General Letter from the Honble. President and Council of the 29 Ultimo and 4th and 6th Instant read, the two Latter accompanying a Supply of Five thousand 5000 Pagodas each, And the former advising Us that upon the Information they had received by way of the Deputy Governour of the Preparations the French are making at Pondicherry and the Apprehensions of the People at Cuddalore that they were chiefly designed against that place, They had advised Commodore Barnet thereof, who had ordered the Deptford to repair to Us and that they had sent by her a Party of fifty Men under the Command of Lieutenant John Gingins, with directions to obey our Orders, but in case they should not be absolutely necessary on shore they direct that we send them on board the Admiral Vernon when she arrives to continue there while she is taking in the Bales whom they purpose to dispatch in a few days to Us, In order to fill up for Europe for which they direct Us to make all necessary Preparations.

Genl. Letters from the Hon'ble. Presid: & Co: read. Supply of Cash sent us. The Deptford Man of War sent to us with a Party of Men to assist us against the French. Directions thereon and Concerning the Admiral Vernon.

General Letters to the President and Council of Yesterday and this day's date read, Signifying the receipt of the two above Supplies and that they turned out right.

Supplies of Cash received Advice thereof sent to the President and Council.

Charles Floyer Paymaster having desired to be advanced Five hundred 500 Pagodas for Disbursements the Deputy Governour acquaints the Board that he paid the same the 1st Instant.

Money advanced the Paymaster.

Andeapah having been advanced Five thousand 5000 Pagodas Yesterday for account of the Investment and he representing that he still requires a further advance on that account ORDERED That four thousand 4000 Pagodas more be paid him.

An Answer to what relates to the Admiral Vernon that the Rains have been inconvenient to curing the Cloth inclosing monthly Papers and representing the necessity of having a new Godown built for the Cloth.

Ordered that a General Letter to the Honourable President and Council be drawn out, in answer to their foregoing favour of the 29: Ulto. and to acquaint them that we shall do all we can to contribute to the ship's early dispatch, but that the late unexpected Rains have been of great Inconveniency to Us, It having disappointed us in the curing of above a hundred Bales; Also to inclose our Consultations &ct. Papers for last month and to acquaint them that the Warehousekeeper having delivered in a Report as entered after our last Consultation, setting forth that it is requisite the Godown remaining to be built at Tevenepatam should be augmented to thirty five Feet long, and that the Godown at that place as well as those at Bandipollam should be compounded by a Brick Wall, and further that there is a great occasion for a New Terrass Godown to be added to our Sorting place of one hundred Feet long and Twenty feet broad, That these Additions were thought absolutely necessary for the carrying on our Honourable Masters Business in a proper manner especially as the Investment is so considerably increased, and desiring their directions thereon.

Genl. Letters from the President and Council read \* advising of the dispatch of the Admiral Vernon to Us inclosing the Invoice and Bill of Lading & that they would send overland the other necessary Papers. Giving us \* directions concerning the dispatch of that Ship.

General Letters from the Honourable President and Council of the 10: and 15: instant read, The former advising us that pursuant to what they wrote us the 29 Ulto. they had dispatched the Admiral Vernon Capt. Cooke to us to be filled up for Europe and inclosing Bill of Lading for the Bales and Saltpetre they had put on board her and that the Invoice for which would be sent us overland with other necessary Papers, for what relates to their dispatch and the Forms to be observed therein they refer us to the directions sent from thence in 1738. 9 and since on the like occasions, that they had given the Commander a Copy of the Caution against fire and keeping the Boats long on board with Bales in them, which they direct us to remind him of, that they would have us advise them as soon as possible what Number of Bales we can certainly depend on having ready by the 25 of the month that if we cannot compleat her Tonage they may give some further assistance if in their power; The latter acknowledging the receipt of ours of the 11th by which they are concerned to observe we have been so greatly impeded by the Rains from curing the Cloth as it occasions them to apprehend that though we shall have upwards of Eighteen hundred Bales on hand which will be more than the Ship will require, Yet that we shall fall short in the quantity of White, So that in Case it should prove so, there is no other remedy left but to make up the deficiency in Brown Cloth which they direct us to take Care to have ready for that purpose, having regard that the Sortments be equal, and that the President will notify to the Deputy

Governour, the time it will be necessary to have the Ship in readiness. That they observe what we mentioned concerning the addition to be made to the Godown at Tevenepatam Washing place, As also the New Terrassed Godown, and when they receive the Estimate of what it will cost they promise to take the same into Consideration, desiring Us to let them know if we are supplied with the necessary Timber and Plank for the latter, as it must otherwise be a very costly Building in these times, Those Articles being so very scarce and dear at present and inclosing the Admiral Vernon's Charterparty and List of Tonage in which they direct us to observe that there is near forty 40 Tons of Surplus petre, which from the want of a proper quantity of white Cloth must be reckoned into her Tonage.

That they should consider on what we wrote concerning the New Godown and desiring an Estimate thereof.

The Admiral Vernon Arriving here this morning and the President and Council having thought proper to direct us to remind the Commander of the Cautions they had given him against Fire &ct. Ordered that a Letter be drawn out to him for that purpose and in observance to their directions in their Letter of the 29 Ulto. Agreed that an order be given Lieutenant Gingsins to repair on board her with the Men he brought from Fort St. George for her defence in Case any Enemy should attack her; Also that an order be sent Captain Cooke to receive him and his party on board as likewise to direct him in case he should be attacked by an Enemy whilst he is in this road taking in Bales and he should think proper to get under way to avoid them, that he make the best of his way to Negapatam and to wait there till he receive farther Orders.

Admiral Vernon arrives. Necessary Cautions given and A Party of Men ordered on board for her Security.

The Wind blowing very fresh and the Surff running so high as to prevent any Boats going off for the present the Warehousekeeper is ordered to employ the time in getting all the Boats he can that the Bales may be sent off with the greater expedition when the Weather will permit.

Wind prevents any Bales being sent on board.

Masters and Mr. Humffries Cole which remain unsettled, and as that Gentleman had withdrawn himself from Calcutta against the consent of the President, or without giving the least notice thereof to the Board They intimate to them, that if Mr. Cole should be on the Coast to take such Methods as should seem adviseable to procure his return thither, as soon as conveniently may be, wherefore they are under a necessity of directing, as they thereby do, That on receipt thereof we immediately secure the person of Mr. Humffries Cole now at our place till he gives us a proper Security to make his personal appearance before the President and Council of Fort William at any time between this and the last day of July next, On which Mr. Cole being sent for in he assures us he had no thought of acting at all contrary to any Orders he should receive from any of the Company's Agents; That he left Calcutta on his own private affairs but that he was ready to return there or any where else where he could contribute to the Interest of the Honble. Company also, That he had acquainted the Honble. President and Council of Fort St. George of such his Intentions on his first arrival here; and then withdrew.

President and Council to the foregoing purpose and that in case there should be any proceedings necessary in regard to his giving Security, as Mr. Cole is ready and willing to wait on their Honors &ct. We hope they will please to order him so to do, as we are all of us entire Strangers to Affairs of that Nature and consequently liable to act in an improper manner and inclosing a Letter Mr. Cole has just now sent in. Also adding that Commodore Barnet came ashore here some days past very Ill of a Fever of which he dyed the 29 Ulto. and was buried the 30th in as decent a manner as possible; That we took all the expeditious means we could to advise Capt. Peyton thereof, who came in here the 1st Instant in the Evening and the 2d in the morning he hoisted a Broad Pendant and we saluted him with Fifteen Guns.

General Letter to the Honble. President and Council of the 3d Instant read, in answer to their favour of the 26 Ultimo acquainting them that in Consequence thereof Messrs. Wynch and Cooke went on board his Majesty's Ship Winchester, where they received the Treasure of Lord William Bertie, paid him Bombay Rupees 7780½ for the freight, and gave him up his Bill of Lading endorsed by them; That our Merchants having agreed to take fourteen Chests at the Madrass price and Mahomed Allibeck to take the remainder of his Bond in Silver, we ordered Sixteen Chests to be sent ashore and the rest to be loaded according to their directions on board the Princess Mary, which Ship arrived here the 30 Ultio. and brought their Honour &ct's favour of the 16th That we had near landed the Stores and should send Bales on board tomorrow the Captain not being ready sooner; That Capt. Peyton talks of staying seven or eight days longer in the Road, and leaves the Lively to convoy this Ship up to Madrass, That in about ten days we compute we shall have about eight hundred Bales ready, That we had then of the new Investment no more than Six hundred and twenty Bales; That the middle of last month Andeapah's Ballance was reduced to thirteen thousand Pagodas and the Salampores Merchants in proportion; but with this fortunate Supply and some Pagodas for this month till the Silver is converted into Pagodas we hoped the Case would be quite altered, and that our Merchants would exert themselves and make up for the lost time; That we had in the Godowns Torn and Turned out Cloth, to the Amount of near Nine thousand Pagodas so large a Sum, that we did not think proper to sell it at outcry as usual without first advising their Honour &ct.; That the latter Article consists of Fifty five Corge of Salampores and only six pieces of Long Cloth Fine, That all the rest was Torn, and is as good Cloth, or perhaps better than some gone home, for which reason we referred it to their Honour &ct's Consideration, That we tendered to Capt. Peyton the Bill for Rupees 5571. — 62 drawn by Lord Thomas Bertie on Curtis Barnet Esqr. deceased who informs us that as there is now no Commander in Chief every Captain must answer for what relates to his own Ship, That Lord Thomas Bertie was very ready to give Bill on the respective Offices but we not knowing how to account for the Rupees in Pounds Sterling, or whether it would not be more agreeable to their Honour &ct. to make up one General account with the Captains near the time of the Ships going for Europe have let that affair rest till we receive their further directions; That to Mr. Barnet's decease, We have paid out of our Cash Pags. 2955. 11. 60 which we send them Mr. Rosewells (the Agent Victualer) receipt for, and have accordingly debted Account Current Fort St. George in April Month; As we have done for Pags. 375. 2 paid on account of the French Prisoners which Capt. Peyton had made himself accountable for by signing the inclosed Account, That we had also paid Mr Belsches Agent for the Sick and Wounded Pags. 727. 30. for which we should wait their Honour &ct's Orders if it should be carried into our next Books or transferred; That we had finished the South West Bastion which came somewhat within the Calculate, and that we have began and go on pretty fast with the arched Work, but as Mr Smith gave it his opinion after we sent the Calculate for six feet thick, that it would not be secure for the purpose unless it was eight feet, We have laid the foundation in that manner, which we hope will meet with their Honour &ct's Approbation, but that it would make it amount to One thousand 1000 Pagodas more; That after this was finished and what we are about If their Honour &ct. would supply us with

That we were thus explicit, that it might not all appear to have been advanced on account of this year's Investment, but on the contrary only Sixty Seven thousand Two hundred and thirty two Pagodas four Fanams and forty Cash 67232. 4. 40 has been advanced on that account, and the Merchant's ballances which can scarce be reckoned any advantage, as in all probability there will be to the same amount due to them at the end of this Investment, as the last, for considering the Investment the Ballances were then but small, and assuring their Honour &c. we should do the best we can, but that the Impediment this Investment met with before the arrival of the Princess Mary, as set forth in our address of the 8 April cannot wholly be recovered, That we have according to their order sent the Warehousekeeper's account of the Torn and Turned out Cloth. The Governour of Madrass having advised the Deputy Governour in a Letter dated the 4th inst. at noon, that the French Fleet with all their Transport Vessels &ct. were (as we imagined they designed) arrived against that place and that in order to invest it they had landed 2000 Men at Trivambore and St Thome, and that 5 of their Ships were lying off Triplicane and 3 off Madrass, and having been since informed that the Enemy had begun their attack on the 5th and that a very brisk fire was heard till yesterday the 7th at nine in the Morning, and having no other Intelligence from the Gentlemen at Madrass themselves, we conclude that the Town is so surrounded that they can get none to Us, We are therefore now met to consider, what in our Power can be done, for our Honourable Masters interest at this Critical and unfortunate Juncturē, to send them any relief we fear is not so, as we have but one hundred European private Men in this Garrison, which is so small a number it would scarce be any service to them and would make this place utterly incapable of making any defence at all, were it otherways our enemies are quite Masters of the Sea on this Coast, not having any knowledge at all what is become of His Majesty's Squadron, therefore it would be impossible to send them any relief by that way and by Land the expedition would be too tedious as well as too dangerous our Enemy's Garrison at Pondicherry being between Us and Madrass and that place being surrounded by Numbers so Superiour to any thing we cou'd send It is therefore upon all these Considerations, Our Unanimous Opinion that all we can at present do, for the service of our Employers is to spare no Cost or Trouble if possible to find out where his Majesty's Squadron is and advise Capt. Peyton of the situation of our Affairs and then to lay in a proper Stock of Provisions according to our former resolution in order to hold out a Siege as long as possible, as at this season of the year every day is liable to produce something in our favour either in bringing succour to Us or obliging our Enemies to quit Us should they attack Us which is not to be doubted, if they meet with Success at Madrass and very likely otherwise.

Letter from the Govr. of Fort St. George advising of the motions of the Enemy.

Advice is brot. that they had begun their attack.

Resolution thereon.

We are sorry to observe the great difficulty that appears to Us in finding out his Majesty's Squadron which tho' we know has been on the Coast upwards of a month has been conducted in so Extraordinary a manner that no advice has been received from it either here or at Madrass or any English Settlement, nor has it been in our power at any place to give them the least notice of our Affairs, The Situation of which has been such this last Month that it cannot be supposed but that all possible means have been used by Us for that purpose but in vain. We have now Cattamorans from Tranquebar to Zeyloan and Letters from Negapatam to Jaffnapatam and other places on Zeyloan to the Masters of the Porto Bello and Fanny Sloops to look out for them if to the Southward and Cattamorans gone off from hence into 30 Fathom Water in hopes of seeing them with Promises of 100 Pagodas reward, which is all in our Power and we wish it may succeed.

There being turned out Cloth now in the Fort belonging to the Merchants amounting to so large a Sum as about Twenty thousand 20,000 Pagodas. which the Merchants not having been able hitherto to sell has been kept for the Security of their Ballances, but as at this time the room that it takes up is very much wanted the Cloth is liable to be damaged by keeping so long in Godowns without airing and it might occasion a dispute should any accident happen to the place, who should bear the Loss, as it is kept entirely for the Company's Conveniency. We upon maturely considering all these Circumstances do think it most for the Company's Interest especially as our Merchants are responsible People that the Cloth be delivered them, they Agreeing not to dispose of it without our Consent and to give a receipt in the Company's receipt Book to be accountable for the amount of it as it is sold.

Having received News by the Dutch Tappies who have brought General Letters all along the Coast, advising that Fort St. George surrendered on the 10 instant and that the French had hoisted their Colours on the Flag Staff, and it being Currently reported from all quarters that they design as soon as possible to attack this place. AGREED that we bring all our Military and Gunroom Force into this Fort, and that there be only out of it; At Cuddalore. An Ensign and twenty Topasses to open and shut the Gates and stand Centinel, and that there be one European Gunner at Patcharee Point and Peons to assist him, and the same at Tevenepatam Gate Way. AGREED Also that the Deputy Governour do immediately address the Nabob and represent the monstrous Injustice as well as Ill Policy of permitting the French to act in this manner, when it is well known to his Excellency as it appears by many of his Letters both to Govr. Morse and Mr. Hinde, That Obedience to his Commands for the sake of the Peace and Welfare of his province have been the only motives that have restrained us from attacking the French by Land when we had a Superiour Force and rendring them long since incapable of taking this advantage of Us; Agreed that we write the Phousdar of Chellumbrum and all the neighbouring Hovildars to procure us some Good Poligars and Musquet Peons, in order to protect the Bounds and keep the Inhabitants together without which we cannot get Provision and Necessaries for the Garrison, and likewise to harrass the Enemy in the night time and keep them at a distance.

— SEPTEMBER 1746 —

To Our very great Misfortune the Ballance of the Honble. Company's Cash being but Ten thousand 10000 Pagodas, though our Merchants have been advanced nothing since the 9 of June Agreed that all their Ballances be immediately demanded and paid in and the Merchants be ordered to put an entire Stop to the Investment and that all the Cloth be sent for from the Washing Towns and secured in the Fort. Agreed farther that the Steward do proceed with the utmost expedition to lay in a Stock of all kind of Provisions for the Garrison for six Months at least, and that the Storekeeper do make Gunpowder as fast as he can get Materials and People to manufacture it and Ordered that all the Sick People be sent for into the Fort as well from the King's Hospital, as the Company's, and that all the Company's Grain be sent for from Cuddalore. Agreed that the Military Officers and Gunner be sent for and ordered to put the Garrison in the same disposition as if they were certain of an immediate attack, and that it constantly be kept in proper order. AGREED that we lodge Letters at Negapatam and Tranquebar to advise his Majesty's Squadron and likewise all Captains and Supra Cargoes of English Ships of this unhappy accident and to request Capt. Peyton to come to the assistance of this Settlement if our Letters should meet with him, though we have very little hopes of that piece of good fortune from his late conduct.

The Ballance of Cash being very small Merchants ballances ordered to be collected in and the Investment to be stopped. All kinds of provisions to be laid in. The Military Officers and Gunner to be sent and ordered to put the Garrison in proper order. Advices sent to Negapatam to advise the Squadron of the accident as also all other English Shipping.

De La Bourdonnais gave his Word of Honour should be on amicable Terms, That accordingly the Articles of Ransom were to have been signed as next day being the 29th and that Monsr. De La Bourdonnais by these Articles (the Conditions of which Mr. Morse makes no mention of) was to evacuate the Town by the 2d or 3d instant, and that in his next Letter he shall speak more fully, for which the Deputy Governour has waited till last Night, when he received from Govr. Morse one dated the 1st Instant wherein he says that since his last Monsr. De La Bourdonnais has made some considerable alterations in the Articles of Ransom and that he seems determined to keep a French Garrison till January. He likewise intimates that the Gentlemen at Pondicherry have been the occasion of this Though Monsr. De La Bourdonnais pretends to make other excuses; But as they are in his hands they cannot help it, And that in their unhappy situation they may expect to suffer this and much more.

General Letters to the Honble. President and Council of Fort William, as also another to the Honble. President and Council of Bombay of the 11 Instant read, both which implying that it is the utmost concern to Us, that it has fallen to our Share, as the next Settlement on this Coast to Madrass, to send them the Melancholly Account of the loss of that Noble Settlement, which surrendered to the French the 10 Sepr. though we had but just now got such Advice of it as could be esteemed a proper foundation for this publick Notice, which were two Letters from Govr. Morse under the 28 Sepr. and 1 October, The first giving an account of their being necessitated to surrender the place on Condition of it's being ransomed, which they had then Agreed upon and were to have been signed the next day, but does not say what the Terms were; That in the latter he says Monsr. De La Bourdonnais has made several Alterations in those Terms, And on the whole is determined to keep a French Garrison in it till January, so that we see little likelihood of it's being recovered but by Force of Arms; That Mr. Hinde on the first account of that place being lost and expecting daily that this would be attacked wrote to their President desiring he would send Succours as soon as possible which we repeated to their Honour &ct. as it might be of the utmost Ill Consequence to Our Honble. Masters to omit it, because we thought as we were at Present stored with Provisions and all other Necessaries for some time, we could hold out till we receive more, which without a Supply was morally impossible to do, That had Monsr. De La Bourdonnais been able to finish his Affairs at Madrass so soon as he proposed, he would we imagine have been with Us long before this, As it is we are informed he designed it late as it is, about or a little before this time, But that it has pleased God to disappoint their Views by a Gale of Wind the 2d at Night that has drove two of their Ships ashore and dispersed five more in such a manner that they know not what is become of them. That the Achilles is said to be one of them ashore, And all or near all her Men are lost by which the Squadron is destroyed; That it was generally believed after they had done here they were bound for the Malabar Coast, but that it has pleased God to stop them in their Career; That about a fortnight since the Centaur a Seventy Gun Ship, of the same Force and Size of the Achilles arrived from thence with Another Forty and a Twenty Gun Ship which was all the force they had now to depend upon on this Coast, which it was said they were to leave the 13th but whether for Bengal or the Malabar Coast or the Eastward we could not tell; That since writing thus far we had received an account That the Bourbon and Duc D'Orleans and one more are lost; That the Achilles and most of the others they say are all dismasted, and that they compute near 1200 Men have perished in the Storm; That Monsr. De La Bourdonnais since this accident sent for one Ship to Madrass which was sent, but sending for three more It was not thought proper to comply with his demand; That the Ships then in Pondicherry Road were taking in Bales and Provisions, As it is said for the Malabar Coast, and that a little French Ship bound from Yanam was lost in the Storm; As were our Honble. Masters Vessels the Mermaid and Advice Snow; And requesting their Honour &ct. would send us in particular some Cannon Shot from 16 to 18 Pounds, with Cohorn Shells of 3 $\frac{3}{4}$  Inches Diameter 500, Spunge Staves 100, Good Musquets 500, and Cartridge paper 2000 Quires.

Court of Directors being drawn out in Consequence of our last Consultation, to advise them of the Loss of their valuable Settlement of Madrass, Four Copies of which being now read and Signed, AGREED to forward the same by the Porto Bello Sloop now lying in Negapatam Road. Sailing Orders are therefore drawn out to the Master thereof Mr. Walter Hooke,

directing him immediately to weigh anchor and make the best of his way to the Cape of Good Hope, where if he met with any of the Honble. Company's Ships to advise them that Fort St. George was taken by the French, and of any other Circumstance he knew of the Enemy's Shipping that may be of service to them; If any safe Conveyance was upon the departure to send by them the Packet directed to the Honble. Court of Directors Marked No. 1, If not to leave it with some Trusty Person, to forward after he was gone, Also directing him not to stay longer ashore than four or five days and then to proceed to St. Helena, where he was to deliver to the Govr. of that place the Packet marked No. 2 and to stay there not above four or five days more and then to proceed for the first Port he could fetch in great Britain or Ireland, There to send his Packet No. 3, as directed by the General Post. If the first Port be in Ireland he is order'd as soon as he has landed his Packet to proceed for the first Port in England, and there land the Packet No. 4 and send it by the General Post, and to advise in a Letter directed to Christopher Mole Esqr. Secry. to the Honble. East India Company, of his arrival, and Where from, and then to make the best of his way into the River Thames, where he would receive orders from our Honble. Masters, Observing that in case he fell in with any Men of War bound for England to put No. 3 on board instead of landing it, particularly ordering him not to carry with him any Private Trade whatever, And that he keep a particular good look out for fear of Enemies; That he avoid as much as possible the Track the French Ships go in, to the Mauritius, and if there are no English Ships at the Cape to leave a Letter directed to the Commanding Officer of any English Ship, advising them of his Voyage and the meaning of it, likewise to keep the Packets Slung and be sure to heave them overboard if he falls in with an Enemy.

Bello Sloop giving an account of the several Circumstances that had come to our knowledge and directions to the Master concerning the disposal of his Packets and orders for his Voyage.

A Letter to the Governour and Council of St. Helena is likewise now read and signed, advising them that we have thought proper to send home to our Honble. Masters the Porto Bello Sloop, Walter Hooke Master, to advise them of the loss of their Settlement Fort St. George, Who will deliver them a Packet directed to the Honble. Court of Directors, being a Duplicate of what we send by that Sloop and requesting they will forward the same to Great Britain by the first opportunity that offers.

Letter to the Govr. and Council with the aforementioned News.

General Letter from the Honble. President and Council of the 9 Instant read, acquainting us that it being Stipulated by the Articles of Capitulation granted by Monsr. De La Bourdonnais for the Ransom of Fort St. George and the Town of Madrass and It's dependancies; That all the English who are not upon Parole shall be sent to Cuddalore; In Consequence thereof they send a party of Men as Per List in the hands of Ensign John Turnball, who they have appointed to conduct them thither and to stay there with them till the time of their return to Madrass, According to the Terms of the Capitulation, Till when they direct us to allow them their usual pay for their Subsistance, but caution us to observe that they being all Prisoners of War we are not to employ them in our Garrison of Fort St. David, As they cannot act either Offensively or Defensively against the French till their exchange, or even defensively till their return thither, Of which they promise to send us directions hereafter, Agreed that these Directions be complied with should any reach this place, but they are taken by a party of French and Carried into Pondicherry as Prisoners of War, by which we imagine the Treaty mentioned in this Letter is not ratified at that Place.

Letter from the President and Council accompanying a party of Military hither upon Parole agreeable to the articles of Capitulation.

They are carried into Pondicherry Prisoners.

There being some Military come from Madrass that are under restrictions not to act, and the President and Council having directed us in the above Letter to allow all such persons their Usual pay—AGREED that they remain at Cuddalore and that they be paid accordingly, And as many of them had arrears due to them at Madrass, The same is likewise agreed to be paid them, For both which the Paymaster is Ordered to debt Account Current Fort St. George.

A Party of them arrives, to remain at Cuddalore, to receive their pay as usual.

De La Bourdonnais's successes and that he is coming to make a Settlement on that Coast at Coletche They request us to give them the best account we can of the Squadron and where they are destined; That by the last advices they had received from the Northward the three French Ships that arrived at Mihie the 25th August, remain on that Coast, They further request that we return the Pattamars directly without sending to Madrass, as the Monsoon advances apace for Shipping to come round from our Coast.

General Letter to Bombay advising of the several Transactions of the Enemy.

General Letter to the President and Council of Bombay of the 28 Instant read, accompanying Duplicate of what we wrote them under the 11 past and acquainting them that since then Monsr. De La Bourdonnais had sailed from Madrass and arrived in Pondicherry road but did not go ashore, and sailed from thence to the Southward the 18 in Company with the three Ships last arrived and three more disabled Ships, That he delivered over the Command of the Garrison at Madrass to

Monsr. De Premeneil &ct. Council appointed at Pondicherry; That there were Articles of Ransom signed and agreed to [by] Mr. De La Bourdonnais but not ratified by Mr. Dupleix, or at all observed by Mr. De Premeneil That the Nabob's Son Mauphas Cawn was sent by his Father with an Army from Arcot to take Madrass from the French, who had sat down before it the 18 by which means that unfortunate place and all the People in it, as well English as French, were reduced to the utmost extremity, That a few Gentlemen who were at the Mount upon their Parole had escaped the Calamity as had Mr. Edward Fowke and Capt. Gingsins by making their escapes in Moors Dresses, That the rest were all close Prisoners and used very indifferently, That the Moors had taken Several French Men Prisoners among whom was Monr. Schonamille Mr Dupleix's Son in Law, That the Sumatra lately taken by the French sailed from Pondicherry for Europe the 20: That we had thought proper to dispatch the Honble. Company's Sloop Porto Bello to Europe with these Unhappy Accounts, That we had no News from Bengal or of any Europe Ships but the Severn of which the Packet from them brought the News and arrived about the 10 Instant, That we hoped their Honour &ct. would not fail to supply us according to our former request As soon as possible, As we should very soon be in want especially of Wheat having been blocked up ever since the 27th of June when the French Squadron arrived.

General Letter to the Honble. President and Council of Fort William read of the 29 Instant, accompanying Duplicate of ours of the 11 and advising that since then affairs at Madrass had taken another Turn which we hoped would be more for our Honble. Masters Interest and the prejudice of our Enemies, that the Articles of ransom have never been at all regarded either by Mr. Dupleix or those he had appointed to command at Madrass, but that on the reverse all Mr. De La Bourdonnais's Passports were revok'd and Fifty seven Men coming here in Consequence of part of that Treaty and with his Passports were taken in their Way and again made Prisoners of War; That the Nabob had sent his Eldest Son with a Force and Orders to retake Madrass who blockaded it from the 18th till the 24 when a party marched from Pondicherry to their Relief, who being joined by the Garrison between Madrass and St. Thome attacked the Nabob, whose Forces received some damage, On which he retired about 2 Leagues in Land to be reinforced, not having above five hundred Horse, That the Country People in General seem quite exasperated against the French and we hoped they would represent it in a proper light at Muxadavad, And desiring they would not fail to Supply Us the latter end of November, Otherwise the Company's Affairs here must run a Prodigious risque, should their Sea Force come upon the Coast before Assistance reaches Us, Also advising them of Monsr. De La Bourdonnais's departure and the Ships he carried with him, likewise that the Sumatra lately taken by the French was sailed for Europe and that we had thought Necessary to dispatch the Porto Bello Sloop home, to advise our Honble. Masters of the Situation of their Affairs on this Coast and requesting them to send us a Couple of Mortars with Bombs to them, as likewise some Great Guns and Shot to them of 30lb. weight with their Carriages, and as we should be in want of Wheat soon we desired if they could not get Surat to send us the best Bengal.

General Letter to the Chief and Council of Vizagapatam of the 29 Instant read, acquainting them, that as Madrass is taken by the French, and they having flown off from all Articles pretend'd to be made by them, And our Governour and Council there, being not only Prisoners of War, but under close Confinement; We had thought proper to direct, in case any of our Honble. Masters Ships should fall in with them that were designed for Madrass, that they acquaint the Commanding Officer of the same, and that it is our Orders as the Government of the highest Settlement on the Coast; That they come hither immediately or that the Company's Affairs will greatly suffer, And in Case they knew of any Enemy Superiour to them between

of the Coast desiring in case any of our Honble. Masters Ships should call there that they be sent hither without they knew of any superior force being on the Coast. That they would take Care to advise Nizam of all Occurrences that came to their knowledge and represent to him in a proper light the injustice of the French desiring them to send their Bales hither and that we expected a strict compliance with these orders.

Us and them, then we Impower'd and Directed them to take out what was consign'd to Fort St. George and keep till they heard further from Us, And their Endorsement on the Bill of Lading we would confirm, And then to dispatch the Ship or Ships as most Conformable to our Honble. Masters Orders and Interest and to keep People along shore (to the Southward especially) to convey these Orders to them, should they not come into their Port; And in case any of them should refuse to obey these Orders, to protest against them in the Company's Name of all Damages that may arise from their Disobedience to our orders in General, and Mr Hinde's in particular, as the only Person at Liberty now of the Governour and Council of Fort St. George; That if any of his Majesty's Ships shou'd appear, they would please to acquaint them with the Contents of this Letter. and request their Concurrence with them, And that they would come to our Assistnace as soon as possible least the French Sea Force should attack us, As the Monsoon is over, And desiring they take all occasions to represent to Nizam as Mr Hinde had done in his Letters to him, sent to their Chief, The great Injuries our Masters has sustained by the Nabobs permitting The French to plunder us in the manner they had done, And to request of him to take the proper Methods to do us justice, or that the Province would soon become a Scene of Blood and Confusion, instead of Trade and Commerce as it was while the English were supported. That in case any of our Honble. Masters Ships fell in with them that were under Convoy or of sufficient force for an Enemy that is on the Coast, We thought it absolutely for the Company's Interest to send what Bales they had ready, up hither and desired they would do so, and that as there was nothing in this Letter but what was for the true Interest of our Honble. Masters Affairs, We expected a strict Compliance with the Contents as they would answer it to them.

A Letter to be wrote the Nabob to encourage him in his designs against our Enemies.

The Nabob having offered his Service to retake Madrass Agreed that he be encouraged in the same in General Terms as we think it highly [to] our Honble. Masters Interest so to do in order to save our Selves and distress our Enemies.

The Deputy Governour produces to the Board a Letter he has received from Mr. Goodwin at the Mount dated the 5 Instant which having been wrote by the desire of Govr. Morse, the same being read is ordered to be entered hereafter.

A Letter received from Mr. Goodwin ordered to be entered.

Having received advice from Pondicherry that the Enemy will certainly attack this place in a day or two. The Military Officers have been ordered to visit the Works and survey the Stores and Ammunition of this Garrison and to make a report of their Condition In Consequence of which they now deliver in their opinions as entered hereafter, on which we came to the following Resolutions, That of the Places mentioned in the first Paragraph, The Hospital being the nearest and worst situated for incommoding the Fort it be immediately pull'd down or blown up as time will allow, That powder be placed in the Choultry over the water to blow up at the shortest warning if necessary, and that the Houses be pulled down in Tevenepatam that are within 400 Yards of the Fort, That the pavement in the Fort be immediately taken up and the Trees lopped, That the Portugueze Church being considerable more distant and not likely to be so incommodious, Agreed that we take that into our further Consideration, especially as at this Juncture it may not be so convenient to irritate so many of our Inhabitants as such a Step would give offence to, having already enemies enough, That Large Guns be put on the N.W. Bastion and Gins or some other Conveniencies for mounting and dismounting Guns be placed on each Bastion; That Lieutenants Morgan Crompton and Gings and Mr. Baker do visit the Gunroom and Ammunition and see that things are in proper order and that the Gunroom People are quartered and proper notice given to them of their respective Stations As likewise that the same be observed in the Military.

Advice from Pondicherry of the Enemy's designs against us.

Orders and Resolutions therein.

All Houses in Tevenepatam within 400 yards of the Fort to be pulled down.

AGREED that the two Companies be divided into three and that the Command of one be given to John Rodolph De Gingsins and that Mr. Ralph Wardlaw be appointed an Ensign in his Company and that each Company be recruited as fast as possible to their full Compliment of Two hundred Men, and that all able Europeans be entertained.

The two Companies divid'd into three the Command of one given to Lieutenant Gingsins Mr. Wardlaw appointed Ensign.

Several Young Gentlemen in the Service being come from Madrass and having no way of subsisting AGREED that a General Table be kept for them in a frugal manner so as not to put the Company to any Considerable Expence.

A General Table ordered to be kept.

The few Writing assistants we have here being barely sufficient to carry on our Honble. Masters Work in a regular manner and as the Business in the Secretary's Office will now be considerably increased, Mr. John Pybus having made application to Us to be continued in the Company's Service and writing a very fair hand, AGREED that he be entertained for the present as a Monthly Writer at 10 Pagodas Per Mensem and that we recommend him to our Honble. Masters to be confirmed in his former Standing in their Service.

Ulto. but we hear he did not sail till the 22d That he had 9 Europeans with himself and 9 Natives That he had agreed to give Mr. Scott his Chief Mate Fifty Rupees Per Month of which he desired eight Pagodas Per Month may be paid his Mother at Madrass, Beaumont Sculch his second Mate is to have thirty five Rupees Per month Fifteen of which he desires may be paid his Wife at Bengal and desires us to write about it thither.

WORSHIPFUL SIR,

On my leaving Madrass I was desired by Mr. Morse to acquaint you with the proceedings of Mr. Paradis by order of Mr. Dupleix &c. Council of Pondicherry which is, That the 30 past he declared (at the head of the Troops) the Capitulation made with Monsr. De La Bourdonnais to be void and in consequence thereof obliged the Inhabitants to evacuate the Town on the following Terms; All those who could prevail with themselves to take an oath of Fidelity to his most Christian Majesty might have the liberty of continuing in Madrass and carry on their commerce as formerly, All such as would not take the above Oath and were inclin'd to go to Pondicherry were permitted to have Passports and to be indulged with the favour of having four days allowed them to prepare for the Journey, But all those who did not choose to go to Pondicherry might have Passports to go where they pleased upon their Parole but have only two days allowed and should be further prohibited of residing at any such places as either of the Mounts or Cattawack. By this Unhappy turn of Affairs Mr. Morse told me he lookt upon himself as perfectly disqualified of acting as formerly and declared that in his opinion you was the Person invest'd with the Principal Authority to manage the Business of the Coast and issue out such Orders to the Northern Factories as you shall esteem most for the advantage of the Company, desiring that you would give likewise the earliest advices of this and all the unlucky Circumstances relating to our most melancholy Situation to Bombay and Bengal It may possibly be a little surprizing that he should not rather have chose to have wrote you all these things himself, but I assure you he seems to be so confounded and weighed down by what has happened as to be

entirely incapable of doing it, however should you entertain the least Suspicion of his not having delivered himself to me in the above manner, I shall always be ready to give you the most solemn proof of it in my Power for your Justification. In the morning after the Publication of what I have before mentioned, Mr. Morse (with the rest of the Council) delivered Mr. Paradis a Protest to all the Proceedings of him and the Superiour Council of Pondicherry and the same has been transmitted thither, but what effect it has had they keep secret, however conformable to what has been delivered, Mr. Morse &c. are determined to submit themselves as Prisoners rather than acknowledge the Power which has been exercised over us contrary to the Articles of Capitulation as well as the Law of Nations.

By my having the good Fortune to be exchanged by Monsr. De La Bourdonnais the same is confirmed to me by Mr. Paradis and in consequence thereof do look upon myself to have the Liberty of residing where I may think most convenient and am therefore determined not to quit this place for some time which will give me the opportunity of forwarding any thing from hence as you may think proper to entrust me with.

Major part of the French Officers seem to shew great concern for the treatment we are obliged to submit to and make no scruple of saying that Mr. Dupleix's actions will be undoubtedly condemned by their Sovereign, but at the same time they would willingly perswade Us that they have advice of their Affairs in Europe being in so flourishing a Condition as to render us incapable of doing them any prejudice. They likewise take upon them to assert that the Dutch have not declared against them. As these Reports are looked upon by Us to be given out with no other view than to damp our Spirits we therefore content Our Selves with the Pleasure of it's not being long ere the Scene is changed, but in the mean time I shall be infinitely obliged to you for some information concerning the Dutch.

Before I take my leave it may be acceptable to acquaint you that early this morning the English Colours were hoisted at the Fort and upon our going to the Top of the Mount We perceived a Ship standing into the Road with English Colours. About 11 o'Clock she anchored and saluted with Seven Guns upon which the English Colours at the Fort were Struck and French hoisted in the room of them, followed by firing all the Guns to the Sea at the Ship, This we observed put her into some confusion but at length the People on board recovering out of their surprize cut their Cable and put her under Sail, The Fort and Princess Mary still kept firing at her but we believe without doing any damage and she is now in a good Offing making the best of her way about E. S. E., as well as we can judge from this distance her Burthen is 2 or 3000 Tons.

When any thing further offers worthy of remark I shall take the liberty of communicating it to you and beg leave to subscribe myself with the greatest respect.

To pull up the Pavement within the Fort and to lop the Trees.

To have the Stores and Ammunition in the Gunroom visited, That the Cart-ridges are seized and numbered to prevent any confusion that may happen in case we should be attacked; As also that the Armoury be inspected into, and that the People which belong to the Gunroom are ordered to their respective quarters and Bills of their Names drawn in writing and hung up where they are quartered.

That it is absolutely necessary to have one or two Gins upon each Bastion to remount the Cannon in case they should be dismounted.

As the North West Bastion is very much exposed We do think that the Nine Pounders which are thereon are not heavy enough.

It is also necessary to have some Bricklayers Carpenters and Smiths as also a quantity of Bricks and Chunan to make use of as the occasion may require.

As the Garrison is to be dieted we hope that every thing is provided and proper Persons appointed to deliver out the Provisions &c.

There is a great deal more to be said on this Subject which would very much contribute to the Strength of this Garrison but the time is so short that nothing more can be done at present.

General Letter from the Honble. President and Council of Fort St. George of the 8th Instant read advising us, that they were forced to surrender the Town of Madrass and its Dependancies to Monsr. De La Bourdonnais and themselves Prisoners of War on the 10th Septr. last, on Condition of Ransom but that some delays in executing the same, and alterations occasionally made in the Articles deferred the Execution of them till the 10th October. Two days after which Monsr. De La Bourdonnais left that place on the Achilles, That the first Articles whereby it was stipulated that the French should evacuate the place to them between the 10th and 15th October N: S: were ready for signitg when on the 2d October O:S: There arose a Storm in which some of the French Ships were lost and others so much damaged that Monsr. De La Bourdonnais made some additional

Articles stipulating that they having previously obtained acts of liberty, should proceed as before in the Management of the Company's Affairs, not interfering with the Authority of the Commandant of the French Garrison, which he found himself obliged to leave there till January, by the last of which month the place was to be evacuated and left to them in full Possession, They performing some of the Articles stipulated on their parts, That the hurry and confusion necessarily attending such an Event would not permit them to carry on affairs with any regularity or order nor suffer them to send us Copies of the Capitulation, Surrendry and Ransom, or to write us more than a short Letter to accompany a Party of our Men who in Consequence of the Terms of Treaty were sent to remain at Cuddalore till the Surrendry of Madrass and who they hear were carried into Pondicherry contrary thereto; That they being fully determind on a strict observance of the Treaty on their parts, They were much surprized at receiving the 30th of last month a declaration published that day in the name of the French King whereby the Treaty made by Monsr. De La Bourdonnais was declared all Null and void, and possession taken of the Town in his Name, and three Conditions allowed the Inhabitants to make choice of Vizt. Those who would stay in the Town must take an Oath of Fidelity to the King of France others were permitted to stay in the Town four days and to have Passports to go whither they would on their Parole, and those who would not take the Oath or give their Parole were to go Prisoners to Pondicherry, That they thought it becoming them in their Publick Character to maintain as far as they were able the validity of the Treaty so long observed by them and therefore the next day delivered Monsr. Paradis the French Commandant, a Protest in the Name of His Brittanick Majesty of their Honble. Masters and all others his said Majesty's Subjects for all Damages that might accrue from such his Declaration and Breach of Treaty made between Monsr. De La Bourdonnais and them; That the Resolutions of Pondicherry on the Subject of their Protest are they beleive the Cause of some delay in their enforcing the Conditions of the declaration; That as they do not know but they may be soon put under Arrest and as the Situation they are at present in makes it impossible for them to give the directions that may be necessary to the Security of our Honble. Masters Affairs at their other Settlements on the Coast, or of their private Shipping that may come upon it, They being unacquainted with the Circumstances of that place and themselves, They refer to us for the present to do all in our power in Pursuance of those Purposes, That they should have sent us the above some days sooner, but were willing to advise us what farther might occur in Consequence of their Protest on which occasion they have to add that on their refusing to take the oath prescribed by the declaration abovementioned or to give their Parole they had that day received an order to hold themselves in readiness to set out the next day for Pondicherry under an Escourt of Military which such of them as are furnished with the means for a Journey must comply with.

Genl. Letter to Vizagapatam advising them of the Situation of Affairs here and of the letter received from the President and Council.

General Letter to the Chief &ct. Council of Vizagapatam of the 21st Instant read, advising them of the receipt of the above letter from the President and Council of Fort St. George and informing them of their unhappy Situation and that they have desired us to give the necessary orders on the Coast, That we therefore send this on purpose to confirm what we wrote them under the 29th Ultio. and directing them to send by the first good Conveyance all the Military that belonged to the Garrison at Madrass and any others they can spare under the Command of Ensign Peter Love and that they keep Ensign Morgan in his Place That if they have reason to believe the Ships from Bengal are passed their place before the receipt of this, We directed them to hire a Vessel or Vessels immediately and to send the people on them with what Saltpetre Rice or Paddy they could take in and they could provide, That Messrs. Morse and Monson were now at Pondicherry, and the rest of the Council dispersed on their Parole as were the Inferiour Servants, And desiring them to send the Contents of this Letter to Bengal by the most speedy Conveyance and to let them know we were safe and that the Moors were coming against Pondicherry and Madrass which we hope will prevent our Enemies coming against Us.

General Letters to the Honble. President and Council of Bombay of the 20 and 30 Instant read, accompanying duplicate of ours of the 28th Ultio. and that we have received a Letter from Governour Morse &ct. Council of the 8 Instant, advising of their unhappy Situation and desiring us to take the management of the Company's Affairs; That Monsr. Paradis had published by beat of Drum all Treaties made by Monsr. De La Bourdonnais to be void, And that all the English were obliged to quit Madrass the Mount and Ennore, That the Governour and Mr. Monson were at Pondicherry and the rest of the Council dispersed as were the Inferiour Servants and Inhabitants, That the Nabob had undertaken to oppose the French and had sent his Eldest Son with a Force towards Madrass, and that his Second Son was arrived within 40 Miles of this place with a design to go before Pondicherry, That our Enemies have been for these ten days past by their Reports coming against us, That we were every day in expectation of Succours from Bengal though we had received no letters from any place but Tellicherry and Anjengo, and that our chief dependance for Men was from them, That we should continue to advise them monthly of our Situation or oftener if necessary, That on the 5th Instant a Europe Ship came into Madrass road where they hoisted English Colours which the Ship saluted, and saw French colours hoisted and all the Guns fired at them from the Fort and Princess Mary that they could bring to bear upon her, on which she slipt her Cable and went off, and she is supposed to be the Brittannia; That as our Carpenters here work extreamly slow we desired their Honours &ct. would order twelve Feild Carriages for 18 Pounders to be made and sent, requesting they might be very strong and the Train not too long; The Latter advising them that we had private notice the French were determined to attack this place immediately and if possible to make themselves Masters of it before our Ships arrive, That the Moors Armies were both increased and advancing nearer Pondicherry every day, and as the time of our Ships arrival was very near we thought they could not make any material attempt upon us, and if they should we could certainly defend Our Selves till we received Succours and requesting their Honours &ct. would not fail to supply us with what we wrote for.

Genl. Letters to Bombay advising them of the Unhappy Situation of Affairs here, giving them the Substance of the letter received from the President and Council that an English Ship had been in Madrass Road but had made her Escape desiring them to send us some Field Carriages for 18 Pounders That the Enemy was coming against us, of the motions of the Moors Armies towards Pondicherry and desiring they would not fail to supply us.

Company's Cloths, for one of our Inhabitants that was at Pondicherry at that time detected two of the said deserted Washers with some of the Honble. Company's Cloths and demanding how they came by them was answered, not only they had brought the Company's Cloths with them, but a great many others here that deserted at the same time, as for the second Article of Pags. 17.1.— the Conicopies solemnly declare that the Washers were indebted that Sum in part of the advances made them just before their desertion.

I hope the aforesaid Circumstances are a sufficient proof that those Cloths as before represented to the Board were stolen by the Pondicherry Washers and that the money Pags. 17.1.— is due from them, both which Articles I hope your Worship &ct. will be pleased to order to be wrote off.

On Fryday the 5th Instant appeared in our Offin to our great satisfaction an English Ship which by the Cattamoran note proved to be the Houghton Capt. Isaac Worth, last from Bencoolen where he had put in for refreshment and which place he left the 1st November, The Deputy Governour immediately wrote him a Letter ordering him to send the Company's Packet ashore by the first Boat and advising him as there were three Ships in Pondicherry road to anchor nearer in and offering him Men if he wanted any and orders went off from the Board by Boats with Europeans in them to send his Treasure, but to our great Concern and Surprize he writes a Letter to the Deputy Governour advising him (to use his own terms) it would not do to stay here, he would go to Batavia or Colombo, on which he weighed and went off at 11 P.M. We hoisted Lights and fired Guns shot and all to bring him too, but to no purpose and the Boats with Europeans cou'd not get on board him. We have sent a Letter in strong terms after him if he goes to Colombo, Copy of which is entered after this Consultation, as are Copies of all the Letters which passed between the Deputy Governour and him, We did not chuse to hold a Consultation then, because we were willing to make People beleive he was only put off for a day or two by our orders, least it might have a very bad effect in disheartning the Garrison which has now had no English embarkation since the Princess Mary in May last, nor a line from either Presidency though it is now near three Months since Madrass being taken, must have been known at Bengal, most discouraging Circumstances indeed Especialy at this Juncture of time when parties are marching out of Pondicherry every day and most if not all their Garrison are now between Us and them.

Just after we had wrote you a General letter to send your Packet and Treasure ashore and had sent Boats for that purpose, Mr Hinde received a letter from you which he has communicated to us and is of a very extraordinary nature as it informs him of your design of leaving this Coast to which you are consigned by the Company and going either to Columbo or Batavia Places where you can be of no manner of service to them, and must run much more risk of Enemies in getting to, than possibly you could have done on this Coast, where there are no Enemies of equal force to your Ship that we know of and many King's Ships are expected hourly, and you yourself had experimentally found there was no danger, by having been five days on the Coast and at an anchor off Pondicherry as we have been advised of and think not a very prudent step, It is true Mr. Hinde said in his letter there were three Ships in Pondicherry and therefore advised you to come nearer in and would have given you other Cautions had they been necessary, you lay about 4 Leagues to Windward of the road where no Boats or Advice could get to you under several hours, which made that Caution necessary but by no means was it so to quit the Coast you were consigned to and carry away with [you] all the money men, ammunition and Stores, designed for the use and protection of the whole Coast and thereby of exposing the Garrison the only one now on the Coast and that in Emminent danger, to the utmost risque, as you Yourself must be sensible of as soon as you knew Madrass was taken, An affair of much greater Consequence than several such Ships as yours, which ought to have run much more risque in order to releive the Place, than You and Your Officers pretend to be apprehensive of though you well know to the Contrary having Yourselves seen the Ships in Pondicherry as above and that only one of them was half rigged, upon the whole we are now to acquaint you that Madrass is in the possession of the French and the President and Council residing there are Prisoners of War and as you was consigned to the President and Council of Fort St. George and their Authority devolves on Us as the head Settlement in a natural Channel, and not only so but by a Letter we have received from them, They have resigned it to Us and desired Us to issue out proper Orders in their stead all which you would have known had you waited two hours longer, or had you followed Mr Hinde's Orders whom as you knew Madrass was taken, you must likewise know was the only one of the Community you was consigned to and whose orders you ought consequently to have followed, as you have thought proper to do otherwise we now peremptorily order you at all hazards immediately to come to this Coast and anchor in a proper place in this road when you will receive our further orders; And for Your disregard to the Company's orders, their Interest, and the orders you have received here, We in the name and behalf of the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies do protest against You

- 3dly. To be sure to harrass them in the heat of the day as well as at midnight, to prevent themselves being surprized.

Our Black Military engage the Enemy.

At 6 in the Morning we hear all our people and the French are come to a General Engagement and that the Enemy gains Ground considerably though our People do not give out but keep a constant fire on them.

About 7 they are got to Manjecopang close by the Garden House and some of them in the Garden and the Nabob's Army does not appear in sight, at which time the Deputy Governour receives a note from Mr. John Hallyburton advising him that the Nabob insists upon a party of our Military being sent out and we give him assurance that we will by firing two guns from the Fort which affair being taken into our serious Consideration, Agreed that we send out Captain Gingins with 100 Picked Men to support our Black Military Soon after which we had the pleasure to see the French in great Confusion, which we imagine proceeded from their just fears of being surrounded as we proposed to do, especially if we could get the Moors to fall upon them who had 2500 Horse and we had near as many Peons, but we could not prevail on them so to do, however the Apprehensions of it made the Enemy retire in great disorder and leave every thing behind them all our people pursued them and had the Moors done so closely they must have been cut to pieces, but before any of them appeared they had rallied their Troops and formed themselves in regular order, but still kept retreating, and upon Capt. Gingins appearing they made all imaginable haste but still in order, Capt. Gingins upon riding very near them got a perfect view of them and sent us word there were 6 or 700 Europeans and 400 Regular Peons and we are informed there are in all about 1000 in three Bodies besides the large Bodies of Peons; That they seemed fatigued and to be sparing of their Ammunition, as their feild pieces were not fired near so often as at first; That if we would send him 300 Men more and 3 feild Pieces he would attack them, but did not think it prudent to do so with only 100 Men, on which we met in Council and agreed that we could not answer evacuating the Fort for any advantage soever, for we well knew that was what they wanted and it might be a Faint; We allowed there was a great moral possibility of destroying the Enemy but at a risque we could not answer to our Honble. Masters, especially as we were only on the defensive We therefore sent Orders to Capt. Gingins to make all prudent advantage of the Victory but always to secure a retreat, if we could then have prevailed on the Moors to have fallen upon them, they must have been destroyed, As they were exceedingly fatigued with their march the day before, A whole Night's Skirmish that day's Engagement and want of Provisions; We pursued them about four Miles beyond our Bound hedge and then retired, having taken all their Provision, Ammunition and Tents, 6 Camells 2 Mortars with their Shells 3 or 4 Drums 2 Chests of Spare Arms their Pallankeens and every thing else they brought with them but their Cannon which we suppose they have buried; The Nabob Mahomed Ally Cawn having some claim to his share in this defeat, though in reality his Forces were but of small Service but in the Enemy's Apprehensions yet as he may be more assisting in future, ORDERED that Captain Gingins and Mr. Hallyburton do now wait on him with a Compliment from the Deputy Governour on the occasion and agreed that a Present of Three thousand Rupees be sent him to morrow as well to encourage him to act in our favour as to defray the Charge of his 11 or 12 Horses killed in the Engagement.

The latter advance considerably; The Nabob desires a party of Military to be sent out which is agreed to and Capt. Gingins to command them the party to consist of 100 Men.

He desires 300 Men more may be sent him which is not thought prudent.

General Letter to the President and Council of Bombay of the 13 inst. read inclosing Duplicate of our last and acquainting them that it has plainly appeared our apprehensions were not ill founded for on the 8 Instant the Enemy's whole forces set out of Pondicherry and arrived within a mile of our Bound hedge that Evening, to whence we dispatched a Body of Black Military who attacked them immediately and harassed them all night, that nevertheless the Enemy at day break began a Regular Engagement and with the help of their Cannon forced their way to the Garden House where the Moors Army advancing upon them and we ordering a party of 100 Men to sally out they were afraid of being surrounded and began to retreat with great precipitation leaving all their Ammunition and Camp Equipage behind them, That notwithstanding this defeat they talk of visiting us again and as yet we have not a line from the Northward That the Ships of all other Nations have appeared on the Coast some days since and advising that the Houghton Captain Worth arrived here the 5th Instant and how he left us Carrying with him all the Money and Stores he might have supplied us with, That thus our Honble. Masters were served in Consequence of which this Settlement must be lost or saved purely by the hand of Providence for no human Assistance has it met with from Europeans, and that we were about taking some Moratta Horse into our pay if possible to keep the Settlement for the Company As it is of the utmost Consequence on the Coast.

Letter from Mr. Thomas Saunders Resident at Ingeram dated the 25th Ulto. read acquainting us that as he has received no Advices from the Presidency since it fell into the hands of the French, and as he has so large an Investment as near 800 Bales but very weakly guarded, he requests we will send him our orders how to act, That he has good Tonage for about 700 and enclosing a List of Cloth on hand and Merchants Ballances to Ulto. October and that about 400 Bales are ready Cured.

Letter from Mr. Saunders at Ingeram advising of the quantity of Bales he has on hand and desiring our directions concerning them.

An Answer to the above of the 18 Instant read telling him he did very well in advising us of the Situation of his affairs and that had we been apprized of the quantity of Bales he had, We should long since have given him directions about them as we did to Vizagapatam about theirs, That as it is if he should not have sent them away already, We directed him to procure the best Conveyances he possibly could to send them hither, that at present the French have no force on the Coast nor do we imagine they will have any equal to what we may expect, nevertheless for Caution sake we directed him to order the Vessels to keep a good offin, and as the Winds would be shifting before he could dispatch them to make the land to the Southward at least as far as Porto Novo where there should be a letter lodged with further directions and desiring he would give all manner of Encouragement to all Boats with Grain to come hither where they should meet with good protection and if he thought proper to make any Contract with any of them we would abide by it, That we had the good fortune to gain a Compleat Victory over the French the 9 Instant when they came against us Notwithstanding which they talk of coming again but that we were in hourly expectation of our Ships it being already very late and not a letter from Bengal come to hand as yet, though we had wrote in the most pressing terms for Stores and Ammunition above three months ago and that Ships of all other Nations but English have appeared on the Coast some days since.

Answer thereto.

Letter to the Chief and Council of Vizagapatam read of the 18th acquainting them that we are much surpriz'd we have not heard from them in answer to our severals of the 29 October and 21 Ulto. and inclosing duplicate of the latter to which we had only to add that we would have them give all possible encouragement to the Owners of Grain to bring it hither where there would not only be a good market but good Protection and advising them of the Victory we had gained over the French and that we were every moment in expectation of seeing the Ships from Bengal.

Letter to Vizagapatam desiring them to give all encouragement to Grain Vessels to come hither.

As also to Mr. Andrews at Ganjam, that he would send his Bales hither & as many Gunnies as he could procure.

Letter to Mr. John Andrews at Ganjam of the 18th read chiefly to direct him to send what Bales he had ready with as many Gunnies as he could possibly provide by the best Conveyances he could procure, also desiring him to give the Encouragement as above to all people that were employ'd in the Grain trade to come here.

Advice from the Dutch of the Britania's arrival at Galle.

Orders sent the Captain.

The Deputy Governour having received advice from the Dutch of the Britania's being arrived at Galle an Express was dispatched the 19 instant to Capt. Somner, with an account of the melancholly Situation of our Honble. Masters Affairs on this Coast ordering him immediately on receipt thereof to make the best of his way to this place and that if he had any secure method of sending his Packet and Letters so as to be with us sooner than he judged his Ship would, We permitted him to send them but that we left entirely to his discretion, that if he met with the Houghton Capt. Worth or any of the Ships consigned to this Coast, We directed him to shew them these orders and that they might extend as well to them as to him.

Copy of them sent to Tellicherry.

Advising them of Victory over our Enemies. and desiring they would advise of all material Occurrences.

General Letter to the Chief and Council of Tellicherry of the 22d Instant read inclosing a duplicate of our Orders to Capt. Somner on the Britania, In Case he should come on that Coast and advising of the arrival of the Houghton and of her going away again in the night, we firing Guns Shot and all to bring her back and carrying away all our Supplies, which together with the total neglect the Bengal Gentlemen have shewn us by neither writing us or Sending any Supplies, has reduced us to great necessity though we had the good fortune to gain a Compleat Victory over the French the 9th instant with very little loss on our side and requesting they would lose no opportunity to advise us of all material Occurrences particularly of the Enemy's Shipping and that if they thought necessary to place Tappey Peons on the road to do so half way and advise us of it and where we should place them the other half way; That we heard from Ingeram that our Masters Ships the Marlborough Montfort and Salisbury are arrived at Bengal and that Capt. Peyton's Squadron may be expected daily.

Letters from Vizagapatam in answer to ours concerning their Bales.

Two General Letters from the Chief and Council of Vizagapatam of the 28 Ulto. read, signifying the receipt of ours of the 29 Octr. and that the Contents of which should be strictly observed by them so far as the present Situation of affairs will admit That in regard to our Honble. Masters Cloth, should none of their Ships touch there, and his Majesty's Squadron call for Intelligence they will embrace the opportunity of sending us a considerable part thereof on a good Conveyance provided for that purpose but if by any accident these their designs should be frustrated, and they have sufficient reason to believe none of the Enemy's Ships are gone to the Bay in such Case they propose to follow the advice they have received from the President and Council of Bengal, which is to send them what Cloth they have on hand in order to be dispatched to our Honble. Masters this year, and accompanying a Packet to the President and Council of Fort St. George which they have received from thence, that they have dispatched a Vakeel with Mr. Hinde's letter to Nizam who they are since informed is set out from Golcondah on his way to Surat so that they apprehend it will be a long while before it reaches him if at all; That they shall let slip no Opportunity to advise him of every thing material that they can depend upon for truth, that as the News of the French having plundered St. Thomé and Committed many Outrages on the Moors reached them a few days since, They had likewise acquainted him therewith; That the French Chief at Yanam had quitted their Factory and embark'd on board a Sloop for Pondicherry, That the same was reported of those at Metchlepatam, which extraordinary proceeding they can assign no other reason for, than the apprehensions of resentment from the Moors for their ill usage of them to the Southward And that when any thing of moment occurs to them they shall not fail to advise Us;

The other advising us that they have just received intelligence from the Gentlemen at Pulliacat that Messrs. Morse and Monsoon were sent Prisoners to Pondicherry and that the Enemy threatned to lay Seige to Fort St. David in a few days which has occasioned them to resolve to let their Cloth remain where it is till they hear further.

General Letter from the President and Council of Bengal to the President and Council of Fort St. George of the 21 Octr. read advising that on the 28 and 30th of Septr. imported there our Honble. Masters Ships the Marlborough and Montfort and the Salisbury the 10 Octr. That each of these Ships brought a Packet for Madrass Presidency. That Mr. Humffries Cole arrived there the 8 inst. and brought them the Melancholly news of the loss of that Settlement which gave them the utmost Concern both on account of their Honble. Masters and themselves and that they wait with Impatience to hear the Circumstances of their Affairs when if they can by any means lend them any assistance they promise to do it with the utmost Alacrity That the Ships above mentioned have brought many Goods for Fort St. George which they shall land and dispose of, that by the Montfort they received 150 Pipes of Wine Consigned to their Honour &c. which they will reserve till they receive their directions thereon and inclosing Copies of the Manifests of private trade licenced Silver, Coral &c. for that Settlement; That the Gentlemen to whom they are Consigned may give orders about them and that in the present posture of Affairs they Cannot venture to appoint any of their Ships for this Coast.

Genl. Letter from Fort William to the President and Council of Fort St. George expressing their concern for the loss of that place and that they would assist them as much as in their power. Advising of the arrival of the Maribro' Montfort and Salisbury, inclosing Copies of their Manifests and that they should wait for orders concerning the Madeira Wine for this Coast.

Agreed that a General letter be now drawn out to the President and Council of Bengal to acknowledge the receipt of the foregoing with the inclosed Manifests and that we have already advised them of the Situation of Fort St. George and that in our opinion it was only to be regained to our Honble. Masters but by force of arms which we were now fully convinced of; That Messrs. Morse Monson Stratton and Savage were at Pondicherry, Mr. Eyre at Tranquebar, Mr. Harris here, and Mr. Fowke at Pulliacat, That we did Ourselves the honour to write to them the 11 and 28 Octr. and sent duplicates of them, and that Mr. Hinde wrote their President the 15: 17: 21: and 28 Septr. 10 and 29 Octr. and 4 inst. and that the Contents of all which were in the most pressing terms for an immediate Supply at all hazards of Provisions. Men, Money and Ammunition but that to our equal Concern and Surprize it was now later than the usual time of Ships arrival from their place, and we have not received a line much less any Succours from them which seeming neglect we could no more account for than we could for it's Consequences and therefore should not take the liberty to find fault with it till we knew where the blame lay. but that we should endeavour to bear up under such melancholly Circumstances as long and as well as we could, though having had no English Embarkation here but the Princess Mary (who brought nothing for this place) ever since this time twelve months our pressing Necessities must be many and great; That on the 5th instant our Honble. Masters Ship Houghton anchor'd in this road, but instead of relieving us on hearing Madrass was taken went off immediately contrary to positive orders to send his Packet ashore and wait for Boats, That these Occurrences altogether encouraged our Enemies to come against us the 8 instant with all their force from Pondicherry but that it pleased God the 9th we gained a great advantage over them and drove them back with a great loss of people that we now have the Nabob's two Sons encamped at our Bound

Masters Names that their Honour &c. will send us immediately at any Expence from 500 to 1000 Tons of Rice or more with all the Stores, Goods and Madeira Wine that was consigned to this Coast from Europe as well as Bullion, Men Ammunition and other Stores that they can spare and may think necessary to preserve this Settlement, that we have neither Iron Lead or Tarr or indeed any thing that is useful That on the 20th our Enemies made another attempt by Water when Providence alone defeated them, and that as there will be no method left untried to destroy us we earnestly look out for Succours, as we do desire that what is not already done may be effectually so before it is too late in the Monsoon; And that we are informed the Britania is arrived at Galle.
