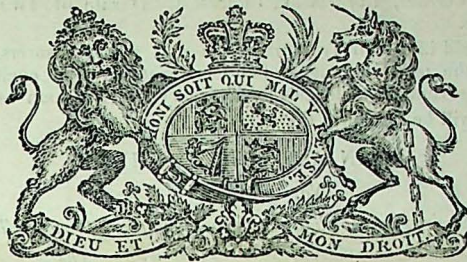

The 30th April 1859.

Referring to paragraph 16 of the Notification of this Department, No. 14, dated the 21st February last, it is hereby notified, that from and after the 1st of May next, the Sub-Treasurers at Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay, the several Residents at Native Courts, the several Collectors of Land Revenue

under the several Presidencies, and the Officers in charge of District Treasuries in the Territories immediately subordinate to the Government of India, will be authorised to receive money for the purchase of Treasury Bills, payable to Order, and bearing Interest at the rate of Two-and-a-half Pies a day, for every One Hundred Rupees.

2. On money being paid into their Treasuries, the said Sub-Treasurers and Officers aforesaid will issue Loan Certificates in the usual manner, which Certificates will be exchanged at the Offices of the Accountants General at the several Presidencies for Treasury Bills, as soon as possible.

TREASURY BILL, BENGAL (MADRAS OR BOMBAY, AS THE CASE MAY BE.)

The Governor General of India in Council does hereby acknowledge to have received from *on this day of 18 the sum of Company's Rupees,* as a Loan to the Secretary of State in Council of India, for which Interest shall be paid to the said *or his Executors or Administrators, or to his or their Order, Half-yearly, at the rate of Two-and-a-half Pies per day for every One Hundred Rupees.*

The said sum shall be liable to be paid off, at the option of the Governor General of India in Council, at any time after the expiration of one year from the date of this Bill, upon notice being given in the Calcutta Gazette at least Three Calendar months before the time fixed for the proposed payment, after which time all further Interest will cease. It shall be at the option of the lawful holder of this Note to obtain payment thereof three months after sight, by presenting the same at the Office of the Accountant General in Calcutta (Madras or Bombay, as the case may be,) and obtaining a Memorandum in writing on the Note, signed by the Accountant General, or some other Officer duly authorised on that behalf, acknowledging the presentment and the date thereof, which acknowledgment shall be given on presentment. In case of presentment, as aforesaid, the Principal sum of Rupees *will be payable at the General Treasury in Calcutta (Madras or Bombay, as the case may be,) at any time after the expiration of three months from the date of such acknowledgment, together with Interest at the rate aforesaid up to the expiration of the period of three months, but all Interest shall cease from the expiration of that period.*

Loan Acknowledgments issued from the Treasuries in the Presidencies of Madras and Bombay will be exchanged for Treasury Bills at the Offices of the Accountants General of those Presidencies respectively; Loan Acknowledgments issued from Treasuries in Bengal, the North-Western Provinces, Nagpore, Oude, and the Punjab, will be exchanged for Treasury Bills at the Office of the Accountant General to the Government of India at Calcutta; Loan Acknowledgments issued by Residents at Native Courts, and Officers in charge of District Treasuries in Territories other than the above, immediately subordinate to the Government of India, will be exchanged for Treasury Bills at the Office of the Accountant General of the nearest Presidency.

The Bills will be issued in sums of Rupees 200, Rupees 500, Rupees 1,000, Rupees 5,000, and Rupees 10,000.

The Bills issued by the Accountant General to the Government of India will be signed by the Secretary to the Government of India in the Financial Department. Those issued by the Accountants General at Bombay and Madras, by the Chief Secretaries to those Governments respectively.

REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

The following ORDER, of Her Majesty the QUEEN in Council, is published for general information :—

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 3rd day of March 1859.

PRESENT:

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Her Majesty was pleased, by an Order in Council, passed on the Twenty-fourth day of February, One thousand Eight hundred and Forty-three, in pursuance of the powers vested in Her Majesty by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the Third and Fourth years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to Regulate the Trade to China and India," to prohibit Her Majesty's Subjects from resorting, for the purposes of trade and commerce, to any other Ports in the dominions of the Emperor of China than those of Canton, Amoy, Foo-chow-foo, Ningpo, and Shanghai, or than might be in the occupation of Her Majesty's Forces; and that any of Her Majesty's Subjects committing a breach or violation of the said direction should, upon conviction thereof as therein mentioned, be liable to the penalty therein mentioned :

And whereas Her Majesty was also pleased, by another Order in Council, passed on the Thirteenth day of June, One thousand Eight hundred and Fifty-three (amongst other things), to order and declare that all Trade whatsoever of Her Majesty's Subjects in, to, or from any part of the Coast of China to the Northward of the Thirty-second degree of North Latitude should be unlawful, and that every party engaged in such trade as principal, agent, ship-owner, ship-master, or supercargo, should be liable to be apprehended, conveyed in custody, tried, and punished as therein mentioned; and further, that it should be lawful for any of the Commanders of Her Majesty's Ships, or any other officer duly authorised in that behalf, to seize any ship or vessel under the British Flag which might reasonably be suspected of having been engaged, or being engaged, in trade declared to be unlawful as aforesaid, and to bring such ship or vessel, and the master, officer, supercargo, and crew thereof, to the Colony of Hongkong, or to any other place where the Chief Superintendent of British Trade in China might, for the time being, be resident, or direct the same to be brought; and there to detain such ship or vessel, and the masters, officers, supercargo, and crew thereof, until the said Chief Superintendent should have tried and determined the charges which might be brought against them, or any of them, of having been engaged in such unlawful trade as aforesaid :

And whereas, by a Treaty agreed upon and concluded between Her Majesty and the Emperor of China, and signed in the English and Chinese languages, at Tien-tsin, on the Twenty-sixth day of June, One thousand Eight hundred and Fifty-eight, it is amongst other things stipulated and agreed, that British Subjects may travel for their pleasure, or for purposes of trade, to all parts of the interior of China, under passports which will be issued by their Consuls, and countersigned by the local authorities, and that British merchant-ships shall have authority to trade upon the Great River (Yang-tze), but that the Upper and Lower Valley of the said river being disturbed by out-laws, no Port shall be, for the present, open to trade, with the exception of Chin-kiang, which shall be opened in a year from the date of the signing of the said Treaty, and that, so soon as peace shall have been restored, British Subjects shall also be admitted to trade at such Ports as far as Han-kow, not exceeding three in number, as the British Minister, after consultation with the Chinese Secretary of State, may determine shall be Ports of Entry and Discharge. And in and by the said Treaty it is further stipulated and agreed that, in addition to the cities and towns of Canton, Amoy, Fuchow (or Foo-chow-foo), Ningpo, and Shanghai, opened by the Treaty of Nankin, British Subjects may frequent the cities and ports of New-Chwang, Tang-Chow, Tai-Wau (Formosa), Chau-Chow (Swatow), and Kiung-Chow (Hainau); that they shall be permitted to carry on trade with whomsoever they please, and to proceed to and fro at pleasure with their vessels and merchandise; and

that they shall enjoy the same privileges, advantages, and immunities, at the said towns and ports, as they enjoy at the ports already opened to trade, including the right of residence, of buying or renting houses, of leasing land therein, and of building churches, hospitals, and cemeteries :

And whereas it is in and by the said Treaty further stipulated and agreed, that the ratifications of the said Treaty under the hands of Her Majesty and of His Majesty the Emperor of China, respectively, shall be exchanged at Peking within a year from the day of the signature of the said Treaty :

And whereas by reason of the aforesaid stipulations of the said Treaty, it is necessary to revoke the prohibitions on the trade of Her Majesty's Subjects in China contained in the said Orders in Council of the Twenty-fourth day of February, One thousand Eight hundred and Forty-three, and the Thirteenth day of June, One thousand Eight hundred and Fifty-three, respectively :

I. Now, therefore, in pursuance of the said Act of the Third and Fourth years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, and in pursuance of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the Sixth and Seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the Better Government of Her Majesty's Subjects resorting to China," and in execution of the powers thereby or otherwise howsoever in Her Majesty in Council vested, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and doth hereby order, that the said several recited clauses and provisions of aid in the said Orders in Council of the Twenty-fourth day of February, One thousand Eight hundred and Forty-three, and the Thirteenth day of June, One thousand Eight hundred and Fifty-three, respectively, and all and every other clause and provision of and in any Order in Council or Ordinance whatsoever, whereby any prohibition, restriction, punishment, penalty, or forfeiture, hath been or is imposed upon the trade of Her Majesty's Subjects in China, or upon Her Majesty's Subjects in respect thereof, shall be and the same are hereby repealed.

II. And it is further ordered that this Order shall commence and take effect on and from the day of the exchange of the ratifications of the said Treaty of the Twenty-sixth day of June, One thousand Eight hundred and Fifty-eight.

And the Right Honorable the Earl of Malmesbury, and the Right Honorable Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton, Baronet, two of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

SIR,—The enclosed Notice contains information of a most daring act of Piracy or Barratry committed yesterday in Table Bay. It is of importance that the perpetrators should not escape with impunity.

I am therefore directed by His Excellency Sir G. Grey to forward to you copies (in duplicate) of the Notice, and to request that you will move the Right Honorable the Governor General of India to take steps to give publicity to the Notice, and to aid this Government in the recovery of the Vessel, and arrest of the Crew and any other persons concerned in her abstraction.

GOVERNMENT NOTICE.

Colonial Office, Cape of Good Hope, 20th January 1859.

PIRACY OR BARRATRY OF A MATE AND MARINERS.

It has been brought to the notice of the Governor of this Colony, that a daring act of Piracy or Barratry was committed on the evening of yesterday, the 19th instant, by the Mate and Crew of the Schooner *Prince Edward*, of Cape Town.

This Vessel was cleared out for a voyage from Table Bay to Hondeklip Bay and Angra Pequina ; and the Master, George Maple, who was on shore, was about to go on board, when the Vessel was observed to have got her anchor up, and to be sailing out of Table Bay. Though hailed at once, she took no notice, but crowded sail and went away.

There are no Ship's Papers on board,—all of them being in the possession of the Master and Part-Owner, George Maple. Should she produce any Papers, they must be false.

The following particulars will, it is hoped, enable the Authorities of any British or Foreign Port into which she may be carried, to identify and detain her and her Crew :—

- 1.—Burthen, 56 tons; deck, 1; masts, 2, schooner rig; stern, square; build, carved; galleries, nil; head, bust of *Prince Edward* with a Scotch cap, black, blue, and red, with gilt edge round cap.
2. New decks and topsides of teak, and newly coppered.
3. Name *Prince Edward* cut into the stern.
4. Words "60 Tons" cut into the couplings of the Hatchway.
5. Long masts; main-mast much chafed at the head with the working of the gaff.
6. Four of the chain-plate bolts, on the port side, broken.
7. Chronometer on board—name, C. Shepherd (London), No. 1512.

There were on board two male passengers proceeding to Namaqua Land as miners, viz. :—R. P. Webb and George Gould: the latter of these was formerly Seaman on board of one of H. M.'s Ships-of-War; and one female passenger, a young woman, named Margaret Lucas, who was proceeding to the same destination, for the purpose of entering service there.

It is reported that other females were seen on board at, or shortly before, the departure of this Vessel, and also that some Seamen belonging to one of H. M.'s Ships-of-War were on board. But the correctness of these reports has not yet been ascertained.

• The proper Crew of the Ship were as follows :—

William Hamilton, Mate, 43 years of age, born at Dorset, formerly Master Mariner, acquainted with South America, and engaged for three voyages in navigating the *Prince Edward*.

The *Prince Edward* had a General Cargo on board, and was fitted out for a voyage for Guano, with sacks, spades, and a riddle, all new, and provisions for upwards of three months.

It is hoped that all Principal Officers of Customs, and other Authorities in British and Foreign Ports will act upon this Notification, in case the *Prince Edward* should come within their reach, by seizing the Ship, and causing the Crew to be imprisoned, to answer for the crime they have committed; giving the earliest notice to the Government of this Colony, and to the Officer Commanding at the nearest British Naval Station.

It is conjectured that the Ship is destined for some Port in South America.

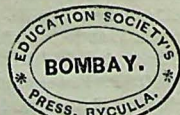

Hours of Posting.—**BANGHY PARCELS** will, from and after the 1st February 1859, be received every day, Sundays excepted, for despatch, from 10 A. M. till 5 P. M., and **LETTERS** and **NEWSPAPERS** every day till 6 P. M., after which hours respectively Late Letters, Newspapers, or Parcels will be received till 7 P. M., on payment of an extra postage (or fee) of 8 Annas on each cover. The full Postage, and likewise the Fee, must be Prepaid in Stamps. **REGISTERED LETTERS** can be posted as heretofore, but the Prepayment of Postage is no longer optional. The Postage, as well as the Registration Fee of 4 Annas, must be Prepaid in Stamps.

Malta and Gibraltar.—Letters for **MALTA** and **GIBRALTAR** may be prepaid or not, at the option of the sender.

Cairo and Constantinople.—Letters for these places cannot be Registered, and must be **PREPAID**.

Ionian Islands.—Letters for the **IONIAN ISLANDS** must be Prepaid to Alexandria, whence they will be forwarded *via* Trieste. Postage Eight Annas on a Letter not exceeding half an ounce.

Banghy Parcels for Scinde and the Punjaub.—Notice is hereby given, that all Banghy Parcels for Scinde and the Punjaub, intended to be sent by Sea *via* Kurrachee, must be so marked, that is "Per Steamer," or else they will be subject to be sent by land, and to be charged with Banghy rates of Postage.

Letters closed with gum, or the ordinary wafer, can be opened without any difficulty, or the slightest chance of detection.

Compulsory Prepayment of Letters to the United Kingdom.—From the 1st of September next the present system of *optional* Prepayment of Letters sent from India to the United Kingdom will be abolished, and from that date the Prepayment of Postage on Letters post-d in any part of India for the United Kingdom, whether marked *via* Southampton or *via* Marseilles, will be *compulsory*. The Rates of Postage are as under:—

All Letters posted on or after the 1st of September upon which at least a single rate of Postage—that is to say, 4 Annas on a Southampton Letter, and 6 Annas on a Marseilles Letter—has not been paid, will be returned to the senders. But in order to obviate the inconvenience which would be caused to the public by detaining and returning to the senders Letters which, *through inadvertence*, may be posted without the full amount of Postage being paid upon them, Letters insufficiently prepaid, but on which at least a single rate of Postage has been paid, will be forwarded, charged with the deficiency of Postage and a fine of Sixpence, or four Annas.

Prepayment must be made, as now, by Stamps.
