DEWAN ORDER No. 108/76 dated 26-12-1927

3. Resolution :—

The Government will be glad if the Vidyadhikari will arrange every year for a careful intensive study of the working of the Compulsory system in four or five villages in each of the District inspecting officers' ranges. The study should include, among others, the following points :—

The Vidyadhikari should arrange for careful study of compulsory system.

- (1) Whether the lists of school-going children are complete.
- (2) The reasons for non-attendance.
- (3) The grounds on which exemptions are applied for and granted.
- (4) The strength of various classes and a detailed analysis of the reasons for the withdrawal of pupils before they have gone through all the four classes.
- (5) How far literacy has increased among the communities in the village as the result of Compulsory Education.
- (6) Generally the manner in which the system is worked.
- (7) The extent of lapse into illiteracy of pupils who have been through the full compulsory course.
- (8) The extent to which parents appreciate the system and whether there has been a change for the better in recent years in this respect.

2. These reports should be attached, with a short review by the Commissioner to the annual education report.

Memorandum

Under D. O. No. 108/76 dated 26-12-1927 each of the six Prant Vidyadhikaries was asked to make an intensive study of conditions and figures affecting the success or otherwise of the Compulsory Education Act and submit a report embodying the information collected and the conclusions to be drawn therefrom.

2. The reports received are of varying interest. They deal mainly with the distribution of population in the villages and the population of school-going age, the figures of new admissions and desertions year by year and absenteeism, so far all the reports are more or less uniform, though the manner of presenting this information is not uniform. For instance, the Baroda sub-division report gives the figures separately in a tabular form and attempts to analyse them and discuss their significance in the body of the report. The others discuss each school separately without any attempts at analysis or co-ordination. The arrangement of the Baroda report is the better one and should be followed in future. Secondly, many of the studies suffer from an important defect. The object of the studies was to find out from a special investigation of the individual case of each pupil conducted by the inspector himself the reasons for absenteeism or retardation. Without conducting an individual enquiry of this type, most officers have given general reasons for these phenomena, the value of which is open to doubt.

3. The Government direct that the present studies should be published after being carefully edited by their authors, under the title:—"Compulsory Education Studies-No. 1."

4. In the coming year, such studies should be conducted by deputy inspectors. Each deputy inspector should study one village in his area completely. In conducting these studies the following additional points should be borne in mind :—

- (i) The figures of seasonal fluctuations should be investigated both in regard to the numbers on the roll and the percentage of absenteeism comparing figures month by month for a series of years.
- (ii) Irregularity in attendance and absenteeism and the reasons thereof should be investigated for each pupil separately by the officer himself.
- (iii) Similarly, stagnation and the causes thereof should be studied for each pupil and the results tabulated,

- (iv) Each study should be submitted to the inspector who will examine it carefully and have the information supplemented whenever necessary.
 - (v) All the studies should be submitted to Government by the end of the year and such of them as are useful and throw new and interesting light on the question connected with elementary education will be published in the series above referred to.
5. Copies of publications in the series should be circulated to all inspectors and deputy inspectors, prant panchayats and municipal councils and revenue officers.

**REPORT ON THE INTENSIVE STUDY OF SIX VILLAGES IN THE
BARODA DIVISION RE: THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE
COMPULSORY EDUCATION**

This report is respectfully submitted in accordance with the orders of H. E. the Dewan Saheb as per Memo No. 108-76 dated 26-12-27 as also His Excellency's order dated 10-1-40.

A careful working of the compulsory system in one village school of every Taluka was conducted every year by the Deputy Inspectors. His Excellency the Dewan Saheb while passing remarks on the annual report of the department for the year 1938-39 ordered that instead of continuing such studies it would be worthwhile henceforth again to take up for study the villages studied in 1930-31 and to see what changes have been effected by educational efforts during the interval. The present study therefore has now been made in light of His Excellency's order referred to above. The following villages were selected:-

Table No. 1 shows the distribution of population in the various villages and the enrolment of the pupils in the schools. The percentage of enrolment has increased in two villages. The following table gives a clear comparative idea of the state of things in the year 1930-31 and 1939-40.

In three villages the percentage of girls has increased while in the case of boys the percentage has increased in two villages only. The decrease is due to lowering of the compulsory age from 14 to 12 in the case of boys as per order passed on Mr. Littlehale's recommendations. The above table shows that more girls take advantage of education at present than 1930-31.

Table No. 2 gives figures for accretions and desertions by months.
Explanation of table No. II. The figures for 1930-31 show that the number of enrolment is greater in March, July, May and February, while the figures for 1939-40 show that the number of enrolment is greater in February, January, April and May. The figures of accretions in 1939-40 show that the people are more careful to admit their children in the school at the beginning of the new classes. The figures also show that the number of girls admitted in the school is greater in 1939-40 than in 1930-31. This also very clearly shows that the department also takes active steps for the proper enrolment of the pupils.

The figures for desertions also show that the condition has improved considerably. In 1939-40 the desertions are greater in August, December and January. The main reason of desertions seems to be of leaving the school after the annual examinations, the pupils after passing class IV generally leave the school. The desertions in the month of August are due to the completing the compulsory age limit. The desertion figures in 1930-31 are more or less irregular.

Table No. III gives movement of pupils by classes. The largest number of accretions is found in class I. This is as it should be. The figures for desertions show that the highest figures are in class V. Some pupils leave the school from class III after completing the compulsory age. Out of total desertions 19.7% leave the school from lower class.

Table No. IV gives a comparative idea of accretions and desertions by communities. In the case of boys the admissions and withdrawals are almost equal while in case of girls withdrawals outnumber admissions. This is due to either finishing the compulsory standard or completing the compulsory age limit. In the case of forward communities, the accretions and desertions are equal while in the case of Antyajas, and Mahomedans the number of desertions is greater.

Table No. V shows the main causes of desertions of children in the schools. The reasons are grouped in four main groups. From the comparative figures of six villages selected for the study it can safely be said that the condition has improved very considerably. The table makes this clear.

From the above table it is clear that at present more than $\frac{3}{4}$ leave the school after fulfilling the conditions of the act. The chief obstacle in primary education in rural areas was the withdrawal of children under the pretext of help to the parents and earn living. The comparative statements of the years 1930-31 and 1939-40 clearly point out that exemptions are strictly granted and that also after a very careful investigation. This also reflects that people now do not like to come in the way of education of their children through they need them for help at home very badly.

Table No. VI gives the percentages of absentees from the schools.

Explanation of table No. VI. In almost all the villages, the daily attendance of boys and girls has increased considerably. As the attendance increases the cases for punishable absence decrease. The figures show that pupils now attend the school more regularly than 10 years ago. Parents do not withhold their children from attending the school regularly.

Table No. VII shows the number of applications for exemptions.

Explanation of table No. VII. In 1930-31 there were 7 applications whereas in 1939-40 there were only 4. Since exemptions are not granted on trivial grounds, people do not come forward to claim them.

Table No. VIII gives by communities the information included in the preceding table. Formerly parents used to withdraw their children as soon as they were of

Explanation of table No. VIII. some service to them in their earnings. At present this idea is uprooted. Nowadays people understand the benefits of educating their children and hence do not want to withdraw them from schools before fulfilling the conditions of the compulsory act.

Table No. IX gives figures for fine inflicted, recovered, excused

Explanation of table No. IX. and the arrears. From the table it will be seen that fines are inflicted in all the villages. It is also seen that in some villages fines are promptly

realised or written off as the case may be. While in others the fine are accumulated and last written off. From the figures it is seen that the cases form inflicting fines are now decreasing and fine duly realised. The teachers have become more careful and they persuade the parents to send their children to schools or to take leave of absence before keeping their children absent.

Table No. X is presented with a view lapse into illiteracy by communities. The forward communities retain explanation of their literacy if they have studied upto class IV and V because they read newspapers and easy Gujerati books. In other communities the percentage of lapse into illiteracy is negligible. Our literacy movement and recent Adult Education Movement are a great help in this direction.

Table No. XI gives the figures of persons who went beyond the compulsory standard of studies. The figures are explanation of by commuuities. The desire for higher studies seems to be keener in forward community. However other three communities have also made good progress in this direction as will be seen from the table. The figures also reveal that the number of literates in vernacular is increasing repidly.

Table No. XII gives the figures for boys who absent themselves from schools owing to various causes. The table clearly shows that the parents do not like to interrupt the studies of their children by keeping them home.

The above study leads to the following:—

- (i) The villages are now not ignorant about the Compulsory Education Act.
- (ii) The people now do not like to withdraw their children from the schools before fulfilling the conditions of the compulsory act.
- (iii) The pupils attend their schools regularly.
- (iv) The work of infliction and realisation of fines is gradually improving.
- (v) The backward people and especially the Musalmans still require greater persuasion to send their children to school regularly.
- (vi) The literacy figures are generally encouraging and there is a growing desire for higher education.
- (vii) The public is now realising the benefits of female education.

INTENSIVE STUDY OF THE OPERATION OF THE COMPULSORY
EDUCATION IN SIX VILLAGES OF THE PETLAD
DIVISION FOR THE YEAR 1939-40

In accordance with the Dewan Order No. 108/76 dated 26-12-27 the following report of the intensive study of the Compulsory Education in six villages of the Petlad Division for the year 1939-40 has been submitted.

During the year under report, each Mahal Shaladhikari was entrusted with the work of studying the conditions Inquiry held by the Mahal Shaladhikaris. of the village which was studied in 1930-31 regarding the success or otherwise of the Compulsory Education System.

The following villages were selected for intensive study :

1. Mogri (Petlad Taluka South).
2. Thaledi (Petlad Taluka North).
3. Sangma (Padra Taluka North).
4. Rajupura (Padra Taluka South).
5. Lalpura (Bhadran Taluka).
6. Kandari (Karjan Taluka).

STUDY OF TABLE NO. I. CHILDREN BY COMMUNITIES

Table No. I gives information regarding the distribution of population in various villages under study and enrolment of children in their schools. The columns 3 to 7 show the figures of population of the Forward, Backward, Antyaja, Musalman classes. Columns 8 to 12 & 13 to 17 show the number of children on the roll at the end of July for the last two years. The ensuing columns of the Table show decrease or increase in the enrolment as compared with the previous year and also the percentage of children of each community on the rolls in the respective villages.

The figures show that the two villages under study show an increase in the enrolment of both boys and girls. The increase is seen great in case of boys and girls in the village Mogri in Petlad Taluka while the increase in the number of girls is seen greater in the village Kandari in the Karjan Taluka.

The percentage in columns 23 to 29 are still more instructive. The percentage of the boys on the whole is 15.2 while that of girls is 13.1 which is more than the required standard.

In the year 1930-31 the percentage of boys was 16.5 while that of girls was 11.6 percent. It is gratifying to note that the percentage of girls in the six villages under study has appreciably increased as compared to the percentage obtained in the year 1930-31. The increase in the case of girls is 1.5 percent. On the whole the education of girls has been paid more attention to in various talukas.

ACCRETIONS AND DESERTIONS BY MONTHS

Table No. II was designed to obtain accretions and desertions of children by months. The totals at the bottom of Table No. II. the table show that the accretions increase during the months December to April while the figures for desertions reach high level during the months of December to February. The highest number of accretions is in the month of January. The reasons for this is that new admissions take place during this month, while the reason for desertions is that the children leave school after examination and finish the compulsory standard or age. On the whole there were 205 accretions and 199 desertions showing an excess of 6 accretions over desertions.

The corresponding figures of 1930-31 show there are a greater number of boys and girls admitted as well as left which shows that the children coming in and going from the villages are noted by the teachers and are at once admitted. Ten years before the children coming for a short time might not have been admitted to schools as contrasted with the report under review and as such greater care has been taken to enforce the compulsory Education Act.

The figures, moreover make clear that 45 more were admitted while 41 more left which shows an increase of 4 in the total number of students.

ACCRETIONS AND DESERTIONS BY CLASSES

Table number III gives figures of movement of pupils by classes.

Table No. III. Naturally the largest number of admissions are in class I. Out of 205 total accretions in the year 1939-40, 111 are admitted in class one. The remaining 94 are admitted in other classes. Comparing these figures with the figures of 1930-31, we see that out of the total admissions of 168, 98 are admitted in class one, and the remaining 62 are admitted in other class. This state of affairs is quite promising.

The total number of pupils leaving studies in class I 22 in 1939-40 as against 38 in 1930-31, which shows a sufficient revision regarding the wastage in the lower class. In the year 1939-40 the total

number of students having passed the fifth class is 39 in 1939-40, shows in compared to 18 in 1930-31.

ACCRETIONS AND DESERTIONS BY COMMUNITIES

Table number IV gives figures of accretions and desertions by communities. It is satisfactory to note that the admissions have greatly increased in case of all the communities. Only the backward community shows greater number of desertions than the accretions. It is pleasing to note that tendency to withdraw children from school earlier than the stipulated period is gradually decreasing.

The number of accretions in the year 1939-40 is 205 as against 160 in the year 1930-31. The total number of desertions in the year 1939-40 is 199 as against 148 in the year 1930-31.

CAUSES OF DESERTIONS

Table number V presents the main causes of desertions of children in the schools. Most of the children leave school either after completing the compulsory course or finishing the compulsory age or physical and economic causes. Out of the total desertion of 199, 129 are due to the finishing of the compulsory age and passing the final test, while out of the remaining 70, 57 are due to the migration of children from one place to another with their parents and remaining 11 are due to physical defect, death and help to parents.

The causes of desertions show a sufficient interest in the case of female education when we note that 4 girls left having passed the sufficient educational test in 1930-31 as compared to 23 girls left in 1939-40.

ABSENTISM IN SCHOOLS

Table number VI gives the percentage of absence from school absentees for excusable reasons found in all villages, and it is higher in Sangma in Padra Taluka; next in order comes Kandari, Rajupura, Thaledi and Mogri. In these villages the percentage of punishable absentees is quite negligible. The teachers persuade the parents to take leave of their children before keeping them absent from the school.

There is a sufficient decrease in the unexcusable absentees of students in all the talukas and it seems the people are taking greater care for the absentees.

NUMBER OF APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS

Table number VII and VIII give the number of applications for exemptions. The number of such applications received during the year is only 7, since exemptions are not given on trivial grounds, people are not coming forward

The percentage of them. Exemptions are granted only on unavoidable expenses.

The applications are seven in 1939-40 as compared to 26 in 1930-31. They are of backward people more than any other community being 3 as compared to 13 and that of Musalmans being only one which is highly gratifying.

INFORMATION ABOUT COMPULSORY FINES

Table No. IX gives the figures for fines inflicted and recovered.

Table No. IX. Fines are written off in one village of Kandari in Karjan Taluka. The amount written off is negligible. This is satisfactory. The fines written off during the year 1930-31 was very great compared to that in 1939-40. One can easily note from the table that the fine recovered is 33 times more than that written off in the year 1939-40 while the corresponding amounts in 1930-31 were almost equal being Rs. 134-6-0 and 146-12-0 respectively.

If Patels and Talatis become regular in recovering the fines every month, things will greatly improve. It is gratifying to note that the compulsory work in all the villages except Sangma in Padra Taluka is satisfactory.

FIGURES OF ILLITERACY

Table No. X is presented with a view to show lapse into illiteracy

Table No. X. by communities. More than double is the number of people maintaining literacy in the backward and Antyaja communities which is no doubt the result of the various campaigns launched in the State. The backward literates are 311 as compared to 193 in 1930-31 and the Musalmans are 37 in 1939-40 as compared to 16 in 1930-31.

These backward people have to work hard for their bread and thus they get very little time to read books and newspapers and some of them who have not studied above class III, only lapse into illiteracy. But times are fast changing. Every one has a desire to know what is happening in our country as well as elsewhere. Moreover, Government have launched on a policy of Adult Education in the State, which will minimise greatly lapse into illiteracy and increase the number of literates in the State.

TABLE No. XI

Table No. XI gives the figures of persons who have gone beyond

Table No. XI. the compulsory standard of studies. The figures are given by communities.

Comparing the figures of backward literates in ten years we find that the number has become nearly three times greater being 955 in 1939-40 as compared to 336 in 1930-31. There is also a considerable

increase of Muslim 424 in 1939-40 as to 72 in 1930-31 shows in general a satisfactory progressing state of affairs.

The desire for higher studies seems greater and keener in higher communities than amongst the backward ones. However, the backward are also making good progress in this direction as will be seen from the table. All the villages show the number of person who have passed classes VI & VII. The highest number being in Mogri in Petlad taluka. This shows a great deal of increase in all the villages during the last ten years.

**REPORT ON THE INTENSIVE STUDY OF VILLAGES IN THE KADI DIVISION
REGARDING THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE COMPULSORY EDUCATION
SYSTEM FOR THE YEAR 1939-40**

Under D. O. No. 108/76 dated 26-12-1927, each of the six Prant Shaladhikaris was asked to make an intensive study of conditions and figures affecting the success or otherwise of the Compulsory Education Act and submit a report. Accordingly, such

Introduction of the Intensive Study of villages.
studies were conducted by the Educational Inspectors for the year 1927-28 and reports were submitted. These studies were later on made by each of the Deputy Educational Inspectors who selected one village in his area and submitted his report to the Educational Inspector who submitted one report of the Division to the Department embodying the information collected and the conclusions drawn therefrom.

2. These studies were conducted for more than 10 years and consequently it was ordered by H. E. the Dewan Saheb while passing remarks on the annual report of the Department for the year 1938-39, that instead of continuing such studies, it would be worth-while to take up again every year the same villages that were studied in the past and compare the results.

3. The great difficulty that came in the way of this study was about the absence of the records of the year 1927-28 in the schools. The first report that was published does not contain any statements as it was the first of the type. Hence it was decided to take up the villages studied in the year 1930-31.

4. Consequently the following 6 villages that were selected in the year 1930-31 were taken up again and the Deputy Inspectors concerned were asked to study them again and submit the reports showing the progress about the success or otherwise of Compulsory Education Act.

The above villages were originally selected with a view that they were small ones, that they contained mainly the backward population, and that their smallness enabled Mahal Shaladhikaris to study them accurately.

5. In all the above villages, the lists of boys of the school going age were nearly complete in the year 1930-31.
Census of school going children. The same state of things continued during the year under report with very slight variations here and there. The lists of girls were, however incomplete, and in one village, the number was very low. Condition in this respect has greatly improved and at present, percentages of girls are nearly to the required standard. This shows that the people now appreciate the importance of the education of girls and send their girls to school more willingly than before.

6. From tables of accretions and desertions, it is found that greater number of children were admitted in class I, after the examinations. Those that left school left it mainly (1) after finishing the course, (2) after completing the age limit and (3) for migrating to other places. The number that left after finishing the course is much larger than before. 126 pupils left school from classes IV and upwards, whereas only 30 left school from these classes in the year 1930-31. This shows that tendency to reach higher classes is on increase. Tendency on the part of village people to migrate to other places in any part of the year is increasing as the village people now-a-days go to towns and cities for employment in mills. The village of Bhoyan Rathod under Kalol is a good instance of the type.

7. Strength of the schools under study was as under:—

This shows that there was an increase of 61 children in those schools.

8. During the year under report only 10 applications were received for exemption as against 20 in the year 1930-31. The reasons for exemptions were mainly social and economic-such as migration, helping the parents etc. This shows that people try to get exemptions only under unavoidable circumstances.

Grounds under which exemptions are applied for and granted.

9. There is a great deal of improvement in this respect. There are fewer occasions to fine people and fines thus inflicted were cleared off more quickly than before. Care on the part of teachers in securing good attendance in schools, and co-operation of the Revenue Department mainly deserve credit in this respect. People also send their children to schools more regularly than before.

10. Tables No. X and XI clearly show that there is an increase of literacy among all the classes. More children passed in class III and IV and many of them took advantage of the higher classes, and some went in English Schools also. Cases of lapsing into illiteracy are very few as our library movement plays an important part in the matter.

11. From the above study, it is clear that things have greatly improved within the last 10 years. Appointment General. of senior trained teachers as head masters in most of the schools, greater element of trained teachers, sympathy of the Revenue Department, frequent supervision of Deputy Inspectors and general awakening on the part of the people have helped in bringing about the above results. Enrolment of children is more thorough, attendance is good, imposition of fines is not so heavy, figures showing wastage and stagnation are diminishing, lapse into illiteracy is insignificant and people are taking greater advantage of the educational system. They now fully understand the advantages of education, but their poverty comes in the way. Recent bad years again have made their conditions still worse. However, on the whole, their progress in the field of education is not quite discouraging.

**REPORT OF THE INTENSIVE STUDY OF SEVEN VILLAGES IN PATAN
DIVISION REGARDING ADMINISTRATION OF THE COMPULSORY
ACT**

Seven villages are selected from the Division.

1. Charup (Patan Taluka)
2. Ghada (Mehsana Taluka)
3. Sedrana (Sidhpur Taluka)
4. Dabhi (Unjha Division)
5. Kharasada (Visnagar Taluka)
6. Chada. (Kheralu Taluka)

TABLE NO. I

From the figures shown in table 1, it will be seen that in most of the villages the number of enrolment at the end of July 1940 shows an appreciable increase over the figures at the end of July 1931, with exception of three villages where the number of enrolment shows a little decrease, due partly to the laxity in the operation of compulsory Act and partly to the apathy of the people. The P. C. of boys to the male population ranges from 10·9 to 16·5 p. c. while in the case of girls it ranges from 7·1 to 15·5 p. c. in July 1940 as against 11 to 15 p. c. for boys and 6 to 12 p. c. in case of girls in July 1931. The p. c. is low in case of girls for the reason that people are unwilling to send their girls to the schools. However, with the improvement in the economic condition of the people and with regular and strict working of the Compulsory Act, favourable results are expected.

TABLE II

The statement gives figures for accretions and desertions in each month. It will be seen that accretions are seen in the months of Feb. and March when census of school-going children is taken while the greatest number of withdrawals takes place in the months of Dec. and March when the children are occupied in agricultural operations. Besides this, there are other causes such as, completion of compulsory age, migration to other schools and places outside the State which operate in the process of desertion, while in 1931 the greater accretions took place in March, April and August, and the greater desertion took place in December, January, February and March.

TABLE III

It will be seen from this table that the largest number of admission is in the below standard, due to the census of school-going children. The standards I to IV comparatively show a little increase. The number

of desertion is largest in below, first and fourth standards. This is due to the stagnation, the children having reached the age-limit, leave the school before completing the compulsory course. This state of things is responsible partly to the teachers who are in-efficient in their work and partly to the slackness of the compulsory Act.

TABLE IV AND V

These statements show considerable fluctuations amongst the backward and forward classes. A large proportion is due to the finishing of educational test. viz. std. IV and above, the completion of compulsory age-limit and migration to cities and big towns. The same condition is experienced in 1930-31.

TABLE VI, VII and VIII

Comparing the major and minor villages it would be seen that the attendance of boys is greater in major villages as compared to the minor villages. While the attendance is on the par in the case of girls except in Sedrana. The p. c. of absentees is slightly greater than that of children going on leave in 1940 as well as in 1930-31. Besides the number of applications asking for exemption is greater in the case of girls as compared to that of boys. The same condition holds-good in 1930-31. This is found mostly in backward communities such as Thakaradas, Bhills etc. and Musalmans who are still unwilling to send their girls to the schools. With the strict enforcement of Compulsory Act the condition will gradually improve.

TABLE IX

The figures of Compulsory Fines during the last five years show a comparative decrease in both major and minor villages as opposed to the condition from 1926-27 to 1930-31 in which the figures show a comparative increase. This shows that the teachers and the inspecting staff have been trying hard to reduce the number of absentees during the last five years.

TABLE X

From the figures shown in the table it appears that the literacy is maintained in most of the villages with the exception of one or two villages. The numbers lapsing into illiteracy is very insignificant. The same condition existed in 1930-31.

TABLE XI

This table gives information about the people living in villages who have studied beyond the compulsory standards. The tendency to study higher standards seems greater in the case of children belonging to forward classes. Children of the backward classes fall back, due to the poverty and other causes such as want of convenience and money to study further. There is not much change in this case during the past ten years.

**REPORT ON THE INTENSIVE STUDY OF THE NAVSARI
PRANT FOR THE YEAR 1939-40**

Under Dewan Order No. 108/76 dated 26th December 1927, it was directed that exhaustive inquiry should be made in the working of the Compulsory Education Act with a view to see how far its working is effective. This report is, therefore, respectfully submitted in accordance with the said Dewan Order.

As per Vidyadhikari Saheb's memo No. 9 dated 23rd October 1940, the following three villages which were intensively studied in the year 1930-31, are taken up again for the intensive study during the year under report, so that a comparative view may be taken and changes effected by educational efforts during the interval may be found out --

- (1) Dhaman Taluka Navsari.
- (2) Dhanori Taluka Gandevi.
- (3) Dungara Taluka Kamrej.

Table No. 1 shows distribution of population in the three villages under study, the number of children attending the school in the years under comparative study, increase or decrease in numbers and the percentage of children. To make the study more instructive, the communities in these villages are divided into four main divisions viz., Forward, Backward, Antyaja, and Musalmans. The figures showing the population as given in columns 3 to 7 are those of the census of 1931. Columns No. 8 to 12 show the number of children at the end of July 1931 and No. 13 to 17 show the number of children at the end of July 1940.

Comparison of the figures of the number of children in the year 1931 with those of the year under report shows that there is a decrease of 41 boys and increase of 48 girls resulting in a total increase of children. It is interesting to note from the figures that the number of boys has fallen down while the number of school going girls has considerably increased in all the three villages. It is due to the fact that the census of the school going girls is taken with greater care and that the guardians are now more inclined to send their girls rather than evading the compulsory rules under one pretext or the other. The considerable decrease in Dungara ver. school is due to the fact that the school has stopped to teach classes VI and VII within the interval of ten years under study. The liking of the people to give English

Education to their children which decreases the number of boys in the higher classes of vernacular schools also helps the decrease.

The percentage of school going children is more than the required standard except that the percentage of girls is negligently low in Dungara.

This table shows accretions and desertions by months. The greatest number of accretions is in the month of January while that of desertions is also in the month of January. This is quite natural as greatest influx and outflux take place in the month following the month of annual examination. In the year 1930-31, the greatest number of accretions took place in month of February and April and desertions in the month of January and February. During the year under report there were 103 accretions and 129 desertions, showing an excess of 26 desertions over accretions, while in the year 1930-31, there were 124 accretions and 115 desertions showing the excess of 11 desertions over accretions. Now the census of school going children is taken place before the annual examinations, so the children coming under the operation of the Compulsory Act, get themselves admitted soon after the examination. The figures of desertions are scattered all over the columns, however, we might say that desertions generally take place after the examination and also in the months of August, September and other subsequent months due to the children being freed from compulsion on account of their finishing the compulsory age limit.

Table No. 3 gives influx and outflux by classes. The largest number of influx is in class I. Out of total accretions of 103, the largest number of 91 is in class I and the remaining is scattered in all other classes. In the year 1930-31 also the greatest number of accretions was in class I which is quite natural. Figures of desertions show that out of 129 desertions, 51 have left the schools from higher primary classes (class V, VI, and VII), while 39 from class II and I in the year under report. In the year 1930-31, 51 left the schools from higher primary classes (class V, VI, and VII) and 34 from class II and I, out of the total number of desertions of 115. The reason for this sort of deficiency may be attributed to the fact that children of backward classes reach upto class V with greater difficulty. They are habituated to remain absent even though they have to pay the fines. They try to evade law under one pretext or the other and leave the school after the completion of compulsory age. Efforts are being made to stop this unhealthy practice and it is hoped that in future desertions from lower classes are sure to decrease.

This table shows accretions and desertions by communities. It shows that the accretions in forward communities are higher than other ones, while desertions in backward communities are larger than other communities. This clearly shows that backward communities are not very willing to educate

their children and only the forward communities are taking more and more advantage of the educational facilities afforded to them by the Government.

Table No. 5 indicates causes for which children leave the school.

Most of the children leave the school either after Table No. 5. completing the compulsory age. During the year under report, 51 left the schools after completing the educational test and 48 left the schools after completing the age limit; while in the year 1930-31 only 19 left the schools after completing the compulsory course and 39 left the schools after completing the age limit. From these figures, it will be seen that now more children finish the educational test and there is less of stagnation. The table shows that the economic causes and physical causes play an immaterial part in desertions due to the careful working of the compulsory education.

Table No. 6 gives information regarding average attendance and absences. By comparing the figures of the year

under report with those of 1930-31, it will be seen that there is an improvement in the average daily attendance and the percentage of absences both excusable and punishable is much lower than before. This is due to the care taken by the teachers in keeping good attendance and saving guardians from the imposition of fines by persuading them to take leave of absences.

These tables show the number of applications for exemption.

Tables Nos. 7 and 8. There is no application for exemption in the year under report, while there were six applications in the year 1930-31. By comparing these figures, it becomes clear that the people have realised the importance of education and they do not try to evade the compulsory rules under different pretexts.

Table No. 9 gives the figures of fines. By studying the table, it will be clearly seen that the amount of fines in the year under report is as good as negligible when compared with the figures of the year 1930-31 and the figures of the five years show a general tendency of decrease in the amount of fines. The reason of this can be attributed to the fact that people are taking more and more interest in educating their children and are particular to get leave sanctioned for reasonable causes. The fines inflicted are generally recovered in full and there is no arrear due.

This table shows lapse into illiteracy by communities. It appears from the figures that lapse into illiteracy is nil. Table No. 10. Even in the year 1930-31 there was no lapse into illiteracy. Generally those who reach class IV and V do not forget what they learnt at school. The institutions of libraries have been a great help to keep up the literacy.

Table No. 11. This table gives statistics showing the desire of people for higher study by communities. The tendency to study higher standard seems to be greater in the case of children of Forward classes. Children of backward classes generally

fall back due to poverty and want of convenience to study further. In the year 1930-31, the number of people knowing English was 83 (75 forward and 6 backward) while during the year under report it is 127 (105 forward, 19 backward, 2 Antyaja and 1 Mohomedan). This shows the inclination of the people towards English education. The number of literates in vernacular in these villages is 1,160; while in the year 1930-31, it was 601. From these figures, it appears that there is considerable increase in the p. c. of literacy.

From this inquiry, it becomes evident that some very interesting facts are obtainable as regards the progress in education, due to the educational efforts. They are as follows :—

1. The census of the school going children is properly taken and the p. c. of children attending the schools is quite satisfactory.
2. Due to the proper working of the compulsory Act, the care of teachers and proper supervision of the inspecting officers, the average daily attendance has largely increased and p. c. of absence (excusable and punishable) has greatly decreased.
3. The fines under the Act are comparatively very low, they are now recovered in full and no arrear left.
4. Village people are now aware of the Compulsory Act, and the facilities under the Act are availed of by them to an appreciably large extent.
5. The people are now more inclined to impart education to their children and they do not seek exemption from the Compulsory Act.
6. Literacy figures show an encouraging state of things while systematic efforts to get higher education beyond the Compulsory class are very prominent. People are now more inclined towards imparting English education to their children.

INTENSIVE STUDY REPORT, AMRELI PRANT, FOR THE YEAR 1939-40

Under Dewan Order No. 108/76 dated 26th December 1927, it was directed that exhaustive inquiry should be introductory. made in the working of Compulsory Education Act, with a view to see how far its working was effective. In accordance with that order, this report is respectfully submitted.

2. The following villages which were selected in the year 1930-31, are again selected this year, as ordered Villages selected. under suchi lekh No. 41 dated 15-4-40, to submit a comparative report.

1. Sajiavadar in Amreli Taluka.
2. Nagadhara " Dhari "
3. Dhrasanvel " Okhamandal ,"

3. Table No. I gives the distribution of population in three villages under study and the enrolment of the boys in their schools. To make the study more instructive., the communities in these villages were divided into four main divisions viz. Forward, Backward, Antyajas and Musalmans.

The figures showing the population as given in columns 3 to 7 are those of the census of 1931. Columns No. 8 to 12 show the number of children at the end of July 1931, and No. 13 to 17 show the number of children at the end of July 1940.

The figures in the columns No. 18 to 22 show the increase on the roll during these ten years.

The percentage of school-going children is much above the required standard in two villages. In Dhrasanvel it is very low due to the last year famine.

4. This table shows accretions and desertions in each month. The accretions take place mostly in the months of January and April while the desertions in December. Larger number of new admissions in January is due to the completion of the annual examinations and starting of new classes and an enrolment of the school-going children under Compulsory Act.

The desertions are mostly in December, because, most of the children leave school after completing the compulsory age and due to migrations to other places outside Baroda territories. During these ten years, the number of accretions is the same, while that of desertions has increased by 23.

5. This table gives movements of pupils by standards. The largest number of accretions is in class I, i. e. Table No. III. the lowest primary class, and it is as it should be. The largest number of desertions is in class V, the last primary compulsory class.

6. This table shows accretions and desertions by communities. It shows that the accretions in the forward Table No. IV. communities are larger than other ones, while the desertions in backward communities are larger than the accretions, which clearly shows that backward communities are not very willing to educate their children. Only the forward communities are taking more and more advantage of the educational facilities afforded to them by the Govt.

7. This table shows the various causes for which children leave the school. From the figures, *it will be evident* Table No. V. *that most of the children leave the school after completing either the compulsory course or the compulsory age, and some of them leave the school due to migration to the territories outside Baroda territories. During the year under report, not a single child has left the school except the causes mentioned above, which is a satisfactory proof of the operation of the Compulsory Act.*

8. This table shows the p. c. of punishable absentees, which is much less in Nagadhara, while in the other two villages it is not at all. In 1930-31, it was 4.0 while in 1939-40, the total comes to 0.6, which is negligible. This shows that the people send their children to schools regularly.

9. These tables show cases of exemptions. Applications for exemptions are very low in number i. e. only 3., Tables No. VII & VIII. and all these have been sanctioned, due to sound reasons. Out of these 3, 2 were for girls of forward and backward classes. There is not a single application from the Antyaj and Musalmans—a good sign of the Compulsory Act. In 1930-31, this number was 5. So, during these years, the people have realised somewhat the advantage of educating their children.

10. This table gives the figures of fines levied during the last five years and in 1930-31. There is a vast difference Table No. IX. in the amount during these ten years because, in 1939-40, the amount of fines is lower than the amount in 1930-31. In Dhrasanvel, a great sum was written off.

11. This table is presented with a view to show lapse into illiteracy by communities. The number of literates in these 3 villages, has increased by 63, during Table No. X. these ten years. The forward communities generally retain their literacy if they have studied upto classes IV & V, because they try to read the newspapers and easy gujarati books. In the backward communities, lapse into illiteracy is found among those who have studied upto classes IV & V. These backward people have to work very hard for their bread, and they get little time to read books and newspapers and some of them who have studied upto class IV, only lapse into illiteracy. But times are fast changing and every one tries to know what happens in our country as well as elsewhere and this incites all to read the newspapers and thus lapse into illiteracy will become less and less.

12. This table gives figures for persons who prosecuted their studies beyond the compulsory standard. The figures are given by communities. The desire for higher studies seems to be keener in the forward communities than in the backward ones. However Musalmans are making progress in this direction. During these ten years, the number of literates in vernacular has increased by a good number. Table No. XI.

These are the land-marks in the history of education. The people in the villages are awaked and are ready to take the fullest advantages of education. The beneficial policy of the Government is thus a great success.
