the necessary statistical records of his office. Mr. Tambe so kindly drew up notes for me on the Control of Food stuffs and Co-operative Societies and Mr. Sheode drew up a note on the temperature and mean pressure &c. My special thanks are due to the Subhas and Amins and other Local Revenue officers on whom depended solely the difficult and the responsible task of furnishing the necessary information in the mofussils.

Among the office staff, all worked well. The Assistant Census Officer, Mr. W. T. Kapse, greatly assisted me in all my work and rendered me valuable services in drafting the various forms of industrial and economic and general statistics and also the instructions for filling up the forms. Mr. Sobhagsingh, my Head clerk was very energetic in his work and I cannot sufficiently express the amount of energy and zeal and ability that he put in all the work entrusted to his care. He performed his arduous duties with an amount of application and assiduity that is hardly to be found in the clerical staff. His rare capacity for work, his utter devotion to his duties and his cheerful willingness to undertake any work intended to be entrusted to him, impressed me most and I trust that these rare qualities will, as hitherto, serve as a great asset to him in whatever capacity he may be placed to work hereafter.

Messrs. D. H. Pandit, Champalal Lad, and Chinnaji Govind Tembeker, clerks of this office, deserve special mention. The first was deputed to this department by the Land Records office and is a very useful statistical clerk. He was of capital help to me in compiling the

various agricultural statistics. Mr. Champalal displayed considerable energy and capacity in sorting and compiling some of the industrial and economic statistics and Mr. Tembeker was useful in preparing a ready reckoner of prices and other statistical and correspondence work.

My grateful thanks are due to the present Chief Minister, Mashir-ud-dowalah, M. Govind Rao, B. A., LL. B. who evinced great interest in the work of the department and but for the prompt attention that he very kindly gave to the references and reports made to him, it would have been impossible to achieve even a portion of what has been achieved. I am also indebted to the late Chief Minister, P. Baburao, Esquire, B. A., LL. B. for his kind support and encouragement in the work of special statistics.

My grateful thanks are also due to Dewan-i-Khas Bahadar Sardar M. V. Kibe, Rao Bahadur, M. A., M. R. A. S., F. R. S. A., Excise Minister, Indore, for the help and encouragement that he gave me from time to time and for making certain useful suggestions inspite of his ill health and absence from the head quarters on leave.

In the end I must express my hearty thanks to Lt. Colonel C. E. Luard, M. A., I. A., A. C. Lothian, Esquire, M. A., I. C. S Major E. J. D. Colvin, I. A., and Major H. V. Biscoe, I. A., who, in their capacity as Superintendents of the Census Operations in Central India, kindly rendered valuable help from time to time and gave me the encouragement in the accomplishment of my difficult task.

STATEMENT No. I.

Weather 1913 to 1920.

Below are given the available barometer, humidity, temperature and rainfall data recorded in Indore, tabulated under months and years from statements supplied by the State Surgeon. These will serve the purpose of giving an idea of the average conditions in the State as a whole. Had the daily readings in different parganas of the State been available it would have served as a basis for a relative study of weather conditions prevailing in different parganas which might be very useful in controlling agricultural production which forms so large a factor in the economic progress of the State.

Temperature, pressure, wind, humidity, rain, composition and layout of a locality are all interdependent, but considering that the soil conditions are more or less settled it is the climatic conditions that to a great extent affect the vegetable kingdom and hence the production of articles that depend upon vegetation.

Looking to the table of agricultural commodities produced in the State it will be seen that these are (a) wheat etc., (b) Maize etc., (c) Rice etc., and (d) others, each of which requires a certain type of weather conditions from the time of sowing and germination of the seed to the development of the plant, filling up of the grains and harvesting. Thus wheat and other winter annuals require a cool prolonged moist climate for their proper germination and growth. Differences in the weather arrest the branching process which determines the ultimate yield; later on warmer weather to dry and hot conditions produce the best quality of grain at harvest time. Occasional rains and clear weather alternately give an ideal yield. Rice is different to the other crops as it requires transplanting and heavy flooding during the period of growth and dry sunshine towards harvesting. Sugarcane in the same way requires warm moist weather for growth and only dry at harvesting.

Besides weather, soil, drainage etc., play an important part in agriculture but since they can be regulated more or less at man's will it is the climatic conditions that control both the quantity and the quality of a crop to a greater extent.

The same grain differs in its growth in different parts of the State even, owing to local variations in the soil etc., and the aptitude of the local cultivating class.

From the weather statement below it can be seen what kind of weather prevailed in an average year during the Census period under report. If the same data could be obtained for the previous Census Periods they would serve as a guide in considering the suitability of a particular seed for a crop in a given locality.

It is therefore suggested that a more detailed study of the variety of seeds in relation to local conditions of soil and climate would be advantageous.

We have now a Department of Agriculture which will be able to see to these problems and advise the agricultural public of the State.

STATEMENT No. II.

Statement of Rain-fall in the Indore State from 1911 to 1920.

This Statement will show an average Rain-fall during the last ten years, i. e. from 1911 to 1920 in the Indore State by Parganas and Districts. The highest Rain-fall will be seen in the year 1917, when it was 46.34 inches (on an average) in the State. It was equally so in 1916. The minimum and maximum rain-fall during the decade is given below by districts:—

STATEMENT No. III.

Statement showing the Principal Crops in the Indore State from the year 1911 to 1920.

This Statement represents the important crops of the Indore State with the area under cultivation and out-turn for the last ten years (from 1911 to 1920) by Districts. The area includes the areas sown in the Khalsa villages together with the area of the Inam lands that exist in the Khalsa villages. It does not include the area in the Jagir, Istamurar and Forest villages.

The main crops are wheat, cotton, opium, juwar, gram, maize, bajara, tuwar, tilli, other oil seeds and tobacco. The out-turn of all the crops has been shown in Bengal maunds except wheat, cotton and opium for which it has been shown in tons, bales and tons respectively. The comparative figures of cropped acreage and out-turn of each crop for the years 1911 and 1920 are given below:—

From the above figures it will be seen that a major portion of culturable land is occupied by wheat, cotton and juwar which are the chief products of the Indore State. The highest out-turn of wheat is 103620 tons in the year 1913 and the lowest is 38470 tons in 1919. That of cotton is 400410 bales in 1920 and the lowest 139077 bales in 1918. The maximum out-turn of Juwar is 4932413 maunds in 1916 and the minimum is 1407399 in 1918.

This information was obtained from the Director of Land Records in the form prescribed by the Census Department and as such it can be regarded as reliable.

The Director of Land Records could not supply the figures of out-turn of the crops except wheat, cotton and opium, but the annawari estimates of yield in each year and the out-turn of crops per acre in normal year were supplied by him and the out-turn of other crops was calculated in the Census Office on the basis of the figures of annawari.

STATEMENT No. IV.

Statement showing the details of Areas (in acres) included in holdings and un-occupied from 1911 to 1920.

Area shown in this Statement is only for the Khalsa villages and includes the area of the Inami lands granted in them. It does not include the area of the Jagir, Guaranteed and Mixed holdings in the State and the Forest villages. But the area excluded from the Khalsa villages and included in the Forest is included in the 8th. column of the Statement.

Columns 1 to 6 relate to the area occupied by the cultivators on assessment payable to the State.

Column No. 1 shows the area under crops. It includes the area under Mangoe groves and other fruit trees.

Column No. 2 shows the area which is Parit since three years. It bears the assessment at full cultivation rates.

Column No. 3 shows the land which is Parit for more than 3 years. It also bears the full assessment.

Column No. 4 shows the area which is Parit either Bir, Charnoi or Parit-kadim and assessed at some concession rates at the time of the Settlement.

Column No. 5 shows the area which is Kharab or unculturable or under wells or small streams included in the occupied area. It bears no assessment.

Column No. 6 is the total of Column No. 1 to 5.

Columns Nos. 7 to 14 show the details of un-occupied area. Land shown in these Columns is Sarkari waste.

Column No. 7 shows the area under State Mangoe groves and fruit trees. These are auctioned every year by the Revenue Department and the revenue is credited to the State as shiwai Bab

Column No. 8 this column shows the area under forest. This area was surveyed in the Revenue Khalsa villages at the time of the settlement. Since the year 1912 it is being administered by the Forest Department on account of the demarcation of the forest boundaries.

Column No. 9 this shows the area that is culturable State waste. It includes Birs, Charnoi lands etc. The Birs are auctioned every year and the amount so realised is credited as Siwai-bab.

Column No. 10 and 11 are clear by themselves.

Column No. 12, this column shows the area which is unculturable or under hills etc.

Column No. 13 shows the total of columns Nos. 7 to 12.

Column No. 14 it is the total of column No. 6 and 13.

Column No. 15 shows the double cropped area. It is already included in the column No. 1 also.

The total area in 1911 was 4455655 acres against 4471020 acres in 1920. In the year 1911 the total occupied area was 2515444 against 2768630 in 1920 i. e. an increase of 263186 during the decade. Area under double crops is 73 thousand acres. A little more than five lacks ~~acres are~~ occupied by culturable fallow including Bir and Charnoi and the equal area is under Kharab hills etc. The details of each Pergana and District of the State are given in the Statement separately.

The information contained in the Statement has been obtained from the Land Records Office and compiled in the Census Office.

Statement showing the New-cultivation in the Indore State during the years 1911 to 1920.

In this statement the area (in acres) shown is that which is brought under new-cultivation from Parit land in the Khalsa villages of the State year by year. It has been assessed at cultivation rates proposed at the time of the Settlement for every village.

This statement also shows rental charged for the same by Perganas and Districts for the last ten years (1911-1920). From the figures given in the statement it will be seen that in 1913, nearly 61000 acres were brought under new-cultivation the highest figure from 1911 to 1920. Where as in 1919 only 8808 acres were brought under new-cultivation. The total area brought under new-cultivation during the last ten years comes to 357176 acres and the total additional revenue that the State receives from them year by year comes to Rs. 500671.

The information has been taken from the records of the Director of Land Records Office and compiled in the Census Office.

Statement showing the irrigated area (in acres) in the Indore State from 1911 to 1920.

This Statement shows the area in acres under irrigation in the Khalsa villages of the State for the last ten years (1911 to 1920) by Mahals and Districts of the Indore State.

Column No. 1 shows the area irrigated by wells *i. e.* by Mot.

Column No. 2 shows the area irrigated by the streams or Nallas.

Column No. 3 shows the area irrigated by streams but by digging Orhis.

From the statement it will appear that at the end of 1920 an area of 39861 acres are irrigated by wells and 4939 acres by tanks, ponds or streams, but only 2671 acres out of the latter are irrigated by flow and 2268 by lift.

A summary of the total irrigated area of the State for the last ten years has also been separately given by Perganas and Districts which will show that the total irrigated area in 1911 was 37184 acres against 44800 in 1920; of the latter Rampura-Bhanpura District alone occupied 20231 acres. The area of 48680 acres was the highest area irrigated from all sources of irrigation. This was in 1918.

The information contained in this statement was obtained from the records of the Land Records Office and compiled in the Census Office.

STATEMENT No. VII

Statement showing the number of Wells and Tanks in the Indore State from the year 1911 to 1920.

This Statement represents the number of Wells and Tanks in the Khalsa villages of the Indore State by Perganas and Districts for the years 1911 to 1920. The total number of wells in the State in 1911 was 19965 against 21344 in 1920 and that of Tanks in 1911 was 616 against 538 in 1920. From the figures given it appears that the number of Wells has been increased in each District except Indore at the end of 1920 as compared to 1911 whereas the number of Tanks decreased in each District except Indore where it has increased by 40. The largest number of wells at the end of 1920, is 2187 in the Garoth Pergana and the lowest is 78 in the Sundarsi Pergana leaving out of account the Divisional Forest, Kannode, where only one well is shown to exist. Similarly the maximum number of tanks is 118 in the Indore Pergana and the minimum is 1 in the Bhikangaon Pergana.

The information was first collected through the Mahal Officers, but it being incomplete, the same had to be obtained from the Land Records Office and was compiled in the Census Office.

STATEMENT No. VIII.

Statement showing the number of Ploughs in the Indore State from 1911 to 1920.

This Statement contains the number of Ploughs in Khalsa Villages in existence in each District of the Indore State by Perganas during the years 1911 to 1920. The Ploughs belong to the cultivators who hold Khatas and pay the assessment to the State. The number of ploughs in 1911 in the whole State was 101117 whereas it was 106977 in 1920. Out of the total number of ploughs the Nimar District shows 40253 in 1920, the Mahidpur Pergana figures being the highest in Perganas.

Looking to the statistics of plough cattle which was 231286 at the end of 1920 in the whole State, the number of cattle to 100 ploughs stand at 216, which compares favourably with the proportion found out in the United Provinces where it comes to 220 (vide Report of the fifth Quinquennial Cattle Census of the U. P. of 1920).

The statistics have been obtained from the Land Record Office and compiled in the Census Office.

This statement represents the number of Plough Cattle and Other-Cattle of the Khalsa villages in each Mahal and District of the Indore State from 1911 to 1920. The plough and other cattle shown in this statement are only those belonging to tenants who hold land from and pay assessment to the State. In 1911 the total number of plough cattle in the State was 217594 against 231286 in the year 1920 and that of Other Cattle was 718919 against 798693. This shows an increase in both by 11% and 6% respectively.

According to the statistics supplied by the Director of Land Records the total number of plough and other cattle in the State comes to 1029979 or nearly 1 cattle to 1 person according to the population of the State ascertained in the Census of 1921.

The information contained in this statement was obtained from the Land Records Office and compiled in Census Office.

This statement contains information about cattle diseases that prevailed in the Indore State by Districts and the number of cattle treated and cured in each District during the years 1915 to 1920. The Civil Veterinary Department though established long ago in the State; was re-organised in 1915 and hence the figures prior to this year are not available. In each year the number of cattle which suffered from epidemic diseases has been shown separately from that of cattle which suffered from ordinary diseases. The maximum number of cattle that suffered from all kinds of diseases is 11382 in 1915 and the minimum is 3834 in the year 1917.

The information was supplied by the Veterinary Inspector through the Director of Agriculture, Indore State.

This statement gives the figures of Land Revenue demand by districts for each year from 1911 to 1920. Prior to the present Settlement carried out in 1906-07, the land revenue demand of the whole State was Rs. 33,53,494/- . In the present Settlement the figure of Land Revenue demand has been shown at Rs. 37,00,815 (vide final Report on the Settlement of the Indore State by H.J. Hoare, Esquire, I.C.S. In 1911 the Land Revenue Demand was Rs. 42,69,902 which went on improving considerably, year by year, till 1918, when it was Rs. 49,77,500, the highest demand witnessed during the last decade. As compared to the present Settlement assessment of 1906-7 the land revenue demand has improved by 15.38% in 1911, 34.80% in 1918 and 33.24% in 1920. The extra demand of Rs. 12,30,244 over the original assessment of Rs. 37,00,815 proposed by Mr. Hoare, is due to more land being brought under new cultivation and new irrigation.

This shows that the present Settlement has been a complete success in the State and that the lands have been assessed at such rates that the agriculturists do not feel it inconvenient to pay the same.

The information was collected from the records of the Land Records Department and incorporated in this Statement.

This statement shows the population of the Indore State as ascertained in the Census of 1921, excluding the Indore Residency and the Mhow Cantonment for which areas the figures have been shown in the remarks column. It is 1107615 (574424 males and 533191 females) against 1013542 (520352 males and 493190 females) in 1911, thus showing an increase of 94073 persons or a little over 9%. The population of the State is distributed in the five Districts excluding the Indore City as shown in the statement. The Nimar District claims the largest number or 35% of the total population of the State; the Indore District comes next with 18%. If the Indore City with its population of 93091 is included, the population of the Indore District is increased from 18% to 27 p. c. of the total population; yet the Nimar District maintains its first place. Rampura-Bhanpura District comes third with 18 p. c., Mahidpur is the fourth with 11·7 p. c. and Nemawar stands last with its smallest percentage of 7·7 p. c.

The highest percentage in Indore City is due to three main facts, viz. (1) that the City was affected with plague at the time of the final enumeration in 1911 and hence it showed the population of 44947 instead of a little less than 70000 which was ascertained by re-count on the 20th July 1911, (2) that during the last decade Indore has enormously developed in trade and commerce, and (3) that new Cotton Mills and several factories have been started since 1911.

The population of Railway areas situated in the territories of His Highness the Maharaja is included in the totals of the Districts concerned.

The number of occupied houses in the State comes to 248638 or 4 persons to one house. An occupied house represents a common-meal family and not a structure.

As compared to 1911 the Perganas of Depalpur, Sawer, Indore, Nisarpur, Segaoon, Kasrawad, Sendhwa, Khargone, Divisional Forest Khargone and Manasa have shown a noticeable increase in population in 1921, the most marked increase being in Segaoon and Sendhwa by 27 and 32·5% respectively. The most noticeable decrease of population is in the Mhow Pergana where it has fallen by 8461 or nearly 25%. The reasons for decrease or increase in the population of the various charges will be discussed in the proper Census Report.

margin whereas in the Census of 1921 there are twentythree including the Indore City as shown in the statement. The increase in the number of towns is due to the fact that according to the article 27 of the Census Procedure Code 'Town' includes (1) every Municipality (2) all Civil lines not included within Municipal limits (3) every Cantonment (4) every other continuons collection of houses, inhabited by not less than 5000 persons, and hence most of them have come under the catagory of towns on account of a Municipality existing in them while others have been included on account of the importance of the places as centres of trade and their historical associations. Thus the urban population of the State is now 194902 as against 99400 in 1911. When comparing the urban population with that of the rural tracts we find that in the State as a whole 83 persons out of 100 live in villages and 17 in towns, the average population of a town being 8474.

**Statement showing the average Income per head per year
of the subjects of the Indore state as ascertained in the
Census of 1921.**

When the Census work of 1921 was at its preliminary stage it was suggested by the Census Department of the State to the Government of His Highness that some interesting and important statistics on the following points should be collected on the occasion of the present Census. There-upon a meeting of the members of the State Council and other Officers of the State (including the Chief Minister and the Census Officer) as well as the Managers of the Mills in Indore City was called on the 2nd July 1920, to discuss the question of the collection of the said statistics and it was decided to collect information on the following points:-

- (1) Income of the head of each family.
- (2) Landed property etc., of each family.. .
- (3) Cattle statistics.
- (4) Statistics regarding Conveyances, Motors, Carriages, and Carts etc.
- (5) Rates of grains etc. and wages of labourers during the last decade.
- (6) Statistics regarding labourers and artisans.

The necessary forms were also drawn up by the Census Officer and placed before the meeting.

As a result of the deliberations it was decided that information under items 1 to 4 should be collected through the Census Agency at the time of the preliminary Census for the whole State, whereas the statistics regarding labourers and artisans be confined to towns only which were also to be collected by the Census Agency. As for the statistics of prices of grains etc. and wages of labourers it was settled that they should be collected through the local Mahal authorities.

Accordingly the different forms were introduced in Hindi and the detailed instructions were also printed and distributed among the Supervisors and Enumerators beforehand in order to enable them to, understand the forms and instructions thoroughly before commencing the collection of information.

The Statement shows the average income per head per year of the subjects of the Indore State as ascertained from the information collected at the time of the preliminary Census of the Indore State in 1921. In the City of Indore the average in-come per head per year from all sources comes to nearly Rs. 120/- whereas in the Districts it ranges between 30 and 37. The average in-come of the subjects of the State as a whole, comes to Rs. 42/- per head per annum. The average in-come per head of population of India has been worked out by the Director of

Statistics, as Rs. 36.1 by the old method of Lord Curzon and as Rs. 53.0 by the new method of the Director himself.* Thus on an average the in-come per head of population in the Indore State fairly compares with that of India.

The total annual income of population of the Indore City (93091) comes to Rs. 11106961 of which the un-earned in-come is Rs. 673409 only or 7·23 per head and the earnings worked out comes to nearly 109/- per head. The income from land is very small i. e. Rs. 3 per head only in the city.

From the above figures it appears that the economic condition of the people of the Indore State is not quite satisfactory. The average in-come per head of population from interest etc., is not more than Rs.2/- per annum. There is not much difference between the earnings and income from land in Indore and Rampura-Bhanpura Districts but in Mahidpur, Nemawar and Nimar the income from land is greater than the earnings since the major portion of the population in these parts are agriculturists.

This information was collected by the Census Department of the Indore State through the Census Agency.

This statement represents the income from all sources of the urban population of the Indore State. The urban population of the Indore State is 194902 including Indore City. The unearned income of the urban population is Rs. 1115585/- or 5.72 per head. The earnings come to 79.43 per head and the income from land to 5.82 per head. The total income of the urban population of the State from all sources is Rs. 17731533/- which works out at 90.97 per head per annum. If Indore City, the incidence of income per head of which is higher, is excluded, the average income per head of the population of towns of the Indore State comes to Rs. 65.06.

The incidence of income in urban areas is higher than the rural which is natural, in-as-much as the wealth of the State is generally accumulated in Towns owing to the development of trade and industry, whereas the rural population mainly depends upon agriculture and labour. Thus it is clear, as is generally everywhere the case, that our peasantry is poorer than the trading class. In towns the people are generally rich on account of trade, service etc., whereas the income of the Agriculturists is very low. The incidence of income of the rural and urban population of the Indore State is given below :—

This statement represents the number of horses, donkeys, mules, cows, buffaloes, bullocks, camels, sheep and others in the Indore State by Districts enumerated at the time of the preliminary Census of the Indore State (1921).

Horses and ponies are included under one head but the mares and their young stock (Colts and fillies) have been classed under separate heads. Similarly young stock of cows and she-buffaloes have been separately enumerated and bulls and bullocks have also been separately shown in column 10 and 11 of the statement. This is the first time that a regular Census of the Live-stock was taken in the Indore State.

The total number of bulls and bullocks in the State is 404857 out of which 231286 are employed for agriculture as shown in the Statement No. IX. The number of ploughs and carts employed in agriculture in the State is 106977 and 54818 respectively. Thus as compared to the total of bulls and bullocks it is worked out as two animals to one plough or one cart leaving the balance of 81267. As compared to the population of the State, the proportion of milch cattle (Cows and she-buffaloes) comes to 53 animals per 100 persons. In the Indore City it comes to 6 per 100 persons only. This lowest proportion is due to the fact that the living of Indore City is very dear and people cannot afford to maintain a milch cow or buffaloe without spending Rs. 20/-to Rs. 25/-per month including a shed for it to keep.

In the Districts the percentage of milch cattle to population comes to 40 in Indore, 63 in Mehidpur, 56 in Nemawar, 52 in Nimar and 83 in

Rampura-Bhanpura. This means that the Rampura-Bhanpura District claims first place in the number of milch cattle and next to it the Mehidpur District. There are in all 166934 she-goats in the whole State, the highest numbers being 81652 and 42368 in the Nimar and Rampura-Bhanpura Districts respectively, the percentage of which comes to 20 per 100 persons in both the Districts. Out of 36199 sheep, 20079 are found in the Rampura-Bhanpura District alone and the rest have been enumerated in all other Districts. Camels are found mostly in the Rampura-Bhanpura District. Dogs are generally kept by the villagers for the protection of their crops from thieves or animals. The largest number of these pet animals is 10066 in Nimar District.

There is no horse carriage for hire in Nemawar because of the Narbada River crossing in the way from Harda to Kannod as well as on account of the remoteness of the Railway Station. 431 Horse Carriages and 12667 bullock carts are utilised in the whole State for private use by the people. Thus it will be seen that the number of hired carriages is less than that of the private ones. There are in all 54818 bullock carts for agricultural purposes in the State out of which Nimar District alone gives 27891 or more than 50 per cent. Mahidpur and Rampura-Bhanpura Districts seem to be very poor. The hired hand-carts are 325 in Indore city; next stands the Indore District, where they are 303. The Nimar District stands third. In the number of private hand-carts Nimar claims first place and Rampura Bhanpura usurps the second.

In other words only 5% of the total number of conveyances exists in towns excluding the Indore City. The highest number of conveyances of all kinds is 722 in Khargone and the lowest in Bhanpura having 74 only, among all the towns in the State leaving aside the City of Indore.

**Statement showing the number of artisans in Towns of
Indore State by sex and caste as ascertained at the
time of the Preliminary Census of 1921.**

As already mentioned elsewhere the statistics of labourers and artisans were collected for towns only of the Indore State by the Census Supervisors and Enumerators at the time of the preliminary enumeration. The information was collected for each town in a special form drawn up for the purpose. The information thus collected has been sorted in the Census Office and classified as under:—

- (1) Number of Artisans by sex and caste.
- (2) Number of Artisans by age and employment.
- (3) Number of Artisans showing income, hours of working, place of training etc. etc.
- (4) Number of Artisans according to birth-place.
- (5) Number of Artisans showing hereditary occupation.
- (6) Number of Artisans showing present occupation, and six separate statements No. 32 to 37 have been compiled.

Statement No. 32 represents the number of artisans in all the towns of the Indore State including the City of Indore by sex and caste. Columns 3-5 show their number by sex, while 6-45 show them by caste. There are in all 5592 artisans out of which 2844 are in the Indore City i. e. more than half the number is found in the City and the rest are distributed over 22 towns. Out of the total number of 5592 artisans 5198 are males and 394 only are females. This shows that females are not generally given to arts and crafts. In Indore City, out of 2844 only 124 females are censused as artisans. Thus it will be seen that in 100 male artisans the number of females is only 4 in the Indore City. Amongst the towns the highest number of female artisans is in Maheshwar. Out of 521 artisans 418 are males while 103 are females i. e. a little over 19 p. c. Similarly Bhanpura indicates the percentage of female artisans by 20 p. c. of the male artisans. In other towns the percentage is very low. The high percentage of female workers in Maheshwar is due to the fact that there are several weavers in the town who employ the females also on the work of weaving.

As mentioned above, columns 6 to 45 show the castes to which the artisan class particularly belongs. From the statement it will appear that the greatest number of artisans is from the Musalmans; next to them come Sutars (Carpenters) and Sunars (Gold-smiths). Out of the total population of the Indore City, viz. 93091, only 2844 are artisans, i. e. 3 p. c. of the total population of the City. In towns the percentage comes to 2 only. Out of 5592 artisans, Musalmans are 17 p. c., Sutar 13 p. c., Sunar 13 p. c., Chamar 6 p. c., Darji (Tailor) 4 p. c., Lohar 3 p. c., and 24 p. c. are found in other castes in column 45 the particulars of which are given at the foot of the statement.

This statement represents the actual number of artisans only and not their dependents.

This statement shows the number of artisans according to age and employment. In column 3 the number of boy artisans is entered, who are below 14 years of age, while in column 11 those artisans who are over 50 are shown. Columns 13-15 show the number of artisans employed in Industrial Concerns, in private firms and those leading independent life respectively. The number of artisans have been divided into the following nine age periods:—

(1) Under 14 years. (2) 15-20. years. (3) 21-25 years. (4) 26-30 years. (5) 31-35 years. (6) 36-40 years. (7) 41-45 years. (8) 46-50 years (9) Over 50 years.

From the statement it will be seen that the number of artisans is generally greater at the age of 26-30 in almost all the towns. Out of 5592 artisans only 100 boy-artisans under 14 years have been returned *i. e.* nearly 18 in one thousand.

In Indore City 1799 out of 2844 do independent business, 683 are employed in private firms and 362 only in Industrial concerns *i. e.* independent workers are 63%. In towns (Excluding City) the percentage comes as under:—

This statement gives the number of artisans according to their place and year of training, monthly income, hours of working, and condition of health. Columns 3-5 show the number of artisans trained in Indore State and the number of those trained in Foreign Territory. Columns 6-12 show the marginally noted six year periods in which they were trained. Columns 13-15 show the monthly maximum, minimum and average income of an artisan in each town. Columns 16-18 give the maximum, minimum and average hours of daily working. Columns 19-22 relate to the condition of health.

Out of 5592 artisans 3870 are local-trained and 1722 are foreign trained, the ratio being 69 to 31. From column 11 of the statement it will be seen that a majority of artisans have not returned the year in which they were trained. Out of those who have returned their year of training 942 were trained upto 1900, 378 in 1901-05, 447 in 1906-10, 360 in 1911-15 and 403 in 1916-20.

In Indore City the minimum income of an artisan comes to Rs. 25-4-0 per month and the maximum Rs. 52-8-0 a month, the average being 38-4-0 per month. Leaving aside the Indore City the monthly income of an artisan in towns of the Indore State works out as under:—

Maximum.....	Rs. 30-0-0
Minimum.....	Rs. 22-0-0
Average	Rs. 22-12-0

The maximum income of the artisan in Towns excepting Indore City is Rs. 50 a month in Barwaha and the minimum is Rs. 8½ in Alampur.

Hours of working, taking all the towns together including Indore City, range between 7½ and 9½. In Indore City the maximum, minimum and average hours of working are 9½, 8 and 3½ respectively, whereas in towns, the maximum hours are 9½ and the minimum are 7½, the average being 8½. In Rampura Town the maximum hours of working are 16½, the minimum and average being 14½ and 16½ respectively which is due to the fact that the independent workmen sometimes remain busy the whole day from morning till 10 O'clock in the night. Sutars and Sunars generally do so in towns. From this it appears that the hours of working are not excessive except in Kampura.

As regards the general health of the artisans, it may be noted that out of the total number of artisans, 3433 have returned themselves as excellent, 2028 as moderate and only 126 as fair. It may with advantage be made clear here that the Enumerators were instructed to question the artisan or labourer himself (as the case may be) as to which of the three conditions of health he thought he belonged and the reply that the man gave was entered in the Schedule. The Enumerators were, however, instructed to judge by personal observations whether the reply given was correct. The enquiry on this point is of a layman and must be taken for what it is worth.

This statement shows the number of artisans according to their birth-place. In column 3 the number of those artisans who are born in Indore State has been shown and in columns 4 to 44 those who are born in any of the other Native States or British Provinces mentioned therein.

Out of the total number of artisans in all the towns of Indore State 3393 are born in Indore State and 2199 in Foreign Territory i. e. out of 100, 60 are born in Indore State and 40 in Foreign territories. Out of 2199 artisans born out-side Indore State, 387 are born in Gwalior State, 241 in Jaipur State, 228 in United Provinces, 156 in Central Provinces, 145 in Jodhpur State, and 131 in Bombay Presidency, whereas others are born in different parts of India. 157 have been returned as those who do not know their birth-places.

**Statement of artisans in towns of Indore State showing
their hereditary occupations as ascertained at the time
of the preliminary Census of 1921.**

This statement represents the number of artisans by their hereditary occupations. Columns 3 to 53 show the various hereditary occupations returned by them which have been classified under 50 heads. Column 52 shows those artisans who follow miscellaneous occupations. They are 44 in number or 8% only. Column 54 shows the number of those who still stick to their hereditary occupations and column 55 shows those who have given up their hereditary occupations and have taken to other occupations. Column 56 gives the reasons for leaving the hereditary occupation in general. This column was kept in the original form introduced for collecting the information in order to know the difficulties of artisans that compelled them to leave their hereditary occupations. But the causes returned by them are of a very general character and no real tangible information seems to have been obtained. The general reasons have, however, been detailed in column 56.

Out of 5592 artisans, 961 or 17% follow weaving, 849 or 15% carpentry, 788 or 14% gold and silver smithy and 553 or 10% are masons or sculptors. Others follow different sorts of occupations as detailed in the statement. This shows that weaving leads ahead of any other pursuit, carpentry coming next with 15%. In the City of Indore carpentry takes the leading place with 20%.

4998 out of 5592 or 89% follow the same occupation at present as was their hereditary one and followed by their ancestors and only 594 or 11% have left their hereditary occupation for the sake of taking up other kind of work.

This means that 90 out of 100 artisans follow the above occupations and only 10% follow other miscellaneous occupations as detailed in the table. In the City of Indore Carpenters and Gold and Silver-smiths take the lead. Next come the sculptors (Patharwats) who are 265 in number.

The main difficulties in the way of artisans seem to be:—

- (1) want of proper training and consequent insufficient profits which makes them lead hard lives.
 - (2) want of capital and consequent deterioration of their work.

Those artisans who have not got proper training in their art and are not experts in their line, feel some difficulty in getting their livelihood according to their requirements. Other trained hands also feel difficulty in developing their arts for want of capital.

STATEMENT No. XXXVIII.

**Statement showing the number of labourers in the towns
of Indore State by sex and caste as ascertained at the
time of the preliminary Census of 1921.**

This statement gives the number of labourers in the Indore City and the towns of the Indore State by sex and caste. The total number of labourers in all the towns of the State including the City is 12111, (8135 males and 3976 females). Out of this number, Indore City has 6709, (5089 males and 1620 females) labourers, *i. e.* more than half the number is found in the City. It may be noted here that agricultural labour is not included in this statement, and that the number represents the actual workmen and not their dependents. The total number of labourers, viz 12111, has been divided into 40 castes. Most common castes have been shown separately in the statement, while the rest who are 2980 are shown in column 45 under "Others." Others include 32 castes enumerated in the foot note of the statement. In all the towns including the Indore City the Musalmans take the first place. They are 2314 or 19%. Next come Chamar labourers who are 1045 in number. Out of 2314 Musalman labourers and 1045 Chamar labourers, 1542 Musalmans and 833 Chamars are found in the City, *i. e.* nearly $\frac{3}{4}$ of the number of these castes is employed in Indore. This is due to the development of Textile industries in Indore City. These Musalman and Chamar labourers are mostly employed in Cotton Mills and Factories. Out of the total population of Indore City, (93091) there are 6709 persons (actual workmen) who belong to labour class. If their dependents are added to them their number represents $6709 \times 4 = 26836$ or more than one-fourth of the total population of the City belong to the labour class. For towns excluding City the percentage of labour comes to more than 20. Mostly the following castes are of labour class:—

"Ahir, Koli, Kumhar, Kulami, Gujar, Chamar, Teli, Dhangar, Balai, Brahman, Musalman, Maratha and Rajput".

In column 3 the number of labourers who are born in Indore State, has been given and the labourers born outside Indore State have been classified under 39 heads of different Native States and British Provinces. Out of 12,111 labourers, 5306 are local born and 6805 are born in Foreign Territories that is to say, labourers born outside Indore State are greater in number than the local born labourers. Among labourers born outside, Jaipur State takes the first place returning 1566 labourers. United Provinces come second in this respect and the third is the Bombay Presidency. 657 labourers are shown in column 42 under "not known" or in other words 657 labourers could not return their birth places. The foreign born labour is mostly due to the development of Industries in the Indore State generally and Indore City particularly.

**Statement of labourers showing their employment, wages,
hours of working, condition of health and nature of labour
for the towns of the Indore State as ascertained
at the time of the preliminary Census of 1921.**

This statement gives the number of labourers according to their employment, nature of labour and condition of health showing also the hours of working and the daily wages they earn. Columns 3 and 4 indicate labourers employed in Industrial concerns and doing private and miscellaneous labour respectively. Columns 6-8 show the maximum, minimum and average daily wages of a labourer respectively in annas in each town. Columns 9-11 show the maximum, minimum and average working hours of a labourer in each town. Columns 12-14 indicate the condition of their health, viz. (1) excellent, (2) moderate and (3) fair. Columns 15-17 show the nature of the labour, i. e. whether the labourer is skilled or un-skilled.

Out of the total number of 12111 labourers, 4648 are employed in Industrial Concerns and 7463 labour independently. In Indore City the maximum daily wages of a labourer are 0-14-6, minimum 0-6-0 and average 0-10-3. Taking all the towns together including City they come to 0-6-6, 0-3-6 and 0-4-9 respectively. But leaving aside the Indore City where labour is generally high, the maximum, minimum and average wages work out at 0-6-0, 0-3-3 and 0-4-3 per day. The maximum, minimum and average daily hours of working are respectively 10, 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ and 9 $\frac{1}{4}$ in the City of Indore. Whereas in the towns excluding City they come to 8 $\frac{1}{2}$, 7 and 8 hours respectively. Out of 12111 labourers, 6856 show excellent health, 4755 moderate health and 500 fair health. The remarks as regards the condition of health ascertained are the same as are made elsewhere when writing about artisans. Similarly out of the total number of labourers only 1861 are skilled and 10259 are un-skilled. Out of the skilled labour, 1819 are in the Indore City and the rest only 42 are in the towns.

STATEMENT NO. XLII.

Statement showing the daily wages of labourers in the last ten years from 1911 to 1920.

This statement represents the daily wages in annas, of labourers in the Indore State by Parganas and Districts for the last ten years (1911 to 1920), according to the nature of the labour (skilled or unskilled). The statement gives the wages of male, female and child separately for all these years in each Pargana.

It may be noted here that there is now a days a pressing need for full and accurate information about the wages paid at the present time and how these wages compare with those paid in previous years. Consequently the comparative statistics about wages were also collected through the local Mahal authorities on the occasion of the present Census as has already been mentioned elsewhere in the Report.

Let us now first take the wages of males. As an average throughout the State as a whole the wages of a skilled labourer were 0-9-6 and un-skilled 0-3-9 in 1911 whereas in 1920 they have risen to 1-2-6 and 0-8-0 respectively. In Indore City these wages were 0-12-9 and 0-5-9 in 1911 as against 1-0-9 and 0-10-3 in 1920.

The following table gives by Districts the comparative wages that were paid during 1911 and 1920:—

From this it will be seen that the wages have not risen as high as prices of commodities. There has been a marked difference in wages of males during the last decade.

As regards wages of females it may be noted that in 1911 they were 0-4-0 and 0-2-3 for skilled and un-skilled labour respectively, while in 1920 they were 0-6-6 and 0-5-0 and for children the wages have risen from 0-3-9 for skilled and 0-1-6 for unskilled in 1911 to 0-8-3 and 0-3-9 respectively.

Statement showing the prices of Agricultural Commodities in the Indore State from 1911 to 1920.

This statement shows the prices of Agricultural Commodities that prevailed in each Pergana of the Indore State during the last ten years (1911-1920). The comparative prices for ten years of the following commodities are collected through the Local Revenue Authorities and the Customs Department :—

1. Wheat, 2. Juwar, 3. Bajra, 4. Maize, 5. Gram, 6. Tuwar,
7. Barley, 8. Mung, 9. Urad, 10. Masur, 11. Chawala, 12. Rice, (High Class) 13. Rice, (Ordinary), 14. Chillies (red), 15. Tilli, 16. Alsi, 17. Rameli, 18. Sarsu, 19. Tobacco.

In this statement the weight of each commodity has been given in Seers and Chhataks per rupee in order to compare the prices.

In 1911 the rates of wheat ranged between 8 and $14\frac{1}{2}$ seers per rupee throughout the State as a whole, whereas in 1920 the maximum rate was 9 seers per rupee and the minimum rate was 4 seers per rupee. But generally in all the Perganas the rates range between 6 seers to 7 seers a rupee. So is the case with all other commodities. These latter prices remained stationary during the years 1917-1920 owing to the stoppage of the export of food-stuffs from the Holkar State. A note on the control of the food-stuffs so kindly drawn up by Mr. S. L. Tambe, B. A., the Controller of Supplies, for this Department will show in detail how the control of food-stuffs was necessitated and how it worked. (vide Appendix A).

These are the average prices taking the State as a whole. Individually there are several perganas in which prices have risen much more than the above; for instance Alampur, Sundarsi, Maheshwar, Bhikangaon, Kannode and others.

The question of high prices has of late been engaging the attention of almost all the countries. The causes of high prices are not peculiar to Indore or India but to the whole world. At present almost all the countries are suffering from the bane of high prices. However it would be interesting to read that Mr. R. Beohar, M. A., L.L. B., F. R. E. S. (London) gives the following causes (Vide Modern Review for June 1921, page 702) which are peculiar to India:—

- (a) Fiscal policy of the Indian Government. Free trade has been the ruin of many infant Indian Industries, and consequent rise of prices of many commodities is also due to free trade.
 - (b) Export of food stuffs by the Indian Government to countries beyond the Sea and to Mesopotamia. The mandate of this country given to us has only added to our economic costs. Our cereals which are insufficient for our home consumption even in normal years are exported even in bad years.
 - (c) Shortage of waggons for internal trade. An instance may be cited:—Sugar was selling at Rs. 25 a maund in Calcutta while at Allahabad it sold at Rs. 38 a maund. Freight charges are very high for internal trade. An Indian witness while giving evidence before the Industrial Commission gave out that freight charges for such a small distance i. e. for Madras to Calcutta are much greater than for the distance between Japan and Calcutta.
 - (d) Diminished imports are also one of the causes of high prices in this country. We consume many foreign commodities, consequently diminution in their imports, means higher price.
 - (e) Unfavourable exchange has further added to the rise in prices of commodities imported from abroad.

The prices of cotton (un-ginned) have been shown in rupees per Mani (6 Bengal Maunds) and of hides large and small per piece in rupees.

In 1911 the Ghee sold at more than one seer per rupee in Indore, Mahidpur and Rampura Bhanpura Districts and at one seer per rupee in Nimawar and Nimar Districts, whereas it sold at half a seer per rupee in almost all the Districts in 1920 that is to say that the price of Ghee has doubled. In 1911 the prices of Mauritius Sugar ranged between 8 and 16 rupees per maund in the State as against 26 to 60 rupees per Maund in 1920 or in other words the prices rose up high by three times or in some cases even four times. So is the case with Benares Sugar. The prices rose from Rs. 10/8/- per Md. in 1911 to Rs. 45. per Maund in 1920 except in the case of Rampura and Nisarpur where the prices went up to Rs. 48. and Rs. 80. per maund respectively. The prices of Gur

ranged between Rs. 4. and Rs. 10-8-0 per maund in 1911 except Segaoon where it sold at Rs. 20 per maund. But in 1920 the prices rose to the maximum of Rs. 27. per maund. There has been no marked fall or rise in the prices of Salt. The prices of sweet-oil were ranging between $4\frac{1}{2}$ seers and $1\frac{3}{4}$ seers per rupee in 1911 whereas they ranged between $1\frac{1}{2}$ seers to one seer per rupee, on an average in the State as a whole in 1920. The prices of Kerosine oil and fuel have almost doubled in 1920 as compared to 1911. So is the case with Char-Coal. Brass and Copper Utensils could be easily had in 1911 at the maximum price of Rs. 1-4-0 per seer but in 1920 the prices ranged between Rs. 2. and Rs. 3-8-0 per seer and in some Parganas even Rs. 4. per seer. The prices of Iron & Iron Utensils went up to Rs. 35 per maund in 1920 from Rs. 7. per maund in 1911 on an average. Silver has not shown an abnormal rise in its prices. Its rate in 1911 was Rs. 0-10-0 to Re. 1. per Tola as against Rs. 0-13-0 to Re. 1-4-0 per Tola in 1920. So is the case with Gold. Cotton seed sold at Re. 1-13-9 per maund to Rs. 2-11-0 in 1911 as against Rs. 2-15-0 to Rs. 4. per maund in 1920. There have been great ups and downs in the prices of cotton (unginned) during the years 1917-1920.

The following table will give the average prices of unginned Cotton prevailing in these years by Districts as compared to 1911:—

From this it will be seen that the prices of cotton were almost trebled in 1918 as compared to 1911.

So also the prices of ginned cotton rose up to Rs. 80. per maund in 1918 from Rs. 20. per maund in 1911. The prices in 1920 were normal. In 1911 a piece of large and small hide could be had at Rs. 4-12-0 and Re. 1-7-0 respectively on an average in the whole State whereas its price rose to Rs. 5 and Rs. 2 per piece in 1920. The prices of Timber have risen by 50 per cent during the last decade.

From the above it is evident that the prices of many of the commodities enumerated above have risen by $2\frac{1}{2}$ and 3 times in almost all cases except in a few cases. Mr. Beohar in his article on "High prices in India" contributed to the Modern Review for June 1921, points out the effects of high prices in the following words:—

"One visible effect of the rise in prices is acute distress prevailing among men of fixed money incomes. As most of them belong to the

articulate class their grievances have come to the front. The result is an all round but unproportionate increase in their incomes, in the form of revision of pay. While the subordinate service which forms the mainstay of the Government machinery has been left to struggle with the high prices with a small increase in their pay. Poor clerks have been given an increase of about 30 per cent while their standard of living has risen by 300 per cent. Rate of interest has risen *pari passu* with prices but not to the same extent. Government securities have been depreciated. unskilled labourers have been hit hard. Their wages have not risen in the same ratio as prices. It is therefore natural to see labour strikes and Industrial Disputes."

The prices of different kinds of cloth have not been incorporated in this statement in-as-much-as it was not possible to classify the various kinds of cloth and then compare prices of each sort. In case that course would have been adopted, it would have been very bulky. Articles of Luxury and their prices had also to be omitted for similar reasons.

**Statement showing taxable commodities imported into the
Indore City during the last eleven years i. e.
from the year 1909-1910 to 1919-1920.**

This statement represents the taxable commodities imported into the *Indore City* during the last eleven years (1909-10 to 1919-20).

The statistics were supplied by the Customs Department of the State. The quantity, weight or number, as the case may be, of each commodity has been given with its value where available in each year. In order to have a thorough knowledge of import trade of the Indore City during the last decade the total imports may be classed for the sake of facility into the following five groups:—

- (a) Food, Drink and Tobacco.
- (b) Raw materials and unmanufactured articles.
- (c) Manufactured articles.
- (d) Articles of Luxury.
- (e) Miscellaneous.

Group (a) includes rice, all kinds of sugar, spices including fruits etc., Ghee etc. Indian and Foreign Tobacco; (b) includes Fuel, Coal and Timber; (c) includes new metal and iron utensils, metal sheets and old utensils, Cloth of all kinds, Tanned leather and sulphur and gun powder; (d) includes perfumery and Toilet requisites, Bicycles, Machinery, Carriages etc., Manihari, Gold and articles made thereof, Silver and articles made thereof and (e) includes vegetable oils, Petrol and other mineral oils and Neemuch Stone.

The value of the total imports of the Indore City in 1910-1911 with the exception of Timber for which the value is not available was nearly 55 lacs, as against Rs. 149½ lacs in round figure in 1919-20, the figures having shown a steady increase every year since 1909-1910. Of the total of 149½ lacs, goods to the value of Rs. 38½ lacs are included under group (a) above; goods to the value of Rs. 88000/- only under (b) excluding Timber for which the value is not available; goods to the value of Rs. 63½ lacs are included under (c); goods to the value of Rs. 43½ lacs under (d); and goods to the value of Rs. 3½ lacs only under (e).

It will thus be seen that the two groups of manufactured articles and articles of luxury account for 107 lacs or nearly 71 per cent of the total imports. Imports under food, drink and Tobacco account for a little more than 25 per cent. Perhaps it would be interesting to consider in further details the figures of the imports of certain particular commodities under the various groups formed:—

Group (a). Of the total imports under this group Rs. 5¾ lacs are apportioned to rice, Rs. 14 lacs to Sugar, Rs. 10½ lacs to spices, Rs. 5 lacs

to Ghee, butter and cheese and Rs. 3 lacs to Tobacco, the largest item being sugar and spices. The increase of value of imports in these commodities is mainly due to an abnormal rise in the price as compared to the previous years.

Group (b). Since there are a very few articles included in this group, they require no special notice by entering into the details of imports.

Group (c). Out of the total imports of $63\frac{1}{2}$ lacs under this group the chief item is cloth which amounts to Rs. $52\frac{3}{4}$ lacs. The total imports under metal show Rs. $8\frac{1}{2}$ lacs whereas tanned leather and Sulpher and Gunpowder are very small items.

Group (d). Out of the total imports of $43\frac{1}{2}$ lacs under this group big items are Gold and Silver and articles made thereof which put together amount to Rs. $38\frac{3}{4}$ lacs. Other items being small require no special scrutiny.

From the statement it will appear that the imports under almost all items have increased year by year but not according to the proportionate value which has trebled in most cases on account of the great European War.

The statistics of import and export trade in the Indore State by Customs Charges are published by the Customs Department every month in the Holkar Sirkar Gazette. Similarly these are also published annually.

**Statement showing taxable commodities exported
from the Indore City during the last eleven years
i. e. from the year 1909-10 to 1919-20.**

This statement shows the taxable commodities exported from the Indore City during the last eleven years (1909-10 to 1919-20.) There are only 13 commodities on which export duty is levied; the main items being cotton-seeds, cleaned cotton, pressed bales of cotton, hides and skins. On an average cotton seeds of the value of Rs. 140000 nearly are exported from the City every year. In 1910-11, 29796 Manis of Cotton were exported in pressed bales; in 1911-12, 28375 manis, in 1912-13, 13617 manis, in 1913-14, 10 manis, only, in 1914-15, 3282 manis, in 1915-16, 10920 manis, in 1916-17, 7349 manis, in 1917-18, 11949 manis, in 1918-19, 6184 manis, in 1919-20, 3582 manis. This will show that the largest export of cotton bales was in 1910-11 and the nominal one was in 1913-14 which was the year of draught. Tobacco of the value of nearly 40 to 50 thousand rupees a year is exported from the Indore City.

The object of export is to enable the community to import articles that it requires, and either cannot produce, or cannot produce economically. There is no advantage in exporting, except as a means to getting something in return. A country that is in a peculiarly strong position in regard to the economical production of a given article finds it advantageous to develop that Industry, to reduce prime costs still further by increase of production, and to exchange the surplus for the other articles in regard to which it is not so favourably situated, or for raw materials or food that it does not produce. (Harmsworth Business Library Vol. IV.)

This statement will show the taxable Commodities imported into the Indore State during the last eleven years (1909-10 to 1919-20). Articles imported under items 1 to 4 and 6 & 7 are shown in weight; those under items 5, 8-12, 16-20 and 25-26 are shown according to value; Petrol and mineral oils in Tins, Fuel, Coal and Coke and Timber in carts and Gold and Silver in Tolas. On an average 100000 maunds of Rice, 46100 maunds of Sugar mauritious and 43000 maunds Sugar Indian are annually imported into the State in round figure, and spices including fruits etc. of the value of Rs. 1544000/- are imported.

These figures were partly supplied by the Customs Department and partly collected from the yearly statistics published in the Holkar Sirkar Gazette.

STATEMENT No L.

Statement showing Customs Tariff of import and export duties in force in the Indore State (1920).

This is the Customs Tariff of Import and Export duties in force in the Indore State (1920). This Tariff was introduced in the Indore State in 1909. There are 24 articles on which import duty is levied and 13 articles on which export duty is charged. Recently an ad valorem duty of Rs. 3-2 per cent has been levied on the export of machinery of all kinds. So also on the export of Alsi at Rs. 5 per Mani. Originally the import and export duties on Ghee, butter and cheese, were Rs. 1- and 8 annas per maund respectively, but owing to an abnormal rise in prices of Ghee during the past two or three years, the Government of His Highness have exempted import of Ghee from Customs duty and levied a duty of Rs. 15 per maund on its export for the time being. This has brought down the prices of Ghee in the market. According to the Tariff, Coal and Coke are liable to import duty at Rs. 1-4 per cart but under Huzur order No. 132 dated 16-8-18, duty on the import of coal used in Mills, Cotton Presses and other like industrial concerns has been abolished tentatively for seven years, in the interest of the development of Industries. There is only a duty of 6 pies per maund on the export of Cotton seeds, but temporarily the export duty has been raised to 4 annas per maund under orders of the Government of His Highness on account of the depletion of stock in the State. The export duty on cattle is realised at present at Rs. 20/- per cent ad valorem instead of 2 annas per head under Huzur orders.

Items 1-3 and 5-6, under import duties of the Tariff are liable to Customs duty by weight in maunds; ad valorem duty is charged on articles under items 4, 7, 11, 15-19 and 24 whereas duty is charged on the import of petrol etc. (item 12), Fuel, Coal and Timber (items 13-14, 20-21), and Gold and Silver (items 23-24) per tin, per cart, per tola and per hundred tolas respectively.

Under export, eight commodities are liable to pay export duty according to the weight in maunds or Manis as the case may be; Ad valorem duty is levied on Tobacco and Machinery; and duty on bones, hides and skins is charged per cart and per piece respectively.

STATEMENT No. LI.

Statement showing the number of Industrial Concerns in the Indore State during the years 1909-10 to 1919-20.

This statement shows the number of Industrial Concerns started in the Indore state during the last eleven years (1909-10 to 1919-20). In 1909-10 there were only 58 concerns in all, out of which 39 were ginning factories, 11 Cotton presses & 2 cotton spinning & weaving mills & 6 were miscellaneous concerns; whereas in 1919-20 the number has gone up to 135 or in other words the number of the factories etc. has more than doubled during the last decade. The statement also shows the number of concerns as they increased in each year since 1909-10.

Of the 135 concerns existing in 1919-20, there are 3 Cotton spinning and weaving mills, 57 cotton ginning factories, 13 Cotton presses, 15 wooden hand presses, 1 Steam Roller flour mill, 1 Ice factory, 32 flour grinding & Oil extracting Concerns worked by Oil or Steam power or Electric current supplied by the State Electric Power House, 2 printing presses, 1 Silk Industry, 1 Electric Power Station, 1 Repair Shop, 1 Rasalpura Canadian Work Shop, one Brush factory, one Brass & Iron Foundry, one Hosiery Factory, one Brick & Tile Factory, one furniture making concern, one Thymol Factory, & one Jail Industry.

Thus it will be seen that Indore has made a rapid headway in the development of Industries during the last decade.

This information was collected from the annual administration Reports of the Indore State & other records available in the Census office.

Statement showing the accidents occurred in the Cotton Mills and Factories in the Indore City during the years 1911 to 1920.

In this statement details are given of the accidents that had occurred and were reported each year in Cotton Mills and Factories in the Indore City during the last decade (1911-1920), year by year.

In all, 194 accidents have been reported during the last decade out of which 188 were minor and 6 fatal. On an average the number of accidents worked out, comes to nearly 20 per annum. The highest number of accidents occurred in 1913, in the Malwa United Mills which was 19, out of which one was fatal. It is in this Mill that the number of accidents is greater than in others. It is a pity that similar information for Districts was not available.

The information was supplied to this Office by the Inspector of Mills and Factories.

**Statement showing quantity of cloth in lbs. manufactured
in the Cotton mills in Indore during the
years 1910 to 1920.**

This statement shows the quantity of cloth manufactured in each Cotton spinning and weaving mill in Indore during the year 1910 to 1920 in lbs. The Hukumchand Mills, Limited, commenced its working in 1916 and hence the figures of cloth manufactured in this Mill prior to this year are not shown.

In 1910, the State Mills turned out 1481469 lbs. and the Malwa United Mill, 1851693 lbs. In 1915, these mills produced 1449825 and 4194130 lbs. respectively. This shows that the Malwa united mills produced cloth nearly $2\frac{1}{2}$ times more in 1915 than in 1910 while the outturn of the State Mills remained stationary. In 1916, the three Mills Viz (1) State Mills (2) Malwa united Mills (3) The Hukumchand Mills together manufactured 6881104 lbs. of cloth against 10571964 lbs. in 1920. The Total quantity of cloth manufactured in all the three mills from 1910-1920 comes to 7, 41, 77, 614 lbs. of which Malwa Mills alone turned out more than $4\frac{1}{2}$ crores of lbs. The Malwa united mills claim the first place in the manufacture of cloth. Next comes the Hukumchand Mill and the third and the last is the State Mill.

The Statistics of cloth were supplied by the Inspector of Mills and Factories, Indore State.

Whereas in 1909-10 the income under this head was Rs. 48237-0-0 only. This extraordinary increase in revenue realised from Excise duty on cloth is attributed to the increase in the number of Textile Industries as well as considerable increase in production.

The Industrial Concerns in this statement have been classified under four headings viz. (1) Cotton Spinning and Weaving Mills (2) Ginning Factories (3) Cotton Presses and (4) Corn Grinding Factories.

Columns 1 and 2 show the District and the Town in which the Factory is situated. Column 3 shows the nature of Industry as to what sort of Industry it is. Column 4 shows how the Industry works, i. e. by steam power or by Oil-Engine etc. Column 5 gives the ownership of the Concern. In Column 6 the amount of Capital invested is given. Columns 7 to 10 show the average number of persons (men, women and Children separately) employed in the Concern during the year. Columns 11- 12 give the yearly out-turn. The quantity is shown in column 11 and the value in column 12. In column 13 the number of working days in the year is given. In column 14 the number of Looms and Spindles in the case of Cotton Spinning and Weaving Mills and the number of Gins in the case of Ginning Factories is given. Column 15 will show the number of spindles and looms or gins, as the case may be, at work.

The statement will show that at the end of December 1920 there are three Cotton Mills, 58 Ginning Factories, 18 Cotton Presses and 42 Corn Grinding and other Concerns in the Indore State, of which 3 Mills, 6 Ginning Factories, 3 Cotton presses and 29 Corn Grinding and other Concerns are located in Indore City.

Statement Nos. 57, 58 and 59 are the comparative statements showing general progress of the Central Banks, Non-agricultural societies and Agricultural Societies existing in the Indore State since 1915-16 to ending June 1920.

The following note kindly drawn up by Mr. S. L. Tambe B. A. Registrar Co-operative Societies Indore gives all the information about the working of these Societies:—

" Agriculture being the premier Industry of India from which revenue was mainly drawn, every effort was made to foster and strengthen it and any movement that tended to give stimulus to agriculture and ameliorate the condition of agriculturists was watched by the Indian Government with interest. The indebtedness of the agriculturists and his servile and helpless dependence on the money-lender which hampered the growth of agriculture and stifled the energies of the agriculturists made the Government of India anxious about the prospects of agriculture and set them on to devise measures to remedy it.

In most of the agricultural countries of Europe which were confronted with the same problem, Co-operative Societies were after patient labour found to be a sovereign remedy for this evil of indebtedness. The same remedy being found to be most useful and advantageous for upholding the agriculturists cause in India, Officers were deputed to study the Co-operative movement and on their recommendations Co-operative Societies were started in British India about the year 1906.

When the Co-operative movement had taken a firm hold in British India and when its benefits were patent, progressive Native States could not afford to overlook this measure of the welfare of their subjects. The Government of His Highness the Maharaja Holkar which has been assiduous timely to take every step to improve the agriculture, naturally turned its attention to this movement. During the time of the Council of Regency this question was mooted but it did not pass beyond the academic stage. In 1913 when the services of an able and experienced Revenue Officer were secured as Agricultural Adviser of the Holkar State and when expert

advice and guidance were thereby obtained he was asked to submit a preliminary note on the organisation of Co-operative Societies in the Dominions of His Highness. His note was much appreciated and His Highness the Maharaja was graciously pleased to approve of the Scheme to start Co-operative Societies in Holkar State.

Mr. S. L. Tambe, B. A. was appointed Registrar Co-operative Societies and he was deputed to the United Provinces for Training in Co-operative work. In order to give a legal status to Co-operative Societies, the Indore State Co-operative Societies Act was passed in July 1914. After his return from the United Provinces the Registrar moved about villages to acquaint himself with the rural condition to ascertain as to the system on which Co-operative Societies could be established in the State. Principles and methods of Co-operative Societies were explained to the cultivators and advantage was taken to explain these to the Amins and Subhas who were at Indore for their Revenue Conferences in 1914.

In the light of knowledge gained by discussions with the Revenue Officers, intelligent cultivators and others interested in the welfare of Agriculturists, bye-laws of Societies were framed and Rules under Section 43 of the Act were passed in 1915.

Suitable villages were selected and the first Co-operative Society in the Dominions of His Highness was started in Rangwasa on 22nd April 1915. Mhow, Kodrya, Datoda followed next and by the end of 1915 twelve Societies were on the register. Modified Raiffeisan system is the type suited and all the agricultural Societies are of that type.

There are 201 Societies of which 4 are Central Banks, 178 agricultural, 2 urban and 17 Weaver Societies. The agricultural Societies have been started in Indore, Nimar and Nimawar Districts. The two urban Societies are situated in Indore City. The parasper Sahakari Pedhi Ltd. caters for the need of the middle class people of Indore City. It has 632 members, most of whom are State servants. The other urban Society, the Chandraseniya Kayastha prabhoo Pat Pedhi Ltd. is a communal Society administering to the wants of the Prabhoo community. One Society has been started for the Moghias, a criminal tribe, in Narayangarh Circle of the Rampura-Bhanpura District.

Seventeen Societies for weavers are in existence in Maheshwar which is famous for Sari Industry. A yarn and Sari store has been opened at Maheshwar to supply yarn at reasonable rates to weavers and to purchase Saris in slack season. The number of their members is 188, their working capital is Rs. 21,033-0-0 and Reserve Fund is Rs. 2,727-0-0

Agricultural Societies get loan from Central Banks at 9% and lend out to their members at 12 to 15%. The profits go to build up the Reserve Fund. Their total number of members is 3654, working capital Rs. 9,11,743 Reserve Fund Rs. 91,290-0-0 and Share money Rs. 29,053.

To finance, supervise and organise the primary Societies Central Banks have been established in Indore, Maheshwar, Sanawad, and Petlawad. Of these four Central Banks, the Indore Co-operative Central Bank Ltd. is the oldest and the premier Central Bank. It was opened in 1916. At the close of July 1917, the share capital was Rs. 19,952/-;

deposits both savings and fixed Rs. 57,765/10/3; its share capital now (at the end of June 1920) is Rs. 49,710/- and deposits both savings and fixed Rs. 457442/12/6 and loans Rs. 53,601/. The progress of this Bank has been very satisfactory. It has on its Directorate prominent men of Indore City, including Bankers, pleaders, Sardars and substantial Cultivators. The savings and fixed deposits have been steadily increasing and the Bank has secured the confidence of the Public of Indore and special concessions have been given to widows and students who are depositors.

The Maheshwar Co-operative Central Bank Ltd. finances the Weavers' Societies at Maheshwar and manages the Sari and yarn stores. The total number of members of the Bank at present is 205. Share money is Rs. 2390/-, Reserve Fund Rs. 210/- and working capital Rs. 23,008/-.

An organisation Fund has been started at Kannode, the head quarters of the Nemawar District. Societies are being organised and financed by this Fund. Much relief was given to the Famine stricken villages in that District and this organisation Fund promises to be soon developed into a well managed Central Bank.

The statement appended will give an idea of the growth of the Co-operative movement. The benefits of Societies have been appreciated by all the classes. Great relief is afforded to the agriculturists in times of stress and their condition is being improved.

In some Societies material improvements in their moral and financial condition can be seen. Irrigated crops like Sugar-cane are being taken up by Society villages which could not afford to do this for want of financial help. Public spirited and intelligent gentlemen have begun to take an active interest in the movement and wherever Societies have been started they are realised as a boon and it is a great joy to hear cultivators and artisans of limited means expressing their gratitude to His Highness the Maharaja for introduction of this movement which tends to ameliorate their hard lot."

The total number of Companies registered up to date is 25 with an authorized capital of Rs. 2,61,45,000, out of which two Companies have been voluntarily wound up and five Companies have not yet obtained the Certificate of incorporation. Out of the total number of Companies, one was registered in 1915, 2 in 1916, 3 in 1918, 9 in 1919, 8 in 1920 and 2 in 1921. Of these, five are textile industries, one Brush Factory, two Brick and Tile Factories, one Iron and Brass Foundry, one Banking Corporation, one Sugar Company, one Motor Service Company, two Printing works and others are miscellaneous Companies.

From the progressing number of Companies registered under the Indore Companies Act which came into force in September 1914, it is apparent that Indore is making a rapid progress in the development of Industries.

**Statement showing the number of Patients treated in
the Hospitals in the Indore State during the years
1910 to 1920.**

This statement represents the number of patients in-door and outdoor allowed for treatment in the Hospitals and Dispensaries of the Indore State during the last eleven years (1910 to 1920). The total number of in-door patients in all the Hospitals and Dispensaries of the State in 1910 was 3220 against 3242 in 1920, that is to say that the number has remained almost stationary. In 1912 it was 3585 which is the maximum number and in 1917 it was 1330 which is the minimum. In 1910 the number of outdoor patients treated in the State Hospitals was 199624 as against 189736 in 1920. In 1918 it was 306412 which is the highest number. From the statement it will be seen that the number of outdoor patients has increased in each year upto 1918. In 1919 it fell from 306412 to 298232 and in 1920 it again fell down to 189736. The average number of patients (indoor and outdoor) for the last eleven years comes to 3264 and 262175 respectively which works out at the ratio of 240 patients to 1000 persons of the total population of the State excluding the Mhow Cantonment and the Indore Residency areas.

Out of the total average number of outdoor patients treated in all the Dispensaries of the State nearly 120000 have been entered for treatment in the Hospitals and Dispensaries situated in the Indore City, that is to say nearly 46 % patients come to the City and the rest in all other Hospitals of the State.

This information was supplied by the State Surgeon, Indore State.

Statement showing the number of Hospitals and Dispensaries in the Indore State for the last eleven years i.e. from the year 1910 to 1920.

This statement represents the number of Hospitals and Dispensaries in the Indore State for the last eleven years by Districts. There has been practically no change in the number of Hospitals and Dispensaries during the last decade. There are at present ten Hospitals and Dispensaries in the City of Indore including the Maharaja Tukoji Rao Hospital and the Maharani Female Hospital; whereas in the Districts there are 5 Dispensaries in Indore District, 4 in Mahidpur, 3 in Nemawar and 12 each in Nimar and Rampura-Bhanpura Districts. Besides, there are 3 Ayurvedic Dispensaries in Nimar and 1 in Rampura Bhanpura District. Thus there are 50 Medical Institutions in all in the Holkar State. This works out at the proportion of one Dispensary to 22000 persons or 200 Square miles. It may be noted with satisfaction that there are a number of Private Dispensaries in each District of the State which are an additional Medical Relief to the people of the rural tracts. The statistics regarding these Private Institutions were not collected on this occasion for want of time.

The following table gives the proportion of Medical and Ayurvedic Institutions in each District of the State to population and area :—

**Statement showing the number of Children vaccinated
in the Indore State during the years 1911 to 1920.**

This statement will give the number of children, male and female vaccinated in the Indore State during the last decade (1911-1920) by Districts. In 1911, 7673 male and 6439 female children were vaccinated as against 4951 and 3620 respectively in 1920. The highest number of children of both the sexes vaccinated was 15569 in 1915. From the statement it will appear that the number of vaccination has fallen down each year from 1916. This means that the people little realise the importance and necessity of having their children vaccinated. If on an average one child of vaccinating age be taken for one family, the total number of children of both the sexes in the whole State comes to 215000 in round figure excluding the Indore Residency and Mhow Cantonment. The average number of vaccinated children during the past ten years comes to 12413 which means that out of one thousand children of vaccinating age, only 57 children are got vaccinated. Had the statistics of deaths that occurred in Districts by small-pox for the last decade been available, they would have helped us to arrive at a definite conclusion as to the percentage of deaths that occurred on this account and the necessity of vaccination etc. Efforts were made to collect the information from the Mahal authorities but no reliable information was supplied by them. The number of vaccinations effected in the City of Indore during each of the past ten years is also not available separately, otherwise it would have been compared with the number of deaths by small-pox in the City which is available.

The information incorporated in this statement was supplied by the State Surgeon, Indore State.

**Statement showing the births registered in Indore City
Municipality during ten years i. e. from 1911 to 1920.**

This statement represents the births registered in the Indore City Municipality for the Indore City only during the last eight years (1913-1920). It seems that prior to 1913 there was no system of recording and registering the births. In this statement the number of births in each year have been shown first by sex and then by caste. Births in the latter case have been classified into main castes such as Brahmans, Kshatriyas, Vaishyas, Shudras, Mabomedans, Christians, Parsees and others. From the statement it appears that the registration of births was commenced in the latter part of the year 1913 and up-to-date information was collected and recorded from 1914. So we must take the figures from 1914 for comparison.

The following table will give the birth rate per 1000 persons in the City during the years 1914 to 1920 :—

From this it will be seen that the birth rate has fallen down every year except in 1917 in which year the rate was 25. In 1919 it came down to only 4 per 1000 persons and in 1920 it was 6 which was very poor.

The number of births registered in 1919 and 1920 is very low and it appears that the arrangement of the municipality for registering the births in those years must be unsatisfactory.

The following table gives the average birth rate per 1000 persons living for the decennial period, 1902-1911 for some of the important countries of the world (vide article on 'Standard of living' contributed by one Jagdish Prasad in Hindusthan Review for May 1921.) :—

From this it will be seen that the highest birth rate is recorded in Russia while the lowest is in France. India gives 38.58 per 1000 persons which is next to Russia. But Indore City does not even compare with France in which the birth rate is only 20.25 per 1000 persons if normal year is taken for comparison's sake.

According to castes, no births were registered under Christians and Parsees during the years 1913-18 and 1920. So also none was registered under Kshatriyas and Shudras during the years 1915-18. The highest number of births registered will be found under Mohamedans in almost all the years. Next to them come Brahmans and then Vaishyas.

The statistics of births incorporated in this statement were furnished by the Secretary, Municipal Committee, Indore City. It may, however, be pointed out here that it is feared that all the births that occur in the City do not seem to have been reported and registered and this seems to be the reason why the birth rate in the Indore City does not even come up to the normal standard as it prevails in other parts of India.

Statement showing the deaths registered in Indore Municipality during the last ten years i. e. from 1911 to 1920.

This statement represents the number of deaths registered in the Indore City Municipality during the last decade (1911-20), according to age and diseases and by sex. In columns 3 to 8 the number of deaths have been recorded under five age periods, viz. (1) under five years (2) under ten years (3) under twenty years, (4) under forty years, (5) above forty years and total. Then these have been classified according to the following diseases in columns 9 to 14 :—

(1) Fever (2) Plague (3) Small-pox (4) Influenza (5) Cholera and (6) other diseases.

Columns 15 to 17 will show the total number of deaths registered in each year by sex.

The average annual number of deaths during the last decade comes to 2751.8 which works out at nearly 31 in 1000. Generally the deaths, it appears, mostly occur in 3 age periods, viz. (1) under 5 years (2) under 40 years and (3) above 40 years. The highest number of deaths in 1918 was 3997 and the minimum was 1714 in 1913 which was not a year of epidemics.

Now looking to the number of deaths according to the diseases we find that during the last decade plague swallowed 6122 persons and fever 5144, out of 27518 in all, that is to say nearly 41 % of the total number of deaths come under Plague and Fever conjointly. Influenza which broke out in 1918 cleared off 1788 persons. Nearly half of the total mortality comes under other diseases. Under sex we find that the mortality of males is greater than that of the females.

The following table will show the difference between the birth and death rates in each year from 1914 to 1920:—

Thus it will be seen that the death rates are greater than the birth rates. Still the population of the City has considerably increased in the Census of 1921 as compared to 1911, which seems to be due to the coming in of persons from out-side on account of the development of trade and industries in the City.

This Abstract represents the total number of Boys' Educational Institutions (State, State-aided and private) for the last eleven years (1910-1920) in the Indore State excluding Holkar College and Sanskrit Mahavidyalaya. Column 2 of the Abstract shows the nature of Institutions. In subsequent columns the number of Institutions of each class, number of students on Roll and the number of Teachers have been shown.

These Institutions include High Schools, Anglo Vernacular Schools, Normal, Vernacular final-both Hindi and Marathi, Vernacular middle-both Hindi and Marathi, Upper primary and Lower primary Schools in the State. The number of all these Institutions in 1910 was 118 with 368 Teachers attended by 9912 Students, while in 1920 the number of Schools rose to 185 with 700 Teachers. The number of students on roll in 1920 was 17671. This means that there has been an increase by 57.63% in the number of Institutions, 78.28% in the number of students and 90.21% in the number of Teachers. On an average 90 boys were taught in one School in 1910 as against 95 in 1920. The average number of students for every teacher comes to 24 in 1910 and 25 in 1920.

If the number of students of school-going age is reckoned at 15% of the male population just like Baroda, it comes to over 90,000 in the whole State, out of which only 17671 or 19.55% attend Educational Institutions. In 1910 there was one High School with 761 students and 33 Teachers as against two High Schools in 1920 with 1761 students and 92 Teachers. There has been no increase in the number of Anglo-vernacular schools during the last decade, while the number has gone down by one.

Besides these there is one Upper Primary Urdu School with 175 Students and 8 Teachers. Upto the year 1913 the number of Boys' Educational Institutions in the State had been falling, but it began to rise from 1914. Thus from 113 in 1913 it rose to 122 in 1914, 133 in 1915, 145 in 1916, 153 in 1917, 173 in 1918, 162 in 1919, and 186 in 1920. In 1919 the number of Schools again went down to 162 from 173 in 1918. However, later on there has been no fall in the number of Schools or Students and Teachers. There are about 285 villages and Towns of the population of over 500 in the State and the total number of Educational Institutions are 186 at present. It means that on an average there are 65 Educational Institutions to 100 such villages or towns.

This statement shows the number of boys' Educational Institutions in existence in the city of Indore from 1910 to 1920. In column 2 the names of Institutions have been given and in subsequent columns the number of students and teachers have been shown year by year against the name of each Institution.

In 1910 there were 761 students on roll in the Maharaja Shiwaji Rao High School with 33 teachers, i.e. 23 boys for one teacher, whereas in 1920 the number of students rose to 1380 and that of teachers to 71. It means that now 19 boys are taught by one Teacher. The abnormal increase in the number of students in the High School each year is due to their import from outside the State. The 2nd private High School, known as Tilokchand Jain High School was started in 1914, by Rai Bahadur Seth Tilokchand Kalyanmal, one of the leading Bankers and merchants of Indore city. The number of students on roll in that school in 1920 was 381 with 21 Teachers. In the city of Indore there are two High Schools, one Anglo-Vernacular, one Normal School, one Vernacular final Hindi, one Vernacular final Marathi, one Vernacular middle Hindi, one Vernacular middle Marathi, two upper primary Hindi, four upper primary Marathi, one upper primary Urdu and one Lower primary Hindi, that is, there are in all 16 Educational Institutions in the city except the Holkar College and Sanskrit Maha-Vidyalaya which are dealt with separately. The total number of students attending these schools in 1920 was 4102 with 188 Teachers. The total number of students of school-going age in the City comes to over 8,000 at 15% of the male population of the City and it is satisfactory to note that more than half the number attends the Educational Institutions.

The statistics contained in this statement as well as in statement No. 74, 76 and 77 were supplied by the Head Inspector of schools through the Director, State Education, Indore.

From this it will be seen that in all the Districts the number of Institutions as well as Students and Teachers has increased during the last decade. The number of Schools increased by 50 per cent in 1920 as compared to 1910. So also the number of Students and Teachers has nearly doubled.

There are no Anglo-Vernacular Schools in the rural area of the State. All the Institutions existing in the Muffasil are vernacular (either Hindi or Marathi). There is no Marathi School in the Muffasil at present. One such Institution was started in Nimar in 1916 but it seems to have been abolished in 1920. There are only two Vernacular Hindi Middle Schools in all the Districts, one in Nemawar and the other in Rampura-Bhanpura, and the rest are primary Schools.

There are in all ten Anglo-Vernacular Schools, one in each of the towns of Kannod, Mahidpur, Barwaha, Sanawad, Maheshwar, Khargone, Rampura, Garoth, Manasa, and Bhanpura. In others there are Primary Schools only. The number of students and Teachers has increased in almost all the towns every year. The total number of students on roll in all the Schools of the towns at the end of 1920 was 4813 with 224 Teachers, the ratio being 21 students to one Teacher. The population of towns of the Holkar State excluding the Indore city is nearly one lac and if the number of students of school-going age be over 7500 at 15 per cent of the male population, it is evident that 64 per cent of the boys of school going age attend the schools in towns.

Column 4 represents the number of students of the Matric Class on roll in the School at the end of December of each year. Column 5 gives the number of students sent up for examination. Column 6 shows the number of those students who were sent up for the Matriculation Examination but were absent from it owing to some reason or other. In column 7 the number of Students who actually appeared at the examination has been given. Columns 8-11 will show the number of candidates who came out successful at the examination during each of the eleven years according to the Divisions in which they were placed. From the Maharaja Shivajee Rao High School no student passed out in the 1st. Division in 1910 and 1913 to 1917.

From this it will be seen that the highest percentage of successful students is 55.38 in 1913, while the lowest is 22.10 in 1918. Taking the average of the last eleven years the percentage comes to 34.39 per year or more than one third of the number appeared. Out of the successful students 34% were placed in the 2nd division and 64% in the 3rd division.

During the years 1910 to 1914, a large number of students on roll at the end of December of each year had been detained from being sent up for the examination as is apparent from the statement but from 1915 almost all the students were sent up for the Matriculation Examination with a very few exceptions.

The students from the Tilokchand Jain High School were sent up for the Matriculation Examination in 1917 for the first time. The result of that School for the years 1917-1920 is given below:—

Statement showing Girls' Educational Institutions in existence in the Holkar State from 1910 to 1920.

This statement represents the number of Girls' Educational Institutions in existence in the Holkar State for 1910-1920. In 1910 there were two Upper Primary Marathi Girls' Schools, eleven Lower Primary Hindi Schools, and one Lower Primary Marathi School in the whole State with 734 girls and 22 teachers. Whereas in 1920 the number of institutions, students and teachers rose to 27, 2256 and 83 respectively, that is to say there are now 3 Upper Primary Marathi and 4 Hindi Schools, 13 Lower Primary Hindi Schools, 6 Private Hindi Schools and 1 State-aided Hindi School in the whole State.

The number of students and teachers in Chandrawati Mahila-vidyalaya and Ahilyashrama also increased year by year since its establishment. A brief history of this Institution is given below :—

“ In 1913 Her Highness was graciously pleased to order the starting of a “ Widows' Home ” and Girls High School on modern lines, at Indore. The Former was called Ahilyashrama after Devi Ahilya Bai Holkar of revered memory and the latter was named Chandrawati Mahila Vidyalaya after Her Highness herself. In Ahilyashrama local widows are maintained and educated free. As these progressed in their education, higher classes were started and for some years they were sent up for vernacular final examination of the Bombay Presidency. Afterwards it was considered desirable to start a normal class with a view to train them to be teachers of primary Girls' Schools and this is now well established and a number of widows have passed out of it and are working as teachers in the State.

“ In the Mahila Vidyalaya only the first three Vernacular Classes could be started in the beginning but the teaching of English was at once started. The School developed fast much beyond the original expectation into a complete High School and was affiliated to the Allahabad University in 1917. Girls were sent up for the Matriculation in 1919 for the first time and one girl passed in 2nd Division. In 1920 one girl passed in the 3rd. Division, and in 1921 one girl passed in 1st Division and two in the 2nd Division.

“ From the beginning, girls have been prepared and sent up every year for the drawing examinations of the Bombay School of Arts and a great number has passed both the elementary and Intermediate grade Drawing Examinations.

“ Besides drawing, plain and fancy needle work and Singing form an important part of the School curriculum.

“ Resident students are given special lessons in fancy needle-work, cutting out, cooking and vegetable gardening.”

This information was supplied by the Principal, Ahilyashrama and Chandrawati Mahila Vidyalaya, whereas the information about the Girls' Educational Institutions was supplied by the Head Inspectoress of Schools, Holkar State through the Director of State Education, Holkar, State.

There were 17 Scholars in B. A., 34 in F. A. 13 in B. Sc. and 15 in F. Sc., that is, 79 scholars in all in 1910 in the College, whereas in 1920 the number rose to 51, 85, 12 and 44 respectively in all the four classes, i. e. to 192 students in all. This means that there has been an increase of 143% in the number of College Students during the last decade. The number of Professors in 1910 was only 6 against 11 in 1920.

This statement relates to the Revenue derived from Toddy during the years 1909-10 to 1919-20. In 1909-10 and 1910-11 there was only one shop of Toddy in the Indore City. One more shop was opened in 1911-12 at Sanawad which together with the City shop gave the yearly revenue of Rs. 1250/- against Rs. 248/- and 550/- during the years 1909-10 and 1910-11 respectively. In 1912-13 the Sanawad shop was closed and only one shop in the City of Indore gave Rs. 1055/- as license fee. Again in 1919-20 another shop in Sanawad was reopened whereby the annual License fee rose to Rs. 1525/-. There is no duty levied on Toddy juice. Toddy is not a favourite drink with the people in Malwa.

**Statement showing consumption of Foreign Liquor in the
Indore City from the year 1911-12[to 1919-20.**

This statement represents the consumption of Foreign Liquor in bottles and pints and actual revenue (license fee) realised therefrom during the last nine years (1911-12 to 1919-20). There is only one shop for the sale of Foreign fermented Liquors in the Indore City. There is no other shop in the whole State. During the last nine years, 6959 bottles and 6911 pints of the Foreign Liquor were consumed in the City or on an average 773 bottles and 768 pints are consumed every year. The only source of revenue realised from the sale of Foreign Liquor is the License fee paid by the Licensee every year to the Excise Department. No import duty or Excise duty is levied by the State on the import and sale of such liquors. The average annual revenue derived from this source is Rs. 200 only. The consumption of Foreign Liquor shown in this statement does not represent the actual consumption of the Indore City since there are several Foreign Liquor licensed Vendors' shops in the Residency; and the Indore City people take advantage of the Residency shops as well.

Statement showing number of shops, consumption of Liquor and actual Revenue realised from Country Spirit in the Holkar State during the years 1909-10 to 1919-20.

This statement shows the number of Liquor Shops, consumption of Liquor and actual Revenue realised from Country Spirit in the Holkar State by Districts during the last eleven years (1909-10 to 1919-20).

The Madras Distillery System was introduced in the Excise Department of the State in 1907-08 for the first time when it was confined to Indore City and the joint Contract Areas only. But later on it was extended to the Districts of Indor-, Nimar and Nemawar till 1909-10 thereby abolishing the old farming system of outstills. In 1909-10, the total number of Liquor Shops licensed for by the Department in all the three Districts including the City of Indore was 501 through the medium of which 1,22,917 Gallons of L. P. liquor were consumed by the drinking population of these Districts. The total revenue derived from license fees and still head duty levied on Liquor in 1909-10 amounted to Rs. 4,47,921. Thus the incidence of Revenue and consumption per head of population of these areas comes to 0-10-10 and 18 Gallons L.P. of Country Spirit respectively. In 1911-12 the Madras System was also introduced in the Mahidpur District and in 1912-13 in the Rampura Bhanpura District. This year (1912-13) the Revenue of the whole State derived from Country Spirit (under Madras System) amounted to Rs. 7,20,263 and 1,58,356 L. P. Gallons of Liquor were consumed during the year. The Incidence per head of population of Revenue and Consumption in this year came to Rs. 0-11-5 and 15 L. P. Gallons.

The number of shops in 1912-13 was 609, in 1913-14 it was 611, in 1914-15 it was increased to 670. The number was reduced to 63 in 1915-16, 624 in 1916-17, 610 in 1917-18 and 608 in 1918-19. No reduction was effected in 1919-20. The number of shops has been reduced in all the Districts except Nimar since the year 1914-15. The number of shops shows a constant decrease. This shows that the Government of His Highness the Maharaja Holkar are alive to see that the chances of drinking habit are minimised by reducing the number of shops and by enhancing the still head duty on liquor as well. In 1914-15 both revenue and consumption decreased as it was a bad year. From 1915-16 the consumption of country spirit continued to increase until it went up to 201118 gallons in 1918-19 as against 146880 in 1914-15. So also the revenue improved year by year from 1915-16 and Rs. 1199836, were realised in 1919-20 as against Rs. 600090, in 1914-15. According to the population of 1921 the incidence per head of revenue and consumption in 1919-20 is worked out at Rs. 1-1-4 and 16 L. P. gallons respectively.

In the City of Indore there were 13 liquor shops in 1909-10. The number of shops was reduced by 2 in 1918-19. The consumption of liquor was only 18630 L. P. gallons in 1909-10 in the City but it began to increase year by year except 1911-12, until the figure reached 43203 L. P.

gallons, the highest consumption in 1918-19. It slightly decreased in 1919-20. The incidence per head of population comes to 40 L. P. gallons in the City which is rather high. It is higher than the double of the State as a whole. From this it is evident that drinking has shown an abnormal increase in the City. The proportion of the number of shops in the City is one to 8463 persons while in the State as a whole there is a shop for every 15.63 square miles.

The fall in consumption of liquor in 1919-20 as compared to 1918-19 is due to temperance and other kinds of movements. While the increase in revenue is due to the enhancement of still head duty on liquor. Though the statistics for the year 1920-21 are not available, it is understood that the consumption has still considerably fallen in this year which is no doubt partly the result of temperance movements and partly of the economic conditions at present prevailing. In 1920 at the convention of the All-India Temperance Conference a resolution was passed urging the provincial organisations to consider, inter alia "reform of excise administration with a view to minimise gradually the consumption of liquor with a view to the ultimate introduction of total prohibition" (vide page 63 of Modern Review for January 1921). In the same issue the contributor Mr. Frederick Grubel says "The temperance reformers of India have not restricted themselves to political activities. They have always recognised that the way must be prepared for effective legislation, and that the basis of national action must be found in the promotion of individual abstinence. Hence they have consistently sought the co-operation of all leaders of public opinion, caste panchayets, Social Service Clubs, religious and Social workers, humanitarians, educationists and above all, of parents in the task of impressing by personal example and precept the advantages of a life of total abstinence on the community at large and the rising generation in particular." It would also be interesting to reproduce here the important medical pronouncement prepared for circulation in India, some time ago, referred to by the contributor in his article "India and the Liquor Traffic" in the Modern Review for January 1921. It was this declaration. "I. Alcohol, Cocaine, Opium and intoxicating drugs (such as Ganja, Bhang and Charas) are poisons.

2. Even a moderate use of these is harmful especially in tropical countries like India. They are of no avail permanently to relieve physical and mental strain.

3. Those who confine themselves to non-alcoholic drinks and who avoid the use of intoxicating drugs are capable of more endurance, and are better able to resist infection and disease.

4. Alcohol is in many cases injurious to the next generation, especially through its favouring influence upon venereal disease.

5. Alcohol aggravates the evils of famine.

6. Alcohol is useless as a preventive of plague.

7. Alcohol lowers the resisting power of the body against the parasites of Malaria and the Microbes of tuberculosis.

8. All that has been said applies with equal force to opium and intoxicating drugs.

9. We therefore appeal to the people of India to maintain and extend the practice of total abstinence as enjoined upon them by their religious and social obligations."

The Excise policy of the Government of His Highness has all along been " Minimum consumption and maximum revenue."

Note:—The figures of actual revenue shown in this Statement year by year are not the figures for that year only but also include the figures of the past years' arrears collected during that year.

**Statement showing number of Liquor Out-stills and actual
Revenue derived therefrom during the last eleven
years i. e. from 1909-10 to 1919-20.**

This statement gives the particulars of Liquor Out-stills in existence in the State and actual revenue derived therefrom during the last eleven years (1909-10 to 1919-20) by Districts. Since, in the Indore City, the system of Out-stills was entirely abolished in 1907-08, no statistics have been shown under Indore City in this statement. In 1909-10 there were 260 stills in all in the whole State and the revenue derived therefrom amounted to Rs. 61586/- . In 1910-11 and 1911-12 the number of stills rose by 6. Since the Madras system was extended to the whole of the State the number of Out-stills was reduced to 174 in 1912-13 and in the year following there remained only 10 Stills, on the border, the existence of which was necessitated with a view to maintain the uniform system and to co-operate with the adjoining Foreign States and administrations. There are at present one out-still in Nimar, 8 in Rampura District, and one in Bhanpura District. The number of Stills in Rampura is still greater because of the Mewar territory adjoining the pergana in which they are situated and in which the same old farming system is in force. The out-stills gave Rs. 3141/-only to the Excise Department in 1919-20. No duty is levied on Liquor distilled by Out-still system and the only revenue that is derived from this source is the license fee offered annually by the monopolist for manufacturing and sale of liquor in that area.

Statement showing the number of shops of opium and hemp Drugs and their consumption and the revenue derived therefrom in the Holkar State during the years 1909-10 to 1919-20.

This statement represents the number of shops, consumption and revenue derived from (1) opium and (2) hemp drugs in the Holkar State during the last eleven years. Columns 2 to 6 of the statement are assigned for the particulars of opium. In column 4 under actual revenue the amount of duty realised on opium exported to Foreign territory during the period is shown and column 5 shows the actual revenue derived from opium locally consumed in the State. Columns 7 to 11 show the number of shops of hemp drugs and the consumption of Bhang, Ganja and Charas in the State as well as duty realised therefrom during the period. Column 12 gives the total revenue derived from opium and hemp drugs from all sources in each year.

In 1909-10 there were 297 shops licensed for the sale of opium. In the year following their number was increased by 39 which remained unchanged up to 1913-14. In 1914-15 it was again increased to 363 and in 1916-17 to 391. This latter number was reduced to 386 in 1918-19 and 376 in 1919-20. So is the case with hemp drugs. The quantity of opium consumed in the State in 1909-10 was 75 maunds only. Since then it has shown tendency to increase every year. The consumption of opium went up to 184 maunds, the largest quantity in 1917-18. An almost equal quantity was consumed during the year 1918-19. However in 1919-20 it fell down to 169 maunds. The reasons of this fall are obvious as have already been explained in the case of liquor consumption. The total quantity consumed in all these years is $1344\frac{1}{4}$ maunds or $122\frac{1}{4}$ maunds per year on an average.

In 1909-10 the duty realised on the export of opium amounted to Rs. 24359/8/- only. For exports, years 1910-1911, 1911-12 and 1912-13 were abnormal, during which great stocks of manufactured opium were exported to China and hence the export duty realised in these years amounted to Rs. 211672/12/-, Rs. 934570/8/- and Rs. 2177024/8/- respectively, which was due to the special enhancement, for the time being, of duty on the export of opium. Since then the export of opium has considerably fallen and the stocks with the State opium merchants have also exhausted to a great extent. The amount of revenue shown in column 5 of the statement is only the license fee offered for the monopoly of sale of both opium and hemp drugs conjointly till the year 1915-16 from 1916-17 the licenses for the sale of hemp drugs began to be sold separately from those of opium and from the same year the duty realised on hemp drugs locally consumed and shown in column 11, has been included in the amount of license fee realised separately for their sale. Thus taking into consideration the total revenue derived from the local consumption of opium and hemp drugs it is evident that it has considerably improved as will be seen from the fact that in 1909-10 the total revenue on account of both the commodities (29594/8/- + 18563/8/-)

amounted to Rs. 48178/- only as against Rs. 162928/- (Rs. 88300/- license fee for opium plus Rs. 74628/- license fee and duty both on Hemp drugs) in 1919-20. In other words the Revenue has improved by nearly 3½ times.

The total quantity of Bhang and Ganja consumed in the whole State during the last eleven years is 682 and 1150½ maunds respectively or 62 and 104½ maunds a year on an average. The sale of Charas was allowed in the State till the year 1916-17. But under orders of His Highness the Maharaja the import and sale of this deleterious drug was prohibited from 1917-18.

Statement showing Imports and Exports of Opium from the Holkar State from 1912-13 to 1919-20

This statement shows the quantity of opium imported into and exported from the Holkar State during the years 1912-13 to 1919-20. Indore is an opium producing State and hence no necessity ever arises for importing it from outside except under special circumstances. Only $3\frac{1}{2}$ Dharies or $17\frac{1}{2}$ seers of opium was imported in 1912-13 and nothing afterwards. Exports have been classified into two heads, viz. (1) Chik or crude opium and (2) opium balls or manufactured opium. For Chik the number of bags has been shown in column 7 and weight in columns 8 to 10. For manufactured opium the number of chests has been shown in column 11 and weight in columns 12-14.

During the last eight years the total quantity of opium chik exported from the State was 80 bags or 179 maunds and 26 seers; and the number of opium chests exported is $9164\frac{1}{2}$ or 15124 maunds, 3 seers. Out of this quantity $5764\frac{3}{4}$ chests were purchased by Government of India and $3399\frac{3}{4}$ chests by other States etc. which have been shown in column 15 and 16 of the Statement respectively.

Government i. e. from the year 1917-18
to 1919-20.**

This statement shows the area in acres brought under Poppy cultivation and out-turn of Opium during the years 1917-18 to 1919-20 and the quantity supplied to the British Government. Before entering into agreement with the Government of India for supply of crude opium to them in 1916-17, the poppy cultivation in the State was restricted to 1200 acres only in the Manasa Pergana of the State. But since the execution of the aforesaid agreement it has been extended to the whole of the Rampura Bhanpura district and the Mahidpur District as well.

In 1917-18 poppy was sown in 4894.34 acres in the Rampura Bhanpura District which produced 597 maunds and 39 $\frac{3}{4}$ seers of chik. Out of this 496 maunds 6 seers and 2 chataks were supplied to the Government of India and the rest was retained for local consumption in the State. In 1918-19 the poppy was cultivated in 2930.45 acres in the Rampura-Bhanpura District and in 88.54 acres in the Mahidpur District bringing the total area under cultivation to 3018.99 acres in which 723 maunds, 25 seers 13 Chataks of Chik opium were produced. Out of this 498 maunds 3 seers 10 Chataks were supplied to the Government of India and 225 maunds 22 seers 3 chataks retained for local consumption. In 1919-20 4967.90 acres were brought under poppy cultivation in both the Districts and the total outturn was 665 maunds 11 seers 10 chataks out of which 432 maunds 18 seers 10 chataks were supplied to the Government and the rest retained for local consumption in the State.

Column 1. shows the years from 1910-20.

Column 2. Name of the News paper or periodical has been given in this column.

Column 3. In this column the name of the language in which the News paper is published, is given.

Column 4. Gives the name of the place and the Press at which the paper is printed.

Column 5. Gives the name of owner of the Press.

Column 6. In this column it has been shown whether the paper is daily, weekly, monthly, or otherwise.

Column 7. Gives the annual subscription of the paper.

Column 8. Gives the number of subscribers to the paper.

Column 9. Gives the name, race etc. of the Proprietor.

Column 10. Gives the name, race etc. of the Editor.

Column 11-12. Show the names and races etc. of the Publisher and the Printer.

In column 13 general remarks as to the tone, influence etc. of the paper have been made.

There are only 4 papers at present published in the State, viz. (1) Holkar Sarkar Gazette, (2) Holkar State Police Gazette, (3) Holkar College Magazine and (4) Mallhari Martand Vijaya. The first two and the fourth are weekly papers and the third is a quarterly magazine of the College. The first is an official organ of the State in which Government orders, notifications, circulars and private notices are published while the 2nd. is meant only for the Police Department. The third contains news about the Educational Institutions of the State and the fourth and the last is intended for the enlightenment of the Public on social, industrial and general matters.

Part B. of this statement is the list of Bulletins issued by the Commerce and Industry Department of the Holkar State, during the last five years (1916-20). They are 31, in number. Some of the Bulletins are very interesting and useful. The perusal of these bulletins will surely give the reader an idea of the development of Commerce and Industry as well as the present and future policy of the Government as regards the Commerce and Industry Department. Some of the most useful publications are:—

- (1) A brief note on Industries in Holkar State.
- (2) Iron deposits of Barwaha and their future possibilities.
- (3) My experience with the "water finder."
- (4) New Industrial Town of Indore and its possibilities.
- (5) A survey of prices, cost of living and wages in Indore Bazar.
- (6) Industrial Betterment.
- (7) Report on the survey of wholesale markets of the Indore City.
- (8) Know your Town exhibition.
- (9) Report of the Commerce and Industry Department for 3 years.

Apart from these the most instructive and interesting Report (in two volumes) of Professor Patrik Geddes regarding Town Planning towards City development was also published. Besides these various private Publications have been issued during the last decade, but the information could not be collected for incorporation in this Report for want of time. However, Muntazim-i-Khas Bahadur Hirachandji Kothari Rai Bahadur, President of the State Council has kindly informed that he has Compiled and published the following booklets:—

Statement of ten years Traffic figures of sent, received and local Office messages ending March 1921.

This statement shows the Traffic figures of sent, received and local Office messages during the last ten years (1911-12 to 1920-21) in Holkar State.

During the decennial period ending March 1921, 172215 private messages were sent from the different Offices situated in the State; 124243 were sent from local Offices and 632772 were received, that is, 929230 messages were exchanged during this period.

The average number of messages sent and received per year comes to 92923 which represent the general all round activity of the State.

STATEMENT No. XCIX.

**Statement showing applications filed, marriages registered
and offences dealt with under the Child marriage
Act since the date the Act has come into force
in the Holkar State.**

This statement represents the number of marriages registered and offences dealt with under the Child Marriage Act in force in the Holkar State.

The Indore Child Marriage Prevention Act No. 2 of 1918 was brought into force on the 1st. September 1918 under Huzur Shree Shankar Order No. 284 dated the 15th. August 1918 with a view to prohibit Child Marriages in the Holkar State with the object of improving the physique of the rising generation.

Since the introduction of the Act in the State, 1156 applications were presented to the Registrar of Marriages for obtaining permission to celebrate Child marriages through-out the State. Out of these permission was granted to 1015 applicants and 141 applications were rejected. During the period 883 marriages were registered. In 388 cases registered, permission was granted by the Registrar and in 415 no permission was obtained. 514 cases of Offences against the different provisions of the Act were dealt with by the Magisterial Courts since the Act came into force.

The information incorporated in this statement was supplied by the Registrar of High Court.

Efforts were also made to collect similar information about working of Indore Hindoo widow Re-marriage Act I of 1915 and the Indore Civil Marriage Act I of 1916 but the same could not be available about the former Act. However, the Registrar of High Court informs that since the introduction of the Indore Civil Marriages Act only four marriages were solemnized under the Act and registered in the High Court. The brides in 3 marriages out of the 4 were widows. Both the parties in 3 of the marriages belong to different castes of the Hindu community. In the remaining one the bride-groom was a Parsi and the bride a Christian.

The Indore Civil Marriage Act I. of 1916 was sanctioned by His Highness the Maharaja under Huzur Shree Shankar Order No. 189 dated the 13th April 1916 in order to provide a form of marriage for persons who intend to celebrate marriage under the provision of the Act and to legalise certain marriages the validity of which is doubtful. It came into force on 1-5-1916. The following was promulgated in the Act for general information :—

“This measure is of a purely permissive character. It will affect only those who choose to avail themselves of its provisions. It does not interfere with the religious susceptibilities of any sect or community but only secures liberty of action to those who wish to extend their social horizon beyond the limited circle of their castes and communities. It is believed that the measure will promote general welfare and tend to bring about a better understanding between the different communities in India.”

The Indore Hindu Re-marriage Act 1 of 1915 was sanctioned by His Highness under Huzur Shree Shankar Order No. 55 dated the 29th November 1915 and came into force on 15th December 1915 in order to remove all legal obstacles to the marriage of Hindu widows. The preamble of the Act is detailed below :—

"It is known that Hindu widows, with certain exceptions, are held to be by reason of their having been once married incapable of contracting a second valid marriage and the offspring of such widows by any second marriage are held to be illegitimate and incapable of inheriting property, and many Hindus believed that this imputed legal incapacity although it is in accordance with the established custom is not in accordance with a true interpretation of the precepts of their religion, and desire that the Civil Law administered by the Courts of Justice shall no longer prevent those Hindus who may be so minded from adopting a different custom, in accordance with the dictates of their own conscience and it is just to relieve all such Hindus from this legal incapacity of which they complain and the removal of all legal obstacles to the marriage of Hindu widows will tend to the promotion of good morals and the public welfare."

STATEMENT No. C.

Statement showing particulars of Criminal Tribes inhabiting the territory of His Highness the Maharaja Holkar.

This statement gives the particulars about the Criminal Tribes inhabiting the territories of His Highness the Maharaja Holkar. The Criminal Tribes are mainly found in the Mahidpur and Rampura Bhanpura Districts. In column 3 the name of the Police Station at which the names of these tribes are registered, is given. Column 4 represents the names of criminal tribes found. Columns 5 to 8 are meant to show how many criminals of each sect are there in the Districts with the number of females and their children. In column 9 the nature of the Government control over these tribes has been described.

In these districts a majority of the Criminal Tribes are Moghias. In the Rampura and Bhanpura Districts there are 1088 Banjaras also besides 690 Moghias.

The following Table gives the number of each Criminal Tribe found in the three Districts.—

From the figures available it will be seen that out of 2937 criminals, Moghias form nearly 52 per cent and Banjaras nearly 37 per cent. Besides the 1088 Banjaras shown here these are in a great number found in Garoth pargana; and had the actual number been available, the percentage of Banjaras would have probably exceeded over that of Moghias. Generally they are controlled by the Motmid of Moghias, an officer appointed for the purpose and the Police Department as well.

STATEMENT No. CI.

Statement showing the estimated and actual receipts and expenditure of the Holkar State for the last ten years:—

This statement will show the estimated as well as actual receipts and expenditure from all sources of the Holkar State for each year from 1910-11 to 1919-20. In columns 2-3 the estimated amounts have been given and in columns 4-5 actual figures. From the statement it will appear that the gross actual income of the State from all sources in 1910-11 was Rs. 81,52,781 as against Rs. 1,06,37,800 in 1919-20, that is to say, it has improved by Rs. 24,78,019 or 30.36 per cent. On an average for the last ten years the gross actual income of the State comes to Rs. 94,22,077 and actual expenditure Rs. 91,52,725.

According to the population of the State (1921), the incidence of taxation per head comes to Rs. 8-8-0. As compared to Baroda where the incidence of taxation in 1918-19 was Rs. 6-1-10, (vide statement No. 56 in Statistical Abstract of the Baroda State from 1909-10 to 1918-19) the burden of taxation in this State is heavier by nearly Rs. 2-6-0 per head than Baroda.

The figures of receipts and expenditure in this statement were supplied by the Finance Department of the State.

Appendix A.

A NOTE ON THE CONTROL OF FOOD-STUFFS.

The Holker State always pursued a policy of non-interference with trade and gave facilities for the development of trade. The years of 1917 and 1918 were agriculturally very bad years and great scarcity of food stuffs was felt by all including the Government of India who had also to arrange for the supply of food-stuffs in war-time. The prices of food stuffs rose very high and the Native States round about Indore had recourse to prohibition of export of food-stuffs. The British Indian provinces drew their supply of grain from Indore only in Central India and as a consequence the stocks of grain were exported in large quantities from Holker State as the exporters got good price for their commodities. The source of supply to recoup the depletion from the neighbouring States being thus stopped our stocks continued to be depleted and grave apprehensions were being felt to meet our own needs. Applications were also sent by the people of Indore requesting prohibition of export of grain from Holker State. War arrangements produced great congestion on Railways and a stage was reached when Railway facilities could not be obtained for movements of grain. Indore always imported wheat from the Punjab in normal times and this supply replaced the Malvi wheat that was exported as it was in great demand in foreign market and fetched good price. Inquiries were made, the district officers and the people were interviewed by the Chief Minister and officers of the State to ascertain the situation with respect to food grains and it was found that in view of our sources of supply of grains being stopped, unless we stopped all export there would certainly be great depletion of stocks and probable starvation of the people. The Government of His Highness therefore stopped all export of grain from the 21st January 1918.

To regulate the supply of food-stuffs in different parts of India at reasonable rates, to lessen the congestion of traffic on Railways and to check the evil propensity of grain dealers to take undue advantage of the situation by demanding high prices the Government of India established the system of "Control of Food-stuffs" and Directors of Civil Supplies were appointed to all the provinces who consulted one another and allowed movements of grain from provinces where a particular grain was a surplus to provinces where it was deficit. No movement of grain could take place on a Railway without a "Priority Certificate" from these Directors of Civil Supplies. A Director of Civil Supplies was appointed for Central India and it was necessary to make arrangements for import of rice pulses grain from outside through him. Statistics had to be kept to be supplied to this Director and control had to be exercised on commodities brought from outside. This necessitated the appointment of "Controller" for Holkar State, to consider the stocks of food-stuffs and other necessities of life and to receive and examine applications from merchants and others for the movements of traffic in the State, to scrutinise reports and demands sent to him by the district

officers of the State, to communicate with the Director of Civil Supplies in Central India as to the nearest point from which supplies for the State could be obtained and to co-operate with him in preventing non-essential movements and particularly the cross movements.

The Government of His Highness considered the proposal and Mr. S. L. Tambe & A. was appointed the controller of Supplies for the Holkar State in addition to his duties as Registrar, Co-operative Department and Director of Agriculture.

Grain Committees were formed in the important centres of the Parganas with the Amins and Naib-Amins as their Presidents and the movements of the grains were allowed on the strength of certificates given by these committees.

Arrangements were made through the Director of Civil Supplies for Central India to import high quality of rice for which there was great demand, for gram and pulses and these were sold under the "Control System". This prevented the dealers from profiteering and enabled the people to get good rice and other grains at reasonable rates. Reports were invited from districts and arrangements were made to supply grain from surplus districts.

Complaints about the smuggling of food grains were reported and many cases were also detected by the Sayar Department but the measures taken by the Sayar Department to prevent smuggling proved in-effective and the Government of His Highness had to be moved to make smuggling a penal offence and soon after smuggling was made a "Penal Offence" the cases were sent to the Magistrate concerned for trial and this step helped greatly in minimising the chances of smuggling.

As the work of Control increased, the necessity of having an Assistant was very keenly felt to manage the office as the controller was often required to go on tour. The Government of His Highness appointed Mr. L. B. Deshmukh, Assistant to the Controller, in December 1919.

Early in October 1919 the merchants holding large stocks of Jwar applied for the export of their Jwar to foreign territories as it was getting more and more spoiled every day. Figures were obtained for our stock of Jwar and other food grains from all Parganas of the State. It was found that there was surplus quantity of Jwar which could profitably be exported. Recommendations for allowing partial export of old Jwar to foreign territories were made. The matter was fully discussed in the Council and the orders of His Highness the Maharaja were obtained for partial removal of restrictions on the export of Jwar for one month only from 18th of November 1919 to the 18th of December 1919 on condition that one-fourth quantity of Jwar should be kept with the grain Committees for local requirements at 15 seers per rupee and the remaining portion to be exported on the recommendations of the grain committees. A grain Committee consisting of local merchants and two or three State pensioners as its members and the Subha of Indore as the President was appointed to do this work in the City of Indore for allowing export of old Jwar from Indore City. This measure enabled the people to get the Jwar at

cheap rate and freed the capital of the dealers which otherwise would have been locked up and had not been serviceable for purchase of the Jwar from the cultivators who would have thereby been forced to dispose of their Jwar at low price to pay their revenue dues.

Later on the wheat arrangements in the city were also entrusted to this Committee. At this time the supply of wheat was inadequate on account of the wheat harvest being very poor. This fact was already corroborated from the figures of the forecast prepared by the Director of Land Records. This danger of shortage of wheat was already apprehended. Arrangements for regular supply of wheat in the city were made by opening "Control shops of wheat" in the city.

The situation with regard to wheat continued to grow serious and a meeting of the special Council was held and stringent measures were proposed to be adopted for taking out stocks of wheat from the stock-holders. For this purpose the Amins and the Subhas under orders of His Highness were empowered to take possession of the grain stocks within their respective jurisdictions.

Doctor S. N. Deo, the then Superintendent Municipality was appointed as a Joint Controller for Indore City and all wheat arrangements for Indore district and city were entrusted to him. This arrangement is still in force as it was considered more useful.

Owing to the acute conditions in the general rise in the prices of food-grains it had become imperative to discuss and propose measures for the control of food-stuffs in the State. Committee consisting of the Revenue Minister, Food Controller, and the Subhas was called together and this committee passed a scheme in which powers were given to the Subhas to allow the movements of grains within their districts and the Amins within their Parganas. It was also decided to ascertain the stocks in the Districts and to prepare statements of stocks to enable this office to regulate the movements of grain supply knowing the surplus and deficit quantity of grain in the districts.

The harvest of wheat in 1919 being poor the situation with regard to wheat continued to be bad and arrangements had to be made to import wheat from the Punjab on facilities afforded to importers to export their unsold wheat as it was necessary to preserve our good Malwi variety for seed purposes.

As is natural smuggling was practised in various ways and in order to minimise it smuggling was made a penal offence in January 1920.

Wheat being the great staple grain of the Holkar State which fetched good price it was found necessary to control it rigorously. All wheat has therefore been ordered to be brought into Indore and all transactions are done with the knowledge and sanction of the Customs Commissioner, Muntazim Bahadur Doctor S.N. Deo. As the Control in British India has now been abolished, steps are being taken to amalgamate the office of the controller of supplies, Holkar State, Indore with that of the Customs Commissioner and therefore all future arrangements as regards grain will be entrusted to him.

"Control" implies restrictions and restrictions tend to retard movement and growth. "Control" has therefore been an impediment to the growth of trade. The Holker State has all along been following the policy of non-interference of trade and to give stimulus to it the Shiwa Gunj duty free zone was established. But "Control" in all the British provinces and the neighbouring States necessitated departure from that policy as otherwise all our grain would have been exported and we would have been starved. Care was, however, taken to enforce rigidity of Control as much as self-sufficiency demanded. This had the effects of enabling the subjects of the Holkar State to have cheap grain when prices in British India had risen very high. This had alleviated the sufferings of the people and afforded them relief. The interest of the trading community had been guarded by allowing export of surplus Jwar so that traders could realise their money locked up. When it was found that there was shortage of wheat it was arranged to allow importation of wheat by giving concessions to the importers with regard to re-exportation of any Punjab wheat that may not be sold here. "Control" has no-where been fully successful as varied and complicated interests of producers, consumers and middle men are involved in it. It militates against the natural law of demand and supply, and it is next to impossible to convince people about the relative dependency of all these interests. Control is found to be unpopular. The British Government had to abolish Control and it has always been the desire of His Highness' Government to gradually relax it and allow trade to have its normal course. But unfortunately the past two years have been agriculturally very bad years, and no suitable time had fallen to our lot when we could gradually relax control and ultimately abolish it. The cultivator has been hit very hard as control has prevented him from getting good price for his produce of grain. The consumers have, however, been benefitted as this has given satisfaction to the people.

NOTE ON APPENDIX B.

This appendix is the statement showing particulars about Dewasthans (देवस्थान) of the Holkar State.

This statement, parts A and B, does not contain all the Devasthans of the State. In statement A those institutions, the annual grant (Nennuk) of which exceed Rs. 100 have been given and in statement B those, whose annual grant is upto Rs. 100 but not below Rs. 40 have been shown.

In order to classify all the Devasthans of the State properly according to the amount of their annual grant they have been divided into four classes, viz. A. B. C. and D. by the Huzur Khasgi Department under whose control these institutions lie. The Institutions coming under the category of class C, and D. i.e. those getting upto Rs 40 but not below Rs. 10 per annum as well as those getting below Rs. 10 per annum have not been sorted and arranged in a statement form like A. and B. as yet, since the information is not yet readily available. But the work of collecting this information, it is understood, is in progress.

Besides the Devasthans that come under classes C and D., there are several other State institutions situated outside the State in several Kshetras all over India which have also not been shown in these statements.

The information contained in this appendix was, supplied by the Huzur Khasgi Office.
