**REPORT ON THE INTENSIVE STUDY OF SIX VILLAGES IN  
THE BARODA DIVISION RE:-ADMINISTRATION OF  
THE COMPULSORY EDUCATION**

---

This Report is respectfully submitted in accordance with the orders of H. E. the Dewan Saheb as per Memo No. 108/76 dated 26-12-27 and also as per his remarks passed on the Report of the Department in the year 1938-39. The present study therefore has now been made in the light of H. E.'s order referred to above. The following villages were restudied.

- (1) Undera, Taluka Baroda North.
- (2) Vernama, Taluka Baroda South.
- (3) Palaswada, Taluka Dabhoi.
- (4) Malsar, Taluka Shinor.
- (5) Bodeli, Taluka Sankheda.
- (6) Gangadia, Taluka Savli.

Table No. 1 shows the distribution of population in the various villages and the enrolment of pupils in the schools. Explanation of The percentage of enrolment is comparatively Table No. 1. increased in more than half the villages under study. The following table gives a clear comparative idea of the state of things in the year 1931-32 and 1940-41.

In three villages the percentage of boys and girls has fluctuated making a gradual rise in the total percentage.

Table No. 2 gives figures for accretions and desertions by months. Explanation of Table No. 2. The figures for 1931-32 show that the number of enrolment is greater in January, February and March while the figures for 1940-41 show that the number of enrolment is greater in February, March and April. The figures of accretions in 1940-41 show that the people are more careful to admit their children in the school at the beginning of the new classes i. e. April. The figures also show that the number of girls admitted in the school is greater in 1940-41 than in 1931-32.

The figures for desertions also show that the condition has improved considerably. In 1940-41 the desertions are greater in April and June. The main reason of desertions seems to be of leaving the school just after the Annual Examinations. The pupils just after passing the class IV leave the schools and join English schools. The desertions in the month of August are due to the completing the compulsory age limit. The desertion figures in 1931-32 are more or less irregular.

Table No. 3 gives movements of the pupils by standard. The largest number of accretions is found in class I. This is as it should be. The figures for desertions show that the highest figures are in class V. Some pupils leave the school from class IV after completing the compulsory age.

Table No. 5 gives a comparative idea of accretions and desertions by communities. The accretions in all the four communities outnumber the desertions in both the years and it is a hopeful sign.

Table No. 1 shows the main causes of desertions of children in the schools. The reasons are grouped in four main groups. From the comparative figures of six villages selected for study. It can safely be said that the condition has improved very considerably.

From the above table it is clear that at present more than three fifth leave the school after fulfilling the conditions of the Act. The

chief obstacle in primary education in rural areas was the withdrawal of children under the pretext of help to parents and earn living. The comparative statements of the years 1940-41 and 1931-32 clearly point out that exemptions are strictly granted and that also after a careful investigation. This also reflects that people now do not like to come in the way of education of their children though they need them for help at home very badly.

Table No. 6 gives the percentages of absentees from the schools  
 Explanation of In some villages the daily attendance of boys and  
 Table No. 6. girls has little bit increased. As the attendance  
 increases the cases for punishable absence decrease. Efforts are being made to make the pupils more regular in the schools.

Table No. 7 shows the number of applications for exemptions.  
 Explanation of In 1931-32 there were 8 applications whereas in  
 Table No. 7. 1940-41 they numbered 11. The highest number is seen at Bodeli in Sankheda Taluka the most backward area in this Division.

Table No. 8 gives, by communities, the information included in the preceding table. All the applications will be seen to come from the backward communities and no remarks are required as the number is very small.  
 Explanation of Table No. 8.

Table No. 9 gives figures for fine inflicted, recovered, written off and the arrears. From the table it will be seen that fines are inflicted in all the villages. It is also seen that in some villages fines are promptly realised or written off as the case may be. From the figures it will be seen that the cases for inflicting fines are now decreasing except in Sankheda Taluka, and they are duly realised. The teachers have become more careful and they persuade the parents to send their children to schools or to take leave of absence before keeping their children absent.

Table No. 10 is presented with a view to show lapse into illiteracy by communities. The forward communities retain their literacy if they have studied upto class IV and V, because they read newspapers and easy Gujarati books. In other communities the percentage of lapse into illiteracy is negligible. Our literacy movement and recent adult education movement are a great help in this direction.  
 Explanation of Table No. 10.

Table No. 11 gives the figures of persons who went beyond the compulsory standard of studies. The figures are by communities. The desire for higher studies seems to be keener in forward community. However other three communities have also made good progress in this direction as will be seen from the table. Figures also reveal that the number of literates in vernacular is increasing rapidly.  
 Explanation of Table No. 11.

Explanation of Table No. 12. Table No. 12 gives the figures for boys who absent themselves from schools owing to various causes. The table clearly shows that the parents do not like to interrupt the studies of their children by keeping them home.

The above study leads to the following :—

- (1) The villages are now not ignorant about the compulsory education Act.
- (2) The people now do not like to withdraw their children from the schools before fulfilling the conditions of the Compulsory Act.
- (3) The pupils attend their schools regularly.
- (4) The work of infliction and realisation of fines is gradually improving. If the Vahivatdars would pay more attention to this and instruct Patels and Talatis to be more careful, the percentage would surely rise.
- (5) The backward people and especially the Musulmans still require greater persuasion to send their children to school regularly.
- (6) The literacy figures are generally encouraging and there is a growing desire for higher education.
- (7) The public is now realising the benefits of Female education.

INTENSIVE STUDY OF THE OPERATION OF THE COMPULSORY  
EDUCATION :—IN SIX VILLAGES OF PETLAD VIBHAG FOR THE  
YEAR 1940-41

In accordance with the Diwan Order No. 108/76 dated 26-12-27 the following report of this intensive study of the Compulsory Education in six villages of Petlad Vibhag for the year 1940-41 has been submitted.

During the year under report, each Mahal Shaldahikari was entrusted with the work of studying the conditions Inquiry held by the of the villages which was studied in 1931-32 Mahal Shaldahikaris. regarding the success or otherwise of the compulsory Education System.

The following villages were selected for intensive study.

1.	Ardi	(Petlad Taluka South)
2.	Petli	(Petlad Taluka North)
3:	Tajpura	(Padra Taluka )
4.	Pindapa	( Do )
5.	Joshikuva	(Bhadran Taluka )
6.	Choranda	(Karjan Taluka )

STUDY OF TABLE NO. 1. CHILDREN BY COMMUNITIES

Table no. 1 gives information regarding the distribution of population in various villages under study and enrolment of children in their schools. The Table No. 1. columns 4 to 8 show the figures of population of the Forward, Backward, Antyaja, Musalman classes. Column 9 to 13 and 14 to 18 show the number of children on the roll at the end of July for the last two years. The ensuing columns of the table show decrease or increase in the enrolment as compared with the previous year and also the percentage of children of each community on the rolls in the respective villages.

The figures of the two villages Ardi and Joshikuva, show an increase in the enrolment of both boys and girls, while in Pindapa only the number of boys show increase while the number of girls have remained unchanged. In three villages Petli, Tajpura and Choranda there is decrease in case of boys, while the number of girls have increased.

The percentage in columns 24 to 30 show that the percentage of the boys on the whole is 13.3, while that of girls is 10.3. In the year 31-32 the percentage of boys was 15.5 while that of girls was 9.3. The

decrease in the percentage of boys is apparently due to the reduction of the compulsory age limit of boys from fourteen years to twelve, while the increase in the percentage of girls is due to fixing the age limit of girls even in the mixed schools upto twelve years of age. Besides most of the boys going to English classes from class iv has told upon the percentage of boys in primary schools.

#### ACCRETIONS AND DESERTIONS BY MONTHS.

Table No. 2 was designed to obtain accretions and desertions of children by months. The totals at the bottom of Table No. 2. the table show that the accretions increase during the months of March and April while the figures for desertions reach high level during the months of March and June. The highest number of accretions take place in the month of March. The reason for this is that new admissions take place during this period, while the reason for desertions is that the children leave school after examination. On the whole there were 202 accretions and 184 desertions showing an excess of eighteen. The corresponding figures for the year 1931-32 show a slight difference of accretions and desertions.

#### ACCRETIONS AND DESERTIONS BY CLASSES.

Table No. 3 gives movement of pupils by classes. Looking to the figures of desertions we see that there are only Table No. 3. few desertions from class 1 to 111 for both boys and girls, while their number is greater in class iv and v as they finish compulsory age or go for English Education. The total number of children leaving studies after finishing compulsory course in 40-41 is 66 as against 36 in the year 31-32.

#### ACCRETIONS AND DESERTIONS BY COMMUNITIES.

Table No. 4 gives accretions and desertions by communities. It gives a rough idea about the admissions and withdrawals from the schools. It is satisfactory to note that the admissions are greater in the Backward and Antyaja communities. Only the forward community shows the greater number of desertions, and this is due to their tendency of sending the children for English Education. It is pleasing to note that the tendency to withdraw children from schools earlier than the stipulated period is gradually decreasing.

#### CAUSES OF DESERTIONS.

Table No. 5 presents the main causes of desertions of children from the schools. Most of the children leave Table No. 5. school either after completing the compulsory course or finishing the compulsory age or physical and economic causes. Out of the total desertion of 184, 67 are due to the finishing of the final test and 78 are due to the finishing of the compulsory age: while out of the remaining 39, 31 are due to the migration of children from one place to another with their parents, and the remaining 8 are due to physical defect, death and help to their parents.

The causes of desertions show sufficient interest in the case of female Education when we note that three girls left having passed the sufficient educational test in 31-32 as compared to 11. girls left in 40-41.

#### ABSENTISM IN SCHOOLS.

Table No. 6 gives the percentage of absence from school.

Table No. 6. Absentees for excusable reasons are found in all villages and it is higher in Joshikuva in Bhadran Taluka. Next in order comes Choranda, Pindapa, Tajpura, Petli and Ardi. In these villages the percentage of punishable absentees is quite negligible. The teachers persuade the parents to take leave of their children before keeping them absent from the schools.

There is a sufficient decrease in the unexcusable absentees of the students in all talukas and it seems the people are taking greater care for absentees.

#### NUMBER OF APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS.

Table No. 7 and 8 give the number of applications for exemptions.

Table No. 7 & 8. The number of such applications received during the year is only 6, since exemptions are not given on trivial grounds. Exemptions are granted only on unavoidable causes.

The applications are 6 in 1940-41 as compared to 7 in 1931-32. Out of which 5 are of Backward people and 1 of Antyaja, and in the year 1931-32 all the applications for exemptions were of backward people.

#### INFORMATION ABOUT COMPULSORY FINES.

Table No. 9. gives the figures for fines inflicted and recovered.

Table No. 9. Out of the six villages Tajpura in Padra Taluka shows a very satisfactory progress as regards the enforcement of the compulsory act. In the year 1940-41 fine of Rs. 2-8-0 was inflicted, and the whole sum was recovered. In the year 1931-32 the amount of fine inflicted was Rs. 134-13-0 and the amount recovered was Rs. 43-5-0, Rs. 77-12-0 were written off, and the sum of Rs. 13-12-0 were in arrears.

Looking to other villages except Petli in Petlad Taluka show a quite satisfactory result in the enforcement of the compulsory act.

If Patels and Talatis become regular in recovering the fines regularly, things will greatly improve.

#### FIGURES OF ILLITERACY.

Table No. 10 is presented with a view to show lapse into illiteracy by communities. More than double is the

Table No. 10. number of people maintaining literacy in the Backward and Antyaja communities which is no doubt the result of the various campaigns launched in the state. The backward literates in the year 1940-41 are 381 as compared to 353 in the year 1931-32

and the Musalmans literates remain steady. The Antyaja literates in the year 1940-41 are 113 as compared to 54 in the year 1931-32. This result is most gratifying.

Only the backward people who have to work hard for their bread get very little time to read books and news papers, and some of them not having gone above class 111 only lapse into illiteracy. Now the times are fast changing. Every one has a desire to know what is happening in our country as well as elsewhere. More over, Government have launched a policy of Adult education in the State, which will greatly minimise lapse into illiteracy and shall increase the number of literates in the State.

**FIGURES OF PERSONS WHO HAVE GONE BEYOND THE  
COMPULSORY STANDARD OF STUDIES.**

Comparing the figures of backward literates in ten years we find that the number has become nearly double, Table No. 11. being 658 in 1940-41 as compared to 395 in 1931-32. There is also a considerable increase of Muslim literates being 192 in 40-41 as compared to 89 in 31-32 shows in general a satisfactory progress.

The desire for higher studies seems to be greater and keener in higher communities than amongst the backward ones. Moreover the backward are also making good progress in this direction as will be seen from the tables.

From the figures shown in table I, it will be seen that in most of the villages the number of enrolment at the end of July 1941, shows an appreciable increase over the figures at the end of July 1932. The p. c. of boys to the male population ranges from 14·8 to 19·7 p. c., while in the case of girls it ranges from 5·2 to 14·9 p. c. in July 1941, as against 10·7 to 22·4 p. c. for boys and 7·4 to 15·5 p. c. in case of girls in July 1932. The p. c. is low in case of girls for the reason that people are unwilling to send their girls to the schools. However with the improvement in the economic condition of the people and with regular and strict working of the compulsory Act, favourable results are expected.

**TABLE NO. II**

The statement gives figures for accertions and desertions in each month. It will be seen that accertions are seen in the months of March and April when census of school-going children is taken while the greatest number of withdrawls takes place in the same months i. e. March and April when the children are occupied in agricultural operation. Besides this there are other causes such as, completion of compulsory age, migration to other schools and places outside the State which operate in the process of desertion, while in 1932 the greater accertions took place in September and March, the greater desertions took place in January and April.

**TABLE NO. III**

It will be seen from this table that the largest number of admission is in the below-standard, due to the census of school-going

children. The number of desertion is largest in class V. This is due to the children who having reached the age limit, leave the school before completing the compulsory course. This state of things is responsible partly to the teachers who are in-efficient in their work and partly to slackness of the compulsory Act.

#### TABLE NO. IV & V

These statements show considerable fluctuations amongst the forward, backward and Antyaj classes. A large proportion is due to the finishing of educational test, viz. class V and above, the completion of compulsory age-limit and migration to cities and big towns. The same condition is experienced in 1931-32.

#### TABLE NO. VI VII and VIII

Comparing the major and minor villages it would be seen that the attendance of boys is greater in major villages as compared to the minor villages. While in Runi the average daily attendance of girls is higher than that of the boys. The p. c. of absentees is slightly greater than that of children going on leave 1932. Besides the number of applicants asking for exemption is less in both girls and boys in 1940-41 than in 1931-32. This is found mostly in backward communities such as Thakardas, Bhils etc. and Musalmans who are still unwilling to send their girls to the schools. With the strict enforcement of the compulsory Act the condition will gradually improve.

#### TABLE NO. IX

The figures of Compulsory Fines during the last five years show a comparative decrease in both major and minor villages as opposed to the condition from 1927-28 to 1931-32 in which the figures show a comparative slight increase. This shows that the teachers and the inspecting staff have been trying hard to reduce the number of absentees during the last five years.

#### TABLE NO. X

From the figures shown in the table, it appears that the literacy is maintained in all the villages. The numbers lapsing into Illiteracy is very insignificant. The same condition existed in 1931-32.

#### TABLE NO. XI

This table gives information about the people living in villages who have studied beyond the compulsory standards. The tendency to study higher standards seems greater in case of children belonging to forward classes. Children of the backward classes fall back, due to poverty and other causes such as want of convenience and money to study further. There is not much change in this case during the past ten years. 19-9-41.

REPORT ON THE INTENSIVE STUDY OF VILLAGES IN THE  
KALOL DIVISION REGARDING THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE  
COMPULSORY EDUCATION SYSTEM FOR THE YEAR 1940-41

1. The following 6 villages that were selected in the year 1931-32 were taken up again and the Deputy Inspectors concerned were asked to study them and submit the reports showing clearly the comparison about the success or other-wise of the Compulsory Education Act.

2. These villages were then selected as all of them had got Mixed Schools which afforded an opportunity of studying the condition of the education of both the boys and girls. Besides the villages possess mixed population; the Kadwa Kunbi element being predominant in the five and Barot predominant in one viz. Veda.

3. The following table shows information about the enrolment and percentages of children in the villages under study:—

From the above, it can be seen that number of children has increased on the whole in spite of reduction of two years in the age of boys and it is more so specially in the case of girls and pupils of back-ward communities such as Antyaja etc. Percentages of children in most of the cases are more than the required standard, which shows that more care is taken in taking census of children and people also take more interest in the education of their children.

Accretions are highest in class I. As regards desertions, it can be seen that greater number now leave school after finishing studies in class III, IV, V, and above. Even now, some girls on the whole and boys of the back-ward-communities, still linger in the lower classes and leave school after finishing the age limit.

There is an improvement in this report. More boys left school after finishing educational test. Cases of desertions after completing the age limit are however greater in case of girls. Desertions due to migration are increasing as there is a tendency on the part of the people to go to cities for earning their livelihood.

From the above, it is clear that mainly the people of the backward communities are required to secure exemptions and that is mainly due to their bad economic condition.

There is a great deal of improvement in this respect. There are fewer occasions to fine people and fines thus inflicted were cleared off more quickly than before. Care on the part of teachers in securing good attendance in schools, and cooperation of the Revenue Department mainly deserve credit in this respect. People also send their children to schools more regularly than before.

12. Special points worth noting with regard to villages under study :—

*Nagrasana.*

In the year 1931-32, only 1 Antyaja boy was in the school. At present there are 25 children of this community.

*Jitoda.*

- (1) Formerly, girls left school in the lower class. Now many girls reach upper classes.
- (2) Attendance of girls has greatly improved.
- (3) Number of literates has also increased.

*Sampa.*

- (1) Most of the people of the Antyaja and Thakarda communities have gone to Ahmedabad for employment in Mills.
- (2) Population of communities such as Raval, Vaghari, Rabari, is diminishing day by day, as the people of these communities go outside in search of livelihood.

*Veda.*

- (1) During the last ten years, 3 girls passed in class VII out of which 2 belonged to the backward class. Over and above these, 4 girls of the backward communities passed in class VI also. 7 boys of the backward community passed in class VII whereas no such boys had passed in the class VII before 1931-32. 2 boys took advantage of the Thakarda Boarding House at Patan.
- (2) At present about 20 boys are studying in the English school.

*Titodan.*

In the year 1931-32, number of children who passed in class VI & VII was 66. This number has been doubled during the last decade.

13. From the above study, it is clear that people on the whole take greater interest in the education of their children.

**Conclusion.** Girls and the children of the backward community take more advantage of our schools than before. Appointment of Senior Trained teachers in schools have greatly helped in improving attendance of children and in reducing the proportion of wastage and stagnation. More children now reach upper classes than before. There are fewer occasions to inflict fines on the defaulting parents, and amount of fines thus inflicted are soon recovered. Literacy figures are increasing and its main credit goes to the Library department.

## REPORT OF THE INTENSIVE STUDY OF THE COMPULSORY EDUCATION IN NAVSARI PRANT FOR THE YEAR 1940-41

Under Dewan Order No. 108/76 dated 26th December 1927 it was directed that exhaustive inquiry should be made in the working of the compulsory education Act with a view to see how far its working is effective. This report is therefore respectfully submitted in accordance with the said Dewan Order.

As per M. R. R. Vidyadhikari Saheb's memo No. 9 dated 23rd October 1940 the following three villages which

The villages select- were selected for intensive study ten years ago ed for study.

i. e. in the year 1931-32, are taken up again for study during the year under report so that a comparative view may be taken and the changes effected by educational efforts during the interval may be found out.

1. Dhamdachha, taluka Gandevi.
2. Vanesa, taluka Palsana.
3. Amla, taluka Navsari.

The study was conducted by the Deputy Educational Inspectors of the respective mahals.

Table No. 1 shows distribution of population by communities, the number of children attending the schools, increase or decrease in number and p. c. of No. 1. children to population by communities in the villages under study. Following population as given in columns 3 to 7 are those of 1931. Columns 8 to 12 show number of children in these schools on 31 July 1932, and columns 13 to 17 show the number of children at the end of July 1941. Comparing this figures it will be seen that taking all the three villages together there is an increase of 9 boys and 73 girls resulting in total increase of 82 children. It is interesting to note that the increase in the number of boys is negligible while that of the girls is considerable, which is due to the fact that the census of school-going girls is now taken with greater care, and that the guardians are now more inclined to educate their girls rather than evading the compulsory rules under one pretext or the other.

The p. c. of the school-going children in all the three villages is more than the required standard which goes to prove that the census of school-going children is properly taken.

This table shows accretions and desertions by months. During the year under report the greatest number of accretions is in the month of May while that of desertions is in month of April. In 1931-32 Study of table No. 2.

the greatest number of accretions was in the month of May, while that of desertions was in the month of December. The maximum influx in the month of May is quite natural as children coming under the operation of the Compulsory Act gets themselves admitted soon after the Annual examination. Comparing the figures of maximum outflux, it will be seen that in 1931-32, many children left the schools in December, i. e., before the Annual examination while during the year under report the maximum outflux is in the month of April which is quite natural as children completing the compulsory course generally leave the schools after Annual examination. During the year under report, there are 208 accretions and 269 desertions showing an excess of 61 desertions over accretions; while in 1931-32 there were 200 accretions and 161 desertions showing an excess of 39 accretions over desertions. Studying the figures in this table, we might say that now due to the educational efforts desertions generally take place after the annual examination and not before.

Table No. 3 gives influx and outflux by classes. During the year under report the maximum influx is in class I. Out of 208 total accretions, 147 are in class I, while the remaining 61 are scattered all over other classes. In the year 1931-32 also the maximum influx was in class I. The maximum outflux in the year under report is from class VII while that in year 1931-32 was from classes VII and IV. Out of 269 total desertions during the year under report 111 are from higher primary classes (class VI, and VII) while 40 are from lower primary classes (classes I and II). In the year 1931-32, out of 161 total desertions, 51 were from higher primary classes (cl. VII & VI) while 33 were from lower primary classes (cl. I and II). The children from backward classes reach upto class V with difficulty, as they are habituated to remain absent even though they have to pay fines, and leave the schools from lower classes after completing the compulsory age. Efforts are being made to stop this unhealthy practice and it is hoped that desertions from lower classes are sure to decrease.

This table shows accretions and desertions by communities. Formerly backward communities were not very willing to educate their children, while forward communities were taking more and more advantages of the educational facilities. But from the figures of this table, it will be clearly seen that there is uniform tendency amongst all the communities to take advantage of the educational facilities afforded to them by the Government.

Table No. 5 indicates causes of withdrawals from schools. During the year under report, 83 left schools after completing the educational test while 132 left the schools after completing the age limit. In the year 1931-32, Study of table No. 5.

40 left the schools after finishing the educational test, while 82 left the schools after passing the age limit. From the figures of this table, it will be seen that most of the children leave the schools either after completing the compulsory course or after passing the compulsory age limit. More children now finish the educational test and there is less of stagnation. Economic, social and physical causes play an immaterial part in the desertions, due to the careful working of the compulsory education in this Prant.

**Table No. 6** gives information regarding average daily attendance, excusable absence and punishable absence. All the three villages show sufficiently good attendance. The total daily attendance in the year under report is 741.2, while that in the year 1931-32 was 610.2. It is clear from these figures that there is definite improvement in attendance. The total excusable and punishable absences in the year under report are 40.9 and 5.04 while those in the year 1931-32 were 75.9 and 18.3 respectively. Comparing these figures, it will be seen that percentage of absences both excusable and punishable is much lower than before. This is due to the care taken by the teachers in keeping good attendance and saving the guardians from the imposition of fines by persuading them to take leave of absences.

These tables show the number of applications received for exemptions by communities. No applications for exemption is received during the year under report, while in the year 1931-32, 4 such applications (one for boy and 3 for girls) were received from backward communities. By comparing these figures it becomes clear that formerly backward classes were seeking for such exemptions, but now they realise the importance of education and do not try to evade compulsory rules under one pretext or the other.

**Table No. 9** gives figures of fines. The total amount of fines inflicted in these villages during the year under report, is Rs. 66-14-0 while that in the year 1931-32 was Rs. 232-13-0 and the arrears in the year 1931-32 was Rs. 20-0-0, while that in the year under report is nil. By comparing these figures it will be clearly seen that formerly no uniform tendency of inflicting and recovering fines was found, but now fines inflicted are generally recovered in full and there is no arrear due.

This table shows lapse into illiteracy by communities. In the year 1931-32, 7 people from forward and 6 people from backward communities lapsed into illiteracy, while during the year under report lapse into illiteracy is nil. Institutions of libraries have been a great help to keep up the literacy.

This table gives statistics showing the desire of people for higher studies. Studying the figures in this table it will be seen that tendency for higher studies seems to be greater in the case of children of forward communities. Children of backward communities generally fall back due to poverty and want of convenience to study further. In the year 1931-32, the number of people knowing English in these villages was 88 while during the year under report it is 280. From these figures it will be seen that people are now more inclined towards English education. In the year 1931-32 the number of literates in these villages was 2,597, while during the year under report, it is 3,286, which shows considerable increase in the p. c. of literacy.

From the inquiry, it becomes evident that some very interesting facts are obtainable as regards the progress in education due to the educational efforts. They are as follows:—

1. The census of school-going children is properly taken and the p. c. of children attending the schools is quite satisfactory.
2. Due to the proper working of Compulsory Act the care of the teachers and proper supervision of the inspecting officers, the average daily attendance has largely increased and p. c. of absences has considerably gone down.
3. The fines under the compulsory Act are comparatively very low and are now recovered in full.
4. Village people are now aware of the Compulsory Act and the facilities under the Act are now availed of by them to an appreciably large extent.
5. The people are now more inclined to impart education to their children and do not try to evade Compulsory Act.
6. Literacy figures show an encouraging state of things and tendency towards higher education is prominent. People are now more inclined towards imparting English education to their children.

INTENSIVE STUDY REPORT OF AMRELI PRANT FOR THE  
YEAR ENDING 31ST JULY, 1941

Under Dewan order No. 108/76 Dated 26-12-1927, it was directed that exhaustive inquiry should be made in the Introductory working of Compulsory Education Act, with a view to see how far its working has been effective. In accordance with that order, this report is respectfully submitted.

2. The following villages which were selected in the year 1931-32, are again selected this year, as ordered Villages selected. under suchi lekh no. 32 Dated 2nd. May 1941, to submit a comparative report.

1. Vithalpur in Amreli mahal.
2. Dewala        "        Dhari        "

The third village, Mulvasar, in Okhamandal mahal, selected in the year 1931-32, has to be left out this year, as the school in that village has been closed long since and as the necessary figures are not available.

3. Table no. 1 gives the distribution of population in two villages under study and the enrolment of the boys in their schools. To make the study more instructive, the communities were divided into four main parts viz. Forward, Backward, Antyaja and Musalmans.

The figures showing the population as given in columns 3 to 7 are those of the census of 1931, as the figures of 1941 are not available yet. Columns no. 8 to 12 show the number of children at the end of July 1932, and no. 13 to 17 show the number of children at the end of July 1941. The figures in the col. no. 18 to 22 show the increase or the decrease on the roll during these ten years. The p. c. of school going children is equal to the required standard in these villages. Only in Dewala, the p. c. of boys is little less than the required standard. The fluctuation in the various figures are very slight and therefore negligible. As such, they do not give any clue to causes and effects.

4. This table shows accretions and desertions in each month.

Table No. 2. The accretions and desertions take place mostly in the month of March. This is due to the completion of the annual examinations, starting of new classes and the yearly enrolment of the school-going children under Compulsory Act. During these ten years, the no. of accretions and desertions has remained almost equal.

5. This table gives movements of pupils by standards. The largest number of accretions is in class I i. e. the Table No. 3. lowest primary class, and it is as it should be. The largest number of desertions is in class V, the last primary compulsory class. The figures do not help in arriving at any generalisations as the number on the whole remain nearly constant.

6. This table shows accretions and desertions by communities. Table No. 4. It shows that accretions in the forward communities are larger than other ones; while the no. of desertions is also larger in that community. Now the accretion number

of the Backward community seems a little better while the desertions of the Musalmans and the Antyaja communities cannot be said to be helpful.

7. This table shows the various causes for which children leave the school. From the figures, it will be seen that

Table No. 5. most of the children leave the school after completing either the Compulsory course or the Compulsory Age, and some of them leave the school in the middle due to migration to the territories outside our Baroda state or for earning livelihood.

8. This table shows the p. c. of punishable absentees, which is

Table No. 6. much less in Dewala. In the year 1931-32, the p. c. was 3.7 while this year it is 7.8 which is well-nigh negligible, looking to the no. on rolls. During this time, the people have come to know to send their children to schools regularly.

9. These tables show cases of exemptions. Applications for

Tables No. 7 and 8. exemptions are very few in number i. e. only 4 and all these have been sanctioned due to sound reasons. Out of these four, there was not a single application, from the backward and Musalman communities, which is a sound proof of efficiency of the Compulsory Education Act. That the number of such applications has not increased is a sure sign of people's appreciating the benefits of Compulsory and free Education.

10. This table shows the figures of fines levied during the last five years and in 1931-32. In Vithalpur it has much Table No. 9. gone down and the amount Rs. 2 is quite negligible. In Dewala, the amount of fines has increased due to various reasons and it shows rather a sorry plight.

11. This table is presented with a view to show the lapse into illiteracy by communities. The forward communities generally retain their literacy if they have studied upto class IV or V, because they are in the habit of reading Gujarati books and newspapers. The backward people have to work very hard for their bread, and they get little time to read books and newspapers and some of them who have studied upto class IV, completely lapse into illiteracy for want of any reading habit. But times are fast changing and every one tries to know what happens in one's country as well as elsewhere, and this incites all to read newspapers and thus lapse into illiteracy will become less and less.

12. This table gives figures for persons who prosecuted their studies beyond the compulsory standard. The figures are given by communities. The desire for higher studies seems to be keener in the forward communities than in the backward ones. However Musalmans are making progress in this direction. During these ten years, the number of literates in vernacular has increased by a good number.
