John Sanderson for so much pretended to have been sent by the said M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson by his Servant Mugga on the Second of March one thousand Seven hundred thirty Seven, Eight, & by his said Servant to have been delivered to my Dubash Cashava Chittee Addepa for Me & for the recovery of which he has since brought his action in the Mayor's Court against my said Dubash, were not received by Me & that I never heard of his sending such Sum of Money till the thirteenth day of November aforesaid when M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson wrote Me of it & demanded repayment thereof.

TO THE GENTLEMEN OF COUNCIL AT FORT ST. GEORGE.

GENTLEMEN

Mr. John Sanderson having commenc'd a Suit against my Servant Cashava Chittee Addapa commonly called Narrain which has occasion'd much and various discourse in Town being a Case so Circumstanced that the Truth of the matter charged in the Bill will perhaps at last be rather guessed at than fully appear, and as many in such an affair will be giving their opinions according to their Passions and Prejudices, I have thought it necessary in my own vindication to lay before you some Facts and circumstances which otherwise I should not have thought justifiable for any private provocation.

I shall begin then, Gentlemen, with acquainting you that the 13<sup>th</sup>. of November last in the morning, I received a Letter from Mr. Sanderson complaining in general of hardships he had suffered from me and in one part of his Letter said that he hoped I would be so just not to detain so large a part of his Fortune as my Man Narrain receiv'd of his Servant Mugga the 2<sup>d</sup>. March 1737-8. As the Subject was quite new to me & the whole of his Letter very unintelligible I desired he would come and explain it: It would be wasting too much of your time to recite all our discourse when he did come, but as to any hardships which have been put Upon him, you will, if he thinks fitt to tell you what they are, be able to judge whether he has any reason to complain, I beleive you will then think he has had great Lenity shewn him & there are many others who think it was too much. As to the mony which, he says, Narrain received, when I asked him what it was, he said it was two thousand Pagodas, and when I asked him for what, he said He understood It was for me; Upon which I told him I would take my Oath I never received a Pagoda of it, but says I We will soon enquire into this matter and thereupon called for Narrain, but he being that morning in Town, I appointed Mr. Sanderson to meet me again in the Evening, but, before I acquaint you with what passed then, it will be necessary that I tell you some things which passed before.

In January 1735-6 my Servant Narrain came into my Writing Room & shew'd me a Letter to him from Mr. Sanderson whose Servant Muggana had brought it to him with one thousand Pagodas design'd as a present for me, The Original I have ready to produce to you and the copy is as follows.

To CASSEM CHITTEE ADIPA.

I have sent my Servant Muggana to you who will inform you the great Misfortune that attends me here for want of a choice of able People to contract with besides the prices I allowed last year in proportion to the Deduction made is so great that I am informed by several People that the Merchants were actually losers by the cloth & still there is a large debt standing out by Lingan's Set of Merchants one of which has prov'd a Bankrup and owes half of the debt among them for his Share.

You will find by what Muggana will deliver to you I have made the same compliment for the Governour I ever did for his Predecessors which I do with a great deal of good Will, but can less afford it of any time since Mr. Macrae left Madrass.

You may depend upon my readiness to serve you on all occasions. I am

After I had read this Letter I was a good deal surpriz'd at the matter of it as well as the confidence he reposed in his Servant Muggana, I considered that if I return'd the mony by the bearer he might still pretend I had received it, and though I should have wrote M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson that I had not, I much doubted in whom he would have most faith; I therefore concluded It was most safe to take the money into my own possession & without saying what my design was I ordered him to be brought into me with the money, which was accordingly done & Muggana having laid the money down upon a Table before Me, He and Narrain went out again after which I delivered the money to my cashkeeper with directions to keep it till I called for it: and the 7<sup>th</sup>. February I wrote M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson a Letter the copy of which is as follows.

SIR

I have seen the Letter you wrote to Audiapa and am very sorry to observe by it, that you were upon such hard terms whilst you were at Injeram, when at the same time I have very good reason to beleive both your neighbours at Vizagapatam and Maddapollam sett Rent Free, But however that be I am sure neither the company's affairs or your own can be carried on as they ought to be, if what you offer upon the present occasion is once established as a constant practice. Yet that you might not be deceived in what has passed here, what your Dubash brought I have thought fitt to take into my possession and desire you will send an order to M<sup>r</sup>. Morse to receive it of Me; He need not be acquainted upon what account, it is, neither is it proper that notions of this Sort should be publick or propagated for fear of the Evil consequence that such a way of thinking may be attended with.

As you know now what Terms you are upon with me I must recommend it to you that you are industrious & vigilant in promoting the Investment, you will want no reasonable Encouragement from hence, but we cannot answer to give such extraordinary prices for bad Cloth, when we ought to have given less for that which is good, but I write you apart and in the General more fully about your Investment and this is sufficient here.

FEBRUARY. THE 7<sup>th</sup>. 1735-6.

The 5<sup>th</sup>. March M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson acknowled [*sic*] the receipt of this Letter and wrote me as follows. "I have your Honour's pardon to ask in Offering to do a thing so "contrary to what you seem to expect, if it is your Honour's pleasure of returning that "which my Servant delivered, if you please of sending it by some Vessel to me as it will "be less publick." Upon the receipt of this Letter from him and supposing the money his servant had delivered was current Pagodas I ordered M<sup>r</sup>. Goulding who was my cashkeeper to lay it out in Madrass Pagodas and the 29<sup>th</sup>. May 1736 I sent them to M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson by Cap<sup>t</sup>. Hepburn, & the 15<sup>th</sup>. June M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson wrote Me "The "small chest Captain Hepburn brought came out right according to the mark of the "Bag." The 24<sup>th</sup>. July 1736 he wrote me again as follows. "Possibly your Honour "would take it amiss if I did not inform you, but the Pagodas I sent your Honour was "a sealed bag of new Madrass Pagodas and it is reasonable to be supposed may have "been paid away in the room of other." I have no copy of what I wrote him in answer, but beleive it was in substance, that he judged right in supposing the mony had been paid away instead of other, that somebody was possibly the better for them, but as I was not I did not think myself accountable for the difference.

I need not take up your time in recounting what passed with regard to the Vizagapatam Investment till the end of 1737 when it was thought proper to call him up hither, and the 19<sup>th</sup>. January following he arrived here, 'twas then too busy a Season for us to enter upon any particular debates in council relating to the Vizagapatam affairs, except that it was agreed we could not advance the prices of that cloth or continue any longer to pay what we did the year before, but I had frequent discourses with him and he shew'd me some proposalls which he said Raganacailoo had made, and he did not doubt would comply with them, I cannot now recollect all that passed between Us, but at last having assured me that if he was permitted to go to Vizagapatam again, he would do his utmost to make a good Investment and if he should not be able to do that, he would himself desire to come up next Season; I gave him to understand I would not be against his returning thither. We were too busy then in dispatching the Royal Guardian to bring the matter into council, but he doubted so little of going again to Vizagapatam that he proposed to me to buy a French ship

which was then in the Road to be sold in order to be employed in the Trade between Vizagapatam and this place, which I very readily came into and it is remarkable That Ship sailed for Vizagapatam the 27<sup>th</sup>. February, four days before, he says, he sent the money & that day also his Paper relating to the Vizagapatam Investment was read in Council & which I beleive was looked upon then as preparative to his return thither.

I must now acquaint you with two other particulars but the exact time I cannot recollect, Talking with me once about his turn'd out Cloth he asked me if I would take it upon my own account, telling me I should have it for two thousand Pagodas less than it cost him or that he would lose two thousand Pagodas by it: I did not ask him to explain himself, but, guessing that he meant what he ought not, I only told him I did not know what to do with it, but I resolved from that time not to touch it upon any account.

At another time he brought me an open account current upon Ballance whereof would have been due to him upwards of two thousand five hundred Pagodas by reason of several sums he disbursed for my account, among others my share of the French ship abovementioned, and observing he had given credit therein for two thousand Pagodas as Cash received, which I knew he had not, I supposed it to be a Sum that he wanted to be paid in part of the ballance; I was therefore going to call for my Cashkeeper to order the money to be paid, but M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson stopp'd me and said he did not want the money, upon which I asked him What he put it in the account for? he replied again That he designed it as a present or desired that I would accept of it or to that Effect. Upon that I asked him, how he could make any such offer or imagine I had any such expectations after what had passed between us about the thousand Pagodas he sent by his Servant Muggana? Or said I, do you think I refused that because it was not enough? We had a good deal more discourse at that time but I cannot charge my memory with so much of it as to be particular in reciting it here, but it tended to convince him that I would accept of no such offers and that he might depend upon all the good offices in my power without any Expectations of that sort; In which as I was very sincere you may judge of my surprize when he first acquainted me he had sent two thousand Pagodas the 2<sup>d</sup>. March 1737. 8 by his Servant Muggana to Narrain.

Concerning which, M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson being come to me according to appointment the 13<sup>th</sup>. November last, I called Narrain in & charged him with having received that Sum from M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson by his servant Muggana & with having owned the receipt of it & promised repayment, which M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson affirmed he had. Narrain absolutely denied it but acknowledged that M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson, since his return to this place, had told him, that he had advanced to his Gomastahs at Vizagapatam to the amount of two thousand Pagodas in Rupees & had demanded that money of him here, which Narrain said he had promised to pay if M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson had any receipt for it from his Gomastahs, or so soon as they should give him any advice that they had received it: Upon this M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson denied that he ever made any such demand upon Narrain, & said those accounts were settled at Vizagapatam & he had been paid there, Upon which Narrain replied No, Sir, for I paid you one Bill here of eight hundred thirty three Rupees & another of three hundred and odd Pag<sup>a</sup>. M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson made answer that he was now paid all and had no demand for any money advanced his Gomastahs: Upon which I interrupted them and told Narrain That the Question was whether the 2<sup>d</sup>. March 1737/8 he received two thousand Pagodas from Muggana which was to be paid Me; This Narrain denying again M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson asked him, whether he had not applied to him & told him That if he would persuade me to permitt him to go down again to Vizagapatam to settle his affairs there and bring up his family he would give him two thousand Pagodas: Upon this I asked M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson If he had not said before it was for me, "Yes, Sir," said he "so it was," "well then" said I "since you did go to Vizagapatam and that was the consideration for which it was intended, don't you think if the money be recovered it belongs to Me?" "No, Sir," said M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson "my turn'd out cloth was to be taken in too": "Oh!" said I "that could not be" and in truth, Gentlemen, there was a very good reason why it could not be, which is that even M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson himself with the rest of you had wrote the Company The cloth from Vizagapatam was very bad in so much that we had turn'd great part of it

out, nor was it possible I could take it in, much less what he had turned out at Vizagapatam for being, as is said in the said Letter, worse than what we had rejected here, or if, in consideration of this intended present, I had agreed to it, which way could you Gentlemen, have been brought to consent thereto? but this by the way. Then M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson went on & said That Narrain in answer to his application to him had told him that my mind was a little vexed about the bad Cloth and some ill usage of the Vizagapatam Merchants, but that if he would get the mony ready, he would let him know when it was proper to send it; but Narrain absolutely denied That M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson had made any such application to him, and upon that I told M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson I was very sure Narrain never spoke to me about his affairs, for that, though I did often hear him with regard to the Blacks, who, it might be supposed, he was best acquainted with, he knew his Duty better than to interfere in matters relating to the English. After this they engaged in some other discourse relating to some matters which had passed at Vizagapatam and some People who are come up from thence, which not being material to the Sum in dispute I ordered Narrain to withdraw, and then I went over again with M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson all that had passed between us relating to the several offers he had made me and asked him how he could be so weak to trust such a Sum of money as that, in such hands? when I had so plainly caution'd him against it in my Letter of the 7<sup>th</sup>. February 1735-6 and not only so but though he staid in the place till the 1<sup>st</sup>. of April 1738 and was frequently with me between that day and the 2<sup>d</sup>. March 1737/8 when he pretends he sent the money, yet in all that time he never once gave me the least hint or Intimation of it, To which he only answered it was very true he had not. I told him it was a very odd story, He said "It was so, but he would not lose his money". I think this is the Substance and all that is material of what passed about this affair the 13<sup>th</sup>. November last. I heard no more from M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson till the 20<sup>th</sup>. when he wrote me he design'd to see Narrain in the Mayor's Court and accordingly he filed his Bill there the 4<sup>th</sup>. December. Narrain has answered it and denied upon Oath That he ever received from Muggana or any other Person by order or in behalf of M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson the sum of two thousand Pagodas or any other Sum to be paid to me; and there the matter rests at present: I suppose in the progress of the suit I shall be called upon to answer upon Interrogatories, whether I received the said Sum of two thousand Pagodas, but as that may not be before the departure of these Ships I think it very necessary in the mean time to clear myself of that matter upon Oath before you that you may bear testimony thereof to my Hoñble Masters, who if I had received that or any other Sum, would have good reason to conclude it was in consideration of my suffering them to be wronged by M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson and indeed I cannot but believe that was his Intention when he made the offer, and if I am liable to any blame from my Hoñble Masters on that account it is for looking on his several offers to proceed rather from the Weakness of his judgement than the depravity of his mind & therefore passed them over in Silence.

I omitted to tell you above that the 8<sup>th</sup>. March 1737/8 I paid M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson two thousand five hundred twenty nine Pagodas nine fanams & twenty cash 2529. 9. 20, the ballance of the account then depending between Us. I am

George & it's Subordinates from April 1738 to April 1739 and it appearing that the Revenues of this place in particular are upwards of seventeen thous<sup>d</sup>. less than the preceding year the Board thought fit to make the following remarks, and first that the amount of them from May 1738 to April 1739 is not less than has been common but the great amount of them the preceding year was very extraordinary & unusual, but however another reason is to be assign'd namely that though the Quantity of Grain imported the last Season was rather more than usual, the price of it was not above two fifths  $\frac{2}{5}$  so much as the preceding year; And it appears by another State of the Sea Customs calculated from January to December for the years 1738 & 1739 that though there is a decrease of near 6000 Pagodas in the article of Grain alone there is an Encrease of two thousand seven hundred on the customs of other Goods which reduces the decrease on the whole to three thousand Pagodas.

Accountant's annual report of the Expences & Revenues deliver'd in. Remarks on the decrease of the Sea Customs.

The great amount of the Land Customs was owing chiefly to a Ship that went to Manilha in July 1737 and another in February following, whereas from May 1738 to April 1739 there were no Goods exported thither and it appears by another State of the Land Customs as Entered hereafter that in truth they amount to upwards of Seven hundred Pagodas more last year than the preceding.

HOÑBLE SIR & SIRS

All the answer that I think is necessary to be made to the long Paper the President was pleased to lay before this Board the third of January is, That I most certainly did send by my Servant Mugganah the second March One thousand seven hundred Thirty seven Eight, Two thousand Pagodas with Orders to deliver the same to Cassim Chtttee Audeapah (commonly called Narrain) and that I meant to present the same to the Governour, and that I had no View therein to the prejudice of my Honourable Masters, and in case I had given any present before, it was when I had given entire satisfaction to my Honble Masters in England, Therefore I thought it might not be unacceptable to Governour Benyon, and thō Governour Benyon as it is set forth in his Paper did slight the offers I had before made him, yet that was no argument that he truly slighted the matter, although it is very plain the manner of my doing it before, was not pleasing to him.

But as Governour Benyon absolutely disowns his having received this money, I think I have a just reason to claim the same from Narrain the Governour's Servant, who has Trick't both his Master & me, and that I have not only all the circumstantial proofs that can be Expected, but a direct positive and legal proof, as much as the nature of the thing can admit of, that the money was paid by Mugganah to Narrain; and that I cannot but be surprized that the Governour should make himself an Advocate for his Servant, as if it would admit of a doubt whether or no, Narrain had received The Two thousand Pagodas.

But to put this affair in a clear light, I sent for Mugganah from Metchlepatam, who is now come, and as he was the only person that transacted this affair, He the said Mugganah has made his affidavit before Timothy Tullie Esq<sup>r</sup>. Mayor of the Corporation of Madrasspatnam, of the material Transactions therein, & thō I must lay under a very great disadvantage by prosecuting Narrain [in this] affair, who is supported by so powerfull a master, yet the Justice of my cause is the only reason which induced me to sue for the two thousand Pagodas, which as Governour Benyon Declares, it never was apply'd to the use I designed them, or that he received any Benefit thereby.

Prince having been directed to attend he was called in, & the Musters of our Izzarees, and Fine Long Cloths & Salampores being shewn him, and he acquainted with the faults complained of from England in those sorts of Goods, as that the Izzarees made here are too thin & that the Fine Long Cloths & Salampores from Ingeram are of too soft a Thread & not well cured, it was demanded of him whether he could provide any & what Quantity of those Sorts in the Year free of the faults complained of. He seemed doubtfull of being able to procure above five hundred Peices of the Izzarees agreeable to the muster, but promised his best endeavours to encrease the Quantity, it being recommended to him to make it, if he can, a thousand Peices. As to the Fine Long Cloths & Salampores he could not say how much he might be able to get and the Board beleiving he cannot procure more than will be wanted, recommended it to him to get all he can that is good, directing him to send up what he may have ready in August brown, but to whiten what more he may have to send up in December (as there will not be time to do it here for the Ships to be dispatched at that season) & to endeavour to mend the defect complained of in the Colour: He was also directed to use his utmost care to prevent in future the complaints that have repeatedly been made from England that the Ingeram Cloths do not answer the Lengths & Breadths specified in the Invoices.

And then the President was desired to write a Letter to Anewardee Cawn Nabob of Rajamundrum relating to the discount on our Madrass Pag<sup>s</sup>. and to draw out Instructions to M<sup>r</sup>. Prince agreeable to the foregoing Resolutions.

The Presid<sup>t</sup>. desired to write to the Nabob of Rajamundrum about the discount on our Madrass Pagodas.

The Company's Merchants attending according to appointment the Board discoursed them fully relating to the Proposals lately received from Fort St. David and the Merchants being withdrawn it was AGREED to write to Fort St. David in substance as follows.

Our Merchants answer<sup>d</sup>. to the proposals made by those of Fort St. David.

That, with regard to the Fort St. David Merchants proposal for our Merchants desisting to provide Cloth at Chemanaickpollam, Worriapollam & particularly at Salem our Merchants do not of themselves seem very fond of looking out for more Cloth at the two first of those places than is necessary to getting in their ballances, but that they are not to be brought to the giving up Salem, That neither We or our Merchants think any Engagements with the French to be depended on longer than they suit their conveniency, That it is not only the French but the Dutch & Danes also as well as the people at Porto Novo who provide Cloth at Salem, and though they may not all provide so good a Sort as we do it seems not to be doubted the Weavers will find Employment. That we cannot concur with them in opinion that the pagod<sup>s</sup>. which pass in the Country are as good this year as the last, being well assured that large parcels have lately been coined much worse, insomuch that our Sealed Bags which are kept as near to Eighty Touch as the judgement of our Shroffs will admit of our Merchants exchange here for other money that passes equally current in the Country & receive a batta on them from 1½ to 2½  $\text{P}$  Cent. That whatever there may be in their reasons & our Merchants objections the latter tell Us possitively That if they are restrained from providing Cloth at Salem they cannot hope to make an Investment elsewhere, the cloth of the company's Sorts manufactured in this part of the country being next to nothing; adding that though some Parcels of Cloth do sometimes come in from Salem much worse than at other times, the Cloths from Worriapollam & Chemanaickpollam have of late been much worse in proportion. Upon the whole that we think if any advantage is to be made of the French being at present quiet at Salem we ought not to let slip the opportunity of encreasing the Investment in a Sort of Cloth the Company seem to be pleased with.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

I Yesterday received a Letter from Mr. Secretary Savage by your order demanding my reasons for coming in here not being consigned hither, in obedience thereto I am to acquaint Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>r</sup>. that though I left the Downs the 9<sup>th</sup>. of August, I did not reach the Cape till the 25<sup>th</sup>. of November where I put in agreeable to my Instructions for refreshment to my people who began to fall down with the Scurvy, I was necessarily detained thereby till the 8<sup>th</sup>. Decemb<sup>r</sup>. when I went on board in Order to proceed on my Voyage for the Malabar Coast, but a Strong N. W<sup>t</sup>. Wind prevented my getting out till the 18<sup>th</sup>. I had not been long out when my people began again to fall down & when I made the Island of Ceyloan the 27<sup>th</sup>. March I had buried four of my own People and had forty six of them quite useless, Of forty Soldiers I had for Bombay Six are dead, one deserted at the Cape & the rest are in a miserable condition and of twelve Lascars I was ordered to bring out six are dead & the rest are down.

We fell in with the Island about 7 Leagues to the Eastward of Dundrahead & tried to beat it up, but the South West Wind & Current so strong against Us that We found we had lost about six Leagues, that day whereupon I called a Consultation of all my Officers at which it being considered that in the condition we were in it would be impossible to gain our passage to the Malabar Coast that the hands we then had were not sufficient to weigh our Anchors should we be obliged to make Use of One, or to work the Ship and even those dayly falling down, it was unanimously agreed to be absolutely necessary for the safety of the Ship & the lives of our people to bear away for this Port where I have buried three Men since my arrival and am obliged to land all the Soldiers and almost all my own People in order to their recovery.

ORDERED that the Paymaster do make all the dispatch possible to compleat such of the repairs as were thought necessary in Consultation the 14<sup>th</sup>. of August last, particularly the Wall from New Point to the Blockhouse, & a Palisado of Redwood from thence to the Sea it being very easy for an Enemy to force their way by that Point & then the whole black Town will lye open to them there being no wall between that Point & the White Town.

The making Provision for the expected China ship, considered.

The president puts the Board in mind it is time to consider of making some provision for the China Ship, & adds that some Tinn being lately arrived at this place & S<sup>t</sup>. Thomé, the French agents had come up to agree for the purchase, upon hearing which, he had sent for the Owners of the Junk Ceyloan Ship to treat with them about the purchase of their Tinn, which may be about two hundred candy, that they asked two & forty for it, but at last agreed to let the Company have it at thirty nine, if the Board thought fit to give so much, & it being considered that there is but one Macao Ship upon the Coast, & that if we can prevent the Tinn falling into the hands of the French it may be one means to hinder a Ship being sent from Pondichery this Season. Thomé.

The president acquaints the Board That last night he received advice which was confirmed this morning, that the Nabob Doost Alley Cawn & his youngest Son Hussain Alley Cawn & several other Persons of Note had been killed in an Engagement with the Morattas, at the pass of the Hills which divide this province, from Corrapah; the particulars of which Engagement according to what we yet hear are as follows. The Nabob was lying at the pass with no more than two thousand horse, & about ten thousand Peons of Bungar Veasum Naigues, the Morattas being then on the other Side the pass, Some Overtures were made by the last for an accommodation but not receiving any answer from the Nabob that was satisfactory, the Morattas found means to bring about ten thousand horse through a Wood (the Poligar of which it is supposed shew'd them the way) & the 9<sup>th</sup>. in the morning they appeared in the Nabob's rear, at the same time the rest of the Moratta Army possessed themselves of the Hills & came down in his Front, the Nabob's Forces were soon surrounded & the Enemy charging them with Fire arms, the Nabob, his Son Hussain Alley & several others about him were soon killed, after which the Morattas having proclaimed That if the rest would disperse they should not be pursued, the Nabob's forces soon Fled: Subdar Alley Cawn the Nabob's Eldest Son, who was upon his march to his Father but with no more than three thousand horse hearing of this defeat turned back and 'tis thought designs to shut himself up in Velour.

The Nabob & several other Great Men defeated & killed by the Morattas.

As there is no room to doubt now that the Morattas may & will range over the whole province, the President acquaints the Board he had this morning ordered all the Men we have in Garrison to be upon Duty, but considering how many Guards & Points we have they will at best be very weakly mann'd & therefore proposed to the consideration of the Board what further to do upon the Emergency, upon which it was AGREED as follows.

The measures necessary to be taken here considered. All the Men in Garrison ord<sup>d</sup>. upon duty.

That considering the few Men we have particularly Europeans it is impossible to spare any force sufficient to mann the Out Choultrys which were formerly erected to defend the Suburbs, besides that those Choultrys are so much gone to decay, that they are not tenable, and were they in better repair it would take up so many Men to mann them that it would lessen considerably the small number we have for the Guard of the White & Black Towns; That they lye at so great a distance as not easily to be succoured, & if they should be hard pressed, the Men would be in very great danger of being cut off before they could retreat to the Town: AGREED therefore that it is not safe to trust any Men at the Out Choultries, but as it would make too much noise & alarm the Inhabitants to bring the Guns in from thence It was only ORDERED that they be nailed up.

The Out Choultrys not tenable.

ORDERED also that as many Europeans & Topasses be entertained in the military & Gunroom as can be procured, This Order is made general because we have too much reason to beleive the most that can be got will be far short of what is necessary.

All the Europeans and Topasses procurable to be entertained.

There being upwards of two hundred Guns mounted on the walls & Bastions, & the number of Men in the Gunner's Crew not being above one Man to two Guns & as in case of action our military will be of most Service with their Fire arms, It is AGREED to entertain two hundred Lascars, if so many can be procured, to assist in working the Great Guns.

200 Lascars to be rais'd for the service of the Gunroom.

ORDERED also that one hundred Peons be taken in upon the Company's pay under the Command of the chief Peon.

Dumas that he was acquainted with all the particulars of their Conduct which occasioned the Letter from M<sup>r</sup>. Dumas dated the 26<sup>th</sup>. July N.S., the Translate thereof is entered hereafter, & upon which the President desired the advice of the Board who being of opinion That we could not try or Punish them for an offence not committed within our Jurisdiction; It was AGREED that the President should again refer the matter to Mons<sup>r</sup>. Dumas & to promise him that we will send them to England; the Letter which the President writes M<sup>r</sup>. Dumas is also ORDERED to be entered after this Consultation. The affair of Captain Coxson & his mates of the Nancy at Pondicherry.

The Pavement before the Sorting Warehouse & along the rest of that Street being entirely gone, ORDERED that the Paymaster new pave the same; But the Sinks there being extremely offensive & ill contrived, ORDERED that the Paymaster & Scavenger do examine if there be any means of altering & remedying the same, & if there be, That they make an Estimate of the Expence & report it to the Board for further directions. The Pavement of the sorting Warehouse street to be mended. Paymaster & scavenger to examine the faults of the sinks.

COPY OF A LETTER FROM M<sup>r</sup>. LE BLANC AT PONDICHERRY  
DATED THE 17<sup>th</sup>. JULY N.S. 1740.

SIR

M<sup>r</sup>. Monger concluded a Contract for his ship the latter end of this last week, Yesterday he fixed to give us possession of the Ship Nancy, which has occasioned a strange disorder ; I take the liberty to let you know what past on that Occasion knowing you to be too good a judge not to blame a parcell of rouges that he had on board, who, if in England, or if Frenchmen, would have had the Gallows for their Pains. Yesterday I being on board the Brigantine, Mons<sup>r</sup>. Pathelin, M<sup>r</sup>. Monger, M<sup>r</sup>. Sheraader, (who was chief mate aboard the Nancy but discharged here by the Captain 4 days ago, because he is an honest Man & would not join his Captain in his rogueries) who two Frenchmen, came on board about 5 O' clock in the evening, desiring me to go on board the Ship Nancy with them to take possession of her, I accordingly went with them on board said ship where on our approach they hoisted English Colours, being on board, M<sup>r</sup>. Monger presented to Captain Coxon the Copy of his Owners orders to the said Captain, asking him if he did know said Orders to be just, he answer'd he did, whereupon M<sup>r</sup>. Monger told him he sold the Ship, & desired him to give us possession which he refused doing, although securities offered him in writing to pay all wages due on the said Ship &c<sup>t</sup>. from the time of our going on board, & while we stayed there, the second Mate whose Name I beleive is Heath with three black helm's Men, were posted at the foot of the Ensign Staff, swearing & blaspheming that any man that would attempt taking down the English Colours, he would knock out his Brains ; a Man that the Cap<sup>t</sup>. Ship't (I know not where he got him) as his cheif Mate, but that same day, all the time we were there abusing M<sup>r</sup>. Monger after the most vile manner, swearing that no possession should be given of the Ship to any body, untill he, the Cap<sup>t</sup>. and the other Officer, as well as all the Lascars &c<sup>a</sup>. were paid two Month's conduct money, a thing not known in the Indies. In short, M<sup>r</sup>. Monger in writing signified to the Cap<sup>t</sup>. that he protested in the name of the Owners against him, & therein ordered him to strike his Topmasts & moore the Ship untill further Orders, which Signification, the Captain took in his hand after he heard it read, & gave it before us all to a Man with orders to throw it over board, which was done ; we quitted the Ship ; M<sup>r</sup>. Monger as soon as ashore went, & made his complaint to the Governour praying him to assist him by force to keep the Ship & what was in her for the Proprietors, the Gov<sup>r</sup>. immediately ordered 14 Soldiers with a Serjeant to go on board said ship and Secure her by force or otherwise for the concern'd, and in the mean time sent orders our Europe Ships to Arm & man their boats to hinder the said ship's getting away, & he ordered me to go with M<sup>r</sup>. Monger to see his orders put in Execution, the Chellinga that carried the Soldiers got away before Us ; on our coming near the Ship seeing a great deal of lights on board, thought the Soldiers had got possession, but coming more near we were Ordered by the Englishmen on board on pain of Death not to advance we were then under her, so as to hear very plainly Captain Coxson order to fire on us, M<sup>r</sup>. Monger made himself known to the Cap<sup>t</sup>. who asked him what he wanted, he answered to go aboard his Ship, on which he ordered a Second time to fire on us, & to heave some grenadoes on board, which seeing, & that we had no Arms nor Men, we made off, expecting every minute the Effects of their madness, & went on board the Europe Ships for their help, on going a good distance from the Nancy we met the boat of Soldiers, I asked them why they did not obey orders in going on board, they answered that on the thretnings of the Englishmen the Boatmen would not row on board, I ordered them ashore to receive further orders ; & went on board the Europe Ship who I found manning their Boat to force their way on board the Nancy, M<sup>r</sup>. Monger thought proper to go ashore to acquaint the Gov<sup>r</sup>. with what [passed] we were near the shore when we saw the fire of several small Arms, as in an Action, & on the barr we met with two Boats with a Company of Soldiers & an Officer &c<sup>a</sup>. going on board, when on shore we saw the Signals of two fires or lights on board which the Europe Ship's boat was to make when the Ship was Secured, on which all was easy for the night, it seems they were preparing to get under Sail when

the boat boarded them, having sway'd up the fore Yard though the topmast was stroke: this morning about one o' Clock a part of the Soldiers with Cap<sup>t</sup>. Coxon & Second mate Heath, both tied with ropes come on shore, they are now in the Black Hole, the other rogue whose name I beleive is Holmes, is in danger of his life, having recd. some wounds by the resistance he made, is on board the Europe Ship under the Care of the Surgeon; the Officers that were on board the Europe Ship's Boat, make affidavit, that as soon as they came near the Ship, & that they answered they were Frenchmen, were fir'd on by the Ship, on which they returned the salute & at once boarded her on her Bow; before the others had time to send the Grenadoes, which were all ready on the Quarterdeck, they found Holmes on the forecastle ready to fire a Second time, when he was wounded. This morning about 7 a Clock M<sup>r</sup>. Monger went on board his Ship by the orders of the Governour with the discharged Chief Mate Sheraader who was with Monger & I all the time of the Affair I beg pardon for the tediousness of this Letter, but as I do not know what may happen & that I may be obliged to appear as a Witness upon this Action of Pyracy, I am glad to give you a full account of it as I can swear it before Judges. I am

TRANSLATE OF MONS<sup>r</sup>. DUMAS LETTER TO THE PRESIDENT DATED 26<sup>th</sup>. JULY 1740. N.S.

SIR

I have received the Letter that you did me the Honour to write me relating to the Affair of M<sup>r</sup>. Coxon and the two Mates of the Nancy. I can't tell Sir whether you have been truly informed of what passed on that occasion, & therefore will give you the particulars, Cap<sup>t</sup>. Monger who has been here some time with his Ship sold her to M<sup>r</sup>. Pathelin & his Partners & went on board to deliver her to the Buyers. But when he got on board M<sup>r</sup>. Coxson & his adherents threatned to throw him over board & obliged him by force to get out of the Ship, with those who went with him aboard, threatning further to fire upon them if they did not immediately retire. M<sup>r</sup>. Monger came ashore, told me what had passed & desired me to let him have some force to get possession of his Ship which he told me the Officers & the Crew had an intention to carry away in the Night. It was six at night but I immediately sent a Sarjeant & six Men in a Chelinga to Order Captain Coxon who was on board to come & talk to me to let me know his reason for this Conduct promising him to do him justice. But instead of receiving the Chelinga I sent, they forbad them to come near them, threatning to fire at them, & they did actually get one of their Cannon and some Grenadoes ready to fire. The Sarjeant return'd ashore & told me what had passed which put me under a necessity to Order the Commodore of our Europe Ships to send his Boat armed on board the Nancy to seize these mutineers & bring them ashore, when the Boat got near the Ship & those on board had asked from whence they came the Officer answered it was the Commodore's boat & they were going on board by the Governour's Orders. The reply was a discharge of several musquets at our Boat which obliged them to fire also at the Ship. The Boats crew boarded her in the Bow & made themselves masters of her. They found M<sup>r</sup>. Coxon & the other two armed with musquets & grenadoes & a single Cannon loaded with broken bits of iron & primed. Happily during this whole affair nobody was killed. Only one of the three English got some Cuts from a Sword which he is almost recovered of. Now, Sir, be pleased to judge yourself of the Conduct of these three people and what punishment they deserve. I own I never did beleive they intended to turn Pirates but beleive all these impertinences are owing to Liquor.

The great regard I have for you, Sir, will engage me to proceed in this affair agreeable to your opinion. Nay I consent that you shall determine their punishment & will deliver them up to You on condition you will promise me they shall be punished. I shall wait your answer before any proceedings are begun against them.

ANSWER TO THE FOREGOING LETTER FROM MONS<sup>r</sup>. DUMAS DATED 18<sup>th</sup>. JULY 1740. O.S.

SIR

Last Night I received the Letter you did me the Honour to write me dated 26<sup>th</sup>. July N.S. relating to the behaviour of M<sup>r</sup>. Coxson & the two mates of the Nancy, & I cannot sufficiently express to you the concern it is to me that any of our People should be guilty of a conduct so shamefull & unwarrantable You have therein Sir laid me under a very sensible obligation in that you have been so kind to refer the matter to me and to consent that I should determine their punishment. But since, Sir, you are so good to attribute their folly & rashness rather to the influence of Wine than any piratical intention, I look upon it as a favourable Circumstance for them, to have You for their Judge & shall therefore leave them to be punished for this insult where it was committed requesting only in Consequence of the promise you have made me that they may escape with their Lives & Limbs saved to them, Whatever punishment less than that you shall think them deserving of, I shall esteem inferiour to their Demerits & shall think myself obliged to you for treating them so tenderly. I am further to desire you Sir to permit me afterwards to send for them that they may be sent to England It being highly necessary to remove such turbulent & mischeiyouS Spirits out of India.

THE HUMBLE PETITION OF THOMAS HOLMES, & ROBERT  
HEATH, MARINERS

SHEWETH

That your Petitioners served as Officers on board the Ship Nancy lying at Pondicherry, of which M<sup>r</sup>. Monger was Supercargoe. That when Your Petitioners expected a Voyage to this Port of Madrass, the said M<sup>r</sup>. Monger sent to the Captain and told him, that he had sold the said Ship, and ordered him on board to deliver her at three in the afternoon to M<sup>r</sup>. Pattaleen; otherwise that he himself would deliver her. Upon which the Captain & Chief Mate Thomas Holmes went on board, and at three o'Clock came M<sup>r</sup>. Monger to see the Ship delivered as above. The Captain then asked him in what manner his Wages were to be paid, with what was due to his Officers & People; and what was to be done with the freight Bales which he had signed a Bill of lading for. To this M<sup>r</sup>. Monger made no reply. Whereupon the Captain addressed himself to the purchaser of the Ship & told him, he was ready to deliver her to him, if he would give his Word for the payment of the Wages due on the Ship. But the said Purchaser answered, it was no concern of his; if the Ship was delivered to him, 'twas well, if not, he would go on Shore. The Captain then told him, that he would wait on M<sup>r</sup>. Dumas in the Morning so they went away And as soon as they put off from the Ship your Petitioners struck the Yards & Topmasts; and there being a Shellingay aboard, Your Petitioner Thomas Holmes wrote a Note to Captain Jobbins desiring him to send three or four loaves of Bread. Which Note the said Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Monger, Barry & Pattleen carried to the Governour, and interpreted it that Captain Jobbins was to send not three or four Loaves of Bread, but three or four Boats of People on board, and that Your Petitioners intended to run away with the Ship. There is something so very extraordinary in this Affair, that it could scarce gain credit, had not Your Petitioners Thomas Holmes a Letter under Captain Jobbin's hand, which he will produce to the honourable Board, to give ample Satisfaction herein, M<sup>r</sup>. Dumas hereupon ordered a Guard from the Garrison to be sent to bring Your Petitioners on Shore, & in the Dusk of the Evening came two Shellingays full of Armed Men, to the great surprise of Your Petitioners, they being wholly ignorant of the design & business they could have on board. Your Petitioners hailed them, to know who they were & what they wanted. The Shellingays answered in English, FRIENDS, & went away. But as Your Petitioners were informed afterwards M<sup>r</sup>. Monger was in one of them, & put on board the Europe Ship then lying there & gave four Rupees each to those that came with him to take Your Petitioners.

The Captain being something disordered, lay down, & desired Your Petitioners not to suffer any boats to come on board without hailing & knowing who they were. But between 9 & 10 at night came three or four Boats, which were hailed by Your Petitioner Thomas Holmes; but instead of Answer, fired immediately their Small Arms on Your Petitioners, & boarded the Ship, & wounded the said Thomas Holmes in several places in a dangerous manner; & robbed him of 25 Pagodas in money, his Watch and Buckles, & carried him on board the Europe Ship to stop the Blood & dress the

Wounds : But the Captain & Second Mate they carried ashore & put in prison. About fourteen days after they sent the Chief Mate his Watch ; but would neither bring the Man, who committed the Robbery to Justice, nor oblige him to return the Money ; tho' Your Petitioner Thomas Holmes the said Chief Mate can swear positively against him.

Your Petitioners are satisfied that Mr. Dumas is a Gentleman of too much honour to suffer such Enormities. But they beleive, that he has not been acquainted with the circumstances of the Affair ; & especially for this reason, that while Your Petitioners continued Prisoners there, they were debarred the use of Pen & Paper, whereby they might have represented their Case to him, & set the ill usage they had received in a true light.

But the behaviour of those who boarded your Petitioners, was too notorious to escape his knowledge for which he imprisoned the Officer, who commanded the Soldiers Which Affair introduced another Scene of Vallainy ; for the said Prisoner to clear himself invented the most scandalous falsehood, & told the Governour that Your Petitioners fired first upon them, & that they only stood in their own defence. Your Petitioners are ready to take their Oaths, that they had neither flints, nor carteridges, nor Ball on board.

Another hardship Your Petitioners beg leave to complain to this honourable Board of, that when Your Petitioners were taken Prisoners, the Soldiers broke open & rifled Your Petitioners Chests & Escrutores, & they continued open till Mr. Monger next morning went on board, & nailed and Sealed them, So that your Petitioners have great reason to fear that all their Effects an board are lost.

This is a true State of this Affair, for which Your Petitioners are confined, & have suffered such losses, besides the blemish cast upon their Characters, which to a Man of business is more to be dreaded than every thing else : But in the midst of all these misfortunes, they account it no small happiness, that they have the liberty to address themselves to this honourable Board, from whose Justice they may expect a redress of their Greivances. They refer themselves wholly to your goodness & compassion for the injured ; beging leave only to acquaint You, that with the necessary expences they have been at since their confinement, their circumstances are much straitned ; for which they hope this Honourable Board will make such provision as shall be thought proper And as in duty bound they shall ever remain full of acknowledgments.

HONBLE SIR & SIRs

In obedience to your Commands I have perused the Accountant's Remarks on the Pagodas & Rupees coined in the Honble Company's Mint at Madrass.

As to the Madrass Pagodas I see no material difference being but one q<sup>r</sup>. of a Grain in the Assay, & the Assaymaster never reports to less then a q<sup>r</sup>. of a grain tho' it be 3.16 more, generally allowing the turn of the Scale in favour of the Buyer.

The Current Pagodas vary very much in all the country Mints especially since the last troubles, those five mentioned in M<sup>r</sup>. Hort's Remarks are the best Matt that are now Current, I have lately tryed some of 74. Touch others of 70 Touch & some from the Southward not quite 50 Touch.

The undertakers of the Madrass Mint do not pretend to make the Rupees of so exact a weight as the English money, nor is it possible that they can, being obliged to weigh & melt every Rupee singly, having no flatting Mills or other Engines, as they have in Europe, so that often times some are half a grain or a grain under or over weight, but I myself take care that they want not above one half  $\frac{1}{2}$  Mill at most as M<sup>r</sup>. Monson the Warehousekeeper can testifie, who sees them weighed himself when he receives them into the Honble Company's Warehouse, and were the Minters to endeavour to be more exact the Coinage would be very tedious, so that the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Company's Ships could not be dispatched in due time to the Bay.

As to the Tower Assaymaster [reporting] the Madrass Rupees but 13 <sup>dwt.</sup> Better than Standard it is probable he made the said Silver [ . . . ] same fire with gold assays, & all Artists will allow that Gold requires a greater heat than Silver and that Silver may be wasted in the fire by over heat. Fine Silver Assays are likewise very liable to spring in cooling by which means there may be more or less Loss.

I will not affirm that either of the above Accidents have happened to the said Assay or that Mr. Haynes has not allowed the Remedy, which is always customary in the Coinage of Silver in the Tower and at the tryal of His Majesties Piets. But this I do assure your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. that to the best of my knowledge I have never past any Musters of the Rupees less than  $14\frac{1}{2}$ <sup>dwt.</sup> Better than English Standard & they have been frequently  $15$ <sup>dwt.</sup> Better by reason it is not worth the undertaker's while [to] melt them over again for  $\frac{1}{2}$ <sup>dwt.</sup> Betterness. And I firmly beleive that none of the Goldsmiths or Cooleys dare to add any allay or mix coarser Silver after [it] is assayed & passed to them.

The Madrass Minters allow the same number of Rupees in proportion for the [new] Mexico Dollars as they do for Standard Silver [according] to their Contract with Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. Council when they were assayed & proved  $3$ <sup>dwt.</sup> Worse than Standard, and I cannot assign any reason why the Bombay Minters allow more unless they [work] cheaper in other Respects.

Having received from Fort St. David the account of the cost of the Cloth sent hither upon their running contract with the Merchants, the Board met this day in the sorting Godown, and compared the sorting of the Fort St. David Cloth with the sorting of that brought in by our Merchants here, and were of opinion, that most of our number Three Salem was equal to their Number Two, and our Number Four much better than theirs; for the same reason a great deal of our Number Two is equal to their Number One.

That their Fine Long Cloth is a different thread to ours, and though the Threads have been dropt in some of our Number Three, which occasioned some faults in it, yet we think our Fine Long Cloth in the whole, is a finer Cloth than theirs, and cheaper in proportion.

The Board then compared the prices of our Salem Cloth, with the prices of that received from Fort St. David, & found that one with another ours comes out 2. 20. 51  $\text{¢}$  Corge dearer than that from St. David; Upon which the Merchants being called in again, insisted that their Accounts were true, and that they would abide by them, and desired that we would send for the Fort St. David Merchants accounts, and that it might be specified therein, what they gave for the Cloth in the Country, and the particular charges of bringing the same from Salem to Fort St. David; but as the examining into this affair will take up a great deal of time before we can come to any exactness, wherein the difference lies, the further Consideration was deferred till after the dispatch of the Colchester.

The Board then proceeded to examine the Morees and other fine Goods provided in this part of the Country, and observing most of [them] to fall short of our old Musters, the Merchants were examined concerning the same, and told, that we should be obliged to turn a great deal of it out; to which they replied, that they provided these Goods only for their Brokerage, and they would give us a fair account of the Cost, but that we must not turn any of it out. In answer to which they were told, that they had Musters given them, and they were to provide Goods according to those Musters, and we would according to our agreement pay them what the same should cost; but that a great deal of what they had brought in was so far inferior to those Musters, that it could not be called the same sort of Cloth, and therefore if they could not get such as was agreeable to the Musters, they ought to have declared so before, and returned the money, for at the rate they went on, and if we should take in all that they did from the Weavers, we should soon run into a different Manufacture. The Merchants having little more to say for themselves than that they had brought in the best they could get, and would give in a true and faithfull Account of the Cost and charges, they were ordered to withdraw, after which the Warehousekeeper was ordered to sort the whole, and to take in none that did not come up to Number Two in the Gingham, Betteelas, Superfine morees, and Fine & Ordinary Morees & to Number Three in the Salampores and Long Cloth Fine, for so much as should come under those Numbers, the Board ordered it to be laid by for further consideration after the dispatch of the Colchester.

Having before I left Portsmouth received Orders from M<sup>r</sup>. Secretary Mole to proceed directly to the Bay, If I found I could not arrive at this Port by the last of August, I think it my Duty to lay before Your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. the absolute necessity I was under of coming to this Port, in excuse for my not complying with those Orders.

To that end I am to acquaint Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>t</sup>. that I left Madeira the 11<sup>th</sup>. May O.S. my People being then in good Condition, but about the latter end of August the Scurvy began to Affect my Ship's company in such a manner that when I made the Island Ceyloan the 14<sup>th</sup>. Inst<sup>t</sup>. there were upwards of Forty of my own People and nine of the Honourable Company's Soldiers down, & more falling down daily: So that on the 16<sup>th</sup>. I thought it proper to call a Consultation of all my Officers wherein they were unanimously of Opinion, That it was absolutely necessary for the safety of the Ship, & the Hoñble Company's Cargo to bear up for this, or some other Port on this Coast where We might get some assistance and refreshment, without which We could not possibly proceed to the Bay at this Season of the Year. Herewith I take the liberty to lay before your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. a Copy of the abovementioned Consultation, and of the Report deliver'd me by the Surgeon of the Ship and his Mate, concerning the State of my People's health.

Having delivered the Honourable Company's Wine here, & taken in some Water, I hope, with the refreshment my People will get here, and the help of thirty Lascars, (I propose to hire to go with the Ship to the Bay) to be able to proceed thither in Six or Seven days.

to proceed to Bengall in the present bad Condition of our Crew, fifty five of whom are Sick and ailing, & the remainder in so a weak a condition, as that (by a modest computation) three in their present State are but a bare equivalent for what one was Originally; and in regard to the lateness of the Season, and the dangers that may arise from thence from trifling Winds, or bad weather, the former of which would occasion the loss of many of our Crew thro' the length of the passage, & the latter disable even the few that we have from doing the Ship's Duty, the immediate consequence of which would be, the apparently risquing the loss of both Ship and Cargo, Do say each, & all of Us, That having maturely weighed (as far as our Capacities will enable Us) all the foregoing circumstances, & all, & every other circumstance, that We apprehend, does or may relate to the present Case, We give it as all and each of our opinions, that it is by no means safe or prudent to risque the gaining Bengall, but that on the contrary we should make the best of our way to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George, or any other near Port, where we have assistance to enable Us to persue such Measures, as then shall be deemed most fitting. In Witness whereof We have hereunto Set our hands this Sixteenth day of September, in the Year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred & forty.

August 1739 being called for the Board observed that promise was conditional but however as Tomby Chitty and his Partners did the 20<sup>th</sup>. of last Month pay in the first payment and promised to be more punctual in the next in further part of their Debt, the Board were willing to comply with their request in letting them have one Third of the Broad Cloth received last year, but the price not being then Settled; the Board asked them what they proposed to give for it, to which they replied that we must be very sensible how much the prices of all Goods were affected by the Troubles and the hazard there was of sending them up into the Country, that they knew we would not consent to abate any thing of the price we sold the Broad Cloth of 1738 for, and therefore they did not ask it, but they hoped we would let them have it at the same rate which was as much as they could afford to give with any hopes of a reasonable Proffit considering the risque they run in the Country, and the Interest they must pay as they understood they were to lay the money down before they took the Cloth out of the Warehouse.

The Board having abundant Reason to be convinced of the bad Effects which the Troubles in the Country have had, and still have upon all Trade, that great part of the Broad Cloth which the other Merchants took out of the Warehouse the beginning of the Year remains still in Town, and that they have been obliged to sett [*sic*] it at a less price than formerly in order to encourage the Buyers and promote the Consumption, which is much decreased of late by the Warrs in Misore & Tritchanopoly which Countries when they were in Peace took off considerable Quantities. The President acquaints the Board that there has for some days been a Report that the Morattas were coming again into this Province, which had given a fresh alarm to the Inhabitants, That yesterday the families of several considerable Moor men came into Town, more were come to day, and others were upon the Road. That he had endeavoured to inform himself what might be the reason of the Morattas marching again towards Arcot, concerning which, reports were very different, but that which had the best authority, and which he hoped might be depended on was, that Ragojee Busseirah was coming with only three thousand Horse to the Feast at Trinomoly, & tho' the Grand Army was advanced to Coloure it was only to receive the last payment due from the Nabob, who had sent Kistnaje Puntaloo to settle it with Them. However as neither Morattas or Moors depend much upon the Faith of each other; The Nabob was putting himself in a posture of Defence at Arcot, and had given leave to those who were afraid to stay there, to go and secure themselves where they thought fitt, till all matters were adjusted between him and the Morattas, and these last were retired again to a greater distance. In the mean time the President has given fresh directions to the Hircarras to observe what passed in the Country and Send him constant advices of the motions of the Moratta Forces.

The Morattas enter the province again.

The President then acquainted the Board that agreeable to what was recommended to him in Consultation the 8<sup>th</sup>. September, He had often since Trivitee Sashachilum's return from the Country endeavoured to settle all matters between him and the others proposed to be concerned with him in the Cowles for the Betle & Tobacco & those for the measuring Duty & Town Brokerage; but many difficulties had been started on both sides, till at last they had agreed that Trivitee Sashachilum and Subramony Chittee should be named in the Cowle for the Betle and Tobacco, and Gongadarah Eyah, Sombayah and Quotambaucum Gruapa for the measuring Duty and Town Brokerage, Quotambaucum Gruapa and Gongadarah Eyah not being of a rank equal to Trivitee Sashachilum is the reason his Gomasta Sombayah is named in his Stead. The President added that Sashachilum having occasion for his Interest and assistance in some Affairs in the Country, had given him an opportunity to Engage him in these Cowles which if he had not, that for the Betle and Tobacco must in all probability have been let at a much less Rent.

May last agreed that it was absolutely necessary that that part of the White Town lying from Charles point to the Cloth Godowns next the river should be inclosed with a Wall and having hitherto deferr'd the Consideration in what manner it should be built partly for want of materials & partly because the Morattas having come to an agreement with the Nabob to leave the Country on payment of a Sum of money, We thought there was reason to hope they would before now have returned to their own Country without giving us any Molestation, but as we look upon their late Conduct to be a breach of Faith with the Nabob and a manifest violation of their agreements with him, and it being confidently reported on all hands, y<sup>t</sup>. they intend to visit the Sea ports, the Board agreed it to be absolutely necessary that some Fence should be run up at the beforementioned part of the White Town as soon as possible but as we have not a sufficient Quantity of materials ready and perhaps also not sufficient time to build a strong Wall there, the paymaster was ordered for the present to run up a Wall of two Bricks & a half thick upon the Wharf which has been already built there by the Inhabitants and that it be twelve feet high above the Warf: The Expence of this will not be above four or five hundred Pagodas and our Intention is only to make such a Fence as may prevent the Enemy from marching directly into the Town and their Musketry from firing into the Houses either of which they might at present do if they have never so little resolution since the River is fordable and the bank on the opposite side as high as the Wharf on this, But as this is only a temporary Remedy & very far from a sufficient Security it is AGREED to represent the same to our Honble Masters and desire permission to secure all that side of the Town effectually by building a Curtain with proper batteries and points all along it.
