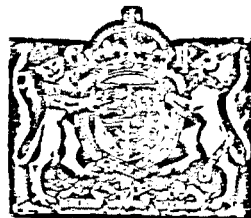

Do. Lastly that the Company will save $\frac{1}{2}$ ₹ Cent in the Coinage of their own silver which as we coin $\frac{1}{3}$ ^d. generally of what goes down to the Bay will very near if not over Compensate for the reduction of the Custom on other silver.

In Obedience to your Order we have endeavour'd to inform our selves whether it will be most for the Interest of our Honble Masters to prevent the Coinage of Silver into Arcot Rupees or to suffer the Merchants to coin it as has of late been Customary in such of the Mints as they thought Proper; but notwithstanding our best endeavours We have found it so nice & Intricate an affair that We are not able to give You so Exact a light into it as We could wish.

Annex'd hereto we give You the best account we could get of the Charges of Coinage in the Madrass and S^t. Thomé mints & the Produce of 100 oz^s. of silver in Each from which You will observe that the said 100 oz^s. of Silver produces Nine Rupees & seven annaes more in the S^t. Thomé Mint than the Madrass mint which difference has occasion'd a Queeree among us whether by its producing so many more rupees in S^t. Thomé Mint than the Madrass the Merchants do not really give more for the silver & the rather because we are inform'd they have in many Places in Bengal obtain'd the Arcott rupee to have equall Credit with the Madrass of which thô we cannot be Certain yet the great Quantities of the Former that are Exported thither give great reason to believe it & therefore thô the Company lose two ₹ cent Coinage by its going into S^t. Thomé Mint whether they are not gainers more than that by the Merchants giving a higher Price for the Silver for 100 Pag^s. of Silver at 15 Dollars for 10 Pagodas produces in the Madrass mint 315 Rupees with 10 ₹ cent Batta is $346\frac{1}{2}$ Current It produces 331 in S^t. Thomé Mint with only

7 ₹ Cent Batta is $354\frac{2}{3}$ Current. Now it may be argued that the Silver being Coin'd into one Rupee or Another does not at all influence the Price so much as the Quantity of Silver that is Imported more or less, for thô the Merchant gets more by it's being Coin'd into the Arcott rupee Yet his Demand for Silver being always the same he will be under the necessity to take the same weight of Silver for his Gold thô it does not produce him the same Number of rupees. That the next morning the defendant after a mature Consideration went and made Complaint to M^r. That Your Petitioner after the Death of her husband went and lived in the House of Verago father to the defendant Paupia who had the sole care and management of all Your Petitioners affair's that the said Verago falling sick and finding his illness increase sent for his son Paupia the defendant and Your Petitioner and settled Accounts with her before his Death at which time there was due from Verago to Your Petitioner about the sum of Three hundred pagodas for w^{ch}. said sum he with his son the defendant gave Your Petitioner a Bond and at the same time deliver'd several other papers and Jewells belonging to her which She lock'd up together in her Escrutore. That immediately upon the Death of the said Verago his son Paupia the defendant sent for a Smith Clandestinely and broke open Your Petitioners Escrutore stole out all her papers and Jewells among which was the aforesaid Bond for 300 Pagodas which was sign'd by the defendant Paupia and given by him and his Father to Your Petitioner just before his fathers death. Your Petitioner thereupon made Complaint to Justice but was prevail'd upon by Kistnamah Naik and Paupa Braminy not to prosecute it but to let it drop the heinousness of the said Paupiahs Crime being such that they greatly fear'd the rigour of Justice which Your Petitioner acquiesced in upon their promising her to examine the matter thoroughly which they accordingly did and upon Examination the said Paupia made Confession of the allegations as above specified and in the Presence of the aforesaid Persons voluntarily renew'd the abovesaid bond to Your Petitioner of which he hath since at sundry times paid her to the Amount of 45 Pagodas which Your Petitioner hath given him Credit in his Account for and further he the said Paupia promised & Agreed before the aforesaid persons to give Your Petitioner a house he had standing in the Patta for the Amount of the Jewells which he had stolen from her and had Squander'd away all which Your said Petitioner then Consented to but the said Paupiah instead of Complying therewith hath from time to time put Your Petitioner off with fair promises which he hath all along imposed on her being a poor woman and incapable of Aiding or assisting herself. WHEREFORE Your Petitioner Humbly Solicites the Protection of this Worshipfull Court from whom she doubts not of Justice and as in Duty bound shall ever Pray.

Petitioner how long he had been in Possession of said Garden. He answer'd that he and his Ancestors had rented it about 70 Years. The then rent being only Pag^s. 120 The Govern^r. told him there was other People that would give Pag^s. 150 ₹ Annum for said Cowle and ask'd whether he would give so much To which Your Petitioner agreed and the Secretary was order'd Accordingly to make out the Cowle in his name which was done and sign'd by the Govern^r. and Council. But Sunca VenkeTachellum receiv'd it unknown to Your Petitioner who being inform'd that it was in his Possession went and demanded it. But he told him there were people that would give Pagodas 200 ₹ Annum for it and if he would pay the same mony he might have it. Your Petitioner made answer that he Could not pay so much money for it besides the Cowle being in his name and granted to him what reason had Sunca VankeTachelum to detain it from him. Whereupon he sent his People and turn'd Your Petitioners Servants out of the Garden but detain'd all his Utensils taking possession of the Garden for himself. At last Your Petitioner finding that he Could obtain no Redress upon Promise to have the Cowle immediately deliver'd him actually paid the said VenkeTachelum Pag^s. 350 in hand but he nevertheless persisted in refusing him the Cowle unless he Your Petitioner would pay him Pag^s. 18 ₹ Annum account Charity; To which Your Petitioner was at last obliged to Agree likewise. But thô he was put in Possession of the Garden Yet the said Sunca VenkeTachelum put him off from time to time with Promises but never deliver'd the Cowle till lat[e] when the Secretary demanded it of him by Order of the Governour. That Your Petitioner Continued to pay regularly into the Honble Companys Cash Pag^s. 150 ₹ Annum for the said Garden but never having seen the Cowle nor had the terms and Conditions of it Communicated to him has forfeited the same to his great prejudice; That the said Sunca VenkeTachelum extorted of Your Pet^r. at first as above Pag^s. 350 and afterwards Pag^s. 18 ₹ Annum the two last Years of M^r. Collets Government under Pretence of a Charity. That no Demands were made upon him the 2 Years of M^r. Hastings Government but when M^r. Elwick Succeeded the aforesaid Sunca VankeTachelum having again recover'd his interest obliged Your Petitioner to pay him for the 2 Years of M^r. Hastings Government Pag^s. 12 ₹ Annum but upon a Different pretence Viz^t. That he was Surety for my Complying with the Conditions of the Cowle and Continued to oblige me to pay him under said pretence Pag^s. 12 ₹ Annum all the time of M^r. Elwick's Governmen[t] Which was a Manifest Extortion for Your Petitioner nor any body in his name ever ask'd Sunca VankeTachelum to be Surety for him Nor ever was any Surety demanded of him by any of the governours or any ₹ son whatever in their name So that the said Sunca VankeTachelum h[as] extorted from Your Petitioner,

THE PETITION OF PAUPIAH BRAMINY

HUMBLY SHEWETH

That when M^r. Collet was Governour of this Place Virago Your Petitioners Uncle built a Pagoda at Collets Petta near Trevitore and prevail'd upon the inhabitants of Madrass to Contribute something towards the maintenance of it and was allow'd for that Purpose a small duty upon all goods either imported or exported from the Sea Gate and Choultry for which the said Governour Collet was pleas'd to grant him and his heirs for ever a Cowle which is register'd in the Town hall. The said Verago during his life time expended his whole estate upon the said Pagoda when he died the Proffits arising by that Pagoda by Virtue of the abovemention'd Cowle descended to Your Petitioner which he for sometime enjoy'd without molestation. One day Sunca Ramah sent Viziah formerly the deceas'd Verago's Conicoply to order Your Pet^r. to bring him the Cowle and Papers relating to the said Pagoda which he refused to do whereupon the said Viziah told him that unless he did the Consequence would prove very much to his disadvantage. Your Petit^r. being Sensible that it was in the Power of so great a man as Sunca Rama to do him a great deal of Prejudice and not knowing how far his resentment would reach Should Your Petitioner not Comply with his order, carry'd the Cowle and papers aforesaid to Sunca Ramah and ask'd him what he wanted with 'em he answer'd that he intended to take the management of the abovesaid Pagoda upon himself and therefore demanded the delivery of the Cowle and Papers belonging thereto which Your Petitioner would not do Saying that the Cowle was granted his Uncle for himself and heirs for ever and that he Could not deliver up that right without doing injustice not only to himself but his heirs. Sunca Ramah finding Your Petitioner resolved not to part with his right by fair means by threatnings and other unjust methods forced the Cowle & papers from him and gave the Charge of the Pagoda to the abovesaid Viziah who has ever since that time receiv'd the dutys of the Pagoda and enjoy'd the Profits of the same without ever giving Y^r. Petitioner any manner of Account. Your Petitioner made his Complaint to Governour Elwick of these the said Viziahs unjust proceedings who was pleas'd to send for him and Order'd him to give Your Petitioner an Account of his Proceedings in relation to the Pagoda as often as thereunto required which he promised to do but notwithstanding that Your Petitioner Could never bring him to it. Your Petitioner likewise desired Governour Elwick to order that he might keep one of his own Conicoplys there which was done for about ten days then Viziah turn'd him out pretending that so long as he Continued there the Merchants would not pay the Usual dutys.

Your Petitioner having run himself greatly in debt to maintain the said Pagoda occasion'd by his being wrong'd of the Profits arising therefrom by the unjust and underhand dealings of Viziah and being now reduced to the most despicable Condition doubts not but Your Honour will have Compassion on him and Considering the justness of his Cause order the said Sunca Ramah to return him his Cowle and Papers and Viziah to give him an exact Account of his Transactions for the time he had the said Pagoda under his direction.

Your Petitioner as in duty bound shall ever Pray.

WE THE SUBSCRIBERS hereunto of the right hand and left hand Cast Chief Merchants and Inhabitants of Madrass do hereby Promise at the request of Rausum Verago Braminy to pay or Cause to be paid by us for the advancement and maintenance of the Pagoda named Colleana Veradarassuloo Situated in Collets Petta the Several Dutys undermention'd Viz^t.

For all Cloth or other Goods brought in at the Sea Gate and Choultry Seven Cash and a half d a Pagoda.

AT A COURT HELD AT THE TOWN HALL ON THE 16TH. OCTOBER 1724 THE WORSHIPFULL JAMES HUBBARD ESQ^R. MAYOR AND ALDERMEN ASSEMBLED.

PETITION read and filed Setting forth that Seg^r. Estra Gregorie being Indebted to Trivalapa Muta Marr Chitty in the sum of 70 Pagodas as he Can make appear by her Bond hopes that the Worshipfull Bench will give an Order for the Sale of her Effects and goods to that Amount he having according to the usuall process of the Court attachd her Effects in Order to Discharge the Debt.

ORDER'D that the Defeldant make answer next Court day.

OCTOBER 27TH. PETITION Read a 2^d. time.

The Defendants Attorney not having his Answer ready ORDER'D that it be deferr'd till next Court day.

NOVEM^R. 3^D. PETITION read a third time.

ANSWER read.

The Defendants Attorney producing several Accounts which were read and bringing Opia Conicoply as a Witness Who was Examin'd and declared that Sumadrew did not pay the defendant 100 Pag^s. which the Plaintiffs Attorney asserted.

ORDER'D therefore that Sumadrew be Summon'd to appear and that it be deferr'd till next Court day.

17TH. PETITION read a 4TH. time.

Summadru being Call'd by the Bench to give an Account what he knows of the Payment of the 100 Pag^s. declares that Muta Mars Conicoply Came to him in Company with another man whom he took to be Servant of Estra's for 100 Pag^s. and that he Order'd his Brother to pay it to him and Entred it in his Account as paid to Mutamar on Estra's Account.

—FORT ST. GEORGE, MAY 1725—

China Summadru declares he paid the 100 Pagodas his Brother had Order'd to Mutamars Conicoply in Company with a Servant of Estra's but is not Sure whether it was her Conicoply or no.

Vereta Mutamars Conicoply Declares that it was Opia Estra's Conicoply that went along with him to Summadru and was with him when Summadrew's Brother paid the 100 Pag^s. and further declares he paid the said Opia the 100 Pagodas for his Mistress.

Oppia the defendants Conicoply denys to have been along with Mutamarrs Conicoply to Summadrew when any money was paid that he knows nothing of the mony having been paid at all and that he never receiv'd it.

M^r. GEE Attorney for the defendant alledges the improbability of the mony being paid to the Conicoply Since Mutamarr upon Estra's Brother going away to Bengal had been ask'd several times about it and then Could not tell who it had been paid to which he might Certainly as well done then as now and Desires that Francisco Delure might be examin'd who was Accordingly call'd in and declares that Francisco Gregorie Brother of Estra Gregorie sent for Mutamarr and Ask'd him whether he had paid 100 Pag^s. to her and where it was or to whom it was paid But would give no further Answer than it is where it is.

Comrapah declares that the Defendant Sent to him and went to Chicas House and ask'd him whether he had receiv'd it he Answer'd he had not and further he ask'd the Plaintiff where is that 100 Pagodas and he Answer'd where it is there it is.

Perseramah declares that about a month ago Paupa Braminy Carried the Deponent with two more to the house of Chinado where this deponent heard the said Paupa Braminy ask the said Chinado what he meant by telling his Mistress Estra Gregorie that he had receiv'd the 100 Pagodas and that he wanted to advise him about it but that Estra Gregorie kept him so long that he had no Opportunity and that Chinado then ask'd the said Paupa Braminy where was one Balua a Peon who lived at Triplicane and told him that when Sumadru went to his Church He would get him to send for him and would likewise go with Sumadru and that he would give that Peon some Piscash to make him say that he had receiv'd the 100 Pag^s. & paid it to Estra Gregorie.

The Peon Ballua and Conicoply Chinado not being present M^r. Gee Attorney for the Defendant desired that they may be summon'd which was Agreed to &c^{ra}.

ORDER'D therefore that it be deferr'd till next Court day.

Novem^r. 24th. THE plaintiff was ask'd what time the mony was paid.

ANSWERD the 15th. of May in the year 1723.

M^r. Gee in behalf of the defendant informs the Court that Mutamarr being Indebted to her that she often sent to him for this 100 Pagodas and was put off from time to time but at last her brother Francisco Gregorie promised her to be Accountable for the mony and from that time forward she never troubled Mutamarr about it but upon her Brothers going away in July last she made up Accounts wth. him but found he had not Credited her for the 100 Pag^s. he had promised to be Accountable to her for Mutamarr and said he had forgott to ask him for it therefore had not put it in his Account And then Mutamarr was sent for to her Brother who acknowledges he had not paid him the mony but would give no further Answer than it is where it is and did not then say it was paid to the Conicoply. She also produces a Certificate from her Brother that the mony was not paid him and Adds that Estra Gregorie is willing to take her Oath that She never Receiv'd the mony and that she had never sent to Mutamarr after her Brother had Agreed to be Accountable for it till about the time of his going away in July last.

VerkaTachelum Bodeinda and Persia Ramah declares that Chinado acknowledg' to them that Mutamarr had taxed him with receiving the 100 Pagodas.

—FORT ST. GEORGE, MAY 1725—

Chinado denies that ever he said that Mutamarr had tax'd him with it and declares that Oppia VenkaTachelum Podunda and Persia Ramah brought him Mutamarrs Account Curr^t. wherein 100 Pagodas was mention'd to be paid to Oppia and that he had told his Mistress he had not receiv'd it and Ask'd him what he should do in the Case and that he the said Chinado answer'd he wondred how he dare to say he had not Receiv'd it Since he knew he had been four or five times to Demand it.

Latcheram being call'd as a Witness Declares that his Mistress sent him to Demand the mony of Mutamarr and that Mutamarr Carried him to Checa's House where they talk'd about the affair and afterwards bid him go and speak to the defendant that Checa would pay the mony which Accordingly he did.

And Latcheram being ask'd what time it was when he Demanded the mony says he Could not well remember the time but that he believes it was three months before Checa went away.

The Peon Ballua declares that Chinado did not offer him any mony at all nor spoke to him to say any thing in the Case and that he is ignorant of the whole matter.

The Bench thinking it Proper to have some time to Consider of this affair it is Agreed

December 1st. ORDERED that it be deferr'd till next Court Day.

Sumadru was ask'd whether he would take his Oath to what he had declared in the foregoing Court days he acquainted the Bench that neither himself or any of his Family ever did and desired to be excused for that he Could not do it upon any Account whatsoever. Sumadru declares further that as he was walking by her house Estra Call'd him in & ask'd him for the hundred Pagodas which the said Mutamarr had Order'd him to pay That he then gave her for answer he would pay her in two or three Days.

The Bench having in the Preceeding Court days fully heard both partys and taken the Declarations of such as were produced as Evidences and after having spent a Considerable time in Debating on the affair Agreed to come to some Resolution Concerning the 100 Pagodas enterr'd in Mutamarrs Account Currant with Seignora Estra and said therein to be paid to her whereupon the following Questions were put to the bench Whether Verda Mutamarrs Conicoply should be allow'd to take his Oath to the Payment of the mony and Whether upon taking his Oath Accordingly the Conicoply Oppia upon whom he thereby fixes it Should be adjudged to have receiv'd it which were resolv'd in the Affirmative.

BECAUSE that this Conicoply Verda fixes the sum upon Oppia and since he denies to have receiv'd it It remains for the Plaintiff to prove the Payment and the Oath of the Evidence in the Affirmative has been always Esteem'd in this Court of Greater Validity and Consequently taken before any negative oath.

It being mention'd that the Usual method of Administring the Oath in Court was not Deem'd so Solemn as the taking an Oath at the Pagoda,

ORDERED therefore that Paupa Braminy who officiates for the interpreter he being indisposed see this administer'd in that manner.

It was then put to the vote whether Oppiah should be accountable to Seignora Estra or to Mutamar and it was AGREED that he should be accountable to his mistress and Seignora Estra to Mutamar because that this Conicoply is well known to have been employed in Transacting business for her and that as both the Sumadru's declare the one that a Person came along wth. Mutamar's Conicoply whom he Took to be a servant of Estra's the other that some one Servant of Estra's was with the Conicoply of Mutamar as more particularly may be Seen by their Examinations and declarations in the foregoing Court days when the sum of one hundred pagodas is Said to be paid to Mutamarr's Conicoply and that as Estra had herself asked this

mony of Sumadru on Accôt. of Mutamarr's debt to her and further y^e. oath of the Conicoply that he paid the s^d. sum to Oppiah at the Time he received it of Chinia Sumadru and it being mentioned upon the Cajans of the s^d. Chinia Sumadru that the sum was paid to the Mutamar's Conicoply acco^t. his debt, to Estra, and that as he was a Servant of her's he is thereby accountable to her, and she to Mutamarr, as the sum was received on acco^t. of his Said Mistress Estra Gregorio.

Dyer Read as entered hereafter desiring Leave to traverse goods which by sever^l. accidents were prevented being put upon their own ships on the Malabar Coast and w^{ch}. are designed as part of the s^d. ship's China cargoes and not proper for this place. Petitioner's money giving them Little or no satisfaction but what they obliged him to by attaching his Effects wherever they could find them and one Peria Tombee Lately arrived from Cochin informed Yo^r. Petitioner that he had 600 pagodas of the s^d. Alano's in his hands w^{ch}. we have Since attached & are Since informed that he has brought hither of the s^d. Alano's to the amount of sixteen hundred pagodas to buy Stores and necessaries for his Ship therefore Yo^r. Petitioners humbly requests this Worspl Bench to order the money already attached to be delivered them & to Enquire about the other sum suspected to be deposited in the hands of the s^d. Peria Tombee &c^t.

M^r. Fleetwood Attorney appearing in the behalf of the Defend^t. and desiring Time till the next Court day to give in his answer it was agreed to and ORDER'D that it be Deferred.

May 7th. Petition read the 2^d. Time.

Answer Read and Filed shewing that the Defendant is entirely unacquainted with the debts that has been Contracted with the Plaintiff as is Sett forth in his petition; and as to his having any money of Alano's in his Possession this Defendant utterly denies but acknowledges that he was necessitated for money at Acheen w^{ch}. he took up on the Owner's acco^t. and payable in Pegue w^{ch}. accounts he is ready to produce to his s^d. Owners whenever they are required; but as there has been such insufficient grounds for an Action to be Taken out against Yo^r. Petitioner therefore prays that his cause may be dismissed &c^t.

The Defendant being asked if he had any money of the said Alano's in his hands denies that he has any except what he is to make good at Pegue. He owns that upon the Exchange of his brigantine with Alano's ship there was a difference of 400 pag^s. due to Alano w^{ch}. he did not pay him but writ to M^r. Townshend in Pegue to pay it and in case he does not comply he has ordered his brother to pay it. He also owns that he had Brimstone and other things w^{ch}. he was to pay to M^r. Alano with the Respondentia at Pegue.

M^r. Fournier being Called in, declares that he heard Alano say at Acheen that he Lent Peria Tombee 1640 pag^s. being for the difference of the exchange of the Vessels & for Brimstone &c^t. sold him w^{ch}. was to be paid him with the Respondentia at Pegue & further says that he also Sent by the s^d. Peria Tombee a Box of Amber to be d^d. to M^r. Vincent at Pondicherry in order to buy arms &c^t. as ¶ List he gave him and further declares that he heard the s^d. Alano say that the money belonged to the King of the Maldives.

The Defendant being asked what effects he had on b^d. Alano's brigantine that was to go to Pegue Sufficient to discharge that Respondentia he was to pay him there answers that he had several goods aboard w^{ch}. he has not the List of by him now but will produce it next Court day.

ORDERED therefore that it be Deferred.

That in the Government of M^r. Collett, Yo^r. Petition^r. being Taken ill, Retired to Triplicane for his health, during w^{ch}. Time Jaldoo Papaya, Canawarum Ramana, Pollawarum Yelleapa, Batzu Collastri and Tirtawasy having sold grain privately and in an illegal manner by a Small measure and not by Mercall; contrary to the Honble Company's orders, Farmer Kistna being by such clandestine practices defrauded of his duty, discovered them and brought his complaint to Governour Collett and the then Mayor of this corporation, M^r. Horden; whereupon the five abovementiond offenders were Committed to prison, with intention to punish them severely for their said offence; but Yo^r. Petitioner was inform'd they were in a Little time released by means of Sunca Vencatachelum, upon a consideration paid to the then Govern^r. and M^r. Horden. Yo^r. Petition^r. being all this while at a distance, neither had, nor cou'd have any Knowledge of that transaction between them, nor act as Interpreter in it, nor rece^d. any part of y^e. THE HUMBLE PETITION OF ZELLIPOLLI SHESHA & NAGULOU

SHEWETH

That in Govern^r. Collet's Time, Jaldou Papaya, Cannawarum Ramanaya, Pollawarum Yellapa, Batzu Collastri and Tirtawasy having sold grain clandestinely, without y^e. knowledge of Farmer Kistna, by a small measure, and not by Mercall, according to the Company's orders, the s^d. Farmer having detected the fraud, complained of it to Govern^r. Collett and the then Mayor M^r. Horden; whereupon the s^d. offenders being Committed in order to be tried and punished, they Sent a message to Suncah Moodu Rama & Vencatachelum, praying them to use their Interest and endeavours for procureing their being set at Liberty, without punishment; upon w^{ch}. an agreement was made to pay Gov^r. Collett Pag^s. 2000.—and M^r. Horden 1000 more, on condition they should be so discharged, w^{ch}. was actually Comply'd with. But in Govern^r. Elwick's Time the abovementioned Five men having Chosen M^r. Tullie their Attorney, sued M^r. Horden in the Mayor's court, for having obliged them to pay him Pag^s. 3000 without a just Consideration, and Sent for yo^r. petitioners to give evidence that they had paid him s^d. sum; but they positively refused giving such evidence, it being contrary to Truth, & told them they wo^d. for no consideration perjure themselves; whereupon the s^d. Jaldou Papaya & c^t. were very angry with Your Petitioners and acquainted Sunca Vencatachelum of their having refused to give the evidence required, and he informed Govern^r. Elwick of it, who was very much displeas'd with yo^r. Petitioners for refusing. Afterwards Yo^r. Petitioners were summoned to court to make oath as to the Truth of the matter, w^{ch}. they did, that they the s^d. Jaldou Papaya & c^t. paid Govern^r. Collett Pag^s. 2000 and M^r. Horden 1000, whereupon Yo^r. Petitioners were ordered by the Court to withdraw. Next court the said Jaldou Papaya & c^t. suborned false evidence who made oath y^t. they paid the s^d. money into Yo^r. Petitioner's hands, whereupon Yo^r. Petitioners were asked by the bench whether the Fact was true; who declared that being Shroffs, the s^d. Jaldou Papaya & c^t. brought the money to them to be tried whether it was good, hav^g. peons to carry it, and after Trial made of it, carried it back again. Upon this the Court gave judgment against yo^r. Petition^{rs}. that they sho^d. pay the money, and they appealed from that judgment, to the Govern^r. and Council, who confirm'd y^e. Judgment of the Mayor's court. Yo^r. Petitioners being then afraid, desired Sunca Challum to make up the matter to prevent their being brought into Trouble on that account, who told Yo^r. Petition^{rs}. that if they wou^d pay the Govern^r. Pag^s. 600 in that case he wo^d. make it up; but Yo^r. petitioners representing that their Circumstances wo^d. not allow of paying so much, he orderd Yo^r. Petition^{rs}. to bring him Pag^s. 300 w^{ch}. were accepted of and paid; but he Required Yo^r. Petitioners to charge Ancona with hav^g. oblig'd the abovementioned five persons to pay him Pag^s. 3000 on the accot afores^d. who answerd they woud not perjure themselves, having never paid Ancona any such money: then Suncah Moodu Rama and Vencatachelum were very angry with Your Petitioners and urged them to procure two persons that used to attend us, to become evidence, and oblige them to make oath y^t. they had paid Ancona the money above, telling Yo^r. Petitioners that in the same manner as these five men have Suborned evidence to charge the Fact upon you, you must bring other Evidence to charge it upon Ancona, and added that if Yo^r. Petition^{rs}. wo^d. not undertake what they proposed, they (Yo^r. Petitioners) sho^d. rot in prison. Upon the whole Yo^r. Petitioners being very apprehensive that these men woud do them all the mischief they could in time comeing, if they did not comply with what was proposed to them, Yo^r. DECLARATION OF SHESHADREE AND RAGONA Company's Peons attending
M^r. RICHARD HORDEN when Mayor of this City.

Five Merchants namely Calliani Chittee, Pollawarum Yellapa, Zaldupapaya, Tirtawassi & Batzu Arnageri having obliged themselves to pay to the then Govern^r. M^r. Collett and to the s^d. M^r. Horden a sum of money Jangamaya and Kistna peons were ordered to collect it; but not using diligence Enough M^r. Horden ordered us to their assistance & to bring him the s^d. money with all Expedition. Accordingly we went and Joined the other Peons and obliged the abovenamd five men to raise the money Viz^t. Pag^s. 3000 who carried it to the house of the Shroffs Zellipolli Sheshah and Nagulou to try it bidding them untie the bags and look at it which they did and returned it; afterwards the s^d. Merchants and we went with the money to M^r. Horden who was then at his gardenhouse where having Taken out Pag^s. 1000 he returned them 2000 ordering them to carry it to the Govern^r. M^r. Collett w^{ch}. they did Immediately being ordered to give M^r. Horden's service to the Govern^r. and to Tell his Honour that he had sent them to him. Having delivered this message to Dubashe Ramanapa he acquainted his Hon^r. of it and the Merchants were presently introduced to him by s^d. Dubashe who returned soon after and Told us the Governour gave his service to M^r. The Measuring duty Farmer Kistna having discovered the following five Merchants Viz^t. Batzu Arnageri, Tirtawassy, Carnawarum Ramanayah, Zaldu Papaya & Pollawarum Yellapa defrauding him of his duty by measuring out grain brought them from Cadolre by a small measure & not by Mercall the s^d. Farmer complained of it to the s^d. M^r. Horden who was Sea Customer as well as Mayor at that Time who took Kistna along with him to the then Govern^r. M^r. Collett and informed him of the Fraud. Whereupon I and another Peon one Kistna in the Company's service was orderd to bring the fores^d. offenders before his Honour, w^{ch}. we accordingly did but knows not what passed between the Govern^r. and them. After they came out from him Dubashe Ramanapa ordered us to confine the abovenamed Merchants close prisoners in the Choultry Cockhouse saying they were very Guilty and that it was his Honour's further orders that no body should be permitted to Speak with them, which we put in Execution. A fortnight after Sunca Vencatachelum came & Told us that he having discoursed our Masters meaning the Govern^r. and Mayor they had orderd the s^d. prisoners to be delivered him and that we Sho^d. be guard upon them. Having askd M^r. Horden if it was so orderd us He Confirmed said order & we Continued to guard them 4 or 5 days after, during w^{ch}. Time whatever Sunca Vencatachelum told us relating to that matter we reported it to M^r. Horden who sent Two peons more to joyn us wth. orders to Collect a Sum of money with all dispatch

which was Performed and the s^d. Merchants and we carried the bags to Shroffs Zellipolli Shesha and Nagulou to have it Tryed who open'd the bags tryed the money and putting it into the same bags again Tyed them and returned them to the Merchants containing 1000 pag^s. Each w^{ch}. we Carried Immediately to M^r. Horden and they had some discourse with him but to what purpose we the s^d. Peons could not Tell. Then M^r. Horden ord^d. us to Carry them the fores^d. Merchants and Two of the bags to the Governour; on the way we asked them how much they had paid M^r. Horden, they answered Pag^s. 1000 and that the other 2000 were for the Govern^r. We applied ourselves to his Dubashe Ramanapa and acquainted him that we were ordered by M^r. Horden to bring the s^d. Merchants and money to the Governour who being told of it they were presently introduced to his Hon^r. by his s^d. Dubashe. After some Conversation they came out and the Dubashe with them who ordered us to Tell M^r. Horden that his Hon^r. had rece^d. Pag^s. 2000 and had no further business with the s^d. merchants w^{ch}. message we deliverd and they were accordingly Sett at Liberty.

That the five following Merchants Batzu Arnageri, Tirtawassy, Carnavarum Ramanaya, Zaldu Papaya and Pollawarum Yellapa having brought false Evidence to make oath in the Mayor's court that they the s^d. Merchants had paid Shroffs Sesha and Naguloo Pag^s. 3000, the said Shroffs being returned home from Court were very much afflicted and full of apprehensions and sent for me and when I was come beg'd me earnestly to give my assistance to save their Houses, upon which I was prevailed upon to give evidence in Court in their behalf, and at their desire to the following purpose viz^t. That happening to be at Ancona's house to buy Rupees Janga Maya and Arnachelum brought him the s^d. Shroffs engaged us to swear but I the Surviving Evidence now declare that I never went into the s^d. That Sunca Moodu Ramah being at Triplicane sent for me to Madrass to come to him and being come he ordered me as follows. Batzu Arnageri, Tirtawassy, Carnavarum Raman[aya], Zalldupapaya and Pollawarum Yellapa these five Merchts having in Govern^r. Collett's Time paid him the s^d. Governour Pag^s. 2000 and 1000 more to M^r. Horden then Mayor they had afterwards charged Shroffs Sesha and Naguloo with having received s^d. money; but that they the s^d. Shroffs were now resolved to Charge Ancona with having received it. Therefore you must find Ancona out wherever he is, and acquaint him of this, and that if he will pay Pag^s. 600 I will oblige the s^d. shroffs to pay 400 more, w^{ch}. will make up the sum of Pag^s. 1000 with which I will endeavour to Satisfie these Merchants. I accordingly went and deliverd the message to Ancona, who answered that he neither was interpreter, nor any other way Employed in that affair, nor rece^d. money from anybody on account of it, and that he never saw the Pag^s. 3000 abovemenconed, but that Sunca Vencatachelum managed that whole affair with Govern^r. Collett and M^r. Horden, and therefore knew

not for what reasons he sho^d. pay the Pag^s. 600 demanded of him; altho Sunca Moodu Ramah had sent me, how I dared to come to him on such an Errand, that he would not pay one Cash on that account, that powerfull Gentlemen will dispose of my houses and gardens, it seems contrary to Law; but Let him see to it, that when he was once recovered of his Sickness, he would return to Madrass and apply for Justice, w^{ch}. he doubted not to obtain, and then they would be obliged to return him his Effects. I Returned to Madrass and acquainted Suncah Moodu Ramah with what is above w^{ch}. is all I know of the matter.

219. 1. 20 altho demanded by the Supracargoes of the Middlesex & James & Mary in the year 1721 was never yet Recovered.

FOURTH, FIFTH & SIXTH ARTICLES.

That in the year 1721/22 the old Sultan being willing to shake off the fatigues of Government, resigned his Crown to the priuce his Son, and to Fix it firm on his head, commanded all the Governing and trading people to reside at Caitongee, which is remote from Banjar Forty miles, the Country People being a long Time ignorant of any Shipp's arrival there, w^{ch}. causes a Scarcity of all provisions, w^{ch}. I aver to be Cent Φ Cent dearer than the first Time the James and Mary was there, that the two aforementioned ships Princess Emelia and King George carried from England Deals, nails and other necessaries for their mills & garbling and weighing of Pepper viz^t. scales, weights, Corn Fans, seivar &c^t. and lay in the river, and in a more favourable Season than when the James & Mary was there, so that their boats might return aboard Every day, thô the consequence had like to have been fatal to them both w^{ch}. the Hon^{ble} President & Council is no strangers to; both ships coming to this place with Small Investments, the general instructions I have had these two last Voyages from the Hon^{ble} Court of Directors and the Experience of the Treachery of those people obliged me to use such precautions to bring the Treasure up in such small Sums, as not to tempt them to any ill design upon us, nor we to fear them, having such a number of people at the Factory. An Objection being Started that it was now upwards of three Years since these affairs had been in court and that according to rule no appeal can be Lodged above three days after judgment was given Anconah was called in and urged that he had for many months before Mr. Elwick came to the Government been ill and in the country for the recovery of his health and that at that very Time when his Houses and gardens &c^t. were sold he was ill at Arcott, that not having y^e. use of his limbs he could not come down but that he wrote both to Mr. Elwick and Mr. Oadham the then Mayor request^e. that they would not proceed to sell his houses and goods till he could come to answer for himself w^{ch}. he would do as soon as he was well and answer all just demands on him. Copy of his Letter to Mr. Elwick was produced and read which is ordered to be entered as was Likewise a Letter from one Appanah Vencaty Putty to Anconah wherein he tells him that Sunca Rama has offered Mr. Elwick very large sums on his (Anconah's) Accot but that Kistna had prevailed on him to give him a protection for thirteen hundred pagodas from whence it appearing that Anconah really desired to come and made application for a protection as likewise that he was ill all which was confirmed by Paupa Braminy who declared he translated the Letter to the Governour and that he made answer that it was very well Anconah might come when he was recovered. It was RESOLVED to go on with the Examination since Anconah appears plainly to have been hindered from applying sooner by unavoidable accidents and not by any design.

The Subject of the papers entered after Consultacon of y^e. 12th. of this Instant were then entered upon and Anconah having in his petition charged five grain Merchants, Two Shroffs Suncamooda Rama and Vencatachelum with having Suborned False witnesses who had obtained a judgment against him whereby he was a Sufferer to the amount of Ten thousand pagodas, likewise the two Shroffs declaring y^e. Sunca Rama had a great part in this affair and was the cause of their procuring false evidence against Anconah, also Sever^l. peons having witnessed to the payment of the money neither to Ancona or the Shroffs but by the Five Grain Merchts themselves to Mr. Collett and Mr. Horden, and further one of the Evidences against Ancona having declared himself perjured It was unanimously AGREED that Anconah had nothing to do in y^e. Affair and therefore the Court misled by the positive orders of Two witnesses had given a wrong judgment so that it was just Ancona sho^d. not be a Sufferer.

Sashia adds as a proof hereof that he expressed a great deal of Concern upon this occasion immediately to sever^l. persons particularly to Poncala Kistna.

Anconah into a Dooly and told him they were going wth. him to the Nabob but that they carried him to Moodu Rama's who Kept him four & Twenty hours and made him give a receipt as above after he could not prevail upon him to deliver up the bond, one thousand of which Moodu Ramah sayd was paid to him in Madrass and the other Thirteen hund^d. was to be given to the Nabob.

All the Concerned in the other affair being then withdrawn, it was argued that from the whole it appeared Anconah had been very unjustly used and ought to have Reparation but that as it did not appear these five merch^{ts}. had been any ways instrumental in the damage done him they ought not to pay any more than what had been paid them out of his estate with the Interest; on the other hand it was urged that these Five persons having unjustly obtained a Judgment against the Shroffs were the occasion of their obtaining a further unjust verdict and Execution against Ancona & were therefore the original cause of his ruin and also that Sunca Ramah who is a Relation of these Five persons ought to bear his proportion in making satisfaction to Ancona since by the foregoing declarations and Examinations it appeared he had been a Chief Instrument in y^e. affair.

This matter was argued on both sides for a considerable Time after which the opinions of each person were Collected as follows.

M^r. HOUGHTON that what houses were sold occasioned by this prosecution of Sashia and Naguloo against Anconah sho^d. be valued and the value paid by these five Merchants and that the other sum and interest shall be paid.

M^r. DRAKE that the Five Merchants are only chargeable with the money they have received with interest for the Time and that Ancona has an action against Sashia and Naguloo for as much money as he can recover.

M^r. HUBBARD is of opinion that the Five Merchants are to pay the money they have received with interest & all charges and damages to fall upon the Shroffs Sashia and Naguloo.

M^r. FOWKE It appears to me that the Five Merchants and Shroffs are all equally Concerned in the damages that Anconah sustained and each to pay a Seventh part and if Sunca Ramah be proved concerned he likewise to be Charged with a proportion of the damage.

M^r. EMMERSON that the Five Merchants do pay the money they have received with Interest and that Anconah have an action against Sashia and Naguloo.

M^r. BENYON joins in opinion with M^r. Emmerson.

M^r. TURNER that the five Merchants do pay the money they have received with Interest and that the Shroffs be also answerable to Anconah for Further damages and if it Shall be proved that Sunca Ramah was the adviser or Contriver of the Shroff's suborning evidence to swear the matter upon Anconah that he also be Answerable to Anconah for damages.

THE PRESIDENT agrees that the Five Merchants do pay the money w^{ch}. they have received out of the sale of Anconas Effects with the interest and that if it shall appear that Sunca Ramah or any other have been instrumental in the injustice done Anconah he or they shall make good his damages.

The majority of the board being of this opinion, it was accordingly ORDERED that the Five Merchants sho^d. pay all they had received with the Interest from the Time they rec^d. it and that a State of Anconah's case sho^d. be fairly drawn out with his Vouchers for what he sho^d. charge on Sunca Rama or any other for the further consideration of the board.

I Received your Letter and observe the Contents thereof. I have delivered all the Letters you sent me into Kistna's hands which he has delivered to the persons for whom they were directed. The Governour's letter particularly Kistna deliverd into his Hon^{rs}. own hands with which the Governour was well pleased & Told Kistna that he would write Two Letters one to Tyre Cawn and another to Velle Mahomud all w^{ch}. Kistna told me.

In relation to this affair Sunca Vencatachelum & Kistna have an understanding together and Sunca Vencatachelum has offered the Govern^r. large sums of money on y^e. occasion but Kistna after much entreaty has prevailed with his Honour at last to accept of Thirteen Fanams Pag^s. 1300, of which he the s^d. Kistna acquainted me. Likewise one Vencataputty a Peon told me the Same thing and desired me to write it you and procure your answer. Kistna desired likewise the same thing of me. I Therefore desire you will write a Letter to Kistna with all Speed. The Governour has likewise promised Kistna that he will Send the Cowle i.e. a Pardon for all that you must write in plain Terms to Kistna. On that condition he is ready to Settle yo^r. affairs.

WE UNDERSUBSCRIBERS Merchants of Madrass do certify that in M^r. Collet's government the measuring-duty-Farmer Kistna having made Complaint to the then Govern^r. and to M^r. Rich^d. Horden at that time Mayor of this city that the five follow^s. Merchants Zalldou Papaya, Canawarum Ramanaya, Pollawarum Yellapa, Batzu Collastree and Tirtawasi had defrauded him of the said duty and were guilty of a breach of the Company's orders by Selling Grain by a smaller measure than allowed they were upon his complaint committed to prison in order to be punished as they deserved, that Soon after we were informed that the s^d. Offenders having made Application by Certain persons to Govern^r. Collett and M^r. Horden they were released. That in M^r. Elwicks governm^t. while Goda Anconah was in the Country for the recovery of his health the abovementioned Five Merchants chargd Shroffs Shashia and Naguloo with having received of them Pag^s. 3000 and they the s^d. Shroffs to clear themselves charged Ancona with having received said sum upon which judgment was given against him by the Mayor's court in his absence & his houses, gardens, paddy &c^t. were sold and the produce paid to y^e. said five Merchants all which we declare upon our certain knowledge to have been obtained by procuring of false witness against the s^d. Ancona who was no ways concerned in the affair and therefore was a very Great injustice. We further declare and certify that having made enquiry of the s^d. Shashia and Naguloo what they knew in relation to the paying the foresaid sum of Pag^s. 3000 they answered that y^e. abovenam^d. five Merchants accompanied by Peons brought it to them to be Shroffed w^{ch}. being done that they immediately carryd it away & that they the s^d. shroffs did not pay it to Ancona that we Likewise have enquired of the forementioned Five Merchants relating to the payment of that money to Ancona and they all affirm they did not pay it to him, that having made the same enquiry of the Peons who attended them while they Collected the money they answered that the foresaid five Merchants and they carried it to the Shroffs to be Shroffed and afterwards from thence to Govern^r. Sashia and Nagana appeald in Consultacon who after examination gave order that the said Sashia and Nagana sho^d. pay yo^r. Petitioners according to the judgment of the Worsp^l. Court part of w^{ch}. money Your Petitioners have received and there remains due to Y^r. Petitio^{ns}. the Sum of Pag^s. 871. 6. 6 besides near 40 pag^s that Y^r. PONCALA KISTNA declares on oath that in Govern^r. Collett's Time he rented measuring duty when the plaintiffs measured grain out of a Lesser measure than usual upon w^{ch}. (as he had a duty thereon) he Complain'd of the s^d. plaintiffs M^r. Horden then Mayor who thereupon Imprisoned them he believes fourteen twenty days, that after the Plaintiffs were released again he heard them Talk having paid a Large sum for their Liberty, that he was at M^r. Horden's house with these Plaintiffs when the matter was made up and heard Ancona M^r. Horden dubashe ask and demand of Each man 500 pag^s. for his Master but he does not know what money was paid but has heard & verily believes they paid about 30 pagodas.

RAMDOSS declares on oath that he knows the Plaintiffs were imprisoned & believes they Continued there seven or eight days in Govern^r. Collett's time, that one day Ancona M^r. Horden's Dubashe sent for him to Triplicane, that when he arrived he found the s^d. Ancona's Conicopy had drawn out sever^l. obligacons upon Caj for sums of money due from the plaintiffs to Poncala Kistna. He adds that he knew these sums were for their releasement & saw them Sign the said Obligacons w^{ch}. to the best of his remembrance were abo^t. 6 or 700 pagodas each but further sayeth not.

SASHIA M^r. Horden's Conicopy says he knows the plaintiffs were imprisoned and has heard that they made up a Sum of 2 or 3000 pagodas and paid it for their releasement.

SASHIA being asked if he never heard Ancona Talk of this affair makes answer that Ancona and the Plaintiffs used to Talk together at Ancona's house but that Ancona never Told him what they said that one day Jangomayah a peon attendant upon M^r. Horden and Ancona and y^e. Plaintiffs brought to his house some money to be shroffed w^{ch}. he shroffed but Knows not for what purpose tho he has heard it was to be paid for the releasement of the Plaintiffs.

THE BENCH think it proper to swear SASHIA to answer to the Truth of what Questions shall be asked him relating to this affair and declare what he Knows of the matter.

SASHIA is accordingly Sworn and declares that y^e. plaintiffs signed four bonds in Triplicane he thinks for Pag^s. 3500 which were wrote in Poncala Kistna's name and given to Ancona, that Jangomayah aforementioned was the person that used to go and frô to collect this money and as often as he received any, deposited it in Naguloo's shop he says particularly that Jellda Mella's money was not so soon received as the rest for to compleat the whole sum he lent the s^d. Jellda Mella 2 or 300 pagodas some grain, that when all the money was gathered together in Naguloo's and his house it was fetchd away by the s^d. Jangomayah and the Petitioners who told him as likewise did Ancona, that 100 of it was for Juggoo Govern^r. Collett's dubashe, for Ancona, 2000 for Govern^r. Collett and 1000 for M^r. Horden. He adds that he asked Jangomayah where he was going to carry y^e. money and he made answer at Ancona's house.

CONDIPILLA GRUAPA being Sworn declares that he knows M^r. Horden's peon to take the plaintiffs out of their houses & Imprisoned them, that they Continued in prison 15 or 20 days, that the day they were cleared he went with them to Ancona's garden at Triplicane when Ancona made 4 bills in Poncala Kistna's name for he thinks 3000 pagodas w^{ch}. the Plaintiffs signed.

RAMADOS declares on oath that he remembers to have sign'd as witness to one of the bonds and believes he Likewise sign'd as Such to the other Three.

NAGULOO being Sworn, declares that as the above s^d. 3000 pagodas was collected it was brought to his & Sashia's shop but then he paid that Sum to Jangomayah & the Plaintiffs who at that same time told him M^r. Horden had made them pay that Sum wrongfully.

JANGOMAYAH a Choultry Talliar, being Sworn declares that the Plaintiffs were imprisoned by M^r. Horden's order in Govern^r. Collet's Time and Kept in y^e. Choultry, that they were there 3 days without having any Victuals being close locked up, that then Sashia came to him and desired him to let the prisoners go to a house hard by for a Little while to eat w^{ch}. he did but as soon as M^r. Horden heard thereof he sent for all the Talliards and checked 'em very Severely Particularly himself and at that Time threated Sashia with punishment if he ever Troubled himself with his prisoners again and sent Jangomayah to watch the plaintiffs where they remained 20 or 21 days afterwards and then they were released by M^r. Horden's order.

SASHIA Confirms what the deponent Says.

UPON THE WHOLE the Bench are Satisfied that y^e. Plaintiffs were imprisoned by M^r. Horden but there is no proof made of the money being paid to him they therefore Clear him of this action and as Sashia & Naguloo acknowledge to have received the 3000 pagodas at their shop, Give judgment that they pay the Plaintiffs that Sum with cost of Suit.

MADULLA KISTNAMA a Broker Inhabitant of Madrass being Sworn declares that he was one day at Anconah's house to buy Rupees, that he came there with Arnachilum

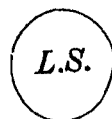

I Presume to lay this before Your Hon^r. & C^t. hoping & requesting you will be pleased to Consider of and appoint a proper place for keeping the said Bags in order to prevent any Frauds the Company may otherwise Sustain in that Branch of their customs.

The Committee you were pleased to appoint to Enquire into the Baseness of the present Current pagodas & to put a Stop to an abuse which will at last be attended with such dangerous consequences do now Humbly lay before y^o. their proceedings and opinion of the most proper remedy effectually to prevent this mischief without giving a Shock to Commerce.

We find upon examining the Shroffs that this has been a growing evil introduced by the corruption of y^o. Country Government in Conniving at the circulation of any sort of pagodas provided their profits from those who have the Liberty of Coining them are answerable and as this is so considerable an advantage to them it is not from the Nabob we are to expect any relief. Therefore we thought it most proper to have the opinion of the Merchants in general w^t. method we should pursue who on a meeting came to this resolution which we offer to Your Hon^r. & C^t. as what we likewise think Sufficient to answer the design without risking a Stagnation in the Circulation.

That Five Shops shall be appointed in the most Convenient parts of the Town for the Exchanging of all mony which is necessary for the Currency of the Buzar in each of which must be placed Two Shroffs, a Goldsmith and a Company's peon whose Stations are to be Changed every day with power to cut or deface all such pagodas as are found to be Bad; as to payments of large Sums the Merchants themselves will undoubtedly be cautious for their own Security and Take such care as not to be Imposed upon in what they Receive by employing such Shroffs in whose fidelity they may confide.

Council is an Authentick award stating the debt to a minute sum after thoroughly and maturely having perusd and Enquired into the proper Vouchers which is a Pregnant proof that they had perused the note Your Petitioner claims from. AT A COURT HELD AT THE TOWN HALL ON TUESDAY THE NINETEENTH INSTANT THE WORSHP^{LE}. FRANCIS ROUS ESQ^R. MAYOR—MESSIEURS EDWARD CROKE, JOHN POWNEY, JOSEPH HOUGHTON, THOM^S. WESTON, RICHARD CARTER AND WILLIAM MONSON ALDERMEN IN COURT ASSEMBLED.

Petition Read Second Time.

The Defendant being present and the said Petition Read to him denies that He was any ways Indebted to the Plaintiff but Confesses that his Father by name Yacombrum had contracted a Debt to the s^d. Poncala Kistna but that upon application to M^r. Oadham He had prevailed on the several Creditors Sunca Ramah, Olivo and the Plaintiff to forgive the debt in Consideration of the poor Circumstances of his said Father and himself they being very poor and working for their daily maintenance.

Poncala Kistna being called upon to prove his debt produced an Account Current the Ballance of w^{ch}. amounted to Pag^s. 485.27.—due from the s^d. Chellumbrum which ballance appearing to the Bench to arise from a Bond of 280 pagodas Principal and the Remainder to be Interest on the s^d. 280 pagodas He was called upon to produce the Bond to which He Replied He had delivered the Bond to M^r. Oadham to Recover the money that sometime ago He acquainted M^r. Elwick with this affair who ordered M^r. English in whose hands all M^r. Oadham's affairs lay to deliver to M^r. Hubbard the then Mayor all Cajans and Papers Relating to y^e. affair but that the Bond was somehow gone and he did not Know whether M^r. Oadham Received the money or not and that he only Received from M^r. English the Arbitration Award and the Penalty Bond they entered into about it both These He delivers To the Bench with the Translates of them which are Read which Arbitration award he thinks is a sufficient Proof that there was such a Bond as is demanded of Him thô He now cannot produce it. He further urges that as a proof the Defendant owed him the money about a month ago He drew up a new Bond and offered him but that not Liking the terms of said Bond He Refused and Tore it.

The Defendant in answer to this Repeats what He had before said of the debt being forgiven in Consideration of his and his Father's poverty and says further that M^r. Oadham cancelled the bond by Consent of the persons concerned in it to prove which He called M^r. English who declar'd to y^e. Bench that He Remembers the dispute to have been ended by M^r. Oadham and the Bond Cancelled He believes by the Consent of all parties and that He particularly Remembers Sunca Rama and Olivo Two of them told him they had agreed to the cancelling of this Bond upon condition that Poncala Kistna should agree Likewise.

Sunca Rama himself one of the Parties being in Court was likewise called upon by the Defendant and Confirms M^r. Englishes Testimony as to his (Sunca Ramahs) hav^g. agreed to the Cancelling this Bond.

The Defendant in answer to what the Plaintiff says about his having signed a new Bond declares that He was kept in close prison Ten days by the Peddi Naigue and that He was advised by the said Peddi Naigue to give a New Bond as the only means to get out of Prison.

The Peddi Naigue being present was asked about y^e. affair and gave the following account.

That upon Complaint of the s^d. Poncala Kistna to M^r. Sitwell the Defendant was brought to him by the s^d. Kistna and a peon of M^r. Sitwells who was then Mayor to be Taken into custody that a few days afterward the s^d. Chellumbrum made his escape and went to Pullicaatt that Hearing he was there he sent Peons and brought him in and that there being apprehensive of the said Chellumbrum's making a Second Escape He had confined him more closely than before. The Peddi Naigue adds that he did advise him to draw a new Bond w^{ch}. he did but that Kistna refused it saying he would have his money.

The Bench then proceeded to consider what had been said on both sides and were unanimous in their opinion that the Plaintiff had by no means proved his

demand, that indeed the Defendant did confess there had been such a bond but at the same time affirms that it was cancelled by the consent of the Creditors. It further appeared plain to the Bench that M^r. Oadham had made application to Sunca Rama and Olivo to forgive the debt and had gained their consents before he cancelled the said bond and it is very Probable that he had done the same by Poncala Kistna both because he wou'd scarce have ventured to have done such a thing without and also because the Consents of Sunca Rama and Olivo were given upon Condition that he gained the consent of Poncala Kistna wherefore the Bench give Judgment in favour of the Defendant and order the Pl^{ff}. to pay cost of suit.

The Company's orders about paying the beforementioned difference being read, it was Found that we were Positively enjoined to collect the money, but those Gentlemen appearing to have made the purchase purely with an eye to the Company's Interest, what Little of that Pepper was not sent home having been sold for profit, & the price for many years having been at or over Twenty two pagod^s. & Candy so that no private advantage could have induced them to do it, the Board were Inclina- ble to find out an Expedient to satisfie the Honble Company, and at the same time to be as easy as possible with the Gentlemen Concerned, accordingly It was propos- ed and the Question put whether the Board might not defer the Putting this order in execution, till it had been once more Represented to Our Honble Masters, if the several persons Concerned wo^d. give Bonds to be Accountable for their pro- portions of the overprice, if the Company sho^d. continue to insist upon it : which Question was unanimously Resolved in the affirmative, and the S^{ec}retary was directed to get Bonds drawn out accordingly.

The President and Mr. Pitt Representing to the Board that they with the Rev^d. Mr. Thomas Wendy were appointed Joint Attorneys to 'John Hastings Esq^r. of Greys-Inn, Brother to Francis Hastings Esq^r. late Govern^r. of this place and Administrator to his will to which Mr. Wendy afores^d. was an Executor in trust for the said John Hastings Esq^r. y^t. y^e. purport of the Letter of Attorney being to Audit and Settle all accounts relating to the s^d. estate, and that having reason to suspect some undue charges for commission &c^t. they had proposed to the said Mr. Wendy to adjust all matters by an arbitracon but that he had hitherto declined it; that therefore they might in some measure answer the Trust reposed in them, they had called upon Mr. Wendy to come before the Board, where they designed to make the same offer.

Mr. Wendy accordingly Appearing The President repeated the offer of an arbitration of either one or two persons on each side, and they jointly to chuse an Umpire in case of their differing in opinion, which Mr. Wendy again refused; but Told the Board He was willing to submit the accounts to the perusal of any one, but that as for the article of Commission, he would not put it in dispute. However He afterwards proposed an Arbitration of Three Persons on each side, which being Likely to occasion an infinite deal of trouble from the difficulty of Getting so many persons together who had business of their own to mind, He was asked whether he did really design to submit to an Arbitration or not, which he answered in the Negative, and then withdrew.

The President and Mr. Pitt then desired the Board to certifie under their Hands that they had made this offer to Mr. Wendy, and were refused, as also what had formerly passed in Consultation about such affairs, and to give declarations of the customs of this place in the Like cases, that so when this matter shall be adjudged in England, all the Light that can be, may be given to it w^{ch}. were readily complied with.

The Pay Master producing the Muster Rolls, and requesting Fifteen Hundred pagodas to defray Charges Garrison, ORDERD that it be advanced him.

Nundalal and Gopaldauze Farmers of the measuring duty Pay into cash one Hundred thirty six pagodas, twenty four Fanams for Two month's Rent of that Farm due the 20th. Ult^o.

Commission Appointing John Williams an Ensign at Fort St. David, produced and signed.

HONBLE SIR &C^t.

It is a very great surprise and concern to us to find our Honble Masters in their Letter of the 11th. November last do with so much resentment declare they Expect that the difference between eighteen & Twenty two pagodas the candy on a thousand

candies of Round Pepper should be paid them by those of the Council who agreed to y^e. purchase thereof, an expectation that more sensibly affects us by so much as we rather hoped and Expected to be commended for it as knowing our design was for their Interest and perhaps they have expressed themselves with more Severity upon the supposition the purchase was made directly contrary to their positive orders. We Confess if it really was so we shou'd have much less to say for ourselves than we think we may with reason do now for if we make it plain that our design was for their advantage in which however we have been mistaken in the consequence Yet that it was not then contrary to any order that forbid us we say if we make this appear we doubt not from their Justice and Equity and your Hon^{rs}. &c^t. Favourable Representation to them they will be induced to entertain very Contrary Thoughts of us and recede from an expectation that is attended with so much severity. This difference is not small it amounts to Four thousand pagodas and therefore we hope Your Hon^r. &c^t. will afford us your Patience till we have Set this matter in a full and true Light.

Some of us who were of Council with President Hastings do well remember He proposed about Twelve mo^s. before the purchase of this thousand candys that it wou'd be for the Company's advantage to purchase such a Quantity if it could be Bought not exceeding Twenty two pagodas a Candy & the reasons he gave for it were that Pepper at that price & at Half-Freight woud come much cheaper from hence than any they could have from the Malabar coast and there was then a notion among the Gentlemen of Council that Twenty Two Pagodas was the price we were Limited to by the Company however Pepper being all that year upwards of Twenty Three nothing further was said or done in it then but being offered a Quantity next year at Twenty two pagodas the Candy the same reasons had weight with us to accept thereof & we doubt not when your Hon^r. &c^t. considers the price that Pepper has been at for these Eight years past you will be persuaded no private gain could be considerable enough to induce us to forfeit our duty and Honesty by so material a purchase if we had not believed it for the Interest of our Masters on the contrary it can be testified to your Hon^r. &c^t. by a Member of the Board who had at the same time this was sending to the Company a Quantity of Pepper by him that the Warehousekeep^r. Offered him twenty two pagodas the candy for it but the Gentleman refused it alledging he could sell it otherwise for Twenty three pagodas $\frac{1}{2}$ candy and it will appear by the Warehousekeeper's accounts of that Time that after the ships had taken in all they could, the surplus was sold at 23 $\frac{1}{2}$ Candy.

Now touching its being contrary to the Company's orders we take the liberty to say notwithstanding our former prepossession we did not precipitately make this purchase but did first look back to see whether there were any orders against it or not. We remembered a Considerable quantity had been purchased by President Harrison and the Council and afterwards a large Quantity by President Collett. We looked over all M^r. Collet's letters that were sent with that purchased by him and found that the 17^o. August 1717 He wrote the Company thus. "Your Hon^{rs}. will observe that we have Bought up as much pepper at Twenty two pagodas $\frac{1}{2}$ candy as we thought sufficient for the ships we should dispatch this year and we could now sell it all for Profit but by the best estimate we can make we apprehend it to be for your Interest to ship it for England. We think there will be some considerable profit since you pay but half Freight and we apprehend your ships upon the Malabar coast may probably meet with disappointments in the Quantity they propose to Take the Dutch having made themselves Masters of Chittoa from whence the greatest quantity usually comes." Such a paragraph as this to a sett of men who were before of opinion the purchase would be for the Interest of their Masters confirmd therein by the reasons before them in that paragraph & others of the like nature concurring at the same Time & who were only debating with themselves whether it was not contrary to their orders might well incline them to believe it was not Especially when upon Perusing the answer to that Letter and all Letters that passed afterwards we could not find any manner of objection or indeed the least mention of Pepper at all from which we Concluded He had made that purchase in Conformity to some former orders if we could but find them at least that it was

approved of by the Company or otherwise that we sho^d. have found in some of their letters some Paragraph or other to forbid the purchase of any more but not finding upon our most curious enquiries any thing like it in all those Letters received in Mr. Collet's and Mr. Hastings's time We Believed we were acting agreeable to the orders and interest of our Masters at least not contrary to either.

We have already said that we Looked if there were any such orders and why when we found none we Believed there were none. We do indeed find in the Company's Letter dated 25^o. Jañry. 1716 they are pleased to say "we note your reason for buy^e. so much Pepper and if it was a disappointment to your new Competitors it doth in some measure answer while they are at market perhaps the commodity may keep up but Heretofore the old Company's stated price for Pepper was eighteen pagodas the Candy on your side and if sometimes it was at a Pagoda or two more the Captains woud gladly Pay that difference out of their Ship Stock well Knowing the Half Freight was clear gains to their Owners and We Compute the Bay Price set at nine to Ten Rupees is not more than eighteen pagodas a Candy the dis-appointment of having no Bencoolen ship this season made y^e. Pepper more acceptable at this Time and yet so great is the fall of it that what sold Two Years since from seventeen pence to near eighteen pence a pound will not now yeild twelve pence."

We shall not detain you with any arguments of our own but leave it with Your Hon^r. &c^t. and our Honble Masters whether upon a Reasonable interpretation of the same there be any positive order or Prohibition contained therein but we must remark that the paragraph we have Recited of Mr. Collet's was in answer to this of the Company's and it is plain He did not Take it as a prohibition certainly if we were to understand it otherwise we ought to have been Told so lest we should as indeed we did esteem their silence as a Tacit approbation of the purchase made by him and look upon that as a Precedent in future.

Further and in answer to what the Company are pleas'd to Say that at the same time we Purchased this Pepper we drew upon them for the amount at nine shillings the pagoda we hope it will not be look'd upon as a further aggravation if we say that the amount of our bills of Exchange was not anything more upon that account because we always did and do now understand that our Cash is to be open to receive all sums that are offered at the Company's stated rate of exchange and therefore as we had by this means a flowing Cash the sending home that Pepper was remitting part of what we drew for into their Hands which could not have been done in another manner as the ships were otherwise fully Loaden with Bales.

To Conclude We hope Your Hon^r. &c^t. are Persuaded that our views in the purchase of this pepper was to serve the Comp^a. that if we had not believed it was for their Interest we would not have consented thereto and further if there was any order to the contrary we were ignorant thereof we say Your Honour &c^t. being Persuaded of this We hope and desire you will cease any further proceedings upon this affair till the Company's further Pleasure shall be known.

You all doubtless have Heard of the action entered agai^{ust} the Attorney of M^r. Richard Horden by Goda Ancona for debts to him on bond and otherwise. We examined his demands, [find] them perfectly just and accordingly granted execution but [when] We Summoned the several persons on whom our Warrants [and] Attachments had been served We found them fully Determined to give no account and accordingly M^{rs}. Horden, M^r. Drake, M^r. [Croke], M^r. Medeiros and M^r. Samuel Court having been frequently [before] us, have evaded giving oath when demanded or to render any [answer] only Constantly denying that they had any effects or moneys in [their] Hands belonging to M^r. Horden.

The quality of the persons has for a Considerable Time [atoned] us to defer coming to any Resolutions Hoping at last they would be Convinced of the reasonableness of what Required of them and have Complied therewith but finding that our indulgence met with Contrary effects and had only exposed us to greater [con]tempt We determined to fix a time for finishing this affair accordingly appointed this day when all being duly Summoned appeared except M^r. Medeiros who having excused himself on acco^t. of this being Christmas-day according to the Portuguez and that therefore He could not possibly attend, we admitted [his] excuse. M^r. Court attended and took the oath required but M^{rs}. Horden Refused thō several Tiraes told the Bench insisted oath and added that she appealed to the Governour and Councill. M^r. The Representation of the Mayor and Aldermen Read last consultation, being taken into Consideration, it was AGREED that the Secretary do write them that we are determined to support them in the exercise of their Lawfull Authority, that if any of the Inhabitants out of the service, shall offer any Insult or Contempt, they have Sufficient authority to Fine them for the same, and that when Companys Servants shall be guilty of anything of that kind, the Board upon application made, will see them fully Righted.

Agreed that the Secry do write the Mayor & Aldermen in answer to their Representa^on that the authority of their Court shall be maintained.

The Import Warehousekeeper then inform'd the Board that the goods lying in several of the godowns allowed him, grow damp by being kept close which He is obliged to do, because the Rats and Bandcoots gnaw the Rattans of the windows, and So get among the goods: wherefore He desired that they would give orders for making the Casements of wire, by which means He sho^d. be able to Air the godowns, and yet Keep the Vermin out, which was AGREED to, and the Pay Master ordered to set about it Immediately.

The casements for the windows of the Bale-godowns to be made with wire for y^e. conveniency of airing the goods & at the same time keep. y^e. Vermin out.

WHEREAS the Tank near Padre Thomas Garden has belonged to y^e. Hon^{ble}. Company for above these fifty years, and a piece of Ground belonging to y^e. Gentue pagoda which Padre Thomas took in Exchange for another, which Dispute Gov^r. Hastings order'd to be decided by M^r. Fowke and M^r. Hugoney who know the truth of this Matter, Now the Padre has taken away from y^e. Tank one of y^e. places for drawing of water which always had two or three for y^e. use of y^e. Company paddy fields, and has removed his Fence from his own Ground to y^e. Companys; upon which your pet^r. sent his Servant to y^e. Padre to Enquire why he had removed his Hedge to y^e. Companys Ground; for which he struck y^e. Servant. As your Hon^r. & C^t. Council have given orders to your pet^r. to take care of y^e. Companys Ground therefore he thought it his duty to lay this matter before your Hon^r. & C^t., and that the paddy fields cheifly depend on this said Tank for their Water. THE HUMBLE PETITION OF THE RIGHT & LEFT HAND CASTS IN BEHALF OF
THEMSELVES & ALL THE INHABITANTS OF THE CITY OF MADRASS.

The Honble Company having appoint^d. a Govern^r. & a Mayor's Court and Choultry Justices for the Regulation of the Affairs of this place the Method of Justice formerly used that any Debt not exceed^s. P. 100 was decided by the Justices of the Choultry which saved Charges & was a great help to Poor People to Recover their Debts the Rich generally apply'd themselves to the Mayor's Court. It was also the Custom here that when any differences happend between Considerable Merch^{ts}. the Injur'd person Complaind thereof to y^e. Gov^r. who endeavoured them to a Reconciliation, otherwise the same was decided in Consultation. When any Confusion happend by Old Acc[ount] or otherwise among the Black Merchants, It was Customary for them to terminate the Affair by Arbitration And a Penalty Bond allow'd of to Stand to the Award. This was done among their Casts without troubling the Justices, which if either Party rejected the Award, The Justices obligd him to Pay the

Penalty. When differences happend in any of y^e. Casts, as Quarrelling or Fighting &c^a. the Heads of the Casts accomodated Matters without any further trouble, but in Case they Refusd to make it up before their Heads, Complaint was made to the Gov^r. or Some of the Justices & the person found Guilty was punishd Accordingly. When any of our Servants or Slaves offend^e. in Small Matters we usually Punishd them with a Slight whipping; Otherwise when Guilty of any Considerable Offences they were Carry'd before the Justices and Chastis'd as they Should determine. When any Persons Comitted Crimes punishable with Death, Burning in the Hand or Cutting off their Ears Such Criminals were bound over to the Justices. In the manner above mention'd we have had Justice administerd to us ever since the place was a Settlem^t. especially these 5 years past that y^r. Hon^r. has had [the] Governm^t. of this place. We have Lived in perfect Tranquility without any Let or Hindrances in our Affairs, Extortions or any thing that might hinder our Several Employments, And as y^r. Hon^r. has Protected us hitherto We now for ourselves as well as in behalf of all the Inhabitants of this place Humbly pray your Hon^r. &c^a. would take our present Case into Consideration.

This last Quarter Sessions there were several Gentlemen appointed to be of the Grand Jury who have greatly Molested us by several Impositions never offerd before. Some of them came to our Houses & Demanded of Us to Answer such questions as they should enquire which very much disturb'd our Quiet & Such methods being Foreign makes us very uneasie, which we beg may be redressd. We have likewise been Sumond to appear in Court by y^e. Grand Jury who Imposed upon us to take Oath without acquainting Us with the Business And that we should Answer to their Questions without Limitation, which are Greivances So great that we humbly beseech your Hon^r. &c^a. will put a stop to such Proceedings which may be Fatal to us all, for the taking of Oaths is of Such discredit to our Casts, & the Mean opinion they have of the Person afterwards must Prove their Ruin. As there is a great many Small Debts Contracted among the poor people from One hund^d. to one pagoda, which by y^e. present Constitution must be Recover'd at Court the Charges whereof becomes so considerable before it is determind that a very Small, if any Ballance is Left to be Receivd by the Owner, Therefore we humbly beg your Hon^r. &c^a. would Order the recovery of Such Small Sums, as formerly, that they may be determind by Arbitration which will Save the great Charge Imposed on Us by the Court Attorneys who by delaying Causes often ruin both Parties. We shall Conclude begging leave to Intimate to your Hon^r. &c^a. that punishing Theft with Death has never been practisd here before, which we intreat may be Alter'd in future that they may have Punishments inflicted on them as formerly. And as your Hon^r. has been a Father to us in preserving our Liberties we humbly beg that Such Regulations may be made as near the Methods used formerly, For we cannot propose to Live Quietly and Safe in this place to be thus Harrass'd by a Grand Jury.
