CHAPTER - I.

I N T R O D U C T I O N .

1.1 General.

The Sangli District comprises of eight tahsils, Namely.-

The area of the district is 8591.3 sq.km. which is 11.6 and 2.80 per cent of the areas of the Poona Division and of the Maharashtra State respectively.

The district is located on the west of Deccan plateau, between 16-45° and 17.33° North Latitude and 73.42° & 75.40° East longitude.

There have been no changes in the boundaries of Sangli district since 1961 Census. For administrative convenience, Miraj and Khanapur tehsils were split up and two additional tehsils. (i) K.Mahankal (ii) Atpadi have been formed in 1964.

1.2 Administrative set up.

The district, under the control of the Collector is ~~divided~~ ^{divided} in to sub-divisions under the control of Prant officers and in to tahsils under the control of tehsildars.

The two sub divisions are Miraj and Walwa and they comprise of following tehsils.

After formation of the zilla parishad, a number of major developmental activities have been developed on zilla parishad and Panchayat Samities. The area under the jurisdiction of zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samities correspond to the district and tahsil areas respectively except for the Municipal limits which are under the control of municipal councils.

The number of villages and towns in each tahsil of Sangli district is shown below.

1.3 Territorial Changes.

The present Sangli district is mainly comprised of the former princely states-Sangli, Miraj (jr), Miraj (sr) Jath, and parts of Aundh State and part of British

territory namely Shirala, Walwa, Khanapur and Tasgaon Tehsils from Satara district.

Besides, one village from former Kurundwad state (sr), one village of former Wadi state, two villages from Athani taluka of Belgaum district and two villages from Shirol tehsil of Kolhapur district are also included in Sangli district.

Consequent upon the merger of these princely states they were included in the Satara district. On 1st August 1949 Satara district was bifurcated to form two districts, namely North-Satara and South Satara. The North Satara district comprised of the former Satara district with Head-Quarter at Satara and the south Satara district of the aforesaid former princely states and the four tehsils of former Satara district with Head-quarter at Sangli. These North and South Satara districts were renamed as Satara and Sangli districts respectively in 1960.

1.4 Physical Setting.

The Sangli district is situated on the Deccan plateau with Sahyadri Ghats on the west. Geologically the basal complex of western India consists of the igneous rocks. The Sahyadri range and its off shoots form the western boundary of the district. The Mahadeo range off shoot stretches upto Khanapur. The off shoots form the water parting between the valleys of Yerela and Man rivers.

Krishna and Warna are the principal rivers of Sangli district. Yerela, Morna, Manganga, Nani, Agrani and Bor are other small rivers flowing through this district. During rainy season the flood water entail much soil

erosion, while during dry part they resume a slender - course. These rivers go dry in summer season.

There are no important mineral deposits except for building stones and clay and lime stones. The limestone is associated with trap formation and the quality is not uniform.

Deep black soil is seen in the river vallays of Krishna,Warna and Yerala. Red soil or Murmad and gray soil is observed in the hilly areas of Shirala Tahsil and parts of Khanapur, Tasgaon and Jath tahsils. The soil is hard and less fertile. In the eastern part, soil is gray with poor or medium fertility.

1.5 . Climate.

a) Rainfall:- Broadly, rainfall declines from west to east. The western part of the district gets on an average rainfall over 1500 mm. The central part gets rainfall of about 650 to 750 mm and the eastern part gets rainfall averaging to about 500 mm. Most of the rainfall in the district is from the southwest mansoons. The rainfall starts in the middle of june and lasts upto the end of September.

The following table has been prepared to show variation of actual rainfall in the agricultural year (June 66 to May 67) and monsoon and post monsoon period of the year 67-68 from the normal rainfall for three selected centres in the western central and eastern part of the district.

Monsoon rains were found to be inadequate in the eastern part of the district in 1967-68. Scarcity conditions were witnessed in this part. 16 villages from Atpadi

tehsil were declared as scarcity affected and full suspension in Land Revenue was granted during 1967-68.

b) Temperature.

The district does not experience abrupt changes in temperature. The seasons are considerably uniform. During rainy season climate is cool and is followed by sultry weather in October and November. Winter sets in thereafter till January and dry hot climate is experienced in February and March followed by hot climate till monsoons set in.

Altitude modifies the average temperature in different seasons. In western part climate is cool and healthy in hot weather and is chilly during rainy season. Temperature climate persists on the plains of Walwa and Miraj tahsils. The eastern part experiences hotter climate than the central and western parts of the district.

In the year 1967, the temperature was lowest in January (14.1 centigrade) and highest (38.3 centigrade) in May.

The mean, mean-maximum and mean-minimum temperatures show an increasing tendency during the last several years as can be seen from the following table.

c) Humidity:- Humidity in the district is less in general as compared to costal regions. It is more in rainy season and recedes in winter. The air is dry in summer.

d) soil:- The soil in the district varies from the deep black in river valleys to shallow murmad red or gray in hilly areas.

In the western zone covering Shirala tehsil the soil is hard and less fertile except that on the bank of Warna river the soil is red laterite mixed with hard murum. Deep black alluvial soil is found in Miraj, Tasgaon Walwa tahsils. Fertility gradually reduces from south to North. In the eastern zone the soil is gray and is of poor or medium fertility.

e) Geographical regions:- The district can be broadly divided in to four zones. The western zone has heavy rainfall, forests and the soil is hard and less fertile and grows crops like paddy and nachani. This zone makes more than 7 per cent of the area of the district. The hilly area of Shirala tehsil is covered in this zone.

The central zone making about 41 per cent of the area of the district comprises of the rich agricultural tract of the Miraj, Walwa ~~xxxx~~ and Tasgaon tahsils. Krishna and Yerala flow through this zone. Jowar, ~~Wheat~~, gram, chillies, sugarcane turmeric are the principal crops of this zone.

The hilly tract comprises parts of Khanapur, Tasgaon and Miraj tahsils with medium type soil and low rainfall. This zone grows jowar and bajari crops.

The eastern zone is a scarcity prone area consisting of jath and atpadi tehsils and part of Khanapur tahsil. It has low rainfall and poor soil Bajari is the main crop of this zone.

Irrigation facilities have been developed in the central zone.

1.6 . Demography

a) General :- The population of the Sangli district in 1901 was 6.45 lakh which rose to 12.31 lakh in 1961. That is the population has increased by 91 per cent in 60 years period. The growth rate is found to have increased at very high rates during the two decades 1941-51 and 1951-61. The population increased at 22.8 per cent in 1941-51 decade, while it increased at 23.3 per cent during the 1951-61 decade. With this rate, the population of the district will be nearly double that of 1961 in the year 1991.

b) Density :- The density of population of this dist. was 143 per sq.km in 1961 as against 129 of the State of Maharashtra as a whole.

Among the tahsils Walwa and Miraj tahsils are thickly populated with population densities 261 and 339 respectively. The high density in Miraj tahsil is due to large urban population in Sangli and Miraj town.

respectively. The high density in Miraj tahsil is partly due to large urban population in Sangli and Miraj townships and partly due to fertile soil under intensive cultivation. Walwa tahsil is most densely populated rural area in sangli district. The soil in the tahsil is very fertile and rich, people are generally progressive and have adopted intensive cultivation methods in recent years. Very low density is observed in Jath tahsil. It is 61 per sq.km Land is of poor quality and the area is often prone to scarcity conditions.

c) Literacy. :- The percentage of literacy in the district for total, males and females in 1951 and in 1961 are given below :-

There is substantial increase in literacy during the decade 1951-61, it is more pronounced in case of females.

The literacy percentages for total males and females for the year 1961, in the Poona division and in the Maharashtra State were 29.30, 42.03, 16.10 and 29.82, 42.04, 16.76 respectively. Thus it will be seen that the progress of literacy in Sangli district was below that of the Poona division and also of the state.

Miraj tahsil has the highest literacy for total male and female population, both in rural and urban areas.

The age group wise percentage of literacy in Sangli district is given below.

The average literacy rates both for males and females are very high in the districts because of very high proportion for the age group 15.34 and high proportion even for the age group 35.59 .

d) Household size.

On the basis of 20 percent sample study, the following observations are made in respect of household size.

Households with 4 to 6 members are more common. (41 per cent) than others. The single member and two to three members size households are more (36 per cent) in urban areas than in rural areas (27 per cent). The average size of the household is 5.47 persons for the district.

e) Livelihood classification.

Of the total population of the district 43 per cent is engaged in work, remaining 57 per cent is non working

or dependent population. -11-

80 per cent of the working population is deriving its livelihood from agricultural pursuits while the rest from non-agricultural activities such as construction, industry, trade and commerce, transport and other services. The proportion of workers dependent on agriculture is very high. The corresponding proportion in the State is 72.07 per cent.

The ratio of cultivators to agricultural labourers is very high in Sangli district. It is 5:1 as against the state ratio . 2.11

There is a marked difference in the distribution pattern for non workers among males and females. 38.8 per cent out of male non-workers are full time students while full time female students account only 10.34 per cent. In urban areas this percentage is more than in rural areas . The percentage of non-workers such as dependants, Infants disabled persons, is lower in urban areas. the percentage of non working females engaged in household duties is higher in urban areas.

f) Dependency ratio:- The ratio between dependants and supporting population has an economic significance. In 1951 89.8 persons were dependent on 100 supporting population while in 1961 this ratio went up to 97.4 to 100. The corresponding dependency ratios for the State were 79.2 in 1951 and 84.9 in 1961. The higher ratio in Sangli district is due to migration of supporting population out of the district. There is increase in dependency ratio in 1961 over 1951 for both the district and the State and the reason may be found in high fertility and low mortality. The dependency load is larger in rural areas than in urban areas.

g) Sex ratios.

The number of females per 1000 males indicates the sex ratio.

The decennial sex ratios for the district in comparison with those of Maharashtra State are given below

The sex ratio varied from 984 in 1901 to 957 in 1961 for the district, while that for the State varied from 978 to 936. Excepting in 1911 and 1921, the district had always a higher sex ratio than that for the state.

Sex ratio is lowest in the age group 35-59 for Total and urban areas of the district.

C H A P T E R - I I .

EXPLANATORY NOTE.

2.1 The District Statistical Abstract for the year 1967-68 presents official statistics on climate rain-fall, agriculture, industries, education, health, cooperation, Transport and communication and a few other topics. The statistical data is presented in a tabular form. The data are collected from the concerned departments of the state and Central Governments and Local bodies. The foot notes at the bottom of the Tables show the sources from which the data has been obtained.

2.2 As far as possible, efforts are made to incorporate data for the year 1967-68 in the District Statistical Abstract. If data for the year 1967-68 are not available for various reasons, the data for earlier years are published.

2.3 In most of the tables presented herein, the breakup of the data is shown tehsilwise. In case, however, where tehsilwise figures are either not available or are found unrepresentable, only figures for the district are shown.

2.4 For convenience of reference the tables are grouped under 13 major heads, such as,

- i. Climate
- ii. Population.
- iii. Agriculture and so on.

The limitations and salient features are given below.

2.5 Climate:

Table 1 presents normal rainfall and the

number of rainy days and actual rainfall of various stations in Sangli district. Normal Rainfall is the average rainfall over a long period usually 80 years. The data are obtained from Govt. Gazette and the Tehsildars who keep the records of rainfall at taluka Headquarters. Tehsils Atpadi and Kavathe-Mahankal came in to existence in 1964. Therefore data on normal rainfall for these two stations are not available. The normal rainfall of Vita and Miraj stations can be made applicable to Atpadi and Kavathe-Mahankal stations respectively as these tehsils were carved out of Khanapur and Miraj tehsils respectively.

2.6 Maximum rainfall is received in the western part of the district. 1184.4 mm rainfall was recorded in 1967 at Shirala centre against normal rainfall of 862.2 mm. Kavathe-Mahankal received 489.3 mm rainfall during the year 1967 which was lowest in the district. Eastern part of the district is prone to scarcity conditions.

2.7 Table No.2 presents the maximum minimum and mean temperature at Miraj station in Sangli district. The mean maximum and mean-minimum temperatures are the averages of maximum and minimum temperatures respectively observed and recorded daily. The mean temperature is the average of the mean-maximum and mean-minimum. In summer the mean maximum temperature recorded at Miraj Centre was 38.3 C (May 67) and it was 14.1 C. in January 1967.

2.8. Population.

The data for Tables 3 to 8 presented in this abstract are reproduced from the Govt. of India publication-Census Report Volume X -Maharashtra part II.

2.9 The total population of the district as per 1961 Census is 12.31 Lakh which is 3.11 per cent of the total population of the Maharashtra State. The population has increased at a very high rate in the two decades 1941-51 and 1951-61. The growth rates were 22.8 and 23.3 per cent in the two decades and are quite alarming.

2.10 The population data is shown in hundreds. The density of population per sq.km has increased from 116.2 in 1951 to 143.2 in 1961. The density is highest in Miraj tehsil (338.8 per sq.km) and is lowest in Jath tehsil (61.42 per sq.km)

2.11 Table No.3 depicts tehsilwise population - classified in to males and females and also in to urban and rural. The rural, urban and total densities and percentage variation over 1951 population are also shown tehsilwise in this table.

2.12 Table No.4 shows tehsilwise classification of villages according to population ranges less than 200, 200 to 499, 500 to 999, etc. 35 per cent of the rural population stays in villages which have population between 2000 to 4999, and such villages constitute 23 per cent of the total villages. Another 25 per cent of rural population stays in villages having population between 1000 to 1999 and such villages constitute 36 percent of the total villages. Yet another 23 per cent population stays in villages having population between 5000 to 9999 and such villages constitute 7 per cent of the total villages in the district.

2.13 Table No.5 shows classification of towns according to population ranges. out of the 6 towns, 3 are in the population range 10,000 to 19,999, 1 in 20,000 to 49,999 and 2 in 50,000 to 99,999. There is no town with population more than 1 lakh.

2.14 The economic classification of the population is shown in Table No.6. The population of worker is 5.31 Lakh and is 43 percent of total population. The percentage of cultivators and agricultural labourers in the working population is 80.

2.15 The non workers constitute 57 per cent of the total population.

The Rural urban and Total population by livelihood classification in each tehsil is shown in Table No.6.

2.16 Table No.7. gives classification of population by age group, mother tongue and religion. 17 per cent of the total population has mother tongues other than Marathi and 16 per cent of the population has religions other than Hindu.

2.17 The scheduled castes & Tribes population in the district is 1.03 Lakh and constitutes 9 per cent of the total population. The scheduled tribes population is very thin and is concentrated in Jath tehsil. These data are presented in Table No.8.

2.18 Agriculture.

Land utilisation statistics, area under crops, yield rates, irrigation statistics are collected from the Directorate of Agriculture and are presented in Tables No.9 to 14. data regarding irrigation works are collected from Zilla Parishad and Irrigation and power department and presented in the Table No.15 and

16. Agricultural wage rate statistics is collected through C.D. block agency by the District Statistical Office and shown in table 17. Data on agricultural implements is reproduced from Live stock Census data of 1966 collected by Revenue agency at Tehsil level and compiled at district level by the District - Statistical Office. Table No.19 presents statistics relating to Famine, scarcity conditions in the dist. and is obtained from the Revenue department.

2.19 The latest statistics available for the year 1965-66 and 1966-67 are presented in the table No. 9,10,11,12,13¹⁵ and 16 . The data are provisional.

2.20 Out of the total geographical area of the district 89.20 per cent area is classified as - cultivable area of which 74.88 per cent area is net sown area. It is observed that the net area sown is showing a declining trend year after year. It was 689570 hectares in 1964-65, 658453 hectares in 65-66 and now it has reduced to 644790 hectares in 66-67. Gross cropped area too has declined from 675063 hectares in 65-66 to 669156 Hectares in 66-67. The decline is observed especially in Atpadi Tehsil.

2.21 The changes in the cropping pattern can be seen in Table No.10.

More than 75 % of the Gross cropped area is under Food Crops,61 per cent under cereals and 14 per cent under pulses, sugarcane, chillies, Turmeric, Fruits Vegetables and Miscellaneous food crops. - sugarcane account for 1.92 per cent of total gross cropped area in the year under reference. The area under total food crops has increased by 1407 hectares

over that of previous years (1965-66) and the area under non food crops has declined by 7314 hectares during the same period.

2.22 The yield rates and outturn are shown for the two years 1965-66 and 1966-67 in the table No.11.

2.23 From Table No.12, it will be seen how the area is irrigated in different tehsils.

2.24 The net as also the gross irrigated area in 1966-67 show an improvement over last years irrigation. The gross irrigated area increased by 5.22 per cent in the reference year over 1965-66. The increase^{is} markedly seen in Atpadi Tehsil where Gross irrigated area increased from 8633 hectares in 65-66 to 12630 hectares in 1966-67. In Jath tehsil there is a decline of 1975 hectares during the same period. 85.23 per cent of the net irrigated area is irrigated by wells alone. This percentage was 84.29 in the previous year (65-66). Irrigation by Tank is observed in Atpadi tehsil where as canal irrigation is concentrated more in Khanapur, Tasgaon and Miraj tehsils.

2.25 Area irrigated under different crops in the years 1965-66 and 66-67 is shown in table No.13.

2.26 There is increase of 3053 hectares of irrigated area in 1966-67 over that in 1965-66. This rise is accounted as follows, 490 Hectares in Food crops & 2563 in Non Food crops. Under non-food group irrigated groundnut area has decreased from 770 to 346 hectares and has increased under other oilseeds from 128 to 539 hectares. The major change is under other miscellaneous non food crops where an additional

area of 2558 hectares has been brought under irrigation. Nearly 87 per cent of the gross irrigated area is covered by food crops and 13 per cent by non food crops. The percentage of irrigated area under food crops has slightly decreased. Among food crops, area under food grains (i.e. cereals and pulses) cover 50 per cent of total gross irrigated area in the dist. under all crops during 1966-67.

2.27 The table reveals a fall of nearly 45 per cent in the irrigated area under sugarcane. This is difficult to explain. The only plausible explanation is that the reporting authorities may have misclassified the data of irrigated area.

2.28 Table 14 indicates number of irrigation wells in each of the tehsils in the years 1965-66 and 1966-67. The number of wells have increased in Atpadi, Jath and Miraj Tehsils. 328 new wells have been added while 180 wells have gone out of use during 1966-67, with the effect of net 180 additional wells coming under use only.

2.29 The number of Minor irrigation works in use, not in use under the state, Local and coo-p. sectors and net area irrigated by them is depicted in table No.15. The net irrigation acreage has increase from 6675 to 9153 hectares during 1966-67. The bulk of additional irrigation ^{is} found under works of cooperative sector only.

2.30 There are no major irrigation projects in Sangli district. The details of the only medium irrigation project of Khodashiweir are given in Table No.16.

2.31 Table No.17 gives details of Agricultural wage rates in different areas of the district.

2.32 Animal Husbandry and Forests.

The total livestock population in Sangli dist. according to 1966 Census is 9.26 Lakh. Of this 3.08 Lakh are cattle and 1.81 Lakh are buffaloes, the remaining constitute sheep, goat and other livestock. About 47 per cent of the cattle is for working bullocks and 14 per cent for milch cattle. On the otherhand working buffaloes constitute only 5 per cent while she buffaloes in milk constitute 34 per cent of the total buffaloes. The poultry population of this district is 6.26 lakh. The livestock and poultry data are shown in Table 20.

2.33 The livestock per 100 hectare is 117 in Sangli district as against, 116 in Poona division. The number of poultry per 1000 human population in Sangli district is 509 as against 394 for the Poona division.

2.34 Table 21 given veterinary statistics availed from the zilla Parishad office.

2.35 FACTORY EMPLOYMENT INDUSTRY AND ELECTRICITY.

This section presents in all 10 Tables. The first three give us an idea about Factories in this district. The information relates to the calender year 1967. Out of 103 facto-ries 4 were closed at the end of year. 7567 persons were engaged in 88 factories submitting returns while 11 Factories not submitting returns employed 285 workers. The classification of factories according to their working strength shows that 34 factories employ 20 to 49 workers, 25 factories employ 10 to 19 workers. The no. of factories employing less than 10 workers is 8. Table No. 27 shows that more than 50 per cent of the factories were working for more than 300 days.

2.36 The next three tables display data about the working of employment exchange. It ~~xxx~~ is seen that registration and placement has decreased during the year 1967-68 as compared to 1966-67. Only 360 persons were given employment in 1967-68 as against 448 in the previous year. Table No.30 gives us an idea about changes in volume of employment in one year from March 67 to March 68. The No. of reporting establishments have increased from 402 to 416 while the no of employees increased from 34762 to 35559.

2.37 It is seen from the tables 31 and 32 that there were 5513 Govt. servants in this district. Their departmentwise breakup shows that Revenue and Home department cover majority of them.

2.38 Since the private companies are purchasing bulk supplies from M.S.E.B. It is seen that generation is reducing year by year. Generation is resorted to only in times of emergency. There is increase in purchase of electricity from 66625 Megawatt to 77812 megawatts. The consumption is also increased by 16 %. In the year 1967-68 total consumption was 57146 megawatt as compared to 49072 megawatt in 1966-67.

✓ 2.39 Cooperation.

In this section cooperative statistics for the year 1967-68 is exhibited. For a fair comparison the data for the year 1966-67 is also displayed. The Statistics collected from Dist.Dy.Registrar of cooperative societies indicates very well the progress of this movement.

2.40 Table No.36 indicates that the total No of cooperative societies increased from 1058 to 1085 during

a year under review. The salient feature of this growth is that the no. of non credit societies is increased.

2.41 Table No.37 shows that there is a good deal of increase in the short term, medium term and long term advances by Land Development Bank, Central Cooperative Bank and Urban Banks.

2.42 The no. of agricultural credit societies decreased from 523 to 522. However there is an increase in share and working capital and loan advanced. The percentage of recovery is decreased in the year 1967-68 as is seen in Table No.38.

2.43 Table No.39 presents the development of all other types of cooperative societies. It speaks very well about the development. The no. of animal Husbandry societies increased from 45 to 59 and that of industrial societies from 117 to 123.

2.44 In the absence of the exact data about the volume of trade in this district it is not possible to say any thing about the share of cooperative societies in marketing sector of the economy. However Table No.41 and Table No.42 will give us the complete idea about cooperative marketing. There were 4 regulated markets at Sangli, Vita, Tasgaon and Takari and 10 primary marketing and 1 district level marketing society in this district. The results of their operation are given in these two tables.

2.45 Table No.43 deals with money lenders.

2.46 MEDICAL AND PUBLIC HEALTH.

Tables 44 to 47 exhibit the statistical data on this section. This table pertains to data collected from the public and public aided bodies like municipalities.

2.47 Table 44 shows the various types of medical facilities alongwith medical staff and the beneficiaries from the data it is observed that there is increase in the number of doctors by 3 and of nurses by 9. Indoor female patients and outdoor patients have also increased.

2.48 Table 45 gives births, deaths and infant deaths Statistics for 1966 and 1967. This information is collected from the Assistant Director of Public Health Poona. It is seen that the births, deaths and infant deaths during 1967 have increasing trend and as compared to the year 1966 the increase in births, deaths and infant deaths is 14.1%, ^{7.7}% and 11.5% respectively.

2.49 Table 46 deals with the deaths due to important causes during the years 1966 and 1967. The table reveals that major deaths are due to periperatory diseases - dycentry-diarriboea and by T.B. ²⁾deaths by these three causes consist 18% for the years 1966 and 1967. Deaths by other causes are also considerable and that amounts to ^{7.6}13% of the total deaths for 1967.

2.50 Table 47 depicts primary vaccination revaccination and Cholera inoculation for the years 1966 and 1967. The data for this table is supplied by the Public Health Officer, Z.P. Sangli and by the Municipalities in this district. The work undertaken as measures against diseases during 1967 ^{has} increasing trend. Percentage increase regarding primary

- -

vaccination below one year and above one year during 1967 over 1966 amounts to 35.40 % and 20.97 % respectively and for revaccination and Cholera inoculation is 14.02 % and 20.88% respectively.

2.51 Education.

The progress made by Sangli District in the field of education can very well be judged from the tables 48 to 55.

2.52 The first three tables dealing with literacy, present the data collected in 1961 census. The percentage of literacy in each Tehsil for rural and urban area separately and that for males and females separately is given in table No.48 alongwith the information for the district as a whole. The next two tables give the classification of the population in rural areas and urban areas separately according to different levels of education. It is observed that the proportion of literate population is more in urban areas than in rural areas and more in males than in females. The percentage of literacy is 45.66 in urban areas and 24.01 in rural areas. The same is 13.64 in respect of females and 41.88 in respect of males.

2.53 The no. of educational institutions, their enrolment and no. of teachers is given in table No.51. The information is given for the district as a whole.

2.54 The no. of backward class student and concessions given to them, the no. of students taking benefits of freestudentship to economically Backward class students is given in the next two Tables.

2.55 .Every year the State Govt. is giving grants to Zilla Parishad and Municipalities to reimburse some percentage of expenditure incurred by them on primary education. The Table No.54 gives us the actual amounts disbursed to them during the year 1967-68.

2.56 The last table in this group shows that there is not a single village without facility of primary school.

2.57 TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATION.

The progress in various sectors of developments is very much linked with the efficient system of transport and communication. Adequate transport facilities are very essential in backward areas.

2.58 The total route length of metre gauge and narrow gauge in this district is 171.4 km. The work of conversion of metre gauge ^{1/5} to broad gauge on Poona Bangalore section is in progress. On an average the rail length per 100 sq. km. is only 2 km.

2.59 The table about roads ^{e/e} shows that the total road mileage in the district is increased from 3325.85 km to 3637.44 km. The roads in municipal limits also record a slight increase in their length. The major increase in road length is under category of other roads and that having Black Topped, W.B.M. and G.M. Surface.

2.60 The Nationalised Road Transport of passengers has shown remarkable progress. The average service distance per day was 68430 km in March 67 which rose to 73427 km in March.68. The number of vehicles on road per day rose from 295 to 319 during this period. Operational fleet increased by 36 vehicles. The average earning per vehicle per day was Rs.304 in 1966-67 which rose to Rs.349 in 1967-68.

2.61 The Table No.53 shows motor vehi

2.61. The Table No.58 shows Motor vehicles in operation in Kolhapur Region as on 31st March 1967 and 31 st March 1968. District-wise data is not available with the Asstt. Regional Transport Officer; The total number of vehicles was 9197 as at the end of 1966-67 which rose to 10535 at the end of 1967-68.

2.62 The number of post offices increased by ^{one} ~~me~~ from 327 in 1966-67 to 328 in 1967-68 .so also there is an increase in number of telegraph office by one. The number of telephones increased from 1133 in 1966-67 to 1369 in 1967-68. There ^{is} an increase of 4,768 radio licences (New as also renewals including) in 1967-68 over the pervious years figure of 15075 licences.

2.63 LOCAL BODIES.

Information mainly on item like income and expenditure of local bodies i.e.the village Panchayats Municipalities and Zilla Parishad is presented for the years 1966-67 and 1967-68.

2.64 ZILLA PARISHAD.

The total income of the Sangli zilla Parishad during the year 1967-68 was Rs.6.27 crores and the expenditure during the same year was Rs.5.75 crores.

2.65 The Zilla Parishads were ^{formed} ~~formed~~ on 1st May 1962 on the acceptance of the principle of democratic decentralisation. Under the Zilla Parishad, Tahsil Panchayat Samities function at the tehsil level and the Gram Panchayats at the village/groups of villages level.

2.66 The Zilla parishad has established a press and undertakes printing jobs on commercial basis in addition to its own printing work

2.67 village Panchayats

The number of village panchayats remained same at 592 at the end of 1967-68. also. Their income ~~ine~~ decreased from Rs.67.70 lakhs 1966-67 to Rs.64.59 lakhs in 1967-68. The expenditure ~~100~~ decreased from Rs.71.14 lakhs in 1966-67 to Rs.55.59 lakhs in the year 1967-68 .

2.68 MUNICIPALITIES :- There are 6 municipalities in the Sangli districts. Their average annual income - during 1966-67 was Rs.72.77 lakhs. In 1967-68 this was Rs.75.09 lakhs.

2.69 None of the six municipalities has any local - transport undertaking. The Sangli Municipality owns a and is operating the Jubilee Electric supply company which mainly supplies electricity with-in the municipal area, purchased from the M.S.E.Board.

2.70 PLAN AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT.

A review of achievements is taken separately in the chapter number IV of this volume.

2.71 On the basis of quarterly progress reports and the annual progress reports of the district level plan schemes, the data is compiled and presented in the tables number 67,68,69,70 and 71.

2.72 The schemes which accrue benefits to a district are classified as district level schemes, those which extend benefits over a number of districts in a Division are classed as divisional level schemes and those extending benefits over a number of division are classed as state level. In the Table compiled and presented account of district level schemes only is taken. The items of information covered are expenditure

under different plan Schemes during 1966-67 and -
1967-68, Physical achievements, an important subjects,
The area coverage under community Development blocks,
their stages, expenditure of community blocks and important
physical achievements under the community development
blocks.

2.73 The expenditure during 1966-67 was Rs.3.47 crore,
but during 1967-68 it declined to Rs.2.75 crore.

Agricultural developmental programme has all along -
received high priority. 46.08 per cent of the total -
expenditure during 1967-68 was on agricultural development
under agriculture head, Soil Conservation and minor
irrigation programme along account for 75 per cent of the
expenditure on agricultural programme.

2.74 Under the Community Development Programme the
entire rural area of the district is covered in to 13
C.P.A. pattern blocks Rs.9.97 lakh were spent on community
development programme and rural works programme. The
programme of Applied Nutrition-a scheme to provide
Nutritional diet to weaker section of the community-like
children, women and backward classes, has been undertaken
in Miraj block.

2.75 P R I C E S. - The weekly prices are collected
at the district head quarter by the District Statistical
Office, Average retail prices of selected commodities -
are presented for each month of the years 1966 and 1967.
The limitation of this data is that it cannot be accepted
as representation of price situation, it is only expected
to serve as a broad indicator of trend in change in
prices. This is because one price quotation is collected

for one commodity from a ~~fixed~~ fixed shop. These prices are given in Table No.72.

2.76. Table No.73 gives the price Index Number for working class for Shohapur centre worked out by the office of the Commissioner of Labour, Bombay on the basis of principles laid down by The Lakadawala Committee. The consumer price Index has gone up from 150 in the year 1966-67 to 165 in the year 1967-68 (The base being 1960=100)

2.77 . MISCELLANEOUS . :- Under this head Statistics on various topics such as police force, crime, cinema insurance general election, small savings, joint stock, companies and banks, news papers, and Land revenue are presented.

2.78. The cost of police force rose from Rs.24.9 lakh in 1966-67 Rs.33.9 lakh in the year 1967-68, that is the cost increased by 36 per cent. There is 12 percent reduction in the total cognizable crimes. There is also a reduction in the number of non-cognizable crimes.

2.79. In the civil courts, the number of cases disposed off were 3901 on original side and 357 on appellate side during 1967 as against 3788 and 506 corresponding cases respectively during the year 1966.

2.80 Under the statistics collected from Cinema Theatres it is observed that the number of permanent theatres has declined from 15 to 14 during 1967-68 and correspondingly seating capacity has changed from 6971 to 6414. There are 9 theatres in Miraj tehsil, 2 in Walwa tehsil and ^{One} each in Khanapur, Tasgaon and Jath tehsils.

2.81 . From the table No.80 on Life insurance it is seen that in 1967-68 the business went up by 10.8 per cent over that in the last year.

The amount insured rose from 2.03 crore in 1966-67 to 2.25 crore in 1967-68.

2.82 From the table No.81 on small Savings collection it is apparent that the gross collection under various small Savings schemes such as National Defence Certificates, 10 years Defence Certificates, 15 years annually certificates, post office savings Bank, cumulative time - Deposits, etc. rose from 1.41 crore in 1966-67 to 1.62 crore in 1967-68, *however the withdrawal being more during 1967-68* The net collection decreased from 22.50 lakhs to 20.65 lakh that is 8.2 per cent reduction.

2.83 Table No.82 shows Land Revenue collection in 1966-67 and 1967-68. From the data it will be seen that the total demand of Land Revenue has declined in 1967-68 as compared to its previous year owing to suspension of land revenue on account of scarcity condition.

2.84 The Table on news papers, periodicals show that there are 78 printing presses in the district, 2 Marathi daily news papers and 10 weeklies are published, most of them from Sangli and Miraj cities.

2.85 Table 84 throws light on General Elections held in 1967. Party wise numbers of votes polled are also shown there in.

C H A P T E R NO. III.

SECTORIAL TRENDS.

3.1 In this chapter an attempt is made to review analytically the developments in the various sectors of development such as agriculture, livestock and poultry, employment, electricity, education, public health, communication and others. For this purpose a series of indicators have been worked out for each of the tahsils which have been reproduced at the end of this volume. In the analysis, comparison is made over the years 1966-67 and 1967-68 wherever data was available readily. In case of agriculture, data for the years 1965-66 and 1966-67 are taken up for the review. The data of 1960-61 is also considered for comparison wherever necessary.

3.2 The following table indicates percentage of gross cropped area to net cropped area, sown in Sangli district.

3.3 The percentage of double cropped area can be regarded as an indicator of development. Judged from this point of view the achievements in the agricultural sector are discouraging. The percentage of double cropped area has declined from 104.0 to 103.8. However it is not bad as compared to 102.5 in 1965-66. The absolute figures of gross cropped area and net cropped area, however show an altogether different picture. In 1960-61 the gross cropped area and net area sown was 667787 and 641901 hectares. The same increased to 675263 and 658453 in 1965-66. The figures of 66-67 are on a lower level with 669156 hectares gross cropped area and 644790 hectares net sown area.

3.4 Inter tehsil comparison shows that the percentage of gross cropped area varies from 101.0 to 112.0.

3.5 It is maximum in Shirala Tehsil (112.0) and minimum in Miraj tehsil (101.0) Atpadi and K.Mahankal Tehsil also has good percentages viz, 107.8 and 105.2 respectively.

3.6 Though with the rise in irrigation facilities it is but natural to expect more double cropped area, the tendency to shift to cash crops of longer duration like sugarcane and turmeric resulted in a smaller difference in gross cropped area and net area sown. Area under Sugarcane has increased from 9053 hectares in 1960-61 to 12849 hectares in 1966-67.

3.7 It is heartening to note that the gross irrigated area is increasing year by year. The figures of gross irrigated area for the years 1960-61 and 1966-67 show that there is an increase of 25.6 percent during the span of 6 years. In 1960-61, 48935 hectares area was

gross irrigated area. The same increased to 58385 in 1965-66 and to 61438 hectares in 1966-67. The increase in this area is largely due to irrigation by well. The corresponding figures for 65-66 and 66-67 being 42704 and 44553 hectares. The major increase is in Atpadi and Miraj Tehsils.

3.8 The number of wells in use has increased slightly in the year 1966-67. There were 38067 wells in use in 1966-67. The increase in no.^{of} wells is found in Atpadi, Jath and ~~Jath~~ Miraj Tahsil.

3.9 Corresponding to an increase in gross area irrigated there is an increase in net irrigated area also. In 1960-61, net irrigated area was 43171 hectares in 1965-66 it was 60664 hectares and in 1966-67 it was 52273 hectares.

3.10 The net area sown during these years was 641901 hectares, 658453 and 644790 hectares respectively. The percentage of net irrigated area to net area sown works out to be 6.72, 7.69 and 8.19 respectively. This shows that there is rise in the ratio of net irrigated to net sown area every year.

3.11. Yield Rates-

One of the important measure of assessing ^{Agricultural} ~~agricultural~~ Development in the rise in productivity of crops. The yield rates of some of the important crops are given below.

3.13 The above table clearly indicates that the tendency to grow food crops ^{is} increasing. The percentage of area under food crop is increased in 1966-67. The increase is distributed among food grains and other food-crops. The percentage of area under Jowar however is decreasing year by year as against that of Rice, Wheat and Bajra. Though the percentage of area under nonfood crops ^{has} decreased the percentage of area under groundnut has increased to some extent.

3.14 As far as the irrigated area is considered the situation is as follows.

3.15 The percentage has decreased in respect of Jowar and sugercane while it has increased in respect of Rice wheat and misc.food crops.

AGRICULTURAL CREDIT.

3.16 The cooperative societies have been ^{playing} ~~acting~~ a very important ^{role} in the field of agricultural development by extending credit facilities on an extending scale year after year. The credit facilities through the agricultural credit societies and L.D.Bank have been considered here. The following table will in a nut shell bring out the position of the credit societies, their membership loans advanced by them and their outstanding dues.

3.18 It is seen from the above table that though there is decrease in the number of societies, all the activities and operations of the credit societies have been increased. During the year 1967-68, Loans advanced amounts to Rs.491.56 which is 18.12 % over and above the previous year, 1966-67. For the year 1967-68 the amount of loans outstanding as over dues is Rs.61.37 lakhs which is decreased by Rs.7.54 lakh. The percentage of overdues to the loans advanced during the year 1967-68 works out to 12 % as against 17 % for the year 1966-67.

3.19 The Land Development Bank that cater, for the long term credit facilities has advanced loans amounting to Rs.164.30 lakhs which is increased by Rs.58.24 lakhs over and above the previous corresponding figure.

WAGE RATE.

3.20 Data on agricultural wage rates in rural areas commenced to be collected since the year 1963-64. The three centre selected for this purpose are Madhavanagar, Budhagaon, Atpadi and Jath and the data is collected from certain selected cultivators every fortnight.

3.21 The wage rates have been found to vary with urban and rural characteristics of the selected places. Madhavanagar-Budhagaon centre is very close to Sangli-Miraj urban area and as such wage rates are found to be always higher at Madhavanagar than those prevailing in other two centres namely Jath and Atpadi.

3.22 The male field labourers are found to get wage rate between Rs.2.50 to Rs.3.50 at Madhavanagar-Budhagaon centre while the female labourer is paid at Rs.1.25 to Rs.1.60 per day. The corresponding rates for males and females in the other two purely rural areas namely Atpadi and Jath have been found to be varying between Rs.1.50 to Rs.2.50 and Rs.0.75 to 1.50 respectively. No child labour has been found to be employed during the year.

3.23. Skilled workers such as carpenters, Blacksmiths, cobblers whose services are required occasionally for agricultural purposes are still found to be paid on 'Baluta' system under which the wages are paid in kind only annually usually after harvests. Carpenters, Blacksmith and Cobblers are paid at Rs.100 annually at Madhavanagar, Budhagaon centre. Wage rates for carpenter and Blacksmith at Atpadi are Rs.114 per year while that for Cobbler Rs.60 per year. Wage rate paid to Carpenter and Blacksmith at Jath centre amounts to Rs.110 per year and that for cobbler Rs.150/- per annum.

LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY.

3.24 Animal Husbandry makes a substantial contribution to the economy by providing income to farmers, subsidiary food to human population and resources of employment to landless labourers. A quinquennial census of livestock

poultry and agricultural implements is taken all over the country. The 10 th such census was done in 1966. From the data available through the census it will be seen that only 35 per cent of the total cattle population is economically useful. Apart from the lower productivity of cattle, the quality of draught cattle is also poor. With rapid increase in urbanisation of rural population and migration of labour to industries, the rearing and developing of livestock assumes greater importance from the point of view of agricultural development.

3.25 The following data will depict Tehsil wise details of livestock per 100 hectares.

3.26 In Jath tehsil, the indicator is very low. It is also below district overage in K. Mahankal Miraj and Khanapur tehsils. As against this Atpadi and Walwa tehsils have a fairly high number of livestock per 100 hectare. The plausible reason for the contrast is scarcity of fodder crops in the lands of low fertility & scanty rainfall.

3.27 The number of livestock per 100 hectare for Poona Division as a whole is 116. The Indicator 117 for Sangli district compares favourably with that of the Division.

3.28 The total poultry in 1966 was 6,25,785 in Sangli district as against 4,97,992 in 1961. The human population according to 1961 census for Sangli district is 12,30,766. The count of poultry birds per 1000 population was 405 in 1961 and 509 in 1966. The comparative ratios for Poona - Division are 344 for 1961, and 394 for 1966. The rate of increase in poultry per 1000 human population in Sangli - district is 26 per cent as against 14 in Poona Division during 1961-65.

3.29 The above comparison is based with the assumption that human population is same in the two years under - reference. However the estimated human population of Sangli district in 1966 is ^{14.2%} 11.26 lakh and according to the poultry per 1000 population in 1966 would be 440 to be more exact. Even then this is an improvement over 1961 Indicator to the tune of 8.6 per cent rise.

consumption of electricity.

3.30 The per capita consumption of electricity in - Sangli district was 39.9 KWH in 1966-67, in 1967-68 this rose to 46.4 kwh. The per capita consumption of electricity in Poona Division was 53.6 kwh in 1966-67. The data for 67-68 for the division ^{is} not available for - comparison.

Enrolment at Employment Exchange and vacancies notified.

3.31 The backlog of unemployment will have to be wiped out before seeking a goal of full employment with all the new addition to the labour force year after year. Additional Employment opportunities must be substantially in excess

of additional labour force coming up so as to cover up cumulative backlog of unemployment.

3.32 Total number of vacancies notified during ~~1967-68~~. ~~This~~ 1967-68 is 579 as against 1218 during 1966-67. Thus - these figures show 52 % decrease in the opportunities of employment. As against 579 vacancies during the year - 1967-68, 360 placements have been made leaving ²¹⁹ 219 - vacancies the-year unfilled. This deficiency might be due to non-availability of suitable candidates at local - employment exchange.

3.33, The registration number during 1967-68 was slightly decreased. The registration was 7549 during the year 1967-68 as against 7600 during the previous year 1966-67.

INCREASE IN INDOOR AND OUTDOOR PATIENTS.

3.34 During 1967 number of indoor patients male, female and children were 3160, 7582 and 3334 respectively. The corresponding figures for 1966 were 3760, 5783, 3769 - respectively. It is th seen that there is decreased in male - and childnaen patients while there is increase in female patients. During 1967 the total increase in indoor patients works out to 5.73%. The corresponding increase during 1966 was ~~2.23%~~ 2.98 %

3.35 Number of outdoor patients increased from - 41986 to 47077 during 1967. This increase works out to 11.23 % as against 11.5 % during 1966. The percentage - increase in respect of males, females and children works out to 11.33, 13.33 and 17.35 per cent respectively.

Increase in number of students in different categories.

3.36 Increase in number of students can be regarded as an indicator of progress in the field of education to some extent. It is seen from the table that the progress is satisfactory.

3.35 The number of outdoor patients increased from 419986 to 479777 during 1967. This increase works out to 14.23 % as against 11.3% during 1966. The percentage increase in respect of males, females and children works out to 11.88, 13.33 and 17.35 per cent respectively.

Increase in number of students in different categories .

3.36 Increase in number of students can be regarded as an indicator of progress in the field of education to some extent. It is seen from the table that the progress is satisfactory.

3.37 It is seen from the above table that increase in the pupils at higher education stage is notably high. This increase during 1966-67 was 9.00 % in case of boys and 17.2 % in case of girls.

Increase in banking facilities.

3.38 The total number of banking offices was 73 in 1968 as against 64 in 1967. Thus there is increase of 8 offices. During the previous year 1967 there were 5.2 offices per lakh population while during 1968 the corresponding figure is 5.9. Thus there is increasing trend in banking facilities.

Increase in road length.

3.39 The total rail gauge length in Sangli District has not changed. This rail gauge length is 26.6 km and 84.8 km. on metre gauge and Narrow Gauge respectively. After the conversion of metre Gauge to Broadgauge -

there will be a *slight* increase in the total length of rail length in the district. The impact of conversion will be more on rural economy.

3.40 As far road length is concerned it was 3552 km. in March, 1967 and 3870 km. in March, 1968. Thus there is an increase of 318 km. in road length during 1967-68. This length also includes the length of municipal roads.

Thus the road length per 100 sq. km comes to 41.85 km in March, 1967 and 45.05 km. in March, 1968.

3.41 PRICES. :- A ^{glance} at the price index number for working class will reveal that general price level in 1967-68 has shot up by 65 per cent over that prevailing in 1960-61. The major groups of items which have contributed to the inflationary trend are Food, Pan-Supari-Tobacco and intoxicants fuel and light and miscellaneous groups. Food articles have recorded 81 per cent rise during 1967-68 over that in 1960-61, while Pan, Supari-Intoxicants recorded 46 per cent rise. Fuel and light and Miscellaneous groups show 43 per cent rise. Housing and clothing groups, however, show a smaller rise comparatively. (They being 21 and 37 per cent during the same period)

3.42 The above observations are made from the consumer price index number computed for Sholapur Centre. The Index is applicable to Sangli district as well.

3.43 Since November 1962 the prices of important commodities are being collected by District Statistical Organisation at each of the dist. head quarters. The modal prices of certain important commodities prevailing in 1962, 1965 and 1967 are given below.

3.44 Most of the commodities show and sharp increase in price level. Gramdal shows ^{nearly} ~~nearly~~ four times rise while rice, wheat, jowar, arhar-dal, groundnut oil, gur, potato show more than 100 per cent increase. Vanaspati oil, Kerosene oil, shirting, cigarettes, indicate more than 50 per cent rise while, Tea, Washing soap, turmeric, record less than 50 per cent rise in price level.

C H A P T E R - IV.

ANNUAL PLAN 1967-68.

4.1. General.

The Third Five year Plan ended in March 1966. From 1966-67 annual plans are executed pending finalisation of the Forth Five Year Plan.

During 1966-67 an amount of Rs.3.47 crore was spent in Sangli district where as in the year under review (1967-68) total amount spent was Rs.2.79 crore. Expenditure under different heads of development during 1967-68 is as shown below.

The programme of agricultural development has all along received a high priority.

The Expenditure in the Third Five Year Plan period (1961-62 to 1965-66) was Rs.6.88 crore. On an average, the annual expenditure during Third Five Year Plan can be said to be Rs.1.38 crore. The expenditure in the year 1966-67 was Rs.3.47 crore and that in 1967-68, Rs.2.79 crore. The per capita expenditure during these periods works out to Rs.11.18, Rs.28.16 and Rs.22.64 (taking 1961 population as constant for all these years.) Thus it may

It has been seen that the rate of expenditure in the Annual Plan years 1966-67 and 1967-68 were more than double that of the per capita expenditure in the Third Five Year Plan. Per capita expenditure appear to have declined in the year 1967-68 when compared to that in the previous year. The Head-wise expenditure and achievements are given below.

4.2. AGRICULTURAL PROGRAMME.

During 1966-67 an amount of Rs.169.32 lakh was spent on various schemes under agricultural programme. This formed 48.85 per cent of total expenditure in 1966-67. During 1967-68, the expenditure amounted to Rs.128.76 lakh and this formed 46.8 per cent of the total expenditure in 1967-68. The sub head wise expenditure is shown below.

Soil conservation and Minor Irrigation together account for about 76 per cent of the total expenditure on Agricultural programme. Dairy development was another important activity on which 15.2 per cent of the expenditure is observed to have been incurred. Expenditure on scheme for production was Rs.10.56 lakh and accounts for only 8.3 per cent of the expenditure on agri. programme.

Very little expenditure is done on other sub heads such as land development, fisheries, warehousing and marketing.

4.3 Achievements under Agricultural programme.

Since agriculture is mostly a private enterprise the government programmes consisted mainly of promoting adoption of improved agricultural practices on the part of cultivators. Hybrid seed production programme was undertaken as in the past years and 2679 quintals of Jawar seeds and 89 quintals of Bajari seeds were obtained. An area of 26047 acres (i.e. 10541.22 hectares.) was brought under the commercial and the high yielding varieties of food crops. To improve the quality of groundnut yield an integrated (Package) scheme was undertaken and 50,000 acres under groundnut was covered by improved seed distribution, 90,000 acres by distribution of fertilisers and 25,000 acres by seed treatment.

In order to augment the supplies of fertilisers emphasis was laid on production of green manures and organic manures. Municipalities were encouraged and assisted to prepare town composts subsidy was given for transporting and excess production over average production of previous two years. The municipalities prepared 8334 tonnes of town compost against the target of 15,000 tons during the year.

Green manures has all the nutrients of chemical fertilisers to encourage the use of green manures 25 per cent subsidy was offered for distribution of green manure seed. The targets for the year was 500 quintals distribution of sann seed, however 141.90 quintals ^{were} only distributed.

The intensive cultivation programme was undertaken in irrigated and assured rainfall areas by setting up compact blocks of 20,000 acres each with special whole time Agricultural Assistants staff. All the food grain crops were to be covered in such blocks. During 1967-68 an area of 16466 acres was covered under this intensive programme.

The small holders among cultivators with limited capacity for investment cannot accrue benefits of various land development measures. A scheme for integrated area development (Popularly known as paje Scheme.) was launched to bring the lands of small cultivators under a package of improved practices. Integrated programme of land improvement and water conservation measures were taken up along with allied activities of animal husbandry, dairy & poultry. The scheme has been operated in Tasgaon tehsil.

Under the Kharif and Rabi crop campaign an area of 62040 acres was covered. Under the campaign certain measures such as supply of seed at subsidised rates, supply of oil engines and pump sets on hire, fertilisers mixtures at half cost supply of irrigation water free of charge and intensification of plant protection measures were undertaken especially in intensive cultivation areas.

Under the general horticultural development programme provision was made for granting long term loans for new fruit plantation and rejuvenation. Accordingly the additional acreage brought under horticulture during this year is 144.5 acres distributed over different fruit plantation as shown below.

In order to help small holders who are not in a position to obtain loans from the Land Development Bank a programme of sinking community wells and installation of pump sets thereon was undertaken and 26 such wells were sunk during 1967-68. The expenses were met from the provisions made under Integrated Area Development for small holders scheme. 1942 wells were constructed and 1577 pump sets were installed under the schemes of construction of irrigation wells and Installation of pump sets. The Govt. met the cost of subsidy ~~proportion~~ only. The finance was provided by L.D.Bank.

The scheme of lift irrigation on cooperative basis from rivers, nalas and wells was undertaken since long steps were undertaken to revitalise the existing societies and to encourage new societies---
--by introducing revised feasibility norms. One such society was organised in 1967-68 and additional irrigation acreage increased by 3800 acres. The minar irrigation works programme was undertaken as in the past under the scheme diversion scheme (Bandharas), percolation tanks and renovation of tanks works were undertaken. Works irrigating upto 250 acres were transferred to Zilla Parishad. In the state sector the following 5 works were still in progress at the end of the year 1967-68.

- 3) Khandrajuri Tank in "Miraj Tehsil.

According to the rough estimates an area of 15.52)
lakh acres in Sangli districts required to be bunded upto
the end of last year. So far area was bunded. The target

for the current year was 65,000 acres. Area bunded during the year is 53,410 acres. To stop soil erosion, terracing of land programme was taken up on hilly slopes and 14.30 acres were brought under terracing.

Under the afforestation of soil conservation programme 125 acres of land was brought under economic plantation and 255 acres under pre-monsoon works.

The programmes of livestock development have a four-fold objective (i) to increase the supply of protective food for improving nutritional standard. (ii) to provide draught cattle for farm operations. (iii) to improve the outturn of certain commercial products like wool hides and skins and (iv) to supplement the incomes of cultivators from farm operations. The programmes of improvement of cattle and poultry were stepped up through better organisation, selective breeding improved fodder and application of intensive methods. During 1967-68 veterinary dispensary buildings were completed at Ashta, Thirala and K. Mahankal. The veterinary aid centres continued to function in this year. Under the schemes of cattle breeding centres and District Premium bulls, 148 bulls were located for improving cattle breed.

With the veterinary aid facilities now available the risk of poultry rearing is minimised. The farmers are taking to poultry breeding on a large scale. Nine individuals were granted loans for poultry breeding.

Milk processing and distribution scheme has been functioning at Miraj. Erection of machinery for milk pasteurisation and other equipment was done in this year and the capacity of handling milk was thus increased. The Dairy at Miraj has been handling more than 28,000 litres of

-7-

milk per day and has exceeded the target set. Under the schemes of grant of loan for purchase of cattle and giving assistance to coop. Milk Union, Rs. 11.30 lakh were distributed by way of loan to Krish^{na} Vally^e Dudh Utpadak - Puravatha Sangh Ltd. and 22 coop. Societies were given assistance.

Under the fisheries programme purchase of 135 kg. of Nylon twine was subsidised. Inland fishing has not made expected progress due to difficulty in setting carp fry in required number. 20,000 carp fry have been stocked and about 2000 kg. fish have been netted during the year under review.

Under the scheme of development of agricultural marketing 4 societies were given managerial subsidy as in the past.

4.4. Cooperation and community development.

During 1966-67, Rs. ~~17.54~~ 17.54 lakh were spent on cooperation and community development, Rs. 2.62 lakh on cooperation and Rs. 14.92 lakh on community development. This accounted for 5 per cent of the total expenditure in the year 1966-67. During 1967-68, Rs. 16.09 lakh were spent on the schemes under this sub head. This forms 5.9 per cent of the total expenditure in 1967-68. Rs. 6.12 lakh were spent on cooperation and Rs. 9.97 lakh on community development. The expenditure under the sub-head, cooperation was on development of cooperative marketing, cooperative farming and strengthening of coop. credit structure & consumer stores.

Under the sub head community development most of the expenditure was on community development programme, and rural works programme. Scheme of Applied nutrition had been implemented under this sub-head.

4.5. Achievements under cooperation and community develop-
-ment.

The agricultural production programme depends to a large extent on the production credit provided by cooperative institutions. Govt. have taken energetic measures to support and strengthen cooperative structure for efficiently discharging its vital function of providing supplies and services to the cultivators. These measures include inter alia share capital contribution to the apex institutions, grant of management subsidies, outright grants to service cooperatives. As a result 107 service societies received outright grants the membership of cooperatives increased by 10358 during 1967-68.

The Govt. has taken various steps for linking credit with marketing and for strengthening and expanding cooperative marketing movement. The marketing societies were given financial assistance by way of loan and subsidy for construction of godowns. Managerial subsidy on the existing pattern to the district and primary marketing societies. During 1967-68, 10 societies received loans and subsidy for construction of godowns and 3 societies received assistance by way of share capital contribution.

On ^{receiving} realizing that the assistance available to the cooperative farming societies, which are farmed mostly by weaker section of the societies, the assistance was given on liberalised pattern for land development, 6 societies received loans during 1967-68 for land development and 13 societies received management subsidy.

With a view to stabilising general price level of essential commodities and to ensure unimpeded distribution of consumers goods to the public at fair price financial assistance by way of share capital contribution, loans and

management subsidy was given to 6 consumer cooperatives.

The approach of the community development programme has been to stimulate an integrated rural development based on local initiative and community action with establishment of panchayat raj institutions in 1962 at dist. block and village levels and the transfer of authority to them, a significant advance has been made in organising rural community specially for undertaking economic and social activities in rural areas. Community Development blocks now cover the entire rural area of the districts.

Under the Applied Nutrition Programme taken up in Miraj Block, attention is given to the nutritional dist. to weaker sections of the community like children, women and backward classes. The activities include poultry pisciculture, horticulture, dairy development etc.

The Rural Works Programme which aims to provide employment in rural areas during slack season envisages and undertaking wide range of works such as soil conservation, minor irrigation, markets roads etc. Priority was given to scarcity areas while implementing this scheme. Under the scheme 53 roads, 4 cross drainage works, 17 bandharas were built and 2 tanks were completed.

4.6. Power Project.

During 1966-67 Rs.106.08 lakh were spent on Rural electrification. This formed 30.6 per cent of the total expenditure in 1966-67. In the year 1967-68 an expenditure of Rs.64.60 lakhs has been incurred on this scheme and it accounts for only 23.2 per cent of the total expenditure in the year 1967-68.

4.7. Achievement under Rural electrification programme.

A high priority has been accorded to the programme of rural electrification in the state. In Sangli district, 16 villages were electrified during 1967-68 bringing the total number of villages electrified to 203.

Against a target of 1200,2604 agricultural pumps were energied. As a result of large scale rural electrification programme the demand for consumption of electricity for agriculture is also steadily increasing.

4.8. Industries.

During 1966-67, Rs.2.17 lakh were spent on different schemes of development of industries. The expenditure was less than 1 per cent of the total expenditure in 1966-67. In the year 1967-68, the expenditure on the schemes under this sub-head was Rs.3.25 lakh, which formed 1.2 per cent of the total expenditure in 1967-68.

4.9 . Growth of small scale industries has been stimulated by the government particularly in rural areas through various measures such as provision of facilities in the nature of development of industrial estates, finance subsidy supply of raw material etc. The Dist.Coop.Industrialisation and Development Society established in Sangli during the Third Plan has taken up schemes based on local raw materials and provide employment to landless agricultural workers. Handloom weavers are encouraged to organise themselves in to coop.societies.Govt.give financial assistance to such societies for purchase of tools and ~~xxxx~~ equipment, - ;purchase of shares, provision of houses and sheds and rebate on sale of cloth. One society received financial assistance, 6 member received loans for purchase of - shares and 8 societies received assistance.

Assistance by way of share capital contribution to societies and members were 17 and 17, managerial subsidy to 14 societies, tools and equipment to 13 individuals, subsidy for godowns to, 3 societies was given under the scheme of Industrial Cooperatives including handicraft workers. 194 loans received loans to the tune of 1.60 lakh under the scheme of Industries under S.I. Rules.

4.10. Transport and Communication.

During 1966-67, the expenditure on the schemes under this head was of the order of Rs.6.70 lakh, which accounted for 1.93 per cent of the total expenditure in 1966-67. In the year 1967-68, however the expenditure incurred was only Rs.4.20 lakh, amounting to 1.5 per cent of the total expenditure in 1967-68.

4.11 The schemes implemented under this head were construction of district Roads roads of economic importance roads in sugarcane areas and village roads. During 1967-68, 3.95 miles of dist.roads were constructed by zilla Parishad, no new roads were constructed or improved by the B & C Dept. No cross drainage works were undertaken, Only 12 culverts were constructed by the B & C dept. on Miraj - Pandharpur & Karad-Vita-Khanapur Roads. 4.5 miles of village roads were constructed by the Zilla Parishad against the target of 11 miles. The bridge on the Miraj-Pandharpur road at Bhoose under the scheme of roads of Economic importance is almost completed.

4.12. Social Services.

During 1966-67 Rs.44.83 lakh were spent on various schemes under the different subheads of social Services such as Education, Public Health, Water supply & drainage Labour Welfare, Housing etc. The expenditure accounted for

12.93 per cent of the total expenditure in 1966-67. During 1967-68 Rs.63.39 lakh were spent on this sub-head and this formed 22.7 per cent of the total expenditure during 1967-68. The sub-head wise expenditure is given below.

4.13. Achievements under Social Services programme.

(a) Education :- The system of education has been made adaptable to meet the requirements of skills at various levels. The system is expected to give minimum standard of knowledge to take up technical and vocational courses. - Opportunities to acquire minimum standard of education have been widened. Primary education has been made free and compulsory throughout the State. Schooling facilities have been made in almost all villages. With the expansion in number of school going children additional 270 teachers were appointed in primary schools run by the Zilla Parishad. - The programme of scholarship and freeships in secondary schools have been expanded. During 1967-68 60 students got benefits under this scheme in this district. The scheme for free education to the children of economically-

backward class persons has been continued and 63 pupils benefited from this scheme. The Govt. have decided to recruit only trained teachers in primary schools in future. Therefore the backlog of untrained teachers has to be eliminated quickly. The capacity of primary training colleges has been increased. As an incentive to inservice trainees, the rate of stipend of untrained teachers has been increased from Rs.40 to Rs.60 p.m. 246 teachers benefited under the scheme. Under the scheme of improvement of science education seven schools were provided with laboratory equipment, during 1967-68 and under the scheme of Development of Non-Govt. secondary schools, 30 schools were given benefits.

One Technical High school received grant for additional staff and equipment under the scheme of Development of Technical Schools.

(b) Health. : Improvement of curative facilities, preventive measures for control and eradication of epidemics, provision of drinking water facilities measures to control population growth and basic services for maternal and child health are the programmes covered under health schemes.

During 1967-68, side by side with the expansion of basic facilities for curative services the standard of dist.hospital has been improved by providing blood bank & blood transfusion services. X-ray and laboratory services. The continuing works on the construction of civil hospital were in progress. One Additional Medical Officer was appointed at the Primary Health Centre.

After completing the intensive phase the national malaria eradication units are converted into maintenance units. The scheme of control of small pox which was intensified in the Third Five year Plan has been continued to

maintain the tempo of primary vaccinations and revaccinations

Concentrated efforts are necessary to reduce the birth rate so as to check the fast growth of population. It is estimated that during a span of 5 years 1961-66, there was an increase of 12 per cent in the population. The family planning programme was intensified during the Third Five Year Plan period with emphasis as sterilisation and adoption of contraceptives. Since 1965, steps were taken to popularise the intra-uterine contraceptive device. Incentives have been provided for undergoing sterilisation operations and adopt intruterine contraceptive method. During 1967-68, 11236 sterilisation operations were performed and 963 I-U.C.D. insertions were made.

(c) Water supply and Drainage.

As regards schemes of drinking water supply and drainage, the government has liberalised the assistance to municipalities but the progress depends mainly on the initiative and efforts on the part of municipalities. In rural areas 29 wells were sunk under the scheme of simple measure (wells) and 3 schemes of piped water supply were in progress.

(d) Housing.

Various schemes of housing have been undertaken to relieve the shortage of accommodation and to prevent slum formation, to provide, housing space for village experiencing population pressure flood affected villages, and settlement of nomadic tribes. schemes for industrial workers low and middle income groups were under taken since beginning of the First Plan. Under the scheme for middle income group housing has been entirely financed from the life Insurance Corporation funds. Substantial finance is

given from L-I.C. funds to houses under low Income group Housing Scheme. Extension of village gaathan was done in 14 villages, 23 tenements were constructed under low Income Group Housing Scheme, and 18 tenements under village Housing Project scheme. The spill over works of houses under the subsidised Industrial Housing Scheme were completed during 1967-68.

e) Urban Development.

With the growth of industrialisation, it became necessary to regulate the development of the area outside the municipal limits. To prevent the growth of developing cities in a haphazard way, a new uniform Act known as the Maharashtra Municipalities Act 1966 has been enacted to enable the municipalities to strengthen their finances and to undertake developmental activities. Sangli Municipality received one lakh rupees by way of financial assistance for developmental activities.

(f) Welfare of Backward class.

Supplementary programmes have been undertaken to provide liberal assistance to the backward class people to remove their social and economical disabilities. Grant of scholarships tuition fees, examination fees were given to 1210 students of backward classes and 297 students of -
vimukta Jatis .15 agriculturists received assistance under propagation of improved agricultural implements, 8 benefited under the scheme for special facilities to Vimukta Jatis for wells and development of land, 3 industrial -
coop. societies received subsidy assistance and 7 housing societies were assisted financially.

g) Social Welfare.

Under the social welfare programme 58 Institutes received financial assistance for indertaking ametiorative measures- In rural areas the State Scoial Welfare Board has been looking after the welfare of women and children by running extension projects etc. craft centres, mahilamandals special care of expectant and nursing mothers.

b) Lanour and Labour Welfare.:-

The faailities for technical and vocational train-
-ing continued to be expanded at the Industrial Training Institute. For want of physical facilities like building, workshops, equipment the expansion of seats could not be as it was desired. During 1967-68 the building programme has been stepped up to remove the deficiency in building and equipment. The existing capacity at I.T.I.Sangli is 220 - seats.
