Legislative Council of India.

8th May 1858.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 27th April 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 8th May 1858), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XVIII. OF 1858.

An Act for the Regulation of certain Ports within the Presidency of Fort St. George.

Whereas it is expedient to provide for the safety of vessels, and the convenience of traffic in Ports within the Presidency of Fort St. George, declared, under Section XXIV. Act VI. of 1844, to be Ports for the landing and shipment of merchandize, but to which the general provisions of Act XXII. of 1855 are not suitable; it is enacted as follows:—

I. The provisions contained in Sections XVI. and XXIV. of Act XXII. of 1855 shall be applicable to the Ports mentioned in the Schedule to this Act annexed, being Ports declared by the Governor in Council of Fort St. George, under Section XXIV. Act VI. of 1844, to be Ports for the landing and shipment of merchandize; and may be enforced by any Magistrate to whose ordinary jurisdiction any such Port is subject; and any penalties imposed by such Magistrate, and any expenses incurred by his order, under the said provisions, shall be recoverable

Sections XVI. and XXIV. Act XXII. of 1855 to be applicable to certain Ports.

Recovery of penalties and expenses.

respectively in the manner provided in Sections LV. and LVII. of the said Act XXII. of 1855.

II. In any of the said Ports, the consent referred to in Section XXIV. of the said Act XXII. of 1855 may be given by the Principal Officer of Customs at such Port, or by any other Officer in that behalf appointed by Government.

Legislative Council of India.

22nd May 1858.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 11th May 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 22nd idem), and is hereby promulgated for general information :-

Act No. XIX. of 1858.

An Act to Provide for the Authentication of Stamped Paper issued from the Stamp Office in Calcutta.

Whereas, during the recent disturbances, a large quantity of Stamped Paper issued from the Stamp Office in Calcutta, and remaining unsold in several of the Collectors' Treasuries, and in the possession of divers Stamp vendors, was plundered; and it is necessary to provide against the unlawful use of such Stamped Paper, and the loss which would ensue to Government from such use thereof; It is enacted as follows:—

I. After the passing of this Act, no deed, instrument, or other writing specified in Schedule A Regulation X. 1829 of the Bengal Code, and required by that Regulation to be stamped, and which shall bear date or shall appear to have been written after the passing of this Act, shall be filed, exhibited, or received in any Court of Justice, or in any public Office, unless the stamped paper, vellum, parchment, or other material upon which such deed, instrument, or other writing is written, shall either bear such stamp, signature, or other mark as hath been or shall be prescribed by the Governor General in Council or by the Lieutenant Governor of Bengal, for the purpose of distinguishing stamps issued from the Stamp Office in Calcutta after the 6th day of January 1858, or be authenticated as having been duly purchased by having thereon the signature and official designation either of the Superintendent of Stamps in Calcutta, or of the Collector of some District, or of his Deputy or Assistant, together with the date of such signature.

II. After the passing of this Act, no law-paper specified in Schedule B of the said Regulation, and required by such Regulation to be stamped, shall be filed, exhibited, or received in any Court of Justice, or in any public Office, unless such law-paper shall either bear the stamp, signature, or other mark required for distinguishing stamps issued subsequently to the said 6th day of January 1858, or be authenticated as having been duly purchased by having thereon the signature and official designation either of the Superintendent of Stamps in Calcutta, or of the Collector of some District, or of his Deputy or Assistant, together with the date of such signature.

III. A notification of the stamp, signature, or other mark prescribed for distinguishing stamps issued from the Stamp Office in Calcutta after the 6th day of January 1858 shall be published in the Calcutta Government Gazette, and in such other Gazettes as shall be published or shall circulate in any District in which stamps issued from the Stamp Office in Calcutta are used.

IV. In every District in which stamps issued from the Stamp Office in Calcutta are required by the said Regulation X. 1829 to be used, a proclamation shall be issued by the Collector requiring all persons, within a time to be specified in the proclamation, not being less than one month from the date of such proclamation, to cause all unused paper, vellum, parchment, or other material stamped under the provisions of the said Regulation, which may be in their possession, not bearing the stamp, signature, or other mark required for distinguishing stamps issued after the 6th day of January 1858, and which shall not have been authenticated in the manner above required, to be sent in to, or produced at, the Office of such Collector or of his Deputy or Assistant, for the purpose of being authenticated or exchanged for new stamps.

V. Every person who, within the time specified in the proclamation, or within such further time as the Collector or his Deputy or Assistant shall consider reasonable under the circumstances of any particular case, shall cause to be produced at such Office as aforesaid any such unused stamped paper, parchment, vellum, or other material as aforesaid, and shall prove to the satisfaction of the Collector or of his Deputy or Assistant that such stamp was honestly obtained from Government and paid for, shall be entitled to have the same authenticated by such Officer in manner aforesaid, or to have the same exchanged by such Officer for new stamps of the same amount.

VI. Any such unused stamped paper, parchment, vellum, or other material so sent in or produced as aforesaid, which shall not either bear the stamp, signature, or other mark required for distinguishing stamps issued after the said 6th day of January 1858, or have been authenticated in manner aforesaid, and which shall not be proved to the satisfaction of the Collector or of his Deputy or Assistant to have been honestly obtained from Government and paid for, shall be detained by such Officer as Government property; and any such stamped paper, parchment, vellum, or other material, which shall be found in the possession of any person, may be seized by any Magistrate, or by any Officer of Police or Revenue Officer, and sent in to the Collector's Office; and if such paper, parchment, vellum, or other material shall be so found after the time required for sending in the same for authentication or exchange, it may be detained as the property of Government.

VII. Any Officer of Police having power by law to search for stolen property may, subject to the provisions under which he is empowered to make such search, proceed to search houses or places in which there may be reasonable cause to suspect that there is any such stamped paper, parchment, vellum, or other material not bearing the stamp, signature, or other mark required for distinguishing stamped paper issued after the 6th day of January 1858, and not authenticated in manner aforesaid as having been duly purchased from Government, and may seize and transmit to the Collector any such stamped paper as aforesaid.

VIII. The words "Collector" or "his Deputy or Assistant" shall be deemed to include any Officer exercising the powers of a Collector or of his Deputy or Assistant respectively.

Legislative Council of India.
22nd May 1858.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 22nd May 1858, and was referred to a Select Committee, who are to report thereon after the 26th of August next:—

A Bill to make Further Provision for the Removal of Prisoners.

Whereas, by the laws in force, the Executive Government of any Presidency or place is authorised to order the removal of any person under sentence of imprisonment, from the prison or place in which he is confined to any other public prison or place of confinement within the same Presidency or Government; and whereas, it is expedient to make provision for the removal of prisoners in certain cases beyond the limits of the Presidency or Government in

which the place where such prisoners are confined is situate; It is enacted as follows:—

I. Whenever it shall be judged necessary, for the safe custody of any person, who has been convicted of any heinous offence and sentenced to imprisonment for life or for any term exceeding three years, that such person should be removed to some place of confinement beyond the limits of the Presidency or Government within which he is confined, it shall be lawful for the Governor General in Council, or for the Executive Government of the Presidency or place, with the sanction of the Governor General in Council, to order the removal of such person from the prison or place in which he is confined to any other prison or place of confinement within the territories in the possession and under the Government of the East India Company.

II. Any prisoner who, previous to the passing of this Act, shall have been removed in manner aforesaid from any prison or place of confinement to any other prison or place of confinement in the said territories, shall be held to have been lawfully removed.

Whereas it is expedient that Act XVI. of 1857 should continue in force for one year; It is enacted as follows:—

Preamble.

Act XVI. of 1857 shall continue in force for one year from the time of the passing of this Act.

Legislative Council of India.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 15th May 1858, and was referred to a Select Committee, who are to report thereon after the 19th July next:—

A Bill to Amend Regulation X. 1829 of the Bengal Code.

Whereas, by the General Rule laid down at the end of Schedule A annexed to Regulation X. 1829 of the Bengal Code, it is declared "that if any Deed or Document specified in that Schedule shall not be contained in one piece or sheet of paper or other material, it shall suffice that one sheet shall bear the stamp. Provided that the seals or signatures of the parties and witnesses be thereupon"; and whereas the said Rule has been productive of inconvenience, and there is reason to believe that many Deeds, Instruments, and Documents have been executed since the said Regulation came into effect, in respect of which the said Rule has not been complied with, and it is expedient to repeal the said Rule, and to provide for the reception in evidence of such Deeds as aforesaid; It is declared and enacted as follows:—

Part of Schedule A Regulation X. 1829 repealed. I. The above Rule is hereby repealed.

II. Every Deed, Instrument, or Document, specified in the said Schedule, which is or shall be contained in more than one sheet or piece of paper or other material, shall be deemed to be sufficiently stamped if any one or more of such sheets or pieces of paper or other material shall bear the requisite stamp or stamps, notwithstanding the signatures or seals of the parties and witnesses shall not be upon such sheet or sheets. The above provision shall apply to Deeds, Instruments, and Documents, executed before this Act, as well as to Deeds, Instruments, and Documents which shall hereafter be executed.

No. 612 of 1858.—The Right Honorable the Governor in Council having had under his consideration the state of the 21st and 27th Regiments of Native Infantry, which were disbanded in the course of last year, for mutinous and disloyal conduct, for which many of their men have suffered condign punishment, has been pleased to direct that the following measures be carried out with respect to these two Regiments:—

1st.—The Native Commissioned Officers who were present with their Regiments, at the time when it became necessary to disarm them, are to be summarily discharged, with the exception only of such Native Officers as may have given proofs of their fidelity, and who may be recommended by his Excellency the Commander in Chief for the favourable consideration of Government.

2nd.—The older Non-Commissioned Officers are to be discharged, and the younger ones reduced to the ranks.

3rd.—All Sepoys suspected of having influenced the others for evil are to be discharged.

4th.—Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, and Privates, discharged under these Orders, are to be required to live in certain localities, which will be assigned for their residence, where they will be under the eye of the Police, or, if allowed to proceed to their homes, the heads of their respective Villages will be required to keep them under strict surveillance.

5th.—Native Commissioned and Non-Commissioned Officers will be appointed from other Regiments to take the place of those discharged under this Order. A large share of the promotion thus given is to be reserved for the men of those Native Regiments of the Bombay Army who have been fighting against Rebels and Mutineers in Central India and Rajpootana, and the remainder is to be bestowed upon the Regiments which were in Persia.

6th.—The numbers borne by the 21st and 27th Regiments Native Infantry are to be struck out of the Army List, and the Regiments, when reconstituted, are to bear the Numbers 30 and 31, and to take the left of all the Regiments of the Line.

As soon as the above measures have been carried into effect, the Regiments are to be removed from their present Stations, and their Arms are to be restored to them.

The Right Honorable the Governor in Council does not deem it necessary to dwell upon the enormity of the crime of which these Regiments have been guilty. With few exceptions, the Bombay Army has behaved with loyalty and fidelity at a time when Treason and Rebellion were rife, and when the loyal and well-disposed were alarmed and disheartened. It is not necessary for him, therefore, to point out to the Officers and Men of the Army generally the severe examples which have been made in both these Regiments, the disgrace they have brought upon their Colours, the discredit they have reflected upon the whole Army to which they belong. But he would appeal to the men of these Regiments who are still to be retained in the service of Government. He would point out to them the certain consequences of listening to the lying tales of the emissaries of Treason and Sedition, and of forgetting the trustful obedience which they owe to their Officers and to their Government.

He would earnestly impress upon them that this obedience is the first duty of a Soldier, and that the greatest Military crime is Mutiny.

The Right Honorable the Governor in Council trusts that the 30th and 31st Regiments will, by their future conduct, show their determination to render themselves worthy of the leniency with which they have been treated, and to wipe out the stain which the crimes of the 21st and 27th have left upon the character of the Bombay Army, so that the recollection of their past misdeeds may hereafter be as effectually effaced from the minds of men as their former Numbers will be erased from the Roll of the Army.

If His Excellency decide that the circumstances attending the loss, justify the grant of compensation, the documents connected with the case will be sent direct from the Adjutant General's Office to the Military Auditor General, or to the Auditor of Commissariat Accounts, as the case may be, who will pass the claim at the rate and to the extent authorised by Rule, or will refer to Government for instructions on any doubtful point.

Unauthorised claims which may deserve special consideration will, as heretofore, be submitted to Government, through His Excellency the Commander in Chief.

"No. 109, the 30th April 1858.—It is the melancholy duty of the Right Honorable the Governor General to announce the death of that most distinguished Officer, Captain Sir William Peel, K.C.B., late in Command of Her Majesty's Ship "Shannon," and of the Naval Brigade in the North-Western Provinces.

Sir William Peel died at Cawnpore on the 27th instant, of Small-pox. He had been wounded at the commencement of the last advance upon Lucknow, but had nearly recovered from the wound, and was on his way to Calcutta when struck by the disease which has brought his honorable career to an early close.

Sir William Peel's services in the field during the last seven months are well known in India and in England. But it is not so well known how great the value of his presence and example has been wherever, during this eventful period, his duty has led him.

The loss of his daring but thoughtful courage, joined with eminent abilities, is a very heavy one to his Country; but it is not more to be deplored than the loss of that influence which his earnest character, admirable temper, and gentle kindly bearing exercised over all within his reach; an influence, which was exerted unceasingly for the public good, and of which the Governor General believes that it may with truth be said, that there is not a man of any rank or profession, who, having been associated with Sir William Peel in these times of anxiety and danger, has not felt and acknowledged it."

NOTIFICATION.

The Right Honorable the Governor in Council feels the deepest regret in announcing the death, on the night of the 29th May, of C. J. MANSON, Esquire, Acting Political Agent in the Southern Muratha Country.

2. A report having reached Mr. Manson, when at Koorundwar, that an Outbreak had occurred at Gudduck, in the Dharwar Collectorate, in which Bheem Rao, of Moondurgee, and the Dessayee of Hembgee were actively engaged, and with which the Chief of Nurgoond was suspected of being connected, Mr. Manson at once proceeded towards Nurgoond, in the hope of restraining the Chief from the commission of any act of Rebellion, and of inducing him to continue loyal to the British Government.

3. Mr. Manson arrived at Ramdroog, about twenty-five miles from Nurgoond, on the evening of the 28th of May, attended by a single horseman, having far outridden the rest of his escort. He was assured by the Chief of Ramdroog that the Chief of Nurgoond had collected troops, and was in open Rebellion against the Government. He was strongly urged not to proceed to Nurgoond; but with that noble devotion to duty, of which the recent history of India has presented so many instances, he determined to make a final effort, by his personal influence, to save the Chief from the ruin impending over him.

4. He left Ramdroog on the evening of the 29th May, attended by sixteen Sowars of the Southern Muratha Irregular Horse, his escort having come up in the course of the day. He stopped at the village of Soorbund, about fifteen miles from Nurgoond, and slept in a palanquin, surrounded by the Sowars. Here he was attacked, in the middle of the night, by the Chief of Nurgoond, at the head of eight hundred men. After a desperate resistance, Mr. Manson and all the Sowars were killed, with the exception of one, who escaped severely wounded.

5. Such are the few facts which have been conveyed to Government by the Electric

Telegraph. They show that a gallant and accomplished gentleman, who had proved himself a most valuable servant of the State, has been basely murdered.

6. His Lordship in Council feels that this bloody deed is too recent for comment, but he is proud to say that, though recent, the avenging hand of justice is on the murderers.

7. Immediately on the receipt of the news of the Outbreak, reinforcements were ordered to proceed to the Southern Muratha Country, and instructions were issued for proclaiming the confiscation of the Nurgood State.

8. On the 1st of June, a Madras Column, under Major Hughes, carried the Fort of Copal by assault, and among the slain were Bheem Rao of Moondurjee, and the Dessayec of Hembgee. On the same day, Colonel Malcolm, with a light detachment, stormed the Petta of Nurgood, and obtained entire possession of the Town. The murderers, though protected by one of the greatest strongholds in the Southern Muratha Country, then lost heart, and evacuated the Fort, which was occupied by Colonel Malcolm on the 2nd of June. Arrangements were then made for the active pursuit of the Chief; and the Right Honorable the Governor in Council is able to announce that the Superintendent of Police, Mr. Souter, after a long chase, succeeded in capturing the Chief and six of his principal adherents, on the evening of June the 3rd.

9. The Right Honorable the Governor in Council has, up to the present time, received no details of the operations which have thus, in so short a space, been crowned by success so ample; but he has thought it his duty at once to place before the public facts which show how promptly and vigorously the Outbreak has been met, and which must prove to the disaffected in the Southern Muratha Country how perilous is the game of Rebellion.

10. The body of Mr. Manson has been recovered, and has been buried at Kulludghee. The Right Honorable the Governor in Council will regard it as a sacred duty to make a provision for the families of the brave men who lost their lives in defending one whose untimely fate is now so deeply deplored.
