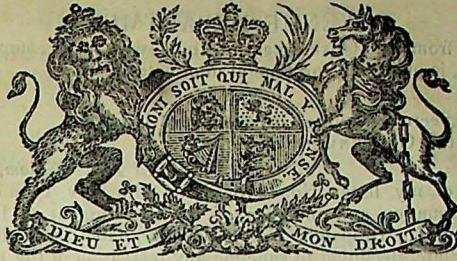

Notice.

The undersigned begs to notify to the BANKING CORPORATIONS, MERCANTILE FIRMS, AGENTS FOR INSURANCE COMPANIES, and others whom it may concern, that he will be prepared to receive Blank Cheque Books, Loan Agreements, Bills of Lading, Charter Parties, Insurance Policies, and other Forms requiring a STAMP to be impressed on them, on and after the 12th instant at the General Stamp Office between the hours of 10 A.M. and 2 P.M.

The forms should be sent to the Stamp Office in a sealed packet, with a list specifying the amount of duty to be impressed on each form, the total amount of each kind of duty, and the total amount of duty to be impressed.

It is particularly requested that the forms should not be mixed, but that forms on which different rates are to be impressed should be kept separate.

It should be clearly understood that it is not in the province of this Department to declare to what duties different papers are liable, the duty which is to be impressed should therefore be clearly denoted.

The person who brings the forms will be furnished with an open receipt. On this receipt will be detailed the amount of duty leviable, and on its reverse will be a blank receipt for the same. This should be taken with the amount to the Collector of Bombay, who will sign it, and, on the presentation of this document, thus filled up, at the Stamp Office, on a day which will be specified on it, the forms will be returned duly stamped.

The following Letter from the Government of India, with its accompanying Despatch from the Secretary of State for India, is published for general information.

"No. 1811.

From W. GREY, Esq., Secretary to the Government of India,
To the SECRETARY to the GOVERNMENT of BOMBAY.

Dated Fort William, the 31st August 1860.

SIR,—In continuation of my letter No. 1118, dated 26th May, I am directed to transmit, for the HOME DEPARTMENT (Revenue) information and guidance of the Government of Bombay, the accompanying copy of a Despatch, No. 36 of 1860, dated the 24th ultimo, from the Secretary of State, declining to sanction any relaxation of the rule which prohibits Officers in the public service from holding land for agricultural purposes in India.

2. I am to draw attention to the modification of the existing rules which is allowed in favour of grantees generally, expressed in the concluding part of the Despatch.

To His Excellency the Right Honorable the GOVERNOR GENERAL of INDIA in Council.

MY LORD,—1. In your letter of the 2nd April last (No. 6), you have referred for the consideration and orders of Her Majesty's Government "the general question of Government servants holding lands in India."

2. In the opinion of the Governor General, in which all the other Members of your Government concur, "it would be quite sufficient to rule, as regards Military Officers, that they might acquire and hold lands anywhere, unless, as in the case of Government grants, residence be made a condition of ownership; but that they should not be employed in any Civil situation in which their influence could, on any reasonable supposition, be brought to bear unduly on their own personal interests as landholders. His Excellency is further of opinion that Officers of the Civil Service might be permitted to hold lands anywhere out of their own Presidency."

3. I am very desirous that all due encouragement should be given to the settlement of Europeans as landed proprietors in India, but, as regards Officers in the Public Service, whether Civil or Military, I am of opinion that it is inexpedient that they should be permitted to engage in pursuits by which their time and attention would be diverted from their proper duties, to which their entire energies should be devoted. I am, therefore, unable to sanction the relaxation of the rules recommended by your Government; and I desire that it may be clearly understood that no officer, so long as he remains in the actual service of the Government, can be permitted to acquire and hold lands for agricultural purposes in any part of India. I think it, however, desirable to take this opportunity of withdrawing the prohibition in the Despatch of the 9th May 1838, against the grant of land to any European, unless he shall undertake to reside on it, and cultivate it himself within a specified period, and that it will be sufficient if, in all cases, the Governor in Council or the Lieutenant Governor should be satisfied, previously to making the grant, that the applicant has the means and intention of bringing into cultivation the land applied for, without insisting on the condition of actual residence.

REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

THE British Government have been subjected to extraordinary expenditure in quelling the late rebellion in India.

2. It is impossible to reduce all at once the cost of the additional Armies and Establishments employed in that service. It becomes necessary, therefore, to increase for a time the revenues of the State.

3. It must be manifest that the British Government have endeavoured to lessen the burdens on their people, and to secure their ease and prosperity. With this view, they have for many years had in progress a Survey and Assessment of the country, the object of which has been to place the land tax upon an easy and equitable footing; whilst they have done this for the agricultural classes, they have, at the same time, surrendered all transit duties and many customs and other taxes which obstructed commerce, and interfered with trade. All, therefore, understand that Government would not willingly impose fresh burdens upon their people, and that they now do so, as the only means by which the income of the State can, for the present, be made equal to the expenditure.

4. It cannot be too strongly impressed upon all, that the present measure is one of the many evils which arise to all classes alike by discord and rebellion, and that it is the interest of all to preserve peace and order.

5. Government, after anxious consideration, have resolved that, for a few years, a tax shall be paid by all classes of the people according to their means, whether European or Native, whether servants of the State or otherwise, upon their annual profits and income.

6. Those whose incomes or annual profits shall exceed Rupees 200, and not Rupees 500, are required to pay at the rate of 2 per cent.; and those whose incomes may exceed Rupees 500 per annum, at the rate of 4 per cent. It will thus be perceived that Government require each person to pay but a small portion of his annual receipts; and in fixing this mode of taxation, they have been anxious that, whilst all classes of the community should pay alike in just proportion to their incomes, all interference in the cultivation, trade, or occupation of every one should be avoided.

7. Government being desirous that the tax should be levied with the smallest possible annoyance and trouble to the payers, have instructed the Collectors accordingly. Each individual should state the amount of his income to the Assessors, or Communities will be allowed to assess themselves in aggregate sums, subject to the approval of the Collector, or they will be permitted to distribute the amount among themselves, by Punchayets appointed for the purpose.

8. Government desire to assure the people that, if they deal fairly by the State, its Officers will endeavour to give the least possible vexation to those taxed, and none need apprehend that their books will be examined, or their transactions enquired into, unless there be reason to believe they are not acting honestly by the Government. It is further provided that those who object to have their profits and income publicly known, may submit, confidentially, statements of them to the taxing Officers, who will be bound by oath not to reveal what may have been stated.

9. Moreover, whoever desires it, may at once settle a fixed annual sum to be paid by him for three or five years, and thus avoid all future trouble and enquiry, and provision is made that persons who may be dissatisfied with the amount assessed upon them (where Government have been compelled to fix the amount either through neglect of the parties to render statements of their income, or by reason of doubts of the correctness and honesty of their statements), shall have a fair hearing on appeal.

10. Having thus explained their intentions, and shortly set before the people the causes which have necessitated the imposition of new taxation, and the manner in which it has been resolved to levy the tax upon incomes and profits, Government confidently trust that there will be little difficulty and trouble in its realization, and that much of the misapprehension which may at present exist with regard to its bearing and effect will be at once removed.

रेविन्यु डिपार्टमेंट.

हिंदुस्थानांत मागे बंड झाले होते ते मोडण्या साठी इंग्रज सरकारास पराकाष्ठेचा खर्च झाला आहे.

२. सदरहू कामासाठी जाजती लश्कर व कारखाने ठेवावे लागले त्यांचा खर्च एकदम कमी करिता येत नाही यास्तव सरकारचा महसूल कांहीं वेळ पर्यंत वाढविण्याचें अवश्य झाले आहे.

३. आपले रयते वरील ओर्झी कमी करून त्यांस सुख व आवादानां होण्यासाठी इंग्रज सरकार आज पर्यंत तजवीज करीत आले आहेत हें सर्वांस जाहिर आहेच या उद्देशाने जमिनीचा सारा हलका व वाजबी व्हावा म्हणून सरकारानी या देशाची पुष्कळ वर्षां पासून पद्दमायप व प्रतबंधी चालविली आहे. शेतकीचें काम करणारे लोकांसाठी या प्रमाणे योजना करून व्यापारास हरकत करणाऱ्या व धंद्यास आड येणाऱ्या रहदारीच्या सर्व जकाती व कस्टमच्या पुष्कळ जकाती व इतर करही सरकारानी सोडले आहेत रयतेवर नवी ओर्झी सरकार संतोषाने घालणार नाही आणि आतां सरकार जें असें करतें त्याचें कारण हेंच कीं तेणे करून सरकारचे खर्चा इतकी अमदानी तुर्त उत्पन्न व्हावी आणि तसें केल्यावांचून दुसरा उपाय नाही असें सदरहू वरून सर्व लोक समजत असतीलच.

४. सांगत जो हा उपाय योजिला आहे तो वैमनस्यामुळे व वंडामुळे सर्व प्रतीचे लोकांस जीं अनेक संकटें प्राप्त होतात त्यांतीलच हें एक संकट आहे आणि समाधानी व स्वस्थता राखणें यांतच सर्वांचें कल्याण आहे या गोष्टी विषयीं कितीही बोध केला तरी थोडका आहे.

५. सर्व प्रतीचे लोक युरोपियन असोत किंवा एतदेशीय असोत व सरकारचे चाकर असोत किंवा इतर कसे असोत त्याणीं आपआपले सामर्थ्यां प्रमाणे आपले वार्षिक प्रार्थितून व उत्पन्नांतून थोडके वर्षे पर्यंत कर द्यावा असा ठराव सरकारांनें फार फार विचार करून केला आहे.

६. ज्याची वार्षिक प्रार्थी २०० रुपयांवर व ५०० रुपयांचे आंत असेल त्यास दरसाल दर शेकडा २ टक्याचे दराने द्यावें लागेल. आणि ज्याचें उत्पन्न दरसाल ५०० रुपयांवर असेल त्यास दरसाल दर शेकडा ४ टक्याचे दराने द्यावें लागेल. प्रत्येक मनुष्याने आपले वार्षिक प्रार्थी पैकीं थोडासा अंश द्यावा इतकेंच सरकारचें म्हणणे आहे आणि या प्रकारचा कर बसविण्यात सर्व प्रतीचे लोकांवर त्यांचे उत्पन्नाचे प्रमाणाने सारखा कर बसवून प्रत्येकाचे शेतकीस किंवा धंद्यास किंवा उद्योगास कांहीं अडचण न यावी असाही सरकारांनें यांत विचार ठेविला आहे हें सदरहू वरून सर्व लोकांचे लक्षांत येईल.

७. कर देणाऱ्यास अगदीं कमी त्रास व मेहनत पडून हा कर बसूल करावा अशी सरकारची इच्छा असल्यामुळे सरकारानी त्या प्रमाणे कलेक्टर साहेबास हुकूम लिहिले आहेत. प्रत्येक मनुष्यानें आपले उत्पन्नाचा रकम असेसरांस लिहून द्यावी किंवा कलेक्टर साहेबाचे मंजुरीने लोकांनी एकत्र मिळून ठोक रकमेची आपणावर आकारणी करावी किंवा मर्जी असल्यास ती रकम वाटण्या साठी नेमलेले पंचादतीचे मार्फतीने आपसांत हिसेरसीने ती रकम वाटून घ्यावी.

८. लोक सरकाराशीं इमानाने वागतील तर त्यांची दजा जितकी कमी करवेल तितकी कमी करण्या विषयीं सरकारचे अमलदार तजवीज ठेवितील असा लोकांनीं खात्री ठेवावी. सरकाराशीं इमानानें चालत नाहीं असें वाटण्याची सबब असल्या वांचून कोणाच्या वधा तपासतील किंवा कोणाचे वेव्हारां विषयीं चौकशी करतील अशी भीती कोणी मनुष्यांनी वाळगुं नये. आणखी असें ठराविलें आहे कीं आपली प्रार्थी व उत्पन्न उघडकीस येण्याची ज्यास हरकत असेल त्याणे आपले तपसील कर बसविणारे अमलदारांस विश्वासून द्यावे त्यांस लिहून दिव्हेला मजकुर त्याणी उघड करूं नये म्हणून त्यांस शपथ दिव्ही जाईल.

९. आणखी असें ठरविलें आहे कीं पुढें मेहनत पडूं नये व चौकशी होऊं नये म्हणून तीन वर्षे पर्यंत किंवा पांच वर्षे पर्यंत दर साल देण्याची उक्ती रकम एकंदम ठरवावी अशी कोणी मनुष्याची इच्छा असेल तर त्या प्रमाणे तो करण्यास मुखयार आहे आणि उत्पन्नाचे तपशील पाठविण्यास हयगय केल्यामुळे किंवा पत्रकाचे खरेपणाविषयीं किंवा प्रमाणिकपणा विषयीं संशय उत्पन्न झाल्यामुळे कराची रकम कोणी मनुष्यावर सरकारास ठरवावी लागली असेल त्या रकमेविषयीं तो मनुष्य ना राजी असेल तर त्याचे आपिलाची वाजबी रितीने चौकशी व्हावी या विषयींही ठराव केला आहे.

१०. सरकारानी आपले दरावाविषयीं सदरहू प्रमाणे समजून देऊन व नवीन कर बसविण्याचें अगत्य पडल्याचीं कारणें आणि उत्पन्ना वरील व प्रार्थी वरील कर कोणते रितीने घेण्याचा ठराव केला आहे ती रिती लोकांस थोडक्यांत जाहिर केली आहे ऐशियास कर बसूल करण्यास थोडकी अडचण व मेहनत पडेल आणि तो कर लोकांवर कसा पडेल व त्याचा परिणाम काय होईल याविषयीं हल्लीं पुष्कळ गैर समजून पडली आहे ती एकदम दूर होईल अशी सरकार उमेद ठेवित आहेत.

જાહેરનામું.

રેવિન્યુ ડિપાર્ટમેન્ટ.

હીંદુસ્થાનમાં જે આગલ ખંડ થયું હતું તે બાગવા માટે અંગરેજ સરકારને ધણોજ ખર્ચ થયેલો છે.

૨. રાદરહુ કાંમ સાથે વધારે લરાકર તથા કારખાંનાં રાખવાં પડ્યાં તેહનો ખર્ચ એકદમ કમી કરી રાકતા નથી માટે સરકારનું મહેસુલ કાંઈ વખત સુધી વધારવાની જરૂર પડી છે.

૩. આપણી રૈયતની ઉપરનો ખોળે ખોળે કરીને તેઓને મુખ તથા આમાદાની થવાસાથે અંગરેજ સરકાર આજ સુધી કોરોરા કરતા આપ્યા છે એ સરવેને જાહેર છે. આ ઇશિદાથી જમીનનો ધારો હલકો તથા વાજખી થવા સાથે સરકારે આ દેરામાં ધણું વરરા થયાં જમીનની માપણી તથા પ્રત્યાંધી ચલાવેલી છે. ખેતીવાડીનું કાંમ કરનારા લોકોને સાથે આ પ્રમાણે યોજનાં કરી, અને વેપારને હરકત કરનારી તથા રોજગાર ધંધાને અડચણ કરનારી રાહાદારીની સર્વ જકાતો તથા કરસમની ધણી જકાતો તથા ખીજા કર રાકારે માફ કીધાં છે. રૈયતની ઉપર નવો ખોળે રાકાર ખુરીથી નાખ્યો નહીં અને હમણાં રાકાર એહું જે ફરે છે તેનું કારણ એજ છે તેણે કરીને સરકારના ખર્ચ જેટલી આંમદાની હાલ પેદા થાએ અને તેવું કીધા શીવાએ ખીજા ઉપાએ નથી એહું રાદરહુ ઉપરથી રાવ લોકો રામજતા હશે.

૪. હાલમાં જે આ ઉપાએ ધારેલો છે તે મીનાકરાથી તથા અંડથી રાવે પ્રતીનાં લોકોને જે અનેક સંકટ પ્રાપ્ત થાએ છે તેમાંનું આ એક સંકટ છે તથા સમાધાની તથા સ્વસ્થતા રાખવી એમાંજ રાવેનું કલ્યાણ છે એ વાતવીરો ગમે તેટલો ઓધ કીધો તોપણ યોગ્ય છે.

૫. રાવે પ્રતીનાં લોકો ઇશિદાની અંધારા હોએ અથવા આ દેરાના હોએ; રાકારના ચાકર હોએ અથવા ખીજા કોઈ હોએ તેઓએ પોતપોતાની રાકતી પ્રમાણે પોતાની દર સાલની પેદારામાંથી તથા આમદાનીમાંથી યોગ્યેક વરરા થુધી કર આપવો એવા ઇરાવ રાકારે ધણું ધણું વીચાર કરીને કીધો છે.

૬. જેઓની પેદારા દર સાલ ૨૦૦ રૂપૈઆ ઉપર તથા ૫૦૦ રૂપૈઆની અંદર હોએ તેઓએ દર સાલ દર રોકડે ૨ ટકા પ્રમાણે આપવું પડશે તથા જેઓની પેદારા દર સાલ ૫૦૦ રૂપૈઆ ઉપર હોએ તેઓને દર સાલ દર રોકડે ૪ ટકા પ્રમાણે આપવું પડશે. દર એક માંણરને પોતાની દર સાલની પેદારામાંથી યોગ્ય અંશ આપવો એજ સરકારનું કહેવું છે. અને આ પ્રકારનો કર ખેસાડવામાં રાવે પ્રતીનાં લોકો ઉપર તેઓની આંમદાનીના પ્રમાણ મુજબ રાખ્યો કર ખેસાડીને દર એકની ખેતીનાં કાંમને અથવા ધંધાને અથવા ઉદ્યોગને કાંઈ અડચણ ન થાએ એવો પણ રાકારે એમાં વીચાર રાખ્યો છે એ વાત રાદરહુ ઉપરથી રાવે લોકોનાં ધ્યાનમાં આવશે.

૭. કર આપનારને ધણોજ થોડી ઇજા તથા તરાદી પડે એ રીતે આ કર વસુલ કરવા એહવી રાકારની ઇજા છે માટે સરકારે તે પ્રમાણે કલેક્ટર સાહેબોને હુકમો લખેલા છે. દર એક માંણરે પોતાની આંમદાનીની રકમ આરોરારોને લખી આપવી અથવા કલેક્ટર સાહેબની મંજૂરીથી લોકોએ એકઠા મહીને ઉધડ રકમ પોતાના ઉપર ખેસાડવી અથવા મરજી હોએ તો તે રકમ ફાલા પડતી આપવા સાથે ઇરાવેલી પંચાએતની મારફતે માહિ માહે વરાડ પ્રમાણે વેહેચી લેવી.

૮. લોકો રાકાર સાથે ઇમાંનથી ચાલરો તો તેઓની ઇજા જેટલી ઓછી થઈ રાકરો તેટલી ઓછી કરવા વીરો રાકારનાં અમલદાર કોરોરા કરરો એવી લોકોએ ખાતરજમાં રાખવી. રાકાર સાથે ઇમાંનથી ચાલતા નથી એવું ધારવાના રાખવ શીવાએ કોઈના ઓપડા તમારો અથવા કોઈના વેહેવાર વીરો ઓકરી કરરો એહવી દેહેરાત કોઈ માંણરો રાખવી નહીં. અને વળી એવું ઇરાવું છે કે પોતાની પેદારા અથવા આંમદાની ઉધાડી થવા બાબત જેઓને હરકત હોએ તેઓએ પોતાની વીગત કર ખેસાડનારા અમલદારોનો ભરોશો રાખીને તેઓને આપવી તેઓને લખી આપેલા મજબૂર તેઓએ ઉધાડો કરવો નહીં એ વીરો તેઓને શોગંન આપવામાં આવશે.

N.B.—This table is an extract from a more extensive yearly Return that is prepared for statistical purposes, and chiefly for the detection of any removable sources of disease, with a view to improving the healthiness of the Island. As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons of all stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendant, the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners particularly are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all *single* cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

An appeal from his order may be made to the Commissary General, whose decision is to be final; but when any of the penalties provided for in the preceding clause are exacted, no further penalty shall be leviable under this clause.
10. The Contractor, or an accredited Agent on his part, approved of by the Executive Commissariat Officer, must attend at this Office during the usual hours of business, *i. e.* from 10 A.M. to 5 P.M. daily (Sundays excepted), also at such other time or place as may be indicated by the Executive Commissariat Officer, when it may be considered desirable for the public service to require such attendance.
11. Any party whose offer is accepted must produce Sureties, such as shall meet the approval of the Cantonment and Civil Authorities, within Fifteen days from the date of the acceptance of his offer, or the Contract will be re-sold, and the amount deposited by the Bidder forfeited to Government. No reason will be assigned for rejecting any Security offered.
12. Bills for articles supplied under this Contract must be preferred for examination within one month from the date of the delivery of the same, or the Contractor will forfeit their full value, unless it clearly appear, to the satisfaction of the Commissary General, that the delay was unavoidable. TRANSPORT TRAIN BETWEEN WASSIND & INDORE.

The Government Bullock Transport Train between Wassind and Indore having been thrown open to the Public, the following Rules and Regulations are published for general information:—

1st. There are Fifty-four Stages between Wassind and Indore, six miles apart : the Cattle will be relieved at every Stage.

2nd. There are three descriptions of Carriages:—

1st Class or Spring Carts for Passengers.

2nd „ „ Muster Carts „ do.

3rd „ „ Country Carts „ do. and Goods.

3rd. Of these, until further notice, twenty Carts will be available for Passengers and Goods daily.

4th. Tickets for passages &c. upwards from Wassind will be granted at the Head Quarter Office, Bombay, and downwards at Indore, Mhow, and intermediate Stations, by the Assistant Director or Inspectors on the Line.

5th. The Halting Stations between Wassind and Indore are as follows:—

PASSENGER TRAIN.

1st. The Train will start at 3 p. m. daily from each end of the Line, and also from each Halting Station, at the same hour, except on Sundays, when Passengers will not be received unless in cases of emergency. This is not applicable to Passengers wishing to travel through without halting; but whenever halts are made, the above hour for starting must be conformed to; if voluntary halts be made at any Station beyond 24 hours, demurrage will be charged at the rate of two Rupees per every hour in excess of that time.

2nd. Twenty pounds of Luggage will be allowed free of charge to Passengers travelling by spring cart, and ten pounds per muster cart. A spring cart will carry two adults, and a muster and country cart, four.

3rd. All Luggage in excess of the above weight must be paid for, and will be sent with the Travellers on country carts at the Train rates of hire; 500 pounds in weight are allowed to each cart in the fair weather, and 400 pounds in the monsoon.

4th. All fares for Passengers and excess Luggage must be prepaid.

5th. Tickets must be shown or given up by Passengers to the Subordinates of the Train, at the Halting Stations on demand. Any Passenger refusing to comply will have to pay the fare from the Terminus in rear to his destination, and will be prevented from proceeding further by the Train, unless the prescribed amount is at once paid or arranged for.

6th. Passengers are on no account whatever to ill-treat the Cattle, Drivers, or Subordinates of the Train. Should any person employed in the Department evince a want of proper civility, or cause unnecessary inconvenience, the same should be reported to the Director at Bombay, or to the Assistant Director at Mhow, detailing all particulars, with the names of the Drivers, Stations, Dates, &c.
