- SATURDAY 28 Arrived Two of our Factory Nayrs from Callicutt with another remittance of Ten thousand New fanams, by them our Linguist in a short Letter advices his having received from the Samorin the 26th. Instant on our Honble Master's Account Seventeen thousand old Fanams Viz^t.

'Tis represented to the Board by the Chief that in Order to prevent the growing Insults of Curringhoda Nayro, he hath agreeable to the Treaty between us and the French at Mihie, acquainted the Chief residing there with what hath from time to time Occured, and particularly [that] the said Nayro, had taken upon him of Late to sow some Ground within our Limits, and to rob, beat and Insult att severall times the people within our H^{on}ble Masters Jurisdiction and last of all, some days past to Enter our Precincts by night in a most Treacherous manner, killing one of our Nayro Soldiers, for which no Satisfaction was yet obtained.

On perusing some of the Letters received from M^r. Tremisot on this Occasion, 'Tis observed, he desires in one of them, that a person might be sent thither, with Power to Treat on the Necessary means for reconcilment, and that in another of Yesterday, he seemingly rejects the offer made him by the Chief to send thither our Linguist, and Insists he be accompanied by Two persons of Distinction, which led us into some debate Concerning the answer now Necessary to be given, and whether our Linguist alone was Sufficient & most proper to proceed thither, as he had often done to persons of more Consequence than Curringhoda Nayro.

But the Board being unanimously of Opinion, that a Concession of this kind will render us Contemptible in the Eyes of the Country round us, and rather delay than hasten the satisfaction we expect to be given, It being rather our part to demand, than Petition Redress for Injuries received.

'Tis AGREED the following Letter be wrote him by the Chief Viz^t.

That if he thinks fitt our Linguist will be sent to Signify the satisfaction we expect from Curringhoda Nayro, for the late Insults, in the manner before promised, and with full Power to settle the same according to the Custom of °

the Country ; But as the said Curringhoda was the Aggressor, no Person of any Consequence here, could be permitted to accompany him, Desiring withall to know, that in Case this Proposall was not Accepted, Whether or no they would Agreeable to the Treaty now in force, Joyn with us and seek redress some other way.

Mons^r. Tremisot the French Chief, signifying in his answer to the Chief's Letter of Yesterday, that Curringhoda Nayro would be at Mihie this morning, in Order to meet such person as we should think fitt to send, for to Treat on the satisfaction expected by us for the late Insults ; Our Linguist was accordingly dispatched thither with power from us to settle this business if possible according to the Custom of the Country. TUESDAY
7th.

Our Linguist returning this Evening from Mihie Acquainted us, that he had settled with Mons^r. Tremisot and Curringhoda Nayro the satisfaction to be taken on the Homicide that kill'd our Nayr Soldier agreeable to the Custom of the Country, the time and manner of which, we find express'd at Large in a Paper of Articles sent by said Mons^r. Tremisot to the Chief, Translate of which is as follows Viz^t. D^o. DIE

1st. 'Twas agreed that the satisfaction to be given by Curringhoda Nayro, shall be to Burn the House of the person that killed our Nayr soldier, and cutt down entirely his Coconut Orta Seituete in Codierry.

2^d. That the aforesaid Homicide shall have his Arms taken from him, and be turn'd out of the service of Curringhoda Nayro.

3^d. That the four persons that accompanied him when the Murther was Committed shall likewise have their Arms taken from them, & be turn'd out of said Service.

4th. That two persons shall be sent from Tellicherry with some of Narrangports Nayrs for to be present at the execution of what is here agreed to, as also some persons belonging to Mihie on the 9th. of this Month Mallabar Stile which will be on Saturday next.

5th. That the Coconut Trees shall be cutt down, and the House burnt, by those belonging to Tellicherry According to the Custom of this Country.

6th. That the Murderer shall make restitution for what Jewells were found on the body of the Deceased. Otherwise he shall Oblige the other Delinquents that were in his Company when the Fact was Committed, to Swear they know nothing of them.

Severall of our Nayrs Jungadoes belonging to Callicutt, arriving here this Evening brought us a remittance of Twenty Thousand New Fanams from that Factory, Our Linguist there adviseing us by them, that no Quantity of Coins were at Present procurable in Exchange for said Fanams on any Conditions. THURSDAY
9th.

This morning being the time appointed for putting in Execution what agreed between us and Curringhoda Nayro the 7th. Instant Our Linguist accompanied with a body of Narrangports Nayrs and proper attendants proceeded to Moylan where he was mett with one of Curringhoda's head Ministers and Two persons deputed by the French, who telling him they were sent to see the Satisfaction before resolved on freely Executed, our Nayrs accordingly went immediatly to Codierry where they Cutt down & destroyed entirely the Coconut Orta belonging to the Murderer and sett Fire to his dwelling House without any hinderance or Molestation from the people on the Contrary Side, thô great numbers of them as of others were assembled there to see this Ceremony performed. - SUNDAY 12** By Nayrs from Callicutt received Ten thousand New fanams in full of what Ordered to be remitted hither from that Factory by advice from our Linguist, we are informed the Samorine's Ministers had paid into Cash there Three thousand Fanams more the 9th. Instant which makes good the Sixty five thousand they were to send in the last month.
- SATURDAY 18th.** Wrote a Letter to the Heads of Ally Rajah's Family desiring they would send proper Persons for to settle the old Depending Accounts between them and our Hon^{ble} masters, Judging it now a proper time to solicit them their ships from Mocha and elsewhere being lately arrived, and their differences with the Prince at present in Suspence.
- TUESDAY 21** The Heirs of Ally Rajah's Family instead of Ordering hither a person to Settle Accounts, give us for answer this day that they know of none depending between them and our Hon^{ble} Masters they having been all concluded in times past.

Our Linguist makes us an offer of Three Hundred & Fifty bales Mangalore Rice at the rate of Ten Fanams $\frac{1}{2}$ bale, to be deliver'd us the last of this month which will be Sufficient for our Garrison for all October.

Notwithstanding we have already by us three Months Provisson of Grain, yet Considering there is no prospect of our being Supply'd from Canara 'ere it be all deliver'd out.

AGREED we purchase the aforesaid three Hundred & Fifty bales and allow him for the same at the rate of Ten Fanams $\frac{1}{2}$ bale, and that instead of delivering out the whole parcell at Nine Fanams as was last resolved on, We advance 'its price to Nine & a Quarter in our future Issues whereby our Hon^{ble} Masters will be somewhat gainers and this Garrison Supply'd at a moderate rate.

ORDER'D that the Warehousekeeper receive said Rice the last of this Month, and make delivery thereof to the Garrison and that the Treasury discharge 'its Cost the whole Amount being Three thousand Five Hundred Fanams or Rupees Seven Hundred.

The Prince Cunhi Homo Signifying by Message to the Chief, that he intended to make use of the major part of the Munchuas belonging to such of his Subjects as inhabited near and at Tellicherry, with which he intended to Cruise on the Canarys, in order to prevent Sustenance from coming to their Army, since he could not otherwise be supply'd with Vessells sufficient.

And the Orders from our Superiours at Bombay possitively forbidding our giving the least handle to the Carnatick Rajah to quarrel with us, Notwithstanding the repeated Insults received from thence even to the denying us Rice for the Sustenance of this Garrison.

It was debated how farr it might be lookt upon, (not only by the Honble the President and Councill, but likewise by the Carnatick Rajah himself) as an Act of ours, provided the Vessells of Tellicherry should be known to Act in the manner before mentioned, and also, whether or no, We could without imediately disgusting the said Prince take upon us to hinder his Vassalls and Subjects from engaging in his Service.

But it appearing to every one of us, a matter that We ought not to Concern ourselves with, be the Consequence what it will.

AGREED We send the following message to the Prince; That his Highness his Vassalls and their Vessells are people, and things we neither have, nor pretend to have any Dominion over, that we are Exceeding thankfull they are permitted to Act for our Service, and that as he at prisint stands in need of them, We wish they may answer the end design[ed].

It is farther requested of us by said Prince, that Ten of our Garrison Soldiers may be sent for the Defence of a small Fort of his call'd Cacart near his Pallace for a few days, the Christian Soldiers in his pay being most of them withdrawn thence to the Frontiers of his Country, which We apprehend ourselves in Gratitude bound to oblige him in Considering his readiness to serve us in the like manner on any Occasion; and his being at present at Peace with the Moors frees us from any apprehensions, that they can make any exceptions at such a proceeding.

ORDERED therefore, that a Corporall and Ten men be spared him for the aforesaid Service, and that they have Directions not to Engage themselves in anything, but the defence of the Fort call'd Cacart, and that they remain there 'till ordered otherwise from hence.

himself, nor at a lower rate, since the Country about Agar where he resides had not yielded above One Hundred Candys, though most years past had produced from One thousand to Twelve Hundred, wherefore had he been obliged to seek this Commodity in places Very remote, and in parts where very likely he might be obstructed in bringing it away, which not only laid him under Very great uncertainty, but doubled his former Expence in Portrage, that the Country about Billapatam was altogether unsettled, and in the parts hereabouts in the utmost Confusion by reason of the great progress made by the Carnatick Army against this Kingdom, which added to the Generall Scarcity of this Commodity, through the Deficiency of the present Crop made him Timerous how he Engaged himself in Bargains of this Nature.

After hearing his reasons, and Debating thereon, We came to a Resolution of making him an offer of Sixty Six Rupees ꝯ Candy for One thousand Candys Pepper to be delivered into our Warehouse any time before the Rains, he to receive in part of payment for the same Two Hundred thousand New Callicutt Fanams Two ꝯ Cent Vattau as Customary and at Twenty five & an half Narodys of thirteen fan^s. old money ꝯ Candy, the rest to be made good to him in Rup^s. at 5½ fanams Tellicherry, and in Dollars at Eleven, But this proposall he could not be prevailld on to Accept, & assured us he would not on any Account agree with us on other Terms than the following (being Confident the French Ships who will Speedily arrive, would not fail of making large alterations in the Price of that Comodity) Viz^t. That he deliver us at Tellicherry before the Expiration of Aprill next Ensuing one thousand Candys Pepper at Sixty Seven Rupees ꝯ Candy, and in part of Payment to take Two Hundred Thousand New Callicutt fan^s. at Two ꝯ Cent Vattau and at 25½ Narodys of 13 Fanams ꝯ Candy, the rest to be made good to him in Dollars at Eleven Fanams Tellicherry each and Rupees at Five & a Quarter.

Finding it impossible for us to reduce him to Terms more favourable, or indeed in our Opinions to serve our Honble Masters by other means on Terms either so Secure or advantageous; It was at last AGREED by us to Accept the aforesaid proposals, which our Linguist was directed to signifie to him, and he requesting that a farth[er] sum of money be advanced him in part of this Contract in Callicutt Fanams.

AGREED We advance him as far as Fifty Thousand in that Specie, as he may think fit to call for them.

RESOLVED therefore, that We release them, and Suffer no Violence to be done them under our Forts, but the Third person being found on proof, to be a Canara Peon, and lately come from their Army with Intelligence, We think we cannot handsomly Concern ourselves about him, or sue for his releasement, Olas being found upon him not Signed, which prove him a Spye; AGREED therefore that We do not Interfere in this business, but that the Prince's Minister be suffer'd to Treat him as he thinks fitt.

SATURDAY This day received a Letter from Mons^r. Tremisot the French Chief & Council of Mihie; unreasonably requiring the releasement of a Canaree Spye the Prince's Ministers had taken up yesterday, whereto We made answer, That as the person they demanded at our hands was Seized by the people belonging to the Prince, to him We referr'd them to apply to for redress, in Case they thought proper, being an Affair We should not, nor could, take upon us to intermeddle with.

SUNDAY This Evening received another Letter from the French Chief & Council of Mihie, wherein they repeat their request for our Interceding for the Releasement of the Canaree Spye the Prince's Ministers had Seized, to which We made answer, referring them to our former Letter, and Confirming our resolution therein, which was not to Interfere in a Case of so Nice a Nature.

MONDAY Ensign Lewis Mendonza to whom the Charge of the Party sent by us against the Pyrate Cutty Coilem the 19th. Instant was Committed, returning this Evening, informs us, that agreeable to our Orders he proceeded to the N^o. ward of the River Billiapatam, in Quest of the Vessells belonging to said Pyrate, where he understood there was a Grab of very Considerable force, that in his way thither, and about three a [sic] Clock this morning he fell in with a Canaree Munchua, who attack'd him with a Volly of Stones Arrows &c^a. that finding himself so ill Treated he gave Fire upon them, & took the Vessell, that at day break the Large Grab before mentioned having on board her near Two Hundred Men & Twelve great Guns in Company with Severall other Munchuas came out, and bore down upon them, on which Ensued a Very Sharp Engagement, that after giving them four or five Volleys, he Clapt them on Board, and destroyed all her people, save about Six or Seven, notwithstanding^a. that he never Saw so Vigorous a Resistance made by any people of this Coast; He says that one of our Granados being thrown down her hatchway, towards the end of the Fray

gave fire to Eleven Barrells of Powder, or thereabouts which were in her Hold, and blew her up, after which she went down immediately, not one person as he apprehends, belonging to her being Saved.

This Evening received a Letter from the French Chief & Council of Mihie, wherein they again require our Interceding for the releasment of the Canara Spye, Protesting against the Hon^{ble}. Company & us for all Damages that may Ensue, in Case of our non Compliance; in answer to which, we gave them to understand, that as it was the Prince's people who Siezed said Spye, and sent him to their Sovereign, We were no wise answerable for that Action; and in Case they should take upon them to disturb the good Harmony which at present Subsists between ours, & their Colonys abroad, and especially those of Tellicherry and Mihie; We did Protest against them & their Company for all Damages & Inconveniencys attending the same.

The Council were called this morning by the Chief to Consider on means how to Supply our Inhabitants with a Quantity of Grain for the wet Season, Since We have barely enough in Store for our Garrison Soldiers.

Our Linguist being called in, was Enquired of as touching the Quantity of Rice he apprehended, might be in the Hands of the Moors &c^a. within our District, which he said, he had by the Chief's Order Scrutinized into, and found there was not Sufficient for the people depending on us for above Two months, before which time, if a supply was not thrown in, they must Desert us, for the French were stricter than ever in not Suffering a Grain to be brought by our people from their Settlement, and had Actually placed Guard boats both by day and night for this very purpose.

Our Superiours in their Commands under the 10th. of Aprill last, are pleased to Express themselves in so dubious a manner, Concerning the Supply they intended us, that 'tis Judged not proper, We should with any assurance, depend thereon, and recommend our using our utmost endeavours to supply ourselves in the best manner we can in Case of a Disappointment meaning We suppose, that we take it from the Canarees, with whom they say, they intend to make War after the Rains, these people having denyed it us for near these four years.

AGREED therefore, that rather than Risque the Loss of this Settlement, and Since no other probable means appear of our being able to Supply ourselves, We fitt out some small Vessells well mann'd with our Garrison Soldiers and endeavour to bring in the Rice boats we have very good Intelligence the Canarees are now fitting out for the Supply of their Army; The Calamitous Condition the place is in, admitting of no delay and in hopes our Superiours will approve this proceeding, Since undoubted and mere Necessity plainly forces us thereto.

Ult^o. with relation to the Canara Spye seized here by the Prince's Minister, sent us this day another Very angry Epistle, seemingly threatning us, in Case we did not procure his releasment, Protesting against us, & Declareing us answerable for his person, To which We made them a very Civil reply, telling them that said Spye was not a person belonging to their Colony, nor were We anywise answerable to them for his person, and that Should they Enter on any unfriendly measures with us on his Account, We declared them answerable for all ill Consequences attending the same.

The Board being Assembled to sign the Severall Copies of our Consultations brought up to this day, M^r. Howard took Occasion to observe that the Officer of the Guard had for sometime past examined all Bundles going out of the Fort, which he said was scandalous & Infamous, that he could not suppose said Orders could come from the Chief, and that he hoped there would be redress; The Chief thereupon informed him that to prevent Theft in the Fort, and to hinder the Garrison Stores from being carried off he has ordered the Captain of the Guard to examine all Bundles carried out of the Fort and intended to continue it, and the Captain of the Guard being called, declares he had received no other Orders from the Chief than to examine all Bundles as above to prevent Theft.

— JUNE 1732 —

Mr. William Forbes thinks it an hardship that his Foul Linen, or anything belonging to him coming from his Room should be opened and Examined before the Guard, but if it is the Chiefs Order, he shall submit to it till such time [as] he can be redressed by his Superiours, as it is a Custom he know not to be practised either att the Presidency or any of the Factories subordinate thereto.

Mr. William Jeynson likewise represent [that] his Bundle of Foul Linen having been used in the same manner with this Aggravation that Cap^t. Douglas took upon him to say he would rip up what belonged to him, and therefore intends to submit this Affair to his Superiours.

Mr. Forbes on the Whole judges it as he expresses it a great Hardship his servants should be examined ere permitted to pass with any Bundle and desires it may not be so in future.

The Chief therefore not only vindicate himself in these proceedings to his Superiours att Bombay, but before such others as they concern, observes that he apprehends he has a power of making such Garrison rules as he judges best suit the Posture of the times, so long as they are not repugnant to Law and Justice and withall remarks the mutinous manner in which the above Three Gentlemen in full Councill have taken upon them to call him to an Account and to [invalidate] what asserted by Mr. Forbes, as touching the unusualness of such a scrutiny alledges that various times the like hath been putt in practice in the Garrison att Bombay by the Orders of Presidents Boone and Phipps and that his own servants, and his own [Bundle] were as [strictly] looked into as any one else and since his Design in this Matter is to prevent all kinds of Thefts which have so frequently been committed in this Garrison by his servants and others, he cannot bring himself to think there is anything Infamous or Scandalous in the above Order and that therefore while he thinks it necessary he will continue them, unless his Superiours think [fit] to take from him the power of making such Garrison rules as he judges are best sui[te]d to the safety thereof and every [member] therein, so long as they are not repugnant to common Practice, Equity and Justice and the standing rules of our Hoñble Masters, but what most of all seems to surprize him is, that the above Gentlemen who took upon them to stop the Effects of the late Chief and his fam[ily] in so Insulting and Bare faced a manner, without as he judges any reasonable pretence for so doing should be alarmed when nothing is intended but for the Generall service and Benefitt.

We desire the above Two Paragraphs may be annexed to yesterdays Consultation, which we humbly submitt to the Consideration of our Superiours.

Which the Chief Requires time till to morrow to object against, and to make such observations as he thinks necessary thereon.

Captⁿ. Douglas seemingly standing accused in the said Consultation, of mall-treating some of the Companys servants in the Execution of his Trust was called in, and being asked concerning the same Declares, that being sharply reprehended by the Chief for not searching his own servants, and his Temper thereby a little Ruffled, he accidentally let drop the following Words in the hearing of M^r. Howard; That since he had fallen under so much Displeasure for not making a narrow scrutiny into Things carried out of the Fort, he would for the future see into the Bottom of every thing and Rip it up, (or words to that purpose), but that he had not hitherto given any such usage; and as touching this matter being a Thing of Custom att Bombay he doth affirm, he hath severall times received the like Orders when on Guard, from Presidents Boone and Phipps.

TO MESSIEURS WILLIAM FORBES, HUGH HOWARD
AND WILLIAM JEYNSON FACTORS ATT TELLICHERRY.

SIRS,

The Paper delivered in by you att Council the 15th. Instant, so ill excuses your seditious Behaviour towards me the preceeding Day that I cannot help making the following Observations thereon, the better to maintain what sett forth in the minutes of Our Transactions, to which shall add some few remarks on the Behaviour of each Person concerned therein that my Superiours may more easily frame a Judgment what sort of Spirits I have to deal with. 'Tis likely I may want sufficient Proof with some men for to settle in them a Belief of what I am about to make Good, since you are 3 and all confederate, and I only my own Voucher, besides I was sorry to hear one of you offerr to make Oath to what seemingly to me appears wrong.

By the Preamble to this some may think I am willing to spin the matter a greater Length than is fitting, be it therefore known to such, that I have declared to you all, the least hint given me of an Insult from an Officer would have immediatly been censured in the due manner, had it been represented with Modesty, Good Nature and the regard which is att present my Due in this Garrison, but instead of this I have the quite Contrary Conduct to complain of in you, which leads me to the Discussion of the first point intended, that is to prove your Behaviour to me the 14th. Instant, both seditious, and indeed mutinous, and in this, I think, I shall not be disappointed.

The first Person I am then to accuse is M^r. Hugh Howard, who taking to himself the head of the Table began with much Passion and Violence to complain his Bundles were examined as they passed the Fort Gate, and immediatly added 'twas Scandalous and Infamous, notwithstanding the Captain of the Guard had told him 'twas by my Order, and all this before I had time to make him a reply, thô this you attempt to moderate in your second Paragraph, by flinging it on the Officer, which is of no Weight, seeing he hath not acted as you knew before but with my Order.

Next I am to take Notice that the above disorderly Proceeding was immediatly backed by M^r. William Forbes, who urged it was a Grievance that his servant should be searched when with Bundle as before related, and talked of having redress since the thing as he understood was not customary any where else, who afterwards taking upon him to mock me in my Discourse, shows the manner of your applying to me was not civill, but disorderly but I do not wonder att any sort of Behaviour in that Gentleman who is so remarkable in his Conduct towards his superiours, as his impious Swearing and Hectering att the Councill Table does manifestly evidence with other Instances of his ill manners and disrespect that are needless here to relate.

I could have been glad M^r. Jeynson had thought better than to have engaged himself with you in this Faction, but his insisting so strenuously on making this idle Complaint so publick [as] now it must be, convinces me you had taken some pains with him to make him of your party, not having found

him troublesome before. As that Gentleman thinks himself so highly wronged by my Orders to the Garrison, I must [. . .] he will prove what Injury he hath received thereby. I was somewhat surprised to find him doubtful whether or no I had an authority of making Garrison Rules, and that he should be so imprudent as to express himself to that purpose in the presence of a Commissioned Officer, for on my asserting the same, he immediatly aplied he knew not whether I had or not, so that I am also obliged to take notice of this ill-advised Gentleman as a [. . .] confederate with you against me, and manifestly engaged with you in a Design of disputing my authority over this Garrison. And as it is plain from what before observed, that you Mr. William Forbes, Mr. Hugh Howard and Mr. William Jeynson, did the 14th. Instant joyntly and as a Body confederate, take upon you to dispute and call in question my Lawfull Orders for the better Government of these Garrisons, I do by these presents accuse you and every one of you of seditious and Mutinous Practices, manifestly tending to publick disorder and other Inconveniencies, and do likewise protest against you as Caballers against your Chief and persons of ungovernable and turbulent dispositions.

I might with Justice enough take upon me to proceed against you all with more rigour, than att present is my Intention, but this I shall leave as a thing to be judged on by my Betters, who I presume will not encourage any Body of Junior Servants to spurn att the Authority lodged by them in the Chiefs of the Hoñble Companys Settlements: but the Conduct of Mr. Hugh Howard, I cannot pass by in so slight a manner, since he appeared the Ring Leader of this Disorder, and branded my proceedings with the Terms of Infamy and Scandall. I therefore by the Authority that is vested in me do accordingly pronounce that the said Mr. Hugh Howard is suspended from acting in the service of the Hoñble United English East India Company att Tellicherry from the date hereof untill the Pleasure of the Honble the President and Council of Bombay be known concerning him.

Was read a Letter received from our Linguist att Callicutt bearing date the 23^d. Instant, signifying to us that the Samorine had sent his Ministers thither for to settle with him the Account of the Payment for Two Hundred thousand Fanams becoming due the first of April 1729 in part of which they had putt into his hands Nine thousand Fanams or thereabouts but that they cavilled with him concerning the Interest, which they say ought only to commence from the 1st. of May instead of the 1st. April 1729 Insisting also that we should send them down immediatly, and ere payment was made the Original Ola for the whole debt when they would send us up Four others for the Four remaining Payments not yet Concluded.

On Retrospecting our Accounts, we find in Journall D^r. Page 11 The manner in which the Chief settled the Account of the first Payment is fully sett forth, and that when the same was concluded no scruple was made of allowing Interest from the Time that Ola was dated which was the same as the present, and that the same reasons bids us insist on full Interest on the present Ola as on the past.

AGREED therefore that we give our Linguist Orders not to make up the Account otherwise than we have directed him before; That is to say that he charge Interest on the Two Hundred Thousand Fanams becoming due the 1st. of April 1729 [until] the Time the Account is made up and that he acquaint them likewise the Chief will send them a Receipt for the whole when paid off, both Principall and Interest, that after the Rains he will either wait on them himself with the Original Ola, or send a proper person with it then to have it Exchanged for Four others in the manner they desire.

AGREED therefore that We wait till towards the 20th. and then apply ourselves to the Chitty, who we think the safest and properest Person for to see what Quantity and at what price he will supply us withall.

Our Broker Chato Chitty was this morning introduced by the Linguist and asked the reason why he had so long delayed to make good his last Contract for 1000 Candys Pepper. to this he said that the 300 Candys or thereabouts now outstanding would infallibly be brought in in all August, provided the Weather permitted, for that he had it in readiness, and that the reason why it was not sent us before the Rains was the difficulty he found in providing it, occasioned by [the] high price given by the French.

It was then proposed to him by the Chief whether or no, he could supply us in all October, with a farther quantity about three to four hundred Candys on the same Terms as before, provided we should stand in need of it; He gave us for answer, that of old Pepper there might now remain about five hundred Candys, which he could not possibly bring hither under the price of 75 to 76 rupees for so was it sold to the French in April last, and that he did not yet find it fallen, notwithstanding there was so good a prospect of a plentiful Crop, and withall begged that for the present we would excuse him from Entering on an Affair of this kind for were he now to buy up at so high a price the small Quantity remaining, it would enhance that of the new to a very extravagant Pitch, that he therefore advised us to wait till January for that in all that month he promised to supply us with any Quantity we might want for the dispatch of our Honourable Masters homeward bound shipping either to break the Price then, or when we judge convenient.

AGREED therefore that since we shall have by us in all August Fifteen hundred Candys or thereabouts which will [be] near sufficient for two Ships should they be sent in October, we conform ourselves to the Chittys Proposals and wait till January next, since in all that month he promises to deliver us the Quantity our Superiours are pleased to order, and a larger if necessary which will be time enough for the Ships intended home.

Said Chitty likewise requests of us that a further sum of sixteen thousand Rupees or thereabouts may be advanced him in part of his last Contract since he hath delivered in upwards of seven hundred Candys, which is near equal to the money already anticipated.

AGREED as such that we let him have the Dollars now by us amounting in all to Seven thousand seven hundred Eighty seven and a Half Mallabar Weight.
