Subject: Annual Administration Report for 1946-47.

I submit herewith the Annual Administration Report on the working of co-operative societies in the Bombay Province for the year ended 30th June 1947.

I. GENERAL PROGRESS OF THE MOVEMENT.

- 2. The year under report was eventful in the history of co-operation in this province; the report of the Co-operative Planning Committee appointed by the Government of India under the Chairmanship of Mr. R. G. Saraiya containing very valuable recommendations for the acceleration of co-operative effort in different departments of rural and urban economy, was published during the year. So far as this province is concerned, several of these recommendations were already in the process of implementation in one form or the other as a part of the post-war plans. The most important schemes which engaged the attention of the Department were (1) provision of facilities for training in theory and practice of co-operation, (2) extension of the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act, (3) development of co-operative marketing and (4) rehabilitation of cottage and small-scale industries.
- 3. Another important direction in which the Department had to devote attention was with regard to the steps to be taken to implement the recommendations made by the Agricultural Finance Sub-Committee appointed by the Government of India, for the provision of crop and land development finance to cultivators at 6 and 4 per cent. respectively. On the publication of the report of the Agricultural Finance Sub-Committee, the Department sought advice of the Bombay Co-operative Banks' Association whether the Co-operative Financing agencies or an agricultural credit corporation should undertake this work on the lines indicated by the Sub-Committee. In pursuance of the suggestions made by the Bombay Co-operative Banks' Association, Government appointed a Special Committee under the chairmanship of Sir Manilal Nanavati to examine the questions raised by the Association and to recommend the terms on which and the extent to which Government assistance should be provided to Co-operative Banks in this province and to suggest amendments and modification; in the existing constitution of the Provincial Bank, central banks and land mortgage banks to enable co-operative banks to provide agricultural credit on the envisaged by the Gadgil Committee. The report of this Committee which was published after the close of the year has been examined by Government and orders of Government on the recommendations of the committee have since been issued.
- 4. Side by side with the general work of organisation and implementation of the post-war plans, the attention of Government and department was concentrated on the need for evolving a comprehensive scheme for co-operative training and

education as an essential pre-requisite to large-scale expansion of the co-operative movement on sound lines. Government accepted almost in toto, recommendations made by the Madan Committee in relation to the provision of training of personnel, propaganda and research.

- 5. On the whole, the year under report was characterised by a considerable expansion of the movement in various spheres of co-operative activities. 761 societies were registered as against 31 ordered to be wound up. The number of co-operative societies as on 30th June 1947 was 8003 showing a net increase of 749 over the previous year's figure.
- 6. Table 'B' indicates the progress of the movement during the year. It will be not ced that there is an all round increase in membership, share capital, reserve and other funds. There is also an increase in the working capital of all types of societies, except in the case of institutions mentioned in category (1) viz., Central Banks and Provincial Bank where the decline in the total working capital is due to the withdrawals of deposits from the Provincial Co-operative Bank which has more than offset the increase both in the case of Central Banks and Provincial Land Mortgage Bank. The sub-joined statement shows a classified list of societies, registered and ordered to be wound up during the year.

The increase is mostly marked in the number of thrift and credit and multipurpose societies in rural areas and is indicative of the steps taken to make arrangements for providing crop finance to the agriculturists under the scheme of extension of the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act. The Act which was originally in operation in 95 talukas has been extended to the whole of the province from 1st February 1947. On the non-credit side, the organisation of as many as 37 societies embracing various activities is also a satisfactory feature.

- 7. Efforts were also directed towards development of co-operative sale societies with a view to link up crop finance with marketing of agricultural produce. Plans drawn up for the marketing development in the province aim at providing each district with District Purchase and Sale Union or in the alternative one or two regional organisations that would cater to the needs of the well developed talukas in the district. Efforts were concentrated during the year, on perfecting the machinely, particularly in the direction of organisation of federations of Purchase and Sale Societies. Soon after the close of the year, one such federation for Kaira district was registered.
- 8. In addition to the schemes which aim at improving the rural credit and marketing machinery, with the appointment of a Special Joint Registrar for. Industrial Co-operatives and Village Industries, a vigorous drive was undertaken to implement comprehensive schemes for rehabilitation of cottage and small-scale industries. Details with regard to the progress made in this field of co-operative activities are given in part II of the Report.
- 9. In urban areas, the increase in the number of salary earners and urban societies shows a steady pace of expansion of this side of the movement. There has also been a growing demand for registration of co-operative housing societies though owing to difficulties in obtaining the necessary building materials etc. most of the newly registered societies have not been able to commence building operations. The recent orders of Government announcing the terms on which Government would finance housing societies organised for the benefit of the labour and the lower middle class families in the large industrial cities of the Province is expected to give a further fillip to this side of the movement.
- 10. The operation of controls over the distribution of foodgrains etc. and the orders of Government giving a distinct preference to co-operative societies over other agencies in the work of distribution continued to give a further stimulus to the consumers' movement which is evidenced by an increase in the number of these societies. The work of distribution of consumers' goods and food-grains, however, was not confined to consumers' societies only. Well managed credit societies in rural and urban areas also played a vital part in the work of distribution of consumers' goods, foodgrains, kerosene, sugar, etc. According to the figures supplied by the Civil Supplies Department out of a total of 3956 rural distribution centres as on 30th June 1947, 1369 were managed by co-operative societies.

12. With the extension of the application of the Bombay Agricultural Debtors' Relief Act to the whole of the Province from 1st February 1947, there has been felt a greater need for providing crop finance to the adjusted debtors in the province and this factor coupled with the growing conviction amongst the agriculturists in the value of co-operative effort as a solution of many of the economic ills from which the agriculturists are suffering, accounts for the growing demand for registraton of more societies in rural areas. There has been a net increase of 470 in the number of thrift and credit and multipurpose societies over the previous year's figure. thrift and credit societies and 150 multipurpose societies were registered during the year as against 10 societies ordered to be wound up. A satisfactory rise in membership is also noticed despite the continuance of the policy of removing recalcitrant defaulters from existing societies and reduction in the number of members brought about by the liquidation of a few societies. It is gratifying to note that the average membership of primary, thrift and credit and multi-purpose societies works out in this province, at 51 per society as against a target of 50 members for a primary society recommended by the All India Planning Committee. Members' deposits increased to the extent of Rs. 3,22,628 only over the previous year's figure while there has been a substantial increase in the amount of share capital which rose to Rs. 63,82,231 as against 51,44,610 of the preceeding year. Owing to the increase in the cost of cultivation coupled with an increase in the cost of living, agriculturists had to resort to increased borrowings. Again there was a large number of newly registered societies, the members of which were in need of finance much in excess of the resources of such societies. These two factors account for the increase in the amount of bank loan to the tune of 30.99 lakhs. There has also been an increase in the amount of deposits of non-members which rose from Rs. 19.85 lakhs to Rs. 20.62 lakhs, due to the fact that the well-to-do agriculturists in rural areas who have remained outside the movement and have more money in their hands are utilising the societies for investment of their surplus funds and also for the reason that the societies undertaking distribution work raised temporary deposits from such well-to-do agriculturists. The other outside liabilities stood at Rs. 8.25 lakhs as against Rs. 5.98 lakhs for the last year. These outside liabilities comprise of mainly deposit amounts kept under suspense for the purchase of lands in the possession of societies. The rise in the amount of owned resources has not, however, kept pace with the rise in the total working capital which rose by Rs. 54.86 lakhs and stood at Rs. 3,61,68,839. The percentage of owned resources, including members' deposits, to working capital, which had riven to 58.8 last year, has, as a result fallen to 55.8.

The process of enlarging the basis of agricultural credit and thrift societies in order to increase their utility to the agriculturists was continued during the year under report. A number of rural thrift and credit societies have made provision in their byelaws for undertaking additional items of work particularly relating to distribution of controlled and rationed articles, like foodgrains, sugar, kerosene, cloth, groundnut-cake in addition to the supply of credit.

13. The subjoined statement gives the figures for societies in different Assistant Registrar's Divisions as regards loan operation current demand, recoveries, arrears both extended and overdue.

From the above statement it will be seen that there is a substantial rise in the amount of total loan outstandings during the year under report. Similarly there is an appreciable increase in the figure of fresh finance made to members which is partly attributable to the registration of a number of fresh societies with a view to making crop finance available to adjusted debters under the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act and partly to the increasing demand for seasonal finance to members in the existing societies. The rise is also explained by the fact that agriculturists had to resort to societies to meet increased cost of cultivation. The amount due for repayment was 224 · 20 lakhs as against 191 · 74 lakhs during the preivous year, but the emount recovered exclusive of advance recoveries was 126.68 lakhs as against 100.03 lakhs the year before, showing an excess of recoveries during the year to the extent of Re. 26:35 lakhs. The percentage of recoveries to demand went up from 52 1 to 56.1 (f the total amount due for repayment during the year. Thus it will be noticed that the progress of recoveries is satisfactory for the Province, as a whole except in five of the Assistant Registrar's divisions where a setback is noticed, as a result of which unauthorised arrears have gone up as showa below:-

14. Unauthorised Arrears.—The reduction by 2.8 in the percentage of unauthorized overdues to the amount due for repayment cannot be taken to reflect a corresponding improvement in the position with regard to overdues because the amount of unauthoused overdues rose to Rs. 81 58 lakhs as against 75 31 lakhs of preceding year. In the Panch Mahals, however, the decline in the percentage of unauthorized arrears is actually accompanied by a real deterioration in the position of recoveries, as mentioned in the previous paragraph. It will be seen from the statement that the percentage of unauthorized overdues for the province as a whole has gone down from 29.2 to 36.4, showing an improvement of 2.8 only, though the percentage of recoveries to demand has gone up from 52.1 of the last year to 56.1 of the current year. Thus the percentage of unauthorized arrears to demand should have really gone down by 4 per cent. instead of 2.8 only, if the amount of extended arears also during the current year had remained the same as in the last year. But the amount for which extensions were granted last year stood at Rs. 16.38 lakhs as against Rs. 15:94 lakhs during the current year, thus resulting in their shrinkage to the extent of about 1.2 per cent, in the amount of extended arrears to the amount due for repayment. The amount due for repayment during the current year exceeded the last year's figure by 32.47 lakhs, whereas recoveries during the current year were only 26.65 lakhs in excess of the collections during the last year. Thus recoveries fell short by 5.82 lakhs as a sequel to this fall in recoveries and shrinkage of percentage in the extended arrears during the current year, unauthorised arrears went up from 75.31 lakhs to 80.51 lakhs; Considering the very large amounts to be recovered this year, in excess of the figures for the preceding year, the position with regard to recoveries cannot be considered as unsatisfactory. The reasons for deterioration in the amounts of unauthorised arrears during the current year are the same as those mentioned in the previous year's report.

AUDIT CLASSIFICATION.

15. The following statement gives the comparative position as regards audit classification of agricultural credit societies for the past two years:—

It will be seen from the figures disclosed in the statement that there is some improvement in the condition of societies. Of the 761 new societies registered, 77 societies were not audited while the number of A and B class societies have gene up by 75 and 385, respectively. The number of societies not classed fell by 39.

Separate figures compiled with regard to percentage of overdues of agricultural credit societies excluding land mortgage banks disclose that out of 5,263 societies there are as many as 1,569 societies (1,171) having no arrears, 350 societies (263) having arrears upto 5 per cent., 269 societies (341) with arrears ranging from 6 to 10 per cent., 632 societies (654) with arrears ranging from 11 to 25 per cent., 729 societies (940) having arrears between 26 to 50 per cent, and 1,624 societies (1,430) having arrears in excess of 50 per cent. (Figures in brackets represent corresponding figures for the previous year).

STATEMENT "A".

CLASSIFICATION OF DEBTS.

16. It will be seen from the above statement that frozen debts have gone down, by 3.83 lakhs and bad cum doubtful debts by 0.98 lakhs which indicates the progress a satisfactory improvement achieved in liquifying of frozen debts and collection of bad and doubtful debts. It is also gratifying to record that the abatement in the amount of bad debts was by about 0.37 lakhs. The total number of societies in which the debts were classified or revised stood at 4,670 as against 4,528 of the previous year:—

CANAL SOCIETIES.

- 17. With the registration of four new societies, the number of societies on the canals stood at 83 at the close of the year. On account of very high prices obtainable for Gur—the chief commercial crop of the tract, there has been a distinct improvmen in the working of societies in areas under the Deccan Canals. The number of members, share capital, Reserve Fund and Working Capital, recorded a satisfactory rise over the preceding year's figures. Deposits from members increased from Rs. 53,206 to Rs. 58,443 while the non-members' deposits, bad and doubtful debts, amounts under awards, amounts locked up in lands have decreased. The total loans advanced during the year amounted to Rs. 757,224 as against Rs. 513,824, the year before showing an increase of Rs. 244,000 on account of the rise in the cost of cultivation. This has also been reflected in the rise in the bank loan which recorded a rise from Rs. 418,527 to Rs. 497,315. The only fly in the ointment is a slight deterioration in the position of overdues which rose from Rs. 261.589 to Rs. 308,912 though the percentage of overdues to total loans outstandings, has gone down from 37.2 to 33.8.
- 18. Of the several factors that have brought about a satisfactory improvement in the condition of the societies on the canals, the most important one is the interest taken by the two big Purchase and Sale Unions viz., the Nira Canals, Purchase and Sale Union at Baramati and the Godavari and the Pravara Canals, Kharadi Vikri Sangh at Kopergan and their branches in the evolution of arrangement for the sale of produce brought to them by the members of the primaries in the area of operation. They encouraged the sale of produce through them by obtaining better prices and assisted recoveries of loans granted to members by the primaries. In addition, they continued to supply quality seed manure and other agricultural requisites and consumers' goods at reasonable prices to the members of primaries, thrift and credit societies.

18. The following table gives the main stations regarding the operation of societies on the Deccan Canals.

19. Bhil Societies.—Societies organised for Bhils are mostly concentrated in the East Khandesh and Panchmahals Districts. With the registration of four more societies in the Panch Mahals and 2 societies in West Khandesh, the total No. of societies increased from 151 to 157. Statistical information relating to the working of the Bhil Societies is given in the following table:—

The year under report recorded a further increase in the number of members and resources of these societies. The number of members has increased from 6,983 to 7,029, while the working capital shows an increase over the last year from Rs. 4,39,044 to Rs. 5,45,385. Demand for loans increased in these societies and Rs. 3,62,657 were advanced during the year as against Rs. 2,85,035 of the preceding year. There has been an appreciable increase in the amount of unauthorized arrears which went up from Rs. 99,057 to Rs. 1,37,781 owing to the failure of rabi crops both in the districts of Panch Mahals and West Khandesh. The perentage of recoveries to demand fell from 61 to 50 during the year and as a sequel to this the amount of overdues has increased. As mentioned in the last year's report, the advances and recoveries in kind continued to form a special feature of the loan operations of Bhil societies. The following table indicates the volume of loan operations in kind:—

Societies for other Backward Classes.

20. In addition to the societies organized for Bhils special societies have been established for the satisfaction of the needs of backward communities engaged in conservancy work, tanning, shoe-making and rope-making and for settlers in industrial settlements. The total number of such societies increased from 144 in the previous year to 167 at the end of the year under report. These societies had an aggregate working capital of Rs. 18,19,889 out of which their owned capital accounted for Rs. 11,32,795, while the loans due from members as at the close of the year under report recorded an increase from 11.75 lakhs to Rs. 14.03 lakhs. Inspite of the adverse effect of the high cost of living on the financial position of members of these societies, the reduction in the figure of unauthorized overdues which decreased from 1.65 lakhs as on 30th June 1946 to Rs. 1.26 lakhs as on 30th June 1947, is noteworthy.

^{22.} The number of multi-purpose societies rose from 264 to 414 during the year, while their membership increased from 20,295 to 35,082. There was a substantial increase in the share capital and deposits both of members and non-members. Amount of loans from central financing agencies, reserve and other funds, working capital have also gone up substantially. The total value of sales of agricultural, domestic and other requisites increased from 64 48 to 108 39 lakhs resulting in an increased commission to the tune of Rs. 1,31,655 as against 1,13,339 of the previous year. The amount of overdues also showed a rise from Rs. 167,256 to Rs. 2,24,578 though the percentage to outstandings came down by 3 over the previous year's figure. The same causes that have contributed to the growth of overdues in rural credit societies are also applicable to the overdues in multi-purpose societies.

23. The working of a few multi-purpose societies will be of interest in this connection.

The Navalgund Group Co-operative Multi-purpose Society did good work during the year. It had a share capital of Rs. 3,090 and working capital of Rs. 65,000 at the close of the year. In its distribution section, it effected purchases and sales to the extent of Rs. 2,12,928 and 1,88,209 respectively. It made advances to members for agricultural operations, provided crop finance to Agricultural debtors under the

Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act, effected sales of agricultural produce on a commission basis and made advances against agricultural products. It also did the work of distribution of improved seeds, groundnut cake manure. It also did the business of purchase and sale of various account books required by the societies in Navalgund taluka. It is being classed "A" for the past 5 years. The names of Devgri, Ratanpalli, Kaginalli and Lakkundi Multi-purpose Societies also deserve mention for their good work. The work done by the Umbarkhede Multi-purpose Society in East Khandesh district deserves special mention for its varid activities. It is running a bus service between Chalisgaon and Umbarkhede. It has also built up a silo pit for supply of good fodder, and secured a grant of Rs. 2,000 from the Rural Development Board. It has also maintained iron ploughs and a winnowing machine for the use of its members and also worked as an approved agent of the Agricultural Department for distribution of ammonium sulphate, oil cake and cotton seeds during the year. The Loni Multi-purpose Society in the Ahmednagar district affords another example of a multi-purpose society that has undertaken varied activities. With a share capital of Rs. 4,735, it held deposits from members and non-members to the extent of Rs. 35,238 and Rs. 19.322 respectively. Reserve and other funds amounted to Rs. 10,574. It supplied 1.190 tons of oil cake manure and effected sale of jaggery valued at Rs. 3,95,145. Iron and steel articles worth Rs. 76,010 were supplied to agriculturists. It also conducted a workshop wherein iron implements, gul pans, moulds, buckets were prepared and supplied to agriculturists. It contemplates starting a co-operative sugar factory in the area of its operations. Multi-purpose societies at Chakan, Malthan in the Poona district and at Pumtamba, Mirajgaon and Wambori also deserve to be mentioned for their good work.

(c) SUPERVISION.

- 24. The number of District Boards of Co-operative Supervising Unions stood unchanged at 14. The existing arrangements for supervision over co-operative societies in the districts of Ahmedabad, Kaira, Pach Mahals and Ratnagiri were continued. Total number of Supervising Unions in the Province stood at 104 on 30th June 1947, the number of societies affiliated to them being 4,638.
- The year under report witnessed a further modification in the constitution of the District Boards of Supervising Unions. With the issue of Government orders transferring control of supervisors to the Department and according them the status of temporary Government servants, and the need for creating an agency in the districts to carry out the functions of education on behalf of the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Institute envisaged in the report of the Co-operative Training and Education Committee, it was found necessary to modify the constitution of the District Union Boards so as to enable them primarily to undertake functions of education and propaganda and to act in an advisory capicity so far as supervision is concerned. The revised constitution of these bodies (to be styled as District Co-operative Boards) was framed by the Provincial Cooperative Institute and was duly considered by the Provincial Board of Supervision in its meeting held on 11th December 1946. The draft constitution so suggested was approved by Government and all the existing District Boards of Supervising Unions were requested to take steps to adopt the revised bye-laws. Unfortunately, there has been some opposition to certain bye-laws in the revised constitution from certain non-official quarters. As a result, only three Boards (viz., East Khandesh, West Khandesh and Nasik) have adopted the revised constitution. The question of suitably modifying the constitution of the District Co-operative Boards to conform to the non-official opinion in this respect was duly considered after the close of the Co-operative year. Side by side, the question

of forming district Co-operative Boards for the districts of Ahmedabad, Kaira, Panch Mahals, Kolaba and Ratnagiri was also taken up. Proposals for registration of a District Co-operative Board in the Panch Mahals District has been received after the close of the year.

- 26. The Provincial Board of Supervision held two meetings during the year. Amongst the important subjects discussed were:—
 - (I) Utilization of surplus funds of cancelled societies.
 - (2) Reorganization of the supervision scheme sanctioned by Government (Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 10056, 28, dated 24th December 1945) transferring the control of supervisors to the Department from 1st April 1946.
 - (3) The revision of the constitution of the District Boards of Supervising Unions.
 - (4) Question of financial assistance to the proposed Federation of supply and Sale Societies.

(d) LAND MORTGAGE BANKS.

27. A separate statement B 1 showing the operations of land mortgage banks is appended herewith.

(i) Primary Land Mortgage Banks.

28. The appended statement indicates the financial position and the extent of business done by these banks including the land mortgage department of the Surat District Co-operative Bank during the year under report.

It will be seen from the statement that the total membership of the primary land mortgage banks recorded an increase from 17,353 to 18,132 of which 4,650 are borrowing members, 854 non-borrowing members and the rest are co-parceners of borrowers as "B" class members. The paid up share capital of the banks stood at Rs. 3,74,442 recording a rise of Rs. 13,461 over the previous year's figure (exclusive of the share capital of the Surat Land Mortgage Bank merged with the District Central Bank). The number of loan applications received by the primay banks during the year was 332 for Rs. 6,83,850 as against 517 for Rs. 10,12,405 in the previous year. 251 loans for the aggregate amount of Rs. 3,41,150 were sanctioned to the primary banks by the Provincial Land Mortgage Bank as against 261 loans for Rs. 3,21,450 last year. 242 loans for an aggregate sum of Rs. 3,58,100 were actually disbursed by the primary banks during the year as against 250 loans for Rs. 3,23,900 during the previous year, which indicate a slight increase in the loan operations of the banks. But on the whole, there has been a decline in the receipt of fresh business. Fall in the volume of fresh business is attributable to the extension of the provisions of the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act throughout the province.

29. Out of the total loans advanced by the primary land mortgage banks, Rs. 3,33,828 in principal and Rs. 2,49,026 in interest were due for repayment. Of these, Rs. 1,16,250 in principal and Rs. 60,118 in interest represented the amount defaulted in previous years. Against the total demand of Rs. 5,82,854, recoveries during the year amounted to Rs. 3,22,215 under principal and Rs. 1,80,844 under interest as against Rs. 3,29,233 under principal and Rs. 1,84,704 in interest of the previous year when the total demand was Rs. 5,39,847. Of these, recoveries of Rs. 1,26,546 under principal and Rs. 5,368 under interest represented advance

payments of the future instalments by the borrowers, the corresponding figure of the previous year being Rs. 1,44,213 and Rs. 5,239, respectively. The percentage of recoveries against current demand during the year under report was 63.6 a against 67 of the previous year. The loans outstanding at the end of the year under report were Rs. 31,89,320 as against Rs. 31,42,708 of the previous year. The overdues at the close of the year amounted to Rs. 2,07,979 as against Rs. 1,70,401 for the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 37,578 in the total amount of overdues. The position with regard to the overdues of the banks shows deterioration. In case of the land mortgage banks at Surat, Gadag and North Kanara, the amount of overdues has been slightly reduced as compared with that of the last year. The overdues in East Khandesh, West Khandesh, Pachora. Nasik, Satara showed an increase which can be attributed to some extent to the unfavourable agricultural season and to the curtailment in the area under money crops. Attempts were made and are also being made by the banks to stimulate recoveries from recalcitrant defaulters by utilising the facilities of summary recovery granted under Section 59 B (i) of the Bombay Co-operative Societies Act, 1925.

- 30. Eight banks showed profit during the year as against 11 banks the year before and the aggregate net profits of all the banks realised during the year amounted to Rs. 9,183 as against Rs. 21,054 for the last year. The reason for the fall in profits is explained by the fact that fresh business has fallen while the establishment expenses remained unchaged. Remission to the extent of Rs. 58,456 out of the total creditors claims amounting to Rs. 4,02,618 was secured for the borrowers by the conciliation committees set up by the various land mortgage banks, the percentage of remission to the claims being 14 as against 11 for the preceding year.
- 31. Conclusion.—From what has been stated above, it will be seen that many of the banks are starving for lack of business and are unable to pay any dividend to their shareholders. In order to remedy this situation, the Sir Manilal Nanavati Committee which examined the position of primary banks, recommended that in cases where the primary banks were working at a loss, their work should be transferred to the central financing agencies operating in that area. This was because the primary land mortgage banks do not possess the same means for keeping close contact with the rural cultivators and co-operative societies which the central banks with their inspectorial staff and branches possess and that some loans which were really longterm loans, were often advanced, under the guise of short-term loans, by the credit societies and the central banks.

They further recommended that the central financing agencies should distribute long-term finance as agents of the Provincial Land Mortgage Bank, keep a separate Department for this business and obtain all the funds required for the purpose and carry out all the existing safeguards about scrutiny of loan applications.

There has been noticed also a demand for loans for land improvement, installation of pumping machinery for lifting water in some cases and the banks are experiencing handicaps in that there is no agency of their own to which scrutiny of loan applications could be entrusted and the usual delays that occur in the disposal of applications for loans for land improvement which are forwarded to the officers of the Agricultural Department hamper the work of the banks. Besides, the Government has taken upon itself the execution or financing at cheap rates of interest of works of land improvement on a large scale through the Department of Agriculture, Land Development, Agricultural Engineering and Minor Irrigation etc. Government has also strengthened and extended the machinery of grant to tagavi for land

improvement at concessional rates of interest which private agency like the land mortgage banks can ill afford to compete. The future of these banks, therefore, depends ultimately upon the policy which Government choose to follow regarding the provision of long-term finance to agriculturists. Most of the banks are well managed, but they are starving for want of business. They demand by way of immediate relief that Government should come to their aid preferably by reimbursing the actual loss sustained by them till the awards under the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act begin to come in large numbers. Other banks which are not likely to be economic units and are not so well managed may have to be amalgamated with the District Central Banks as recommended by the Nanavati Committee.

- 32. The Bombay Provincial Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank worked well under the able guidance of Mr. Nurmohomed N. Chinoy who continued to be its President except during his tour overseas for 4 months from January 1947 to May, when Sir Janardan A. Madan held the office of the President of the Bank. Mr. B. N. Desai served as Manager of the Bank during the year.
- 33. There was no change in the number of affiliated banks which stood at 15. Though the Surat Primary Bank was amalgamated with the Surat District Co-operative Bank, the shares held by the former have not yet been transferred to the latter in its name. The share capital of the bank increased from Rs. 5,03,260 to Rs. 5,12,640. During the year, the bank adopted a new byelaw providing for admission of adjusted debtors under section 55 of the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act residing outside the area of operation of primary banks as members or nominal members of the bank. Four such debtors were admitted as nominal members and the amount of adjusted debts was paid by the bank as per terms of the awards.
- 34. Loan operations.—The number of loan applications from the primary banks pending disposal at the beginning of the year was 96, the amount involved therein being Rs. 1,88,343. During the year under report, the bank received 234 fresh loan applications for Rs. 3,94,400 as against 290 loan applications for Rs. 4,69,015 of the previous year. Out of these 246 loan applications for Rs. 3,49,600 were sanctioned during the year as against 263 loan applications for Rs. 3,49,200 in the preceding year. The fall in receipt of fresh loan applications is mainly due to the extension of the application of the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act to the whole of the province. During the year, 275 loans amounting to Rs. 3.89,762 were advanced to primary banks, the corresponding figures for the previous year being 252 loans for Rs. 3,31,500. Of these, four loans for Rs. 3,185-8-0 were advanced to adjusted debtors residing outside the area of primary banks. The outstandings with the primary land mortgage banks at the close of the year show an increase from Rs. 28,74,646 to Rs. 29,36,680. A statement showing the number and amount of loans advanced during the year to primary banks and adjusted debtors residing outside the area of primary banks and the amounts outstanding with them is appended herewith.

It would be seen from the above classification that the redemption of old debts continued to be the main purpose for which loans were sanctioned. Now that the provisions of the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act have been applied to the whole of the province, the debts of agriculturists will be adjusted and the demand for loans for redemption of debts will be generally in the form of awards passed under the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act for payment by land mortgage banks.

These figures indicate that the business in small loans not exceeding Rs. 1,000 is not inconsiderable.

- 35. Recoveries.—The amount which was due for repayment during the year was Rs. 3,82,710 (Rs. 2,43,138 under principal and Rs. 1,39,572 under interest). The total recoveries were Rs. 5,42,000 of which Rs. 1,90,867 represent advance payments towards future instalments. The recoveries against current demand were Rs. 3,51,133. The recovery of interest was cent per cent. The percentage of recovery of principal to demand (principal was 91.7 as against 86.9 during the previous year. The overdues at the close of the year amounted to Rs. 31,577 with 8 primary land mortgage banks as against Rs. 26,772 with 5 primary banks at the close of the previous year. The percentage of overdues to demand at the close of the year stood at 8 from 8 primary banks. Scarcity conditions prevailing in some of the areas of the banks are reported to be mainly responsible for the deterioration in the position of overdues. It is, however, gratifying to find that the primary banks are making efforts to pay up the overdue amounts and three banks have accordingly paid up their overdue amounts after the close of the year thus further bringing down the total amount of overdues todate to Rs. 19,069.
- 36. Debentures.—During the year, Government was pleased to guarantee the issue of the fourth series of debentures for Rs. 5 lakhs and to grant temporary advances to the bank on certain conditions pending the issue of debentures. The final issue of the said debentures is, however, pending receipt of Government orders approving the draft agreement and Debenture Trust Deed and also appointing the Sole Trustee for debenture holders, the necessary approval in the matter will be accorded after the receipt of Government orders. The total amount of debentures issued at the close of the year remained unchanged at Rs. 35,00,000. The bank obtained an advance of rupees one lakh from Government under the new arrangement pending floatation of the new series of debentures.
- 37. Profits.—The net profit earned for the year amounts to Rs. 6,903 as against Rs. 6,439 for the previous year. During the year, the management expenses of the bank including discount on debentures and under-writing commission written off, increased due to the grant of increased scales of pay to the staff and to payment of sitting fees to directors coupled with increases in other miscellaneous allowances. The percentage of the expenditure to outstandings and working capital stood at ~64 and ·42 as against ·57 and ·38 respectively of the previous year.

Transfer of assets and liabilities of the Land Mortgage Department of the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Bank.

- 38. No case for transfer was received during the year and hence the number of cases awaiting transfer stood at 13 for Rs, 22,450 at the end of the year.
- 39. Conclusion.—Owing to increase in operational costs and the gradual decline in income brought about by a lack of progressive increase in the volume of business attracted to the bank, the bank had again to consider the question of taking a portion to profit and loss account out of the income earned on investments of the sinking fund in respect of the three series of debentures on the lines advised by the Reserve Bank of India with a view to ease to some extent its profit position. The question of amending clause 13 (2) of the debenture trust deed suitably so as to enable the Bank to improve its profit earning capacity was taken up after the close of the year which is now under the consideration of Government. It was visualised that the Provincial Land Mortgage Bank and the primary land mortgage banks would be enabled to get adequate business if Section 55 was duly amended. In some cases, awards have been passed by the Debt Adjustment Boards and are transferred for payment to the Land Mortgage Banks under the amended Section 33 of the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act. Practical experience of the working of this amended section has shown that there are still a number of difficulties which are encountered by the banks underlining the necessity of "further amendment" of the Section in question so as to give the banks an opportunity to reject unprofitable cases instead of passing them on to the Bank under the compulsion of the statute. In this connection the Nanavati Committee in paragraph 37 of their report remarked as under :---

"We have noticed that the provisions of Section 55 (amended Section 33) of the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act do not provide for consultation with the land mortgage banks before passing of the awards and that they are under a statutory obligation to pay up all the awards passed under the said section. These provisions in our opinion are financially unsound and we recommend that the land mortgage banks should have full liberty in selection or rejection of the cases which are passed on to them."

(e) AGRICULTURAL NON-CREDIT SOCIETIES.

- 40. Side by side with the steps taken to provide finance to agriculturists efforts were also made to harness co-operative effort so as to cater to the various other needs of agriculturists, viz., arrangement for profitable marketing of their produce, provision of improved seed, manure, implements, etc., facilities for irrigation, protection of crops from the ravages of wild animals etc. As a result of these efforts, there has been a considerable expansion of the agricultural non-credit movement and the number of non-credit societies embracing a varied range of activities recorded an increase from 561 to 769.
- 41. Amongst the non-credit societies, the district and taluka purchase and sale unions play an important role. Following a planned development of this type of activity, there has been an increase in the number of sale societies and unions from 197 to 202. Some of the purchase and sale unions were provided with departmental trained officiers to work as managers, free of cost or subject to certain conditions. These societies were extensively utilised by the Supply Department to work as their agents in the scheme of distribution of controlled and rationed commodities.

The Bombay Provincial Co-operative Marketing Society, Ltd.

42. The Bombay Provincial Co-operative Marketing Society which entered the seventh year of its career has been showing steady progress in its development. Till last year, the Board of Directors was nominated by Government. This is the first year when an elected Board of Directors was constituted. The Registrar,

Co-operative Societies and the Chief Marketing Officer, Bombay Province, Poona, however, continued, as before ex-officio members of the Board. Impediments in the normal trading operations due to Government monopoly of food-grains and restrictions over prices and movement of agricultural commodities, continued to affect the working of this premier marketing institution. Its working resulted in a net profit of Rs. 5,080 as against Rs. 1,317 for the last year. The following paragraph indicates the work done by the Society during the year under report.

43. The Society's main activities were sale of cotton, grams and oilseeds, fruits and vegetables and supply of consumers' goods like cloth, paper and cosmetics. The Society also supplied yarn to weavers's organisations. It continued to function as the wholesale distributor of rationed commodities in Bombay City in relation to some consumers' co-operative societies. It also continued to work as a distributor of the Imperial Chemical Industries (India), Limited, for artificial manures. The Society also did the work of distribution of groundnut oil cake of the Agricultural Department as before. The Society's appointment as the central distributing agency for distributing paper to co-operative societies also continued during the year under report. The comparative position showing the work done by the Society in regard to the above activities during this and the last year is given in the subjoined statement:—

During the year under report the Society was able to make an income of Rs. 53,950 as against Rs. 44,263 for the last year.

Under the able guidance of its President, Diwan Bahadur H. L. Kaji and a strong directorate, the Society made good progress and should be able to take its legitimate place as an apex institution in the province, when normal conditions set in.

SALE AND PURCHASE AND SALE SOCIETIES.

Societies dealing in agricultural produce in general.

44. The following is an account of the activities undertaken by some of the important purchase and sale societies in various districts.

The Belgaum District Cooperative Purchase and Sale Union, Limited, performed its normal activities viz.: marketing of agricultural produce and supply of improved seeds and manures satisfactorily. The value of agricultural produce sold was Rs. 11,06,693. It also did considerable business in controlled commodities and supplied iron, steel, etc. to the agriculturists. The District Magistrate, Belgaum, entrusted the wholesale distribution of kerosene oil, gul and sugar to this Union, and sales of these commodities amounted to Rs. 9,59,861. The Union earned a net profit of Rs. 22,751. The Dharwar District Cooperative Purchase and Sale Union, Ltd., in addition to its usual activities, was entrusted with the wholesale distribution of yarn for Ranebennur and Gadag Talukas and of sugar for Dharwar town and taluka. The value of yarn and sugar sold during the year amounted to Rs. 5,89,446 and Rs. 1,12,559 respectively. The Nandurbar Co-operative Purchase and Sale Union in West Khandesh effected sales of agricultural produce on adut business amounting to Rs. 1,56,059 and of agricultural requisites and domestic articles of the value of Rs. 28,595 and Rs. 5,82,856 respectively. The Union has been rendering yeoman services to the Bhils in the matter of sale of their agricultural produce and during the year sales of their agricultural produce were effected to the extent of Rs. 41,492. In addition, it is also supplying the needs of adjusted debtors with regard to crop finance. The Sahada Purchase and Sale Society extended its activities by purchasing a ginning and pressing factory. It conducted a "Saranjam Karyalay" and supplied to its members spare parts of machinery, worth Rs. 9,000. The value of sales of agricultural requisites and controlled articles amounted to Rs. 2,32,223 and Rs. 4,45,010 respectively. It also catered to the needs of seasonal finance of the adjusted debtors of the villages, which have no primary cooperative societies. The Malegaon Co-operative Purchase and Sale Union is showing signs of rapid development under the able guidance of its chairman, Mr. B. S. Hire, M.L.A. (Central). It supplied agricultural requisites to members and others, amounting to Rs. 2,42,250. It also did considerable business in the matter of supply of controlled articles like sugar and gul. Its working resulted in a net profit of Rs. 23,204. The Malshiras Taluka Co-operative Purchase and Sale Union, Ltd., in Sholapur District worked 11 distribution centres in the taluka, and its business relating to the supply of foodgrains, sugar, iron, kerosene yarn, gul, etc. amounted Rs. 3,54,728. It distributed 35,370 Bengal maunds of groundnut oil cake. The Karmala Taluka Co-operative Purchase and Sale Union conducted 15 fair price shops, 6 ration shops and 4 grocery shops. It was entrusted with the wholesale distribution of sugar, cotton-seed, groundnut oil cake, gur and yarn. The Poona District Purchase and Sale Union, Ltd., sold manures to the extent of Rs. 97,401 and iron and agricultural implements of Rs. 2,14,546. It earned a net profit of Rs. 34,698. The Annigeri Co-operative Agricultural Produce Sale Society, Ltd.

of the Dharwar District also did useful work during the year under report. It sold cotton seeds, weighing 4,250 Bengal maunds, valued at over Rs. 20,000 to the agriculturists.

The Surat District Co-operative Purchase and Sale Union supplied goods to members and non-members worth Rs. 18,93,947 and earned a profit of Rs. 40,772. The Broach District Co-operative Store Purchase and Sale Union conducted satisfactorily the management of several rural distribution centres. It sold goods worth Rs. 39,03,508 and earned a profit of Rs. 15,945. The Kalyan Taluka Co-operative Purchase and Sale Union, Ltd. conducted 16 rural distribution centres and undertook distribution of controlled and non-controlled articles. It earned a net profit of Rs. 9,085. The Bhiwandi Taluka Co-operative Purchase and Sale Union managed 14 rural distribution centres in the taluka. It earned a net profit of Rs. 13,530. The Shahapur Taluka Cooperative Purchase and Sale Union though recently registered, was able to show good results. It undertook distribution of controlled articles and earned a net profit of Rs. 8,655. The Panwel Taluka Co-operative Purchase and Sale Union conducted distribution of controlled articles, manures, etc. through 13 rural distribution centres. Its net profit amounted to Rs. 23,806.

SINGLE COMMODITY SOCIETIES.

45. Cotton.—The Cotton sale societies continued to assist the agriculturists in the spread of improved variety of cotton and in arranging sale of their produce. The Gadag Co-operative Cotton Sale Society effected sales valued at Rs. 17,17,818. It also helped the Agricultural Department in Seed Multiplication Scheme. Its profit during the year amounted to Rs. 47,707. The Hubli Cooperative Cotton Sale Society effected sales to the extent of Rs. 4,65,329.

The number of cotton sale societies organised under the Jarilla Cotton Scheme in East Khandesh, remained unchanged at 16. These societies were appointed as approved stockists by the Cotton Superintendent for the supply of good pedigree jarilla seed. They continued to do rouging and purification operations in addition to ginning and pressing etc. They supplied 16,555 bags of cotton seed to members and non-members. They also sold 9,064 quarters and 36 bales of lint cotton. Some of these societies also pooled groundnut produce of the members and the total quantity of the produce thus sold was about 19,386 maunds. The number of societies organised under the above scheme, in West Khandesh and Nasik stood at 7 as against 8 of the last year, as the Taloda Taluka Co-operative Cotton Sale Society was converted into a Purchase and Sale Union, during the year under report. The societies continued to pool together the members' produce. Out of the pooled cotton, 2,835 maunds of seed cotton were sold for Rs. 56,700, while 555 bags of lint cotton were sold for about Rs. 1,20,000.

The 6 cotton sale societies in Ahmedabad division continued to work satisfactorily. They sold cotton and cotton seed to the extent of 2,51,951 and 38,811 maunds and realised Rs. 20,64,257 and Rs. 4,53,792, respectively.

The 18 cotton sale societies in Surat district continued to work well. They sold 35,490 Bengal maunds of cotton lint of the value of Rs. 17,40,266 and 60,022 Bengal maunds of cotton seeds of the value of Rs. 492,615. The working of these societies resulted in a net profit of Rs. 17,382. The two ginning and pressing societies in Surat District continued to work satisfactorily. The ginning and pressing charges earned by these societies amounted to Rs. 89,831 and Rs. 51,228 respectively. They a rned a net profit of Rs. 15,251.

FRUITS AND VEGETABLES.

46. The Ahmedabad Co-operative Fruit and Vegetable Association, Ltd. was entrusted by the District Magistrate with the distribution of potatoes and carned a commission of Rs. 7,728. It also sold vegetables, kerosene, and groundaut oil cake. It earned a net profit of Rs. 8,190.

The Sardar Fruit and Vegetable Growers Sale Society registered during the year, at Bardoli, pooled and sold 88,479, Bengal maunds of members' produce for Rs. 4,73,925 and supplied household requisites valued at Rs. 8,090. It earned a commission of Rs. 5,201. The Poona Kumbharia Group Co-operative Fruit and Vegetable Growers Sale Society, at Surat collected and sold 1,46,708 Bengal maunds of members produce worth Rs. 10,74,389 and supplied household and other requisites worth Rs. 8,090. It made a profit of Rs. 8,111. The number of fruit sale societies in East Khandesh district increased from 8 to 11. Most of these sale societies were dealing mainly in plantains. The total sales of these societies amounted to Rs. 26,92 lakhs. These societies received preferential treatment in the matter of railway transport.

The two newly formed Fruit Sale Societies in West Khandesh District sold fruits worth Rs. 10,561 and earned a commission of Rs. 679. The Dhulia Fruit Sale Society also sold oil-cake worth Rs. 5,302.

ARECANUT.

47. The Kumta Arecanut Sale Society and the Sirsi Totagars' Sale Society continued to maintain progress and sold pepper, cardamom, arecanut, etc. of the value of Rs. 14,97,619.

CHILLY.

48. The Byadgi Co-operative Chilly Sale Society continued to work satisfactorily. It effected sales of chillies to the extent of Rs. 4,57,043 and carned a profit of Rs. 12,306 during the year under report.

SALT.

49. The Dharsana Group Co-operative Salt Sale Society, Ltd. sold 6,25,022 Bengal maunds salt worth Rs. 1,97,807 and earned a commission of Rs. 14,730. It made a net profit of Rs. 5,426.

50. Cattle Breeding Societies.—The number of these societies remained unchanged at 18. Maintenance of pedigree bulls, distribution of cattle feed, maintenance and leasing out of grazing lands are the main activities undertaken by these societies.

The work done by the following societies deserves special mention.

The Sidenur and Hiremallur societies of Dharwar and the Ainapur and Sadalga societies in Belgaum district continued to do useful work in improving the breed of cattle. The Sidenur societies has maintained 2 bulls and 36 calves were born during the year. This society is the oldest to society in the district and continued to be well managed. It has installed a spray machine and tick pound to safeguard cattle against ticks and other cattle diseases. The Sadalga and Ainapur societies maintained 2 breeding bulls and the number of off-springs born during the year was 18. These societies have been granted grazing lands by Government.

51. Dairy Societies.—With the registration of 16 more societies the total number of these societies, increased to 30. The 30 dairy societies working at present can

be classified as under:-

15 Milk Producers' Societies.

11 of a mixed type of consumers' and producers'.

4 Milk Supply Unions.

During the year under report, special efforts were made to organise milk producers' societies in Bombay and Bombay Suburban districts with a view to tackle the problem of milk Supply in Greater Bombay and as a result 11 cattle owners dairy societies, came into existence. With a view of facilitating organisation and supervision of such societies, the Milk Commissioner has been provided with a special staff of two organisers deputed by this Department. These societies contributed about 150 maunds of milk daily to the milk supply scheme under the control of the Milk Commissioner. The Bombay Milk Scheme depend partially on the supply of milk from Kaira district where also two Milk Supply societies have been organised with the help of the organiser, lent from the Co-operative Department.

The total value of milk supplied by the dairy societies during the year was nearly Rs. 12 lakks, which shows a phenomenal increase over the previous year's figure of Rs. 1,73,000. The quantity of milk supplied to the consumers is 13,07,059 lbs. as against 10,43,881 lbs. for the previous year. In addition to the supply of credit to the members and collection and marketing of milk, some of these societies worked as approved agencies for distribution of cattle feeds under the Govern-

ment scheme for distribution of essential commodities.

Amongst the new institutions which came into existence during the year, the Peoples' Commonwealth Co-operative Dairy Society at Poona, which has an ambitious programme of dairy development in the villages and the City, deserves special mention.

52. According to the original proposals formulated by the Department and included in the Post-war plans, it was proposed to put into operation 2 separate comprehensive schemes relating to development of dairy farming on co-operative-basis, viz.: (1) Co-operative creameries and (2) Milk supply unions. These schemes are being merged into one scheme described as "Village Co-operative Cattle Breeding and Milk Production Societies in Rural Arras", drawn up generally on the lines of the recommendations contained in the Expert Cattle Committee's Report. Under Government orders, however, the scheme was sent to the Dairy Development Officer, for revision. After the close of the year, the Dairy Development Officer prepared a revised scheme embodying generally the recommendations made in the All-India Planning Committee's Report. The scheme is yet to be inalised.

53. Land Improvement Societies.—The number of these societies stands at 13. These societies had in all 548 members and the total area included in the scheme was 2,647 acres. Along with the land improvement, the introduction of methods of cultivation and costly agricultural implements and machinery has, of late, assumed great importance in view of the steps taken to intensify the "Grow More Food Campaign" as a result of which societies with wider objects such as taluka development associations, better framing societies and joint farming societies, irrigation societies are more in demand than such societies with limited objects. The land improvement societies are mostly to be found in Kanara and Dharwar districts. The former has 6 societies, while the latter 3. The societies in North Kanara district continued to work well during the year. They had in all 370 members and the total area included in the scheme was 1,570 acres. The Allipur Co-operative Farm and Sheep Breeding Society and Yalivigi Land Improvement Society are in need of more lands and steps to secure more lands for these societies are in progress.

54. Agricultural Requisite Supply Societies.—(a) Seed and Manure Supply Societies.—The number of these societies stood at 38 at the end of the year. Total value of seeds, manure, etc. supplied by these societies during the year amounted

to Rs. 2,37,249 and they earned a net profit of Rs. 49,550 for the year.

(b) Machinery and Implement Societies.—These societies increased from 15 to 21 at the close of the year. Their main activities comprise sale and hiring of improved types of implements and agricultural machinery such as cane crushers, gul pans, etc. to their members and non-members. Ahmednagar district which has 5 societies leads in this type of societies. The total membership of these societies is 1,897 and they supplied agricultural implements of the total value of Rs. 2.52,898 and earned a commission of Rs. 205. The two societies at Jamkhed and Samvatsara in Ahmednagar district deserve special mention.

The scope for work in the societies as well as fresh organisation of societies of this type, is limited since the taluka development associations, multi-purpose societies and other agricultural primaries have also of late been undertaking distribution of seeds, manures, hiring and supply of agricultural implements, etc.

55. Taluka Development Associations.—With the registration of two taluka development association the number of Associations increased from 118 to 120. The subjoined statement gives the main statistics relating to the working of the Associations:—

The agency of these associations was largely made use of by Rural Development Boards and the Agricultural Department for popularising improved methods of cultivation. The Taluka Development Associations, in addition to their normal business of agricultural propagands and of supply of improved seed, did on a large scale the work of distribution of controlled commodities like iron, cement, oil-cake etc. The Associations continued also to assist the intensification of the "Grow More Food" campaign.

Proposals which aimed at revitalising the working of taluka development associations with a view to increase their utility and to ensure their closer association with the activities of Rural Development Boards, were considered during the year, but final decision has not been taken.

56. The following paragraphs indicate in brief the work done by some of the

· outstanding taluka development associations:-

(1) The Malwan Taluka Development Association in Ratnagiri district supplied 40 maunds of improved seed of paddy, 1,050 tons of oil cake and 1,300 mango grafts to the agriculturists in the taluka. It also maintained a nursery for supply of graft of lemons, chikku, cocoanut, etc. and ran a poultry farm.

- (2) The Jalgaon Taluka Development Association continued to progress satisfactorily. The cattle breeding farm maintained by the Association at Pimpale, carried out excellent work by supply or bulls and cows to the various parts of the district. The cattle reared by this Association at this farm secured prizes worth Rs. 440 and the Holkar Government Challenge Cup in the All-India Cattle Show held at Delhi in February 1947. The Association continued to maintain its Dairy Farm at Chincholi and supplied 1,28,718 lbs. of milk during the year to the people of Jalgaon. There are also two poultry farms running under the auspices of the Association.
- (3) Hirekerur Taluka Development Association in Dharwar did considerable work in the matter of supply of iron, steel and iron implements. It distributed mango, rose, apple and lemon grafts as also 271 bags of ammonium sulphate, 80 lbs. of sulphur dust, 5 lbs. of copper sulphate, etc. It has maintained tion farms for paddy and sugarcane and runs 3 gun clubs, which were responsibl for killing 87 pigs during the year.
- 57. Co-operative Farming Societies.—Two Joint Farming Societies were registered during the year under report, bringing the total number to 10. The work done by the following societies deserves special mention:—

The Karda Joint Farming Society in Poona district undertook joint cultivation of tur, jowar, bajri, kardi, etc. It obtained land admeasuring 100 acres from 13 mahars, of whom 9 were ex-servicemen, who have joined the society as members and have agreed to share the produce of the land according to their labour units. The Pimpalwad Nikhumb Joint Farming Society of East Khandesh has established a Mahar Colony for cultivation of land in the village Pimpalwad Nikhumb. Government has given rent-free 400 acres of land on lease to the society on condition that the society grows the crops specified by Government. The society obtained a tagai loan of Rs. 7,400 from the Collector of East Khandesh, for purchase of bullocks and agricultural implements. Free services of a qualified agricultural assistant have been given to the society.

58. The question of organising co-operative farming on a planned basis received serious attention of Government and Capt. Mohite was appointed by Government on special duty to investigate in the light of the existing crop practices, distribution of land and prevailing land tenures and also the extent of virgin land available for development, the suitability of adopting schemes of co-operative, collective

joint or better farming. He was also to recommend which types of farming societies were best suited to secure the optimum production and the most equitable distribution of agricultural profits and further to suggest model schemes of each type of society considered suitable in different areas of the province. The question of organising a joint farming society in the light of recommendations made in Capt. Mohite's report is separately under consideration of Government.

- 59. Better Farming Societies.—Ten Better Farming Societies were registered during the year, bringing the total number to 76. These societies continued to take active part in disseminating knowledge of improved methods of agriculture to the agriculturists. Other useful activities undertaken by the societies were supply of improved seeds and manure, cattle breeding, bunding, etc.
- 60. With a view to ensure efficient working of these societies, it has been decided to provide these societies with trained agricultural assistants as secretaries.
- 61. The work done by the following better farming societies deserves special mention:—
 - (1) The Hegde Co-operative Better Farming Society in North Kanara supplied -oil-cake manure, ammonium sulphate, mango grafts, cocoanut seedlings and has undertaken development of fruit gardening in about 50 acres of minor forest lands. Likewise, the Kalganur Better Farming Society in this district, apart from undertaking activities on the lines of the Hegde Society has also kept agricultural implements including 2 sugarcane crushers for the benefit of its members on hire. It also provides facilities for storage of agricultural produce of its members. The Madbhavi Better Farming Society continued to maintain its progress. It stocked 12 iron ploughs and assisted the members in bringing 400 acres of land under cultivation, got 83 acres of land levelled. Besides, it undertook improvement of cattle. The Hattarwad Co-operative Better Farming Society in Belgaum continued its efforts in developing 73 acres of forest lands with a view to bring it under cultivation. The Borvihir Better Farming Society in West Khandesh is noted for its activities in poultry improvement. The Mamdapur and Nandgaon Better Farming Societies in Ahmednagar continued their work of improvement of poultry and selling of vegetables on commission basis during the year.

62. Crop Protection Societies.—These societies can be classified under two main categories, viz.: (i) fencing societies and (ii) crop protection societies.

The fencing activities are mostly concentrated in the Dharwar district. The societies numbering in all 11 have afforded protection to 1,568 acres of land from

the ravages of wild beasts.

The latter type of societies have become popular in the districts of Satara, East Khandesh, West Khandesh. Though the object aimed at by both types of societies is the same, the methods adopted by the latter type are different masmuch as these societies provide protection through construction of stone walls, maintenance of watchmen and running of gun clubs.

The subjoined statement gives the main statistics relating to these societies:-

It will be noticed that the West Khandesh district is leading in this type of activity. 46 societies were registered during the year. These societies earned an income of Rs. 70,885 from subscriptions and other sources while the cost of management amounted to Rs. 53,047.

of 3 societies in the year under report, the number of these societies stands at 34. The Satara district claims the largest number of these societies, viz. 12. These societies continued to do good work. The work of the Jawalwadi Co-operative Better Living Society deserves commendation. This Society conducted 34 voluntary schools, a boarding house, a library and a dispensary. It has established a conciliation committee to decide disputes of members. The Ratnagiri Karhada Brahmins Better Living Society with an area of operation extending to the whole of the district also deserves mention. It has 911 members on the roll and collected donations, etc., to the extent of 279 and granted scholarships of the value of Rs. 286 to poor and deserving students. It has a working capital of Rs. 3,490.

The Kumar Kshatriya Namdhari Better Living Society at Kumta in North Kanara district with a membership of 405 catered to the social uplift of the Namdhari community. Activities with a view to curtail unnecessary ceremonial expenses were undertaken by the society. Side by side it has taken up 70 acres of minor forest for Kumri cultivation for its members.

West Khandesh district stands next in importance in this field of co-operative activities. The Dhulia Sahakari Bhagini Mandal maintained a Model Cloth Shop which yielded a profit of Rs. 611 and carried on also other activities like supply of medical appliances for use of members, supply of domestic requirements of its members, encouragement of secondary occupations by affording training in arts and crafts.

(2) Banking in General.

64. The Bank rate remained unchanged at 3 per cent. during the year. Conditions in the money market became stringent during the second half of the financial year. The capital and money markets presented all features of a transition from war to peace time economy. The early part of the financial year witnessed a boom in the share and gilt-edged markets followed by a slump resulting in a great deal of uncertainty and diffidence in the markets. A steadier tendency, however, was noticeable in the gilt-edged market towards the close. In the sphere of banking the war-time growth of deposits has been halted and a trend towards the restoration of the normal ratio between time and demand deposits was noticeable. An outstanding feature in the banking situation was the revival of demand. for bank accommodation, bringing back the pre-war pattern of business. The entry of banks on the post-war phase is not without its defects, for the removal of which efforts are being made by the Reserve Bank of India and the Central Government. Apart from the legislative measures enacted by the Government of India, the Reserve Bank made an important attempt through a Circular addressed to all scheduled banks to introduce some form of uniformity in the rates of interest paid on deposits. Instructions contained in the circular could equally be made applicable to the co-operative banks. In the realm of industrial finance a feature of the year was the introduction of a bill in the Legislative Assembly for the formation of the Industrial Finance Corporation with a guaranteed share capital of 5 crores of rupees to be held by the Government of India, the Reserve

Bank of India, scheduled banks and other institutional investors in an agreed proportion. No provision, however, has been made in the bill for a share for the co-operative banks in these holdings and a representation addressed by the Co-operative Banks' Association in this Province in the matter to the Government of India was not viewed with fevour. A noteworthy feature of the year was also the formation of an All India Banks' Association, with its membership open to scheduled-banks only. Lastly, an interesting year end event was a minor and short-lived banking crisis in Calcutta affecting mainly the non-secheduled banks. Timely action taken by the Government of Bengal and the Reserve Bank of India steadied the situation and prevented the crisis from spreading.

- 65. The period of relaxation of the provisions of Rule 8 of the Bombay Cooperative Societies Rules permitting borrowings without limit in the case of central and certain urban co-operative banks in the province subject to certain conditions having expired during the year; a reference was made to Government for a further relaxation and the matter is still under the consideration of Government.
- 66. The Bombay Co-operative Banks' Association had another year of progress and useful work. At the close of the co-operative year 1947, total membership of the Association consisted of 14 central financing agencies including Banking Unions and 54 Urban Banks. During the year 4 meetings of the Executive Committee were held and the total number of subjects taken up for consideration was 37. The Association has established itself as a very useful consultative body and the Department consulted it on all important matters relating to banking. It serves as the forum for pooling of ideas and experience amongst member banks with a view to foster healthy banking conventions, so as to avoid undesirable trends which would otherwise have to be removed by legislation. The Association sustained during the year a serious loss in the death of Mr. R. C. Banker at the hands of hooligans on the 23rd November 1947, while he was returning from Broach to Ankleshwar. He was a member of the Board of Representatives and also a member of the Executive Committee. He was a Director of the Nagrik Sahakari Bank for several years past. The Association has by now completed eighth years of usefulness to co-operative movement. The question of getting it registered under the Bombay Co-operative Societies Act and amending its constitution was considered by a Special Joint meeting held on 21st June 1947. In accordance with a resolution passed at the Joint Session it was decided that a draft constitution and bye-laws be framed so as to enable the Association to function as a registered Federation of Central Financing Agencies and Urban Banks, and birculated amongst member banks for eliciting their opinion. The member banks were consulted in the matter and the final draft was further considered by a small Committee appointed by the Association to finalise it after the close of the year. The Association owes its success in no small measure to the keen interest of its Honorary Secretary Mr. V. P. Varde, who is now assisted by Mr. V. M. Thakore, who has been appointed as the Secretary of the Association.

68." Total resources of the bank amounted to Rs. 598 59 lakks, showing a declin of Rs. 45 45 lakhs over the previous year's figure. The working capital of the bank which was Rs. 3 81 crores at the end of 1942-43, and which had risen to Rs. 6.9 crores by the end of the year 1945-46, declined during the year by Rs. 43 lakhs There has been a slight increase of Rs. 0.15 lakhs in the amount of paid up capital which now stands at Rs. 20 24 lakhs. The various reserves have also gone up from Rs. 23.85 lakhs to Rs. 25.65 lakh. Out of the total demand deposits, of Rs. 4.2 crores, over Rs. 1.60 crores were held from societies and over Rs. 2.63 crores were held from individuals. Out of the total time-deposits of Rs. 1.75 crores Rs. 1.04 crores were held from societies and Rs. 0.69 crores were held from individuals Total deposits of societies have, however, decret sed from Rs 3.02 erores to Rs. 2.6 crores and deposits of individuals have decreased from Rs. 3:42 crores to Rs. 3:3 crores. The decline was mainly noticeable in fixed deposits of individuals and savings and current deposits of societies and banks, indicating increasing employ ment of funds of societies, banks and individuals recking investment in normal business. Bank's investments in gilt-edged securities also decreased from Rs. 3.58 crores to Rs. 3.35 crores. The bank held Rs. 21 lakhs as against 48 lakh at the end of the co-operative year 1946, by way of deposits in approved banks in addition to over Rs. 32 63 lakhs, as against Rs. 25 lakhs of the last year figures in cash at Head office and Branches and Rs. 43.64 lakhs as against Rs. 80.51 lakh last year in current accounts or at call with approved banks. Thus it will be seen that the aggregate amount of cash on hand and in deposits with approved banks declined from Rs. 1,54 lakhs to Rs. 97 lakhs during the year under report.

- 69. The advances to societies amounted to Rs. 160 lakks, indicating a net increase of Rs. 68 lakhs over that of the last year's figure, which was Rs. 92 lakhs. Advances to individuals dwindled during the year from Rs. 89 lakhs to Rs. 68. lakhs, recording a decline of Rs. 21 lakhs. The increase in advances to societies was to a large extent due to the increased cost of cultivation which their members had to meet and to some extent due to the curtailment of private credit on account of the extension of the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act to the whole of the Province, and impending legislation to control money-lending as also to increased advances to purchase and sale unions and individual societies because of entrustment by Government of the work of supply and distribution of controlled articles to societies. There has been a noticeable decline in the business of advances against Government and other Trustees securities from Rs. 29:07 lakhs to Rs. 6:30 lakhs. The proportion of advances to individuals as against advances to societies at the end of the year was 30: 70 as against 49: 51 at the end of the previous Though there has been a substantial decrease in advances by the Bank to individuals, total advances both to societies and individuals have increased from Rs. 181 lakhs to Rs. 228 lakhs, out of which, Rs. 4:37 lakhs and Rs. 0:18 lakhs were advanced to societies and individuals respectively as crop finance, defined under Section 2 (6) of the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act. The dues from societies in liquidation slightly increased from Rs. 5.48 lakhs to Rr. 5.5! lakhs. The ratio of liquid resources of the bank to its total deposit liabilities on 30th June 1946 was 88: 100, while on 30th June 1947 it was 73: 100. Recoveries during the year did not keep pace with the increase in borrowings by the societies. But the collections from out of the amounts that fell due for repayment during the year may be considered satisfactory, in view of the fact that the crops were damaged in large parts of the province by untimely rains in November and wheat rust in winter. Recoveries of loans under principal due from various societies amounted to Rs. 42:35 lakhs as against Rs. 32:36 lakhs of the previous year. The unauthorised arrears from running societies have slightly fallen from Rs. 3:42 lakho to Rs. 3:21 lakhs in principal. The total amount due for repayment by the end of the year was Rs. 43.61 lakhs, out of which Rs. 39.22 lakhs were recovered. Of these Rs. 3.09 lakhs and Rs. 2.84 lakhs were crop loans and recoveries thereof, respectively, under the Bon bay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act.
- 70. The number of branches and sub-branches of the bank increased to 52, two new sub-branches at Mehmedabad and Kapadvanj in Kaira district having been opened during the year. The sub-branches at Rahuri, Sangamner and Lasalgaon were converted into branches during the year and at the ond of the year, the bank had in all 39 branches and 13 sub-branches in 11 revenue districts of the Province.
- 71. The profit made by the bank declined from Rs. 3,24,228 to Rs. 2,98,455 during the year under review. This decline is due to increasing cost of operation resulting from higher salaries and establishment charges on the one hand, and a policy of charging progressively lewer rate of interest to co-operative borrowers on the other. As explained by the Chairman, Mr. Saraiya in his speech at the annual general meeting, the decrease in advances to individuals was an important contributory factor to the fall in profits, because the yield on advances to societies is nearly 1 per cent. less than the yield on advances to individuals. The cost of management increased from Rs. 7.57 lakhs to Rs. 9.27 lakhs. The rate of dividend declared this year is the same as that of the last year, viz. 4 per cent. per annum and in addition, bonus at the rate of I per cent. on the fully paid up shares was also declared.

72. The affairs of the bank continued to be well managed under the able guidanc of Mr. R. G. Saraiya, the chairman of the bank and the constant vigilance of Mr. V. P. Varde, the Honorary Managing Director of the Bank.

(4) DISTRICT CENTRAL BANKS.

- 73. The number of District Central Banks remained stationary, i.e., till 11. The statement 'A' appended at the end indicates the figures relating to the operation of these banks. It will be seen therefrom that the paidup share capital, Reserve fund and other funds of the banks increased substantially during the year under report. Deposits held by these banks from individuals went up by Rs. 61.73 lakhs over those of the previous year while the deposits held from societies and banks declined by Rs. 23.94 lakhs. There has been, thus a net increase in deposits by Rs. 37.79 lakhs. The working capital also increased from Rs. 709 lakhs to Rs. 740 lakhs. The termination of war did not affect flow of deposits which had set in during the war. As the period of concession granted by Government in the matter of acceptance of deposits in excess of limit laid down under Rule 8 of the Bombay Co-operative Societies Rules, 1927, expired on 16th April 1947, Government was moved to extend the period of concession for one year more.
- Out of the total working capital of Rs. 740 lakhs, Rs. 145 lakhs were on loan with banks and societies as against Rs. 103 lakhs at the end of the last year. The rise in outstandings is largely due to the increased demand for finance from agriculturists to meet the increasing cost of cultivation and partly due to the fact that advances on an increasing scale had to be made to co-operative societies dealing in controlled commodities as also due to the fact that private credit has contracted on account of the extension of the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act to the whole province.

Investment and Fluid Resources.

- 74. The cash held by the banks and with the bankers was Rs. 97.09 lakhs. while their investments including deposits with approved banks stood at Rs. 394-92 lakhs. Out of latter, a sum of Rs. 351 lakhs was in Government and other trustee securities. The percentage of cash reserves to deposits was 14.7, while the percentage of investments in deposits with approved banks and in Government and other trustee securities was 59.9. The investments in loans and advances to societies and individuals including overdrafts, amounted to Rs. 241.94 lakhs, which formed 36.7 per cent. of the total deposit liabilities. The distribution of assets of central banks on the whole, was in accordance with the standards laid down in this behalf. All the central banks except the Belgaum, Karnatak and Ahmedabad Central Banks maintained adequate fluids resources, throughout the year. The fluid resources maintained by the 3 banks fell below the standard prescribed during one quarter only. The Belgaum District Central Co-operative Bank and the Karnatak Central Co-operative Bank had brought up the fluid resources to the required standard at the close of the year and the Ahmedabad District Central Co-operative Bank after the close of the year.
- 75. Borrowings.—Of the borrowings, deposits and loans amounted to Rs. 658.80 lakhs, representing 88.9 per cent. of the total working capital. The owned capital of the bank was Rs. 81.76 lakhs, forming 11 per cent. of the total working capital and 12.4 per cent. of the total deposits. All the central Banks met punctually their liabilities, whether from the Provincial Bank or other sources

- 76. Arrears.—The overdues with individuals, banks and societies have gone up slightly from Rs. 26·37 lakhs to Rs. 27·45 lakhs. The percentage of arrears to total amount due was 11·3 as against 14·5 of the last year.
- 77. Profits.—All the central banks worked at profit during the year. The total amount of profit earned was Rs. 6,44,501 as against Rs. 5,00,882 of the preceding year.
- 78. General.—The East Khandesh Central Co-operative Bank continued to work as approved stockist of the Agricultural Department for the distribution of jarilla cotton seed to agriculturists. It also undertook supply work and was doing useful work in that direction. Most of the other central banks also undertook the work of purchase and sale of controlled articles either by acting as agents of Government or by opening fair price shops or by financing societies doing supply and distribution work.

During the year under report, the provisions of the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act were extended to the whole of the province. The banks continued to advance crop finance loans to their nominal members as well as to members of the affiliated societies (through the societies concerned) who were parties to proceedings under the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act, at the reduced rate of 41 per cent. interest. Compared to the year 1945-46, there was a considerable increase in the demand for crop finance during the year under report. The amount of crop finance advanced by the central financing agencies and societies upto 30th June 1947, amounted to Rs. 23,39,604 showing a total increase of Rs. 17.61 lakhs over that of the previous year's figures. The amount outstanding at the end of the year was Rs. 14,08,520 as against Rs. 5,58,571 of the last year. In order to enable co-operative societies to advance to their members secured loans at the maximum rate of interest, i.e., 6 per cent. and unsecured loans at a rate of interest not exceeding 9 per cent., all the central financing agencies were advised after the close of the co-operative year under report to reduce the lending rates to their primaries to 4 per cent. The Broach Co-operative Bank has agreed to make advances to societies at 4 per cent, while some district central banks have indicated difficulties in reducing the existing rates of interest to 4 per cent. The entire question is under active consideration of the Department and is linked up with Government assistance for making good the deficit due to reduction in the lending rates of interest.

(5) Banking Unions.

79. The number of banking unions at the close of the year was 3 as against 2 at the preceding year. The Poorva Panchmahals ('o-operative Banking Union at Dohad was registered during the year under report. Statement "A" appended at the end indicates the figures relating to the operation of these unions.

The Halol and Kalol Taluka Co-operative Banking Union and Wada Co-operative Banking Union continued to work satisfactorily during the year. The share capital and Reserve Fund of these two unions increased from Rs. 56,164 to Rs. 66,987 showing an increase of Rs. 10,823. Loans outstanding from individuals and societies, have gone up from Rs. 1,84,182 to Rs. 3,54,127. This marked increase was mainly due to advances against hypothecation of goods by the Kalol and Halol Taluka Co-operative Banking Union to Purchase and Sale Unions which had undertaken distribution work. The overdues amounted to Rs. 42,190 as against Rs. 30,493 of the last year. The working capital of these two unions increased from Rs. 4·12 lacs to Rs. 5·59 lacs showing an increase of Rs. 1·47 lacs. The Poorva Panchmahals Co-operative Banking Union which was registered during the last quarter of the Co-operative year commenced work after the close of the year.

(6) Non-Agricultural Credit Societies.

- 80. The year under review witnessed a further rise in the number of these societies from 885 to 928. Deposits of all classes with these societies increased from Rs. 10,04,03,501 to Rs. 10,42,62,824. As a result of an all round increase in the amount of share capital, adances and deposits, reserve and other funds, the total working capital of these societies stood at Rs. 14,87,45,314 as compared to Rs. 13,94,13,841 of the preceding year.
- 81. With the growing demand for banking facilities and continued improvement in the position of urban credit societies there was an increase in the number of urban banks, and salary earners' banks doing banking business having a share capital of Rs. 20,000 and above. Their number rose from 96 to 126. The following table gives the main statistics relating to the operation of these banks:—

^{82.} It will be noticed from the above table that the year under report witnessed a further substantial progress in the case of full-fledged urban banks and salary

earners' banks doing banking business in the Province. The membership showed an increase of 16,863. The rise in their resources in the form of deposits, share capital, bank loans and reserve and other funds is also noteworthy. The figures of profits and cost of management show an increase and the percentage of cost of management to working capital has increased to 1.2 as against 1.03 of the previous year. The position with regard to overdues has shown improvement over the previous year's figure, the percentage of overdues to loan outstandings being 6.8 as against 10.3 of the previous year.

Conclusion .- Most of the urban banks are working well and have introduced modern methods of banking. They are enjoying full confidence of the investing public on account of their efficient management and as a result are flooded with deposits though the rates of interest paid are reduced on such deposits and can now in most cases stand comparison with the rates prevalent in joint-stock banks of their size. They have been really instrumental in popularising the use of cheques by their customers. Members are adequately financed for trade and industry and many of the banks have introduced the system of accommodation on the security of agricultural produce and other merchandize, though the volume of such business has received a set back during the war years on account of operation of movement controls and monopoly purchases by Government. Some of them continued to play a prominent part in the distribution of controlled and non-controlled articles to their members and other consumers. Most of these banks continued to have unusable funds which they had to invest in Government and other gilt-edged securities carrying lower yield of interest. There has been, therefore, an incessant demand for giving them greater latitude in the matter of investment of their idle surpluses. The All-India Co-operative Planning Committee recommended that 40 per cent, of the surplus funds of such banks after making adequate provision for fluid resources be permitted to be invested in the shares of joint-stock companies at the discretion of the managements. This proposal was not, however, favoured by the 14th Conference of Registrars held at Madras. There are other problems also before these banks which were fully considered by the Registrar and a reference in the matter has been forwarded to Government which is still under the consideration of Government.

The following banks deserve special mention for their all round activities, progress and efficient working:—

- 83. Salary-earners' Societies.—There was a further increase from 483 to 495 in the number of these societies. Out of the total amount of Rs. 3,01.56 lakhs due for repayment to these societies actual repayments amounted to Rs. 2,89.24 lakhs, leaving a balance of Rs. 12.32 lakhs as arrears both overdue and extended with members. Of this amount, the amount of unauthorised overdues stood at Rs. 7.53 lakhs, forming 2.2 of the total amount due for repayment. The percentage of recoveries to demand shows an improvement from 95.7 of the preceding year to 96.00 during the year under report. The position with regard to recoveries must be considered very satisfactory in view of the fact that the continued high cost of living is adversely affecting the bulk of the salary-earners who borrow from the societies. Societies formed for salary-earners are as a class working satisfactorily in this province. These societies continued to render valuable services to their members as thrift and credit institutions. The business of joint purchase of domestic requirements through fair-price shops and ration shops is another line of useful war-time activitity which many of these societies continued to undertake during the year under report.
- 84. Communal Societies.—Their number has increased from 138 to 143 during the year under report. Out of Rs. 75:00 lakks due for repayment to these societies, Rs. 66.34 lakks were recovered by them, leaving the balance of Rs. 8.66 lakks as authorized and unauthorized arrears with members. Of this amount Rs. 7.50 lakhs were unauthorized arrears, forming 10 per cent. of the total amount due for repayment. The amount of arrears both overdue and extended shows an improvement over the last year to the extent of Rs. 1.57 lakhs. In view of the present conditions, the efforts made by these societies to serve the interests of the community for which they are established may be considered as satisfactory. As against other urban co-operative banks which develop features of the working of joint stock banks, communal societies are as a class co-operative in their outlook and work, as members are united in a common bond and look after the interests of each other. The only defect which these societies exhibit is comparative slackness in enforcing punctual repayment of loans from their members. These communal societies become also centres of other useful activities for their members. Amongst the societies of this class that are rendering useful service to their members and are well-managed and have a progressive outlook the following institutions deserve special mention :-

The table above indicates an all round increase in the number of members' deposits and working capital. There has been also an increase in the amount of reserve and

other funds. Total recoveries of loans, amounted to Rs. 73,91,500. Of the total loan outstandings of Rs. 59,91,969 at the close of the year Rs. 84,483 were overdue, the percentage of overdues to loan outstanding being 1.4 as against 1.2 of the proceding year. Some of the Factory workers' societies are rendering useful service to their members by opening fair-price shops and by undertaking joint supply of domestic requirements on indent basis and on their own account.

(7) Co-operative Insurance Society.

86 The Bombay Co-operative Insurance Society, Ltd.—In accordance with the provisions of the Insurance Act, the financial year of the society closes on 31st December.

It is gratifying to record that there has been a further decrease in the renewal expenses ratio from 14.25 per cent. to 14.09 per cent. 87. The society has been permitted by Government to invest upto 30 per cent. of its funds in preference shares and debentures of joint stock companies incorporated in India on certain conditions. Even with this concession, the society has only been able to earn interest on life fund investments at the rate of 3.10 per cent. This is attributed partly to the conversion operations of the Central Government whereby the 3½ per cent. loan was converted into 3 per cent. loan during the period under report and partly to the increase in the rate of income-tax which rose from 57 pies to 60 pies in the rupee.

OTHER INSURANCE COMPANIES.

- 88. There are three other institutions working in the field of insurance on co-operative basis. They are the (1) B. B. and C. I. Death Benefit and Endowment for Indian Staff Limited. (2) The Bombay Postal Employees' Co-operative Insurance Fund Limited. (3) The Mackinnon Mackenzie and Company's Employees' Co-operative Family Benefit Fund Limited. (4) The Ratnagiri Co-operative Motor Insurance Association Limited.
- 89. The Ratnagiri Co-operative Motor Insurance Association Limited founded in the year 1930 had 36 members on the roll; it insured 159 cars. The total assets of the Association amounted to Rs. 1,61,985 and it earned an income of Rs. 19,539 during the year under report. The net profits for the year ending 31st December 1946 amounted to Rs. 7,833. These institutions continued to render useful services to their members.

B-CONSUMERS' MOVEMENT

(i) Co-operative Stores.

90. The sub-joined statement indicates the main statistics regarding the working of co-operative stores during the last two years.

The year under report witnessed a further rise in the number of Co-operative Stores from 465 to 515. Fifty-nine stores were registered and nine were liquidated during the year under report. There is also an alround increase in the number of members, working capital and volume of total purchases and sales. Net profits earned during the year under report amount to Rs. 7,66.911 as against Rs. 8,41,548 for the previous year, showing a fall of Rs. 74,637. This is due to the increase in operational costs the percentage of which has gone up to 4.25 from 4.10. In addition to mere consumers stores, a number of co-operative credit institutions and non-credit institutions not only in urban areas but in rural areas, are conducting fair price shops and ration shops for the benefit of members and incidently non-members as well. On 30th June 1947, out of a total of 3,956 rural distribution centres, 1,369 were managed by co-operative societies. Though a large number was under management of village credit and multipurposes societies and purchases and sale organisations, some of the centres were also run by co-operative stores.

- 91. Almost all co-operative stores ordinarily deal in controlled and rationed articles for the sale of which they have been licenced. The assured business which has been available to distributive organizations of this type especially in view of Government's revised policy to give preference to co-operative institution in handling business in controlled commodities, was responsible for the incessant and growing demand for the registration of co-operative stores in the Province.
- 92. As in the past, consumers' movement in Ahmedabad division continued to maintain its lead in respect of the number of stores, membership and the volume of business transacted. Out of 515 stores in the Province, as many as 218 stores having a membership of 71,796 and working capital of Rs. 31,71,787 are situated in that division. The total value of goods supplied by these 218 stores amounted to Rs. 3.61,32,673 during the year under report. Next stands the Bombay division which has store organisations like the Bombay Central Excise Collectorate Supply Society, the Madras Co-operative Hostel Society, the Ismailia Co-operative General Stores, Cutchi Memon Co-operative General Stores and two stores run by the South Indian which continued to work successfully. The stores Department of the Ammunition Factory Co-operative Credit Society, Kirkee, which was till recently run by its parent Co-operative Society mainly for the benefit of the employees and workers of the Ammunition Factory at Kirkee during the war-time and was. not working satisfactorily for several reasons, has now been separated from its parent body and registered as a separate stores. This separation was a result of action taken to remedy the mismanagement which had crept into its working.

An enquiry was ordered into its affairs during the year and a special Officer of the Department was deputed to conduct it under the orders of Government. The question of taking suitable action in the light of the findings of the enquiry officer was still under the consideration of the Department and Government.

93. Among the stores that did good business during the year, the following stores deserve special mention.

(1) The Bombay Central Excise Collectorate Co-operative Supply Society with a membership of 463 and working capital of Rs. 55,593 had a total turnover of

Rs. 4,76,652 and carned a net profit of Rs. 15,634 for the year.

(2) The Mominpura Co-operative General Stores has 369 members and a working capital of Rs. 48,849. It sold goods of the value of Rs. 4,23,152 and earned a net profit of Rs. 25,884.

(3) The Madras Co-operative Hostel Society with a membership of 995 and

working capital of Rs. 24,336 had a turnover of Rs. 1,19,461.

(4) The Cutchi Memon Co-operative General Stores of Bombay with a member-ship of 336 had a turn over of Rs. 1,97,063 and earned a profit of Rs. 5,855.

(5) The Ismailia Co-operative Stores has a membership of 853. It sold goods

of the value of Rs. 4,18,107 and earned a net profit of Rs. 15,108.

(6) The Ideal Co-operative stores and the South Indian Co-operative Stores at Poona also did good work during the year.

(ii) Housing Societies.

94. The total number of societies at the close of the year stood at 167 recording an increase of 31 societies during the year. No society was ordered to be wound up. Of the new societies, 7 were registered in Bombay, 6 in Ahmedahad and the rest in other Districts. Owing however, to several restrictions on building activities and difficulties in obtaining building materials, most of the newly registered societies have not been able to make headway with the building programme.

- 95. Ahmedabad continues to be the main centre of co-operative housing activity. Most of the societies have, however, not still taken steps for grant of leases in form D'. As pointed out in previous reports, this is a disquieting feature of the working of these societies, and so long as this question is not satisfactorily solved, the societies cannot be called purely co-operative in character.
- 96. The increased demand for accommodation in Bombay has helped the societies to get over the serious financial embarrassment faced during the years of depression owing to vacancies in tenements and consequent fall in income. The introduction of the reconstruction scheme has also helped the societies to liquidate their liabilities to Government. The Vasant Theosophical Co-operative Housing and the Goud Saraswat Brahmin Co-operative Housing Societies paid off the entire balance of Government loan due from them. It is unfortunate that the implementation of the reconstruction scheme in the Saraswat Suburban Co-operative Housing Society, Ltd., Santa Cruz, has given rise to party factions which has affected adversely the working of the society.
- 97. A noteworthy development in the field of Housing is a scheme of Housing for the backward community of Halpatis in Surat District which has been sanctioned by Government as an experimental measure. According to the scheme, it is proposed to organise ten housing societies in suitable areas to be selected by the Deputy Registrar, Northern Circle, in consultation with the proposed Halpatis Housing Trust for the construction of 100 dwellings for the Halpatis. Government has sanctioned the following assistance:—
 - (i) Assuming the cost of a model dwelling at Rs. 500 a loan of Rs. 250 per dwelling for 100 such dwellings to be constructed by the 10 societies. The loan to be free of interest and repayable in 10 years and the assets of the society and dwellings to remain mortgaged to Government till it is repaid.
 - (ii) Building materials like timber and bamboos to be supplied at concessional rates by the Forest Department.
 - (iii) Available unoccupied Government land in Gavthans to be given at the concessional rent of 1/2 pie per square yard. Where such land is not available, suitable plots of 200-300 square yards per dwelling to be acquired and given on rent at 8 annas per mensem per plot.
 - (ic) The societies would also be eligible for a subsidy of half the amount spent by them in the construction of 10 wells for drinking water on the basis of 1 well per society.

Steps have also been taken after the close of the year to formulate schemes for organization of building societies for backward class people at sutable centres in consultation with the Backward Class Officer under the Post-war Reconstruction Scheme No. 219.

98. Consequent on the growing shortage of housing accommodation in the Province and especially in Bombay, Ahmedabad and other big industrial centres. Government appointed during the year, a Provincial Housing Board and a Provincial Housing Advisory Committee to formulate a long range policy to remedy the situation. A Housing Commissioner has been appointed to co-ordinate building efforts in general and to implement the Government's housing programme. It is expected that Co-operative Housing Societies would play a vital part in implementing the building programme, chalked out by the Housing Board and the Advisory Committee. On the recommendations of the Advisory Committee, Government announced after the close of the year, the terms on which it would grant financial

assistance to Co-operative Housing Societies. Accordingly, societies constructing tenements consisting of two living rooms and a kitchen (with other amenities) or of a lesser size, would be granted loans at 3 per cent. or at ½ per cent. less than the Government borrowing rate whichever is higher. These loans would be to the extent of 75 per cent. of the value of the land and buildings in the case of Tenant Co-partnership societies and to the extent of 60 per cent. in the case of other societies. Co-operative Housing Societies constructing tenements of higher standards than these will be entitled to loans to the extent of 50 per cent. of the value of the land and buildings at the rate of ½ per cent. above the bank rate, provided the bank rate is not lower than the rate at which the Government has itself borrowed on the last occasion before giving loans. For the present, however, the scope of the assistance referred to above would be confined to industrial towns of Bombay, Ahmedabad, Poona, Sholapur and Hubli.

(iii) House Reconstruction Societies.

99. During the year, one House Reconstruction Society repaid Government loan balance due from it in full and was thereafter ordered to be wound up. The number of House Reconstruction Societies thus stood at 12, as against 13 at the end of the previous year, while the balance of Government loan due from them stood at Rs. 4,224 as against Rs. 5,520 at the close of the previous year.

III. BOMBAY PROVINCIAL CO-OPERATIVE INSTITUTE.

- The outstanding event of the year was the introduction of a revised scheme of education and training in the light of the recommendations made in the Report of Co-operative Training and Education Committee, appointed by Government under the chairmanship of Sir Janardan Madan, the President of the Institute. The main recommendation of the report was that the Provincial Co-operative Institute should be the sole agency for imparting co-operative training and education to officials and non-officials throughout the Province, so that it would be the fountain head for the promotion of co-operative literature, research, and propaganda. The Institute took steps in right earnest to implement the various recommendations of the Committee by appointment of an Executive Officer in charge of the educational activities. In furtherence of the Committee's recommendations, a Co-operative Training College has been started at Poona and three Regional Schools for the three linguistic divisions have also been established at Surat, Poona, and Dharwar. Prior to the establishment of the college and schools, 13 candidates were selected for the post of Educational Supervisors who were given a course of training both in theory and practice at the training centre conducted under the guidance of the Joint Registrar, Industrial Co-operatives and Village Industries. The training course commenced on 14th January 1947 and concluded on the 15th June 1947. These Supervisors were posted in the respective districts with effect from 1st July 1947, and have started their work from that date of organising training classes for secretaries of rural societies and managing committee members of the societies.
- 101. The Institute has placed the administration of the Regional Schools on a sound basis. Divisional Boards of Education has been constituted as recommended by the Madan Committee, and the administrative control over the school and recruitment of competent staff for each school has been vested in the respective Divisional Boards. The schools at Surat, Dharwar and Poona commenced functioning by the 3rd week of June 1947, and have made a fairly good beginning. These schools are intended to provide co-operative education to Supervisors, Bank-Inspectors, Assistant Co-operative Officers and secretaries of big multi-purpose societies and purchase and sale unions.

- 102. The Co-operative Training College at Poona was inaugurated on the 14th June 1947 by Honourable Mr. V. L. Mehta, Minister for Finance and Co-operation. This top most storey of the training structure constitutes a land mark in the history of co-operative education not only in this Province but perhaps in the whole country.
- 103. The Co-operative Training College is expected to train higher staff of the Co-operative Department as also of the Co-operative Institutions. It provides a course of theoretical and practical training for one year, while the course at the Regional Schools is of six months' duration. The medium of instruction at the College is English, while the training imparted in the Regional Schools is in the regional languages. Only graduates are eligible to be admitted at the College. Candidates passing the examination to be held on the completion of the course would be awarded the Diploma styled as "Higher Diploma in Co-operation". The schools give the higher co-operative certificate. The administration of the College is being carried on by a committee constituted as under:—
 - (1) Chairman of the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Institute (Chairman).

(2) Registrar of Co-operative Societies (Vice-Chairman).

(3) One distinguished Educationist.

(4) One distinguished Co-operator.

(5) Chairman of the Co-operative Banks' Association.

(6) Principal of the Co-operative Training College.

104. In the field of publicity, the Institute has been publishing the Co-operative Quarterly as before. Steps to start journals in regional languages at the schools have materialized after the close of the year. The object of these journals is to serve as mouth-piece of co-operative thought, research and news in the region as a whole.

All-India Co-operators' Day.

105. The All-India Co-operators' Day was celebrated as usual at Bombay and in the districts.

Donations under Section 42 of the Act.

106. The total sum for which sanction was accorded during the year amounted to Rs. 45,640 donated by 292 societies as against Rs. 44,720 donated by 328 societies during the previous year. The total amount sanctioned by the Institute was utilised by societies for various purposes as under:—

11,865 on education.

99,600 on public works like repairs to road, sinking of wells, etc., and

1,060 on medical relief.

Grants.

107. The Institute received a Government grant of Rs. 29,687 for general work and Rs. 47,190 for educational work. Proposals have been submitted to Government to make statutory provision in the Act requiring all types of societies to contribute 1 per cont. of their profits as educational cess to the Institute so as to make this important activity less dependent on the public exchaquer.

General Remarks.

108. The Institute has put in a year of solid work, and carried out an all-sided programme of activities entrusted to it in the light of Madan Committee's Report. With the launching of a well planned scheme aiming at an integrated structure of educational and propaganda activities on a province-wide basis, it has assumed its proper role in the Co-operative edifice.

IV. ADMINISTRATION.

Gazetted Officers and Other Staff.

Registrar of Co-operative Societies, Bombay Province, Poona.

109. Mr. S. M. Ikram, I.C.S., continued to hold the office of the Registrar, Co-operative Societies, except for a short interval from 15th December 1946 to 11th January 1947, when I officiated as Registrar during the period during his absence on leave. In view of the increased responsibilities which have devolved on the Department as a result of the steps taken to implement the Post-war plans including the progressive development of regulated markets under the Bombay Agricultural Produce Markets Act. Government sanctioned the re-organisation of the superior staff of the Department with effect from 1st April 1947. Accordingly the post of the Registrar was converted into that of Registrar of Co-operative Societies and Director of Agricultural Marketing and Rural Finance.

The Registrar of Co-operative Societies was also entrusted with the administration of the Money Lenders Act after the close of the year.

Joint, Registrar, Co-operative Societies, Poona.

110. Mr. P. J. Chinmulgund, I.C.S., officiated as Joint Registrar, Co-operative Societies, from 1st July 1946 to 2nd September 1946, when he was transferred as Collector of the Panch Mahals. I took over as Joint Registrar on 4th October 1946 and was, in that capacity, sent on a study tour in Madras, United Provin es and Punjab from 11th January 1947 to 10th March 1947. During this period of study tour, Government sanctioned the post of Deputy Registrar, Headquarters, and Mr. S. G. Almoula was appointed to hold the post. Under the re-organisation scheme of the superior staff referred to above, the post of the Joint Registrar was converted into that of the Additional Registrar, Co-operative Societies, with all the powers of the Registrar under the Bombay Co-operative Societies Act delegated to him. I held the office of the Additional Registrar from 1st April 1947 to 30th June 1947.

Joint Registrar for Industrial Co-operatives and Village Industries.

111. Mr. D. A. Shah who was appointed as Joint Registrar, Industrial Co-operatives and Village Industries, on 13th July 1946 hold the office till the end of the year.

Divisional Deputy Registrars, Co-operative Societies.

- · 112. The three temporary posts of the Divisional Deputy Registrars at Surat, Nasik and Dharwar were held by the following officers:—
 - (1) Mr. R. N. Trivedi, Deputy Registrar, Northern Circle, Surat.
 - (2) Mr. N. V. Nayak worked as Deputy Registrar, Nasik, from 1st July 1946 to 14th April 1947 when he was transferred on deputation to work as Principal of the Co-operative Training College, Poona. Mr. S. G. Almoula succeeded him till the end of the year.
 - (3) Mr. R. S. Patil officiated as Deputy Registrar, Southern Circle, till 25th July 1946. He was relieved by Mr. N. P. Bhagwat (on return from leave), who held the post for the rest of the year.

Chief Auditor and Financial Adviser.

113. Mr. K. R. Kulkarni worked as Chief Auditor and Financial Adviser throughout the year.

Chief Marketing Officer.

114. Mr. V. D. Karkhanis continued to work as Chief Marketing Officer throughout the year. He performed in addition, the duties of Marketing Research Officer till 31st March 1947. Thereafter, Mr. R. K. Apte, Senior Assistant Marketing Officer at Bombay, was entrusted with the duties of Marketing Research Officer (in addition) for the rest of the year.

Under the reorganization scheme of the superior staff the status of the incumbent of the post of Chief Marketing Officer was raised to that of an officer of Class I so as to be commensurate with his responsibilities.

Personal Assistant to the Registrar, Co-operative Societies.

115. Mr. J. G. Saldanha worked as Personal Assistant to the Registrar throughout the year except for a short period of leave from 16th December 1946 to 5th January 1947 when Mr. B. M. Chitnis acted in his place. Government sanctioned also a post of Personal Assistant to the Additional Registrar, Co-operative Societies, in Provincial Co-operative Service, Class II, and Mr. B. M. Chitnis was appointed to hold the post.

Assistant Registrar, Co-operative Societies.

116. During the year under report, Government sanctioned the creation of the post of Assistant Registrar for Konkan Division (i.e., Kolaba and Ratnagiri Districts) with Headquarters at Mahad. The post was not however filled in till after the end of the year.

Subordinate staff:-

121. In view of a considerable increase in the number of societies the cadre of the District Audit staff was further reinforced by creation of 5 posts of Auditors with a clerk attached to each. Eight posts of Sub-auditors sanctioned last year but which were held in abeyance were filled in during the year.

The post of an Office-Superintendent with a senior clerk for work in connection with Post War Planning of the Department and the three additional clerks to cope with the general increase in work in Registrar's office, sanctioned last year continued through out the year. In addition, Government sanctioned the entertainment of the following staff on temporary basis in the Registrar's Office.

Special Temporary Staff:-

122. Both the posts of Auditors and Reconstruction Officers and the staff under them for areas served formerly by Nasik and Kaira District Central Co-operative Banks (in liquidation) were continued through out the year. Similarly the posts of Special Supervising Officer and the staff for supervision in the Dohad Taluka and Jhalod Mahal, the staff intended for the backward areas of Bardoli and Mandvi Talukas and that for work in backward areas in West Khandesh and Nasik District were continued.

The entire supervision staff of Senior Supervisors, Supervisors, and Assistant Supervisors placed under the control of the Department from 1st April 1946 as a temporary addition to the Departmental staff continued to be the same during the year.

Departmental Officers continued to work as Liquidators in Poona and Nasik Districts. The post of the Liquidator of the Dharwar Urban Co-operative Bank (in liquidation) was held by an officer of the rank of a Sub-Auditor as in the last year.

The additional 15 posts of District Co-operative Officers, viz., 6 posts sanctioned for the general increase in activities in the Districts particularly arising as a result of distribution work undertaken by Co-operative agencies and 9 posts for post war development work, were continued throughout the year. The 18 posts of Sub-Auditors—9 in the grade of Rs. 95—5—130 and 9 in the grade of Rs. 75—5/ 2-90 for work in connection with the administration of the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act were also continued along with other debt relief staff (viz., 51 Assistant District Co-operative Officers and 51 Land Valuation Officers). Though all these additional posts of District Co-operative Officers and Sub-Auditors were sanctioned oringinally by Government for specific items of work, with a view to secure more efficient disposal of work, it was felt necessary to readjust the administrative machinery in such a way so as to provide each District with one District Co-operative Officer and one or more Additional District Co-operative Officers or Assistant District Co-operative Officers according to the need of each District. The Additional District Co-operative Officers and Assistant District Co-operative Officers have been allotted territorial charges of 1 to 4 talukas and 18 posts of Sub-Auditors sanctioned for debt relief work were also utilised. as Additional District Co-operative Officers or Assistant District Co-operative These officers now concentrate on all items of work within their respective jurisdiction subject to the control of the District Co-operative Officer at Head Quarters.

The temporary posts of 7 clerks under the District Co-operative Officers were sanctioned on permanent basis.

The policy followed in the recent years to provide departmental hands as Managers of Co-operative Marketing organisations was continued during the year. The staff under the scheme for Fruit and Vegetable grading and for marketing of Jarila cotton in Khandesh Districts was also continued throughout the year.

Of the ten posts of Marketing Inspectors senctioned by Government for the execution of marketing development programme 3 posts were filled in during the year.

- Special Temporary staff for the Training Centre for training the staff of the Co-operative Department and other Provincial Co-operative bodies and personnel required by co-operative organisations to be set up under Post War Reconstruction Schemes.
- 123. The staff consisting of 1 Assistant Registrar, two Inspectors, and 2 clerks was continued during the year. During the first half of the year the ex-servicemen recruited to various categories of posts in the Department were given training at the Training Centre while in the latter half the personnel trained consisted of—
 - (1) Sub-Auditors recruited by the Department.
 - (2) District Officers recruited for Cottage Industries Section.
 - (3) Educational Supervisors, recruited by the Provincial Co-operative Institute, and
 - (4) Organisers recruited by the Provincial Industrial Co-operative Association. Following officers worked as Assistant Registrar in charge of the Centre—
 - Mr. S. G. Almoula ... 1st July 1946 to 10th January 1947.
 - Mr. K. V. Deodhar ... 26th January 1947 to 30th June 1947.

Consequent on the revised arrangements for training the staff of Department and that of non-official Institutions, sanctioned by Government, in the light of the recommendations of the Committee on Co operative Education and Training

(to which reference has made in the Chapter on Bombay Provinced Co-operative Institute), it was no longer necessary to continue the Departmental Centre. Orders were accordingly passed disbanding the Centre, as well as the teaching stuff.

HONORARY WORKERS.

124. The number of Honorary Organisers at the close of the year remained unchanged at 191, of which 49 were District Honorary Organisers and 115 Taluka Honorary Organisers. The period of appointment of Lady Honorary Organisers, which terminated on the 30th June 1916, was extended further for one year upto 30th June 1947. These appointments are made for curtain towns where there is scope for spread of co-operative movement amongst women and at the close of the year, there were 8 such organisers one each for Ahmedahad, Bombay, Belgaum, Ahmedagar, Dhulia, Nasik and two for Poona.

COST OF WORKING.

125. The cost of working of the Department together with the cost relating to the scheme for improvement of agricultural marketing, the cost of the scheme for co-operative training and education and other post-war schemes is indicated in Table "A" appended to this Report.

SUPPRESSION OF CORRUPTION.

126. Four cases in which departmental officers in subordinate ranks viz., one Assistant District Co operative Officer, two rural assistants and one secretary were involved in misappropriation of funds (and in one case goods) of societies came to light. All these cases were investigated by the Police. In one case, the officer concerned was acquitted, while the other three cases were till under investigation at the close of the year.

V. MISCELLANEOUS MATTERS.

(1) ACT, RULES AND BYE-LAWS.

Act and Rules.

127. There have been no addition or alteration to the Bombay Co-operative Societies Act, 1925, or the Bombay Co-operative Societies Rules, 1927, during the year. However, in order to overcome difficulties which have been experienced in the working of the Bombay Co-operative Societies Act, 1925, and to provide facilities for an orderly democratisation and development of the co-operative movement, proposals for the amendment of the Co-operative Societies Act have been taken in hand by Government in consultation with the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Institute and the Registrar. Detailed amendments to the Bombay Co-operative Societies Act and Rules are under consideration, and it is expected they they would be taken up by the Assembly during the next session.

Bye-laws.

128. A model set of bye-laws for federation of the purchase and sale societies and unions were framed during the year,

With a view to secure uniformity and to regularise the business of discounting of short-dated hundies and usance bills and to eschew as far as possible the risks inherent in this business, all central and urban banks doing hundi business and discounting usance bills were advised to adopt the following amendments to their bye-laws:—

- (a) Objects clause to be added to bye-law 3.—
- "To undertake discounting of short-dated hundies and usance bills on behalf of the members of the bank in accordance with the rules framed by the Board of Directors and approved by the Registrar of Co-operative Societies, Bombay Province, Poona."
- (b) Following clause to be added to the model bye-law 32 in leaflet "H" relating to duties and powers of the Board of Directors:—
 - "To frame rules for discounting of short-dated hundies and usance bills on behalf of the members of the bank, such rules being subject to the approval of the Registrar."

(2) ARBITRATION.

129. The total number of arbitration cases filed during the year was 1,650 and 2,293 cases were pending at the beginning of the year. Out of them, 1,497 cases were disposed of leaving a balance of 2,446 cases at the end of the year. Out of the total loans outstanding from members of all classes of societies amounting to Rs. 9,93,65,493, an amount of Rs. 31,44,692 was involved in arbitration recording a decrease of Rs. 5,93,482 over the figure of Rs. 37,38,174 of the preceding year. The amount of loans in cases in which awards have been obtained, but which were still with societies or Assistant Registrars pending execution were respectively Rs. 5,73,014 and Rs. 1,25,496.

(3) LIQUIDATION.

130. 31 Societies were ordered to be wound up during the year, while the liquidation proceedings of 19 societies were completed. The total number of societies in liquidation stood at 866 at the close of the year. The classification of societies taken into liquidation is under:—

The central financing agencies continued to be entrusted with the work of the liquidation of societies indebted to them. In a few cases the District Co-operative Officers, Assistant District Co-operative Officers and Supervisors were appointed as liquidators while suitable non-officials have also been entrusted with the liquidation work of some societies.

(4) RECOVERIES THROUGH SPECIAL RECOVERY OFFICERS.

131. The following statement shows the progress of recoveries effected through the agency of the Special Recovery Officers:—

The statement indicates that there has been a decrease of about Rs. 5,00,000 in recoveries during the year. The number of arbitration awards and liquidation orders sent to the Special Recovery Officers during the year shows a large reduction as compared with the figure of the preceding year and also records a substantial decrease in amount recoverable over the last year's figure, while the balance of the amount recoverable shows a decrease over the corresponding figures of the preceding year by Rs. 3,44,482.

(5) CRIMINAL CASES.

132. The total number of offences committed in co-operative societies and noticed during the year shows an increase over the previous year's record. The total number of prosecutions launched during the year was 60 which together with 35 cases pending at the close of the last year brought the total to 95. Of these 17 cases were decided, 8 resulting in conviction and 9 in acquittal. The total number of cases pending at the close of the year was 78.

The incidence of frauds in certain districts e.g.—East Khandesh, Nasik, Satara and Ahmedabad has been a regrettable feature and necessary steps have been taken to investigate cases of frauds and to take suitable action.

(6) SUSPENSION OF MANAGING COMMITTEES OF SOCIETIES.

133. The number of societies of which the managing committees were suspended was 79 at the beginning of the year. During the course of the year, committees of 8 societies were suspended, the period of suspended committees was extended in 19 cases and committees of 27 societies were re-instated. The number of societies of which the managing committees were under suspension thus stood at 60 at the close of the year.

(7) SCHOOL BOYS' SOCIETIES.

134. The year under report records a decrease in the number of school boys societies. The total number of these societies stood at 795 as against 766 for the last year. These societies have been working well and have demonstrated their usefulness in the matter of supply of books, stationery etc., to the boys attending the schools. The following statement shows the distribution of such societies in the province as on the 31st March 1947:—

VL CONCLUSION.

- 135. From the foregoing paragraphs it will be seen that the year on the whole has been a period of progressive development of the movement. Considering that during the last three years as many as 1948 societies embracing a variety of economic activities have come into existence both in rural and urban areas, the pace of expansion can be considered as satisfactory.
- 136. In the realm of rural credit, the extension of the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act to the whole province has emphasised the need for evolving an efficient machinery for the provision of crop finance to adjusted debtors. It is gratifying to note that in the process of building up the credit structure as many as 329 thrift and credit societies and 150 multipurpose societies were registered during the year. Simultaneously, efforts were also concentrated on reorganizing the working of the older established societies.
- 137. A distinguishing feature which continued to characterise the working of rural primaries is the extent to which they have participated in other beneficient activities like distribution of controlled commodities, consumers goods, etc. The efficient manner in which the societies have on the whole tackled these items of work have helped to infuse fresh blood into the movement, so much so that the co-operative society which till recent years mainly confined itself to credit business, has come to be regarded as a powerful agency capable of catering to the various economic needs of the rural folk. We have now reached a turning point when with the switch over from war to peace time economy, societies will no longer have the same avenues for many sided activities. It is, therefore, time that societies should devote their attention in right earnest to adjusting their working to rapidly changing The process of broadening the basis of societies which has already been in operation for several years deserves to be pursued with vigour so that societies in addition to the dispensing of credit can usefully undertake other activities relating to rural economy ranging from the provisions of seed and manures to the marketing of the produce of the agriculturists.
- 138. All India Planning Committee has suggested that the target of expansion should be to cover 50 per cent. of the villages and 30 per cent. of the rural population within the ambit of the reorganised primary society within a period of 10 years in two five years periods and that the membership of the primary society should be at least 50. As a result of the extension of the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act, the implementation of this recommendation of the Planning Committee has already commenced. The average membership of the society at present works out at 51, while about 7.5 per cent. of the rural population has served by the Co-operative movement. But it is necessary to guard against the complacency which may well be set the co-operators on account of the rather easy progress achieved during the war years, for war time spurt in prices and in scope for distributive trade is but a transitary phase and time has now come for the conservation of members, purchasing power through savings drive and consolidation of finance and functions of co-operative societies so as to enable them to weather the store storm of depression which may set in before long.
- 139. In the domain of long term finance the Furure of Land Mortgage Banks is be set with several difficulties which have arisen as a result of a fall in the business of Land Mortgage Banks. The position of the several of these Land Mortgage Banks at present is precarious and has been partly aggravated by conditions which have necessitated financing of land improvement schemes by Government through various

departmental agencies. The future of the Land Mortgage Banks depends on the policy Government decides to follow with regard to provision of long term finance to agriculturists and it is likely some of the Land Mortgage Banks, in the event of their inability to function as economic units, may inevitably have to be amalgamated with District Central Banks.

- 140. The urban side of the movement has continued to flourish in all its phasis, banking, housing etc. and demonstrates the potentialities of the moment for sections of the public which satisfy certain standards of intelligence, education and financial solvency. The Salary Earners Societies are proving useful agency for promotion of thrift, while Urban Banks continue to provide banking facilities in and outside the areas of operation of Joint Stock Banking Institutions. The large inflow of deposits in these banks inspite of a reduction in the rate of interest indicates increasing confidence of the public in the stability of these institutions.
- 141. Before I close, I should like to express my thanks to the non-official leaders and workers of the movement who at considerable sacrifice of their time continue to make valuable contribution to accelerating the pace of co-operative efforts. Considering that the recommendations of the All India Planning Committee advocate the application of co-operative method to a wide range of economic activities both in rural and urban areas, aiming at the achievement of a Co-operative Commonwealth, the need for an ever increasing band of enthusiastic workers imbued with the spirit of service and co-operative ideals amongst the masses is greater to-day than it has ever been before. I am also thankful to the members of the departmental staff, both Gazetted and non-gazetted, who have worked with devotion to duty and have ungrudgingly borne the strain of work of a rapidly growing department.
