PHOTOGRAPHY CLASS.

Mr. W. H. STANLEY CRAWFORD will commence his Second Course of Instruction in Photography on Saturday the 2nd February, at 7 A. M.

- 2. From that date to the 30th April, the Class will meet from 7 to 9 every Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday morning.
- 3. Instruction will be given in the Daguerreotype, Wax-paper, Talbotype, and Albumenizedglass processes.
- 4. Each pupil will pay in advance the sum of Rupees ten (10), and will provide chemicals and paper for his own practice.
- The regulations under which pupils will be allowed the use of instruments and apparatus may be learnt from the Instructor.
- 6. At the end of the Course it is proposed to award three prizes of the value of Rupees Fifty (50), Thirty (30), and Twenty (20) respectively, subject to conditions which will hereafter be made known to the Class.

IV. Sculptures, allegorical, representative, or ornamental, and Architectural Models illustrative of the state of art in India (aucient and modern), and also collections of Coins and Antiquities.

The Central Museum is meant to be the parent or nurse of such Presidency, District, or other Museums as may desire assistance from it; and incurs no risk, therefore, of being loaded with duplicates, as all spare specimens will be set aside, named, and classed for distribution or exchange. While thus disposing of its own duplicates, any of those in the possession of other establishments will be thankfully accepted.

The specimens under both heads will, so far as circumstances permit, be classed both systematically and topographically: for example, under the head "Iron Ores," specimens of all the varieties of ores that can be obtained will be arranged in scientific order: while under the Tophographical Division (e. g. Guzerat) the ores of iron, in their unsmelted forms, and in all their stages of preparation for use, will be classed with the other mineral productions of that province.

Animal Productions.—Collections in this branch are equally contemplated; such as stuffed specimens of animals and birds, of their preserved skins; reptiles and insects; fresh-water and marine shells. Also specimens of heads, whether with the skin or in skeleton form, such as those of the buffalo, bison, deer, elk, tiger, lion, boar, or other large animals; horns, bones, tusks, or teeth, will be thankfully accepted. Under the head "Animal Substances," for the Economic Department, are wool, hair, feathers, and the like in the the natural or prepared state, with silk, and all descriptions of insect filaments.

Vegetable Productions.—A collection of all the varieties of wood that can be procured is deemed desirable. Cuts of trees, two feet in length, taken from the bole, two or three feet above the roots, and with the bark left on, best exhibit the structure and characteristics of the timber. Portions of the roots are desirable where these are used in carved work or carpentry, and, if possible, specimens of work made from them, together with specimens of branches that have become inosculated or have grown into each other; with all sorts of monstrosities or extraordinary exceptions, or portions that have been rendered spiral by creepers, or are otherwise distorted. Specimens of flowers, shoots, leaves, and fruit, or drawings of the tree, with a view to its identification, are important, and information concerning the distribution and extent of wood, and that of the supply, the period of growth and maturity, and the soil best adapted to it.

Barks used for tanning, dyeing, medicinal or other purposes; gums, gum resins, balsams, and resinous substances, are of interest, and the information regarding these should give in detail the uses they are applied to, the method of procuring or extracting them, the produce of a given number of trees, specifying the trees they are derived from, as above.

Oils.—Their Commercial and Domestic value, the uses of their products after extraction, the facilities of separation, modes of preparation and purification, the capabilities of the district, the per-centage of produce, and the amount exported.

Vegetable Die Stuffs of all descriptions; with the processes of dyeing and colour obtained, their mordants, and samples of materials dyed with them, illustrative of their properties; the same with leather, and tanning substances.

Grains.—The amount and price of produce, the peculiarity in preference over others, the use of refuse (as in fodder or fuel), the method of storing, the deterioration it is subject to, the division of crop to which it belongs.

Medicinal Substances.—Plants, if possible, to be dried and collected as an herbarium, or drawings given. The doses in which they are administered, and the diseases to which they are applied; the method of preparation or combination, and the Native and scientific names.

Fibres.—The mode of cleansing and preparing in all states, fresh or dry; with samples; their manufactured products in different stages, coarse and fine; the manufacture of thread, cord, rope, paper, or matting, &c. in consecutive series.

MINERAL PRODUCTIONS.—The mineral portion of the one or the other division of the Collection will consist of every variety of solid substance, or mineral oils or waters, constituting the material of the crust of the earth.

Rock Specimens of all varieties, particularly those used as building stones; metallic ores, coal; shale; simple minerals; fossils or organic remains, with specimens of the rock in which they are found. All varieties of marble, lime, or chunam stones; gypsum, or the raw material of stucco; alum-slate, and sulphur. All varieties of salts found in, or produced from the soil; ochreous or coloured earths, used as pigments; clays used for bricks, and pottery purposes; with specimens of river sand, stating the locality of the deposit; and all the most noted varieties of cultivable soil.

Ores.—The geological formations above and below them; the ores in various stages of preparation, and the uses of each; a description of all operations connected with them, such as digging, washing, refining, &c., the flux and fuel used, with samples; the amount of produce, net and gross; also models and drawings of furnaces, and of tools.

Soils.—Their depth, height above water, fertility, susceptibility of irrigation, the annual fall of rain in the district, and manure used, also the nature or specimens of the sub-soil.

It is superfluous to offer any lengthened description of the best method of packing up ordinary varieties of material, as these are generally understood.

Specimens of every kind should, however, be kept distinct, and be carefully papered. The labels should never be attached to wrappers, but to the specimen itself. Native as well as English names should invariably be given; and it should be stated whether the article is indigenous or imported; the quantity grown or obtainable; the nature of the market for it, and, if possible, the products of the different parts in a consecutive series, with examples and descriptions of the conversion.

Rock and mineral specimens should be all as fresh as possible: the former are best chipped in pieces

three inches square, and an inch thick—one side prepared, if possible. A rough mass, capable of being brought within suitable dimensions, will equally serve.

Amongst the peculiar specimens to be looked for from each individual district are the following, as

distinguished from those common to them all :-

In the Konhun.—The peculiar woods, gums, and dye stuffs found in the defiles or on the spurs of the Ghauts; the potstone from which the potstoneware of Goa, Viziadroog, and the adjoining districts, is made, together with good specimens of the ware itself; the manganese ore near Phoonda Ghaut; and other currous minerals and rocks in that neighbourhood.

The Konkun is also rich in the starch series, as arrowroot, &c. and in the wood oils; and fibrous plants

grow in perfection, such as palms, pine apples, Indian hemp.

2. The Ghauts.—Specimens of iron ore, and of the iron turned out from the Native furnaces, in all

its stages of progress; the coarse woollen carpets, &c. &c.

- 3. The Deccan affords specimens of silk (raw, and in all its stages of manufacture), pepper, sugar, oil seeds and nuts, coarse cotton rugs, and dyed carpets, chiefly abundant around Poona; as also clay figures, silver ornaments, shot-silk, silk lace, thread, oil and sugar mills, hemp, and fibres. In minerals, agates, iaspers, limestone, and all the family of reality and the famil In minerals, agates, jaspers, limestone, and all the family of zeolites and their kindred minerals, for which Poona is celebrated; large specimens of the sheet and branched kunkur, containing fresh-water shells, from the steep banks of the rivers, especially abundant near the Jamsetjee Bund; the selenite or gypsum occasionally found in small pieces in the black soil; and the salt and alkaline earths generally prevailing in the neighbourhood.
- Belgaum, and S. M. Country.—The Belgaum Collectorate contains a great diversity of granites, schists, and varieties of sandstone, &c., not frequent in other parts of the Presidency. Some of the latter of these have occasionally been employed as roofing-slates. The manganese and copper ore in thin coatings, with many curious varieties of iron ore, found in this quarter, would be peculiarly acceptable. It has likewise supplied varieties of excellent cotton, stick lac, personal apparel, artificial fruit, and models of agricultural implements.
- 5. Scinde.—Kurrachee is famous for its shark fishery: jaws, snouts, bones, and fins, or other portions of these creatures capable of preservation, would be desirable, and specimens of fish oil of different kinds. It has likewise dyes, gums, grains, animal fibres (wool and hair), and is famous for the manufacture of arms. Hyderabad has long been celebrated for its rugs, carpets, and embroidery-work, as well as for its turned and lacquered-ware, specimens of all of which would be acceptable. Scinde is one of the few places in India where the use of gypsum as stucco, and the glazing of pottery-ware, have been extensively practised, and specimens of the open stucco-work in mosque and other windows, and of glazed-ware (ancient and modern), in all its forms, would be deemed peculiarly desirable. The rocks and minerals of Scinde are mostly similar to those of Cutch, but it is desirable, for the Topographical Department, to have the productions of every District, even though identical with those adjoining. Specimens of the conglomerate and oyster beds of Munora might be sent, with the beautiful coloured clays alternating with them; and specimens of the alluvium of the Delta, taken from the steep banks of the river some feet from the surface, near Sukkur, Hyderabad, and towards the sea, in such masses as to exhibit the flakes or stratification, indicating the successive depositions of individual inundations.
- 6. Central India, and the neighbouring provinces on the Nerbudda and Rajpootana, are capable of affording great varieties of iron and coal, of opium, rich cereals (especially wheat), also tobacco, lac, and madder of excellent quality, poppy and grass oil, in abundance. In manufactures, gold and silver cloth and kinkob from Boorhanpoor, and silver and enamelled gold-work from Purtaubghur, and superior pottery, statuary, and arms from Rajpootana.
- 7. Guzerat, including Cutch, is rich in agates and ornamental stones; in cotton, cereals, indigo, and dyes; soda, salt, and alum products. The manufacturing and agricultural implements it supplies are very varied; it affords also manufactures of printed cottons; silk and gold fabric, paper, pottery, silver filigree-work. In the arts, enamelling, models of temples, buildings, and lapidary-work.
- 8. The Foreign Department will include the products of Arabia, Africa, Egypt, China, and Australia, and be kept distinct from those peculiar to India.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

The following provisional Rules for Grants-in-Aid of Education in the Bombay Presidency are published for general information, with the sanction of the Government of India:-

This system of Government Grants-in-Aid is founded on an entire abstinence from interference with the religious doctrines inculcated in the schools to be aided. The Officers who are to visit and inspect schools on behalf of Government have accordingly been instructed not to notice religious teaching either

All parties desirous of participating in these Grants, and prepared to accept them on the conditions

indicated, should communicate with the nearest Visitor of Schools or Educational Inspector.

- 1. The system of Grants-in-Aid, which is stated to have been successfully carried out in England, is to be adopted in this Presidency.
- 2. This system is based upon an entire abstinence from interference with the religious instruction conveyed in the school assisted.
- 3. Aid will be given, as far as possible, to all schools in which a good secular education is imparted, or in which the secular knowledge conveyed is such as to entitle the school to consideration in the distribution of the sums applied to Grants-in-Aid; provided always-
 - 1st.—That the schools to be assisted are under the local management of private patrons, voluntary subscribers, or trustees of endowments, who will undertake the general superintendence and guarantee the continuance of the school for a given time, and,
 - 2nd .- That the managers consent to Government inspection, and agree to the conditions by which the Grants are to be regulated.
- Grants-in-Aid will generally be accorded only to schools in which some fee, however small, is paid by the pupils; except Normal Schools.
- 5. Grants will be appropriated to specific objects, as, for instance, augmenting the salaries of Head Masters and Masters; supplying Junior Teachers; founding, wholly or in part, Scholarships. They will not be given as mere contributions in aid of general expenses.
- 6. Aid may be given to all schools and institutions in which the required conditions are fulfilled, whether they be Anglo-Vernacular or Vernacular, and whether for males or females.
 - Grants will be made only upon written applications specifying clearly—
 - The Funds appropriated from private or local sources towards the maintenance of the school.
 - 2. The exact charges upon those Funds.
 - 3. The persons responsible for the management of the school, and how long they will guarantee its continuance.
 - 4. The average number, ages, and duration of attendance of pupils.
 - The course of secular instruction imparted, including the books used in several classes.
- 8. A Government Grant will in no case be paid until the proportion of local and private contributions be duly brought forward.
- 9. The Government Grant to any school will not exceed in amount the sum expended on it by private persons, or by associations, and will be conditional on increased activity on the part of the inhabitants or supporters of the school, who will certify in their applications that the sum to be annually expended on the school from private and local funds is not less than that so expended during each of the last three years.
 - 10. The management of aided schools will be vested solely in the local Committees or Trustees.
- In the first instance, aid will not generally be given to any school at which the average number of pupils shall be less than 25, or in which the pupils daily attending shall ordinary fall below the number on the Register by more than 14 per cent.
- 12. Aid, in the shape of scholarships, will not be given to any Village or Primary Vernacular Schools unless the Inspector shall be satisfied that the pupils are therein thoroughly trained and grounded on a good system. The exact nature and extent of attainments to be required in such schools, as the condition of a Grant, will hereafter be defined.
- 13. It will be especially noticed, in regard to each school recommended for a Grant-in-Aid, whether or not the native mode of keeping accounts and of computing interest be thoroughly taught there.
- 14. No scholarship connected with any Village or Primary Vernacular School will be of a higher value than Rupees 3 per mensem, or will be obtainable until the candidate shall have passed a satisfactory examination in the branches taught in the school, or will be held by any but a pupil attending some Government or inspected superior Vernacular School, and not even by such an one for a period exceeding two years. It will be liable to forfeiture at any time from misconduct or unsatisfactory progress.
- 15. There will not be more than one scholarship annually available in any Village or Primary Vernacalar School, unless the attainments and the number of pupils be both remarkably great.
- 16. Aid in the shape of augmented salary to masters will not ordinarily be granted to any Village or Primary Vernacular School, unless the Inspector be satisfied that the state of the local or private funds

- 17. In cases of extraordinary merit on the part of a teacher, the limit of pay prescribed in the above rule may sometimes be exceeded. A deserving schoolmaster will also be encouraged to look for reward in the way of promotion in the Department of Education, or in some other branch of the Public Service.
- 18. The continuance of all Grants-in-Aid of the pay of Village and Primary Vernacular Schoolmasters will depend on the continued good reports of the Inspectors.

- 28. Aid in the shape of augmented salary to Masters will not be granted to any Zilla School unless the Inspector shall be satisfied, and shall report, that the Master is possessed of undoubted merit and qualifications
- 29. Aid in the shape of augmented salary to Assistant Masters will not at first be granted in the proportion of more than one Assistant to 75 pupils.

30. The continuance of Grants in Aid of the pay of Zilla or other English School Masters will de-

pend on the continued good reports of the Inspectors. 31. Masters in aided Schools, whose salaries are paid wholly or in part by Government, will be subordinate to the local managers alone, and will not in any way be regarded as Government Servants.

The local managers will take care that their Masters are of good moral character.

32. For private Schools, Girls' Schools, Industrial Schools, and the higher kinds of educational institutions in the larger towns, no definite scales can be fixed. Special reports and recommendations will be made in each case by the Inspector, who will be guided as far as possible by the analogy of the preceding rules.

- 33. In special cases grants may be made, with the sanction of the Director, in aid of school buildings and also grants of school and other books, and specimens for museums, &c. But these will not generally be accorded according to the second of the property of the second of the property of the second of the property of the second of the Director, in aid of school buildings and also grants of school and other books, and specimens for museums, &c. But these will not generally be accorded except in cases wherein special efforts have been made by the community or local society
- 34. When a grant towards school buildings is desired, the local managers will undertake in the outset to observe the Government rules relative to sites, dimensions, and arrangements of school houses, and to make a regular assignment of the buildings for school purposes.
- 35. When a grant for the purchase of school furniture, or a grant of school books, maps, or apparatus is desired, the local managers will undertake to be responsible for the due preservation of the same, and for their application to the purposes for which they are to be supplied.
- 36. No grant for the payment of pupil teachers will be made to any school unless it shall be certified that the master is fully competent to train such pupil teachers, and that the pupils to be paid have been present (after examination) at least one year in his school.
- 37. The inspection of aided schools is regarded as a means of co-operation between Government and the local managers, who will thus have an opportunity of ascertaining what improvements in the apparatus and internal arrangement of schools, in school management and discipline, and in the method of teaching, have been sanctioned by the most recent experience.
- 38. The above rules indicate generally the limits within which Government grants will be made. The award of any particular grant, however, and the extent of it, will ultimately depend on the comparative merits of each school applying for aid, with reference to the total sum at the disposal of Government for distribution in that manner.

3rd .- Officers who have not availed themselves of the full period of leave granted to them, are authorised to notify the circumstance with full particulars to the Adjutant General's Office at the Presidency by letter (postage paid), within one month from the expiration of the leave, and such correction as is proper will then be made in the Furlough Register; failing such Notification, the entire period of leave published in General Orders will be debited against their service for pension.

- In July, 1856, an examination will take place of candidates for appointments to the Civil Service of the East India Company. Notice will be hereafter given of the days and place of examination.
- 2. Any natural-born subject of Her Majesty, who shall be desirous of entering the Civil Service of the East India Company, will be entitled to be examined at such examination, provided he shall, before the 1st of May 1856, have transmitted to the India Board, Cannon Row, Westminster:—
- (a) A certificate of his birth, showing that his age, on the 1st of May, 1856, will be above eighteen
- years and under twenty-three years. (b) A certificate, signed by a physician or surgeon, of his having no disease, constitutional affection, or bodily infirmity, unfitting him for the Civil Service of the East India Company.
- (c) A certificate of good moral character, signed by the head of the school or college at which he has last received his education; or, if he has not received education at any school or college since the year 1853, then such proof of good moral character as may be satisfactory to the Board of Commissioners for the affairs of India.
- (d) A statement of those of the branches of knowledge, hereinafter enumerated, in which he desires to be examined.

- 4. The merit of the persons examined will be estimated by marks according to the ordinary system in use at several of the Universities, and the number set opposite to each branch in the preceding paragraph denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it.
- 5. No candidate will be allowed any marks in respect of any subject of examination, unless he shall obtain, in respect of that subject, one-sixth of the number of marks set against that particular subject.
- 6. The examination will be conducted by means of printed questions and written answers, and by viva voce examination.
- 7. After the examination shall have been completed, the marks obtained by each candidate, in respect of each of the subjects in which he shall have been examined, shall be added up, and the names of the twenty candidates who shall have obtained a greater aggregate number of marks than any of the remaining candidates shall be set forth in order of merit; and such twenty candidates shall be deemed to be selected candidates for the Civil Service of the East India Company. I. Letters arriving at the Presidency towns by Mail Steamers will be immediately sorted for delivery, without any reference to instructions which may have been received regarding change of address. Such changes will be left to be discovered by the Delivery Officers, and be corrected in the Forward and

II. A separate instruction will be required for every change of address, and no instruction will be attended to for more than three months after its receipt.

III. Under Section XXIII. of Act XVII. of 1854, Forward Postage will be charged, in addition to all other Postage due or paid thereon, upon every letter without exception which may be re-directed in any Post Office. For example, if a letter posted in Calcutta, and addressed to Hooghly, is, under instructions which may have been received from the addressee, re-directed in the Calcutta Post Office, and sent to Barrackpore, Forward Postage will be charged in addition to the Postage which would have been due had the letter been despatched to Hooghly according to its original address. IV. The practice of giving instructions to the Officers of the Post Office to intercept and re-direct letters not only imposes much labour upon them, but, in large Offices, seriously retards the delivery and despatch of the Mails.
