It is Altogather in Vain that We here have Endeavoured to Maintain a good Union and Intelligence in the Commerce of our two Companys Since You have been the first that have Committed Hostilities.

We have Just now been Apprized of the Capture of our Company's Ship Favory in the road of Boutrian on the Coast of Achin by Your Ships Medway Captain Peyton & the Dolphin Ca[ptain] Moore, We don't Speak of this Affair, but to set our right with our Superiors and in Conformity to their Or[ders] by reclaiming the Ship Favory with all belonging to her when she was taken as well the Captain Monsuer Deschenays Gibert as all others that are detained prisoners, We desire you Gentlemen to give us a positive Answer Whether not only this Ships but all such as shall have been taken before we became Aggressors against you, shall not be restored.

On Your Answer depends the good Harmony which we have Continued with pleasure and have given Orders should be Mantain'd in all places dependant on our Nation.

While Our Annual Letter &c. Papers were a Copying we received Your Honour &c<sup>'</sup>s Favour advising of the Morattas Advancing towards these Provinces on which we sent for the Merchants into Council & told them of what your Honour &c<sup>'</sup>. Advised of, to which they alledged that their Ballances in general were very low to the end of last Month, and that as nothing had been advanced them this, it wou'd be of the utmost ill Consequences not only to the Present and ensuing Investment, but likewise to their Ballances which are now standing out to put a stop to the sending of any Supplys immediately. We told them that we had Acquainted them of the Danger & that if they took any it must be entirely at their own Risque, which after we had made them entirely sensible of we thought it for our Honble Masters Interest to advance them as follows.

Since ours of the 29<sup>th</sup>. September last We have been favoured with Your Honour &c<sup>s</sup>. of the 18<sup>th</sup>. of that Month & 12<sup>th</sup>. & 17<sup>th</sup>. of October, with the Duplicates of the former to which we now Reply.

Agreeable to Your Honour &c<sup>s</sup>. request with Respect to the Princess Augusta, and of Supply<sup>r</sup>. the Gentlemen at Bencoolen with such Stores as were in our power, on Receipt of Your favour of the 18<sup>th</sup>. Sept<sup>r</sup>., we opened the Packet directed to you from thence, and the Lapwing not being then sailed We put on board her such of the stores mentioned in their Indent as she Could take in, as also what Stores they mention'd in their to us, with the quantity of Gunpowder you desired to be sent thither, the List of all which comes enclosed and she was dispatch'd to Bencoolen on the 5<sup>th</sup>. Instant.

The Scarcity of Rice Still Continuing here We Find little or no Advantage will accrue to your Honour &c<sup>s</sup>. by sending her to you with that article, and not expecting a sufficient quantity of Salt Petre in any Reasonable time to Lade on board the Durrington & Beaufort as a Stock for Your Presidency for the ensuing Season, We have come to a Determination of Keeping that Ship to Carry up the Necessary supply to fill her up with Patcharræ Rice for the use of Bencoolen being informed that Article is much wanted there and the new Crop here beginning to Come in.

We Observe that your honour &c<sup>s</sup>. had placed Tappey peons for the better intelligence between Your Settlement and this on the Road as far as Ganjam, We sent the like directions to the Resident at Ballasore, who has Since Advised us of his having put the same in Execution.

On the 1<sup>st</sup>. December our Honourable Masters Ship Godolphin Cap<sup>t</sup>. John Stevens Arrived here, she touch'd at Bencoolen in her Passage, by her We received two packets directed to your Honour &c<sup>s</sup>. One from the Honble Company, and the other from the Gentlemen at Bencoolen likewise another from the Secret Committee which with the Box packet Receiv'd @ Princess August a We now forward to your Honour &c<sup>s</sup>.



The great want of small Arms for our own use at this Settlement prevents our Supply<sup>r</sup>. the Chief and Council at Anjengo with any.

We are greatly obliged to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>., for the Advice you give us of the French Ships from Pondicherry.

The Wager as yet We have no News of the Godolphin brought no Stores for your Settlement and should there be any by the former We shall have Regard to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. request for sending them as Early as possible.

We have had the like advices with your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. as mentioned in your favour of the 17<sup>th</sup>. Oct<sup>r</sup>. from the Hon<sup>ble</sup> the President & Council at Bombay, and in Consequence thereof we resolved to send three ships to Tellicherry to fill up with Pepper Lading on board them their Kentlage tonnage Salt Petre and Redwood, and they were Accordingly dispatch'd thither viz<sup>t</sup>. the S<sup>t</sup>. George Captain Robinson, & the Winchester Cap<sup>t</sup>. Samson, on the 9<sup>th</sup>. Instant, and the Prince William, Captain Langworth on the 25<sup>th</sup>. Instant, the Swiftsnow was dispatched hence on the 8<sup>th</sup>. November, and the Montague for Bombay the 24<sup>th</sup>. November.

In Our Honble Masters Commands by the Godolphin they direct us to send to Your Presidency upon their Account five hundred peices of Baftaes more than before ordered in the List of Investment they being to be printed, these we have Ordered to be provided, and shall on our Receiving them from Jugdea send them to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. by the first Conveyance.

In ours of the 12<sup>th</sup>. September We advised Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. that We should transmitt you our sentiments in regard to the Copper by the ships in December We have been able to make but very inconsiderable Sales of this Article Since, what has been disposed of sold at the following Prices which was not more than about 500 Maunds Viz<sup>t</sup>.

which We apprehend will be a very heavy Article, several of the buyers having been losers by their former purchases & have large Remains on their hands The Common Sort of Copper for Battery and that for Brass were put up at twenty  $\frac{1}{2}$  Cent advance allowing the Customary discount, but there was no bidders for these Sortments, we shall make a further tryal thereof very shortly but do not Expect any tolerable Success, after which We shall advise Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. the needfull on this subject for Your Guidance in regard to what may be sent out to this Presidency next Year should the Wager in the Interim arrive with your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. We are to request you will take out all the Copper consigned us by her and dispose thereof.

This waits on your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. by the Beaufort Cap<sup>t</sup>. Thomas Stevens & Durrington Captain Richard Crabb, We are sorry We have been obliged to detain them so late, but this has been owing to the disappointment we have met with in our Salt Petre's not Arriving so early as Expected, which has occasioned by the Stoppage of our Eusiness Account the troubles with the Government, and the Quantities we

were obliged to send on our Hon'ble Masters Ships to the Mallabar Coast and Bombay, We have met with the like disappointments in regard to our peice Goods Contracted for here as well as at the Subordinate factories.

On the Beaufort We have Laden Sundry Goods & Merchandize for Europe and Consigned to our Honble Masters as ⌘ Abstract of her Invoice enclosed amounting to Current Rupees 302000.

On the Durrington We have laden Sundry Goods & Merchandize for Europe and consigned to our Honble Masters as ⌘ abstract of her Invoice enclosed Amounting to Current Rupees 304600.

We have likewise Laden on board them Sundry Goods and Stores for the use of Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. Settlement as ⌘ Bills of Lading and Invoices enclosed in their Respective packets.

The manifests of private trade Laden by each of the Captains on these Ships to Europe We also send enclosed to be Compleated at Your Settlement with such other Necessary papers as Relate to these Ships.

We have Acquainted these Captains to Compleat their full Compliments of Men here for the Reasons Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. mention.

Mr. William Mackett who dispatches these ships will send Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. their Draught of Water at that time.

The Brillant Snow which Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>a</sup>. have been pleased to send for the Service of this Coast, is of a good Size, & will be very usefull when she has another Deck, We have now dispatched her to Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>a</sup>. with advices, as the Princess Augusta is not returned from Batavia, whither she was sent for Salt, as We shall have Occasion to mention, & request You will Order her to be fitted up & sent back to us, The Cost of her & of the Ten Tarpaulins is brought to Account conformable to Your Directions.

5. Captain Gay has been advanced \$1000. One Thousand Dollars to defray the necessary Disbursements of that vessel & he is to give an account thereof to Your Honour & C<sup>a</sup>. as ~~is~~ his inclosed receipt.

6. We were glad to receive by the Princess Augusta Fifty Lascars For they will be very serviceable to the Settlement, either to go in the Sloops, or on many other Occasions & We shall take Care that they be well treated, & According to the Agreement made with them, We have bought a large Compound & Houses commodiously situated for them near the Sea Side, but We are sorry that We have been obliged to part with Ten of them, Cap<sup>t</sup>. Gay having assured Us, that [He] could not proceed without that additional Number, he having lost several Men by Death & Desertion.

7. We have perused the Representation which Captain Taylor has made to your Honour & C<sup>a</sup>. in excuse For his late Arrival here the last Voyage, wherein he confidently sets forth that He has not touched any where on the Coast but at Barroos, that his stay there was less than 4 Days, and that having been obliged to take the Sloop in tow & meeting with contrary Winds, he did not arrive off that place till the 26<sup>th</sup>. of November, concluding with an Insinuation, as if We were disobliged from a private Concern, when We made our Complaints.

8. Wherefore We think it necessary to inform Your Honour & C<sup>a</sup>, that his Assertions are frivolous, & whatever he may mention in his Journal you will be pleased to observe, that He brought a General Letter from Padang dated the 31<sup>st</sup>. of December NS; advising his Arrival there the 28<sup>th</sup>. so that he evidently was at that place also three Days, but that is not all the Delay he made notwithstanding. positive Orders for tho' We cannot positively fix the Time of his making the Coast, Yet We have been well informed that he reached it a great Deal earlier than what he asserts, which appears plainly from the Business We know He has done there, and Captain Goring, as well as other persons who are come that Way since, have had Complaints made of some of his unfair Dealings with the Natives at a place called Tapinooli, who threaten revenge unless Justice is done them.

9. As to the Disadvantage Arising to the Company from his late Arrival, We are further to lay before Your Honour & C<sup>a</sup>, that had he arrived here sooner as he might have done had he punctually obeyed Your Orders, We should have had an Opportunity to have unloaded him before the Grantham came upon our Hands, which was not till the 27<sup>th</sup>. of December, at which Time We were stressed for Want of Boats for both ships, most of them being then at the Northward with the Duke of

Lorrain, so that they were long in delivering their Cargoes; and when we intended for Expedition Sake to order back the Duke of Lorrain to this Port from the Northward, & to have sent the Sumatra to take in the Pepper of Laye Bentoonan &c<sup>a</sup>. whilst in the Interim the Grantham might transfer her Salt Petre to & receive Pepper from the Duke of Lorrain, Cap<sup>t</sup>. Taylor declared he could not proceed without a good Quantity of Ballast in taking in of which, & in refitting at Pooloo, he was a long while, which was the reason that we could not get him away to Allass before the 24<sup>th</sup>. of February, & after that as We have informed Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. the Weather proved bad in so much, that both Europe ships parted two Cables each at one Time all this retardment or at least a great part of it would no Doubt have been prevented, had he made the best of his way to this Port as he ought to have done, altho as he expresses it, he could not in the least apprehend his Deviation could be at all detrimental to our Honble Masters.

10. We shall have due regard to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>'s Order's in the 4<sup>th</sup>. paragraph by the Princess Augusta to dispatch the Ships bound for Madrass by the 15<sup>th</sup>. of July & Accordingly intended to have sent this Vessel back within that Time, but her late return from Batavia, occasioned by the uncommonly Northerly Winds at this Season of the Year, which continued to blow for a long time, & other circumstances, which will Appear in the sequel of this Letter, detained her till now, which reasons we persuade ourselves will plead our Excuse for dispatching her later than Your Orders.

11. The Royal Guardian Cap<sup>t</sup>. William Earle Benson Commander arrived here the 11<sup>th</sup>. of September last, & as soon as she was unloaded we put 62 Tons of Pepper on Board her, after which we sent her to Moco Moco, but having met with several Interruptions of bad Weather at the Northern Settlements She did not come back here till the 5<sup>th</sup>. of January, when the Captain having petition'd for Surplus Tonnage, we shipped off what Pepper remained in the Godown, & sent him to be filled up at Manna & at the same time dispatched the Brillant snow with a Sloop for Allass to convey to the Royal Guardian what pepper they could get off there in good Time, & she was dispatched for England the 12<sup>th</sup>. of February having on Board <sup>Tons. 0 qr.<sup>rs</sup>.</sup> 519 4.—10 of Pepper which the Cap<sup>t</sup>. said was all he could take in.

12. After the Brillant Snow had performed that Service, she brought up the Pepper remaining at Manna, since when she has been employed in a Trip to Moco-Moco, & after that to Batavia.

13. A Dutch Ship called T'Wapen Vanhoorn from Zelone came in hither in Company with the Royal Guardian who met with her in very great Distress a little to the Southward of Manna, we afforded the Captain & Crew all the Assistance We could in getting [her] [r]efitted at Pooloo, & advanced the Captain & Bockhaulder \$ 2000. to defray the Charges of her repairs & other Expences when they were ready to sail they represented that they could not put to Sea without the Help of about 20 Men we thereupon spared them 10 Europeans & procured about the same Number of China Men, with whom they proceed on their Voyage to Batavia the 10<sup>th</sup>. of November, with a Letter which we wrote to the General & Council to acquaint them therewith, & by the return of the Brillant they have sent us the Money accordingly.

14. M<sup>r</sup>. Henry Stirling, who as we advised Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. in our last was sent to Batavia to contract for rice returned here the 7<sup>th</sup>. of October & brought 16 Soldiers & as many of the Stores consigned to this place by the Colchester, as the Mary Sloop could take in, that Ship being then at Batavia in her Way to Benjar.

15. We also received a Letter from the Supra Cargoes acquainting Us that they had met the Royal Guardian in the Streights of Sunda, & had tendered the 26<sup>th</sup>. Soldiers & the said Stores to Captain Benson, who excused himself from receiving them for want of room, wherefore they desired Us to send a Sloop to Benjar for the 10 remaining soldiers & stores, & at the same time to give them some Advices concerning the affairs at that place.

16. They further requested that We would dispatch the ship Swift thither with all Expedition, which Vessel they informed Us was sent out, that in Case a Contract

---

was concluded with the Sultan of Benjar by the Supracargoes of the Severn, She might lay there till relieved by a Guard Ship, which they intended to order for that purpose.

17. In Consequence whereof, as those Gentlemen had made such a Contract & the Swift was not Arrived, We imagined it would be agreable to the Sultan to hear of the Honble Company's early Preparation to fullfill their part of it by sending out the said Vessel, & thinking also that it would greatly conduce to the success of the Colchester's Business there to have a Company's Servant upon the Spot, who is acquainted with the Nature of it, & with the Inhabitants We accordingly sent M<sup>r</sup>. James Wheeler the 12<sup>th</sup>. of December on the Mary Sloop to Benjar, with M<sup>r</sup>. John Massey to take charge of the Honourable Company's Effects in case of M<sup>r</sup>. Wheeler's Death, giving them Instructions to act in Concert with the Supra Cargoes of the Colchester For their Honours Interest, & in Case they find they can with Safety remain there, We appointed M<sup>r</sup>. Wheeler resident.

18. We wrote Letters by them to the Sultan and Toomongoong recommending them to their protection & forwarded by that Conveyance the Sultan's Musquets, which Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. have caused to be repaired & returned Us.

19. We also delivered to [M<sup>r</sup>. Whee]ler a Letter to the Honble the Court of Directors advising them with our proceedings relating to the Affairs of Benjar, & Another to the Supra Cargoes of the Colchester in Answer to theirs.

20. Since that having had no News of him We took the Opportunity of the Neptune Brigantine's going to Benjar to send M<sup>r</sup>. Walter Churchey on her the 1<sup>st</sup>. of June with Instructions that in Case any Accident should have happened to M<sup>r</sup>. Wheeler, he may succeed jointly with M<sup>r</sup>. Massey to the Management of the Honble Company's Affairs there, but if they are both well, that He come back again upon the Brigg, & bring away with him the stores & Military left by the Supra Cargoes of the Colchester, We also put up \$ 2000 Dollars & consigned them to M<sup>r</sup>. Wheeler to answer the Disbursements of that Factory, as it might be a long time before We could have another Opportunity of sending them a supply.

21. But on the Brillant's return from Batavia We were informed by Cap<sup>t</sup>. Gay, as well as by private Letters, that M<sup>r</sup>. Wheeler died at Banjar the 26<sup>th</sup>. of March that M<sup>r</sup>. Massey had left that place in Company with the Colchester, having been warned that it was not safe for him to remain there, the Benjareens having cut off a French Briggantine called the St. Joseph Captain Fournier Comm<sup>r</sup>., & destroyed every living Creature belonging to her, after which He was informed of some bad Intentions against himself also.

22. M<sup>r</sup>. Massey was at Batavia repairing the Mary Sloop's Sails, & intended to come away in a few [Days] after the Brillant.

23. The Colchester was also at Batavia from whence She was to sail for England the 28<sup>th</sup>. of June, having taken in a Loading of 6000 pecul of Pepper at Benjar. Cap<sup>t</sup>. Micklefield the Commander of her died in the Passage to Benjar.

24. Captain Gay also reports to us that there was a Man on Board of the Colchester, who had deserted from the Swift at the Cape of Good Hope, from whence that Vessel was returned to England, having been much damaged by running on Shore at Madagascar.

25. He further informs Us that the Winchester, which Ship was in Company with the Luisa when she was lost upon the Isle of May, one of the Cape De Verds Islands, has been refitting at the Brazils.

26. And that Commodore Anson had taken the Manila Galleon & passed thro' the Streights of Sunda with an immense Treasure on Board.

#### SECONDLY OF GOODS FROM EUROPE, FORT S<sup>t</sup>. GEORGE AND BENGAL.

27. Captain Benson brought us a supply of 22000 Bamboes of Rice, which M<sup>r</sup>. Stirling had agreed with him for at Batavia, & since that We have received the Quantities which Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. were pleased to send by the Brillant Snow, and Princess Augusta, & they have been of great Assistance to the Inhabitants depending

on the Honble Company, for it is still scarce. We therefore continue our request for 500 Bags by every Conveyance & by the Europe Ship from Bengal 1000.

28. The Several Articles of Stores & Wares turned out agreeable to the Invoice & We have now enclosed an Indent for Wares &c<sup>a</sup>. wanted for the use of the Settlement, & shall be glad to receive a good supply of Salt, as also of Gunney Bags.

29. Finding that We had but a very small Stock of Arrack on Hand, We took the Opportunity of sending the Brillant Snow to Batavia, from whence she brought thirty Leaguers with a few Stores, that We were in immediate Want of.

30. Having received very little Salt this Year from Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. & being disappointed of the Quantities which We had reason to expect from Java, having agreed with many Masters of Praws to bring it, & our Stock being almost expended, We were obliged to send the Princess Augusta to Batavia in Order to purchase a Loading of it, if possible, & to the End that she might be ready to return to Madrass by the time limited, We used all Expedition in unlading her, & she sail'd for that place the 2<sup>a</sup>. June, but We are concerned that she is not yet come back, nor can We imagine the Cause of her Detention.

31. By the Brillant Snow We have sent the large Cable that came from St. Helena, as also an Anchor which is specified in the enclosed Invoice, as it will also be of service to that Vessel, she having but one Cable that she can trust to ride by.

[32.] The Brillant brings also part of the 60 Tons of Lead received by the Royal Guardian, & the Princess Augusta has the rest on Board for Ballast.

#### THIRDLY CONCERNING INVESTMENTS & FOURTHLY COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

33. The Royal Guardian as beforementioned carried Home <sup>Tons. q<sup>r</sup>. lb.</sup> 519. 4. —. 10 of Pepper & We have this Day in our Godowns Tons 161. 8. 1. 16 besides which there are several Quantities of last Year's Crop at the Outsettlements, amounting to about <sup>Tons.</sup> Tons 150 more.

34. We are sorry that there should have appeared a Deficiency in last Season's product, especially about Bontoonan Laye & Polley, but We have the Satisfaction to believe that in reality it is inconsiderable, for We are well assured that there were many Parcells of Pepper still left in the Country which the planters would not bring down, because of their Disgust at the pillar Dollars, The people inland being unused to them and absolutely refusing to receive them, which Inconveniency has for Some time past also occasioned a great Dearth of provisions.

35. We have again met with many Difficulties in getting Boats to go to the Southern Settlements, the Sultan assisted with a Letter enjoying all the Masters of Tombongons belonging to his Country to go to Manna & the other places, We are now preparing to get up the Pepper from thence as fast as We can, & seeing no other Method will prevail with the Owners, We have been under a Necessity to agree to pay half the Value of the Boats that may be lost coming over the Bars, & We have already received several Parcel[s of Pepper] from Manna, Peeno &c<sup>a</sup>. of last Years produce.

36. And in Order to make a strict Enquiry into the Condition of the Pepper plantations in the several parts of the Country, We have had surveys taken & sent people from time to time for Information, & M<sup>r</sup>. Richard Gripton has been on that of the Twelve Doosoons, who at his return gave in a Report, upon which We assembled their proateens, among whom two of the very chief Men were fined & some of the others who had considerable plantations, were presented with small Tokens of the Honble Company's Satisfaction at their Industry, as is set forth in Consultation of the 18<sup>th</sup>. of April.

37. In Anack Soongey there has been a small Encrease this Year & the Sultan to avoid being imposed upon by false reports, sent Oorang Cayer Se Koondar his Brother a second Time, to Accompany M<sup>r</sup>. Dunckley throughout his whole Dominions to see if they had made any Improvements agreeable to the promises he had accepted

from them, & one Dupatty Seramee of Ippoe having appeared faulty, was at the Sultan's Desire put under Confinement, but afterwards released & fined for his Neglect, the Sultan has also caused a Head Man of Cattown to be turned out, & appointed another in his room, in whom he places some Confidence & in general We think he has tolerably exerted himself.

38. Agreeable to what We wrote Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. in our last concerning the Messages, We had received from the eight Doosoon people, most of those belonging to Benteering [one] of the two principal villages with their Dependants came down in October last, & are now quietly settled in different parts of the Country about us planting of Paddy & clearing Ground to make Pepper Plantations We have not called upon them since, as it would be an In[ter]ruption to that material part of procuring themse[lves] a Maintenance, & when We find they are tolerably well refixed We shall require the Submission from them according to the Terms of their Readmission, & in the meanwhile We believe more of them will be induced [since] our mild Treatment to them, to follow their Example.

39. The Country about us is at present i[n] peace but We have lately been threatned at Pooloo Pesa[ng] with some Disturbance there from One Radeen Iyalaax who We are told is a Man in great Authority in the [Neigh]bouring Country of Se Manko; We have Accordingly [used] our best Endeavours to supply the Resident M<sup>r</sup>. Thom[as] Combes with Necessaries & recruits as far as We are able but We cannot in our present Circumstances assist him further, nor have We but one Master of a Sloop left, [the] others being either dead or gone away, & as to Euro[pe] men our Garrison is very much weakened by keeping [ . . . ] of Moco Moco & Croce, at which last place, We have lost several Men.

40. We had sent several Supplies & recruits by the Brillant Snow, which Vessel did not touch there either in going or on her return from Batavia, Captain Gay having declared that he could not go in there by reason of the bad Weather, & great Swells, however We had an Opportunity to send them some Necessaries & Ammunition by the Princess Augusta, which were safely put [on] Shore.

41. And the Louisa was dispatched to him the 26<sup>th</sup>. Instant with 10 Europeans two Chests of Fire Arms & a good Stock of Ammunition, so that We hope they will be by this time 30 Strong, which with about Ninety Bugguesses besides several other Inhabitants there, which the resident has found necessary to take into pay, will in all probability be a Force sufficient to preserve themselves.

42. By the Brillant Snow We received a Letter from the General & Council of Batavia, wherein it appears they take Umbrage at our forming the Settlement of Pooloo Pesang, saying it is an Encroachment upon the Territories of the Sultan of Bantam their Ally, We herewith lay before Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. a Translation of that Letter, requesting Your Speedy Directions for our proceedings.

43. The Ambassadors from the King of Mandar mentioned in our last went back the 25<sup>th</sup>. December & We wrote a Letter of Thanks by them for the Permission that King gave our Serjeant to enlist Soldiers there, & for the further civil offers of Friendship, he had been pleased to make to the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Company.

[44] Pangaran Saxee Negarro of Eatto Cay [...] near Pooloo Pesang, having had some little disagreement with our resident, which chiefly proceeded from the Disgust he had taken at the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Company's people being removed from his District, where they were first settled, he came up Some time ago & We have persuaded him to return again, & keep up a good Harmony with M<sup>r</sup>. Combes, which would be very much to his Benefit & the Wellfare of his Country, & wrote to the resident to maintain a good agreement together, for thò the Pangaran had been a little refractory in refusing several times to come to consult with him & the proateens, Yet as he was the very first person in those parts, who had invited us thither & entered into Contract with the Company, We should be unwilling to have any Misunderstandings subsist between Us, & We hope that Interview will have a good Effect with him.

45. We at the same time represented to Pangaran Saxee Negarro the bad Consequences that ensued from Gaming, whereof he himself had met with a severe Instance, for had it not been for M<sup>r</sup>. Hurlock, who happened to be at Cawoor, when he passed



by there, the Inhabitants would certainly have detained him for Old gaming Debts, upon which Occasion We took into Consideration that the principal Cause of the Country of Cawoor's bad Condition, Arises from the continual Quarrels & Contentions about gaming Debts, for which many poor Families that cannot pay are carried away to other parts & sold for Slaves, nor has any person indebted in that Manner Encouragement to raise any Establishment by planting of Pepper or other Industrious Means, because his Duns would Seize upon his little Improvements, & he would still remain in a Starving Condition.

46. We therefore with the General Consent and advice of all the Head Mallays caused a Chop to be proclaimed, that no Man shall be molested on Account of any Debts whatever contracted by Gaming.

47. Mr. Hurlock who is returned from Cawoor delivered in a report, which is ent[er]ed in Consultation of the 20<sup>th</sup>. of July; wherein he relates to the [...]tioned Effect & that the people required their Pepper to be weighed off & paid for in the like manner as at Manna; He also entered a new Agreement with them & promised that whenever they had eight Bahars ready it should be sent & paid for at the Rate stipulated, but should their Country hereafter produce such considerable Quantities of Pepper to make it worth the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Company's while, they would no doubt put them upon the same Footing with the other places, from whence they draw large parcells.

48. Several Families of Passarna people are come down with their Pangaran to settle about Manna & raise Pepper Plantations, & as they are destitute of all means of Subsistence being in a strange Country, they have requested the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Company's Assistance, & We have permitted the Resident if he finds it necessary, to advance them at Times as far as \$ 100 to be repaid out of the product of their Labour.

49. The King of Indrapore has again wrote to us jointly with the Sultan of Manang Cabow, pressing us to settle amongst them, but We have not made any reply thereto as yet, not thinking it ingenuous, & shall wait till We are better Satisfied concerning it.

50. The Gentlemen of Padang have answered the Letter We wrote them agreeable to Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. Orders concerning the Exchange of Desertors, wherein they acquaint us that they cannot give them such a free & unlimited pardon as We required so that We believe that affair will remain on the former Footing.

51. The other less material Transactions relating to these Heads being entered at large in our Consultations, We crave leave to refer Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. to them for the further particulars.

#### FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS BUILDINGS AND REVENUES.

52. The Buildings at Moco Moco as We are told go on very well, the Walls are compleated & they are now finishing the Gate, Italian Padre who went thither a second time about 6 Months ago remains there still, & has been very usefull in directing the Works, We shall according to the Liberty Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. give us make him a reasonable recompence.

53. The Covering of the large Godown next the Shedd for Materials is so much fallen in that We were obliged to get it new cover'd with attops, for thro' Want of Skill in the persons who tyled them, the Rain soaked thro' & rotted the Timbers, so that the whole Roof was in danger of coming down, & We have now no person at all left who knows how to lay Tyles, for which reason also, we have been under a Necessity of covering the Lodgings in the Fort with Coolit Cayoos.

54. The sea having considerably gained upon that Godown, We were Obliged some time ago to secure it by driving large piles into the Ground & filling them up with Earth & rubbish, but it has since been washed out & many of the piles broke down by the [said] high [Tide] We shall endeavour to repair them in the best Manner We can & prevent its doing any further Damage.

- 55. Several Persons having requested Leases for their Houses & Compounds, We have granted them as they do not stand in the Way of the Companys Buildings.
- 56. The Licences for this Year have been put up at publick Outcry & sold to the best Bidders the Arrack Licence for \$ 130. the Ophium Licence at Marlbrô. at \$ 90. & the Ophium Licence at Moco Moco for \$ 30. & Mensem.
- 57. All the Customs upon Goods imported here by the Brillant & Princess Augusta have been duely paid into Cash.

SIXTHLY COMPANY'S SERVANTS MILITARY AND THEIR ACCOUNTS.

• 58. The Deputy Governour having been exceedingly indisposed for upwards of these 7 Months past, & seeing no probability of retrieving his Health at this place, he now proceeds on the Brillant snow in Hopes the Sea Air & change of Climate may give him relief, & he having desired that M<sup>r</sup>. David Pugh our Surgeon might be permitted to attend him, as there is no person that assist him on Board the Vessel, We have accordingly complied therewith, & have sent for M<sup>r</sup>. Wotton Braham the Surgeon at Moco Moco to come up.

59. M<sup>r</sup>. Samuel Greenslate Second & Resident of Moco Moco has been acquainted with the Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>s. Resolution to go to Madras for his Health, & a praw has been dispatched to him that he may have a Conveyance to come up, if he thinks proper.

60. We have also at the Deputy Governour's Desire drawn out Certificates for \$ 7500.—.—which his Attorneys have deposited into the Honble Company's Cash her, he being unable to transact any Business himself, & We request Your Honour &c. will be pleased to pay the Amount to the Honourable Nicholas Morse Esq<sup>r</sup>.

61. M<sup>r</sup>. William Rigg Trustee to the Estate of M<sup>r</sup>. Henry Stirling deceased has deposited into Cash here the Sum of \$ 8000. For which We have granted him Certificates payable to the Honourable Nicholas Morse Esq<sup>r</sup>.

62. The Estate of M<sup>r</sup>. Charles Gibson deceased being indebted at Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George in the Sum of \$ 1040.3.70. The Attorneys to the Honourable Nicholas Morse Esq<sup>r</sup>. have requested a Certificate for the same, which We have likewise granted.

63. We request Your Honour &c. will be pleased to discharge those several Sums, for all which due Credit has been given in our Books to Account Current Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George.

64. There being still some Money due to M<sup>r</sup>. Gibson's Estate that Account is not yet settled, but We beg Leave to Assure Your Honour &c. that due Care shall be taken concerning it.

• 65. The 25<sup>th</sup>. of September last died M<sup>r</sup>. John Rowles Factor intestate & his Effects were as usual sold at publick Outcry, & the Account of that Estate will speedily be made up.

66. The 30<sup>th</sup>. of March last died M<sup>r</sup>. John Greene Factor without a Will, an Inventory was taken of his Effects & after they were sold at publick Outcry it [offered] by true value of what he left & from the several Claims which are already brought upon his Estate, that it will not go near to pay his Creditors. We must endeavour therefore to compound with them when We come to settle that Account.

67. And as We have been informed that there is some Money sent out for M<sup>r</sup>. John Greene on the Winchester, We request Your Honour &c. will be pleased to secure the same upon her Arrival, & permitt us to divide it also among his Creditors.

68. M<sup>r</sup>. Henry Stirling Sixth of the Council died two Days after M<sup>r</sup>. Greene both of Feavours M<sup>r</sup>. Stirling by his Will had named M<sup>r</sup>. William Rigg & M<sup>r</sup>. Charles Smith his Executors, but the latter having declined the Trust M<sup>r</sup>. William Rigg took that Charge upon himself.

69. On the Royal Guardian came out M<sup>r</sup>. Oliver Stewart & six Writers.

70. The Writers who came out by the Britannia having behaved well, were appointed Factors agreeable to the Directions from the Honourable Court.

71. Mr. Oliver Stewart having been appointed 7<sup>th</sup>. of Council He was upon Mr. William Coles's Absence called to the Board as Sixth, but having behaved himself in most unbecoming indiscreet Manner, We are very Sorry to Acquaint Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. that We were obliged to dismiss him, the particulars whereof being entered at large in our Consultation of Jan<sup>ry</sup>. the 13<sup>th</sup>, We beg Leave to refer Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. thereto, & he has taken his passage on the Royal Guardian.

72. Another unfortunate Affair has happened in the Case of Mr. James Man who has been sent home on that Ship hav[ing] been Suspected of the Murther of one William Holt who lived with him as a Servant & having all along led a very idle & riotous Course of Life.

73. Ensign MackLaen of Pooloo Pesang being dead, one Serjeant Sparks was Appointed in his room.

74. And as they had had no Ensign at Moco Moco for some time a Commission was given to one Serjeant Tucker who acted in that station ever since the late Ensign's Decease.

75. Upon Mr. Oliver Stewart's Dismission Mr. Isaac Barbut was taken into Council & after Mr. Stirling's Demise Mr. Robert Hindley succeeded to that Vacancy, they being the next in Standing.

76. Mr. Thomas Tomlyne one of the Writers by the Royal Guardian died the 5<sup>th</sup>. of June last, his Effects were sold at Outcry & the Amount not being sufficient to discharge the Demands on him, it was distributed amongst the Creditors.

77. We acquainted Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. that We should wait till We had a proper Man to Supply the place of Gunner, which we have since filled by a person recommended as very capable of that Employ, namely, Mr. Elias De Butts who We believe will answer our Expectations, & We have accordingly entertained him at the usual allowance.

SUPPLEMENT.

1. Since writing the above arrived the Princess Augusta on the 30<sup>th</sup>. Ult<sup>o</sup>. from Batavia & brought us a Supply of about 47 Coyan of Salt Java Measure, which will be a sufficient provision till We can receive a further Quantity from Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>.

2. Captain Goring informed Us that the Cæsar Storeship Cap<sup>t</sup>. Matthew Court Commander, was arrived at Batavia about 10 Days before he came away, & that Mr. John Massey was still at that place, having sent the Sloop Mary after the Neptune Brigantine, upon which vessel Mr. Watter Churchey took his passage to Benjar, to inform him of the Disposition of affairs there & to prevent his proceeding to that port.

3. The Same Day in the Evening came in the Neptune Brigantine, & the Mate who brought her hither informs us that they had met the Sloop, & upon the Advices they received from Mr. Massey, they intended to return, but being in want of Water were obliged to put into Samarang, where at the Invitation of the Dutch Chief who

- wrote them a very friendly Letter, M<sup>r</sup>. Churchey & the Commander went on shore,
- but on the same Evening about 9 O'Clock seven Boats came off to the Vessel full of armed Men, both White & Black with an Intention to have seized her, but after having endeavoured to board her the Mate cut his Cable & came away leaving M<sup>r</sup>. Churchey & the Master of the Brigantine behind, however We hope they will be sent to Batavia time enough to return on the Storeship.

[4] Upon Captain Goring's Arrival at Batavia the General informed him that his ship must be searched, or they could not permit him to remain in the road, saying, that it had been the Custom for this two Years last past to search all ships that touched there, & that the English Commanders before him had made no objection to it upon which Cap<sup>t</sup>. Goring told his Excellency that whatever other Commanders might do it was no Rule for his Conduct, & that he could not upon any Account suffer the Honble Company's Ship to be searched, saying, that he came thither to purchase salt for their Honours settlement & not in a clandestine Manner, & that he had rather go back empty than offer such an Indignity to his Country, which the Dutch had no Right to insist on from any Treaties subsisting between the two Nations, he at the same Time assured the General that he had no contraband Goods on Board, & for the General's private Satisfaction would wait on any Gentleman his Excellency should think proper to send on Board, & convince him of the Truth of what he said, but not under the Denomination of a Search. His Excellency was Satisfied with the Captain's perseverance & Granted him the Liberty of the port.

5. The Brilliant Snow which We had intended to carry the above Letter to Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. was countermanded upon the Princess Augusta's Arrival, that we may be the better able to frame our advices to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. upon the Directions We shall [receive from the] Honble Court by the Storeship, & We intend immediately [upon the] Ships Arrival to dispatch the Snow also to Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>.

6. The Deputy Governour having altered his Resolutions of taking his passage on the Brilliant, now proceeds on the Princess Augusta.

7. This ship brings Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. the Remainder of the 60 Ton of Lead, & as We have already advised the Snow has the Rest on Board, & We now also send the Copper Doodoes which came by the Royal Guardian from S<sup>t</sup>. Helena.

8. Inclosed are Invoice & Bill of Lading for all that is shipped on the Princess Augusta on the Honble Company's Account.

9. We have at Cap<sup>t</sup>. Goring's request advanced him the sum of \$ 531. -- for the use of the Ship Princess Augusta, & inclosed comes his receipt for the same.

10. M<sup>r</sup>. Robert Hindley resident of Laye has in consultation of this Day informed us, that the Pepper of Laye & Bentooman has been all received, & that there was no Deficiency, but the Polley Pepper is not Yet brought down.

11. We are informed that the Cæsar, now at Batavia, has no recruits for this Place, & therefore desire Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will take it into Consideration, & send us a supply, either of Europeans or Topasses, that We may be able to support the Out-settlements of Moco Moco & Pooloo Pesang, which as We have already acquainted you, have very greatly drained our [...]

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

Since We had the Honour to Address Your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. by the Princess [ . . . ] [Ship sailed] from hence the 9<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo The Worship<sup>l</sup>. Samuel Greens[late] Esq<sup>r</sup>. who arrived from Moco Moco the 20<sup>th</sup>, has taken the Chair as Deputy Governour during the Absence of Robert Lennox Esq<sup>r</sup>.

The Cæsar Captain Matthew Court Comm<sup>r</sup>. from Europe but last from Batavia came in here the 24<sup>th</sup>. of August and on the 28<sup>th</sup>. of the same month Arrived the Godolphin Captain John Stevens Commander bound for Madrass or Bengal which Ship was Obligated to put in here for Water and Refreshments, having a Number of Soldiers on Board and a sickly Ship's Company she left England the 23<sup>d</sup>. of April last and brought the News of a Declaration of War on both sides between the Crown of Great Britain and France when it was also expected the Dutch would soon declare.

By the Cæsar We received a Letter from the General and Council of Batavia representing that they had Seized The Honourable Company's Sloop the Mary with M<sup>r</sup>. John Massey and the People belonging to her, who as We informed Your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. were upon their Return from Banjar. The Reason they alledged for this Proceeding was that M<sup>r</sup>. Massey had sent the said Sloop with private Advices to the Neptune Brigantine then bound to that place the Master of whom together with M<sup>r</sup>. Watter Churchey were as We have mentioned in our proceeding Letter treacherously detained at Samarang, where [they had] put in for Wood and Watter, thô as his Excellency &c<sup>t</sup>. are pleased to Signify was only to cloak the real Design which was the Sale of a Parcel Ophium, on Board the Vessel, in Opposition to the Strict Prohibitions of sending that Commodity; Accusing Us at the same time of Breach of Faith and infringing on the Laws and Rights of their Commerce by conniving at such clandestine Practices, which they say has been carried on for some Time past, they have thereupon forbid us any further Correspondence with their Settlement and referred the Examination of those Gentlemen in Regard to that Affair to the Council of Justice at Batavia.

Upon which We made a Strict Enquiry concerning this Complaint and found that the Owners agreeable to the free and unlimited Liberty of Trade which the Honble Company have been pleased to grant to their Servants in any Merchandizes whatever that did not interfere with their Honours Commerce had loaded on the Brigantine, Ophium, as well as other Goods and directed the Master to dispose of them to the best Advantage at Banjar particularly enjoining him to run no Resque, if therefore the Master upon receiving the Information which M<sup>r</sup>. Massey had sent to M<sup>r</sup>. Chuchey relating to the Disposition of the Banjar Affairs and only to warn them of the Danger, they might run were the proceed thither, should finding his Voyage disappointed imprudently have offered his Ophium to sale among the Dutch, which however We have great Hopes to believe is not the Case, as it would have

been Contrary to the Owners Orders [they] could not possibly guard against it any more than by th[ ] persuade themselves that they will not be thought blameable.

Wherefore as We are Strangers to the Affair and can have no further Lights into it than what we have abovementioned together with the Mate's Report who brought the Vessel back, and assures us that their only Business at Samarang was to procure Refreshments and Water, We came to a Resolution to Answer their Letter with Regard to Pooloo Pesang, and likewise to represent to them the Indignity offered by detaining his Majesty's Subjects and in seizing our Hoñble Masters Servants and Sloop especially as We cannot comprehend with what Justice they have done it as well as to request the Releasement of those Gentlemen who are now under Confinement in their Settlement.

And as Captain Gay upon his Arrival from Batavia brought a Message from the General, desiring that in Case, We received the first Advices of a French War We would dispatch a Vessel to inform him of it and promising that We might depend upon the like Favour if it should reach them before us We have remanded the Brilliant Snow which was in Readiness to have proceeded to Madrass agreeable to our Intentions in order to forward these advices to Batavia having no other Vessel fit for that Purpose and We were the more induced to do it as We can take hold of the good Opportunity of the Godolphin to carry our Pacquet to your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>.

We have likewise Appointed Captain Gay to confer with the General &c. upon this unfortunate accident and We believe his good Conduct may have a happy Influence in procuring the Release of those Gentlemen and in bringing Matters to a speedy Accommodation.

Inclosed We have transmitted Copys of the Letter We received from his Excellency &c<sup>t</sup>. and of that which is prepared to be sent thither, whereby Your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. may be the better able to judge of this Affair.

The Brilliant Snow being very much out of Repair and wanting another Deck We have also as Your Honour &c. will be pleased to observe requested the General &c<sup>t</sup>. to permit Captain Gay to get her refitted at Batavia, and have put on Board her \$ 3000, Three Thousand Dollars to defray the Disbursements on that Account and to Supply Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Churchey and Massey, if they should be in Want under their Melancholy Circumstances.

We have likewise been obliged to take out the Godolphin some few Articles of the Stores which were consigned to Bengal for the Brilliant's Use, and have. . .

The Fanny being now on Departure for Bengall, We have an Opportunity of Inclosing Your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. a Copy of his Majesty's Declaration of War against France; which thô the Consul of Aleppo had not received any Publick Advice of, Yet Several Letters to private Merchants mentioning the War being declared, He thought sufficient grounds to forward the Notice to us; This News preventing the Fanny's going to Madrass, We have putt this under Cover to the Honourable the President and Council of Bengall, and duplicate of it We have recommended to M<sup>r</sup>. Thomas Holme suppracargo of the Fanny to send on shore at Anjengo if possible: We would have sent Your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. the advice of the War by the Deligence a French Bengal Ship, but as the French Gentlemen here have a Suspicion if not a Confirmation of the War Its being Declared, we Suppose They will look out for English Letters; and therefore we were unwilling to trust any by them; besides as M<sup>r</sup>. Holme assures Us he has taken a Method of forwarding the News by that Ship to M<sup>r</sup>. John Saunders, Wrote in Court Hand for the more Secrecy, We presume that Gentleman will Acquaint Your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. with it.

We are at present very quiet in these Parts, but under a great uncertainty of Continuing So, here being various Reports as to Peace or War between the Turks & Persians, but the Latter most probable; and our Bashaw is thought to have had a great hand in the past Troubles, for which the Porte would be glad to destroy him if it was not out of fear that he would again call a Forreign Power into the Kingdom, or Raise the Arabs, which would put the whole Country in Confusion.

The Winchester Captain Stewart was Lost in her passage from England to Bengall off Brasil, but her Cargo saved.

In this time of a General War, if any Advices should come to Our Notice via Aleppo, which We think the forwarding may be of Consequence, We will take the Liberty of doing it by way of Surat.

GENTLEMEN,

The French India Company, having by it's Letter of the 14<sup>th</sup>. of April, which did not reach us, till the 28<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo; advised us of the declaration of War, made by the King our Master, against the King of England, Elector of Hanover, Signifies to us at th[e same] time, that it should be highly pleased, could a good [under] standing still subsist, between the Nations trading [with] India, notwithstanding the Declaration of War be [made].

As the Views of our Superiors, can [ . . . ] only to the Common good of both Company's, we have ju[dged] that in order to go entirely into them, it would be conveni[ent] that on neither side, any Act of Hostility, should be com[menced] on this side of the Cape of Good Hope, quite to China, & be [ . . . ] it. We have the Honour to communicate our Intentions, [to the . . . ] Gentlemen at Madrass, & Calcutta, & also that of preventing them, as we also prevent Ye Gentlemen with the Notice, [that] in Consequence of our Resolutions, Our Orders are already dispatch'd to all our Settlements, & Ships as well of the Company, as private, expressly forbidding them to be the Aggressors in any manner whatever, enjoining them to be purely on the Defensive, in a word not to use the right of War, in the whole Space of the abovementioned Seas, unless they were first attack[ed] by the English.

So Gentlemen ye see, that if you think proper, to give the same Orders, to all Your Subordinates; it will not be our fault, that the Trade of the two Nations, is not carried on in India, with the Same Union, & Tranquill [ity] as if our respective Sovereigns, were in full Peace.

November and remark Your honours Negotiation with the French Gentlemen at Pondicherry in regard to proposals of Tranquility between that Nation and ours in India The like proposals have been made to us from Chandernagore but We did not think proper to enter into any Engagements not being Authorized so to do but Acquainted them That it would be very Agreeable to us to Avoid any Hostilities being committed and that the Commanders of our Country Shipping had no Orders or Directions from us to protect or attack any of their Ships but only to be upon their Guard.

Kasoordoss is a Guzurat and related to Several Shroffs who have a great Sway in the Moors Government he resides commonly at Narsapore close by me where he has been protected for some time by the Phousdar of Narsapore he has besides run himself in Debt a small sum to the Rajamundrum Government purposely, well knowing they will not permit me to molest him while he is their Debtor he is worth nothing himself but were he in Custody his Friends would probably Assist him.

Enemyooty Cawmadou Phoala Gruah (the son of Phoala Surripa) and Eram Chitty, are now Prisoners in the Factory From the first nothing can be hoped, from the second very little and the third has paid off most of his Ballance, he went from hence to Ingeram and stands also Debtor on the Books of that Residency.

Peggalapitty Moukantry is now an Ingeram Merchant he entered into Partnership witu one Seram Mollou a Merchant here, and by an Award of Arbitration made before M. Prince and me at Ingeram his proportion of that Joint Ballance is as above.

Bompana and Bomprauze are two Ingeram Merchants who contracted likewise underhand with M<sup>r</sup>. Goddard and he enter'd them under these Names their real Names were Cunshum Cönniah and Door Chitty Ballou.

By a Dutch ship bound hence for Zelone & Surat the 22<sup>d</sup>. October last we informed Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. that notwithstanding the Spaniards were on the Coast of China with Two large Galleons and another ship of considerable Force, with Intentions to Intercept the English, Yet we had the good Fortune to Arrive safely here with the York and Statford.

We likewise Acquainted Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>s</sup>. that the Hardwick arriving off the Ladrona at a Time when the Spaniards were so Stationed as to make it impossible to pass them, she was obliged to bear away for Amoy, where she Arrived the 2<sup>d</sup>. August, and as we were then Informed sailed thence the 19<sup>th</sup>. for Chusan, We have since that Time received Letters from her Supra Cargoes dated off the Hole in the Wall the 17<sup>th</sup>. August, Advising that their Endeavours to load the Ship at that Port had proved ineffectual from the very hard Conditions offered them by the Mandareens, who not only insisted on the Delivery of their Guns, Ammunition and Sails, but likewise the Deposit of their whole Cargo into the Custody of an Officer whom the Mandareens Should Appoint to Receive it. Such an Unreasonable Demand, together with the Difficultys they were likely to meet for want of proper Merchants Accustomed to the European Trade, and likewise the Consideration that the Time of the ships Detention in India by Charterparty would expire in January next, determined them to loose no more Time but to quit the Place; and as the Captain and officers were of Opinion they could beat against the Monsoon, they resolved for Bengall, hoping the ships might be loaded from thence this year for England.

The Many Reports that have been current in Canton concerning the Spaniards Intentions, sometimes that they were to remain here the whole season, at other times that they had been joined by other ships from Manilha, These have in some Measure impeded our Business; but at last we were satisfied they left the Coast about the middle of October, having neither Money nor provisions to support themselves longer here, the Government likewise having Used all Methods to distress them.

The Loss of Silver in Chest N<sup>o</sup>. 365 by the York amounting to 14, 2, 15, <sup>lb. oz. dw<sup>t</sup>.</sup> with submission we think we cannot justly charge to our account, the seals of the Chest being Entire when landed and Examined at Canton: We beg Leave to offer to Your Honour &c<sup>s</sup>. Consideration, whether as the Deficiency in each Bag was pretty near Equal, it may not have been a Mistake in the Weighing at Madrass.

Enclosed (under N<sup>o</sup>. 1) comes Second Copys of the Bills we sent Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. by the Fort St. George, what we said in our Address thereon under the 25<sup>th</sup>. Feb<sup>r</sup>. was what was wrote us from Spahaun, but finding the money could not be recovered from the Drawers without much Trouble & Application to the Government, which would have been attended with Expences, M<sup>r</sup>. Peirson chose making a Tryall of fresh Bills with Interest & a power from the Drawers to recover the Amount by Law, which as the Drawer is not only Wife to David Sultan, but likewise Heiress to the large Effects in his hands, we hope the Honble President & Council will oblige him to make them good, but should the Bills be returned Again, we shall give such Directions as to enter into rigorous methods with the Family as are generally used in this Country for obtaining full satisfaction.

We have lately received an order from his Majesty for bringing the Said David Sultan with his Effects into Persia, which was procured by some Armenians on a petition they made that he lived under the English protection, by which means they could not come at him to pay his just Debts, Enclosed we send Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. the Original Order, but as we know the procurers of it, & the Validity of such Orders which are of very little Signification, there will be no Occasion to take any further Notice of it, unless use may be made of it in regard to his paying the Bills drawn on him by his Family.

The Difficulty of sending any large sum of Money out of Spahaun by it's being prohibited, & we having only Authority by an old Rogom which is now of little use, to send out but three thousand (3000) Tomands Annually has obliged Mr. Peirson to remit by Bills, & enclosed (under N<sup>o</sup>. 2. 3. 4) comes three Bills for Eleven thousand (11,000) Rupees, two of which are on Surat for Eight thousand (8,000) & the other on Madrass for three thousand (3,000) Rupees, which he has taken Security for in case of Failure in payment.
