Calicut, 1st February 1847.

Notice is hereby given, that a fixed single light will be exhibited at Calicut from the 15th instant, on a column of masonry 105 feet above the level of the sea.

The column, which is white, may be seen from the deck of a ship, at a distance of about 14 or 15 miles during the day time, and the light (which is a small one) may be distinguished at a distance of about 9 or 10 miles during the night.

The Calicut shoal bears from the Light House N. N. E. distance about 1½ miles.

The best anchorage for shipping is in 5 fathoms with the Light House bearing from east to E. N. E.

There is 3½ fathoms near the western edge of the Calicut shoal, but vessels passing the port either by day or by night, should not come under 5 fathoms, this depth will carry them well clear of the shoal.

The light will not be exhibited from the 20th May to the 10th August of each year.

NOTIFICATION.

Notice is hereby given, that by a Treasury Warrant under date 11th September 1845, among other Regulations, certain rates of British Packet Postage have been established upon all Letters, Newspapers and Prices Current, conveyed from Port to Port in the East Indies, China &c. by the new lines of Packet boats recently put in operation under the additional contract made by Her Majesty's Government, with the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company,

These rates of Packet Postage are as follows.

One Shilling per half ounce for letters, according to the scale of weight now in operation in the united Kingdom,

One Penny for each Newspaper, whether British, Colonial or Foreign, conveyed between any of Her Majesty's Colonies and a Foreign Port, or between any two Foreign Ports.

One Penny for each British or Colonial printed Price Current, or printed Commercial List conveyed between any of Her Majesty's Colonies.

Two Pence for each printed Price Current or printed Commercial list, whether British, Colonial or Foreign, conveyed between a British Colony and a Foreign Port or between two Foreign Ports.

British or Colonial Newspapers passing by these packets between any of Her Majesty's Colonies will not be liable to any postage for the sea conveyance,

The prepayment of the British Packet postage on letters, is optional, when conveyed between the Indian Offices of Bombay, Aden, Calcutta, Madras, Penang & Singapore, and the Islands of Ceylon and Hongkong, or between any two of the indian offices above enumerated; but when dispatched to a foreign country or possession, such as China, Manilla &c, the above postage must be paid in advance at the Despatching Office.

The postage chargeable on Newspapers and Prices Current and Commercial lists forwarded by these packet boats must in all cases be paid in advance.

The public are requested to take notice that by this Warrant, Letters &c. sent from Bombay to Point de Galle for dispatch thence to any Port in India or China, or to any of the settlements to the eastward by the Peninsular and Oriental Company's Steamers will be liable to the above rate of British packet postage in addition to the postage at present leviable from hence to Galle; and also that when addressed to a foreign country or possession the postage in question, must in all cases be paid in advance at the despatching office

The British Packet postage above referred to will, till further notice be converted into indian currency at the rate of two shillings the rupee.

The above arrangement will come into operation in this Presidency on the 1st day of May next.

GENERAL ORDER

BY THE RIGHT HON'BLE THE GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA.

FOREIGN DEPARTMENT,

Camp Dehra, March 15th, 1847.

NOTIFICATION.

Fort William, Foreign Department, the 30th August 1843.

Some misconception appearing to exist with respect to the power which officers of both services have over the documents and papers which come into their possession officially, the Governor General in Council deems it expedient to notify, that such documents and papers are in no case to be made public, or communicated to individuals without the previous consent of the Government to which alone they belong.

The officer in possession of such documents and papers can only legitimately use them for the furtherance of the public service, in the discharge of his official duty; and it is to be understood, that the same rule which applies to documents and papers, applies to information of which officers may become possessed officially.

The Governor General deems it advisable to republish for general information the Notification issued on the 30th August 1843, in which the principle is laid down, that it is contrary to the duty of every officer, civil or military, to make public or to communicate to individuals, without the previous sanction of Government, any documents, papers, or information of which he may have become possessed in his official capacity.

The practice of making use of official information in carrying on personal controversies, is a course highly prejudicial to the public interests, and is not only at variance with the rules by which due discipline and obedience to superior authority can be adequately maintained, but is a positive breach of faith, in as much as no functionary has a right to reveal, without due authority from his official superiors, or the Home authorities, any fact or circumstance which may come to his knowledge in the performance of his duty, or to correspond with any one, upon the instructions he may have received for his special guidance.

The Governor General is persuaded that every officer, civil and military, will henceforth conform to this rule of the service, under the conviction that, if in the transaction of his official duties, his public conduct be impugned he is at liberty to seek redress through the usual official channel, by an appeal to the government he serves, and that the government so appealed to will afford him every opportunity of vindicating his character.

No. 241 of 1847.—The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to notify, that in supercession of Art. 79, Sec. XLVII, page 770 of Jameson's Code, commanding officers of native regiments of the line, who may from time to time be authorized by the Commander in Chief, to detach recruiting parties to any part of this, or of the other presidencies, to obtain recruits for the service of their respective corps, are allowed to draw an advance of Rupees one thousand for that purpose; such advance being disbursed exclusively in the subsistence of such recruits, and accounted for accordingly by regular abstracts, on the arrival of the recruits at the head quarters of their corps.

Act No. — of 1847.

An Act for amending Act XXX. of 1836.

It is hereby enacted, that within the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Com-

pany whenever any Court not included under the provisions of Act XXIV. of 1843, shall sentence any offender to imprisonment for life under the provisions of Act XXX. of 1836, it shall at the same time sentence such offender to transportation beyond sea for life, unless there should be special reasons inducing the Court to think such prisoner not a proper subject for transportation, which special reasons the Court is hereby directed to record.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 13th day of June next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 13th of March 1847.

Act No. ——— of 1847.

An Act for the encouragement of learning in the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company, by defining and providing for the enforcement of the right called Copyright therein.

Whereas doubts may exist whether the right called Copyright can be enforced by the Common Law of England in those parts of the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company into which the Common Law of England has been introduced:

And whereas doubts may exist whether the said right can be enforced by virtue of the principles of equity and good conscience in the other parts of the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company:

And whereas for the encouragement of learning it is desirable that the existence of the said right should be placed beyond doubt, and that the said right should be made capable of easy enforcement in every part of the said Territories:

And whereas it is doubtful whether the Act of Parliament 5 and 6 Victoria, C. 45, entitled "an Act to amend the Law of Copyright," although such Act extend to every part of the British Dominions, has made appropriate and sufficient provision for the enforcement in every part of the said Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company of the said right by proprietors thereof: and whether the said Act of Parliament has made provision for the enforcement of the said right by or against any persons not being subject to the jurisdiction of the Courts established by Her Majesty's Charter.

I. It is therefore hereby enacted, that the Copyright in every book published in the life time of its author within the said Territories after the passing of the Act of Parliament 3 and 4 Wm. 4, C. 85, entitled "an Act for effecting an arrangement with the East India Company and for the better government of His Majesty's Indian Territories till the 30th day of April 1854." shall endure for the natural life of such author, and for the further term of seven years commencing at the time of his death, and shall be the property of such Author and his Assigns: Provided always, that if the said term of seven years shall expire before the end of forty-two years from the publication of such book, the Copyright shall in that case endure for such period of forty-two years; and that the Copyright in every book which shall be published after the death of its Author shall endure for the term of forty-two years from the first publication thereof and shall be the property of the proprietor of the Author's manuscript from which such book shall be first published and his Assigns.

II. And whereas it is expedient to provide against the suppression of books of importance to the public. It is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor General in Council on complaint made to them that the proprietor of the Copyright

in any book published after the passing of this Act within the said Territories, has after the death of its Author refused to republish or to allow the republication of the same, and that by reason of such refusal such book may be withheld from the public, to grant a licence to such complainant to publish such book in such manner and subject to such conditions as they may think fit, and it shall be lawful for such complainant to publish such book according to such licence.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that a Book of Registry wherein may be registered as hereinafter enacted the proprietorship in the Copyright of books and assignments thereof, and licences affecting such Copyright, shall be kept in the office of the Secretary to the Government of India for the Home Department, and shall at all convenient times be open to the inspection of any person on payment of for every entry which shall be searched for or inspected in the said book, and that such Officer shall whenever thereunto reasonably required, give a copy of any entry in such book certified under his hand, to any person requiring the same on payment to him of the sum of

and such copies so certified shall be received in evidence in all Courts and in all summary proceedings, and shall be *prima facie* proof of the proprietorship or assignment of Copyright or licence as therein expressed, but subject to be rebutted by other evidence.

IV. And it is enacted, that if any person shall wilfully make or cause to be made any false entry in the Registry Book aforesaid, or shall wilfully produce, or cause to be tendered in evidence any paper falsely purporting to be a copy of any entry in the said book, he shall be guilty of an indictable misdemeanour, and shall be punished accordingly.

V. And it is enacted, that after the passing of this Act it shall be lawful for the proprietor of Copyright in any book published, after the passing of the said Act of Parliament 3 and 4 Wm. 4, C. 85 to make entry in the Registry Book of the title of such book, the time of the first publication, and the name and place of abode of the publisher thereof, and the name and place of abode of the proprietor of the Copyright of the said book, or of any portion of such Copyright in the form in that behalf given in the Schedule to this Act annexed upon payment of the sum of

to and that it shall be lawful for every such registered proprietor to assign his interest or any portion of his interest therein, by making entry in the said Book of Registry of such assignment, and of the name and place of abode of the Assignee thereof in the form given in that behalf in the said Schedule on payment of the like sum; and such assignment so entered shall be effectual in Law to all intents and purposes whatsoever without being subject to any stamp or duty, and shall be of the same force and effect as if such assignment had been made by Deed.

VI. And it is enacted, that if any person shall deem himself aggrieved by any entry made under colour of this Act in the said Book of Registry, it shall be lawful for such person to apply by motion to the Supreme Court of Calcutta in term time, or to apply by Summons to any Judge of such Court in vacation for an order that such entry may be expunged or varied, and that upon any such application by motion or Summons to the said Court, or to a Judge as aforesaid, such Court or Judge shall make such order for expunging, varying or confirming such entry either with or without costs, as to such Court or Judge shall seem just, and the said Secretary shall on the production to him of any such order for expunging or varying any such entry, expunge or vary the same according to the requisitions of such order.

VII. And it is enacted, that if any person shall after the passing of this Act print or cause to be printed either for sale or exportation, any book in which there shall be subsisting Copyright without the consent in writing of the proprietor thereof, or shall have in his possession for sale or hire any such book so unlawfully printed without such consent as aforesaid, such offender if he shall have so offended within the local limits of any of the Courts of Judicature established by Her Majesty's Charter, shall be liable to a special action on the case in

such Court, and if he shall have so offended in any other part of the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company, to a suit in the Zillah Court within the jurisdiction of which he shall have so offended, which shall and may be prosecuted in the same manner in which any other action of damages may be brought and prosecuted there, and if he shall so offend in any such last mentioned part of the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company in which there is no Zillah Court, to a suit in the highest local Court exercising original Civil jurisdiction in such part of the said Territories.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that after the passing of this Act, in any suit or action brought in any of the Courts of Judicature established by Her Majesty's Charter under the provisions of this Act, against any person for printing any such book for sale, hire or exportation, or for selling, publishing, or exposing to sale or hire, or causing to be sold, published or exposed to sale or hire, or for having in his possession for sale or hire any such book so unlawfully printed, the defendant on pleading thereto shall give to the plaintiff a notice in writing of any objections on which he means to rely on the trial of such action, and if the nature of his defence be that the plaintiff in such action was not the author or first publisher of the book in which he shall by such action claim Copyright, or is not the proprietor of the Copyright therein, or that some other person than the plaintiff was the author or first publisher of such book, or is the proprietor of the Copyright therein, then the defendant shall specify in such notice the name of the person whom he alleges to have been the author or first publisher of such book, or the proprietor of the Copyright therein, together with the title of such book, and the time when and the place where such book was first published, otherwise the defendant in such action shall not at the trial or hearing of such action be allowed to give any evidence that the plaintiff in such action was not the author or first publisher of the book in which he claims such Copyright as aforesaid, or that he was not the proprietor of the Copyright therein, and at such trial, or hearing no other objection shall be allowed to be made on behalf of such defendant than the objections stated in such notice, or that any other person was the author or first publisher of such book, or the proprietor of the Copyright therein than the person specified in such notice, or give in evidence in support of his defence any other book than one substantially corresponding in title, time and place, of publication with the title, time and place specified in such notice.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that after the passing of this Act in any such suit or action as last aforesaid brought in any Zillah Court or other local Court as aforesaid, the defendant shall state in his answer all the matters which by the last preceding section the defendant in any suit or action brought in any of the Courts of Judicature established by Her Majesty's Charter is required to give notice of in writing.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that when any publisher or other person shall within the said Territories before or at the time of the passing of this Act but after the passing of the said Act of Parliament 3 and 4 Wm. 4, C. 85, have projected, conducted and carried on, or shall hereafter project, conduct or carry on, or be the proprietor of any Encyclopædia, Review, Magazine, Periodical work or work published in a series of Books or parts, or any book whatsoever, and shall have employed or shall employ any persons to compose the same, or any Volumes, Parts, Essays, Articles, or portions thereof for publication in, or as part of the same, and such work, Volumes, Parts, Essays, Articles, or portions shall have been, or shall hereafter be composed under such employment on the terms that the Copyright therein shall belong to such Proprietor, Projector, Publisher or Conductor, and paid for by such Proprietor, Projector, Publisher or Conductor, the Copyright in every such Encyclopædia, Review, Magazine, Periodical work, and work published in a series of Books or Parts, and in every Volume, Part, Essay, Article and portion so composed and paid for shall be the property of such Proprietor, Projector, Publisher or Conductor, who shall enjoy the same rights as if he were the actual

author thereof and shall have such term of Copyright therein as is given to the authors of Books by this Act, except only that in the case of Essays, Articles or Portions forming part of and first published in Reviews, Magazines, or other Periodical works of a like nature after the term of twenty-eight years from the first publication thereof respectively the right of publishing the same in a separate form shall revert to the author for the remainder of the term given by this Act. Provided always, that during the term of twenty-eight years the said Proprietor, Projector, Publisher, or Conductor shall not publish any such Essay, Article, or portion separately or singly without the consent previously obtained of the author thereof or his Assigns: Provided also, that nothing herein contained shall alter or affect the right of any person who shall have been or shall be so employed as aforesaid, to publish any such his composition in a separate form who by any contract, express or implied, may have reserved or may hereafter reserve to himself such right, but every author reserving, retaining or having such right shall be entitled to the Copyright in such composition when published in a separate form according to this Act without prejudice to the right of such Proprietor, Projector, Publisher, or Conductor as aforesaid.

XI. And it is hereby enacted, that the Proprietor of the Copyright in any Encyclopædia, Review, Magazine, Periodical work or other work published in a series of Books or Parts shall be entitled to all the benefits of the Registration in the Office of the Secretary to the Government of India in the Home Department, under this Act, on entering in the said Book of Registry the title of such Encyclopædia, Review, Periodical work, or other work published in a series of Books or Parts, the time of the first publication of the first Volume, Number or Part thereof, or of the first Volume, Number or Part first published after the passing of this Act in any such work which shall have been published heretofore, and after the passing of the said Act of Parliament 3 and 4, William 4, C. 85, and the name and place of abode of the proprietor thereof and of the Publisher thereof, when such Publisher shall not also be the proprietor thereof.

XII. And it is enacted, that all copies of any Book wherein there shall be Copyright, and of which entry shall have been made in the said Registry Book and which shall have been unlawfully printed without the consent of the registered proprietor of such Copyright in writing under his hand first obtained, shall be deemed to be the property of the proprietor of such Copyright and who shall be registered as such, and such registered proprietor shall after demand thereof in writing be entitled to sue for and recover the same or damages for the detention thereof.

XIII. And it is enacted, that if the case be within the jurisdiction of any of the Courts of Judicature established by Her Majesty's Charter, such registered proprietor shall be entitled to sue for and recover such copies or damages for the detention thereof in an action of Detinue, from any party who shall detain the same, or to sue for and recover damages for the conversion thereof in an action of Trover, and that if the case be within the jurisdiction of any Zillah Court or other local Court as aforesaid the registered proprietor shall be entitled to sue for and recover such copies or damages for the detention or conversion thereof in such form as is in use in the said Zillah or other local Courts for the recovery of specific personal property or damages for the detention or conversion thereof.

XIV. And it is enacted, that no proprietor of Copyright in any book which shall be first published after the passing of this Act shall maintain under the provisions of this Act any action or suit at law or in equity, or any summary proceeding in respect of any infringement of such Copyright unless he shall before commencing such action, suit, or proceeding have caused an entry to be made in the Book of Registry at the office of the said Secretary of such book pursuant to this Act. Provided always that the omission to make such entry shall not affect the Copyright in any book, nor the right to sue or proceed in respect of the infringement thereof except the right to sue or proceed in respect of the infringement thereof under the provisions of this Act.

XV. And it is enacted, that if any action or suit shall be commenced or brought in any of the Courts of Judicature established by her Majesty's Charter against any person or persons whomsoever for doing or causing to be done any thing in pursuance of this Act the defendant or defendants in such action may plead the general issue and give the special matter in evidence; and if upon such action a verdict shall be given for the defendant, or the plaintiff shall become nonsuited or discontinue his action, then the defendant shall have and recover his full costs for which he shall have the same remedy as a defendant in any case by law hath in the said last mentioned Courts.

XVI. And it is enacted, that all Actions, Suits, Bills, Indictments, Informations and other criminal proceedings for any offence which shall be committed against this Act shall be brought, sued and commenced within twelve Calendar months next after such offence committed, or else the same shall be void and of none effect.

XVII. Provided always and it is enacted, that nothing in this Act contained shall affect, alter, or vary any right subsisting at the time of passing this Act except as herein expressly enacted; and all contracts, agreements and obligations made and entered into before the passing of this Act and all remedies relating thereto, shall remain in full force any thing herein contained to the contrary notwithstanding.
