#### FORT WILLIAM. LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT. Тие 29ти July, 1842.

The following Act is passed by the Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council, on the 29th of July 1842; with the assent of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India, which has been read and recorded.

Ordered, that the Act be promulgated for general information.

Act No. V. of 1842.

An Act concerning payment on account of Licenses for the Sale of Spirits in the Island of Bombay and Colaba.

It is hereby enacted, that whenever a Li ense to retail Spirituous Liquors in the Islands of Bombay and Colaba shall be granted under the Provisions of Act XVIII of 1840, the Officers granting such Licenses shall be authorized to demand such Fee, Tax, or Duty in consideration of the privilege granted as may from time to time be fixed by such Officers under the sanction of the Governor of Bombay in Council. And such Fee, Tax, or Duty may be made payable in advance, or at such period as may be settled under such authority as aforesaid.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Officers granting such Licenses to withhold or recall the same in case the Fee, Tax, or Duty aforesaid be not duly paid according to the conditions upon which any such License; shall be granted. And any person vending Spirituous Liquors within the Islands aforesaid whilst such License shall be withheld, or after it shall have been recalled as aforesaid, shall be liable to all the penalties for vending Spirituous Liquors without a License.

### FORT WILLIAM, LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

THE 5TH AUGUST 1842.

The following Act is passed by the Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council, on the 5th of August 1842, with the assent of the Right Hon'ble the Governor. General of India, which has been read and recorded.

Ordered, that the Act be promulgated for general information.

ACT No. VI. of 1842. An Act for annexing to the British Territory cer-tain Villages belonging to the late Nepance Ja-gheer, and acquisitions by exchange from the Sattara State, and for bringing under the Regulations an Inam Village of Purgunna Yelloor.

Whereas the Villages lately composing the Nepance Jagheer have lapsed to Government, and it has been deemed desirable, in order to the better consolidation and management of the British and Sattara Territories, to exchange certain Villages for mutual convenience, and whereas the Village of Deshoor, in Purgunna Yelloor, though held in Inam under the British Government, has not yet

been brought under the Regulations;
It is hereby enacted, that from the time of passing this Act, so much of Regulation XXIX. of 1827 and Regulation VII. of 1830, as relates to the undermentioned seven Villages, viz.

Jaleehall, Purgunna Honwar.
Teengnee Beedree, Purgunna Ghota. Hongunhullee, Purgunna Moolwad. Oopuldinee, Purgunna Mohumudapoor. Allasundeh, Prant Kagul. Boblad, Purguina Burdole.

And so much of Act VIII. of 1839, as relates to the undermentioned four Villages-

Kusba Ashta, Kuryat Ashta, Rrant Mee ruj.

Moje Koondul, ... Turf. Valwe, Prant Punnala, shall be rescinded; and that the following Villages shall be subject to all Acts and Regulations which are or shall be in force within the territories subject to the Presidency of Bombay:

XXI. And it is hereby enacted, that the jurisdiction and authority ordained to be exercised by the Master Attendant and Deputy Master Attendant for the time being of the Port of Madras jointly or severally as Justices of the Peace, by virtue of the hereinbefore recited Regulation, shall and may be exercised as regards such parts of the said Regulations not hereinbefore repealed) by any Justices of the Peace in and for the Presidency of Madras in like manner jointly or severally.

XXII. And it is hereby further enacted, that every person whatever who either as Owner or Servant, shall use or employ, or be employed in any Boat or Catamaran in the Madras Roads, shall be amenable to Sections XII, XII., and XIII., of the above recited Regulation.

XXIII. And it is hereby further enacted, that Section XXXVI. of the above recited Regulation shall hereafter apply to the fixing up at the Offices therein mentioned copies of the same, omitting all other notice of those Sections thereof which are by this Act repealed, save that the same are so repealed.

XXIV. And it is hereby enacted, that all pecuniary forfeitures and penalties had or incurred under or against this Act, shall and may be heard and determined by any Justice of the Peace of the Town of Madras, who is hereby empowered and authorized to hear and determine the same and to issue his sum-

mons or warrant for bringing the party or parties complained of before him the said Justice, and upon his, her or their appearance or contempt and default to hear the parties, examine witnesses and to give judgment or sentence according as in and by this Act is directed; and it is hereby further declared, that it shall be lawful for any Justice who may have adjudged any pecuniary penalty under the provisions of this Act to award and issue out a warrant or warrants under his or their hands and seals for the paying of such forfeitures and penalties as may be imposed or adjudged upon the Goods and Chattels of the offender and cause sale to be made of the same if they shall not be redeemed within six days, rendering to the party the overplus, if any after deducting the amount of such forfeiture or penalty, and the costs and charges attending the levying thereof, and in case sufficient distress shall not be found, and such forfeitures and penalties shall not be forthwith paid, it shall and may be lawful for the Justice as last aforesaid, and he is hereby authorized and required by warrant or warrants under his hand and seal to cause such offender or offenders to be committed to prison. there to remain for any time not exceeding six months unless such forfeiture and penalties and all reasonable charges shall be sooner paid and satisfied, and that all the said forfeitures when paid and levied shall after deducting all necessary charges and also a compensa-tion not exceeding one-third to be settled and ascertained by the said Justice before whom the conviction may take place, and to be given to the Officer or other persons giving information and prosecuting to be applied and disposed of according to the directions of the Honorable the Governor in Council.

Battery, and in case any person shall land or be engaged in attempting to land any Goods otherwise than as before directed, every such person shall be liable to pay on conviction before a Justice of the Peace a sum not greater than 100 Rupees as that

Justice of the Peace shall determine.

X1. And it is hereby enacted, that all Vessels other than those commonly known as Native Vessels or Donies shall anchor in the South Roads, the North Angle of the Fort being one point, and the Master Attendant's Flag-staff the other, and all Vessels commonly known as Native Vessels or Donies shall anchor in the North Roads, the North Angle of the Custom House being the Southern, and the Village of Royapooram the Northern point, and the Owner of any Lincensed Boat or Catamaran, on holding (except at the request of the Master Attendant) communication with a Vessel which shall be anchored otherwise than as aforesaid, shall on conviction thereof before a Justice of the Peace, be liable to pay a sum not greater than 10 Rupees as such Justice of the Peace shall direct.

XII. And it is hereby enacted, that the Owner or Owners of all Boats and Catamarans kept for the purpose of being commonly let out for hire shall, when the same shall not be engaged in doing actual service for hire, by themselves or their Agents give daily attendance at the Boat Office from 5 A. M. until 6 r. M. so as to be ready to provide upon immediate notice their Boats or Catamarans for service or hire, and that for any neglect in so giving attendance (unless occasioned by sufficient excuse) such Owners shall be punishable by a Justice of the Peace on conviction by a fine not exceeding Ten Rupees.

XIII. And it is hereby enacted, that it any Owner of a Boat or Catamaran so licensed, or any person deputed by him shall demand a rate of hire beyond that which is sanctioned by Schedule B. under the several circumstances and restrictions therein provided for, he shall on conviction before a Justice of the Peace forfeit the sum of 10 Rupees,

together with the amount of such hire.

XIV. And it is hereby enacted, that any Owner of a Boat or Catamaran, so licensed, "and kept or "employed for the purpose of being let out commonly on hire," or any person deputed by him, refusing to let on hire such Boat or Catamaran, for public or private use, and within the hours and in the terms specified in the Schedule B. to this act without assigning such cause for his refusal as shall be deemed satisfactory or reasonable to the Justice of the Peace trying such offence will, on conviction before a Justice of the Peace, be liable to the penalty of 20 Rupees, and for a second refusal to a fine of 100 Rupees and to the forfeit of his license.

XV. And it is hereby enacted, that if any Boatman or Boatmen serving in any Boat of Catamaran kept and employed for the purpose of being let out commonly on hire to carry Passengers, Cargo or Letters, shall by wilful neglect or desertion of his duty, cause any impediment to the service of any such Boat or Catamaran, he or they shall for the first offence be liable to receive corporal punishment not exceeding three dozen lashes on conviction before a Justice of the Peace, and if life shall have been thereby endangered, or in case of a second effence, he or they shall be committed to hard labour for a term

. not exceeding six months.

XVI. And it is hereby enacted, that the Owners of Boats and Catamarans, which are kept or employed for the purpose of being commonly let out for hire, shall keep and provide for service during the night, that is to say, from six o'clock in the Afternoon until six o'clock in the Morning at least, ten Boats and four Catamarans with their respective Crews, according to a course of rotation to be specified by the Master Attendant on the first day of every current month, and to be notified in writing on

some conspicuous part of his Office as regards the particular nights, for the attendance of particular Boats and Catamarans, and every Owner of any such Boat or Catamaran who shall fail to provide his Boat or Catamaran, without assigning such excuse for such failure as shall be deemed satisfactory or reasonable to the Justice of the Peace trying such offence shall, if the Owner of a Boat, on conviction before a Justice of the Peace be liable to a penalty of 20 Rupees, and for a second offence to the penalty of 50 Rupees, and for a second offence to the penalty of 50 Rupees and for a second offence to the penalty of 50 Rupees and for a second offence to the penalty of 10 Rupees.

XVIII. And it is hereby enacted, that if any communication by Boat or Catamaran is held with any Ship or Vessel in the offing, or beyond the limits of the Anchorage before the Master Attendant's Report Boat or Catamaran has boarded such Ship or Vessel, the Owner of such Boat or Catamaran shall forfeit the sum of 20 Rupees, and if any attempt is made to hold such a communication without the permission of the Master Attendant, he will incur a penalty, of 10 Ru-

pees

XIX. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Master Attendant or his Deputy, the Collector of Sea Customs or his Deputy, and all Sitting Magistrates and qualified Justices of the Peace, or such person or persons as he or they shall by warrant under their hands duly authorize for that purpose from time to time to go on board any Boat or Catamaran and to search all parts of such Boats or Catamaran for prohibited or uncustomed or smuggled Goods, and also to examine into all Packages, Boxes or Baggage of whatever description, within or upon such Boat or Catamaran or landed therefrom, provided such Master Attendant or his Deputy or other person to be appointed as aforesaid, shall have good reason to suppose that any such Package, Box or Baggage contains any smuggled or prohibited Goods, and they shall likewise have power and authority to search any person or persons on board any such Boat or Catamaran, or who may have landed therefrom, provided such Master Attendant or his Deputy, or other person appointed as aforesaid, shall have good reason to suppose that such person or persons hath or have any uncustomed, smuggled or prohibited Goods, secreted about his or her person; provided always, that no female shall be searched by any other person than a female duly authorized for that purpose by the Collector of Customs, and it is hereby further enacted, that if any person shall resist to impede any or either of the said parties hereinbefore authorized to go on board exa-mine and search as hereinfore provided in the execution of their duty, or in any manner prevent the per-formance of such duty, every such person shall be liable according to the circumstances of the case and the quality of the party offending, upon conviction before a Justice of the Peace, to fine not exceeding 100 Rupees, or to imprisonment with or without hard labour on the roads or otherwise for a period not exceeding six months, and in case any such offence be committed by any Owner of a Boat or Catamaran such Owner shall likewise forfeit his license.

And it is hereby enacted, that in order to enable the said Master Attendant to grant a correct License of the Registry of every such Boat previous to the Registry of any Boat requiring such License, the said Master Attendant or his Deputy shall in the presence of the Owner of every such Boat or any other person duly appointed by such Owner, cause each such Boat to be surveyed and measured, and in case the same shall not in the judgment of the said Master Attendant or his Deputy be of the proper dimensions and capacity and sea-worthy and of the proper quality for the purposes aforesaid, no Registry shall be made nor License be granted, until every such defect in the admeasurement; sea-worthiness and quality of the said Boat shall have been rectified by the Owner thereof, and for every such survey and admeasurement a fee of three Rupees shall be paid by the Owner of any such Boat to the said Master Attendant.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that the said Owner or Owners of every such Boat shall forthwith paint in black English figures; not less than six inches in length upon a white ground, such white ground having a margin of at least three inches beyond the outermost part of the figures, on a conspicuous part of the bow on one side and of the quarter on the other, and in a legible and distinct manner from left to right, the number in such Registry and License mentioned, and if any person shall fraudulently paint or counterfeit or cause or permit to be painted or counterfeited, upon any Boat, any figure not having been duly registered, every such person shall forfeit the sum of 100 Rupees, and every such

Boat shall also be forfeited.

V. And for the better prevention of fraud or omission in the painting, the figures hereinbefore provided to be painted on all Boats, let out for hire as well as for the better distinguishing and identifying such Boats and Cattamarans as have been registered and licensend, it is hereby enacted, that so often as any Registry is made the said Master Attendant shall cause the number in the same to be cut or branded in the most common native characters, in some part or parts of every such Boat and Catamaran, and if the Owner or Owners of any such Boat shall neglect or refuse to keep painted, cut or branded any figure hereinbefore required to be painted, cut or branded, on any such Boat or Catamaran, in a fair and legible condition, or if he shall paint, cut or brand the same in a different manner, or on a different part of such Boat than is hereinbefore provided, or shall wilfully erase, obliterate or in any way hide or conceal the same, or if the Owner of any such Boat or Catamaran shall knowingly permit any such act to be done, he shall forfeit a sum not exceeding 100 Rupees on conviction before a Justice of the Peace as that Justice shall direct, and if any person not being such Owner shall be guilty of, or shall assist in any such incorrect painting, cutting, branding, erasure or concealment, he shall forfeit one moiety of the penalty in this Article imposed.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that every Boat of the description and dimensions now in use (that is to say) not more than thirty-three feet in length, nine feet in breadth, and four feet four inches in depth, nor less than thirty feet in length, six feet in breadth, and three feet six inches in depth, which shall be so Licensed and Registered as aforesaid, shall be manned with not less than two Steers-men, eight Rowers and one Baler, and shall if required be obliged to carry at one time any number of Pas-

sengers not exceeding fifteen, or any quantities of goods not exceeding the quantity mentioned in the Schedule A. hereunder written; and in case Boats of different construction and dimensions shall be Licensed and Registered they shall be manned in such manner and shall be obliged to carry such Passengers or such a quantity of Goods as the Master Attendant shall direct, and shall express in the License, under the penalty of 50 Rupess.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that if any Boat be loaded with Passengers or Cargo beyond the number or quantity specified in the License granted to such Boat, the Tindal of such Boat shall be liable to a fine not exceeding 5 Rupees on conviction, before a Justice of the Peace for every such surplus Passenger and for every Candy weight of such Cargo beyond such specified quantity, and the Owner of such Boat shall be liable to a fine of 50 Rupees on conviction before a Justice of the Peace, for every such surplus Passenger or surplus Candy weight of Cargo. And every person other than the Tindal or Owner who shall be guilty either as principal or accessary of the like offence of overloading any Boat, shall be liable to a fine of 10 Rupees on conviction before a Justice of the Peace for every such surplus Passenger or surplus Gandy weight of Cargo.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that no Boat or Catamaran so licensed shall leave the shore before Gun Fire in the morning, nor after five o'clock in the afternoon, nor shall remain alongside any Ship or Vessel after 6 o'clock in the afternoon without leave from the Master Attendant or his Deputy, who shall be at liberty to prevent any Boat or Catamaran from putting off to or from the shore when in his judgment the doing so would be attended with danger; on which occasions the Master Attendant shall hoist at the mast head of his Flag-staff the following Flags, viz. The white pendant with a red ball under a red and white chequered Flag; and in case any person offend against this Clause he shall be liable on conviction before a Justice of the Peace to forfeit and pay a

sum not greater than 30 Rupees.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that on the 15th day of December in every year the Owners of Boats and Catamarans which shall have been so Licensed and Registered as aforesaid shall expose them and their Crews on the Beach for the inspection of the Marine Board, and the Master Attendant shall once in every month or oftener, and as often as he may think necessary, require the Owner of the said Boats and Catamarans, or any one or more of them to expose them and their Crews on the Beach for his inspection; and in case any owner shall neglect or refuse so to expose a Boat or Catamaran belonging to him, and in case, on any Boat or Catamaran being so exposed the Master Attendant shall deem it unseaworthy, or that its Crew is in an inefficient state, he shall suspend the License granted in respect thereof until the said Boat or Catamaran shall have been repaired and the Crew rendered efficient to the satisfaction of the Master Attendant-and it is hereby declared, that in case the Owner of any such Boat or Catamaran shall refuse or neglect to make such necessary repairs to the same and to render efficient the Crew thereof, within one month after such inspection, the License shall altogether be withdrawn from such Boat.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that grain shall be landed within the space between the north angle of the Custom House and Clive's Battery, and all other Goods, excepting Timber; shall be landed within the space between the north angle of the Custom House and the south angle of Bentinck's Buildings, and that Timber may be landed any where if the permission of the Collector of Sea Customs be first obtained, and if such permission shall not have been obtained it shall be landed within the space between the north angle of the Custom House and Clive's

ACT No. III of 1842.

An Act for extending the Provisions of Act XXI, of 1839, to certain Petty Thefts, not being cases of simple Lurceny.

I.-Whereas it has been found that property has been rendered insecure in many cases, by reason of the impunity with which petty thefts, not being simple larcenies, have been committed, it is hereby enacted, that Act No. XXI. of 1839, shall be extended to the following cases, where the property stolen does not exceed in value 20 Rupees, that is to say, to stealing any goods or merchandize in any vessel, barge or boat of any description whatsoever, or from any dock, wharf or quay-to stealing, by any servant, any chattel or money belonging to or in possession or power of his Master-to stealing any chattel or money from the person of another.

ACT No. IV. of 1842.

For the better-management of Boats and Catamarans in the Madras Roads, and for the amendment of certain Harbour Regulations.

Whereas it is expedient to make Regulations for Boats and Catamarans employed in the Madras Roads, with a view to the better preservation of good order, the prevention of smuggling, and the general protection of life and property, and whereas certain Rules now in force for the 'Harbour of Mad-

ras require amendment,

It is hereby enacted, that from and after the 1st day of September next, no person either as Owner or Servant shall use or employ, or be employed in, any Boat or Catamaran to carry Passengers, Goods. or Letters, to or from any Ship or Vessel lying in the Madras Roads and Shore, unless such Owners or Owner of Boats and Catamarans shall have previously received a License, and unless the Boat or Catamaran which such Owners or Owner, Servants or Servant shall so use, has been registered as hereinafter mentioned, and in case any person who has not received such License shall employ or be employed in a Boat or Catamaran for the purposes aforesaid, or such Boat or Catamaran shall not have been so registered, such person shall be liable to a fine not exceeding the sum of 50 Rupees on conviction before a Justice of the Peace, as that Justice shall direct, and the Boat or Catamaran shall be liable to be seized by the orders of any Justice of the

Peace and forfeited.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that upon the Master Attendant being satisfied that any such Boat is of the proper dimensions and capacity, and that the same is sea-worthy, and of a proper quality for the purposes aforesaid, and upon the application of the Owner of any such Boat or of any Catamaran, and upon such Owner delivering to him a written paper signed by such Owner specifying his name, occupation and place of residence, and the names and places of residence of all such Boatmen or other persons as shall be employed by such Owner in and about the navigation and management of such Boat as particularly as may be, and also subscribing to a declaration in writing that he fully understands all the provisions of this Act and those contained in the Subsidiary Rules to the same Act, it shall and may be lawful, and the said Master Attendant is hereby required to grant to such Owner a License so to use the same in which License (if of a Boat) shall be expressed the dimensions, the number of Passengers or the quantity of Goods which such Boat shall be permitted to take and carry, and every such License shall also contain a number of such Boat or Cattamaran, and the name or names, occupation or occupations, and place or places of residence of the Owner or Owners thereof, and the number of the Servants or Crew who shall be used or employed to row or navigate the same, and their names and places of residence respectively all of which particulars shall be entered in a book or Registry for that purpose to be kept by the Master Attendant, and so often as the property in any such Boat or Catamaran, or any share of the same shall be transferred, every Owner of such Boat or Catamaran shall produce his License before the said Master Attendant, and such new Owner shall 'also deliver to him a written paper signed by such new Owner specifying his name, occupation and place of residence, and the names and places of residence of all such Boatmen or other persons as he shall em-ploy, or propose to employ in and about the navigation and management of such Boat as particularly as may be, and shall also subscribe to a declaration in writing that he fully understands all the provisions of this Act, and those contained in the Subsidiary Rules to this Act, all which said particulars shall be duly entered by the said Master Attendant in a new Registry to be made by him of such Boat or Catamaran, and thereupon a new License to use such Boat or Catamaran expressing and containing the same particulars as are hereinbefore provided to be expressed in the original License shall be granted by the said Master Attendant, and whenever any such Owner or Owners, or any of the Boatmen or other persons employed to manage or navigate any such Boat or Catamaran shall change his or their place of abode notice of such change of abode shall be delivered to the said Master Attendant by the said Owner in order that such new place of abode may be entered in the Registry and License. No. 189 of 1842. GENERAL ORDERS BY THE HONORABLE THE PRESIDENT IN COUNCIL. FORT WILLIAM; 29TH JULY 1842.

With reference to the Orders of the Honorable the Court of Directors, published in the Government General Order No. 120, dated the 13th of August 1838, establishing prospectively for the Native Armies of the three Presidences, a new and graduated Scale of Pousions for Wounds received in Action, and declaring that those Pensions being a compensation for the permanent disability caused by such Wounds, may be held together with any other Pension to which a Native Officer or Soldier may be entitled, without any deductions on account thereof; The Honorable the President in Council, in communication with the Right Honorable the Governor General is pleased, with the view of removing existing doubts and misapprehensions, to notify for general information, that all former Regulations for the grant of Wound Pensions to Native Soldiers were thereby rescipded, the Provisions on that head of the General Order No. 84, dated the 17th April 1837, included,

2. Wound Pension as established by the General Order of the 13th of August 1838, affords both a provision for Men disabled by Wounds, whose period of Service does not entitle them to any other Pension, and an additional provision for Men similarly disabled, who from length of service are eligible to the benefit

of Invalid Retiring Pension.

3. In the former of those cases, Wound Pension precludes all claim, on account of the injury sustained, to any other Pension or Provision whatsoever; in the latter, it may be held together with the Ordinary rate of Retiring Invalid Pension, by all Men whose length of Service entitles them to that provisions, and with the Superior rate of the same Pension, by such Officers and Soldiers as have served 40 years and upwards, and also belong to the Class whose exclusive privilege it is to receive such Superior rate, which privilege, it is to be distinctly understood, is restricted by the Orders of the Honorable the Court of Directors to " Fighting Men of the Regular Army" and to the grades of that Class detailed in the General Order No. 84, dated the 17th of April 1837.

4. The General Order of the 17th April 1837, in so for as it reserved to Officers and Soldiers of the Madras and Bombay Armies, enlisted before the 1st of May of that year, the right of receiving the Pensions theretofore authorized by the Regulations of their respective Presidencies, whenever such Pensions exceeded the Bengal rates, was not affected by the General Order of the 13th of August 1838, but the last mentioned Order must not be construed cumulatively, nor be held to confer on such Officers and Men of those Armies, so enlisted, any claim to the Pension grantable under it's provisions, in addition to the higher Pen-

sion before receiveable by them in virtue of the right reserved to them by the Regulations of 1837.

I have the honor to forward herewith a copy of my Letter to the Adjutant General of the Army, of this date, forwarding copies of Letters and other Documents from Brigadier Monteath, reporting the result of an attack on the Enemy

The loss sustained by the Enemy must have been considerable, for in a Letter which one of the Chiefs addressed to Captain MacGregor on the 28th instant, he states, that they were still burying their dead. The effect in the whole Valley by such a complete defeat of the Shinwarees, and the destruction of so many of their Forts, will be productive of the most beneficial effects.

MAJOR GENERAL LUMLEY, Adjutant Genl. of the Army. Head Quarters Simlah, Camp Jellallahad, 29th July 1842.

I have the honor to forward for the information of His Excellency the Commander in Chief copy of a Letter dated Camp Mazeena, 27th Instant, from Brigadier Monteath, c. B. Commanding the Troops in the Shinwaree Valley, together with copies of the Documents to which it refers. Although the loss of the Enemy on this occasion has not been stated by Brigadier Monteath, I have every reason to believe from authentic sources, it has been considerable. One of the Chiefs "Shadoo," had a Nephew and a first Cousin killed in the action, and another Chief "Horor," the lost a Son

The Enemy were busily employed during the afternoon of the 26th in burying their dead, and on the day subsequent to the engagement, the Shinwaree Chiefs sent into Camp to express their willingness to pay the Revenue.

I have the honor of addressing you, to state for the information of Major General Pollock, c. B. that in accordance with the intention expressed by me in my Letter of the 24th Instant, I marched out yesterday morning at day-light, to attack the Enemy with the following Troops and Guns.

> Five 9 Pounders. One 24 Pounder Howitzer. Fifty Sappers and Miners. One Squadron 1st Light Cavalry. Seven Companies H. M's. 31st Regiment. Seven do. 33rd N. I. 53rd N. I. do. Seven Ferris' Corps of Jezailchees.

As the road into the Enemy's country was nearly impracticable for loaded animals, and we must have lost a great many Camels had I attempted to move with our Baggage, I resolved on returning to my present position after the operations I had in view had been concluded; therefore having compressed the Camp as much as possible by striking a portion of it, and collecting the Tents and Baggage on one spot, I left it in charge of Major Hewitt, 33rd Regiment, with the following Troops.

Two Companies H. Majesty's 31st Regiment. Ditto. . Ditto . . . . . . . . 53rd Native Infantry. Two Squadrons......lst Light Cavalry. Fifty Jezailchees and one hundred of Toorabaz Khan's Men. Two Squadrons......

On the Troops gaining the left ridge of the Shinwaree Valley, which was the most practicable, the Enemy retired out of their Forts, and I detached Lieutenant Beecher of the Corps of Engineers, with the Sappers and Miners, to set fire to them, which he did in succession up to the Fort of Secunder Khan, at the head of the Valley, the force moving parrallel along the ridge for the protection of the party.—Thus at one time the interiors of five and thirty Forts were in a blaze along the Valley, the Enemy contemplating the scene from the heights in the vicinity of Secunder Khan's Fort, where they had taken up positions, and from whence they were driven in gallant style by the advance consisting of the Light and two Battalion Companies Her Majesty's 31st Regiment, the Light Companies 33d and 53d Regiments, and the Corps of Jezailchees under Major Skinner, Her Majesty's 31st Regiment.

At this moment the Guns having been brought into position by Captain Abbott, opened a fire of Shrapnell Shells upon them, which did considerable execution, and so disconcerted them, that parties left the field altogether

and never returned.

Having effected every thing in the way of destruction, I caused two Companies of the 53d Regiment to be extended along a ridge below that from whence the advance had driven the Enemy, and of which it remained in possession. In rear of the Companies of the 53d a Company of the 33d was extended along the top of another ridge, and in rear of that, Company on a higher ridge two Guns were placed in position to aid in covering the retirement of the advance from the Enemy, who were all ready to attack them as soon as they should commence their descent from the heights. On these arrangements being completed, the recall was sounded to the advance,

and I am happy to say, the whole joined the main body without a single casualty occurring.

Major Skinner's party being exceedingly fatigued, for the heat had been excessive, and the labor great, I directed them to fall in with the main column, and ordered out two Companies from each of the three Regiments, to cover our retrogression homewards. These were formed into two parties, and extended across the ridge in two lines of Skirmishers. In rear of the second line I placed two Guns, with a Company of H. M. 31st Regiment, flanking each of them, also a party of forty Cavalry, and a line of Skirmishers was thrown out along the whole right flank of the column to the edge of the ridge (where the ground from it's broken character was most favorable for the Enemy,) and which communicated with the rear line of the covering force placed under the command of Lieutenant Colo nel Bolton, H. M. 31st Regiment, at his own solicitation.

In this order, we retired seven miles and a half over as bad a road as can well be supposed, and although I had anticipated loss and great annoyance from the Enemy, throughout the march, yet it seemed as if they had had enough, as their attacks were languid and remarkably cautious throughout, and I am rejoiced to say, that at half past 3 P. M.

As then attacks were angled and to injury of any kind.

It gives me great pleasure to record the zealous conduct of the Troops generally, and the cheerful and praise-worthy manner in which the Soldiers of Her Majesty's 31st Regiment labored to drag the Guns up such

places as the Horses, notwithstanding their unequalled qualities, were incapable of doing.

Herewith I beg to enclose Major Skinner's Report, and I can myself bear ample testimony to the gallant conduct of himself, and those under his Command, and I should be unjust were I not to say that the conduct of Captain Ferris, his Native Commandant, Hyder Ali, and the whole Corps of Jezailchees was highly distinguished

My thanks are very justly due to Lieut. Col. Bolton, Her Majesty's 31st Regiment, for the able manner in which he conducted the duties of covering the retirement of the Force, and particularly so to Major Skinner, for the zealous and gallant manner in which he led the advance against the Enemy.—To Captain Ferris, for the galthe zealous and gainent manner in which he led the advance against the Enemy.—To Captain Ferris, for the garlant manner in which with his Corps of Jezailchees he drove the Enemy from their position on the heights.—To Captain Abbott and Lieut. Dawes, for the very successful practice of the guns.—To Lieut. Beecher, for the zealous and satisfactory manner in which he, with the Detachment of Sappers and Miners, constructed a road for the Guns, and fired the Enemy's Forts in the Valley; and to Lieut. Lugard, H. M.'s 31st Regiment, Major of Brigade; Lieut. Mayne, Asssistant Quarter Master General; Captain Lloyd, Sub-Assistant Commissary General, and Captain Robertson. Field Engineer, for the assistance afforded manby them in the Field. Robertson, Field Engineer, for the assistance afforded me by them in the Field.

SIR, Dated Camp Mazeena, 27th July, 1842.

I have the honor to report to you, that when the Advance Guard, composed of the following Details, viz: the 3 Light Companies of the Brigade, with two Battalion Companies of H. M's. 31st Regiment and the Corps of Jezailchees, reached the crest of the ridge over which the Main Column was moving about 8 o'clock A. M. I observed the Enemy posted in small bodies upon the different heights and ridges in my front, while several parties occupied Gardens and broken Walls at the foot of the line of Hills I was upon, above the Valley on the right hand.

A sharp fire was opened upon the line of Skirmishers who quickly advanced and drove the Enemy off. The Corps of Jezailchees swept the front, the left Hills were cleared by the Light Company of the 31st Foot; and the Light Company of the 33d Native Infantry on the right skirmished throughout that part of the Valley nearest the ridge, the remaining Companies were in support. We advanced to Secunder Khan's Fort of "Muriaz" over very broken and difficult Country, with frequent descents and ascents, the Enemy sometimes keeping up a good fire, but always abandoning the line of heights as we ascended, and falling back to others. I halted at Secunder Khan's Fort, from which a few shots were fired as we advanced, when it was evacuated.

This Fort hangs over a narrow Valley on the right hand, fields of rice in many parts of it now under water. A narrow stony ridge in the midst of this Valley was occupied by the Enemy and commanded the post among trees at the foot of the Fort, which I wished to hold; the Enemy was soon driven off the first part of the ridge and fell back to a higher peak, from which it became also necessary to drive them, this was done by the Jezail-chees under Captain Ferris in very good style, who held it till withdrawn. At the head of the Valley in which we now were, there stands a high Hill with a Fort upon its summit, a considerable distance off; All the ridges from which the Enemy had been driven appear to draw to a point at this Fort, and their retreat was always towards it.

Many Men were collected there, and large parties were sent out to my right, this induced me to draw the Companies of the 31st Foot on the left nearer to me. The Enemy soon appearing on the summit of a hill above my left however, I sent one Company of the 31st Regiment to drive him away and occupy the hill; This duty was remarkably well performed by Captain Marshall, Her Majesty's 31st Regiment, whose Company was employed upon it. The Enemy retreated with some loss and took up another position under cover of a Sungah or breast-work of stone within shot. He was driven from it with great gallantry by Lieutenant Mc-liveen, of the 31st Regiment and a party of No. 7 Company of that Corps. Lieutentenat McIlveen, a very promising Young Officer indeed, was I regret to say, killed in this assault upon the Sungah.

A narrow Valley of rice fields, completely swamped, separated the ridge, on which my right was, from two small Forts, a garden at one end of the rice Valley below the ridge towards the first of the two Forts, was held by the Light Company of the 33rd Native Infantry, the Enemy descended from a high line of Sand Hills and occupying these two Forts, annoyed my position a good deal. He was driven from them by the Light Company and part of No. 6 of the 31st Regiment who had no other ground to advance on but the narrow ridges that divided the terraces of rice; they moved along these under a sharp fire and drove the Enemy from his position. I occupied these Forts and leaving Brevet Major Urmston, of the 31st Regiment in Command of the post, ceased from further operations. None of the Forts I have mentioned were tenable by the Enemy, the walls were breached in many places by the earthquake in February last. When I was ordered to fall back on the main body about ½ past one P. M. Major Urmston retired in good order (followed at a distance by the Enemy who had fired constantly into the Forts when we occupied them) over the difficult ground behind him, having set fire to the villages within the two Forts before he left them.

The advance guard being collected together above Secunder Khan's fort, joined the main column. I have great pleasure in assuring you, that during several hours of most active operations over the difficult country we were in, every Officer and Man under my Command behaved admirably.
