GENTLEMEN

A Detachment of about 50 Men is intended to be embarked tomorrow morning on board a Sloop for Deve Cotah with orders to stand into your road on purpose to give passage to the Officers who were lately sent to you and are to proceed to Camp, this I am ordered by the President & Council to communicate to you and to desire that those Officers may be ordered to hold themselves in readiness to go off as soon as the Sloop appears in sight, and that you may not be mistaken in the Vessell the Commander will be ordered to fire a Gun & make a Whif in the Ensign as a Signal.

A Detachment of 54 Europeans is now embarking on board the Sloop Salangore Capt. Edwd. Bibb whose Orders are to stand into Fort St. David Road to take in several Officers and then proceed to you, this Sir I am ordered by the President & Council to acquaint you of and to desire that on his Arrival you will order the whole detachment to be landed and give them the best accommodation you can and immediately advise Major Lawrence of their Arrival at the same time forward the enclosed Letter to him and wait his Directions in regard to the Disposition of this party.

SIR

On receipt hereof you are required to repair on board your Vessell and receive on her a detachment of fifty four European Military on Account of the Honble Company whom you will accommodate in the best manner you can, after they are on board you are with all convenient Speed to proceed to Fort St. David Road and as soon as you arrive within such a distance as that a signal may be distinctly observed from the shore, fire a Gun and make a Whif in the Ensign and lye to in the Road where several officers are ordered to come on board you, as soon as this is done you are to loose no time, but proceed directly to DeveCotah where on your Arrival you will deliver the accompanying Letter to Mr. Charles Hopkins the Chief of that Settlement and follow all such orders as you shall receive from him for your further proceedings. GENTLEMEN

We have considered the report you sent Us some time ago of your Military Stores and can only recommend to you in general to let such of them be substantially repaired as will admit of it, and apply the materials of the others to such uses as may turn most to advantage.

We have two Letters from you of the 28 Decr. and one of the 4th. Instant which We shall now answer as far as they require it.

We accept of Mr. Bairds resignation of our Honble Masters Service and have no objections to his coming hither when he thinks proper in order to prepare for his passage to Europe.

On looking into the Accounts you sent Us of the Articles to be wrote off in your Books to profit & Loss there appears no less a profit on Bale Goods than Pags. 3844-8-78 of which Pag. 2135-24-24 is the produce of Salampores middling alone, we cannot conceive how this should arise and desire you will send Us an Account sale of these goods for our Information as expeditiously as possible that your Books may be closed, We shall then give you directions how to write off the several other Articles. Those is the Storekeepers and Military Storekeepers Accounts also require an explanation, it is certain they are liable to Rust breakage and Wastage but yet they cannot be totally lost, what remains of them may be returned to some use and in that case should not be wrote off, give Us such information in these particulars as may enable Us to judge.

If Mr. Perceval is desirous of continuing in the Military Service and will exert himself in it, We have no objection and he may do duty in your Garrison for some time.

The Case of Sheeva Gonga really deserves attention, if upon enquiry you find the Allegations in her petition true she should have a reasonable satisfaction and we can recommend no better way of procuring it for her than by stopping out of Gautakes Monthly allowance so much as you may think sufficient without distressing him.

The President has acquainted Us that he is informed some means have been used by the French Emissarvs to seduce Gautake with an intent as is supposed to set him up for King of Tanjore and by that means create civil Broils in the Kingdom, which might be of dangerous consequences, to prevent it, let him be confined in such manner however that it may be as little irksome to him as possible, We are also informed there are schemes forming to procure the escape or enlargement of Rangopunt, be watchfull and guard against it in the best manner you can.

GENTLEMEN,

By Letters lately rec'd from Mr. Westcott and Mr. Andrews We are informed that the French have obtained Cowles from Salabad Jing for the Rajahmundrum and Chicacull &ca. Countrys, We are more concern'd than surprized at this event when we consider what Influence they have at Aurungabad by means of their Troops the possession of these Countrys will put it in their power greatly to hurt the Company's Investment & We imagine they will lose no opportunity of doing it, Our Forces are but barely sufficient to make head against the Enemy here which puts it quite out of our power to send you any Assistance, you must therefore be passive & intermeddle as little as possible in the Country Affairs that neither party may have any pretence to distress you, but if any of the Companys possessions should be invaded or their Rights infringed defend and protect them to the last extremity and don't fail to protest formally against the French for every Hostile act. The Nabob and Rajah have both applied to Us for our Assistance it is not prudent to refuse them tho' we can gratify neither, and yet we would willingly appear a friend to both without making any direct promise, we shall therefore write them that in return for the friendship we have rec'd from them we should readily comply with their request but at present we are unwilling to make any detachments from our Forces in this Country, because We have sanguine hopes by pursuing our late Successes shortly to put an end to the trouble which will the better enable to

PRESIDENT AT INGERAM.

SIR

The Charles Schooner arrived here the 31st. of last month, and brought Us your Letter of the 24 and Duplicate of another dated 6 Decem^r. the Original whereof, with the Severall Accounts is also since received.

We plainly perceived from the beginning of the troubles that the views of the French were to get possession of the whole Coast for themselves and have used our utmost Endeavours to prevent so pernicious a design, but your last Letter convinces Us that their Forces with Salabat Jung may command any thing, as they have succeeded in getting Cowles for the Rajahmundrum Chicacull &c2. Countrys, We do not doubt but that they will use every means in their power to distress our Factorys & prejudice the Companys Investment. We have received Letters both from Jaffer Ally Cawn and Viziaram Rause desiring we will assist them with our Forces, it is not in our power to gratify either of them and all that can be done under the present unfavourable circumstances is to wear the face of friendship with them both and answer their Letters in ambiguous terms, tell them it is the Characteristick of the English Nation to bear a grateful remembrance of favours received and to make proper returns that our Arms have been attended with success in these parts and we are now on the point of giving the finishing Stroke to the Troubles in the Carnatick, that done, We shall convince the World that we are mindfull of our Friends and will protect them against the attempts of their Enemys. We are very sensible you are not nor can we put you in a condition to act offensively. your care therefore must be to defend as far as you are able the Companys Rights and possessions should they be invaded and protest formally against the French for every attempt of that sort.

Sir

Your last Letter of the December has confirmed what we have long had reason to fear would happen, the Situation of Salabat Jings Affairs are so precarious and the assistance of the French Troops so necessary to support them that their late acquisition is not to be wondered at, but tho' we foresaw the evil we had not the means to prevent it, nor is it now in our power to apply a remedy, the unfortunate quarrel between the Nabob and Rajah has given them an opportunity thus far to gain their point which they will doubtless improve by every means in their power to the prejudice of the Companys Investment and Factorys, it will be felt at all of them, but your Situation alarms us the more as your residence at Bandarmalanka is only on sufferance and you are in no condition to defend yourself if attacked nor can we spare any assistance from hence that could do you any material service, we shall endeavour to send you a few men by the return of the Vessell that brings us your Bales. In case of disturbance we would have you continue at Bandarmalanka as long as you may think it safe, and then retire to the Companys Factory at Madapollam, both Jaffir Ally Cawn and Viziaram Rause have applied to Us for Assistance, tho' tis impossible for Us to grant them any yet it may not be prudent to let them know it, on the contrary we shall acquaint them, and would have you do so when you correspond with them, that our great success in these parts incline Us to bend our whole force against the Enemy that we may the sooner put an end to the troubles in this Country, which we are in hopes of effecting very shortly and shall then shew our friends how sensible we are of the favours received from them by lending our assistance against their Enemys, Let your Letters be worded as evasively as possible, make no direct promises to any but endeavour to keep on good terms with all, and if the French should at any time directly or indirectly invade or infringe the Companys Rights and possessions don't fail to protest formally against them and advise Us immediately of your proceedings. This Sir is all we can recommend to you on the present occasion. and rely on your best endeavours for our Honble Masters Service.

Enclosed are Letters for the Nabob and Rajah with Translations for your perusal, also Duplicate of our last.

M^r. George Dolben takes passage to Ingeram on the Charles Schooner and from thence will proceed to you as an assistant in the room of M^r. Heath, he has been paid his salary to the 25 Septem^r. diet Money to the end of this month and also the usual allowance for travelling charges.

GENTLEMEN

We are to answer your Letters of the 8th. 14th. and 18th. Instant.

Mr. Hopkins at Deve Cotah writes Us the Companys Sloop Dragon is there ready to be dispatched by the first favourable wind to Us, should she arrive here within a few days We shall immediately send her to you with a Lack of Rupees and the Sundry Articles you have indented for, but if in the mean time any other good conveyance can be procured we shall make use of it.

We observe by the Account of Salampores middling you sent Us how the difference arises, it is so considerable that We were at a loss how to account for it, and tho' in the end it makes no real difference in point of profit to our Honble Masters, yet this method of Invoicing your goods at so much more than they actually cost, may make them appear dear at home if the reason should not be attended to we would have you in future value them upon sorting nearer to the price at which they are received from the Merchants.

We are not all satisfied with the reasons you give for the deficiency in the Stores Civil and Military, for as we mentioned to you before it seems improbable to Us that the Articles in your List can be annihilated, a List should be sent Us every year enclosing your Books of such stores as are become useless and an account of the real wastage & Rust &c^a. that the former may be sold and the latter annually wrote off acquaint Us under whose management these deficiencys happened that we may recover the amount, they must therefore be carried forward in your new Books but the other Accounts you sent us in your Letter of the 28 Decem^r. may be wrote off to Profit and Loss.

The deficiencys in the Salt Petre & Gunneys to Chesterfield and Bombay Castle were omitted to be recovered of the Commanders of those Ships but have since been paid for and we shall therefore credit your Settlement for the amount but this being a subsequent transaction will be an article in your new Books & has nothing to do with those of 1752 in which the difficiency must be wrote off to profit & Loss, As to the Tarpaulins you will observe by the enclosed Account for what purpose they were issued here, such of them as were actually used in the Companys Service must be wrote off to profit and Loss, and the value of the others unless they are produced must be received of the several persons to whose use they were delivered here.

The Stewards Account remains you sent Us up in Novem. 1752 is so different from that in our books that it would be to no purpose to send you the list you desire, the time will not now admit of adjusting this Account with accuracy let it therefore be carried forward to your Books 1753 as it now stands.

We do not see any reason for allowing diet money to the Bengal Officers besides Batta and therefore cannot consent to that Extraordinary expence.

We can take no cognizance of Capt. Holfords Petition as we have no authority to interfere in matters of property and We can only advise him to apply to Mr. Merrigoot an Attorney of the Mayors Court, who we are informed is attorney to Messrs. De Mare and Murphy and as such his direction may be a sanction to Captain Holford.

We shall send you some Matrosses for your Laboratory.

We have found some inconveniencys in bringing to Account the difference of Batta on Pagodas advanc'd for the disbursements in the several employs, to avoid which effectually in future let a sufficient sum in fanams be always advanced for the use of each employ, so that there may be no occasion for exchanging of pagodas, and let the Compy. be duely credited for all Batta.

We observe that you have no particular head in your Books for the Charges of washing the Compys. cloth but that you carry it directly to charges Merchandize this is irregular, in future let a head be erected in your books for the washers, Debt them regularly for the money advanced and credit them monthly for the cloth they bring in.

There has been some mistakes in the Acct. sortments of Vizagapatam Cloth enclosed a two Invoices, on the back of which the Gentlemen of Vizagapatam desire a perfect Account Sortments may be endorsed, when you have done so, we desire you will return them to us.

A Duplicate Account, to go home by the Durrington, must be sent Us of the Ordnance Shot Shells &ca. mounted and in Store at your settlement and Deve Cotah.

Our Honble Masters Ships Dragon arrived here the 21 Instant from Bengal and we shall shortly dispatch her to the West Coast, we are in daily expectations of the Durrington that her detention may be as short as possible take every good opportunity that offer of sending us your Bales and give no more cloth to the wash than you are sure can be cured in time as We have rather chuse to send it home brown than keep the ship or be put to difficultys to compleat her Tonnage.

The Information you have given Us in your Letter of the 12 Instant in relation to Mr. Flaction is satisfactory and we have ordered a Commission to be drawn out for him as Ensign, he has not lost any Rank, those who have had Commissions engaged themselves as Voluntiers before him.

In the manner you state to Us the objection your Bound Renters make to the quantity of paddy ground allowed the Polligar by his Cowle We are inclined to think it must be a mistake, We shall inform ourselves of the King of Tanjores people what was customary in former times, and give you our directions in consequence.

Our Orders for recalling the party from PallamCotah were positive, We make no doubt of the Polligars pressing Solicitations, it is his Interest but the detention of that detachment a few days can be of very little service to him in collecting the grain and we do not think it adviseable to spare them from your Garrison till the Harvest is got in, the most We can consent to is that the party remains there till the breach in the Fort is repaired, which ought to have been done immediately, and before you withdrew it, insist on being paid the full charges of the expedition, if the Polligar has a due sense of the service done him he will not hesitate.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

Our Honble Masters Ship Dragon arrived here the 21st. Instant and brought us your favour of the 27 Decem^r. which We beg leave to omit answering particularly at present.

We addressed your Honour &c. by pattamar the 24th. Ultimo and lately forwarded a Duplicate which will inform you of our Situation fully, and the little reason we had to expect a re-establishment of peace, we cannot vet flatter ourselves with more sanguine hopes tho' Mr. Dupleix has agreed to a Conference and the Commissary on his part and ours are just met at Sadrass to concert ways & means of restoring tranquility, but from what has passed by Letter between Mr. Dupleix and the President we see no probability of reaping the happy fruits we wish, on the contrary our whole dependance must be on our Military Force, the great consequence of having them commanded by an able chief is so obvious that it has induced Us to acquaint Collonel Scott We think it will be doing our Honble Masters an acceptable service if he could come to

our assistance, without a remarkable prejudice to their affairs under your Honour &c^a. management, our reason for taking this Step now is that the great fatigue Major Lawrence has undergone by being constantly in the field has so much impaired his health that we were not without apprehensions lately of loseing him and even now it is doubtfull whether he will be able to continue in the command much longer, this consider dwe don't doubt but your Honour &c^a. will readily agree to Coll. Scott's coming hither by the first good conveyance, if the plans he may have formed with you can any ways admit of it.

The Cuddalore Sloop arrived here two days ago from the Negrais and brought Us the News of Mr. Hunters death, the rest of the people were but sickly so that what Artificers your Honour &ca. may have sent to Egmore will be very acceptable.

We propose in a few days to dispatch the Dragon to the West Coast and by her shall forward the packet you enclosed as well as the box packet you sent Us for our Honble Masters by the Speedwell.

To CAROLINE FREDERICK SCOTT ESOR.

Sir

Notwithstanding the superiority of the Enemy in Numbers the successes that have attended our Arms since you left us have been so remarkable that they might give us flattering hopes of bringing to a happy conclusion the war that has so long raged in this Country were we not well convinced of the insatiable Ambition and spirit of those whom we oppose, a spirit which appears to Us so fixed and determined that we have no hopes of ever obtaining any reasonable terms by negociation and must therefore place our whole relyance on the force of Arms. Under such Circumstances you are perfectly sensible of how great moment it is that the Army should have an able Commander in Chief. We are sensible that our Honble Masters primary view was the fortyfying of Bengal, but they have acquainted us too that in case of any accident to Major Lawrence you were to have the command in Chief of all their Forces in India. The fatigue of a long Campaign have not without reason inclined Us to wish we could with prudence give Major Lawrence some respite especially as his health has suffered considerably from constant Duty, so much indeed that we are apprehensive it will not be in his power much longer to keep the field, and tho' we do not mean to reflect on the capacity of any of our Officers yet we must do Major Lawrence the justice to say we should be sensible of the loss if that were to happen. We should not think we did justice to our Honble Masters if we omitted to acquaint you of our apprehensions, at the same time we are persuaded you have their Interest so much at heart that it is needless for us to desire your presence here, you will we are assured hasten to our assistance if the plans you have formed at Bengal can admit of it without manifest prejudice. We have acquaint'd the Honble President & Council of this our Application to you, that you may jointly concert your measure accordingly, but

before we took this step we consulted with Major Lawrence that no difficultys might arise on your arrival with regard to the Command, a Copy of his answer comes inclosed for your perusal.

To George Pigot Esq^R. Chief &c^A. Council of Vizagapatam.

GENTLEMEN

We have three Letters from you to answer one of them dated the 26 and the others both of the 31st. Ultimo since ours of the 7th. which you acknowledge we wrote you by Pattamars the 11th. & 12th. Ultimo and 12 Instant, a duplicate of the last accompanys this.

We have sent to Fort St. David the copies of Invoices you enclosed to us for them, which with those for our Warehousekeeper when properly endorsed we shall return you, and have no manner of objection to pur[suing] this method in future.

If Collonel Scott should come hither without touching at your Settlement We shall consult with him about the proper method of carrying on your works and give you our directions in consequence.

You may acquaint the Rajah of our readiness to oblige him with the hundred (100) Barrells of Gun powder he desires tho' we cannot spare such a quan[tity] without some inconvenience as our own demands are large.

Our Hon'ble Masters are always indulgent to those who meet with unavoidable misfortunes in their service. Mr. Mauls case we really think entitles him to their Indulgence. We therefore approve of your allowing him Fifteen Pagodas a month which may be continued, and as soon as his health permits We would have him proceed hither.

We should have been better pleased if you had not detained the Porto Bello Sloop for our further advices, as her early arrival at the Negrais was of consequence chiefly on Account of the Military, if she should not have sailed before you receive this put on board her as much Rice, Doll, Ghee and other kinds of provisions as she can take in and dispatch her immediately to the Negrais with the detachm^t, the Cuddalore Sloop arrived here from thence two days ago and brought us the news of M^r. Hunters death, M^r. Henry Brooke now has the charge of that Settlement, forward the enclosed to him with the proper vouchers, and Advices of what you may lade on the Porto Belli. We purpose very shortly to dispatch the Cuddalore to the Negrais with orders to touch at your Settlement to take in a loading of such kind of provisions as the Porto Bello, and we give you this notice that you may prepare accordingly.

We approve of your paying the detachm^t. intended for the Negrais by the Porto Bello, let your Train be paid from the 1st. of this month agreable to the regulation enclosed, the stoppages do not regard the Company's Accounts your Military Paymaster must therefore set[tle] [it] with Capt. Maskelyne & Brohier.

By the Enclosed Duplicate of what we wrote you the 12th. Instant you will be fully informed of our sentiments on the present posture of affairs [in the] Northern Provinces we hope and have some reason to believe a reconciliation will take place between the Nabob and Rajah, the former has certainly shewn a great regard for the English and if We may judge from his letters, is determined to oppose the French as far he is able the Rajahs inclining to them at present seems to Us designed to answer his present purposes rather than from any attachment to their party, this time must discover, your policy at present must be to keep fair with both and We therefore much approve of your giving protection to the Nabobs family and you must shew the same favour to the Rajah if he should desire it, the Nabob writes Us that he had sent you a perwana for coining Dubbs, if you should not have reced it, this will be a favourable opportunity to obtain it.

When an opportunity offers, if we should be in a condition to spare you any Subaltern Officers, you may be assured We shall supply you.

You have not sent Us either your Account of Quick Stock or the Annual report of the encrease or the decrease of Revenues & Expences, this is a great neglect and will put Us to difficultys in drawing out our General Account of quick Stock, you should have sent Us also a Duplicate Acct. of Ordnance, Shott Shells &ca. mounted and in Garrison that you sent us before went home by the Delawar and We shall want another to go by the Durrington.

Under the Head of Repairs of Fortifications We observe you charge in the gross the number of Artificers employed during the month, this is too General, it should be explained where and on what particular work they were employed and so likewise of the Materials used.

We dispatched the Prince George Capt. Burman to you the 3^d. of Novem^r. last, and on her proceeded Mess^{rs}. John Walsh and John Pybus whom in consequence of directions from England We appointed Supravizors of all our Honble Masters possessions and Affairs on the Island of Sumatra by the same conveyance also we wrote you very fully, and now forward the several Duplicate papers to which We refer you in case the Prince George should have met with any accident.

In consequence of your Advice that you should have about two hundred Tons of Surplus Pepper We wrote to the Gentlemen at Bengal to send Us a Ship so far loaded for Europe as yet to leave room for your Surplus, and fill up that Tonnage with rice for your use, they have accordingly sent Us our Honble Masters Ship Dragon with twelve hundred Bags of Salt Petre and Six hundred Maund of Redwood Invoice and Bill of Loading whereof are inclosed in this Packet to be forwarded to England in yours, the Gentlemen at the Bay acquaint Us they have agreable to our request filled up the remainder of the Dragons, Tonnage with Rice consigned to you, Bill of Loading and Invoice whereof is enclosed in their packet.

We hope you will have every thing in readiness on the Dragons arrival to give her a quick dispatch that she may not be exposed to the danger of a late passage round the Cape.

The Cuddalore Sloop lately arrived here from Negrais, where, We are advised Mr. Hunter died the 24th. Decemr. this Vessell is so usefull in that Expedition that she cannot yet be spared for your Service, we expect by the Supravizors Advices to be informed what vessells are actually necessary on the West Coast and we shall then provide accordingly.

We acquainted you by the Prince George that by this Conveyance we should send you the Long Cloth you indented for, but the troubles on this Coast have so much affected our Investment that we shall be greatly streightned to make up the Tonnage of the Durrington which we are in daily expectations to arrive from Bengal to fill up here this prevents our complying fully with your demand, but as We imagine the only use to which you would apply these Goods is for the cloathing the Coffrees &ca. we have sent you Eight Bales of damaged Long Cloth and Salampores which will answer the purpose very well.

Thirty One of the Coffrey Women we intended to have sent you on the Prince George but were prevented by the appearance of the small pox amongst them, come to you on this Ship, a List of their Names is in the packet.

Invoice and Bill of Loading for what we consign you are enclosed in the Packet, as are also Capt. Kents manifest of his private Trade for your Settlement, and another for his homeward bound adventure, to this last you will add whatever he may ship with you on the same Account and forward it in your packet to our Honble Masters.

Capt. Kent is to be paid as usual for the diet of the Coffreys.

GENTLEMEN

We promised to supply you by the Dragon Sloop, as far as we are able with the sundry Articles you have indented for and accordingly now dispatch her to you; Invoice and Bill of Lading for what We consign are enclosed as is also an Invoice of the Arms sent with the party on the Lisle We cannot at present supply you with any Wax Cloth, the Gun powder and remainder of the Shott shall be sent on some future conveyance. On this Sloop we also consign you a Lack of Rupees which We hope will be sufficient to answer your demands for some time, and as you tell Us fanams are scarce, we likewise send you to the amount of two thousand Pagodas, and if these should not answer your purpose of which you will advise Us we shall give you a further supply, We decline it at present because the purchasing a large quantity at once might raise the price.

The large demands for your Settlement and the Army have so considerably sunk our Treasure that you must be as sparing as possible and make no further Advances to your Merchants without previously acquaints, us, we dont mean by this to check your Investment but it is necessary we should be informed from time to time of all exegencys that we may concert such measures as may prevent our being Streightned for Cash before the Arrival of the Europe Ships.

The Reasons you offer for the deficiencys in the Military Stores have their proper weight; on enquiry of several gentlemen here who were then at S^t. David we are informed that many Articles were by M^r. Bobins's Directions thrown aside as quite useless, this was extreamly irregular, but as it cannot now be remedied & We are in some measure satisfyed how the deficiencys arose We consent that they be wrote off to Profit and Loss as well as those in the Civil Stores, and in future, we insist that not an article be it ever so trifling be condemned as unserviceable without an order of your Board made in consequence of a regular Survey by the proper Officer and a report laid before you.

All the Companys Military are, We conceive to serve wherever they are commanded, a gratification is allowed to all Officers without distinction in the Field in consideration of their extraordinary Expences, but what title have the Gentlemen on the Bengal establishment to diet money in Garrison more than those on our own. We know of none therefore cannot take upon Us to put the Company to that additional Expence.

The two Rafts of Timber and Plank are certainly lost, and must be wrote off, We have some imperfect Accounts of the Cattamaran people quitting them at Sea.

Mr. Maunsell acts as Commissary in Camp, and you may accept and pay his Bills, but the head in your Books for Mr. Palk may still be kept open and the draughts from Camp carried to that Account.

We shall consider of the Trevendeporam bound rent, and give you our directions.

Gautakees Allowance may we think admit of a deduction of twenty Rupees \$\mathbb{H}\$ Month to satisfy so just a demand as Sheeva Gongas, and if it puts him to some present difficultys it is more just he should bear them than the poor Woman should lose what is actually her right, We would therefore have you continue to make that stoppage untill the Debt be satisfied.

Mr. Morse has represented to Us that before the loss of this settlement he advanced out of his own money to Mutal for Mulinga Kistnah & Ponnapah Companys Merchts. 1528-31-24 to purchase Beteelas on the Companys Account and that Goods to the Amount of 967-18-48 were delivered into the Warehouse

at Fort St. David but the Value has never been paid nor accounted for, We send you enclosed a copy of the Acc^t. that you may make the necessary enquirys and advise us.

Application has been made to Us by Serjeant Rose who had the command at Vedachelum for a Ballance of Rupees 510-6 fan. which alledges is due to him for the pay of the detachment he commanded there and for other disbursem^{ts}. as the charges of that Fort were defrayed by you We send you a copy of the Account which you will examine and acquaint Us whether any thing and what is really due thereon.

We have occasion to employ Mr. Greenslate here, and we desire you will order him to proceed hither by the first good conveyance.

As soon as you have unloaded the Dragon return her to Us with Bales, those you sent Us by the Marianne are safely arrived & landed as well as the Box by the same conveyance containing the late Mr. Byer's papers.

The Accountant informs us that the Vizagapatam paymasters Books for 1748 and several others are at Fort S^t. David, your Books and papers must be revised and all such as belong to the Presidency sent us.

Capt. Saunders had our leave a considerable time ago to return to Bengal of which we advised the Gentlemen there, and they expect him accordingly of which we desire you will give him notice that he may prepare for his passage.

The Harlup Snow arrived here yesterday and we are preparing to land the 67 Bales of cloth you consigned us on her, a very poor Asssistance towards our dispatch compared with the quantity that used to be furnished from your Settlement.

Besides our Letter of the 24th. December which you acknowledge We wrote you again the 12th. & 24th. Ultimo and now enclose a Duplicate of the last, by which you will perceive We disapproved of your detaining the Porto Bello Sloop for our fresh Advices, how great then must have been our surprize a few days ago on the receipt of a Letter from Mr. Westcott acquainting Us as you have done in yours of the 21st. Ultimo that you had sent that vessell to Ingeram with the detachment intended by Us for the Negrais, but which you have taken upon you to destine for an Expedition to Rajahmundrum, had you given yourselves time to reflect you must have been sensible that nothing but absolute necessity could have induced Us to spare a Man from hence for the Negrais considering our own pressing occasions for them; a discretional power must doubtless be lodged in you to act upon emergent Occasions without waiting for particular Orders from hence, but in the present case you have stretched beyond the proper limits of such an authority in absolutely changing a disposition. We had made, therefore on receipt of this you must immediately recall the party, and dispatch the Porto Bello with it according to our first intention. We have been very explicit in our former Letters and repeat to you here that we are not in a condition to carry on the War in this Country and act offensively to the Northward your whole aim therefore must be to defend the Companys Rights and endeavour to cultivate a Friendship both with the Nabob and Rajah at least act so as to offend neither.

A few Occasional Presents well timed are often of service We hope that you gave to Narrain Dieu may prove so.

As you say the Godown and Choultry at Walteer are very commodious and well worth the price they are offered at We think they had better be purchased than hired, and you have our consent to do so.

You Judge right in entertaining a few Gun Peons against the arrival of the Nabobs family, a little Parade is necessary on such Occasions.

Your Indents shall be complied with as far as we are able.

You were irregular in sending Us up Six of your Military Prisoners by that Ship without the proceedings of the Court Martial or Court of Enquiry We are willing to impute it to the difficultys you are under for want of Officers, you shall be supplied as soon as we are able.

The Warehousekeepers here and at Fort S^t. David acquaint Us that it is impossible to endorse the Invoices you sent Us some time ago with the Account Sortments in the manner you desire the cloth having been mixed, We have given proper Orders to prevent the like in future for what is past your Attorneys will be able to furnish you with an Account of the Goods turned Out.

The Durrington is now under dispatch and will we hope be ready to sail in a fortnight.

Notwithstanding We have repeatedly wrote you that it is impossible for us to oppose the Enemy here and act offensively to the Northward yet by a late Step you have taken you do not seem passively inclined, the Gentlemen at Vizagapatam did very wrong in sending you the detachment in the Porto Bello Sloop which we had destined for the Negrais, and your Scheme of sending that party up the country is far from meeting with our Approbation you must be sensible the situation of our affairs here is so precarious that were we not indispensably obliged we should not spare a man how then could you think of detaining a party we had allotted for the protection of a new established Settlement? We don't doubt but that the Nabob has been very pressing for assistance & we should be glad to grant it, but what end will it answer to make a shew of acting Hostily [sic] when it is as much as We can do to maintain our ground on the defensive? it certainly will only expose Us to dangers which otherwise might not have approached Us, but whatever may be the Event the party intended for the Negrais can by no means be spared and therefore immediately on receipt of this you must recall it and dispatch away the Sloop, make the best excuse you can to the Nabob and if possible keep on good terms with him and the Rajah.

The Three & Nine pounder Guns you desire cannot be spared, but the Small Arms shall be sent.

The last time we had the pleasure to address your Excellency &ca. Council was by our Honble Companys Ship Prince George in answer to a Letter we were favoured with from you of the 2d. June which gave us all the assurances we could wish for of your inclination to shew us such marks of friendship as one nation in perfect Amity & Alliance with another might Expect, the Letter we had the Honr. of writing you in answer will evince how agreable such terms are to us & how ready we are to reciprocate all good Officers, but it is with concern we are now to inform your Excellency &ca. Council we do not find the like good disposition in all your Settlements in India tho' we are willing to flatter ourselves that when they are perfectly informed of your Sentiments they will act on the same plan, the cause of our present Complaint is that a ship of ours bound thro' the Streights of Mallacca having unluckily sprung a Leak was obliged to put in at your port of Malacca to refit which could not be done without landing the whole Cargoe your Excellency &ca. Council must confess that to allow it, is nothing more than common hospitality & what we can hardly think would be refused in any port of the world under the like Circumstances, and yet it may be said now & proved that the Agents of the Dutch (We will not say the Dutch Nation because we cannot conceive it to be their sense) have exacted one per Cent upon the whole Cargo landed at one of their ports from an English Ship in distress & without such a gratification, absolutely refused the Supra Cargo's the liberty of bringing the Goods ashore. The Names of the Supra Cargo's who had this remarkable treatment at Malacca are Mess. Samuel Greenhaugh & William Pye, & the ship is called the Travencore, we hope on receipt of your Excellencys &ca. Council answer to this Letter we shall have cause to blot out this Event from our Annals as well as from our remembrance. & to repeat our assurances that we are perfectly

The Cuddalore Sloop has been employed here much longer than was intended, We now dispatch her to you & hope you will have every thing in readiness that her detention may be but short, our sailing Instructions to Captain Hammond are to proceed to Vizagapatam & on his arrival to follow your directions, as soon therefore as you have put on board the several stores

agreable to our Letter of the 24th. January give the Captain Orders to make the best of his way to the Negrais where for his future proceedings he is to be under the direction of M^r. Henry Brooke whom we have appointed Chief of that Settlement.

We have in Several Letters explained our Sentiments so fully with respect to the Situation of your affairs that we have nothing material to observe further on that Subject, by the Translates of Letters from the Nabob & Rajah which came inclosed in yours of the 14th. Febry. We are pleased to find the Rajah has recommended the Nabobs family to your protection, as he cannot now take umbrage or hereafter reproach you for shewing them favour when he himself has requested it.

The Situation of Affairs here will at present by no means admit of our taking a part in those of the Nabob & Rajah of your Government, you will therefore on all occasions avoid it, the necessity of the Rajahs Schemes obliges him to grasp at such measures as are most likely to support them, he is powerfull at present & by his influence may greatly benefit or prejudice your Affairs, therefore avoid disputes with him & by all means keep fair with him.

Our Honble Masters Ship Durrington was dispatch'd for England the 9th. Instant with a full Loading.

Since writing the former part of this Letter We have reced. yours of the 28th. Febry. inclosing a Letter from the Rajah demands, of you the Kisty Money which we would have you pay as a refusal may irritate him & it certainly is in his power at present to do us infinitely great prejudice.

The President has communicated to Us several Letters to him from Ibrahim Ally Cawn complaining of the difficultys he labours under for want of money & desiring our Assistance, tell him the President will shortly send him the produce of the Cargo he has consigned to him & that we shall always be glad to serve him but weive [sic] if possible the subject of lending him money, We cannot answer it to the Company.

GENTLEMEN

We have rec'd your Annual Address being as you term it (a Summary of the transactions of your Settlement) dated the 6th. of March, by the purport of it, it does not appear a work of so much difficulty but that it might have been transmitted us in January as usual.

An honest diligent endeavour is all that is required by our Honble Masters in the several branches of their Affairs improbabilitys are not expected, this being strictly observed there will be no occasion to waste 3 or 4 sides of paper with specious pretences to varnish over your conduct, & thus in regard to your Investment, for the better part of the year you were so surrounded by the Enemy that it was even difficult to get provision, & your Deputy Governour wrote, the Merchants would not bring the Cloth to Deve Cotah, Supposing your Cash Chest had been full of what effect would it have been. We therefore judged the Season more proper to retrench the Ballances than make advances & gave you directions accordingly & to these orders more than your Indifatagable [sic] Industry the reduction of them was owing, after the Seat of War was removed these cautions also subsided & then our advise to you was to sprinkle small sums amongst your Merchants, there was no Occasion for introducing a new one, this

man with ready money only bought up what would of course have fallen into the hands of your old Merchants, the cloth was the same sortment & from the same market & it is a general remark in trade than the more Competitors the more likely to enhance the prices or debase the Fabrick besides every additional Merchant has constantly a sum of the Compys money lying dead in his hands therefore observe it as a General Rule never but upon necessity to make new ones, the Communication with Salem is cut off whether your Merchants have had Cloth lying there so long is much a doubt, We should rather conclude they would have disposed of it to those of other Settlements.

You will be carefull at the end of the year to let as few debts remain outstanding as possible.

It is with concern We observe the unsettled situation of the Country which occasions an extraordinary Expence in all the Settlements this head requires your particular attention, for your Government lay before you a sett of former Books, come as near to them as you can & avoid every charge but what is absolutely necessary.

Though the Fortifications & repairs are under the direction of the Engineer yet let it be your care to supply him with as many workmen & Cooleys as can be procured see the materials purchas'd are good & not over rated, that there be no Embezzlement & that the Artificers & Cooleys are regularly & justly paid no repairrs be made without previously acquainting us & transmitting an Estimate of what it may amount to.

If Our Honble Masters this Season send Us any Covenanted Servants, Weshall supply you.

You will keep strictly to the regulations of Military & Seapoys Stipulated for your Settlement.

The Excuse you make in regard to your Books & Accounts is so lame & absurd that instead of exculpating it only makes you appear the more remiss, you ommitted to send us your General Address till the 6th. March which should have been transmitted in January & at the same time we received your Books which should have been here in Nov. by which means we have been unable to make to our Honble Masters the proper remarks on the transactions of your Settlement, it is a constant Rule that our Books be closed in Nov. & your should be sent before that time, the Deve Cotah Books cannot be Ballanced, because you have from time to time neglected to send them Accounts of the several stores &c. supplyed them with. These are neglects unpar[don]able & such as our Honble Masters will not fail to remark, tis disagreable to Us to be obliged thus constantly to remind you of your Duty & We hope you will give us no further Occasion for it.

GENTLEMEN

There are several particulars in some of your Letters which we purposely deferred answering that we might consider them more at leisure, we have done so, & shall now give you our Directions.

In our Letter of the 23^d. January in answer to yours of the 14th. We gave you our reasons for not sending you the particulars of the Stewards Account furniture at S^t. David as the Articles stand charged in our Books, we have considered how this Account may best be adjusted & we see no other method than by taking a List of all the Furniture now in being valuing each article as near as possible to its real present worth & writing of the difference you will therefore order such a List to be made & valued & send it to Us with the old List in which much be remarked what Articles are now deficient & by what means; this done you will wait our further directions.

We have weighed what the Trevendeporum Renter urges to obtain an abatement of Rent, as stated in your Letter of the 31 January, & on recourse to our Advices we do find that the Morattas for several Months in the beginning of the year did infest that Country, & doubtless considerable damages have been sustained, but for the last six months the War has been entirely in & about the Tritchenopoly & Tanjore Country's & the Companys Bounds have been unmolested; We cannot therefore from the Accounts we have had conceive that a country let for Eight thousand Pagodas & Annum can have suffered so considerable as that the Revenue should be reduced to 1,550 Pagodas which is what you estimate the last years collection at Representations of this kind were made to Us by the Renters of Poonemallee & St. Thomé but on strict enquiry we found their Losses greatly exagerated & we agreed to abate them what we judged they might actually have suffered offering at the same time to allow them the whole damage they would solemnly swear to in their Pagoda which they never thought fit to comply with you must pursue the same method.

You say in your Letter of the 16th. February that Mr. Hopkins has desired you to apply to Us for leave to write Off 166 shells which were lost by the Stranding of a Boat. You may acquaint him he has our permission to do so, as Accidents of this sort cannot always be guarded against.

With the same Letter you sent Us an Estimate of the Charge of new paving the Bridge to the Westward of the Fort, We would by all means have it done with stone, which tho' more costly at first than Brick will in the end turn out much cheaper, as experience has already shewn in that same bridge which was paved with Brick but a few years ago.

In your letter of the 21st. February you desire a supply of Copper Cash which you say is scarce in your Buzar, we suffer the same inconvenience here, & it will ever be the case whilst the intrinsick value of copper is greater than what the Coin passes for. If the Europe ships should bring Us a proper sort & quantity of Copper we propose to consider of some effectual remedy to this evil.

In regard to Capt. Schaub's application to you which you mention in your Letter of the 27th. February acquaint him that he may demand of Mr. Dupleix in our name (if it be necessary & he has not already done so) the Effects of his Officer Mr. Prevost, as his dying in the Romish persuasion cannot give Mr. Dupleix any right to them.

We have lately sent a quantity of Arms to Deve Cotah so that the five hundred Stand you desire in your Letter of the 8th. March is not so necessary nor indeed can we well spare them.

You sent up in October some Horse Saddles &ca. but omitted to mention the value of each Article for want of which they cannot be brought to Account properly.

By the Companys Sloop Dragon you sent Us up only Fifty Bales tho' you must have had more in readiness for but two days afterwards you consigned us on the Sloop Mary a Country Vessell Eighty, our reason for remarking this is that we have before observed the Companys Vessells are crouded with private Merchandize this we apprehend was the case with the Dragon or we know not how to account for the small number of Company's Bales sent on her, it is certain she stowed Ninety from the Northward & we imagine is equally capable of taking in as many from S^t. David for the future no private Merchandize must on any Account be suffered to go on board the Companys Vessells when there is a full loading of Companys Goods or untill all that is intended to be sent on the Companys Account is on board & then upon Freight.

If Mr. Hopkins at Deve Cotah should write you for any fanams, the supplies we have lately sent you will we imagine enable you to comply with what he may want, if not let us know & we shall provide accordingly.

The Forty Barrells of fine Gun powder you desire in your Letter of the 25 March shall be sent you by the first Conveyance.

By Letters just rec'd from Bengal we are advised that Coll. Scott intended in a few days to proceed to this Coast in one of the Companys Sloops to relieve Major Lawrence in the Command of the Army in case he should touch at S^t. David which is not improbable the Enclosed Letter is to be delivered to him, it contains our request that without Coming hither which would occasion a great loss of time he will take the first opportunity of proceeding to Camp on his arrival you will accommodate him in a proper manner and shew him all due honours.

Your Several Letters of the 24th. & 27th. Febry. 7th., 15th., 17th., & 28th. March are reced. with the Bale of Musters by the Cuddalore and the Piles by the Prawn and Shrimp.

We take notice of the large quantity of Bales the Merchants promise, first we must remark that our Intention is to carry on an Investment at Deve Cotah so far as it does not interfere with S^t. David & that the Prices will Ballance the Extraordinary Charges We must be at. We apprehend the Sially Cloth is the only proper manufacture of your Country & to contract for the other Sortments would only be making a new Sett of Merchants who would be Competitors with those of S^t. David & in the end be of no Service, We therefore think you should endeavour to improve this Branch only & when our Ships from Europe arrive we will for that purpose supply you with Cash, One Merchant will be sufficient & the prices must be $1\frac{1}{2}$ Pagoda P Corge less than the prices at S^t. David.

On perusing your Accounts we observe all Expences on Account of the several detachments sent to Deve Cotah in their way to Camp, Stores &c*. Charges on Account of Expeditions are carried to the heads of Charges General & Charges Extraordinary which is very wrong for the future observe it as a rule that the settled Garrison of Deve Cotah is to be one Company of Military & one Company of Seapoys & no more, whatever Troops may at any time be with you whether to remain there or to be sent on Detachment are to be deemed in the service of Nabob Annaverdy Cawn, & their pay, Batta & Charges are to be carried to this Account as are also all Stores & Charges whatsoever supplied or occasioned by our attachment to his Cause & for what is past you must revise your Accounts & write of all Articles of that sort to the Nabob's Debit.

We have lately sent the Gentlemen at S^t. David a plentiful supply of fanams to avoid the necessity of changing Pagodas in the several Employs & We have directed them to furnish you with what you may want for discharging all small Articles that do not amount to an exact Pagoda this will avoid the necessity there would otherwise be of erecting a head of Batta in your Books in order to Credit the Company for the difference on Exchange.

Mahauphooz Cawn has at length acquainted us that he is ready to march to his Brothers Assistance in case we would send a party of Europeans with him, which to prevent further delays & for the greater security we consented to & have ordered a detachment of our Military under the command of Ensign

Paccard to accompany him as far as Deve 'Cotah on their arrival the said detachment must be returned to Us by Sea, the Dragon Sloop sailed from hence the 26th. Ulto with the Revd. Mr. Palk on board for your place, if on the receipt of this you should not have dispatched that Vessell back to Us, detain her to bring the said detachment hither & you may fill her up with Piles, but no more are to be sent Us on freight without our further directions. You must be mindfull when you return the party to give the Commands. Officer a Certificate, at the foot of a Muster Roll of the Men, that they are Military in the Honble Companys Service passing from their Garrison of Deve Cotah to their Settlement of Fort St. George & order the Commander when he approahes Pondicherry to keep as far out to Sea as he may think safe.

We have heard that a large party of Morattas Horse are in Motion from Seringham Northwards, be as secret as possible with respect to Mahauphooz Cawn's March & send him what Intelligence you can of the Motions of the Morattas.

Your Letter of the 2^d. Instant advising of your having sent Us five hundred Piles by a Country Boat is just received.

The several Letters your Honour &c^a. Council have favoured us with & which we are now to reply to are dated 27th. Decem^r. 17 January 1st. 8th. and 9th. March the last day by our Honble Masters Sloop Syren which arrived here yesterday with Colonel Scott.

The late detention of the Colchester at the Negrais made it impracticable for her to reach you in time to be dispatched this season for Europe, & the ship being in want of very material repairs the Commander proceeded hither for our further directions; We have sent him to Batavia to refit & return to us by the

middle of September to be dispatched to England before the breaking up of the Monsoon, but lest any Accident should prevent his Arrival in home, that we may not in that case be deprived of a September Ship we propose to detain one of the Ships of this season untill the Colchesters return, or to be dispatched in her stead.

We shall say no more in relation to your Ships importing at the southern ports on this Coast than that we are well pleased your Honour &ca. have wrote to our Honble Masters on the subject, we represented it to you because we found it amongst their orders & it therefore was our duty to do so, if upon your Statement of the case they shall see cause to reverse their former directions we shall be well satisfied.

The Officers your Honour &c. sent us by the Dragon have been ranked in your detachment agreable to your desire.

It would give us great pleasure if we could by any means contribute to the disposal of your woolen Goods agreable to your Letter of the 17th. Jañry. it will be needless to offer any Arguments to Shew the improbability of our getting off any part here when we inform your Honour &ca. that till the 10th. Instant we had not been able to dispose of a piece of last years Importation, not above half was sold then & that at a very trifle advance, every Bale of it remains Still in our Godowns & may probably continue there uncleared for many months to come, under these Circumstances were we to detain here any part of what may be consigned to you this season it would certainly have the effect on our sales, which your Honour &ca. very justly apprehend with respect to yours, as it will answer therefore no good end we beg leave to decline it.

As the Coast & Bay ships are chiefly loaded with consignments for your Presidency it would be attended with great Inconvenience were we to order one of them to relieve the Egmont without proceeding first to Bengal, we therefore leave it your Honour &ca. to send such ship to the Negrais for that purpose as you may think proper.

The Packing Stuff &c². P Durrington turned out agreeable to Invoice.

Agreable to your desire we shall send you this season no more Redwood than the Company's Ships can take in.

We come now to your last Letter where you acquaint Us you propose to dispatch a Ship to England in Septem. if we can furnish Bales for 200 Ton, we have already informed your Honour &c. that we intend to load the Colchester for Europe which will take up full as many Bales as we can answer for, but even should we have a surplus they will absolutely be necessary for our Jañry dispatch when we hope to be able to supply half the Tonnage of one Ship, we should have no objection to complying with your Honours proposal by filling up a ship in September & loading one entirely in Janry. but that we think our present scheme will be as advantageous to the Company, & should they send out a small ship this season which is probable, the True Briton being in turn, besides the Anson which went home last season your Honour &c. will have an opportunity of compleating that Tonnage entirely, we are therefore to request your Honour &c. will send us a Ship half loaded in Janry, if between this & then we should see any prospect of being able to do more we shall give you due advice.

We must very candidly confess our inability to employ any of the Companys Ships on freight this season, the Markets in every part of India are so overstocked & Trade is so dead that it would be attended with a certain loss, our Experience has already convinced Us of it & the reports we have of the unsuccessfull voyages of a number of ships from your port are such corroborating proofs that we should rather chuse to dispose of our own ships could we meet with purchasers for valuable Considerations, than employ them where the prospects are so unpleasing.

The President & Council of Bombay have remitted us seventy five thousand Arcot Rupees by Bills on the Shroffs here, which they desire us to forward to you by a safe conveyance, we shall comply with their request by the Companys Sloop Syren which we shall very shortly dispatch to Deve Cotah with Colonel Scott, her detention on this Account we are in hopes will be but short and we shall then immediately return her to you.

Application was made to Us some time ago by Lieut. Cudmore for leave to return to Bengal the reason he offered was that he had been informed Lieut. Godwin had lost his rank on your establishment by his long absence on this Coast, which made him apprehend he might suffer in the same manner, we satisfied his doubts by acquainting him we should address your Honour &ca. in his behalf & all the other Bengal Officers that their services here may be no Bar to their advancement with you.

Lieut. Godwin lately requested of us to be put upon this establishment, as his behaviour has been much to the satisfaction of his superiours, we have complied with his request & granted him a commission of first Lieut. of one of our Companys of Artillery.

Captain Robert Sanders on returns [sic] to you on the ship Eagle by which this waits on you in the packet is a List of Several persons whom we send to you on the same Vessel, considering the situation of our affairs here with respect to the French We do not think it adviseable to keep the deserters in our Garrison.

The two accompanying Letters we are desired to forward to you, one we reced. from Bombay the other from the Negrais.

We compleated the Durringtons Tonnage & dispatch'd her to England the 9th. Ultimo.

We are advised from Tellicherry that the Salisbury Prince Edward & Tavistock sailed respectively from thence the 10 Janry. 28 Febry. & 3^d. March the Prince Edward for Batavia & the other two for Anjengo & England, that the Winchelsea arrived their the 6th. Febry. & the Montfort and Stafford the 11th. March & were to proceed to Bombay in two or three days.

We are much concerned at the occasion of this address which is to inform you that we have this Instant rec'd Advices from our Chief & Council at Vizagapatam that a large party of Morattas were laying waste that Country with fire & Sword, and amongst other places which had felt the Effects of their fury both the Town & your Factory at Bimblipetam had been reduced to ashes, their attack on it was so sudden & unexpected; that the Gentⁿ. your Agents had but just time to make their escape in the cloaths they slept in this happened the 1st. Instant, as soon as the news reach'd our Chief & Council at Vizagapatam they immediately sent out a party of Peons with Palankeens to give what

assistance they could to your distressed Gentlemen & luckily met them between Bimblipatam & Walteer about two of the cloth [sic] in the morning. Your Chief of Bimblipatam being desirous of seeing whether anything can be recover'd out of the Ruins of that Factory our Gentlemen were getting ready a small sloop to carry him there by Sea. This News tho' disagreable is what we think ourselves in friendship bound to communicate to you immediately that you may take such measure as you shall think best. We have the Honour to be very perfectly.

We have your Letters of the 25th. 27th. and 29th. April to answer.

We have been disappointed in our views of supplying you with Cash by the Syren Sloop which is under Col. Scott's direction & he could not spare, as soon as we were certain of this we remitted you fifty thousand Rupees by Bill & shall send you further Sums very shortly, but we must repeat that our Treasure grows very low & you must husband it as much as possible, the Ballances due to Irshippa Chitty & Linga Chitty ought certainly to be paid as soon as Convenient and you have our permission to do so.

Enclosed you will receive the form of the oath to be administred to the Trevendeporum Renters which if they will take you must allow them whatever damages they will so swear to.

As soon we receive a supply of Copper from Europe we propose to coin a proper quantity of Copper Cash & shall then be mindfull of your wants, in the mean time you must bear with the present scarcity as well as we.

We are informed that Fanams are as plenty at S^t. David as here & that Pagodas may be exchanges to as great advantage if so there is no necessity for our supplying you with so large a quantity monthly as you write for, before we fix'd on the present method of making advances in fanams the Gentlemen in the several employs found means to supply themselves & we imagine it may be as easy to Exchange Pagodas out of the Cash Chest in which case Batta must be credited, for the difference; however if we should be mistaken in this, as soon as you set us right, we shall send you what may be necessary.

As you inform us your Ferry Boat is quite decayed, we consent to your building a new one agreable to the estimate you sent Us.

Write us whether you are in want of any & what Europe Stores, that you may have our directions for supplying yourselves out of any of the expected ships that may chance to touch at your Port.

There is an absolute necessity for Officers at Vizagapatam therefore acquaint Capt. Gardner we insist on his coming up hither by the very first Opportunity.

As it is extreamly proper we should have somebody constantly at the Court of Tanjore whilst Affairs remain in the present precarious situation therefore that no time may be lost in case Mr. Palk should be obliged to leave that place, we have appointed Mr. Andrew Newton to succeed him, of which we desire you will give him notice that he may be in readyness to proceed without delay whenever we may require it.

Ensign Scottney whom we lately ordered to Deve Cotah is to proceed to Camp his place at Deve Cotah is to be supplied by Lieut. Perceval, whom you will send there accordingly.

We have appointed M^r. Rich^d. Fairfield (who will shortly come to your assistance) to supply the place in your Council of M^r. Peter S^t. Paul deceased, he is also to succeed him in all his employs.

The Party to be sworn is to attend before Sunrise & to bathe himself in the Pagoda Tank, he is to stand in sight of the Idol in his wet cloths & to have a Chaplet of Flowers put round his neck by a Bramin who is to administer Mint & Water to him at the same time, & read his deposition, he is then to proceed into the Temple & to prostrate himself before the Idol upon the Ground, in that posture his Deposition is to read to him a second time with a Denunciation out of the Vidam which is to this effect, May the Curse that does attend the Murder of a cow Bramin or Child at Cantia on the Sacred Banks of the Ganges attend me & may all the Ills that can attend mankind fall on my children if what I swear is false, & thereupon he is to rise from his prostration & in rising to extinguish the Lamp burning before the Idol with his hand.

N.B.—The Oath that is administered to him in the Sanscarret Language is to be interpreted to him in his own, send for the Mint & Water from Trevendeporum Pagoda.

We have rece'd your two Letters of the 18th. & 27th. April.

You say you have sent us Musters of 12 & 9 Call Chially Long cloth, we find in the Bale of Musters of Longcloth Chellimbrum of 12 Call. at Pags. 63–18 pr. Corge & Long cloth Salem of 9 Call at pags. 46–18 pr. Corge, but none of Chially, tho' even if they were the price of the latter will not answer as it is provided at St. David for pags. 47–18 pr. Corge & this difference will not defray the additional expence of servants &c2. that must attend the making an Investment at your settlement, as to the 12 Call Cloth we cannot say what the price is for none has been provided at St. David however you may write to the Gentlemen there to inform you what was formerly given and their answer you will communicate to Us.

Our Accountant informs us you have a head on your Books of "Expedition to Tritchenopoly" let this be wrote of to the head we have before directed you to open of "Nabob Mahomed Ally Cawn" & after you have wrote off to this Account all that should be discharged by it from Charges General & Charges Extraordinary send us up the whole account compleat from the 18th. March 1752 for since that time we have had no General Account, you must observe also to send us monthly an Account of whatever relates to the Nabob.

We approve of your employing the Dragon Sloop to carry Piles to S^t. David.

We are of Opinion that the Number of Military & Seapoys we limitted for your Garrison is sufficient for its defence, it is possible a further number may upon particular Occasions be necessary, but then you must advise us very Circumstantially and wait our directions without which not a Seapoy is to be raised.

On perusing your Accounts we observe considerable sums every month expended for Fortifications & repairs, we do not recollect to have given directions for setting about any works, & you must observe in future that none are to be undertaken without an Estimate first made of the charges & transmitted to us for our Approbation.

In your Accounts for March we find a Charge of no less than one hundred & three pieces of Dungaree used in that month & valued at 64 Pags. we cannot conceive in what uses such a quantity can have been expended, however we suspend our Judgement untill you inform us particularly, and acquaint us at the same time what sort of Dungaree it what [sic].

Ensign Scottney whom we lately appointed to replace Lieut. Frazer in your Garrison is also to proceed to Camp with Capt. Pigou and Lieut. Perceval from S^t. David has orders to supply his place.

Council we have directed Mr. Brooke to draw on you for the amount (but we cannot say exactly how much that is) in favour of Messrs. Maningham & Frankland & we shall credit your Presidency for the same.

March 2d. & 15 April & with great concern observe the devastations which those merciless Enemy's the Morattas are committing in the Northern province, as little distinction is made by them between Friends and Foes & one General Calamity involves the whole, we entirely approve of your conduct & would by all means have you continue to act on the same principle, at the same time we must caution you against receivs. into the Town a greater number of people than you can provide for; it is certain that the laws of hospitality & Humanity may sometimes justifye the straining a point, but it must always be remembered that the first law of nature is self preservation, very fortunately just at the time that we reced. your last Letter three Vessells imported here from Bengal with rice which we purchased immediately & shall send down to you by every conveyance we can procure, the quantity is pretty near what you write for.

On the receipt of your Letter advising us of the burning of Bimblepatam, we directly wrote to the Gentlemen at Negapatam to acquaint them of that unhappy Event & of your friendly Offices to their Agents, we have reced. their thanks with a request that all further assistance in your power may be given them which we desire you will do, tho' we cannot say any friendship We have ever met with from the Dutch in India can entitle them to it so much the greater therefore will be their Reproach & our Praise.

We are very sensible how necessary it is you should be supplied with Officers, we are ourselves destressed, but we sometime ago ordered Captain Gardner at St. David to come up hither immediately that he might proceed to you by the first Conveyance, a sudden illness prevented him but we have Repeated our Orders & as soon as he is able to travel we shall admit of no delay; Ensign Simon Hart now upon an Expedition is also ordered in & is to proceed to you with Captain Gardner.

As there is a Mayors Court established here which has Jurisdiction over all the Company's Settlements on the Coast We cannot intermeddle in Capt. Cromptons Affairs, his Effects must therefore be sealed up & remain so untill some person be properly empowered by the Mayors Court to take charge of them.

Instant when Colonel Scott was on the point of embarking on board the Syren on his return to you, but tis with much concern we are now to acquaint you that he was prevented by the violent attack of a Fever, of which he died the 12th. Instant, the Syren Sloop then fell under our management, but we detained here a few days in hopes of the arrival of a Ship from Europe in which we have not been disappointed; the St. George Capt. Robert Robinson from England, last from Madeira with Wine for this Coast & the Bay imported here yesterday, by her we have received such a supply of Treasure as enables us to forward to your Honour &c. the 75,000 A.Rs. remitted Us from Bombay for your Use the Invoice & Bill of Lading whereof are enclosed. The only Advices we have relating to your Settlement are contained in the following Paragraph of our Honour Masters Commands dated 28th. Nov. 1753.

Parag: 12. "Having made a larger Investment of Woolen Goods for Ben"gal than the Ships designed for that Presidency can carry,-we intend to laid
"the Surplus Bales being 300 on the Ship True Briton & as there will be
"room in the St. George upon the delivery of the Wine before mentioned to stow
"all or the greater part of the said Bales, you are therefore to send them on
"board that Ship & Consign them to the President & Council at Fort William,
"& you are hereby directed to detain the St. George until the Arrival of the
"Ship True Briton with the said Bales accordingly.

The Orders to detain the S^t. George untill the True Britons arrival being express we shall obey them. Capt. Robinsons informs Us that ten days before he left Madeira a Vessell arrived there, which sailed from the Downs in Company with the several Ships bound to this Coast & China so that we are in hourly expectation of their Arrival. Enclosed is a List of Ships taken up for all parts of India, also one of those arrived in England.

Of the Several Articles in your Indents you may land the Lead, Red and White Lead, Iron, Steel, & Sea Coals, Six & three Pounder Shot Bayonet Pieces, Carbines, Pistols, Flints & Drums also the 40 Barrels fine Gunpowder you wrote for the 25 March, most of the other Articles are contained in package which it would be inconvenient to land and open, and occasion loss of time, they had therefore better be sent from hence, and you may depend on being supplied as soon as we are able, the Captains have always a Copy of their Bill of Lading which you may require them to produce.

Several of the Officers at Camp having been wounded in a late Action has obliged Us to order Capt^{ns}. Pigou D'Illens and Innis to proceed there immediately and Captain Pascal to supply the place of Capt. Innis at Deve Cotah of which we desire you will give him notice, as Lieutenant Perceval is at present incapable of proceeding there we have ordered Ensign Scottney to remain in that Garrison.

We shall supply you with Fanams as you desire, but as this in a short time must make them very plenty with you, we rely on your advising us that we may not be put to the unnecessary Inconvenience of sending them from hence.

GENTLEMEN

In our Letter of the 23^d, we acquainted you that there were some particulars to be observed with regard to the pay of the Bombay Military, accordingly you will find Lists enclosed of what is to be paid to them respectively here and what Stopped at Bombay monthly of which you will give the proper notice to the Commissary at Camp.

Your two Letters of the 16th, and 22d. May are now to be answered. The Chevaux de Frise you sent Us on the Malacca Sloop are received.

We are not surprized at the objection of the Trevendeporum Renters to the oath we prescribed, these artfull People never fail to set up some ceremony or custom as a plea for doing or omitting what may serve or hurt their purpose, that the Oath we require is not contrary to their religion is very certain because We have it from their own people and we well know it has been taken by many, indeed it is the most and solemn and binding of any Oath amongst the Gentues and what few will dare venture to take falsely and that is the very reason we insist on it, we admit what they say that it is the condition of their Cowle to be protected from the Enemy and we are ready to allow them what they have suffered as soon as they have given Us sufficient and satisfactory proof, None can be so but the Oath we require therefore to prevent any further petitions pretences and dealys acquaint them it is our peremptory Order that they either pay the whole Rent or Swear to their damages which we will in that case and no other allow.

The reasons assigned for the extraordinary Amount of the Indent for your Hospital Cloathing are Satisfactory and the Indent may be complied with, this Branch always belonged to the paymaster and the Cloathing must now be supplied by him.

The President has reced. a Letter from Capt Ziegler desiring that his Company may have the same Indulgence in every respect as the former detachment were allowed, which if refused he apprehends will occasion desertion, requesting also an advance of pay for his Officers, and that he may be supplied with Cloth for cloathing his Company. As we have refused Diet money to the Bengal detachment we cannot without partiality which we shall on all occasions avoid, grant it to the Bombay Military, but as Capt. Zieglers Company is intended immediately for Camp and their Stay in Garrison can be but a few

days the officers may be allowed the usual Batta and the Men dieted as if they were actually in the field. Captain Ziegler gves as a reason for his request of an advance to his Officers, that their sudden departure from Bombay prevented their providing tnemselves with necessary's for a Campaign, there is a good deal of probability in this and we therefore consent to your advancing them what you may think reasonable, Capt. Zeigler may also be supplied with the necessary Cloth for cloathing his Company on paying for the same.

We shall dispatch the St. George Capt. Robert Robinson in two or three days at furthest with a reinforcement to Deve Cotah and we shall order the Commander to stand into your Road, that in case the Bombay Military should not be then gone to Deve Cotah agreable to our former directions he may give them a passage but that no time may be unnecessarily lost by his anchoring in case the detachment should be already gone observe to make these signals of which we shall apprize him if you would have him Anchor, make a Whif in the Flag & fire three Guns, if you would have him proceed without anchoring Strike your Colours and fire one Gun, and that you may know the Ship coming into your Road we shall order the Captain as soon as he is near enough in to heave his Ship too, fire one Gun and wait your Signals it is possible the St. George may have a long passage therefore don't let the Bombay detachment wait for her arrival but proceed as soon as possible, in case there should be no occasion for the St. George to anchor in your road going to, we shall order the Captain to touch there in returning from Deve Cotah to land sundry Stores and Treasure we shall consign you.

In case any of the Europe Ships should touch at S^t. David, as soon as you have landed the recruits, take the first Opportunity of sending as far as One hundred of them to Deve Cotah where they may be disciplined and held in readiness for what Service may be required.

SIR

By your Letter of the 21st. we observe Capt. Pigou's party had marched in consequence of an Order from the Major, in our Letter to you of the 19th. April we directed that all the Seapoys with you exceeding three hundred should be sent with that party to reinforce the Army: tho' you say not one word whether you have complied with it or not we must conclude you have by your desiring leave to raise more you should always observe to be particular and exact in your Advices without which it is impossible for us to form a proper Judgement. If you can get good Seapoys you may raise three Compleat Companys and let them be well disciplined be very strict in this particular without which they often do more harm than service, these are not intended absolutely for your Garrison but may be employed wherever their service shall appear most usefull.

If you had paid a due regard to our directions you would have observed by our Letter of the 8th. Instant that no works were to be undertaken without an estimate first made of the Charge and transmitted to Us for our approbation, yet in less than a fortnight you ask our leave to set about repairing the passes without giving us the least Idea of the Cost, we expect more punctuality in future, for the present as you represent the repair of those passes absolutely necessary you may begin upon the most material and send Us an estimate immediately, You must observe also in future to explain very particularly in your Accounts the nature of the work done, mention the number of Cooleys or Workmen employed, the materials used, and every article distinct and separate.

In two or three days at furthest, we shall dispatch the S^t. George to you with about Seventy Military which we hope will be sufficient for your defence, the S^t. George is also to call at Fort S^t. David to transport the Bombay detachment to you if it should not be already gone, and we have besides directed the Gentlemen at Fort S^t. David in case they should land any Military out of the Europe Ships that may chance to touch there to send you immediately as far as one hundred whom you will take care to have properly disciplined, and if we see occasion we may send you more that they may be at hand to reinforce the Army or act otherwise as their service may be required.

The Killedar of Palam Cotah has made fresh applications to Us for assistance we find by our Letter of the 4 Febry. we gave you a discretional Power to assist him as far as was consistant with the safety of your Garrison on his paying or giving Security for the Charges, if you should find yourself strong enough on the arrival of the reinforcement we intend you to protect that place & defend your Bounds we would have you do so, we must at the same time caution you against being too adventurous, learn well the Strength of the Enemy and don't depend too much on the Men we shall send you, they are most of them new Recruits.

By the S^t. George we shall send you what Arms we can spare, for the Seapoys you are to raise.

The King of Tanjore has complained that certain Braminys who at his Instance & request have long had the enjoyment of Maniams of free Grounds in the districts of Deve Cotah have lately been confined by you upon the Information of one Nagaboshen that the said Braminys were not the persons recommended by the King. Your manner of acting in this affair is not at all satisfactory to Us, nor have we any reason to be better pleased with your Conduct in regard to the Water Courses, whenever any disputes or doubts arise relating to matters of right priviledge or property, we ought to be consulted, and henceforward you will observe that points of this sort are never to be decided without our direction; in the present case it was extreamly ill judged to do any thing that could possibly give the King of Tanjore the least cause of disgust at a time when his Friendship is of such Consequence to Us and that We are using all the means in our power to obtain it, your Informant Nagaboshen has highly incensed the King [it] gives him a character not much to his advantage, we are told you have him in confinement as well as the Braminys, relase the latter immediately and keep the former in Custody untill you have our further directions.

would have you proceed they are to strike the Colours and fire one Gun; if the signal for anchoring should be made you are to obey it, and deliver the accompanying packet for the Deputy Governor & Council of Fort St. David as directed and follow all such Orders as you shall receive from them for your further proceedings, but if the signal should be made for your proceeding, you are then to make the best of your way to Deve Cotah where on your arrival you are to deliver the accompanying Letter to Mr. Charles Hopkins Chief there, and follow his directions for landing the Military on board your Ship & Stores consigned to him which being done you are then to proceed to Fort St. David deliver the Letter for the Gentlemen there as above directed and follow their Orders for your future proceedings, We have permitted them to land such part of the Lead on board your Ship as they may have occasion for and also thirty Pipes of the Madeira Wine consigned to the President and Council of Bengal, which you will comply with and this shall be your sufficient Warrant Dated in Fort St. George the 31st. May 1754.

GENTLEMEN

We dispatched the S^t. George from hence the 31st. Ultimo. agreable to what we wrote you with a detachment for Deve Cotah and a Lack of Rupees, 72000 fanams, & sundry Stores for you in the Evening we received advice that the Boat in which were Cap^t. Ziegler and some others had been drove to Sadrass, we thereupon immediately dispatched orders to Capt. Robinson which fortunately reached him to touch at Sadrass to take them in.

What you say in your Letter of the 31st. in relation to Capt. Mainwarings deficiency convinces us that his plea in regard to the Redwood is reasonable and that it would be a great hardship on him to pay for what he did not actually receive, the seeming deficiency must however be accounted for by some means or other & the readyest way is to write it on your Books as you have discharged yourselves of all the quantity that appeared deficient here, more than you should have done for you received the wood at the real Weight the Deficiency is Candy. Md. d.

39. 10. 23 for which we shall debit you. The Salt Petre we shall settle with Captain Mainwaring.

We are convinced our Honble Masters view in sending an Annual Ship to Madeira is not so much the profit that may arise to them from it as that their Servants may be supplied with wine at a reasonable rate, but this their indulgent intention has of late been frustrated by persons who have been employed to bid at the Outcry for the Dutch other & foreigners whereby the price has been immoderately raised, we have for these reasons Agreed that the Companys Servants Civil & Military shall be supplied this year at the rate of fifty two Pagodas a Pipe which turns out above twenty five P Cent upon prime Cost, the thirty Pipes we have permitted you to land from the St. George may therefore be issued at that rate not exceeding one Pipe to those under the degree of a Junior Merchant and not exceeding two to those above, it would certainly be an unnecessary injunction to the Gentlemen not to desire more of that priviledge than they really want for their own use for none could be so mean as to abuse such an Indulgence by taking it for Sale.

We don't doubt but you have taken an Account of the remains of the Provisions shipp'd at Bombay for the Military on board the Fort St. David as well

as of the Utensils which we are informed were landed with the Men, these should be put under the care of the Storekeeper and an Account of them sent Us.

M^r. Hopkins writes Us that the Gun Carriages there are so much decayed that new ones are absolutely necessary some other repairs are also wanted, let M^r. Call take the first Opportunity of going there to Survey and report what is absolutely wanted that We may give our Directions in Consequence.

Major Lawrence has wrote pressingly to Us for a good Interpreter, our enquirys have hitherto been ineffectual & we apprehend it will be a difficult matter to find such an one here, possibly you may have better Success 'tis a matter of Consequence and we desire you will use your best endeavours to find out a Man of Integrity.

In September last you sent us up some Horse furniture by the Delawar, at the same time as our Military Storekeeper informs Us, four Basket Hilt Swords were reced. but not Invoiced, so that they cannot be brought to Account for want of knowing their value, enquire into this and advise Us.

Our Honble Masters Ship Stafford arrived here yesterday from Bombay & Tellicherry with two Officers 50 Europs. One hundred Topasses & Sixty Seapoys; We shall in a few days dispatch that Ship with the reinforcement to Deve Cotah, Capt. Green informs us he passed thro' your road the 2^d. Inst. about 6 o'clock in the Evening so near as to be plainly seen but no signals were made to bring him in which had it been done would have saved a great deal of time and Inconvenience.

The Reverend M^r. Palk has desired our leader to return from Tanjore on Account of his health, but we hope he will be able to continue there sometime longer, however we would have M^r. Andrew Newton proceed there immediately that he may have the benefit of M^r. Palks advice before he leaves that Court which will be a great help to him afterwards.

We shall write to Deve Cotah to order the Dragon Sloop to cruise in the-Offing for the Coast & Bay Ships & in case of meeting with any to order the Commanders to land the recruits and Arms at Deve Cotah but in case they should miss the Sloop and touch at S^t. David they are to be landed with you and both forwarded to Deve Cotah.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

The Ships Fort St. David, Northumberland, Fanny, Stafford and Protector are all safely arrived here & we have landed from them the several detachments you sent to our assistance, which with those we are still to expect by the Montford far exceed what we could have hopes to receive from you, so much the greater are our thanks for your readiness to support Us and we hope this mark of your zeal for our Honble Masters Interest will not be unnoticed by them, we beg leave to assure you it shall not want a proper remark from Us.

The several Letters we have reced. from you since our last are dated 2 March 10, & 25 April, 3, 12 & 20 May.

In that of the second of March you take notice that one Mahadnock Sonack a Seapoy who was sent to our assistance but returned to you denies having reced. any part of his pay here, 'tis certain he reced. none at this Place we shall enquire whether any was paid him at Camp.

The Gentlemen at Tellicherry have sent Us on the Stafford One hundred Topasses & Sixty Seapoys, we have given directions for incorporating the former in Capt. Forbes's Company agreable to what you write us. should we receive any from Anjengo which we doubt as the Season is advanced, they shall be disposed of in like manner.

We observe and shall pay a due regard to what your Honour's say of Capt. Armstrong's Commission to command the Seapoys which is not to prevent his rising in the Military.

We shall on all Occasions be very ready to serve those Gentlemen who made a voluntary Offer of coming to our assistance, but your Honour &ca. must be sensible it will be impossible to prefer them to Vacancys on our Establishment without disgusting the whole Corps, at the same time we must acknowledge that those Gentlemen are to expose their Lives on terms less advantageous than ours, but we foresaw this objection and mentioned it when we requested a supply of officers, in every other respect we shall pay a due regard to their merit and your recommendation.

Your Honour &ca. have not sent Us any Account of the Arms your several detachments were furnished with nor have you mentioned whether you propose to debt us for their value or for the amount of the Provisions Utensils and pay supplied & advanced them, we request your Honour &ca. will give us the necessary Information on that head; The Gentlemen at Tellicherry say they have debted Us for what supplied their detachment & we shall credit them accordingly.

The Bills for A.Rs^s. 50100 which your Honour &c^a. remitted Us by the Stafford are all accepted, the Amount when reced. shall be forwarded by the first safe Conveyance to Bengal as well as the Treasure you consigned us for the same purpose on the Protector, but the Bill of Exchange remitted by that Ship has been presented & Acceptance refused under pretence that there is an Error in the name of him on whom it is drawn the person meant is known here by the name of Gocaul Terwady whose Fathers name was Gocauldoss Pursotum he therefore refuses to accept or pay the Bill; this is nothing but a meer evasion for several of the Bills you before remitted us were drawn on him by the name of Pursotum & were paid without objection, We therefore return you a Protest of the Bill for non Acceptance and the Bill itself when due shall be returned protested for non payment that your Honour &c^a. may recover the Amount with Interest and damages.

The Protector shall be detained here no longer than Necessity requires.

Our Honble Masters Ships St. George for Madeira Coast & Bay; Essex, Triton, Onslow, Ilchester & True Briton for this Presidency & China are safely arriv'd by one of them We received the accompanying Packet from our Honble Masters with directions to forward it speedily, two other Packets which we judge are Duplicate & Triplicate shall also be sent you by subsequent Conveyances.

Enclosed is a List of Ships taken up for the present year for all parts of India.

The Stafford sailed from hence the 11th. Instant on her Voyage for Canton.

In our Letter of the 11th. Septem. last we requested your Honour &ca. would favour us with an Account of the Cost of 71 Slaves, Vizt. 53 Men. 13 Women 4 Boys & a Child which were delivered at Madagascar by the Agents on the Swallow to those of the Dragon, for want of which we cannot bring them properly to Account, & shall therefore be obliged to you for an Invoice by the first Conveyance.

SIR

We wrote to you the 6th. Instant to acquaint you of our having altered our Intentions with respect to the detachment by the S^t. George, we shall now reply to your Letters of the 24th. 27th. & 30th. Ulto.

It is possible you may have been misinformed in regard to the Cloth called Chellimbrum, but that we may at a greater certainty send us up fresh Musters of real Chially Cloth of the several sorts made there with the lowest prices, by the time these are ready you may be informed from Fort St. David of the cost of the same sortments there which you will advise Us of at the same time that we may be able to determine one way or other without further delay, we cannot think your reasoning upon the Cost & Charges of an Investment with you just, you say that supposing the charges at St. David & your settlement upon cloth to be equal the difference in prime cost will hold on, we can by no means admit this, for it is very certain that the whole annual charge of servants &ca. at St. David will not be diminished one tittle by your making an Investment, nor will the Compys Investment upon the whole be encreased thereby as the cloth that may be provided by you would otherwise be delivered at Fort St. David, so that unless the difference in the price will more than answer all the Charges you may be at on Account of the Investment it will be rather a loss than a benefit to the Company nor will those Charges be so very trifling as you seem to think, a Virando in the first place is very improper to Lodge piece Goods in, the building Godowns or even fitting up this Virando properly cannot be done for a trifle & the Annual Expence of Conicopolys Packers &ca. for we never yet found that Lascars were proper for this business) will sink deep in the difference between your and the St. David prices of Cloth.

Mr. Dawson is very positive that all the Original Papers were left regularly at Deve Cotah except some General Letters which he has delivered Us & shall be sent you by a proper Conveyance, what monthly papers be brought up hither he tells us were only Copys from those Originals we therefore insist on your setting about & compleating the accounts in the manner we before directed as soon as possible.

Captain Zieglers Company will be a sufficient protection to your Settlement for some time for we don't imagine the Major will immediately order it up to the Army but in case he should if there should be an absolute necessity and not otherwise you may detain so many of them as may be sufficient for your defence and for keeping the Communication open with the Army, but we hope you will not be under a necessity to detain any of them for we have ordered the Gentlemen at St. David to send you as far as One hundred of the Recruits expected from Europe in case any of the Ships should touch there, those with the seapoys we have permitted you to raise will answer your purpose, if you are streightned for want of Train men, we are so too, and cannot possibly spare any from hence, there are no more we believe at St. David than they have occasion for, you must therefore make the best Shift you can.

It is impossible to give you particular directions how to act in every Circumstance that may happen you therefore be left to your discretion and we hope you will use it, we can give you no other than this General Instruction, to be rather diffident of your strength than too bold as it is better to miss some little advantages that might be gained than to suffer a defeat.

Allowing what you say to be true that when you took charge of the Settlement of Deve Cotah it was in a state of decay, we ought to have been consulted before you entered on any Repairs, we have already given you directions on this head, and now enforce them, as the Repairs of the defences at the passes will not amount to more than 60 Pagodas let them be done out of hand, what may be wanted to your Buildings, Gun Carriages &ca. must be deferred as we have ordered Mr. Call to take the first Opportunity of surveying them and upon his report we shall give proper directions, we have no Train Carpenters or Coopers to share at present therefore you must be supplied from St. David.

The best that can be said of your employing the Dungaree to make Sand Bags for Merlons is that it was very injudicious and what was never heard of before, Gunneys would be much more durable and less expensive, your manner of bringing this Article to Account is also improper, the head of Gunners Stores would have been much better than Charges General, it is very disagreable to Us to be thus occasionally reprehending and pointing out Errors & Neglects which a proper attention and Attachment to the Company's Affairs & Interest would prevent, we hope your future care will give us no further Occasion of Complaint.'

As Captain Innis's Illness will not permit him to take the field Capt. Pascal must proceed to Camp for we are well inform'd that he is in perfect health.

You did right in sending the Dragon Sloop to cruize for the missing Boats which we are glad to hear are all safe.

If the Companys Grain can be secured from the Weather by any means till Mr. Call can survey your Buildings & report we should chuse to have the repair of the Godowns deferred till then, but if not, let them be tiled, here again you have neglected to send Us an estimate of the Charge.

You may order the Dragon Sloop to cruize in the Offing for the Coast and Bay Ships (for all those for China are arrived here) and in case of meeting with

any to acquaint the Commander to land their Military & Arms with you in case the Sloop should miss them, the Gentlemen at St. David have the like directions if any of them should touch there.

We observe that the Account between the Pallem Cotah Phousdar & you is not yet settled nor the Expence discharged you will therefore do it immediately crediting him for what has been paid you and Ensign Frasier and debiting him for the Expences, in adjusting Mr. Fraziers Account you will take care nothing be overcharged & in this be governed by the Company's established Rules, if any thing appears unreasonable it must be deducted and Mr. Frazier directly repay it, when you have finished it demand the Ballance from the Phousdar.

We are informed that Mr. Conradt belonging to Capt. Zieglers Company has some knowledge of the Engineers business particularly the drawing of plans &ca. if so he may be very usefull to Mr. Brohier in carrying on the works and we would have him take the first Opportunity of coming hither.

The Izzarees Superfine is also much worse of late years this requires your attention also, Of Izzarees fine none has been provided, as the price is in proportion to the superfine we expect you do not fail in sending the full quantity and as much Long Cloth middling as you can, by the Account of Cloth on hand in your Letter of the 6th Ulto. you have greatly exceeded the limitted proportion of fine Goods which we can by no means allow of heavy are the Complaints in regard to Cloth torn darned, & patched inspect narrowly into your Cloth received from the washers, and if any be found thus damaged make them pay for it. We expect a very strict observance of what we now write you, that we may not have the uneasiness annually to receive from our Honble Masters Remarks on the Investment full of Censure.

Their Orders are that if the Goods manufactured in your district cannot be provided better in quality and cheaper to send none, as we know that the Izzarees Superfine & fine & the Long Cloth fine are more particularly the Fabrick of the Bandarmalanka Country, & that the Long Cloth Ordinary made near you is of a harder twisted thread & Superiour to what comes from Munda Petta, sensible that the Schemes of the French & the troublesome Situation of the Country have been great impediments we are willing to try whether these Goods cannot be brought to their former goodness & therefore we would have you rather endeavour to improve the manufacture near you than push at the Munda Petta Goods. We should certainly be pleased

with a large and goods Investment yet at prest. it must be your more particular care and attention to bring the Goods to their former Standard though the quantity may be much less. The Izzarees Superfine have of late years been much inferiour to the Muster, We shall be glad you would remove the disagreable Task of always finding fault, there has been a backwardness in the Merchants to bring the Izzarrees fine, but why, the prices are proportionable therefore we expect you will not fail sending Us the full quantity mention'd in the List of Investment & not exceed the Limitation prescribed that $\frac{1}{4}$ part of the Amount of your Investment be in fine Goods.

We know the difficulty in prevailing on the Weavers to bring their Cloths to the proper lengths & breadths after they have been so long suffered to deviate from them but as it is of the utmost consequence to the Sales at home therefore we must insist on your applying yourself to the remedying this defect, you will inspect more narrowly into the Cloth air'd 'tis said to be full of darns & holes if you find by carelessness 'tis thus damaged turn it on their hands we can upon no Account admit of its being mixed with the other Cloth. We have now pointed out the several defects, & as you must be very sensible of the very mild manner in which our Hon'ple Masters remark them, you will put a just sense on it and not give them any reason to complain in future.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

We had the pleasure to address you by Pattamr the 14th Ulto. and on the 18th. arrived our Hon'ble Masters Ship Montfort Capt. Vincent with your favour of the 24th. May & the Company of Seapoys you therein advise us of, which were all landed, and Capt. Vincent after having Supplied himself with refreshments sailed from hence for the Bay the 27th.

The reinforcement you have sent to our assistance is the more acceptable as the number of recruits we have rec'd by the China Ships from Europe falls very short of what we might reasonably have expected & indeed of what was intended, owing, as our Hon'ble Masters acquaint Us to a disappointment. The greatest part of your detachment under the command of Capt. Forbes, with what further Strength we could muster are on their march to join the Army under the Command of Major Lawrence near Tanjour where we hope shortly to hear of their arrival.

We should have returned the Protector to you much sooner, but a very pressing demand for Treasure & material Stores at Fort St. David induced Us to order her on that service as we had at that time no other proper Conveyance, Capt. James gives us hopes he may yet arrive in very good time to be employed on his proper Station.

We enclose your Honour &ca. an Extract of two Paragraphs from our Honble Masters Commands, & in regard to that relating to broad Cloth, we must observe that we see not the least probability of being able to dispose of near the quantity consigned Us; for full half of what we received last year lies still in our Warehouse unsold altho several times offered at Outcry agreable to the Company's Directions, the market at Bengal promises no better than ours, the Gentlemen there having found their last years importation lye on hand applied to Us to disburthen them of half the quantity that might be intended for them this Season which for the reasons abovementioned we could not comply with, but should be glad if any part of what we have on hand could be disposed of on your side on which we shall wait your Advices.

As we enclose you what our Honble Masters say in relation to Coja Shaumieer Sultans request, we have only to beg your Honour &ca. will favour Us with all the Information you can on the subject that we may be enabled to state that case clearly to our Superiours.

The Bill for 25000 Ars. drawn on Gocauldoss Pursotum which we advised your Honour &ca. in our last, he refused to accept, has since been paid, and the amount thereof with what you remitted Us by the Stafford making together seventy five thousand One hundred (75100) Ars. has already been forwarded to the Bay, as will also the Treasure you consigned us by the Protector for the same purpose, our reason for detaining it here thus long is, that an Opportunity offered of making a Gain of half \$\mathbb{H}\$ Cent to the Company by selling those Rupees here for two \$\mathbb{H}\$ Cent advance (being the premium or Exchange they bear at the Bay more than Arcot Rupees) on Condition that the purchaser should recoin them in the Companys Mint here at his own Expence on which a Custom of half \$\mathbb{H}\$ Cent is rec'd, this has been done and we shall forward to the Gentlemen at Bengal 255000 Arcot Rupees on that Account.

All the Ships from Europe bound to this Port and China arrived and have & been dispatched in due time to their Consigned Port, the Denham & York for Coast & Bay arrived here the beginning of this month & will shortly proceed on their Voyages.

The Gentlemen at Anjengo have sent Us a Packet to be forwarded to your Honour &ca. & it accordingly comes by this Conveyance as well as one rec'd from Europe, another which we judge to be a Duplicate of it remains here and shall be sent by the next opportunity.

Captain James's Sailing Orders are to proceed directly to Bombay.

Restore also to the Braminys their Charity Grounds we repeat to you that admitting their might have been some Roguery this is not a time for entering into disputes with the King of Tanjour who writes the President that 'tis their due & observe it as a standing Rate that no person whatsoever be confined but you immediately in a General Letter to Us advise us of it as well as the occasion of it when you shall from Us receive Orders how to act.

As we observe by the Camp returns upwards of 2000 Seapoys the 900 that went with Capt. Forbes's detachment will be sufficient therefore raise no more on that Account.

When we receive by our Musters of Chially Long Cloth we shall be proper Judges whether an Investment can be made to the Company's advantage or not.

We have long observed the perplexity in the Deve Cotah Accounts and peremptorily insist on their being brought up and kept regularly.

The Dungaree & Dungaree Bags should be put under the head of Gunners Stores surely 'tis time enough to write them off when expended we hope we shall have no further Occasion to take notice of such flagrant Mistakes.

We approve of the detention of Ensign Scottney, Receive [sic] of the Polligar of Palam Cotah his Ballance which his Vackeel informs us he is very ready to pay & forward to Major Lawrence Ensign Fraziers Account to whom we have wrote concerning it.

When we receive Mr. Calls report of the Buildings and Fortifications you shall have our directions concerning them.

You in general terms represent the remissness of the Polligar but give no particular instance of it oblige him to do his duty, and if he has any Accounts with others in your district he must settle them justly, but be carefull no partiality be shewn.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

We dispatched the S^t. George Capt. Robinson to you the 30th. Ultimo with Sundry Consignments for which We refer to the Duplicate Papers in this Packet and Shortly after arrived our Honble Masters Ships Denham & York, the latter being now in readiness to proceed We dispatch her to you with a good supply of Treasure.

We acquainted your Honour &ca. in a former Letter that the Gentlemen at Bombay had consigned Us for your Acct. two hundred & fifty thousand Bombay Rupees which coin we are informed passes with you only for two P Cent more than Arcot Rupees tho' in reality the intrinsick value is something more which induced one of our Shroffs to make us an offer of purchasing them at two P Cent advance and to recoin them here at his own expence into Arcot Rupees in the Companys Mint on which a Duty of half Cent being received is so much clear gain to our Hon'ble Masters, this induced us to accept the proposal and accordingly in lieu of 250000 Bombay you will receive 25500 Arcot Rupees being the full sum they would have produced with you, these are contained in 31 Chests

and are distinguished in the Invoice from Twenty others of Arcot Rupees, which are also consign'd to you on this ship with Ten Chests of Bullion & ten of Madras Rupees on account of the Treasure we have received from Europe.

Your Honour &ca. are very sensible that the distract'd state of this Province and the Ambitious schemes of the French render it absolutely necessary for the protection and defence of the Companys Rights & possessions that our Military force should be sufficient to resist the attempts of the Enemy this for several years past has obliged Us to detain here the recruits intended for your Presidency which doubtless must have weakened your Garrison too much, that we might not be drove to the same necessity this year. We wrote to the Gentlemen of Bombay for a reinforcement & they have done their utmost to support Us, with which assistance, had we received the Recruits from England that were reasonably expected we might have faced the Enemy, but by some disappointment; as our Hon'ble Masters inform Us, they have sent Us by the China Ships & St. George but two hundred and twenty Men or therabouts, which in all probability is so disproportionable to the force the Enemy will receive that it has determined Us to land the recruits consigned to you they are incorporated in your detachment, and a List of those taken out of the York and Denham is in the packet, our demand for Arms of all Sorts has also obliged to land from each of those ships three Chests of Swords which are endorsed of the Bills of Lading.

We acquainted your Honour &c^a. in our Letter of the 16 April of our Intentions to dispatch the Colchester to England in Sep^r. and to detain one of the Coast & Bay Ships here till her arrival from Batavia that We might not be disappointed in case of any accident happening to her in which we have our Honble Masters Sanction as you will observe by the enclosed Extract from their Commands, we shall therefore detain the Denham till the Norfolk arrives & then immediately dis [sic] the former to you and keep the latter till the Colchester comes in, the Anson being a small ship which may be proper for your early dispatch we shall send her away to you directly after her arrival here of which we are in hourly expectation.

In our said Letter of the 16 April We acquainted your Hon. &c. with our reasons for leaving to you to relieve the Egmont at the Negrais; the protection of a Europe ship will We conceive be absolutely necessary there till our Honble Masters Affairs are settled on much firmer footing than they are at present, whatever ship your Honour &c. may order on this service We request you will send a good supply of provision and refreshments which will be very acceptable.

We imagine you will receive the same Commands as are given Us in regard to the Salt Petre to be laden home, however as it can be of no diservice we send you an Extract of two paragraphs of the Companys General Letter received this Season relating thereto.

The Companys Affairs on the West Coast of Sumatra having fallen into great disorder We were ordered last year to send Supra Vizors to regulate them, we accordingly did so and have lately rec'd from them a very Satisfactory Account of their proceedings amongst other things they very justly observe that our Honble Masters by their Letter of the 31 Decr. 1723 (an Extract of which is enclosed for your perusal) thought proper to forbid the importation of Callicoes or piece Goods at that place, but by a particular Indulgence to the Servants there in consideration of their limitted Trade that prohibition was by orders from this Presedency (as you will observe by the Extract of a Letter dated 4 October 1724) alleviated with respect to them, notwithstanding these orders have never been revoked but have always been understood to continue in force, many private Vessells trading from different parts of India have thro' an extream remissness in Government and inattention to Orders been suffered to import & vend their Merchandize of all Sorts at the West Coast without limitation. The Supra Vizors by virtue of the powers we vested them with have

already enforced those Orders and published the prohibition thereby made under penalty of confiscation which we approve and shall confirm, we think it proper to communicate these regulations to your Honour &ca. that private Traders from your Port may not ignorantly break thro it.

The Company having been put to a considerable Expence in making a Settlement at Natal on the West Coast of Sumatra with an intention & expectation as it was represented of promoting an Investment of Pepper which now appears to have been ill grounded tho' considerable Advantages have probably arisen from a Trade in Ophium. We think it but just that the Company who have supported the Charge should reap the benefits and have therefore resolved to confine that branch of Trade entirely to them, and shall by our next Advices to the West Coast acquaint the Gentlemen there to publish an absolute prohibition of the importation of Ophium there except on the Companys Account under penalty of Confiscation. The Supra Vizors write us that Fifty Chests of Patna Ophium may be disposed of to advantage which we therefore request your Honour &c². will provide & Consign to Us on the Honble Companys Account. We are in hopes there will be a considerable quantity of Surplus Pepper at Fort Marlbro' this season but of this we are as yet uncertain and expect further Advices which when we receive shall be communicated to you.

Captain Ward has represented to Us that he has considerably more than his Tonnage on board on the Companys Account with which his Ship is so deep that he does not judge it consistent with her safety and that of the Cargo to take in any thing more considering the danger of going over the Flatts into Bengal River for which reason we have not insisted on his taking in any Redwood, we shall consign you by the Denham and other Ships as much as they can carry.

We have permitted John Harley belonging to your detachm^t. to return to Bengal on the York & We also send you by the same Ship one John Baptist Mioch a French Deserter.

A Packet rec'd from England and a Letter from Bombay are in the Packet with the several Papers rec'd \$\mathbb{Y}\$ York to be forwarded and some others as \$\mathbb{Y}\$. List.

Captain Wards Sailing Orders are to touch at Vizagapatam to land a Consignment of Treasure and then proceed directly to you.

June we are informed that the Morattas had entirely evacuated that Country, We wish it may prove true, and doubt not but in that case the manufacturers will gladly return to their Habitations and labour & enable you & the Gentlemen at the other two Settlements to supply Us with a good quantity of Cloth for our September dispatch.

Captain Gardner Sailed from hence the 19th. Ulto. in the Charles Snow Capt. Mitchell bound for Bengal & to touch at your Port which he has most probably missed and proceeded to the Bay if this should be the case he will certainly return by the first conveyance in the mean time we recommend it to you to see that your Military be constantly and regularly disciplined.

As Colonel Scott when at your Settlement particularly recommended the building of the Wall from Martins Point to Tonery's Battery, we would have it set about and compleated as soon as possible under the Inspection of

Mr. Heath who is to be paid fifteen Pags. That we may not seem to bear hard on the Trevendeporum Renters tho' in reality what we insisted on is most reasonable and favourable, we consent to their taking the Oath we prescribed to their Losses for 1753 & 1754 at the same time, provided it be done forthwith, for we observe the term of payment is not till the first of Nov^r. to compleat the Year, and if they mean to defer taking the Oath till then we shall look upon their behaviour as trifling with Us, and will not admit of it, but insist on that Account being settled immediately, if they take the Oath directly as it is their own proposal they will not be entitled to any further Allowance for damages should any happen within the term still to run of 1754.

We are very sorry to hear the Cost of the Tents you sent Us up agrees pretty nearly with what has charged for some time past because it appears to Us most Exorbitant when compared with what some other Tents made here stand the Company in, those We received from you were immediately sent to Camp so that there was not time to take the exact demensions of them, but they seemed to be pretty near the common size, the difference between their Cost & ours is stated here under for your Observation Viz^t.

We suspend our Judgement on this remarkable difference untill you acquaint Us what are the dimensions & qualitys of your Tents that their price should be swelled so much beyond ours, let it be very particularly inquired into & stated to Us and if you find there has been any fraud examine and acquaint Us what number of Tents the Company have been supplied with at that rate and by whom.

As soon as all the Writers for this Establishment expected from Europe are arrived we shall station them according to their several Capacitys and shall then be mindfull to supply you with as many as can be spared, Acquaint Us how many you reckon a full supply without employing any monthl writers & specfy for what employs they are wanted.

We called upon Capt. James of the Protector to make good the bundle of

Steel Pz. 1.1 which you say was deficient, but he insisted that he delivered it with the rest into Boat No. 7 this assertion would not have been altogether satisfactory had he not produced Us his Bill of Lading discharged, so that one way or other there has been some irregularity which the Company must not suffer for, but if the steel is really deficient, as the Storekeeper was to blame for delivering up the Bill of Loading he must make it good.

You did very right in refusing to gratifie your Merchants in their request for an advance of price on their Cloth tho' we are sensible they have some reason of their side, but the difficultys that have been always found in this Country especially to reduce a price that has once been advanced are so very great that nothing but unavoidable necessity can justifie it, indeed it would by no means Answer at present when our Honble Masters complain that our Investm^t. yields them little or no profit. The reason you were not supplied with Cash sooner to proceed in your Investment was that we had barely sufficient in the Treasury to answer the Current Expences of the Settlement & the continual demands for the Army and other contingent Charges but as soon as the arrival of the Europe Ships put it in our power to remove that difficulty, we supplied you plentifully & shall continue to do so to the full amount of what you can Invest acquaint Us therefore as near as you can how long your present Cash will answer your demands, that we may provide some Conveyance in time to-send you what may be further necessary for your Occasions. When we directed you to advance some money to your old Merchts. as well as the new we assigned the reasons for it that we thought it wrong to lay them entirely aside and fling the whole Trade into the new Merchants hands by making Advances to them only to the utter ruin of the rest, but if they have neglected to exert themselves in return for this Indulgence we shall no longer think them worthy of favour you must therefore insist on their bringing in very shortly to the full amount of their last advance & press them to lessen their Ballances when that is done they may be again tried, as to Irshipa Chitty and Paupa Rauze whom you represent as the most active & responsible persons we are very willing to give them all prudent encouragements the reasons we gave for limitting your advances to Pags. 5000 were that the troubles your way made it too dangerous to risque more at once with the respective Merchants, the same reasons subsists still and we are induced to deviate from there, only beause we are press'd to it by urgent necessity, the Consequence of Septr. dispatch is so great to our Hon'ble Masters that to accomplish it we must run greater risques than we should otherwise chuse, you may therefore advance those two Merchants or such others as may be depended on as largely as you think consistent with prudence & we rely on your utmost diligence to get your cloth cured as early as possible that we may get the Ship clear of the Coast before the breaking up of the Monsoon.

Enclosed is a List of what Goods are to be provided by you for the Current year which we trust you will do your best to comply with be very attentive to the remarks on your Investments which we send you herewith as extracted from the List of Investments received this season from England and pay as great regard to them as if they were repeated here for we are determined to see our

Honble Masters directions executed as litterally as possible, or that sufficient reasons be given for any default. In this Packet you will also receive Copy of an Account sent Us from England of the true Measure of Long Cloth & Salampores &ca. & an Account of Goods over & wanting Ships arrived in England 1753 with respect to the latter you will observe some Mistakes have been committed both here and at your Settlement in embaling & Invoicing the Goods, let such as relate to you be rectified, and your Export Warehousekr. must be answerable to the Company for what Goods appear to be really deficient, when this Account is adjusted advise Us how you have settled it and what deficiencys are paid for.

Your Indent for Stores shall be complied with as far as we are able by the first Opportunity.

Advise Us at what rate Pagodas may be exchanged into fanams at your place and if it appear worth while you shall have a supply as to Copper Cash its impossible to think about them whilst the Mint is so engaged as it is at present in coining the Treasure from Europe, as soon as that is done we shall order the Cash to be set about.

Mr. Thomas Maunsell is henceforward to be considered as Commissary at Camp a head must accordingly be erected in your Books to which that new standing there for Mr. Robert Palk as Commissary must be wrote off.

Instant you are under some difficultys how to adjust an Article in your Books of Firelocks for which Expedition to Tritchenopoly stands Dr. to Account Current Fort St. David tho' by what we can understand there is no such Article in the Fort St. David Books, that you may not be at a Stand on this Account let Account Current Fort St. George be Credited and we will settle it here.

In regard to the Ground you propose to have sold as an Encouragement to Inhabitants to come and settle there, it is improper to be put in Execution at present as the whole Country is rented of Us for a certain Term and it may injure the Farmers, the Cowle will expire next June when it may be effected with much greater ease.

Since we ordered Mr. Call to survey your Fortifications and Buildings we have rec'd our Honble Masters orders not to lay out any thing more on them than is absolutely necessary, the Charge of putting them in a tollerable condition would be so considerable that we cannot think of entering on it, the most essential repair wanting at present is the Powder Magazine which therefore you must get done, acquaint Mr. Call with our directions on this head that he may advise what is proper to be done to the Magazine, we only mean that it is to be so fitted up as to render it tollerably secure for that purpose, any other trifling repairs may also be made if they are really necessary & not otherwise.

Henry Eustace Johnson to come up hither for the recovery of his health, which we were before informed of by his arrival here the 5th. Instant, on a proper representation from you we should not have refused him that liberty, but we cannot approve of the Companys Servants removing from any of the Subordinates without our leave first obtained unless upon very emergent Occasions M^r. Johnsons was not so pressing but that it might have admitted of delay till our answer could have been received.

When we compare your Letter of the 17 July in relation to the Investment, with what you say on that Subject in our last we observe a very remarkable difference, In the first you say Irshippa Chitty & Paupa Rauze upon an Ingenuous Computation of the Number of Bales they could provide against the September dispatch were in hopes of bringing in about 400 if they were not impeded for want of money or by fresh disturbances, upon this we gave you liberty to advance them as largely as you might judge prudent which they are no sooner appriz'd of than they evade giving any direct answer & only tell you in general Terms they will do their best leaving it very doubtfull whether any dependance can be had on their performance, this is acting very disingenously by you of which they should be made sensible.

Enclosed, you will receive a report in consequence of a survey of Cloth received, from you in February last, it is very fortunate that we were not under a necessity of immediately shipping it off for Europe without reembaling, had we done so, how justly should we have been exposed to the severest Censure of our Honble Masters, but the fault is not the more excusable because this has not happened, the Bale Notes plainly shew the Cloth was never sorted, a neglect that cannot be passed over, it is not sufficient to say the Company shall not be injured by this particular Case, for they would have suffered had we not discovered it however untill we hear what you have to offer, we shall only add that We are determined your Export Warehousekeeper shall either take the Cloth for his own Account or make good the difference of value to the Company upon a just appraisement.

GENTLEMEN

We dispatched the York from hence the 27th. Ulto. with orders to touch at your Port to land a Consignment of Treasure of which we then advised you.

The Deficiency in the Rice is very considerable and probably arises in a great measure from Pilferage which it is impossible ever to prevent, we apprehended a Loss would happen by sending it on Country Vessells, but as you were in want & we had no other Conveyance it became a case of necessity, the Syrangs of those vessells were so sensible of this that they refused to take the Grain on board if they were to be made answerable for deficiencys, we agreed they should not & therefore what is wanting must be wrote off to Profit & Loss.

Ibrahim Ally Cawn having wrote the President very pressingly for some Assistance to support himself & family requesting at the same time that he would dispose of a quantity of Paddy for his Account which was lodged here & remit him the produce, as we have reced favours from Japhir Ally Cawn & should be glad to do his family any service provided our Honble Masters are not sufferers by it, we have purchased the said Paddy for the Companys Account amounting to four hundred & one Pagodas twenty seven fanams & seventy two Cash (401—27—72) the quantity being 12 Garce 70 Marcals at 33 Pags. \$\mathscr{A}\$ Garce which sum you will pay to Ibrahim Ally Cawn & debt Us for the same

You must certainly be mistaken in the measure of your brown Cloth it could never fail of turning out above 36 yards when white if it were 72 Covids brown, we have made the Experiment here upon five pieces brown Cloth each measuring brown exactly Seventy Covids, after being washed four of them were full $68\frac{1}{2}$ Covids long or 36 yds. $5\frac{1}{2}$ Inch^s. & the fifth sixty Nine Covids or 36 yds. 15 Inch^s. but tho' this exceeds the Companys Measure we have ordered that no Cloth under 70 Covids shall be taken in & even insist on its being full Seventy One or upwards, you must observe the same and for greater Satisfaction we would have you try the Experiment yourselves.

We observe the quantity of Cloth you have on hand and hope you will be able to encrease it considerably in time for our dispatch we should be glad you would always mention at the foot of your Letters as particularly as in your last the Cloth you have ready & preparing.

Mess^{rs}. Westcott & Andrews write Us that Mons^r. Bussey is expected at Rajahmundrum & that they apprehend he will impede our business & insist on being treated as Nabob of that province, we have ordered them not to acknowledge him as such on any Account, and you will observe the same, he is no more than Renter of those Countrys.

Mr Dupleix is dismissed from his Government and is succeeded in it by Monsr. Godeheu lately arrived from France, he speaks in a very pacifick Stile & we shall not be backward in Answering his Intentions if they really tend to the restoring tranquility on just & honourable terms but we shall be on our guard & place no more confidence in Gallic Declarations than they deserve.

The Answer you returned to Juggapetarauzes demand of the Towns which the Company hold by Cowles from Vizaramrauze was very right. The French will certainly try every means in their power to wrest from Us our legal possessions, their Actions have so plainly proved their Intentions that we ought to be the more on our Guard, your resolution to defend the Companys possession under your Charge to the last extremity is highly laudable, we hope & don't doubt but you will continue it & that it will have the desired Effect to the Confusion of the disturbers of publick tranquility, but to be ready for the worst your Caution in preparing a vessell to secure the Companys Effects is proper and what we sometime ago directed tho' we don't imagine it will come to this extremity, but let what will happen you are not on any Account to acknowledge Mr. De Bussey as Nabob of that Province for he really is not the most he can with any Colour pretend to is a Cowle from Salabat Jing for receiving the Rents.

Mons^r. Godeheu is lately arrived from France in quality of Governour General & Commander in Chief of all the French Companys Settlements in India, he declares his Orders & Intentions are pacifick how far they are so time must shew, but we shall have no relyance on declarations unless they are supported by suitable actions.

We observe the quantity of Cloth you have on hand continue to mention it constantly at the Foot of all your Letters, we can add nothing to what we have already said on this subject and we rely on your best endeavours on our parts we will give you what assistance we can, a Military force is not in our power to spare but a further supply of money shall be sent to Vizagapatam for your use before the season is over, & also the Gunpowder you desire.

We observe what you say in regard to your Investment we have already given you our Sentiments on it so fully that it would be but a needless repetition to enforce it, we were pleased to learn by your Letter of the 17 that the Towns where the Chief part of your Cloth is manufactured had escaped the fury of the Morattoes the good Effects will we hope be felt in your Investment, Mr. De Bussey will doubtless impede it as much as he can & you are right to be on your Guard tho' we cannot imagine he will proceed to the extremitys you apprehend, but even if he should you are on no Account to acknowledge him as Nabob of the Province, he is no more than the Renter of it by virtue of a Cowle from Salabat Jing, therefore pursue the Instructions we have already given you, prepare a Vessell to secure the Companys Effects on, in case you should be attacked maintain your Ground to the last extremity and when you can do no more embark and proceed to Vizagapatam, we should be glad were it in our power to assist you with more than Advice and Orders, but we cannot spare any further reinforcements from hence.

Mons^r. I am ordered by the President & Council to desire you will acquaint them whether you recollect anything of the sorting that Cloth, & by whom it was done with any other Circumstances relating to it that may occur to you.

The 6th. & 8th. Instant I enclosed you 2 Bills for 5000 Pagodas ea. for the use of the Army the receipt whereof has not been acknowledged please to let me know whether they came safe & have been paid.

GENTLEMEN

We reply to your Letter of the 20th. Instant.

The sum of the Trevendeporum Renters say they have collected, is much less than we could have imagined, but as they have sworn to the Account in the most solemn manner their religion enjoins, & you no doubt have taken all the pains you could by other means to discover the truth you may receive the amount in full to 31 July last.

We did not mean to have your enquiry concerning the Tents extend so far back as Mr. Cookes time, that having formerly been examined into & his reasons transmitted to Europe as to those that have been made since, the report of your Committee gives us reason to suspect the Company have been imposed on than we at first Imagined for according to their report our Officers Tents contain above Eighty three Yards of Vitterry more than the largest of yours & One hundred & thirty three Yards more than the smallest & yet yours amount to above thirty three Pagodas more than ours, the difference in the private Tents is as remarkable, Ours contain above eight yards of Vitterry more than yours & cost above four Pagodas & three Quarters less which exceeds the charge of our more than One hundred One ? Cent, we grant the Vitterry may be a trifle dearer at your place than here, but it can bear no sort of proportion to the difference between your Charge & ours, we are determined to have this Affair cleared up if possible & to do the Company Justice, therefore a further enquiry must be made if (as it appears by your Committees Report) the Officers Tents were of different sizes vizt. from 130 to 180 yards, how comes it that they are all charged at the same price 923 Pags. tho' the exact quantity of Vitterry used by each Tent may not appear by the Companys Books it probably may by the Storehouse Conicoplys Cadjans or the late Mr. St. Paul's private Conicoplys, examine them strictly 'tis impossible but that they must be very well acquainted with every Circumstance, if they prevaricate or pretend Ignorance, confine them or use such rigorous measures as may best conduce to a discovery of the truth and follow the same method with all other persons from whom you may have reason to expect any Information when by such an enquiry you are thoroughly informed of the quantity & quality of the Vittery used in those Tents the Charge of making and every other particular relating to them report the same to Us with your Opinion, before we leave the subject we must observe that the reasons given for making the Officers Tents of different Sizes ought not to be admitted let a certain Standard be fixed & don't deviate from it to gratifie any Officer without a very good reason.

We should have paid a much greater regard to your assertion than to the attestation of Conicoplys, Cotton beaters, Peons, Bag Cooleys and Packers on whose Testimony we know how to set a Just value, but as you aver the Cloth was sorted we cannot doubt it & only want to be satisfied by whom it was done,

the means of proving this occurrs very readily, your packing Book will immediately shew every particular, for our satisfaction let the foul Book be sent Us up directly. It is extreamly improbable that any of the Cloth should have met with the damage we mentioned, since you parted with it, for the 1222 pieces were not as you seem to apprehend contained in forty Bales but were picked out of the whole quantity you sent us up brown & none of those Bales appeared on the outside to have the least damage as our Export Warehousekeepers informs Us which fixes the fault still at your Settlement it will avail but little merely to prove the Cloth was sorted for it will still be certain either that it was sorted without attention or that the Cloth was changed afterwards which it rests with you to discover we shall be very glad to have it fixed upon the guilty, you will therefore take such measures as you think best to detect the fraud, for be assured we will see Justice done the Company.

We do not desire your Warehousekeeper should be answerable for any deficiencys that he is not properly chargeable with, but as you can by your books readily tell who had the Employ of Export warehouse keeper at the several times when the Cloth Admiral Vernon, Bombay Castle & Chesterfield was embaled, let them be examined & send us an Account of the deficiencys & persons who are chargeable with them.

Captain James positively averred that his Bill of Lading was regularly indorsed as fullfilled, we cannot be so certain that he actually produced it, as your Storekeeper insists he endorsed it with an exception let the affair rest for the present we shall write to Bombay when we shall desire that Capt. James may be called upon to produce the Bill of Lading & if it is endorsed with an exception be obliged to make good the deficiency otherwise your Storekeeper must answer for it.

If you can Exchange Pagodas into fanams at 43 it is much better that you should do so than have them sent from hence where the Exchange for any quantity is 42. 20 you will therefore supply yourselves.

It is probable we may soon have Occasion to employ the Reverend Mr. Palk in our Negociations with the French but as soon as it is more convenient one of the Companys Chaplains shall reside with you some part of the Year.

According to a just valuation of the several Horses that were lent to mount the Troops we find Cootahs White Horse valued at One hundred & twenty Pagodas which sum you'll therefore pay him.

Our Madeira Wine is very near expended so that we cannot supply you with any more, let Us have a particular Account how the thirty Pipes sent you have been distributed.

In regard to the Deve Cotah Bound Renters demand we are informed Mess^{rs}. Boddam & Wynch when Paymasters supplied the Company with an additional number of Bricks in consideration of the liberty of cutting Firewood without Charge as to the Polligars, The Braminys, Rama Naigue &c^a. a mere assertion that they are indebted in certain sums is no way satisfactory, some sort of proof should be brought & they should have an opportunity of justifying themselves, all which you will thoroughly enquire into, we must observe that the Jancan appears to Us very extravagant, the value of all the Firewood M^r. Wynch had from thence was no more than 1100 & the Juncan charged in the Account you sent Us up is 458 Pagodas, let this be enquired into.

The disabled Topasses who came in from Camp should be put upon the pension list but they should first produce a Certificate from the Commander in Chief of their good behaviour to entitle them thereto as to the Lascars we

rather chuse they should have a gratuity given them according to the Circumstances of their case and be dismissed without buthening [sic] the Company any further.

The Dutch never deliver up any Deserters from Us therefore by all means protect those that may fly from them to Us for refuge but the Boat which you mention to have been run away with from Negapatam must be returned. We have at times had many Men desert to the Dutch We are certain they fare no where so well as with Us & therefore imagine they would again be glad of our Service encourage them to it, & to that end publish all over the Bounds a free pardon to all deserters whatsoever who shall return.

Enclosed is a List of sundry Hospital necessarys Indented for by M^r. Wilson at Tritchenopoly, you will order them to be prepared and sent thither by the first Opportunity.

Mahomed Ebar Cawn has wrote the President that he is sent by Major Lawrence & the Nabob to fetch Mahauphooz Cawn & desires that the 50,000 Rupees may be paid to him, that he will engage Mahauphooz Cawn to proceed and not advance him the money till he has passed the Coladam, but if after all Mahauphooz Cawn should still refuse to move he will be accountable for & repay the money as he shall be directed. We would have the Deputy Govr. discourse with Ebar Cawn & promise him the half Lack on Mahauphooz Cawn's arrival at Deve Cotah but if that should not be satisfactory pay him the money directly making him accountable in case Mahauphooz Cawn should still delay or refuse to proceed.

The Deputy Gov^r. has wrote to the President in regard to the providing a large number of Cotts in case any Land Forces should be sent from Europe, Admiral Boscawen Forces were supplied with Matts only & the same method may be practised again, a few Cotts may be provided for the sick.

The Anson arrived here this morning from England by her Our Hon'ble Masters have been pleased to make an alteration in the Council which now stands thus.

Our Honble Masters having been under a necessity of sending the Kent, London and Britannia to this Coast on purpose to Transport a detachment of Troops his Majesty has been graciously pleased to assist the Company with, they have ordered Us to concert with you the best Measures for employing that additional Tonnage in such manner as to indemnifie them from the heavy charge of Demorage, it is probable you are furnished with the same Instructions as are sent Us, however that we may go hand in hand we send you a Copy of ours for your Information. The Britannia is already arrived, and we are in hourly expectation of the Kent & London.

In our Letter of the 16 April we acquainted your Honour &ca. with our Sentiments on the State of the Trade in India and how incapable we were of taking up any of the Companys Tonnage this Season on our own Accounts; Experience has since confirmed our Opinion, but tho' we cannot employ any of these ships at our own risque yet as well in compliance with our Honble Masters commands as through our own Inclination to disburthen them we have given publick notice that all persons who may be inclined to freight any or either of the ships Kent London or Britannia may deliver in their proposals to Us and we shall give all the encouragement we can to those who may be inclined to Venture but we much doubt the Success of this Plan, if we should not be able to let either of them we shall send the three down to the Bay in hopes that your Honour &ca. may be more fortunate than we in the disposal of them, but in case you should lay under the same inability that we do we then can think of no other scheme than returning them to Us in January with Cargoes of rice, we therefore submit to your Honor. &ca. either to provide such Cargoes or not as you shall judge most for our Hon'ble Masters Interest.

His Majesty has been pleased to assist the Company with a Regiment of Infantry consisting of above 800 Men and a detachment of near 80 men from

the Royal Train of Artillery with a Squadron of 5 Men of War and a Sloop commanded by Admiral Watson, the Admiral with two others are already arrived and the rest are daily expected.

The Colchester is not yet arrived therefore we still detain the Norfolk.

We must apologize to your Honour &ca. for inadvertently opening the Box packet from Europe & Anson under your Address, Captain Veitch brought it ashore by mistake and it was opened without observing the direction, we soon discovered the Error and had it nailed up and sealed again immediately.

Captain Veitches Orders are to proceed to Vizagapatam to land a Consignment of Treasure and then make the best of his way to you.

GENTLEMEN

We have hitherto given the Deputy Governor alone such Instructions and Directions as we judged necessary for the reception and accommodation of his Majestys Forces and so far as those Orders have been carried into execution the Expences that have thereby arisen must be charged to the Company, As we were not till now furnished with any Orders for our Guidance, but from the receipt of this Letter whatever directions we have given heretofore are to cease and you are to govern yourselves by the Enclosed General Letter from our Honble Masters dated the 2^d . March last, to which we add such further Instructions as appear to Us absolutely necessary.

You will observe by the Companys Orders that Admiral Watson and Colonel Adlercron are to be allowed no more than five Pagodas \$\mathbb{\text{P}}\$ day each for their Table and all Expences whatsoever, but there are no Appointments settled for Lieut. Col. Bagshaw and Major Sewell except that the Table to be kept by Col. Adlercron is said to be for himself and those two Gentlemen expressly, however as Lieut. Col. Bagshaw commands in Chief in the Absence of Col. Adlercron he must be allowed the five Pagodas \$\mathbb{\text{P}}\$ day untill the Colonel arrives.

Altho' our Honble Masters have directed Us not to make any further Allowances than what are express'd in their Commands now transmitted you yet we conceive there are some particulars which are not mentioned merely because they did not occurr to their minds and which we therefore venture to supply.

Admiral Watson and Commodore Pocock are to be allowed Palankeens.

Colonel Adlercron, Lieut. Col. Bagshaw and Major Sewell are to have Palankeens and Horses when in the Field but not in Garrison.

And to the Chaplain to the Regiment you are to allow Eighteen pence aday as an addition to his Pay.

Lieut. Col. Bagshaws request that the Forces may be furnished with Provisions after the manner of the Companys Troops when in the Field for at least fourteen days after their Arrival, is very reasonable and you will therefore—comply with it, and that the Soldiery may afterwards with greater ease supply themselves you must give proper directions that a plentifull Buzar be kept at Cuddalore and let it be so regulated that the price of provisions be not enhanced.

The Regulation of the Quarters as well for the Officers as the private Men deserves attention Provide as far as in your power good and sufficient apartments for the former and prevent the encroachments complained of in the latter and that this may the more readily be effected let it be a branch of the Paymasters duty to concert with the commanding officer what is proper to be done and you are to see that it be executed accordingly.

With regard to furniture we imagine it would be impossible to procure any quantity under a very considerable time besides that we are not authorized to put the Company to any Expence on that Account, yet we should be glad if any of the Companys could be spared without great Inconvenience, that Col. Adler-cron and the Chief officers were not left destitute of necessary Accommodation on their Arrival.

We recommend to you very strictly to observe the directions in the 10th., 11th., & 12th. Paragraphs for supplying the Squadron and Land Forces with money Stores &c^a. adjusting the Accounts and taking Bills on the proper Officers and we also enclose you an Extract of another Letter for your Guidance in regard to Bills for money taken upon Account of the detachment of Artillery, we shall inform ourselves particularly of the value of the Weighty Dollar and write you fully on that head.

You are already directed that the Admiral is to be saluted with 15 Guns, the Commodore with 13, and Col. Adlercron with 13 to which we add that the Captains of the Kings Ships are to be saluted with Eleven Guns.

The Salute for Colonel Lawrence as Commander in Chief of all the Companys Forces in India is to be thirteen Guns.

Tho' we cannot justify giving you Orders for affording his Majestys Officers any better accommodation than what are herein directed, we persuade ourselves you will readily do whatever may be in your power to make every thing easy and agreable, and that they may be convinced of our good Intentions to give Satisfaction produce the Compys. Orders to the Admiral and Colonel and assure them on our part of the most sincere and hearty desire to promote Harmony and Content of which we flatter ourselves they will be convinced by our having taken upon us to exceed our orders.

The directions we gave Mr. Starke the 9th. Instant to hire Mr. Kiernanders house for Colonel Adlercron are still to subsist, we shall be concerned if he should have the same opinion of it as Lieut. Col. Bagshaw, but when we have provided the best in our power we can do no more.

GENTLEMEN

We were in hopes that the last directions we gave you concerning the Tents would have been sufficient to convince you we were determined not to drop the subject without having a more satisfactory Account than you have given Us; if the Conicoply could not tell what Cooley was paid, surely the Taylor that made them or any other Taylor cannot be ignorant of it, we long ago directed that Vouchers should be kept for all Articles of this kind to be produced when called for, demand those for all the Tents made by Mr. St. Paul and from them state to Us the particulars of his Charges, 'tis in vain that we are explicit in our directions unless you are assiduous in executing them; We insist on your enquiring very strictly into this Affair and when you have done so give Us your Opinion upon it.

We have given you our Sentiments before very fully on the torn and damaged cloth, and are sorry you cannot give Us a more satisfactory account we shall only observe that it is very improbable the cloth could be torn after it was embaled, and it would be very unreasonable to turn it upon the Merchants hands, for after it has undergone the usual examination and is out of their Custody they are no longer chargeable, it would give Us great satisfaction to come at the real truth but if you who are on the spot where it happened cannot discover it 'tis improbable that we should here, at all events the Company must be indemnified, amongst the Companys standing orders we find the following-• We hereby declare and direct that whatever Conicoply or other black Servant " or white one if not under Covenants with us is employed by any of our Coven-" ant Servants in looking after any Bullion Goods or Effects of ours or collect-"ing the money for the Sale of them or assisting at their delivery or any therwise accountable, such warehousekeeper shall be responsible for him "and them, and therefore that he take sufficient Security for whomsoever he "employs even tho' the President and Council should recommend him, we " likewise order and direct that they never impose a Conicoply or other Personwithout such Servants consent in compliance therefore with this Order we do direct that your Export Warehousekeeper do pay to the Company the full amount of the said torn and damaged cloth which shall then be deliver'd here to whomsoever he shall appoint to receive it, and in case it shall at any time hereafter appear who was the real authors of the fraud satisfaction shall be procured from them.

We can neither supply you with fanams nor Copper Cash at present as soon as the Mint is disengaged we shall coin a quantity of the latter and send you a proportion.

You may give protection to all Deserters except the Danes with whom we have entered into an Agreement to the contrary on condition that such Deserters as shall be delivered up on either side be pardoned.

To such Lascars as are really disabled and incapable of getting their living you may grant pensions but gratuitys only, are to be given to all others as we before directed.

If upon examining the Articles of Lieut. Davis's Account with the Original Rolls and Vouchers you find them just he is certainly entitled to the Ballance and you will in such case pay it accordingly. After Capt. Chace's death at Pondicherry we are informed a sum of money was found amongst his Effects which we have reason to believe was part of a Ballance remaining in his hands of the Compys. money for payment of the Garrison at Trivady, enquire of Lieut. Davis whether he can give you any Information in this Affair and advise Us.

There certainly are some Grounds for Cootah's representations in regard to the weighing & measuring Duty, as the removal of the Presidency has doubtless occasion'd a decrease in the Importation of Grain, on this Consideration we consent that instead of four hundred pagodas & Ann^m. the Annual Rent of that Farm be three hundred Pagodas from the date of the Cowle and you will settle with the Farmer accordingly, as to the several debts which he has mentioned in a List annexed to his Petition, let him draw out a particular account how they arise and when, which we shall then consider of.

We cannot take upon Us to decide or intermeddle with the private disputes of the Arrack Farmers in matter of property those who took the Farm of the Company must pay the Rent.

We have ordered the Bale of Musters you sent Us to be examined when that is done we shall give you our Opinion.

We have appointed Mess^{rs}. James Broadbent and Robert Dowsett to be Assistants at your Settlement they will both take their passage on the Britannia.

Tho' we have directed you to show all the Civilities in your power to his Majestys Officers and to promote Harmony and a good understanding with them you are at the same time not to acquiesce to any unreasonable request or proposals but remember that the Settlement of Fort St. David and its districts belong to the Company and are committed to your charge, the King Forces are therefore not to have any command there but are to be considered merely as Troops in quarters.

You are to supply Capt. Hislop with the Tumbrils &ca. he desires and any other Stores in the Compys. Godowns that may be really wanted for the Service.

The Winchelsea arrived here the 11th. and Captain Baron has delivered Us your Packet of the 26th. August, your favour of the 6th. June has also been received.

We shall give your Presidency due Credit for the Arms, pay & provisions supplied the detachments sent to our Assistance.

Our Letter of the 29th. July (which your Honrs. &cs. had not received when you wrote that we are now answering) will explain the case of the protested Bill, however it may not be amiss just to take notice that there is no Inconsistence in the Import Warehousekeepers endorsement, on referring to our Letter of the 14 June your Honour &cs. may observe that we only returned you a protest for non acceptance but kept the Bill here in order to demand payment at its falling due & advised you that if it was not duely discharged we should then return you both the Bill and another protest for want of payment, but the Bill was duely paid and the person on whom it was drawn to save his Credit Immediately dispatched a private pattamar with it regularly endorsed as being discharged, which reached you before our Advices of the 29th. July.

Sr. James Foulis's Services would have been extreamly acceptable if the Company had not sent us out Lieut. Col. Alexr. Heron as Major of this Garrison who will shortly take the Field, we have returned Sr. James Foulis our thanks for his readiness to serve the Company and acquainted him that we apprehend his presence at Bombay will be as material to the Companys Interest as his stay here considering our present situation.

We shall satisfie Captain Baron for the four puncheons of Beef and the diet of the two Europeans with S^r. James Foulis and debt your Presidency for the same.

Captain Baron has delivered us the Mace for the use of our Mayors Court, and we are to request your Honour &c². will favour us with the other Ensigns of state as soon as they are finished.

Besides the several ships originally intended for this Coast and the Bay (which are all arrived) our Honble Masters have been under a necessity of sending Us the Kent London and Britannia to Transport a detachment of Troops which his Majesty has been graciously pleased to assist the Company with they have also ordered the Warren to touch here to land some of the stores intended for the use of that detachment and then to proceed round to you, that ship arrived here a few days ago and shall be dispatched to you as soon as the people are sufficiently refreshed.

His Majesty has also ordered a Squadron of Men of War consisting of five ships and a sloop for the protection of the Companys rights in these parts, they are under the Command of Admiral Watson who is already arrived in the Kent with the Salisbury and King Fisher Sloop, and the Companys Ships London and Britannia as Transports.

To fill up the Tonnage that will be vacant in the Warren after landing the Kings Stores here our Hon'ble Masters have directed Us to load on that Ship all such Woollen Goods as will not readily sell here and consign them to you if we apprehend they will go off more advantageously on your side, we have already acquainted your Honour &c². Council we should be glad to be disburthened of a large quantity but as we have no Grounds to imagine you are in any Condition to take them off our Hands we shall wait your Answer to our Letter of the 19 July before we send you any.

Whilst the Protector was on this Coast we made use of her to transport sundry Stores to Fort S^t. David, the Gentlemen there wrote Us that a Bundle

of Steel w^t. 1. 1 was deficient of the Consignment, we called upon Capt. James in his return here to make it good but he assured Us that he had delivered the whole Consignment and that his Bill of Lading had been delivered up to him regularly endorsed We omitted to see that it was so but demanded the value of the Steel of the Storek^r. there, who delares he is ready to make Oath that he never reced. the Steel and says that he endorsed the Bill of Loading in the presence of Capt. James's Chief Lieut. (who promised to deliver the Steel in case it should be afterwards found to the Storek^r. here) and did particularly except the missing Bundle mentioning its weight, we are therefore to request

your Honour &ca. Council will call upon Capt. James to produce his Bill of Loading and if it appears endorsed as above, oblige him to make good the value fa. c.
of the Steel being Pagodas 4-24-60.

The Several Stores by the Warren being landed and the Commander informing us his Ships Company are sufficiently refreshed we shall this day deliver him his dispatches directing him to touch at St. David to land Major Heron and other Officers and then make the best of his way to you.

The Military Recruits from England by the Warren were intended for your Presidency nevertheless our Honble Masters have expressly given Us permission to detain them on this Establishment if our Affairs require it, we are sorry to say they do, and that a much larger number would be acceptable, we have therefore incorporated these with our own Companys.

In our last dated 19th. Sep^r. (which went by Pattamar Duplicate whereof is enclosed) we acquainted your Honour &c^a. that we could not accept of the services of S^r. James Foulis, we have since reflected that tho' at present we are in no want of Commanders, yet it is prudent to provide against the Worst, and in case of any Accident to Lieut. Col. Lawrence and Major Heron, S^r. James Foulis may be of great service to Us, we have therefore signified to him we should be glad he would continue on this Coast during the time he has permission of Absence from you, which he has consented to.

According to your desire we purchased and delivered to Captain Baron of P. fa. Ca.

the Winchelsea four Puncheons of Beef amounting to 186-23-37 for which we have debted your Presidency.

The Norfolk Captain Pinson Benham is now under dispatch for Europe and we hope will be ready to sail before the end of the month but we are apprehensive we shall be under a necessity of filling up part of her Charter party Tonnage with Salt Petre for want of Bales, we have but little reason to imagine we shall be more successfull in our Investment against the January dispatch, half a ships Loading is the most we expect to supply, and half a Loading we hope will remain of Surplus pepper at the West Coast, this is but a poor help yet tis all the assistance we can give in dispatching home the Ships on hand, how much Tonnage the Gentlemen at the Bay may provide for we cannot say but at the best there must remain a heavy Burthen behind for after the Norfolks dispatch we reckon no loss than Eleven Ships to be provided for on this

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

We have been disappointed in our intentions of dispatching the Colchester this Month to Europe, we waited for her Arrival from Batavia as long as we thought it prudent and then set about unloading the Norfolk, by the time this was near compleated the Colchester Imported but the Norfolk having then taken in the Salt Petre and prepared every thing to receive the remainder of her Cargo we have judged it most adviseable to dispatch her to Europe and to send the Colchester down to you, and that she may be in no danger of losing her passage we do not even detain her to land the Timber & Plank brought from Batavia but consign the same to your Honour &c². as \$\mathbb{H}\$ Invoice and Bill of Loading enclosed, and this we are the rather induced to do as we observe by your favour of the 1st. September that Article may yield our Hon'ble Masters a Profit with you.

We hope your Honour &ca, will excuse Us for mentioning that we think it would be adviseable to dispatch the Colchester the first Ship directly to Europe because as she has been long in India and this is her last Voyage she may not be so capable of beating round the Cape in a late passage.

When we consider the heavy Tonnage to be disposed of on this side of India it adds greatly to the Concern which the bad success in our Investment occasions we apprehend we shall with difficulty be able to compleat the Norfolks Loading, and half a Ship in January is full as much as we flatter ourselves with the hopes of filling up this we acknowledge will go but a little way towards disburthening our Honble Masters of the Ships to be provided for but yet considering the distracted State of the whole coast we are not disappointed in our Expectations.

The Supra Vizors and Council at Fort Marlbro' acquaint Us that they should have 250 Tons of Surplus Pepper ready in January; tho' we have sundry Stores to send thither which the Prince George (now under dispatch) cannot take in yet as it may occasion some delay should the Ship to be sent thither touch here we are to request your Honour &ca. will dispatch one with so much Tonnage for Europe on board, as with the 250 Tons above mentioned may make up her full charter party Tonnage, directly to Fort Marlbro' as early as possible that her passage round the Cape may not be endangered, by the same Conveyance we are to desire your Honour &c2. will consign to John Pybus Esqr. Supra Vizor &ca. Council there the Stores we have already indented for to you and expressed to be for their use and also Eight hundred gallons of Lamp Oil in Jarrs if they are procurable because Duppers are subject to great wastage since we desired your Honour &ca. to provide for that market fifty Chests of Ophium. We have reason to believe a larger quantity may be disposed of to advantage and we therefore desire your Honour &ca. will provide Eighty instead of fifty and consign them on the same Ship directly to Marlbro as also two hundred and fifty Barrells of Gunpowder which are much wanted there, the Supra Vizors & Council write Us that they can be supplied with Grain much cheaper from Batavia than from hence or the Bay, we therefore apprehend it will not answer to fill up the remaining Tonnage with that Article.

Your Honour &c*. acquaint Us that you had given publick notice of our having prohibited the Trade in piece Goods to Bencoolen as well as Ophium to Natall, by which we apprehend our meaning is misunderstood with respect to both, the Importation of which is prohibited at all the Companys Settlements on the West Coast of Sumatra, except as to the Piece Goods such as may be manifested from hence, and as to the Ophium such as we shall consign on the Companys Account.

As our Honble Masters have directed that in case we cannot dispatch home the Kent, London and Britannia this Season one or two of them are to be sent to China We propose dispatching one of them with a Cargo of Salt and other Stores from this place to the West Coast with Orders to proceed from thence to Canton and to be returned by the Supra Cargo's there directly to Europe, we have already proposed to your Honour &c. the returning those three Ships to Us in January with Grain if you cannot better dispose of them, we have only to add that we shall depend on having one and shall provide a Cargo of Salt accordingly.

As your Honour &ca. advise Us you have a large Ballance of Gunpowder in Store, we should not be over stocked if you were to supply us with One thousand Barrells provided it be good, and you have that quantity over and above your own proper store.

By this Conveyance (the Colchester) your Honour &c*. will receive the Box Packet from our Honble Masters for your Presidency, we have been obliged to open it in order to take out the Norfolks Charterparty after which it was immediately sealed up again, the Necessity for this Step will speak for itself.

We have delivered to Captain Mainwaring seperately another Packet for the President of Fort William which we received from Captain Bonham directed to be destroyed in case of danger.

We have advanced Captain Mainwaring at different times Ten thousand five hundred Pagodas on charterparty Terms for the use of the Colchester and three thousand Pagodas for which we have taken from him a Sett of Bills of Exchange on his Owners, we mention this that your Honour &ca. may be apprized of the risque our Honble Masters already have on that Bottom.

The Kent will be dispatched in a day or two with part of the Norfolks Cargo, the rest shall be consigned you on the London & Britannia as soon as it can be put on board.

The Coral and other private Consignments \(\mathbb{P} \) Norfolk are shipped on the Colchester as by the Manifest and Bills of Lading enclosed.

We have received your favour by the Cuddalore and Ganges, the Box Packet for our Honble Masters by the former shall be forwarded P Norfolk the other by the Ship to be dispatched in January.

it is not in our power consistently with Honour to deliver them up, indeed we cannot at present for they are gone to Bengal, but the Boat which we have secured shall be returned to whomsoever you may appoint to receive it.

GENTLEMEN

We have received your several Letters the last dated the 14 Instant.

After you had been so frequently acquainted of our Apprehensions that we should be distressed for Bales to compleat the Norfolk Tonnage, we cannot help being surprized that you should send us the Kent London & Britannia without any and write for our directions whether the Cloth should be sent us up brown, You will find by our Letters of the 18th. 23^d. & 27th. Ultimo that we directed you to send by these Ships all the Bales you had ready without mentioning either brown or white but supposing we had given no directions at all the worst that could have happened by your sending Us your brown cloth would have been the curing it here in case it had not been wanted for the Norfolk, you have let the opportunity slip and now it is too late.

If Mr. Cooke will give Security to abide by the Company's determination we will comply with his request and refer the difference to their decision, and in that case the torn and damaged cloth shall be delivered to his Attorney on paying down the sum at which it shall be appraised or the whole shall be sold at Outcry for Mr. Cooke's Account, but if he should refuse to give such security you are then to demand of him payment of the full amount of the cloth as it stands charged to the Company.

We have appointed M^r. Charles Turner to supply the place in your Council which is to come vacant by the Suspension of M^r. Cooke you will appoint the most proper person to take charge of the Warehouses, M^r. Turner will proceed to you by the very first opportunity.

All your turned out Cloth must be kept in the warehouse as we before directed untill we are certain of a sufficient quantity of the proper sortments for the January dispatch.

By all means supply Captain Hislop with the Gunnies necessary to Shelter the people from the Inclemency of the weather, as to the Hospital, you did right in not granting one in Tenepatam, we see no reason why the sick may not be as well accommodated at Cuddalore and therefore you will give proper Orders for their reception there. You have not yet sent us your Account Quick Stock, dispatch it to Us immediately.

Worshipfull Sir & Sirs

Para. 1. By the Prince George, Prince Edward and Orange Tree Sloop we have reced Letters from the Supravizors and Council dated 12 Febry. 12 May, and 6 August and from the Supravizors, Seperate Advices dated the 12 Febry, 13 May and 6 August, containing a Summary of their Transactions and a state of the Companys Affairs under your Management on all which we shall now give you our Sentiments & directions with such other Advices as are proper for your future Conduct.

FIRST CONCERNING SHIPPING.

- 2. Our Honble Masters Ship Prince George Captain Edward Burman is mow under dispatch to you with the several Consignments particularized in the Invoice We would have her returned to Us with all possible dispatch as we intend she shall make a second Trip to you, which if you are expeditious in unloading her and no unforeseen Accid^t. should happen may very Easily be effected in good time for her to be back here again, proceed to the Bay to refit if necessary and return to receive our dispatches next October.
- 3. The late dispatch of the Dragon has been attended with the loss of her passage round the Cape, she was spoke with at Madagascar by one of the Ships arrived here from Europe, we plainly perceive that this will generally be the consequence if the ship destined to take in your Surplus Pepper should touch here in her way from the Bay for our Advices, to avoid that Hazard we have therefore wrote to the Gentlemen at Bengal to dispatch a Ship to you directly as early as possible that her passage home may not be endanger'd.
- 4. We have also desired them to send up a Ship early in January which we intend to dispatch to you with a Cargo of Salt, and then to proceed to Canton.
- 5. The Plan proposed by the Supravizors to the Court of Directors of sending a Ship to arrive with Us in March and to be dispatched directly from hence so as to be with you by the End of September to take in your Surplus Pepper might answer very well upon a supposition that we were in a Condition to put so much Tonnage on board there as with your Surplus might compleat her Charterparty Tonnage but that we neither are nor have any prospect of being able to effect during the Troubles on this Coast, as the Ship we fill up in January or February constantly clears our warehouses; the method we have now fallen on of sending you a Ship directly from the Bay in Decem^r. or early in January will answer full as well provided she meet with no unusual delays on your Coast.
- 6. The Want of proper vessells or the Ill management of those you have must constantly lay you under great difficulties in transporting the pepper from the Subordinacys to Marlbro, the Ship from Europe may therefore continue to make her Trip to the Northward to take in the Pepper at Laye, Bental, Priamong, Ippoe and Moco Moco, return to Marlbro, receive what may be ready there, then to proceed to Manna Cawoor or Croee and be dispatched from thence to Europe.
- 7. We concur in opinion with the Supravizors that two Vessells of about fifty Tons and two or three Long boats may be serviceable if properly managed for bringing up pepper at other Seasons supplying the Subordinates with Stores &ca. and as we observe that one of your sloops is much out of Repair we shall endeavour to procure and send you one in her room as well as the Long boats but the Intent of supplying you with these Vessells will be in a great measure frustrated unless proper care be taken to keep them in good order and repair.

this we apprehend may be very well done at Marlbro when you are supplied with Timber and Plank from Batavia and Naval Stores from hence, the Unhealthyness of Poolo renders that place improper, and Billingbing is too much exposed, so that notwithstanding these places in respect to the commodiousness of the Harbours have greatly the Advantage of Marlbro upon the whole we think the latter has the preference, and when any such material repairs are necessary, as cannot be done there the vessells may then be sent to Batavia, but it will rest with you to see that such repairs are really wanted, and that the vessells are not sent to Batavia under pretence of repairing when the private Advantage of the Masters may be the point in View, they should constantly give receipts for all stores they are supplied with and account for all Deficiencysonce in six months.

SECONDLY OF GOODS FROM EUROPE FORT S^T. GEORGE, OR FROM ONE PART OF INDIA TO ANOTHER.

8. You will receive the Prince George a part only of the several Stores you have indented for, The Taffities, Chints Calcutta, Gunney Bags, Oyl, Ophium and two hundred and fifty Barrells of Gunpowder, we have requested the Gentⁿ. at Bengal to consign to you on the Ship to be dispatched from thence for your Surplus pepper, such of the other stores for (which we hope will be the greatest part) as can be procured against January we shall forward to you on the ship we propose dispatching from hence.

9. Though you have Indented but for fifty Chests of Patna Ophium we desired the Gentlemen at the Bay to send you Eighty which we don't doubt will

find an advantagious Sale.

10. The Bamboo Measure you sent Us having been tried with our Standard Measure we find that fourteen and an half Bamboo's make exactly one Parra. of 5 Mercalls and Eighty Paras being one Garce consequently eleven hundred and Sixty (1160) Bamboo's make one Garce, you will adjust the deficiency with Captain Burman (should any happen) agreable to this Calculation allowing him as is usual six \$\mathbb{P}\$ Cent for unavoidable wastage.

11. The Iron now consigned to you and that we shall send in January is not in such Barrs as you mention, we have none of the kind but shall Indent to Europe particularly for a quantity to supply you with for the Trade to Natal.

- 12. As You have a plentifull Stock of Grain on hand and you acquaint Us you can procure it at a cheaper rate from Batavia than what it costs in these parts we have not desired the Gentlemen at the Bay to send you any by the Ship for your Surplus pepper and in future we shall be guided by your Advices whether or not to send you any supplies of Grain, you will therefore constantly acquaint Us at what rates that Article is procurable at Batavia that in case of a Scarcity there we may provide accordingly.
- 13. An Annual Supply of Timber & Plank may be brought to you from Batavia in the Store Ship sufficient we imagine to answer all your purposes unless it should be resolved to set about the New Buildings represented to be necessary; when the proper Means of procuring materials will also come under Consideration.

14. Our demand for Madeira Wine this season has been so large for the-Army that we have not any remaining. We shall in future readily supply you when any can be spared.

15. The quantity of Salt we shall send you in January with what you will receive by the Prince George may probably exceed what you may write for; but as it is an Article much in demand we do not conceive it will be any burthen, bevery particular in your Advices in this head.

- 16. Our Mint has been so much engaged in coining the Treasure from Europe for Begnal that we have not been able to set about the Coining of Fanams or Copper Cash but we hope by the January Ship to send you a supply.
- 17. The Musters of Arrack you sent us have been sold at Outcry and produced 36 Pagodas & Leager whatever quantity of that Article and Sugar you have received from the Undertakers of those works may be consigned to Us by the Prince George.
- 18. Agreable to your request we send you twenty Coffree Men Slaves, the training them up as Artificers is what we much approve and strongly recommend as they may by that means become very Usefull in carrying on the buildings and works which must necessarily be erected at your Settlement.
- 19. We have paid the Owners of the Prince Edward Two hundred and thirty five Pagodas thirty two fanams & two cash for the three hundred Timbers which you landed from that ship you will therefore credit Account Current Fort S^t. George for that Sum, and we shall debt you accordingly.
- 20. The Supravizors in their Letter of the 12th. February tell Us you have 25 or 30 large Maracooley Timbers of 30 Feet long and 12 Inches Square which are particularly proper for Piles by not admitting the worm, As you will be in want of such Timbers when your Buildings are taken in hand we think you will do best to keep them.
- 21. In Garbling the pepper there appears to be a quantity of it seperated which is represented to be light and not fit to be sent to Europe, we don't find that it is any where accounted for, if it cannot be better disposed of let it be sent hither on the Companys Account, in your next Advices Explain this Affair to Us.

THIRDLY TOUCHING INVESTMENTS.

- 22. The first remark that occurs to Us under this head is that the decline of the Investment to the great Loss of the Company hath manifestly arisen from the want of Annual Surveys by Covenanted Servants, Moco Moco, Bantal & Ippoe are the only Districts that have their due Number of Vines, Cattown, Tallo. Croe are greatly deficient, and Laye, Sillebar & Marlbro districts seem to have been totally neglected, we cannot therefore too strongly insist on Annual Surveys being taken by Covenanted Servants, and upon those Surveys wherever it appears that the Inhabitants have been negligent the Dupattaies of the Dosoons should feel the Effects of a severe resentment, and on the other hand those who perform their Contracts should be rewarded and encouraged, a few presents on such Occasions bestowed on the most deserving may have a good Effect, by strictly adhering to these Rules it seems more than probable to Us the Investment may in due time be near doubled and as this must in a great measure depend on the Vigilance of the several Residents and those who make the Surveys you must observe annually to send Us the several Reports of them with a particular State of the Vines, their Increase or decrease since the last surveys and the cause thereof our Observations thereon we shall transmit to our Honble Masters and shall not fail therein to recommend to their favourable Notice such of their Servants who by their prudent management of the Districts committed to their Charge shall have made the greatest Progress in the Investment, the fatigue attending these Surveys we are sensible must be great, and certainly ought to be alleviated as much as possible, by the Assistance of one or more if necessary of the Military and a reasonable Allowance should be made for the charges attending it.
- 23. The receiving of pepper at the Subordinates only at stipulated time, was certainly a great discouragem^t to the Planters, the Orders made by the Supravizors, that the Residents be always ready to receive whatever quantitys the Planters may bring in is very proper & must be strictly observed, the planters must be paid in ready money and strict Justice done them in the weighs, and garbling the pepper.

- 24. The Supra Vizors Observations is very just that no certain time can be fixed for the renewal of Vines at all places alike, the situation and soil will doubtless bring some to Maturity much Sooner in one place than another it should therefore be recommended to the several Residents & those who take the Surveys to observe and be particular in their reports as to the growth of the Vines, and the Inhabitants should be obliged to renew them whenever there is a real occasion.
- 25. The more numerous the Inhabitants become the greater will be the prospect of an Increase in the Investment, we take due notice of the Supravizors observation that their [sic] are many Clans of Industrious people inhabiting the hills at the backs of all the Residencys, who by proper encouragement might be brought to settle on the Coast; We strongly recommend it to you to effect this if possible, a well timed liberallity may be a powerfull Inducement, the Example of a few properly encouraged and protected from the Tyrannical disposition of the Pangarans may tempt others to partake of the likebenefits therefore you should have a watchfull Eye over the first who may accept the Invitation to settle with you.

FOURTHLY OF COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

- 26. We are the rather induced to flatter ourselves, the prudent Steps taken by the Supravizors for restoring the Investment will be attended with Success as the whole Country is at present in profound peace, to keep it so requires your Serious Attention, the troubles which it is apprehended may arise on the Sultan of Moco Moco's death, by a Competition of his Sons for the Government may probably be prevented by a timely interposition before the Spirit of War and Commotion shews itself on either Side.
- 27. The Sultan of Manam Caboo being the Prince of the Several Countries wherein the Companys Settlements are Situated, a friendly Correspondence should be kept up and a Good Understanding cultivated with him, if you are not possessed of proper Grants for the several Settlements watch a proper opportunity to solicit and obtain them from him.
- 28. The General & Council of Batavia not having returned any Answer before your last dispatches to the Supravizors Letter we are not sufficiently informed of the particulars of their claims to give a determinate Opinion thus far we can say that if the Dutch should not bring more substantial Proofs of their Right than those already offered we think our Claim and pretensions just and they are therefore in such case to be supported.
- 29. But though our Right to Natal should be ever so just and incontestable, yet the Conduct of the late Deputy Governour and Council is highly inexcuseablein daring under a specious pretence of extending the Companys Limits & encreasing their pepper Investment; to occupy this place at a great Expence purely to serve their private Interest & Support a Trade for private Emolument at their Masters Cost, this is very evidently the Case, since it has been more than once acknowledged that very little pepper is or can be procured there, indeed we are now told, and the Supravizors confirm it, that a Considerable Advantage may arise to the Company by reserving to themselves an exclusive Right to the Trade or Iron Salt and Ophium and levying a Custom on piece-Goods Imported there, the Affair is now gone too far to be retracted, and therefore the Settlement must be continued. We shall endeavour constantly to supply you with the aforementioned Articles on the Companys Account, and on piece goods imported there by the Companys Servants (to whom alone the Trade in such Goods is reserved) a Duty must be levied of five \$\mathbb{P}\$ Cent unless that Duty should have been paid before at Marlbro.
- Natal and exclude Foreigners from the Advantage of it, the most effectual means would be to vend the Companys there at an Advance of 50 \$\mathbb{P}\$ Cent only on the

prime Cost, the reasons offered in support of this proposal are not of sufficient weight to Ballance those against it, the bad use that might be made of such a limitation is too obvious to need a remark, we can make this Regulation whenever we experience it to be necessary, but till we find it so we julge it best to sell the Companys Ophium for the most it will fetch; As the success of this Scheme will depend greatly on the faithfull Execution of it, your greatest Attention is requisite to see that the Companys property be not made subservient to private gain, at the same time we must observe that the benefits which may arise to private Traders by this Settlement we are of Opinion will have due weight with our Honble Masters in determining them to continue it provided it be made appear that the Advantages to be gained by the Company are equal to the Charge and Hazard of the Undertaking.

- 31. We have advised the Gentlemen at Bengal that the Importation of piece Goods at the Companys Settlements on the West Coast of Sumatra is prohibited except such as may be manifested here and consigned to the Companys Servants there, and that the Trade in Ophium is entirely reserv'd to the Company, on receipt of this you will therefore give publick Notice at Marlbro and all the Subordinates that all piece Goods not Manifested shall be liable to Seizure and Confiscation, and that whosoever shall be detected in vending Ophium Iron or Salt (which are reserved to the Company) if a Covenanted Servant he shall be immediately suspended from the Service and if a person in the Seafaring or any other way he shall be deprived of his Employs & excluded from the priviledge of the Companys protection, which notice you are to execute with Rigour.
- 32. We shall remonstrate to the King of Acheen the Villany and barbarity of the people at Sinhell, and give him to understand that unless we are treated with that Friendship he professes, and that security to the persons and Effects of our Traders be assured in his Ports, we shall not be at a Loss to do ourselves ample Justice.

FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS, BUILDINGS REPAIRS AND REVENUES.

- 33. We observe with Concern the decayed state of the Buildings at Marlbro' as well as the Several Subordinates, the restoring these or erecting New, is a work of such Consequence that we do not think it adviseable to proceed in it without the directions of our Honble Masters, We shall therefore referr it to them, and till we receive their Orders no new Buildings are to be undertaken but as there appears an absolute necessity for some temporary repairs such as cannot well be deferred may be made amongst which proper accommodations for the Companys Servants Civil and Military and the Storehouses seem unavoidable.
- 34. Instead of the rates of Dutys settled by the Supravizors we are of Opinion it would be better to put the Settlements on the West Coast of Sumatra on the same footing as at this place from the receipt of this Letter you will therefore observe as a fixed regulation and give proper notice accordingly that all Goods and Merchandize of what nature or kind soever (except only provisions & Necessarys for apparel imported by the Storeship which are exempt from any Tax) are to pay a Duty of five # Cent on Importation which duty is to be computed upon the price Current of the several species of Merchandize at Marlbro that all Goods not manifested from this place or from one of the Companys Settlements on the West Coast to another be liable to Seizure and Confiscation two thirds thereof to the Use of the Company and one third to the person who shall detect any Goods clandestinely landed, that when any goods so manifested and imported shall be again exported they are to be manifested and a Certificate shall be granted by the proper Officer that such Goods have already paid the Companys Duty of 5 | Cent which Manifest & Certificate shall exempt them from any further Duty at the Settlement where they may be landed.

- 35. The Supra Vizors remark that the Importation of Buggness, Java and such like Cloating had long been prohibited, but they are not able to trace from whence that prohibition took its rise, however they revoked it and substituted a duty of 15 \$\mathbb{B}\$ Cent in Lieu which may be continued and you must advise Us whether any very considerable quantitys are imported under this new Regulation and how far it may affect the Trade in piece Goods from hence.
- 36. You represent the Arrack & Sugar Works to be in a flourishing Condition and with proper encouragement and Support may become very considerable we could wish you had extended your Observations and enquired a little further and informed Us what are the Advantages that our Honble Masters may probably reap from this Undertaking should it meet with the Success that may be reasonably expected the Managers will doubtless be amply rewarded for their Industry by the gain that must arise on the sale of their Manufacture, whilst the whole risque in bringing it to perfection is the Companys, by the Advances of cash that have and are proposed to be made for which they receive an Interest of ten # Cent and are paid off in Arrack & Sugar, those Articles are generally sold at Batavia the former from forty to forty five Rix Dollars # Leager of 150 Gallons, the latter at four and a half to five Rix Dollars \(\mathbb{P}\) Pecul at Marlbro' the Arrack is Invoiced at Sixty Spanish Dollars # Leager of 160 Gallons and Sugar @ 5 pecul the Medium prices of these Articles here may be reckoned from 35 to 40 Pagodas # Leager of Arrack, and from 13 to 15 Pagods. # Candy of Sugar the profits arising from these Sales do not seem adiquate to the risque of the undertaking, let this be a subject for your future enquiry and give Us your sentiments minutely on this manufacture with respect to the Advantages that may accrue to the Company, the gain that may arise to the Undertaker and the benefits to the Settlement in general, in the mean time on the representation of the Supravizors we are for giving the work all the encouragement & therefore if you apprehend the Interest of ten # Cent with which their debt is charged too heavy a Burthen for the Undertakers to bear it may be reduced to five, but then we expect you, will make it plainly appear the Company can be no losers; and that we may the better be enabled to Judge of the progress made in these works an Annual Account should be sent Us of the produce and an Account Current between the Company and the Contractors.

SIXTHLY OF FACTORS, WRITERS MILITARY OFFICERS AND THEIR ACCOUNTS.

- 37. How far Mr. Hindleys Transactions with Mr. Hurlock may be construed a pecuniary Consideration we shall not now determine, but as Mr. Hindleys bad circumstances are alone sufficient to disqualify him for so weighty a charge as that of Government we approve of his dismission from the service, however as it does not appear to Us that he has been realy guilty of any intentional fraud in the management of the Companys Affairs, tho' most of the Abuses & Neglects that in his time have crept in may be charged on his remissness, and as he is become destitute of support by the surrender of his Affairs into the hands of Trustees we confirm the Allowce. made him of fifty Dollars Month untill our Honble Masters pleasure be known.
- 38. Tho' Mr. Coombe's Conduct in regard to the Contract between Mr. Hindley and Mr. Hurlock may justly expose him to Censure in his private character yet when considered as a Transaction regarding the publick it was his duty to acquaint the Company of it, it would indeed have been more conformable to their Orders had he immediately disclosed, it the Contract would then probably have been dropp'd and many personal reflections and Animosities avoided and therefore he seems so far blameable.
- 39. We think it highly necessary that the regulations made by the Supra Vizors should be carried into execution under the Eye of one of them at least and we do therefore confirm John Pybus Esqr. in that Station and till our Honble Masters directions be received, in regard to their Servants on the West

- Coast, Mr. Combes's good Services and pretentions to the Succession will doubtless have due weight with them and it is therefore needless for Us to say anything on that subject.
- 40. Mr. Masseys Conduct was certainly highly blameable and we approve of the Supravizors confirming his Dismission, the precedent cannot be pleaded in excuse it may be admitted in some Cases as an Aleviation and particularly so in Mr. Masseys, who having delivered over his Effects to Trustees, to make good his deficiencys, an Allowe. of 30 Dollars \(\beta\) Month for his present Support until the Companys directions be received, is not unreasonable.
- 41. Mr. Daniel Tottie has presented to Us a Complaint of great Injustice done him in the Appointment of Mr. Darvall to the Residency of Manna, we do not find any objections made to Mr. Totties behaviour or Capacity but the chief reason for superceeding him seems to have been that Mr. Darvall had been before Assistant to the Resident the same reason then as Mr. Tottie observes might have supported his claim had he made one to the Residency of Moco Moco, but what surprizes Us still more is that when Mr. Darvalls Services were necessary at Marlbro to conduct the Secretarys employ upon an Emergency, he was at the same time continued in the Residency at Manna, Stations that cannot possibly be executed by one person since both require a Constant Attendance on the Spot. Mr. Tottie has since been admitted to a Seat at the Board, which is a Tacit acknowledgment that there are no Objections against him and therefore we cannot avoid condemning the proceedings with respect to that Gentlemen, we do not lay down this principle as a rule not to be broken, particular Merit and Capacity ought on some Occasions to be preferr'd but as Superiour Stations should in general be the reward of long services we shall expect that very just reaons be given for any deviation, for if partiallity be suffered to take place, what Security or Encouragement has Merit or Length of Service; on receipt of this you will therefore do Justice to Mr. Tottie or Assign better reasons than those already given.
- 42. As Captain Lieutenant Gabbet acted by Order of his superiours it would be a great hardship to make him refund the pay he received by their Authority it is not therefore to be demanded of him and we are so well satisfied with his behaviour that if our Honble Masters had not Ordered an Officer from St. Helena to fill the Vacancy we should think him entitled to it.
- 43. Jesiah Smith whom you tell Us you kept in prison being charged with the Murder of a Coffree Woman, must be sent to England.
- 44. We observe the Supra Vizors have appointed a Court under the denomination of a Court of Justice, consisting of the members of the Council or any three of them who are to decide all cases of property under the sum of two hundred Dollars leaving a Liberty of Appeal to the Deputy Governour and Council from the Judgement of that Court in Causes above fifty Dollars, this Court is also invested with a power to inflict punishments for petty Crimes & Misdemeanours, upon all which we must remark, that the erecting a Court of Judicature is of so serious a nature that without a legal Authority it ought not to be attempted, and it is very certain that neither you nor we have any; this New Court must therefore on receipt of this be abolished, but as it is necessary some means should be thought of to maintain good Order in the Community and to adjust disputes relating to property this power had better be lodged with the Supra Vizor or Deputy Governour and Council who in that Capacity may hear and determine petty crimes & inflict punishments, and in regard to property, the decision of such disputes between Europeans may be recommended to Arbitrators, and between the Natives, three of the head Men may be joined with the Supra Vizor or Deputy Governour and Council observing that in all Cases where Europeans may be concerned the English Laws are to be strictly adhered

SEVENTHLY OF ACCOUNTS.

- 45. The manner in which the Treasure from Europe appears to have been brought to Account is a glaring instance of the Negligence and irregularity which prevail'd at Marlbro', in future the Treasure should be counted in the presence of the Deputy Governour and Council and mention made in the Minutes of Consultation that it is done so.
- 46. The Supra Vizors did very right in ordering the deficiency of Copper Cash to be made good by the board. We observe the whole was not paid in care must be taken to collect it, and in future the Copper Cash must be put under the Charge of the Warehousekeeper a Head should be opened in his books for that purpose & Credited monthly for what delivered out as sold.
- 47. In the Sett of Consultations you have sent Us, the Cash Accounts for April May, June & July are not entered, a neglect that it is proper you should be made sensible of.
- 48. It appears that a Custom has prevailed of selling the Companys Stores to Inhabitants and others at so large an advance as forty ? Cent on the Companys price the Supra Vizors rightly judging this practice unjustifiable obliged Messrs. Gunn, Tottie & Idell to repay into Cash on that Account 391-1-96 but tho' it is equally evident that Mr. Combes has dealt largely that way no demand was made on him which seems very extraordinary for he has nothing more to say in his justification than the other Gentlemen, to wit that he bought them on his own Account and sold them in the same manner to the Native, we cannot perceive the equity in excusing one more than another and therefore Mr. Combes's Account must be adjusted in the same manner as the others, we must further remark that if the Storekeeper knowing the Company to be in want of any Articles buys them upon his own Account in order to sell them to the Company at an advanced price, & on the other hand if when he perceives any Articles in the Company's Storehouse are in demand to take them out in his own name in order to sell them at an advanced price leaving those that are likely to lay on hand, all this we say is a palpable abuse of the Companys Indulgence to their Servants to take out of the Storehouse at a moderate price what they may want for their own use.
- 49. In regard to the several deficiencys they appear to have been of so long standing, & so complicated that even the Supravizors could not trace them accurately and if they on the spot were at this difficulty 'tis impossible for us to determine on the Equity of their Orders in this respect, our Honble Masters with whom the final decision lies will give their directions on that head, one thing however is worthy remark, it is allowed by all that Mr. Henry Coales was an honest assiduous Man and that the remains were not taken till 6 Months after his death consequently the Storehouse must have been in other hands for that time it therefore seems unjust to charge his Estate with any deficiency, but after it had been determined to charge it, we could have wished the compulsive means used to force a Bond out of the hands of his Executors had been omitted, it would have been better had the demand made on those Gentlemen and their refusal been submitted to our Honble Masters, the case shall be referred to them and therefore the Bond must be returned to Mr. Coales's Executors.
- 50. The Reduction of Expences appears very considerable but above half of it comes under the head of Charges Garrison and Country Guard, the Garrisons at Marlborough Moco Moco, Manna and Natal appear full small for such an extent of Country, the Malays are remarkable for Treachery, we cannot therefore by any means think it adviseable under a notion of saving to expose those Settlements to any danger, and when it is considered that there are now but 29 Compys. Servants and the Supra Vizors represent 42 to be necessary the reduction in Expences upon the whole is for the greatest part only temporary. we would certainly on all occasions recommend economy and the lessening of

Expences but at the same time we must observe that the principal object should be the Increase of the Investment, which it is generally allowed might with proper management be at least doubled, the Advantages of such an Increase would give an ample Compensation for the Necessary Charges attending it.

51. A List of Adjustments shall be sent you in January.

SUPPLEMENT.

- 52. We must in Justice to the Supra Vizors acknowledge that they have gone through the Business of their Charge with spirit and Jugdement and in general to our satisfaction, but still the path is only marked out and it remains with you to see the several Regulations that have been made carried into Execution, we could have wished it had been possible for one of the Supra Vizors to have visited the several Subordinates, it would have given them a clear and extensive knowledge of what they have now only from Report it is a work that still continues necessary and we recommend it to Mr. Pybus when he can be spared from Marlbro' to visit such of them as his other Avocations will admit of.
- 53. We at first intended to have dispatched the Prince George directly to you but when we considered that by delivering the Salt at Natal the Charge & difficulty of transporting it thither from Marlbro will be saved we have ordered Captain Burman to touch first at Natal for that purpose and then proceed directly to you.
- 54. Mess^{rs}. Walsh and Vansittart having purchased a Parcell of Ophium for the West Coast before the prohibition was made public we have permitted them to consign it to their Correspondents as appears by the Manifest.
- 55. We have reimbursed Captain Burman the Charges of repairing the Marlbro Hoy at Batavia amounting to \$\mathbb{H}\$ 355-23 or Pagodas 236 25 30 for which sum you will credit account Current Fort St. George.

We depend on your greatest Care that the Merchants keep the Cloth up to the lengths you mention and hope as the Country about you is pretty quiet you will be able to make a Considerable Investment by the Month of January.

Colonel Bagshaw has represented to Us that the unlimitted Sale of Arrack and Spirituous Liquors at Cuddalore is attended with very pernicious Consequences to his Majestys Troops, and requests that it may be regulated it is most reasonable and necessary it should and you will therefore oblige the Farmers of the Arrack &ca. to adhere strictly to the terms of their Cowle, wherein is particularly specified the Number and Situation of Houses where they are to vend Spirituous Liquors, and you are to license such a Number of Publick houses only, as many be necessary or convenient, a List of the Names of those whom you shall license to keep such houses, must be delivered to the Commander in Chief who will when he sees convenient order proper persons to examine whether the Liquors sold be genuine and upon any Complaint made to you by him of adulterated Liquors found there you are immediately to suppress such houses. Give Publick Notice of this regulation and if afterwards any person whatsoever not licensed be detected in vending Spirituous liquor let them be punished in an exemplary manner to deter others.

SIR.

The Cuddalore Sloop arrived here the 8th. and the Porto Bello the 18 of Last Month, by them we have received your Letters of the 18th. August & 2^d. September.

We wrote to the Gentlemen at Bengal to relieve the Egmont and they acquaint Us in Answer that they had appointed the Denham Captain Meard, to proceed on that Service and should send you a supply of provisions & refreshments.

As we observe you found the Arcot Snow on examining her bottom, sound and have now made her a tight and serviceable Vessell we do not imagine you have any Occasion or can find Employment for both the Cuddalore and Porto Bello Sloops, we have therefore sent the latter to Bengal to be repaired and return'd to Us in January, when if there should be occasion we shall dispatch her to you and not otherwise.

The Gentlemen at Bengal write Us that Timber and Plank may generally turn to good Account there, & desire we will give you directions to procure as large a quantity as possible to be forwarded them on the return of the Denham we suppose they will advise you particularly what kinds will Answer best, and you will comply with their Indents as far as possible.

We refer you to the accompanying Invoice for the particulars of what we now consign you by the Cuddalore, we do not mean the Treasure as a full supply, it will be sufficient we hope to answer your present demands, and we shall send you a further sum by the first good Conveyance that may offer in January, when you should also have a supply of Copper Cash, at present the Scarcity of that Coin prevents our furnishing you with any, but we have complied with your request for fanams and the quantity we send you will we imagine be very sufficient to answer your purposes.

We observe your Accounts are kept in Rups. Quarters and Reis, but are at a Loss to account for the reason, that Method is practiced at Bombay with which you have no connection, but at this place and Bengal, Rupees, Annaes and Pice are the usual denominations.

Mr. Knapton deserves Censure for not Complying with our directions when you signified them to him for taking a compleat Survey of the Island, nothing could be more material to Us in forming a Judgment of the place, for the principal settlement, however from what we learn by your descriptions, Mr. Taylors Accounts, and the drafts deliver'd us by Captain Grierson and Hammond we do not hesitate to pronounce the place where you now are, very improper for a settlement; the NE or more Northerly point seems to have the most advantagious situation for that purpose of any place upon the Island, and therefore unless any new and unforeseen difficultys should arise, we would have you remove to that spot, but if any obstacle should present that may seem material to you, in that case we leave it you to remove to any other part of the Island you may think best, in our Judgement the NW point is the properest if it cannot be effected at the NE but tho' this latter may want some advantages which are to be found at the former the goodness and safety of the Harbour at the NE by far outweighs them all. As our Opinions in this respect are but Speculative and your Observations do not amount to a sufficient degree of certainty, we would avoid putting our Honble Masters to any greater Expence than the Nature of the case may absolutely require and therefore wherever you may remove to, no other Fortifications or Buildings are to be erected than such as may be immediately necessary for your present defence against an Enemy, and to put yourselves under commodious shelter from the Inclemency of the Weather, untill time and experience have shown the Advantages and Inconveniencys of the spot you may chuse, make it your study to find out these and describe them to Us very particularly.

Coja Nicoos sailed from this place the latter end of July, we wrote you by him the 25th. of that Month and enclosed a Copy of the Articles which he gave Us reason to hope the King would accede to, another Copy of them accompanys this, it has since occurred to Us that the Court of Pegue jealous of the power of foreigners may insist on the exercise of their Laws at Persaim, should that point be started wave it if possible it will be a much properer time for us to discuss it when we are in actual Possession.

Notwithstanding the Advantages gained by the Burmurs and the tottering Condition of the Pegue Government we would have you embrace any favourable Opportunity that may present of concluding the abovementioned Articles with the latter but at the same time let your Friendship to them appear more from professions than Acts, that no Cause of Umbrage may be given the Burmurs, for in case of a revolution our attachments to their Enemies would not fail to be set up against Us, let the advantages turn on which side they may it must be your policy not to interfere directly or indirectly in the quarrell for as we have not a force sufficient to turn the Ballance on either side we should only shew our weakness by intermeddling, and create Enemys where perhaps we might have found friends.

We approve of your Ordering Mr. Henry Stringfellow to take charge of the Flag & Companys Effects at Syrian; as it is of no other Consequence than merely supports, our right to the Factory there, he is not to have any Allowance or gratuity, the Title of Resident has been thought sufficient and perhaps may bring some advantages with it equal to the trouble, we have in our former Advices acquainted you & repeat that during the unsettled state of the Government no Money is to be laid out in repairs or Buildings either at Syrian or Persaim except such trifles as may be necessary for immediate shelter.

It is proper somebody should be at Persaim, if Captain Baker answers the purpose you may continue him or appoint such person as may best suit with the Circumstances of your Affairs. We are very sensible an assistant is necessary at the Nagrais and we should have sent you one before, but that we have not a sufficient Number of Covenanted Servants to transact our own Affairs, since the receipt of your Advices we have endeavoured to procure a Monthly Writer but hitherto without Effect, if we can prevail on any to accept that service you shall have one in January.

We have appointed M^r . John Dyer an Ensign on the Negrais Establishment and he takes his passage on the Cuddalore with six Military, One Serjeant of Artillery and five men of the Train which is all we can spare, Lieut. Bilhock has our permission to return to the Coast if his health requires it, and in that Case Lieut. North will have the Command. We have no Artillery Officer to send you in the room of M^r . Knapton.

Your Letters of the 10th. 26th. & 29th. September and 12th. October are received, the George with your Bales arrived here the 10th. October. The difficulty in landing Goods at that Season of the Year cannot have escaped the Observation of any one, it can be done only in the Intervals of fair Weather which are not very frequent, and even then the surf is not always passable; under such Circumstances every means should be used in the Stowage of the Ship, that no Impediments might arrise on that Account, but there had been so little regard paid to this in the loading your Vessell that it was full three weeks before the Bales could be got ashore; we were in hopes our Observations

on your Cloth last Year, and the strict directions sent you this Season, would have had a better Effect, but so far has it been from producing any Amendment, that had we not been distressed for Bales to make up the Norfolks Tonnage, the greatest part of your Cloth must have been rejected; 'tis in vain to plead the troubles in the Country, the Effects of them have been felt at Vizagapatam as well as round you, and yet the Cloth from thence far surpasses yours, and so does that from Bandarmalanka tho' not so considerably; we forbear any further reflections on this subject, because what we have already said is sufficient to suggest to you what our Honble Masters Interest demands, if a very considerable Amendment should not appear.

The Information you have sent Us in relation to Coja Shaumir Sultan has enabled Us to state that Affair fully to our Honble Masters.

As your Honour &ca. acquaint Us you apprehend some difficulty will attend the disposal of the Woollen Goods you expect this season from Europe, We shall not send round to you any part of what we have on hand tho' it is likely to remain in our Warehouse a long time, it is with Concern we observe that the three Presidencys are now so overstocked with this Article that with the quantity which must be sent out annually there is reason to fear this branch of Trade will suffer from it greatly for some years to come.

We intended to have dispatched the Norfolk to England before the breaking up of the Monsoon, but the Situation our Affairs with respect to the French being at such a Crisis as made it necessary to send the Company some particular Advices which we have been in daily hopes to do, we have detained that Ship in our Road till now but expect to dispatch her shortly.

As much may depend on our Military Strength, in case the state of your Forces will admit of sending Us a further supply of Men, we shall be obliged to your Honour &ca. for as many Europeans as you can spare, particularly of the Train, but no Topasses or Seapoys.

We omitted to acquaint you in our last that being in want of Officers we had detained Capt. Lee of your Establishment, who is now at Camp.
