Notice is hereby given, that in addition to the sum of £ 800,000 advertised on the 5th October last, as to be provided in India for the service of the Home Treasury during the course of the official year 1846 | 47, and of which the larger proportion has already been purchased, a further amount of £ 455,000, being the un-supplied balance of the year 1844 | 45, will, in pursuance of instructions received from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, be raised on the hypothecation of Goods either wholly within the remainder of the current official year, should the trade of India require it, or in portions within the present and the ensuing official years, viz: 1846 | 47 and 1847 | 48, and that, in addition thereto, a still further sum of £ 600,000 will be raised in India for the service of the Home Treasury by bills on the hypothecation of goods during the course of the official year 1847 | 48, in full, so far as is at present known, of the requirements of the Home Treasury up to the 30th April 1848.

Advances of Cash will accordingly be made for this purpose by the Governments of Bengal, Madras, and Bombay, and the rate of exchange at which bills are to be drawn will continue to be 2 shillings per Company's Rupee, until further notice.

In all other respects the existing terms and conditions of the advances to be made by the respective Governments will remain in force, and be the same as published in the Calcutta Gazette under dates the 1st April 1842 and the 23rd August 1844.

Notice is hereby given, that by a Treasury Warrant under date 11th September 1845, among other Regulations, certain rates of British Packet Postage have been established upon all Letters, Newspapers and Prices Current, conveyed from Port to Port in the East Indies, China &c. by the new lines of Packet boats recently put in operation under the additional contract made by Her Majesty's Government, with the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company,

These rates of Packet Postage are as follows.

One Shilling per half ounce for letters, according to the scale of weight now in operation in the united Kingdom,

One Penny for each Newspaper, whether British, Colonial or Foreign, conveyed between any of Her Majesty's Colonies and a Foreign Port, or between any two Foreign Ports.

One Penny for each British or Colonial printed Price Current, or printed Commercial List conveyed between any of Her Majesty's Colonies.

Two Pence for each printed Price Current or printed Commercial list, whether British, Colonial or Foreign, conveyed between a British Colony and a Foreign Port or between two Foreign Ports.

British or Colonial Newspapers passing by these packets between any of Her Majesty's Colonies will not be liable to any postage for the sea conveyance,

The prepayment of the British Packet postage on letters, is optional, when conveyed between the Indian Offices of Bombay, Aden, Calcutta, Madras, Penang & Singapore, and the Islands of Ceylon and Hongkong, or between any two of the Indian offices above enumerated; but when dispatched to a foreign country or possession, such as China, Manila &c, the above postage must be paid in advance at the Despatching Office.

The postage chargeable on Newspapers and Prices Current and Commercial lists forwarded by these packet boats must in all cases be paid in advance.

The public are requested to take notice that by this Warrant, Letters &c. sent from Bombay to Point de Galle for dispatch thence to any Port in India or China, or to any of the settlements to the eastward by the Peninsular and Oriental Company's Steamers will be liable to the above rate of British packet postage in addition to the postage at present leviable from hence to Galle; and also that when addressed to a foreign country or possession the postage in question, must in all cases be paid in advance at the despatching office

The British Packet postage above referred to will, till further notice be converted into Indian currency at the rate of two shillings the rupee.

Packing boxes for such arms and accoutrements will be supplied by the Ordnance Department on the usual sanctioned indents being preferred.

No. 207 of 1847.—Lieutenant J. W. Barwise, of the Madras Artillery, is allowed leave of absence for a period of one year to proceed to the Neilgherry Hills on medical certificate.

No. 208 of 1847.—The following order issued by His Excellency Major General Sir C. J. Napier, dated 20th October last has been sanctioned by the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India.

A bazar establishment having been sanctioned by His Excellency the Major General for the station of Shikarpoor on the scale laid down in Jameson's Code for the station of Rajcote, with only a small additional expense to government by the reduction of the police establishment in the Sudder Bazar at Sukkur, Lieutenant Hunter of the 4th Regiment N. I. (Rifles) staff officer at Shikarpoor, is appointed to superintend the same.

59. It may in consequence be necessary that you should issue an explanatory G. O. specifying in clear and distinct terms that by the constitution of their offices Pay Masters are primarily and eventually responsible to Govt. for every payment which they make, that every charge in their accounts not authorised by regulations or special orders will accordingly be retrenched as against the Pay Master, who disbursed it, that nevertheless, except in cases where a contrary course may be determined upon the assistance of Govt. will be given in the recovery of the amount from the drawing or receiving officer, but that if, from whatever cause the recovery by or on behalf of the Pay Master is found impracticable or is likely to be delayed for a protracted period, the recovery of the amount on behalf of Government shall be at once enforced from the Pay Master who disbursed it.

The Honorable the President of the Council of India in Council is pleased to publish for general information an extract (as per margin*) from a letter from the Honorable the Court of Directors to the Government of Fort St. George and with reference thereto, to direct, that in all cases of the recovery from officers of sums overdrawn by or overpaid to them, being from whatever cause found impracticable or likely to be delayed for a protracted period the rule under which pay masters are responsible for every charge in their accounts not authorised by Regulation or a special order shall be at once enforced by the recovery of the sums in question from the Pay Masters who disbursed them:

2. In like manner in all future cases in which Government may consider it proper for satisfactory reasons adduced in appeal to relieve drawing or receiving officers from retrenchments against them, the Pay Master by whom the charges objected to were admitted shall be held responsible for the amount overpaid.

3. The above order to be held applicable to the three Presidencies.

No. 212 of 1847.—The following orders are published for general information in lieu of articles 71 to 78, 197 to 202, 204 to 210, 212, 213, 215 to 227, 269 to 276, 285, and 286, 290, 307 to 369, 385, Section XXIII. Article 52, Section LIII. Addenda. Articles 503, 570, Section XXIII, Appendix No. 1, and Articles 589 and 590 Section XXIII. Appendix No. 2 of Jameson's code.

REPAIRS.

1. Repairs are divided under the heads, petty and annual.
2. Petty repairs include coloring walls, oil painting, repairs of plaster, ceilings, floors, steps, fixtures and fastenings and such like.

3. Broken panes of glass in public buildings, are to be replaced without expense to government except the case of buildings being unoccupied, or of its being certified by the head of the department, that they were broken through carelessness; all public buildings are to be received and given over complete in glass; government being put to no expense on that account except under the circumstances above mentioned.

4. *Annual repairs* include whatever else is needed for the due preservation of any structure, from the consequences of the ordinary causes of injury or deterioration.

5. All additions or alterations therefore, come under the head of new works.

6. For emergent repairs, the same rule applies as per emergent works.

PETTY REPAIRS.

7. Petty repairs will be executed at any period, according to convenience or necessity, on a station order, or on the requisition of a civil authority, or of the head of a department, or other competent authority, and they will be charged in the executive officers monthly current expense bill, for each department.

8. At stations and in districts where there is no engineer or executive officer, the authorities under whose orders such repairs are made, will prefer monthly bills for the expense incurred, through the superintending engineer of the province, to the military board for audit.

ANNUAL REPAIRS.

9. Committees should be comprised of officers capable of forming an opinion, of which repairs are, or are not required; a field officer should invariably preside, and the engineer or officiating engineer of the division, station or district, be a member of the committee of survey, which will be annually assembled between the 15th and 30th of October, at the several stations under this presidency, to report upon the annual repairs necessary to the several buildings &c. according to the form No. 9, page 314. The proceedings of the committee after being approved of and countersigned by the station commanding officer, will be made over to the executive officer, not later than the 1st November, to allow of the timely preparation of the estimates, and the provincial superintending engineer is held responsible, that the survey report and estimates reach the Military Board not later than the 15th January.

10. The buildings &c. in the Military department at the presidency, and its out posts, will be reported on by the standing committee of survey between the 15th and 30th of October, and the proceedings forwarded to the garrison engineer by the 1st November, who will prepare and submit the estimates to the Military Board by the 15th January.

11. Survey reports of the repairs required to the civil buildings at the presidency, and out posts, will be prepared by the civil architect, and be countersigned by the heads of departments. These reports with the corresponding estimates will be submitted by the civil architect to the Military Board before the 1st February.

12. Survey reports of the buildings and works in charge of the engineer to the dock yard, will be prepared by that officer, and countersigned by the Superintendent Indian Navy, and with the corresponding estimates will be submitted to the Board by the 1st January.

13. At out stations and in districts where there is no executive officer, the heads of departments; will prepare the requisite survey reports and estimates for annual repairs to the buildings in their charge, and submit the same to the provincial superintendent before the 15th January, who should transmit them to the Military Board by the 15th February.

Note.—The civil authorities in the Tanna and Rutnagherry Collectories, are authorised to apply to any of the assistants to the Superintendent of Roads, who may be in the vicinity, for professional aid in preparing the reports and estimates, but if such aid be not procurable, they should themselves prepare those documents, and submit them through the Superintendent of Roads to the Military Board.

14. At stations and in districts where there is an executive officer available, he will prepare the survey reports, which when countersigned by the heads of departments, he will forward to the Provincial Superintendent, by the 15th January.

15. As a check upon unnecessary expenditure on annual repairs, a statement will appear at the foot of each estimate, of the expenditure on that account for the three preceding years.

16. A foot note will be added, when necessary, explanatory of the nature of the repair which it is intended shall be performed under the general heads.

17. A completion report will accompany each bill for repairs.

18. The Military Board are authorized to sanction conditionally, estimates for annual repairs in the Military and Civil Departments, and the intimation of such sanction to engineer and other officers under their control, to proceed with such repairs, will be sufficient authority to Pay Masters, Collectors and other disbursing officers, to make the necessary cash advances.

19. Heads of departments occupying public buildings, whether detached from, or forming part of their offices, shall keep them in repair at their own expense, excepting those occupied by officers holding political situations, which will be repaired at the expense of government. Public buildings occupied by assistants, either at the presidency, or when stationed in the districts, will be repaired at the expense of government.

20. Alterations and additions required to buildings occupied by either heads of departments or their assistants, will, if authorised by government, be made at the expense of the occupants.

In lieu of articles 238 to 243 inclusive, 245 and 246, Section XXIII Jameson's Code.

EMERGENT WORKS AND REPAIRS.

An executive engineer on receiving an order from a divisional or station commanding officer, or requisition from a civil authority, or head of department, or other competent authority for the execution on emergency of any work or repair, which would not without public inconvenience admit of delay, will proceed at once with the work, a report of the nature of the work, and the probable expense being made immediately by the Engineer Department, to the Military Board, if the expense exceed Rupees one hundred, and by the Military Board to Government, if it exceed Rupees four hundred.

Such emergent work or repair not exceeding an outlay of Rupees four hundred, will be included in the executive officers monthly current expense bill, vouched by the original order, letter, or requisition, authorising it.

3. If the outlay exceed that amount, a separate bill for the work will be submitted for sanction, on its completion, the Military Board using their discretion in calling for estimates.

In lieu of articles 108, 109, 139, 140, 317 to 348, Section XXIII and 59 to 61, Section LIII, Addenda Jameson's Code.

BOOKS AND RETURNS.

1. Each superintending engineer will, in addition to the ordinary office records, compile the valuation returns of buildings in a book, and will correct the book yearly, according to the annual returns of alterations in the valuation of buildings, which will be transmitted to the Military Board, by the executive officers, through his office.

2. Each superintending engineer will furnish to the Military Board the following returns.—Annual comparative return of his establishment, shewing all alterations during the past year, 1st May;—Annual returns of Books, Papers and Plans, 1st May;—Annual returns of Mathematical Instruments and drawing materials, 1st May;—Annual return of office furniture 1st May;—Annual report of the proceedings of the public work department, in his province for the year ending 30th April, for publication

Annual reports of any European subordinates or assistant surveyors and builders, who may be employed in his office, 1st May.

3. Each executive officer will keep the following books, which will be at all times liable to examination by the superintending engineer.

Inward and outward letters.

Estimates.

Cash books, shewing actual receipts and disbursements of cash.

Journal or day book.

Cash abstract of daily cash payments.

Figured abstracts of daily expenditure of labor and materials.

Stock book.

Book of accounts current, with suppliers of materials.

Valuation of buildings.

4. Each Executive officer will furnish the following returns, to the Military Board, through the Superintending Engineer.

Quarterly Progress Reports in each department, dated 1st May, 1st August, 1st November and 1st February.	
Annual Reports of European subordinates,	1st May.
Annual Report of assistant surveyors and builders,	1st ditto.

5. Half yearly accounts current to the Collector at an outstation, or to the General Paymaster at the Presidency, on 30th April and 30th October.

In the Military Department.

6. Monthly cash balance reports direct to the Military Accountant on the 1st of each month, half yearly accounts current through the disbursing officer, and Military Board, to the Military Accountant, on the 30th April and 30th October.

In lieu of Articles 311 to 316, Section XXIII Jameson's Code.

Completion Reports.

Executive officers will forward with their bills for any work, a completion report in the regulated form, by the Superintending Engineer if present, otherwise by a committee, or if a committee be not procurable, they will furnish a certificate of completion by the head of the department.

Transfer Rules.

1. Survey report on serviceable materials by a committee, are to be furnished, if deemed necessary by the relieving officer, otherwise the countersignature of the latter, on the relieved officer's bill, with a declaration according to the following Form, that he is satisfied with the quality and prices charged is sufficient.

"I do hereby certify, that I have received the above mentioned stores, together with copy of this document, and that I am satisfied with the accuracy of the quantities, with their condition, and with the rates charged."

2. Survey reports on Tools, on Barrack and Hospital Furniture, and all other materials or stores borne in separate Quarterly Returns, containing columns shewing the quantity, condition and rated value of the articles delivered over are to be furnished and countersigned by the relieved officer.

3. Old materials for which there is no immediate use, are either to be disposed of under the authority of the Superintending Engineer, or to be brought into the account as stores in hand, at a fair valuation, determined by a committee, the circumstance being reported, and due credit given to government.

4. A list of works in progress, estimated, or ordered to be estimated, is to be furnished by the relieved officer, unfinished works are to be surveyed by a committee, and the measurement vouched by the committee and relieving officer.

5. Bills for unfinished works are to be prepared by the relieved officer and countersigned by the relieving officer, in acceptance of the balance of estimate for the completion of the work, otherwise the relieved officer is to submit his bill for the portion completed to the Military Board for audit, and the relieving officer to submit a revised estimate for the remainder, as soon as possible.

6. The office books and records of returns of the latest date, are to be countersigned by the relieving officer, if satisfied of their correctness, who will report having done so, to the superintending engineer.

7. The relieving officer, if dissatisfied or doubtful, regarding the receipt or condition of any stores, building or other public property, is to take charge, under protest, recording his objections and immediately applying for a committee. If he delay to do so, the whole responsibility of the charge he has assumed, will rest on him.

8. If either party be dissatisfied with the decision of the committee, the question will be referred to the Military Board and Government, through the superintending engineer.

9. When the superintending engineer happens to be present, all the duties referred in the foregoing regulations to "a committee," will be performed by that officer.

No. 213 of 1847.—The following order is confirmed as a temporary arrangement.

A station order be Lieutenant Colonel Dods, dated Ad n 8th January 1847, directing Bt. At all stations, not the head quarters of a permanent Brigadier, where two or more corps of the line may be cantoned, the officer exercising in virtue of his seniority the command of the station, will make over the command of his own corps to the next senior regimental officer, and draw a command allowance of Rupees (500) five hundred with (20) twenty Rupees for stationary.
