The Right Hon'ble the Governor in Council having sanctioned the publication of a weekly paper to be styled the 'BOMBAY GOVERNMENT GAZETTE,' notice is hereby given, that after this day all advertisements and other public papers of the government, will be printed in the BOMBAY GOVERNMENT GAZETTE only; and all orders or other public notices, appearing in that paper, under the signature of the secretaries, or other public officers of the government, are hereby ordered and directed to be conformed to and obeyed accordingly.

When official notifications from the government are inserted in the BOMBAY GOVERNMENT GAZETTE, no communication on the same subject will be made in writing to any department concerned; but all public officers are required to take notice of such official notifications in the same manner as if they had been directly communicated to them by letter from the secretary's office, and as heads of offices alone will be furnished by government with the BOMBAY GOVERNMENT GAZETTE, they will be expected to communicate to their subordinate officers all orders which may in any manner concern them.

The Bombay Government Gazettes furnished by government to public officers are to be lodged with the records, and are not to be removed from the office.

Proclamation.

TERRITORIAL DEPARTMENT, REVENUE—OPIUM.

1st. Notice is hereby given, that Passes for the free transit of Malwa Opium to Bombay, for importation by Sea, will be granted on application to the Opium Agent at Bombay, or to the Resident and Opium Agent in Malwa, on payment of Bombay Rupees one hundred and twenty five (125) per chest of 140 lbs weight.

2nd. For the convenience of importers, Passes will be granted for Maunds, instead of Chests, should it be desired; but in no case will a Pass be given for less than 30 Maunds or ten Chests.

3d. Passes obtained at Bombay, will not be given open to the persons taking them out, but enclosed in a sealed letter of advice, to the Opium Agent in Malwa, who will countersign each Pass before the Opium is dispatched; persons taking out Passes for Malwa Opium, that may have left that Province, will be required to satisfy the local authorities, in whose District the Drug may first arrive, that it is the actual produce of Malwa, and in the event of its proving otherwise, the same will be confiscated, and the Pass Money forfeited.

4th. No Duties will be exacted on account of the Hon'ble Company's Government, on Opium protected by Passes; it will however, be liable, should occasion require, to examination at the different Nakas and Chowkies, when in transitu, and also on its arrival at Bombay, with the view of ascertaining that the quantity corresponds with that specified in the Pass, but there will be no detention or obstruction by the Officers of Government, beyond what may be necessary for the diligent prevention of any Opium being conveyed into the Territories subordinate to this Presidency.

5th. The Owners of the Opium will have to make their own arrangements for its transport. The despatches will be accompanied by one or more Chuprasees or Peons, as the Resident and the Opium Agent in Malwa shall consider advi-

seable, but the providing of Escorts for the protection of the Drug will rest with the Owners, and Government will not be answerable for any casualties that may befall the same.

6th. It is left to the option of persons taking out Passes, to pay at the rate of Bombay Rupees seventeen (17) per chest, in commutation of Customs and Duties that may be due to the Native States through whose Territories the Opium is conveyed, or to pay those Duties themselves. Opium, for which this commutation money may have been paid, shall be allowed to pass equally free from Customs and Duties, whether examined at, and despatched from, Indore, or Rutlam, or other Marts in Malwa.

7th. Persons residing at Ahmedabad, Baroda, Surat, or other places, desirous of exporting Malwa Opium, under a Pass, will be furnished with the same on application to the British authorities resident at such places.

8th. The Hon'ble the Governor in Council guarantees that the price to be paid for the Passes and in commutation of the Duties to Native States, shall continue as now fixed, to the 1st of October 1842, but the guarantee here given will not debar the Government from continuing to grant Passes after the expiration of this period, should it think fit to do so, without a further Proclamation.

9th. For the convenience of individuals, deposits of Company's Paper will be received on account of sums payable for the Passes and Duties specified in Articles 1st and 6th, interest being payable to Government on the same, until redeemed, at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, and the deposit should be redeemed on or before the arrival of the Drug at Bombay, from which period the charge on account of interest will be doubled.

10th. Hoondies may be received by the Opium Agent in Malwa, for Passes taken out there, payable to the Opium Agent in Bombay, within six days after sight; if not redeemed within that period, a deposit of Company's Paper, or substantial Security must be given by the parties concerned, interest being charged at the rate of 5 per cent

until the arrival of the Opium which will be detained until payment be made. If Security be not forthwith produced, the Hoondies will be returned as dishonored, and the Opium seized on its arrival.

11th. The Holders of Passes are to take the Opium to Indore, Rutlam, or any other place in Malwa, that may suit the wishes and convenience of both parties, to be weighed by persons who will be appointed by the Opium Agent in Malwa to perform that duty.

12th. Fifteen days notice must be given to the Opium Agent in Malwa, or his Assistant by all persons about to make exportations under Licences previously to the production of the Opium at the place of weighment, in order that he may be better prepared to receive, weigh and dispatch it.

13th. Only one dispatch will be allowed under a Pass or License, which dispatch may or may not, at the option of the holder of the Pass, be to the full quantity mentioned in it, but if a smaller quantity be exported, no drawback or refund from the sum paid for the Pass, will be allowed, on account of such deficiency, excepting in the case of Parties taking Passes at Bombay, who will be allowed a refund on account of such deficiency, on a report thereof being made to this Government by the Opium Agent in Malwa, but in the event of the actual dispatch containing a greater quantity of Opium than that for which the Pass was taken out, such excess shall be paid for at the rates specified in the 1st article of this Proclamation, and shall by way of security for payment, be liable to detention by the Collector of Customs at Bombay until paid for.

14th. In weighing the Opium, an allowance of three lbs will be allowed for each Chest of 140 lbs on account of leafage and dustage.

15th. With the exception contained in article 8th, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council reserves to himself the right to adopt, from time to time, such measures as he may conceive to be necessary, to prevent the illicit trade in Opium, and to secure the object of Government in sanctioning the present arrangement.

The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased, with reference to the equalization of the Duties on articles; the produce and manufacture of the British Possessions in India, with those on similar articles, the produce and manufacture of the United Kingdom or of other British Possessions, to publish for general information, an Extract, Article 21, of an Ordinance, enacted by the Government of Ceylon, to amend the Laws relating to the Ports and Customs of that Settlement, and to intimate, that the Custom Department has been authorized to grant the Certificates in question, on application to the authorities at the several Bunders of this Presidency.

Article 21. And it is further enacted, that no Goods shall be entered as being of, or from, any British Possession (if any benefit attached to such distinction) unless the Master of the Ship importing the same shall have delivered to the Collector or Controller, a Certificate, under the hand of the proper Officer of the place where such Goods were taken on board, of the due Clearance of such Ship from thence, containing an account of such Goods.

If after this publication, the Public will persist in sending, to the Post Office, letters which require prepayment, by the hands of persons who will make no inquiry, but, at once, put such letters into the "Not Paid" Letter Box, and consequently, cause their detention, the Public can blame no one but themselves. The Post Master General here, subjoins a List of the places to which letters must be prepaid. All letters going by sailing Ships or Steamers (excepting the Steamers which convey the Overland Mail via Suez, to the United Kingdoms.) All letters going Overland, to Ceylon, so far as Cape Calmere (excepting letters from Europe.) All letters to any Inland Stations which are, alternately, to be transmitted, by Ship, to their destinations.

With reference to the Circular Letter from the late Committee of "Warden's Official Fund" of the 25th June 1831, and to their Notification dated the 19th January 1838, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to publish the following revised Rules, with a view to prevent Frauds in the payment of Pensions, and to detect imposition in Marriage and Birth Certificates; as well as to ascertain all future claims to the benefit of the Fund.

1st. All Disbursing Officers should previous to the payment of Pensions, require from every Widow exempted from attending Muster, a Certificate, agreeably to the accompanying form A, signed before a Magistrate or Justice of the Peace by the Head of the Caste, to which the Party or Parties belong, and by one of the Law Officers of a Court of Justice, or by a respectable European or Native Public Servant.

2d. All Heads of Departments are directed to transmit with every application for Pension from the Family of a deceased Member, a Certificate agreeably to the accompanying form B, signed by the Widow or some near relation, attested by the Priest of the Family, and countersigned in the presence of a Magistrate or Justice of the Peace (after full enquiry and examination as to the facts therein set-forth) by a

respectable Native Servant of Government, or by the Head of the Caste, to which the Parties belong.

3d. Every Government Native Servant and Pensioner whose Family will, at his demise, come upon the Fund, is directed to give in a list of his Wives and Children to the Civil Auditor, on or before the 1st January 1842, agreeably to the accompanying form C, containing the exact English dates of the Marriage of the former, and of the Birth of the latter, and to notify from time to time that Officer such changes as may occur therein, either by Births, Deaths &c, during the Father's life time, and should it be discovered that any Individual fail to comply with this requisition, he will be liable to be punished according the circumstances of each case.

4th. All the Disbursing Officers are directed to require on or before the 1st of January 1842, from all Widows and Children pensioned from the Fund, fresh Certificates of their Marriages and Births in the manner prescribed, and agreeably to the form B, alluded to in the 2d para; of these Rules, and to transmit the same as soon as possible to the Civil Auditor, stopping at the same time the Pensions of those Parties who will not comply with this requisition.

5th. All Parties concerned are hereby distinctly given to understand, that if it hereafter be discovered that they have signed any False Certificate of Marriage, Births, &c. &c. Government will punish them by the immediate forfeiture of the Pension obtained by such fraudulent means, and by criminal prosecution for the fraud in every case in which further punishment should be deemed necessary or expedient.

No. 556 of 1841.—Lieutenant J. H. G. Crawford of the Engineer Corps, is appointed to act as Assistant Secretary to the Military Board, during the absence of Lieutenant Cruickshank on sick certificate, or until further orders.

No. 557 of 1841.—Lieutenant C. M. Barrow of the 19th Regiment Native Infantry, is allowed to proceed to the Neilgherries on private affairs, with leave of absence for a period of four months, commencing from the 15th proximo.

No. 558 of 1841.—A Field order dated 18th ultimo, directing as a temporary arrangement, all Reports and Returns to be made to Lieutenant Colonel M. Soppitt, during the indisposition of Brigadier England, K. H. or until further orders, is confirmed.

No. 559 of 1841.—Lieutenant and Brevet Captain Hicks of the Regiment of Artillery, is allowed a furlough to Europe for three years, agreeably to the Regulations.

No. 560 of 1841.—A report having been made to Government, of the very objectionable and irregular conduct of Sub-Conductor Hendley, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased, on the recommendation of His Excellency the Commander in Chief, to direct that he be deprived of his Warrant, and removed from the Ordnance Department.

No. 561 of 1841.—The following Extract, Para. 2d of a despatch from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, dated the 4th ultimo, (No. 42) is published for general information.

Para. 2.—In future cases, when Officers may be granted a furlough on sick certificate, or on private affairs, to New South Wales, or any other Colony, we desire that they may be separately informed that any applications which they may have occasion to prefer for extended leave, are to be addressed to us insufficient time to allow of their receiving our reply by the period when they should embark on their return, so as to ensure their arrival within the original term of furlough; but if the application is preferred on account of health, it will be supported by certificates from the Medical Staff Officers, or other undoubted medical testimony on the spot, shewing that the applicants are then incapable from ill health to return to the performance of military duty in India, and specifying the term for which they consider additional leave absolutely necessary for the recovery of the applicants health; and that if the application is preferred on the ground of urgent private affairs, it will be required that the nature of those affairs should be specified, and that the necessity for his continued absence should be certified by his professional adviser on the spot.

No. 562 of 1841.—The Hon'ble the Governor in Council having had under his consideration, the mode of Inspection, Superintendence, and payment of Pensioners under this Presidency, is pleased, with a view of ensuring a more efficient and complete control, without increasing the expense, to direct the following modification of the system at present in force.

2. The Fort Adjutant at Bombay is relieved from the duty of Inspector of the Pension List, which is in future to be performed by an Officer to be designated "Superintendent of Pensions and Family Payments," and who is to be especially nominated by Government to that duty.

3. The Superintendent is to have a direct control over the whole of the Pension Establishment, and is to be held responsible for any irregular payment made under his authority; the Superintendent is to keep Registers of all Pensioners in the Military and Marine Departments, both European and Native, comprehending the most particular description of their persons, shewing when and why they were pensioned &c.

4. The Superintendent is to furnish Government annually, for transmission to the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, a Return shewing the number and amount of Pay of all the classes of European and Native Military and Marine Pensioners, compared with the preceding year; another Return shewing the number, rank, and amount of Pay of all the Native and European Pensioners who have been Pensioned during the year; and a comparative Statement of the number and amount of Pensions granted in the Military and Marine Departments; those that have lapsed during the preceding twelve months, and shewing the number and annual amount of all the Pensions on the Registers of his Office at the close of the official year.

5. The Superintendent is to furnish the Military Auditor General annually, with a list of the whole of the Pensioners of the establishment, classed according to the different heads, the years in which they were granted, and exhibiting the state of the Registers on the 30th April of each year.

6. The list abovementioned shall be transmitted as early as may be practicable after the termination of the official year; it is to be particularly examined by the Military Auditor General, and to be submitted by that Officer with such remarks and explanations as may appear necessary, for the information of Government.

7. The Superintendent is authorized to correspond with Commanding Officers and Staff Officers of Stations, and the different Civil Authorities, and it will be the duty of those Officers to afford him every information which he may require regarding the Pension Establishment; they are also to attend to such occasional instructions as the Superintendent may find it necessary to transmit to them, regarding Forms of Reports, the personal examination of individuals at periods not prescribed by the Mustering Regulations, or when doubts occur as to the eligibility of attending Musters, and generally, respecting all matters, which may tend to the furtherance of the duty to be performed by the Superintendent.

8. Commanding and Staff Officers &c. are in like manner to address the Superintendent when they require information regarding Pensioners residing within the limits of their respective Commands or Stations, and that Officer is directed to pay due attention to their communications. All Abstracts and Muster Rolls of European and Native Pensioners of this Presidency, with the exceptions noted in the margin* shall be duly authenticated by the Superintendent of Pensions, for which purpose, they shall be forwarded by Paymasters, as soon as may be practicable, after they are discharged and have been entered on their Disbursements, to the Superintendent, and it will be the duty of that Officer to compare them with the General Registers kept in his Office, and to forward them certified in the following manner, to the Military Auditor General.

or otherwise to note on the margin of the Muster Roll in what respect they may be incorrect.

9. The Superintendent's certificates are however, to be considered as applicable only to name, rank, and amount of allowance drawn for each individual, the correctness of the Abstracts in other respects, as regards additions and calculations, period of arrear, double charges &c. remaining subject to the Paymaster's examinations, and ultimate check of the Office of Audit.

10. The Superintendent will be furnished monthly by Division Paymasters with a List of all Pensioned Commissioned and Warrant Officers, including the Widows of these ranks on Lord Clive's Fund, drawing Pay on their own Abstracts, within their respective range of payment, by which list the Superintendent will correct the Registers kept in his office.

11. The Superintendent is to attend to such instructions regarding the duties allotted to him as he may occasionally receive from the Military Auditor General.

12. The charge of Pensioners at Bombay is vested in the Fort Adjutant. He will be responsible for their payment, and the preparation of Pay Abstracts &c.—He will also furnish to the Superintendent, such Returns &c. as are prescribed in the foregoing Paragraphs, and also such other information as may be required by the Superintendent.

13. The Pension Paymasters at Dapoolie and Tannah will take the same charge of Pensioners stationed there, and in the vicinity, and make the necessary Returns as directed in the foregoing paragraph, to the Superintendent.

14. Staff Officers at Stations will be also in the same way vested with the charge and payment of Pensioners.

15. The above Officers will also be charged with the Family Payments of Corps on Service. The Pension Paymasters being in receipt of a Staff Salary, are to receive no Head Money for Pensioners or Family Payments, but it will be allowed to Staff Officers agreeably to the scale herein sanctioned, with the exception of the Fort Adjutant at Bombay, who will receive an addition to his Office Establishment of Rupees 40 per annum to enable him to perform the duty.

16. The Pensioners in charge of Collectors &c. are to remain on their present footing, the necessary Returns &c. being furnished to the Superintendent.

17. The Muster of Pensioners is directed to take place once in four months, on the 1st January, 1st May, and 1st September; at Stations where there are Staff Officers, the Muster shall be taken by the Commanding Officer; and at those Stations where there are no Staff Officers and that the Commanding Officers draw for Pensioners, the Musters are then to be taken by the Officer next in seniority to them, but should there be no other Officer present, the Commanding Officer is to Muster and draw the Pay and Allowances for the Pensioners. At the Presidency a Muster Master, an Officer of the Military Auditor General's Department, is to be specially appointed to take the Musters of Pensioners, as well as of all the Troops and Departments, as at Madras.

18. Both in mustering and in paying Pensioners they must be carefully compared with the description contained in their Pension Certificates, and no Pay should be drawn for any Pensioner, whose Certificate does not exhibit the Mustering Officer's notification of the last special Muster, as follows.

September 1841, A. B. Muster Master.
January 1842, ditto ditto ditto.
May 1842, ditto ditto ditto.

19. The efficient control of the Pension Establishment depending on the accuracy with which Musters are taken, the strictest attention is required in the performance of this duty, to prevent the transfer of Certificates on the decease of their holders, to any other person, and to check any other irregularities which may be attempted.

20. Committees will, under the orders of His Excellency the Commander in Chief, be assembled at every Station within this Presidency where Pensioners reside, as soon after the receipt of this order as may be practicable, for their Inspection; and Collectors and others will be pleased to direct all Pensioners residing

in their Districts to proceed to the nearest Station for the Inspection of the Committee, communicating with the Commanding Officer as to the time they may assemble.

21. The proceedings will be conducted in strict accordance with the orders laid down in Page 491 of the Military Code.

22. The Committees are to meet triennially, the next to assemble on or soon after the 1st September 1844.

23. At the Presidency no Committee will be assembled; but the Pensioners residing there will be required to appear for examination at the Superintendent's Office, at the same periods as the Committees are assembled at Out Stations.

24. In addition to the examination of Pensioners at the Presidency, it will be the duty of the Superintendent to inspect personally those at the principal Stations in the Deccan and the Concan, at such periods as he may hereafter be instructed by Government, but this is not to interfere with the triennial inspection of Out Station Pensioners by a Committee.
