PARAGRAPHS OF THE WORSHIP^{ED}. GEORGE TAYLOR ESQ^R. Dated Novemb^R. [About half a page of the original is lost] time taken and Carried into Bombay the sam [. . .] jenge Carried in the best and biggest of Angrias's [Grabs with Nine] by five men on Board of which 27 were killed.

The Lyon arrived her [sic] the 20 Ins^T. and [. . .] the 24 with the John Ketch, when the Shorum and Elizabeth [came out] of the Harbour and Joynd them without comeing to an anchor [I] acquainted M^R. Mathews of the Gallys takeing the Portugueze [Grabs] when he said it was not safe for the Shipping to proceed up the [Coast] without Convoy, which he designed down very speedily and desired me to send this advice down the Coast, I had dispatch't this Ga[lli]vatt Sooner but she being gone to the S^Ward to bring up th[e] Compa^S. Pepper returnd not till now.

ANDER & C^R. Washers debt is Considerably lessen[ed and will] be all of itt paid in a short time more.

ERAM RAUZE bound renter haveing been hard [put to for it] hath paid Two Hundred Pago^S. for his old debt of pago^S. Six Hundred Forty nine and Twenty Fanams, [He is really] very Indigent and poor and hopes • therefore for [your] Compassion that he shall be Considered accord[ingly] from anyfarther trouble on that account.

MADRE NAIGUE & C^R. bound renters, and likewise [Ande Virago &] Chinapa arrack Farmers have an Attachmen[t on some money] of Mar Kistna formerly Dubash here for [so much extor]ted from them, they having laid their Case [before the President] and Council of Fort S^t. George, hope they [will be able by] that means to discharge a great part of their [debt].

COOTA & C^o. our Present Arrack renters having paid [a great part of their] Debt there is but little due from them, whic[. . .]terly with their Rent in a short time for [wth. we have taken such] security as can be had here.

7th. Two French Ships saild[on the] 14 Instant for France having taken in there [. . .] Hundred Bales, Consisting Chiefly of Ordinary[White] Long Cloth, and Sallampores, and about one [Hundred bales] of Beteelas.

8th. We have the happiness [to inform you we] are in Perfect Peace with the Moors Gover[nment] here both Civill and military are all [a few words lost].

Your Hon^{rs}. & c^o. of the 29 October rec^d the 25 Decemb^r. the Hannover and Galleys & c^o. Shipping has been with us to whom gave the necessary Precaution, and the Galleys in their Passage had the good luck to overcome two of the Portugeze Warr Grabs, and the Victoria Grab over Angrias, by taking and bringing into Bombay his Commadore, and the head Subarder as may see by the Inclosed Paper, how the Portugeze will resent their [. . .] any time will produce, but believe if M^r. Mathews woud [but ent]er openly and heartily in the Compa^s. Interest, an acc[ount one or two pages seem to have been lost] Dubash here will deliver it with the others.

The reason why the Company [. . .] Peddedintons is because they paid no more Kings Custom for Clothes of 56 Coveds long then for a Single Sheet of 7 Covetts long, [. . .] merely for these Sheets at Maddapollum twenty Six [. . .] and now they may be bought att 18 Pago^s. P Corge wh[. . .] it acceptable Cloth.

As for the sail Cloth it may be bou[ght . . .] Pago^s: P Corge when Cotton grows Cheaper of which there [will] be a great Encrease this year.

About 6 Weeks ago I passed over the [River of] Yannum which I had not done before, thinking itt a low Is[land] of trees, but I found it to my satisfaction very high land a[nd the] Eastermost part surrounded by the sea which may be truly [. . .] one for that Promontary of Land called Corango Poynt stret[ching] far into the Sea that in the bottom of this Bay it is a perfect [calm] when the Sea runs very high oft of the Point, a branch of Yannum [river] runs into the Sea in this Bay, which lyes on the north si[de of the] Point on the north side of this Peninsula called Nel[lipillee] [. . .] the sea and the Bar[rier] [About half a page lost.]

[. . .] 6. I presume your Hono^r. & c^t. will approve of Nellepelle before Yannum or Gutten Dewy, then please to order us to settle upon this large and valuable Inheritance Wee will live in Cajan Houses and [. . .] Charge in building [of] them will be but a triff[le] tis said here is 50 [in the] Raj[. . .] oks, that are Inhabited I have seen near One Hundred of them [but] none Comparable to Nellepelle, where we have a Quiet Sea open to [. . .] and all that can be wish't for, on the North side is ord[. . .] made, and on the West side the Fine our [merchant] Dor[. . .]inga [. . .] the Dutch Chief Merchant, and is reckoned a very rich man, he wants to send for his Family and all his Kindred after he has built Houses at Nellepelle others the same, our living in Town makes the Rashwars uneasie they thinking it a Disgrace when we see any of their Daughters they valuing themselves [so] much for being of the Royall Tribe, this Deputy Rajowe lately told me, that no European but myself will be suffered to [live in] this Town, that mons^r. Curtoo and his Padre lived [under a] tree near Yannum till his [House] was built, that it w[. . .] for us to live att Nellepelle, where we [. . .] might send for Sou[. . .] as we pleased, that he was very sensible I had allways [. . .] have sight of any of their Women, as much as possible, and [. . .] the same [About half a page lost.]

Included is an account of a Penins[ula called] Nellepele which this Queen as [sic] appointed for us to settle [. . .] as this Deputy Rajowe sent me word this day, or a [settle]ment at Gutten Dewy is offered us, being an Island [surround- ed] with a branch of the great River and is about twelve Engli[sh] Miles in Circumference, Scituate on the South side of itt w[here] these Country Vessells are built and is to the East of In[eram] about Twelve miles, and lyes West of the Barr and mouth [of the] great River about Twenty Miles but their is not so [. . .] for us, nor can it be Expected we can have any more than a [. . .] Whereas Nellepelle when once Inhabited [. . .] on Co[. . .]e be ours, the Dutch have [a few words lost] and as as [sic] often Hon^d. [Your ...] another River [a few words lost] depth of Water sufficient [. . .] in so that we have the use of Two Bars, as also [. . .] this Peninsula as near as I coud Judge it about Twe[ive] Miles round, about the Skirts of itt the land is low f[. . .] Excepting that part that borders upon the Sea, where it is [. . .] Land from Yannum or the West part of itt east to the s[outh] 8 or 9 miles, all high and smooth land where there is [. . .] Taranind Trees half the way this Nellepelle is [. . .] by the Fishermen, that live by the Riverside, and [. . .] that are about the middle of itt of Poor People [. . .] home I apply'd my self to this Deputy [Rajowe in order] to take a view of itt' and this day he sen[. . .] for she Reigns in her sons minority [. . .]-formable to the Cowle of Priviledge [. . .] by Rajowe Riaprose, and now Co[. . .] Timorose, and wis [a few words lost] and make a [a few lines lost.]

if the [Grabs] continued their Chase the next day they would fire as [. . .] then, to know which they were which accordingly [. . .] which the Portugueze Grabs fired a [. . .] Galleys which [*a few words lost*] and se[. . .] man and has been a go[. . .] therefore I request the Favour of yo^r. Hon^r. &c^r. [. . .] permitt him to live in the Compa^s. Service here [. . .] Vizagapatam, may be Called thither upon [. . .] not ordered to remain with me.

The Queen has not yett ordered her Sons present to be sent him, therefore tis supposed she Expects me to go with itt as I did before, Her pallace is two days Journey to the west of Ingeram, I will avoid going if possible.

I have by this Vessell sent musters of such Cloth as the Company desired when I was here before Viz^t.

Our Cloth is all gone to Vizaga[patam] Included is the Invoice of itt, as also Copy of last Letter wi[th] the Description of Nellepelle.

A Head Weaver that lives on the other side of this great River towards Madapollum, has offered to provide for the Company Long Cloth Fine, att 48 Pago^s. 7^o Corge and [ord^r.] Long Cloth for 30 Pag^s: 7^o Corge, all full lengths and Bread[ths] and Proportion as now and after he brings it to Ingeram [and] his money as is now Customary, this Peons brings his Muste[rs I] remember we paid this Weavers Father Anno 1700, 100 Pago^s. [7^o Corge] for Long Cloth, very little Finer, they Company then Writing [they] had such a ready Markett for itt, that we could not send them [too much] of itt, provided We bought itt much Cheaper, which in those [days] we Could nott do, so that Factory [was] withdrawn I mean [Madapollam].

We are now Indebted to our Merchants [. . .] 232 Pago^s. odd Fanams, for Cloth and thirty odd Pago^s. to our Washermen, besides Cloth to the amount of Fireteen Bales which lyes in the Godown unsorted, which they provided for us, I finding no likelyhood of having more Pago^s. sent us, I did not buy it of them.

Company and that yo^r. Hon^r. &c. would be pleased to Issue out this Order with Consen[t] of the Inhabitants have it Published on the back of an Elephant with Power to him in Case the Governour of the Pagoda refuses to Pay him that he may arrest him and oblidge him to [a] Compliance, also that he formerly paid three Quarters of a Pa[goda] rent for his House, which has for some years been released by Governour Collett &c. on Our Request, may be Incerted in y^e. Paper [to] be released to him for ever and given to him, the Charity is Sixty Pago^s. ʒ Annum of which he [now receives an]nually Thirty Pago^s.

This is the Request of the [Two Prin]ces as also of the King of Caannore, if yo^r. Honour &c. gratife them in this affair it will be a great Pleasure for [us] to hear itt and of Service to our R^t. Hono^{ble}. Master's negotiatio[ns] on this whole Coast, for if they find we are kind to their request they will not be wanting to Gratife us in ours. We are

My last to your Honour &c. was upon a Country Boat, which Inclos'd by [sic] November months Account and was upon the request of Coja Gee, in behalf of his Father in Law, going from Madrass to Arcott, that your [sic] &c. woud be pleased to Assist him with Coolies &c. needfull for his Journey thither, which we hear was most Favourable Condescended to [him] for which Coja Gee has directed me to return yo^r. Honour & [c. thanks] This now accompanies my December months account, in [which] I have given Account Current Fort S^t. Georg [sic] Credit for the [. . .] Hundred Madrass Pago^s. remitted me by the hands of M^r. Ri[chard] Benyon and have wrote of Seventeen Pago^s. Twenty Four Fanams, to profit and Loss, being for so much gaind in Exchanging them into Pollicatt Pago^s. likewise comes my last Years 12 months Accounts, which I hope will meet your Honour &c^s. Approbation.

I thankfully Acknowledge your Hon^r. &c^r. Favour in giving me leave to repair the Rooms above stairs but Especially the Flagg Staff because now I hope we shall be upon a Levell with our Neighbours here, whereas hitherto it has made us look very little in the Eye of every one, that the French and Dutch, especially the Former upon an hird House, shoud Hoist a Flagg and we nott, who have [al]ways had the [better] of either of these two nations, Even Coja Gee him[^{self} when] he was passing by the Factory and seeing [their flags but] not ours, Sent this Gross reflection [that if I] was [not] able to afford a Flagg, he would send me Betea[^{las}] to make one, Upon which I gott one made, the old Flagg being Quite worn out hoping your Honours &c^r. will lett me Charge it in my next Months Account, the Cost of it being but Seventeen Pago^s. which I presume yo^r. Hon^r. &c^r. will think but a Trife upon the account of keeping up the Compa^s. Honour here & the Dignity of the Hon^{ble}. Presidency of Fort S^t. George.

M^r. Robert Berrimans Sloop the Charles and Mary Saïd hence the 9 Instant bound for Pegue, having been refitted in the River, and supply'd with Provisions and other Necessaries for her Voyage. I am.

This Accompanies a List of Ols or Writes of Debts belonging to the Estate of William Gyfford Esq^r. decaasd, a great many of the Debts belonging to the Hon^{ble}. Company as appears by their Ballance of the Books L.S.

Since the Death of M^r. Blackett Midford, we have Examined the Deceased William Gyffords Accounts, and find his Estate Indebted to the Hon^{ble}. Compa[ny] upwards of One Hundred Thousand Rupees.

The abovementioned List was in part wro[te] by M^r. George Tullie, and all the Writes are said to be in his Hands, we doubt not but upon the Perusing of this Letter Y^r. Honour &c^r. Councill will find it needfull to secure all the Writes and in the name of the Honour^{ble}. Company, and for their Account, We request that the said Writes be forthwith seized.

We now return the Madrass Workm[en] which were sent here by the Hon^{ble}. Francis Hastings &c^r. Councill.

From Cochin we are advised of the miserable Estate of Spahaun, the Plague and Famine rage within, and a Powerfull Enemy Ravages all without, tis thought in a few Days the last will be master of the Place, if so the English Gentlemen there are to Expect no Quarters.

The Revenge Grabb has Carried into B[om]bay one of the largest of Angrias Grabbs and a good [number] of Prisoners, the Three little Vessells that came [hither] have in their Passage up the Coast been [able to capture two Portugueze] Grabbs who Fired a Broad [side by which were] killed the Second Mate of one, and some others, but after a short dispute, both the Grabbs were taken and Carried up to Bombay.

As this is likely to Widen the breach with the Portugueze, we shall not fail to give timely notice of itt to all Ships that Pass. We are

Fancett has sent us from Ingeram twenty Bales of Cloth, and we Expect between Thirty or Forty more, which as soon as they arrive we will load upon the Fort S^t. David munchua, with the remaining Bales we have here, which may amount to the Number of One Hundred and Forty Bales or [more].

By this Conveyance [. . .] Cash to the 8 Instant [*a few words lost*] the Ult^o. December, and our Paymast^r. Account to the ult^o. November. We are daily dun'd by Mucanterow, who has att present the Government; for his Customary Present & Continually alarmed with the news of our late Nabob Sanoula Cawns Brother comeing to Supercede him, We shall if we can stave of the Compliance till we are Certain who will be Firmly Invested in itt. This being what att present's Materiall. We Remaine

Yesterday I was to the north side of Nellepelle, where is a great many Palmera Trees I asked them why they did not shave them, and draw Toddy they said there was no People to do itt, and Certainly Coaca Nutt Trees would thrive well there, I found in this Part of the Peninsula only Herdsmen and Shepherds, very little Arable Land, Tanks of Excellent Water, and our Washer[man] says it is better to wash Cloth there than att Yannum because there is Sandy Ground to Dry itt upon; in short this Land is Capable of Great Improvement, and upon this view I cannot

think itt less than thirty English Miles round, I mett with Hares and the People said there was other wild Beasts in the Woods, which in some Places are very thiock.

This Deputy Rajowe was with the Queen (who has the Executive power) abt. two months ago she then Charged him to take Care of us, and Ordered him to give us a Settlement att Gutten Dewy, or were [*sic*] we pleasd as her Husband had promised M^r. Faucett when he was att Paddaporum, and to give us as much ground as we wanted Adding, that she hoped, that a great many Rich Merchants would come to live under our Protection, that Wee might have a great name in her Country.

The French could gett no more ground than where their Factory stood, which is not so long as our Inward Fort att Madrass but the Queen said she could trust us any where.

The Subah of Gulcunday has quitted his Demand of Thirty Thousand Pagodas ₹ Anū which he has forced from Rajowe Timerose for several Years, by bringing into this Country a numerous army and now requires only Ten Thousand Pag^a. as a present to Himself with the usual Tribute money, so that matters are allmost Accomodated with the nabob, Arab Beeg Cawn, and Yesterday Came Orders for the Gutten Dewy Vessells and those of Ramasheroon, and all other places to Sail.

If yo^r. Honour &c^r. please to send a sma[ll] Vessell to Carry away our Bales, she may make severall Trips in a Year to Madrass with them, and when she wants repairing there is all Conveniences for itt att Gutten Dewy, The Jentowe Ship-Wrights, that mad[e] Ships for us att Madapollum do live there.

Yesterday we went again to Nellepelle that wee might give you all the Satisfaction we cann about the Place, when wee came near the sea side, Wee found a long Island made by the Sea, which runs from the S^O. side to the N^O. side into that River, but att low water it is very shallow especially towards the north side the Island is about Three miles in length, the breadth but little, but is so high land that the Sea never breaks over itt, here in my Opinion a Fortification may be made, that is Impregnable to the natives, in our way wee see a Garden of Coconutt Trees, many of which planted there wou'd be a Considerable Revenue, Wee passed over plain & Champion Ground in severall places, for severall miles together where we found towards the S^O. East part that great Quantitys of Salt might be made, and as to the Extent of the Peninsula, we perceiv'd there is no travelling about itt in a Pallenkeen in less yⁿ. two days, which makes it little Inferiour in largeness to the Island Dewy near Metchlapatam, yett this Country so capable of Improvement seems to be neglected, so as to take very little notice of itt further than to receive the Annuall Revenue of the Head Men, which amounts to no more than One Hundred and Ten Pag^a. Yearly.

M^{ost} of our Bales were gott to Vizagapatam the rest were very near by our last advices from thence.

It is now some days since Wee receivd a Letter by Two Peons Seald with a Moors Seal, to which we were entire Strangers, Sign'd Nath^l. Elwick, with seven other Gentlemens names to itt the Peons told us and Wee afterwards Found by the Contents of the Letter Bearing Date the 8 December 1722 O.S. That they receivd itt from the Hon^{ble}. Gover^r. and Council of Madrass with Orders to bring itt to us which they have accordingly done.

Your Honour &c^r. in the Letter desire to know our reasons for the Treatment which the Ship Diana mett with att Gaule, & the Brigan^o. Samarine att Manare w^[th] an hint of Ill usage receiv'd by severall others, which you do not th^[ink] fitt to name to us.

Att the time you speak of our Cheifs had the strictest Ord^[ers] for Inspecting into the Passes of all. Ships, that shoud touch [att] our Ports, the better to secure our trade from Interlopers, and others trading without the Permission of the Establishd Company in the East as well as West Indies, where they Sail with all Sorts of Passes and Commissions, which has frequently been Complain'd of by yours as well as our Company, this together with many other Old standing Orders, has oblig'd us by every Opportunity to use such Measures, as Wee Judg'd best for the Security of our Trade, and to prevent any Encroachm^{ts}. upon the Sovereigne Grant our actions in pursuit of this, has allways been such, as to give no just Grounds for Complaint hitherto, w^{ch}. as they are by every Opportunity Transmitted to Europe, We doubt not are well known to England [and] Holland, And We cant suppose but yo^r. [Hon^r. &c^r. are] fully Inform'd of all things from yo^r. masters and therefore you must be well acquainted, how absolutely necessary it is for us to use all Imaginable Caution on our side, att this Dangerous Juncture so that were we to give no further Answer We might think our selves sufficiently Excused, nor do we think our selves oblige to give yo^r. Hon^r. &c^r. any Account of our Orders, You tell us you design to write to Europe for satisfaction, We are well assured of the Justice of our Actions, and desire your Hon^r. &c^r. to use all probable ways to be advised of our behaviour to all the English Cap^{ts}. and particularly to Two, who have been lately here with the ships Shoram and Stretham, We are sure you will Find by Enquiry y^e. our Gover^r. in the Indies, have allways show'd the utmost respect to all Licensed Ships, belonging either to his Majesty, or the Hon^{ble}: East India Company, and to such as Sail with passes acknowledged to be valid by the s^d. Company.

In the mean time We shall by the First Opportunity Transmitt to the Hon^{ble}. Dutch East India Company a Coppy of Your Letter, together with an Exact list of vast number of Ships, That have come hither under severall pretences, more than those of the Kings or Compa^s. English Bottoms amongst whom We find none named Diana belonging to English Merchants, th^[ere] was indeed another Bottom of that name, belonging as we were told to different Owners, and therefore we have been abus'd since We did not believe any part of her belong'd to the English Company.

As to the Brigan^o. Samarine which yo^r. Hon^r. &c^r. talk pretty largely of, the Case as We are informd is this, he came in the 23 of May last in the night a very Improper time to buy Rice and unchord before Negambo, the Cheif of which place sent him word, he must not stay there, it being Contrary to his Orders to admitt any strange Ship, upon which the Cap^t. weigh'd and went up before the wind to Manare, which is near 3 Degrees N^o. from the place he Weigh'd from, tho he had a hold Lee shore to have gone away that Coast had we had the liberty to have lett him staid, is unfitt for any Ship to ride even in the good Monsoon, and it was next to a miracle that he who was a stranger shoud escape all the Rocks and Shouls, which our own

Pilotts [are] hardly able to keep clear of beside that he Confessed he came [from] Anjengo in the S W Monsoon and might have gott to Madrass in a Few days the Common Way, to which place Yo^r. Honour &c^r. say he was bound

Wee were very much surprized and not without reason att his unaccountable procedure, whereby we could not expect any other than to lose the Vessell, being gott into the Bottom of the Bay in the s W : Monsoon, which brings in so heavy a Sea with itt, that scarce any Anchors or Cables can hold a Vessell the s^t. Cap^t. Tho^s. Mackie took very little pains to avoid running his Vessell aground on a small Island, were she stuck Fast after which he went to Fort Manare where he made very heavy Complaints, that he had no provisions on board, to subsist himself and Comp^y. with, he had no money to buy or goods to Barter for Provisions, had our People contrary to the Equitable orders of our Comp^y. Consented to buy them of him, his Cargoe being of little or no value, he was going to discharge his Men, but we advised him to the Contrary, in hopes he might gett her off the sand back, on the Change of the Monsoon.

In this Condition the Christians there tho they knew the risque they ran in doing itt, were prevaild with to assist them in their misfortune, being assur'd from the Cap^t. that he shoud be assisted with money from Madrass, which has not yett appear'd, nor was any paid in December last.

The northerly Winds Blowing, and the Vessell being luckily seated on a Sand bank, she was gott of and the Capt Saild and Escaped from that very dangerous place when through the Charity of the Inhabitants he was assisted with Provisions, for which they have not yett receivd the Paym^t. from Madrass, but instead of having their Demands satisfied by those who make so much Enquiry about the Vessell & being repaid with their Charity, made them advance him, Wee have receiv'd Yo^r. Hono^r. &c^r. unexpected Complaint, We cou'd not have believd that in so short a Time, he cou'd have taken up the Sum of Guilders 391 5 which was in a manner beg'd of them.

This is but an Ill return for their assistance to this Vessell, which came from Anjengo without [Provi]sions or any Money to provide any on their Arrivall [. . .] Port for the safety of themselves and Vessell [. . .].

Itt looked very suspicious for him to run into one of the most Dangerous places under this Government where he run the risque of losing both their Lives and Vessell & which they Certainly woud have lost, had not we tho Contrary to our Orders been prevaild upon out of Pitty and Compassion to prevent itt, nay we Further assisted them as much as if it had been a Compa^y. Ship, but att the same time assur'd him that no One in Future, who Endeavours so unfairly to search after a River in the Bottom of this Bay shall come of so well We therefore desire that yo^r : Hon^r. &c^r. will hereafter give such Directions to yo^r : ships, as may prevent any Innovations on the Settled Customs of this Government, and maintain a good Correspondence between us, for what we have done is for our security and according to our Masters Orders, and is the more necessary in these Dangerous times.

The Washers were very [hard] sett to provide for the Middlesex being kept att work night and day for near Two months time and yet 400 Bales 3^d Month [were] the most they coud then cure.

The Complainants having been acquainted here with your proceedings have nothing further to offer than what hath already passed, nor can they produ[ce] any better proofs for the support of their charge as the nature of the case is, who do not allow the 725 Pag^s: to be any part of the 1242 6 charged in their Account.

Your orders came to late for loading any Sea Coals upon the Young Derby, she having taken in so many of her Bales that the master could not conveniently make Room for them nor can we yet procure any Mango plank which shall be sent you as soon as possibly it can be had from Nagore or that part of the Coast where there is the most likelihood of obtaining itt & with the Sea Coales may be sent by the Young Derby or if you should not think fitt to send her this way again, by some other Conve[yance].

We cannot but think that Fifty Pag^a. applyed to Sevamull and some others may afford you an Opportunity to put him off from time to time under pretence of receiving orders from Madrass, the arrivall of the present by Shipping and such like pretences till your Rajah hath made up matters and is in a Capacity to Screen you from an attempt that can be made upon your [Person] or Effects, as you have Investment going [Forward we must] in no wise prejudice you in that part[icular or] be sorude to [...] which [...] he will hardly [...] [We cannot] doubt but your Interest with the Rajah will afford you means to get out of the way & secure your Effects from falling into his hands in regard to which it will be necessary that you keep good Intelligence in his Camp to advise you when any thing is hatching ag^t. you.

As for his promise of granting you Perwannas it is nothing but a lure to draw you in, you may see by his treatment of the Dutch your neighbours w^t. Account he makes of Perwannas, therefore that ought not in the least to Induce you to gratif[ie] his Avarice and Extortion, these are the best and safest Directions we can give you in this [nice] affair, and we doubt not but you will find some way to avoid putting our Hon^{ble} Masters to so great a Charge and drawing a [future] Inconvenience upon their Affairs in those parts.

Not having recd an answer yet to my last which accompanied my twelve months Acco^{ts}. this replys to your Hon^r. &c^r. general of the 18 January and incloses my two Accounts for said month & Febry.

I Humbly return your Hono^r. &c^r. thanks for giving me leave to come up to Madrass but the unlucky disappointment of [the] Parr my brother promised to send here and his keeping my Servant there so long without an answer that it was too late when he arriv'd to go by Sea the Southerly Wind being strongly sett in and all the boats gone from hence, has obliged me to defer accepting your Hon^r. &c^r. favour till some Sea conveyance offers, because my Circumstances will not admitt of my coming overland and bringing those things I did design along with me.

As to my expences I shall take care to lay out no more than what is allowable and absolutely necessary and shall be sure to use the utmost frugality in respect to the repairs ordered to be done to the Factory which I am now about, but the work goes on very slowly thro' the Difficulty of getting at present both materials and Workmen, The Dutch being rebuilding three quarters of their Factory, the Moors refitting the long bridge [and] seven or eight new houses a making, upon which account if I gett People att work one day I cant gett them the next, the Governm^t. pressing them for their buissness, besides the trouble of getting them, they now ask a greater rate for their hire, a Carpenter or Bricklayer that work't before for eighteen pence 4^d diem will not now for less than twenty four, however I hope to gett what is remaining to be done, finished by the middle of next month and then will send your Honour &c^r. an Account perticulars and insert the amount under the head of Factory repairs in my months account, that shall come with it.

In your Hon^r. &c^r. generall of the 30th. November, your orders for new tiling the House seem to be Countermanded without which we shall be in as bad a plight as ever in the rainy season, the charges thereof will not be [so] great as I presume

your Honour &c. conceives for sever^{al}. of the old Tiles will serve again, and ading new ones to them, with the bricklayers Cooly will not all Amount to above eight or Ten Pagodas, therefore I hope your Honour &c^r. woud be pleased to confirm these orders again for our conveniency of living in the Factory as likewise the preserving the beams and planks within from rotting as also the Floors w^{ch}. are all boarded.

Six barrells of Country Madrass Powder Nett Seven Hundred ninety one pounds Thirty four Shotts round Viz^t. Twenty Six of eight pound each Eight of Six Ditto.

Six barrels English Cannon Powder weig[hing] Six hundred Sixteen pound nett Two Hundred Shott round Sakers between [five] and six pound each.

Transactions as also the arrivall of the Young Derby, for the bad Condition of which and the loss of the Metchlapatam we are heartily sorry Wee shall now proceed to inform your Honour &c^r. of the posture of Affairs here, since the Supravisors departure under the prescribed generall heads as Follows.

AS TO SHIPPING.

The George Brigantine was dispatch'd for Moco Moco the 21 July with a Supply of Money and Wares from whence she returned the 5 of Septemb^r. with a loading of boards Cooly Coys and other materials for building y^e. 18 October she was sent back thither in order to take on board [what] Pepper was ready in the Northern Settlem^{ts}. and the 17 Decemb^r. she arrived here from Moco Moco wth. a loading of Pepper.

The Goodfellow was dispatch'd Aug^r. 14 to the Port of Manno on a design (which we are sorry to acquaint you) has proved unsuccessfull, a p^r.ticular account of which you will see in a Representation of itt made by M^r. John Shewen who was employ'd therein, Entered after a Consultation of October the 8 She return'd from thence October 6, and has since brought up what Pepper was att Sillebar, Decemb^r. the 8 we dispatch'd her to Moco Moco & sent thither by her M^r. Peter Shelly Cheif of that place with a supply of Money Men and Stores from whence we daily expect her here with Timbers boards &c^r.

The Lethieulier Cap^t. John Edwards arrived here October 18 from London we are heartily sorry [she] has been detain'd so long on this Coast, having expected [to] [dis]patch her soon enough to save her Passage to Mad[rass] [that] she might have Sail'd for England in Febry for w^{ch}. rea[so]n we have not garbled the Pepper on board her but we [have] been disappointed partly by want of boats & bad W^heather, but especially by the Sicklyness of the Season, above half the Compaⁿ: Servants being very ill & not in a Condition to do any buissness, We shall take the most effectuall method we can to remedy the delay occasion'd by the want of boats by oblidging the Pangarans as soon as the Prows come in to keep up a Constant number having already advanced them some money on that Account.

We send in the Pacquett Duplicate of the Comp^s. Letter by the Ship Lethieulier her Invoice and Charter Party as also a list of what Ships &c^r. have arrived att and departed from this Port since [our] last [We have order]ed Ship Lethieulier to

touch att Moco [Moco] | to take in] what Pepper remains there of { which the] Chief & the Councill there of that place will send a Particular [Account] as we do herewith of what loaded on board her and the George att this place.

The Ship Queen lyes here in a very bad Condition and we are often put to much trouble and charge to send People to her assistance for fear of her sinking, We shall be oblidge if she grows worse to take out her lead and Iron and to hawl her ashore if we can for her preservation which we hope you will approve we must desire your orders about her by the first Conveyance.

We return your Hon^r. &c. our thanks for the seasonable supply, sent us by the Perry without which we should have found itt difficult to have dispatch'd the George Brigantine for the remainder, and wh[at] we may receive we promise you the utmost Frugality [our] Storehouse is very bare of every thing having receiv'd no supply of that kind by the Lethieulier as you will see by her Invoice, so we must intreat you send us the Stores mentioned in the Inclosed List also some Long Cloth white for the purchase of Pepper att the Nothern Settlements and some goods for presents to the Country People, We are greatly in want of Slaves to carry on our works, Cooley hire making our expences run very high, twould be of great service to us of [sic] you could assist us with some Smiths and Bricklayers, Our Stock of Cattle is very low we beg you send us some Cows and Goats by the first occasion, Wee must particularly intreat you to send us a supply of Medicines there being scarce any left fitt for use, and we presume yo^e. are sensible y^t. this place cant be without a large and frequent supply of that kind, Wee have almost half the Garrison sick of Intermitting fevers, and not one pound of Peruvian bark on the Coast, We observe what you are pleased to write about Fanams they did very well to the Northward so we must request a supply of them as also some Copper Cash and a Silver Chop for the use of this Settlem^t. that which we now use belonged formerly to Bantall Factory.

By the Lethieulier the Hon^{ble}. Court of Directors Consign'd us fourteen Chests of Treasure and five Pipes of Madera Wine the latter of which proved to be but half full, M^r. Funster as Ψ his Consultation of the 29 Octob^r. ordered five more which happened to be in the same Condition so that we have only had five whole Pipes and our monthly expence being one Pipe and a half our stock is already very low so must request a Supply there is such a Scarcity of Arrack here that find itt Impossible to purchase itt att the price fixt by M^r. Hubbard in his Consultation of June 21 wherein itt was ordered that Arrack shoud be delivered the Companys Servants att Thirty Six Dollars Ψ Leager [theres none] to be bought under Seventy Dollars Ψ Leaguer att this time and since the price is so uncertain we must desire a Generall liberty in this particular which we will take care shall not be abused.

CONCERNING INVESTMENTS.

We are sorry to acquaint you that the [Quantity] of Pepper receiv'd from these and the Nothern Settlements does not answer expectation, there being on board the Lethieulier only Two hundred ninety four Bahan one hundred a Quarter and Twenty pounds and on the George Brigantine One hundred and Seventy Bahan five hundred and Seventy pound.

As to the reason of the deficiency to the Northward we begg leave to referr to our Consultation of December 3^d.

We now transmitt you a Survey of Pangaran Soongy Etams Pepper Plantation taken in Octob^r. last but as there is no great Confidence to be reposed in him shall in a few days send out an European [. . .] Jenytoolis, and a Bugguese Guard to [. . .] the same method as is practised in the [. . .] by which we shall be able to discover who are negligent and advise you more exactly for the Future what Quantity of Pepper we may reasonable expect that your Hon^r. &c. may not be deceived with hopes of more than is really to be had and wee promise your orders for a Survey twice a Year shall be punctually observed.

OF TRADE IN GENERALL & THERIN ALL TRANSACTIONS WITH THE COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

We observe What the Hon^{ble}. Court of Directors write in their Gener^l. Letter # the Lethieulier ab^t. their settlem^t. of Moco Moco, which we are perswaded is owing to their not being fully apprised of the Importance of that place to the Comp^y. Interest, We beg leave to assure Your Hon^r. &c. that the Comp^y. Affairs will suffer very much if there is not a Cheif and Council there and we are humbly of opinion that instead of lessening the number of Servants in that place there ought to be a further supply especially military sent thither a Considerable Force being absolutely necessary to keep that Country in Awe and since we have reason to believe that the greatest Quantity of Pepper is to be expected from those Nothern Settlem^{ts}. we doubt not you will agree with us; they ought not to be neglected, the Deputy Gov^r. having been convinced of the truth of this by long experience, humbly desires leave to referr your Hon^r. &c. to a Generall Letter from Moco Moco on that Subject Dated October 31, you have herewith a list of Chinese and their employs, Wee have lately appointed one See Gibb as head over them and in every respect the fittest wee could chuse for this employ. He seems inclinable to sett about the old project of making Sugar and arrack but in that case desires the Company may allow him fifty male & Fifty Female Slaves for his Assistance, which he has made appear will greatly ease the charge as you will observe by his proposalls copy of which we herewith send you, he has likewise engaged to procure a Considerable number of China men this Season alledging that their want of a Cheif has been the cause that no more are already come you will also perceive by comparing list with the last sent y^t. there has been great mortality among them.

We are glad to advise you that the Coun[try] is in perfect peace the People come down to their Doosans as formerly and seem every where to be well affected to the Comp^y. Interest which good intelligence we shall endeavour to maintain a great many of the Country People have been with us requesting Chops for the Security of the Pepper Plantations they design to make, How soon we have recovered our health we design to Summon the Proatteens round us Viz^t. those in the Territories of the Pangarans Soongy Lama Soongy Etam Boundseradin & Jantinely as also those of Talla &c. to give them all Imaginable Assurances of our protection and Friendship to Encourage them to plant Pepper Trees, nor are we without hopes y^t. our endeavours herein will have the desired effect from the good disposition the People seem att present to be in.

The Pangaran of Manno has [wrote] the Deputy Gov^r. a private Letter acknowledging the Receipt of One Hundred Dollars from Mr. Hubbard which he pro[m]ises to repay and that he will shortly make him a visitt but says nothing about the disappointment^t. occasioned by the breach of his promises since our last Dyed Dupatty Benteerin in whose room the Pangarans have Constituted a new Proatteen well affected to the Company which we hope will be for their Advantage, Rajah Nassattie his Confederate who some time since went to Pullembang is now returned he behaves himself very quietly att present and we shall keep a strict eye over him for the Future.

Pangaran Jantinely having made his Submission and acknowledged his Fault is restored to his Governm^t. for a particular Account of which [we take the] liberty to refer to a Consultation of August 15.

TOUCHING FORTIFICATIONS [BUILDINGS] & REVENUES.

We send you a particular list of [. . .] Buildings by which you will be informed of their #sent Condition and how far they have been carry'd on under the management of the respective Deputy Govern^r. and we promise to exert our selves as much as possible to finish them wth. all expedition, as to the buildings to the N^o.ward be pleased to be referred to Mr. Peter Shelleys Letter to us and the orders we have given him about that Affair, the Resident att Sillehar complaining to us that the Compa^y. house there was so ruinous that he could not with safety lodge

in itt, we ordered a survey thereof and find by the report made to us tis impossible to repair itt so we have ordered itt to be rebuilt, Judging itt necessary for the Interest of our Hon^{ble}. Masters to maintain that settlement.

We have almost Finished a new Pepper Godown which being more than sufficient to contain the Pepper we can expect for some time we have made a Storehouse of about one third of itt, where the Stores that are of most value will be better secured than in the Bamboo houses there are also good Lodgings over itt which will accommodate some of the Compa^s: Servants.

Wee continue according to Orders to bring our bricks from York Fort See [Gibb] has lately burnt a kiln containing Seventy Thousand bricks and has another ready to burn as for Chinam we have now as much [wor]k't as can be used.

Touching the Abatement made the renters of the Arrack and Opium License we begg leave to referr to M^r: Willfords Consultation of Novemb^r. 29 in which you will see the reasons of itt, We shall endeavour as soon as possible to advance itt to the first price but tear itt will be some time first, the want of Arrack and the small number of Chinees and Military being a great discouragem^t. to the Renters.

CONCERNING FACTORS WRITERS OFFICERS SOULDIERES AND THEIR ACCOMPTS.

Wee thank Yo^r. Hon^r. &c. for the supply of Servants sent us by the Perry we take notice of the Characters you [are] pleased to give of them but more especially of M^r. David [Carnegie] who we take the liberty to assure you is every way deserving of itt, and make no doubt will merit your future [favours] the Deputy Govern^r in particular returns you his thanks for [con]firming him second of the Coast and is very sensible of your favour in promising to determine his Affair by the next conveyance.

Tis with the greatest Concern we acquaint Your Hon^r. &c. with the Death of Thomas Dunster Esq^r. late Deputy Govern^r: of the 13 November of a violent fever & what adds to this misfortune, is the disorder in which he has left his Affairs there being a very Considerable deficiency of the Hon^{ble} Compa^s. Cash during his Administration on w^{ch}. Account we have been Oblidged to perform our duty to our Hon^{ble}: Masters in seizing part of his Estate to make itt good we send herewith Account of the particulars seized which are valued [att] the same prizes paid for them by the Deceased, For a more full Account of this unfortunate Affair, and our proceedings therein we take the liberty to refer to our Consultation of the 14 Decemb^r: and hope Your Hon^r: &c. will app[rove] our management.

We must also inform Your Hon^r. &c. of the Deficiency found in the Quantity of Pepper bought by M^r. Peter Shelley whilst he was Pepper Godown keeper being Eighty nine Baharr One hundred and fourteen pound for the reason of which we begg leave to referr you to a representation made [by him] to M^r. Hubbard entered after his Consultation of June the 4 and to our Consultation of December y^o. 26 desiring youl be pleased to send us your directions how to proceed in this Affair.

By the List of the Hon^{ble}. Comp^s: Govern^t. Servants you will see wee are in all but thirteen on the Coast of which there are two who do no great Service Viz^t. Mess^s. John Bembowe and Arthur Crundall and two att Moco Moco Mess^s. Peter Shelley and Patrick Brown so we are but [seven] who do the buissiness and very often five of us sick, by which you will perceive itt very needfull to send us a supply for the [future] (like Ships who make long Voyages) to [. . .]ment in case of Mortality.

We have appointed [M^r. Peter Shelley Chief] of [Moco Moco] and M^r. Patrick Brown second Store[k^r.] Warehousek^r. and Pepper Godownk^r: and there being a vacancy in Council we have called to the board M^r. Thomas Black[all] Secretary which we doubt not your Hon^r. &c. will approve it being his right and he having always behaved himself with diligence and Fidelity in the Hon^{ble}. Compa^s. Service.

You will observe in a Consultation dated January the 12 a Complaint made by M^r. Wheake of a Gross abuse offered him by M^r. Moor one of our Surgeons who having made his Submission in asking pardon we have continued him in his Employ

but assure your Hon^r. &c. had M^r. Elliot the other Surgeon being health we woud have dis[miss]ed him the Service having had severall complaints about the [hos]-pittall which we are oblidged to putt up, M^r. Elliot being dangerously ill and he being the only one left in case of his Death.

We cant but observe to your Hon^r. &c. the Inequality of the Two Surgeons [Imp]loys in this place the Hospittall which M^r. Moor now [has] being the only profitable Station the other has nothing but his Salary & Allowances which in this place will bare[ly] maintain & M^r. Elliot being as to his buissness at least [equ]all to his Colleque & a very carefull Sober and understanding man we hope you will take this Affair [into] your Consideration and give orders that our Surgeons may be upon a more equall Footing and take there stations at the Hospittall by turns.

This we woud have determined here had we not thought our selves oblidg'd to act with great Caution in making any alterations without Your Hon^r. &c. Permission

Your Orders to pay into Cash the Estates of Persons deceased shall be punctually observed we have paid the amount of Upcott Loves Estate being One Hundred Forty Two Dollars and a half to M^r. David Carnegie he showing us a Cobby of said [Lo]ves Will attested from the Mayors Court in Madrass [and] a Letter of Attorney from his Executor we shall [debt] M^r. Hopkins's Estate for the value of Sixty nine Pag^a. paid him att Fort S^t. George being One hundred and three Dollars 2 sucas and for Fifty dollars paid him att Moco Moco.

Lieutenant Cartwright being dead & Lieut: Nangle who is dangerously ill being oblidged for his health to come to Fort S^t. George we have given an Ensi[gn]s Commission to One Gabriel Stuart a Serjeant who has be[ha]ved himself well in order to send him down to Moco Moco which we hope you will approve.

We return our hearty thanks for the supply of Topasses sent us but cannot forbear observing how much you have been deceivd by Yo^r: Officers in the [choice] of them, We send your Hon^r. &c. [a m]uster of what sort of Sou[ldiers] were sent us We [mean] an old man who begging leave to re[turn] we have consented to itt since his Assistance wont be much missed, In fine they have sent only boys and men ready to drop into their Graves thro age, for the Security of a place which you are very sensible is both sickly and by reason [of the tre]acherous Inclinations of the natives very often dangerous you will see how indifferently we are provided [of Mi]lilitary men [by the] List herewith sent for which reason [we] must request [a supp]ly, and doubt not your directions will [be] given that [only such] be sent as this place requires Wee sh[all] permit [such of the] Topasses now sent who shall desire to [re]turn after they have served three Years and shall observe Y^r. Orders as to Stopping the Money advanced them with you.

We have informed Francis Geary [what] you write Concerning him but he is so dangerously [Ill] he cant in his present Condition be carried on board with [out] hazarding his life.

Lieut. Nangle the Widow Har[. . .] and one Baugh whom we have permitted on thei[r requesting to] come to Fort S^t. George having taken their Pass[age by this] Ship the latter was formerly ordered home by the [Company] in their Letter by the Drake.

We send a List of [. . .] Employm^t. [a few words lost] who concealed himself in the Ship unknown to the Cap^t. he has delivered us eleven and on his request we have paid him for their Passage being four pound for each according to Charter Party We have also paid the Surgeon of the Ship Twenty Six Dollars for his care of them:

The four Slaves return'd us by the Perry we have receivd and one of the Male-factors the other died in the Passage we shall creditt you as you order att Eighty doll^r. each as also for the Amount of the Provisions laid in for the Covenanted Servants and Military that came on the Perry & for money advanced the latter in Madrass.

TOUCHING ACCOMPTS.

Herewith you'l receive our monthly Accompts from the Ult^o. June to the first Decemb^r. which by reason of Sickness we have not had time to examine them this we intreat you'l excuse and we will as soon as possible sett about itt and hope to send you correct Copies of them by the Perry which is expected next month from Batavia the Moco Moco accompts are not sent there having been no Covenanted Servants at that place ever since August last but M^r. Lewis Deane only [who being] most part of that time out of Order but they are [now Cop]pying and we shall not fail to send them by the [Perry.]

Wee design to begin our Generall books from the 1 Decemb^r. having taken account remains att that time but M^r. Pyke having kept no regular Accompts Wee cannot exactly know the value of the severall articles of Dead Stock there having been no estimate made of the buildings &c. in the Supravisors time so we must of necessity value them anew in which we shall endeavour to come as near the truth as the Imperfect Accompts we have will enable us to do.

We shall observe what particulars orders we may have fermerly recd from you on this head mean time we must request your directions Touching our Gene^l. [Books] and that you woud be pleased to send us a Coppy [*a few words lost*] and one months [Journall] Parcels by which we shall be [enabled] to go on in [the] same method which is practised by you and to charge the severall particulars of Stores &c. under their proper heads this is also necessary in order to our Sub Accomptants being acquainted with the Compa^s. particular methods tho this shall not hinder us to begin and when we have recd your orders can make such alterations as you are pleased to direct.

We send Your Hon^r. &c. an estimate of our monthly charge by which you will be able to Judge how long our present Stock of Cash will be sufficient to support our charge we shall not fail our Hon^{ble} Masters Orders in being Carefull not waste their Estates in unnecessary buildings &c. but [yet] we must observe to you that the most effectual way to be truly parsimonious in this particular is to finish those that absolutely necessary wth. the utmost expedition that tho the charge for Some time must be Considerable it may not be encreased by doing things by halves and being oblidged to supply a Contin[ua]l expence.

Thus we have given your Hon^r. &c. as [full] an Account of our present Condition as we can and if we have omitted anything materiall we begg to be excused do us the Justice &c. to believe that we have and will on all occasions [exert our] selves to the utmost for the Interest of our Hon^{ble} Masters and we are sincerely and respectfully Their and

Your Hon^r. &c. will be pleased to [refer to our] Consultation dated Jan. 12 the suspension [of M^r.] Henry Bailey lately a Factor was look't into [. . .]—ing the misdeamenours alledged against him [being of a] heinous nature and he making no defence but [. . .] we thought fit to order him to Fort St. George [to answer to] his accusation before Your Hon^r. &c. since when we ha[ve] recd a Petition from him desiring liberty to stay till th[is] occasion by reason of his Illness (which he being very sick we have granted).

You will see in our Consultation of [. . .] Decemb^r. [that] there were Seven Ounces and a Quarter [wanting] [*sic*] the [w]eight [of] Silver sent by the Perry itt was weigh[ed] in the [presence] of the Master who can attest the same you will be pleased to creditt us four Pag^s. twenty three ffa[nams] being the value of itt.

There are in the Invoice of the George Brigantine Three Hundred and forty bars of Iron & Ten Pigs of lead we are informed by the master that there is a greater Quantity on board her but neither [he] nor any of the Comp^s. Servants remain^s. here know of any more being sent of from hence, We hope you will not accuse us of this neglect since it was transacted before our time, had we known any thing of itt ere the Pepper w[ent] on board we shoud have [caused] itt to be weigh'd we must beg your excuse for omitting the charges of boat hire in the same Invoice the Resid^t. of Moco Moco not having sent us an account thereof but we shall send a Cobby by next Conveyance with this Error amended & give orders that there be no more such mistakes for the time to come.

Since writing this See [Gibb] has requested of us to permitt a China Man to [take] his Passage on the George which we have granted Wee are as above.
