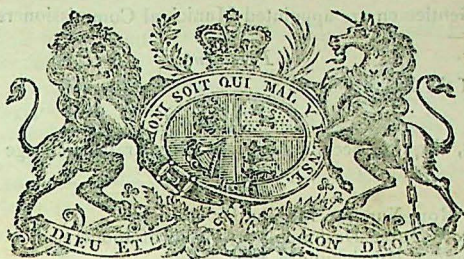

### Notification.

Fort St. George, March 20th, 1860.

The Government of Madras are prepared to receive offers, through the Superintendent of Marine, for the establishment of a line of Steamers of not less than 600 tons gross, and 150 horse-power, or thereabout, between Madras, the Northern Ports, and Rangoon, on the following conditions:—

- 1st. That a Steamer be despatched to Rangoon two days after the arrival of the first or second Suez Steamer of the month, as may hereafter be decided, touching at Masulipatam, Coconada, and Vizagapatam, and that she return to Madras by the same route.
- 2nd.—That she carry all Mails free of expense to Government.
- 3rd.—That she shall afford the regulated space below decks for at least 100 Natives, accommodation (Cabin) for 5 Officers and 3 Warrant Officers, and stowage in the hold for 30 tons of Stores.
- 4th.—That the freight and passage money shall be according to the following scale:—

5th.—That each cabin passenger be permitted to carry 3 cwts. baggage, and each deck passenger 40 lbs., exclusive of their Arms and Knapsacks; and that extra space be allowed for the men's provisions, which will be supplied by the Commissariat.

6th.—That the Commander be held responsible for the custody and issue of the provisions in the mode adopted on board Government Transports, or other Vessels carrying Troops; and

7th.—That, in the event of the Steamer failing to keep to her time of departure from Madras the subsidy and guarantee shall not be claimable, and that, in all cases, the subsidy shall not be payable until the vessel has accomplished her voyage out and home.

2. The Government will guarantee freight and passage money to the extent of Seven thousand and Five hundred (7,500) Rupees on each full trip from Madras and back.

3. Cabin passengers are to be provided with a liberal table, including liquors.
4. Intermediate passage is intended for Warrant Officers who are entitled to a plain, substantial mess, without liquor.
5. Deck passengers will be fed by the Government, but the Commander will be required to take charge of, issue, and cook their food.
6. Parties tendering should state full particulars of the vessel, or vessels, they would propose to employ, more especially as to age, tonnage, horse-power, and 'tween-deck accommodation for Troops; and the subsidy required should be stated for the voyage from Madras and back.
7. No penalties will be stipulated for in the event of failure.
8. Tenders should be addressed to the "Superintendent of Marine, Madras," and despatched so as to arrive not later than the 31st July next.

### M I L I T A R Y D E P A R T M E N T .

The Senior of the two Musketry Inspectors will be attached to Army Head Quarters; and, while performing the duties of his own Division, will receive the Reports from the Junior Inspector for submission to the Commander in Chief, and subsequent transmission to the Home Authorities.

For the performance of the above duty, the Senior Inspector will receive an Extra Allowance of Fifty (50) Rupees per mensem.

The Inspectors, when on tours of inspection, will travel by post, at the public expense, at the usual rates, to be passed on Contingent Bills.

As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons of all stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendant, the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners particularly are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather, to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all *single* cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

**Notice to Mariners.****DIRECTIONS FOR CROSSING THE BAR OF THE BANCOOT RIVER.**

Notice is hereby given, that two Conical Buoys, painted white, have been placed on the Bar of the Bancoot River, and these two buoys in line show the deepest channel over the Bar.

The Outer Buoy is in 16 feet at low water spring tides, and is a little outside of the deepest part of the Bar, where there is 8 feet at low water.

The Inner Buoy is about three quarters of a mile further in than the Outer one, bearing from it E  $\frac{1}{2}$  N., and is moored in 18 feet at low water spring tides.

From the inner buoy the Fort at the water's edge on Bancoot Point, is about 1  $\frac{1}{4}$  miles distant, bearing N. E. by E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  E.

Vessels running into the Bancoot River from Seaward have only to bring the buoys in line and run from one to the other, passing them so as to keep them a few yards on the Port side. When the Inner Buoy is reached, steer N. E. by E  $\frac{1}{4}$  E. for the Fort on Bancoot Point, rounding it at a distance of 60 yards, and thence to the anchorage off the Village.

The least water on the bar at low water spring tides, in the line between the two buoys, is seven feet, and the rise and fall at that period is about eleven feet.

**Notice to Mariners.****DANGEROUS SHOAL IN THE MIDDLE OF THE PERSIAN GULF.**

A dangerous shoal was reported some time back to exist in the middle of the Persian Gulf, by the Commander of the Ship "Shah Allum," who first discovered and sounded on it; and, in consequence thereof, the shoal which has lately been carefully surveyed, has been called the "Shah Allum Shoal."

It lies in the middle of the Persian Gulf, equidistant from the Islands Sheykh Shayb and Halool, and its bearing from the Westward end of Sheykh Shayb is S. 55° W., distant 44 miles. The shoal forms a small bank of sharp and rugged rocks, and that portion of it where the soundings are under 20 fathoms, is only 2  $\frac{1}{2}$  miles wide in a North and South direction, and 2 miles in an East and West direction. The dangerous part is at the

North end, where is not more than one-third of a mile across, on which there is generally from 4 to 5 fathoms in overfalls, but in one spot there are rocks having only from 15 to 17 feet on them, according to the tide, the time of which is not accurately known. The least water on any part of the shoal is not less than 12 feet.

The "Shah Allum Shoal" is steep to all round, having 37 fathoms at its South extremity, and from 40 to 45 fathoms at its North, about a mile distant from the shoal, which renders it all the more dangerous, as this great depth of water produces no discolouration on its surface, nor does it allow the shoal to be seen from aloft until on it, but the bottom may be seen, when in seven fathoms, and plainly when under that depth. Sea-birds frequent the site of the shoal, and flocks of them are generally to be seen hovering over it. There are sometimes also slight marks observable on the water, in its vicinity, supposed to be caused by the tides.

In clear weather, the mountains on the coast of Persia between Tauric and Nakhiloo, can be distinctly seen from the shoal, and the well known landmark called Assaloo Notch bears from it N. 5  $\frac{1}{2}$ ° E.

The shoalest spot is in Latitude 26° 25' 20" North, and 1° 40' 13" East of Bushire Residency Flagstaff.

SIR,—In reply to your letter to our address, No. 2542, of the 26th ultimo, we have the honour to report, for the information of His Lordship in Council, that the accounts herewith returned of the late Board of Conservancy, for the year ending 30th April 1858, and from 1st May to 11th August 1858, received with the above communication, have been carefully compared with the vouchers appertaining thereto, and found correct, with the exception of the following inaccuracies, viz :—

The sum of Rs. 26-14-2, on account of unclaimed articles sold by public auction in July 1857, has not been deducted from Outstanding Balance, Rs. 29,499-10-6, of Wheel Tax, shown due to the Municipal Fund in the Appendix A. of the Report for the year 1857-58, under the head "Assets," as is done in cases of augmentation made to, and remission deducted from, the Outstanding Balances.

The above remark is equally applicable to the sum of Rs. 23-12-0, credited in the accounts between 1st May and 11th August 1858.

The balance in charge of Superintendent of Repairs, on account of advances made to him for repairing, scavenging, and watering the roads and streets on the Islands of Bombay and Colaba, appears to have been omitted to be shown under the head "Assets."

The accompanying memorandum, of the 9th instant, from the Collector of Municipal Taxes, affords explanation in respect to the first two small items alluded to in the letter of the 14th of last month, from the three gentlemen appointed by Government to audit the accounts of the Municipal Fund, from the 1st of May 1857 to the 11th of August 1858. These items did not relate to any of the compound numbers of which the balance of Rs. 29,499-10-6 was the result, and consequently it was not necessary to deduct them from that balance, but merely to pay them into the Government General Treasury on account of the Municipal Fund.

2. In reference to the concluding paragraph of the letter abovementioned, I may observe that, in the early part of 1857, the Accounts of the Superintendent of Repairs were found to be in a confused state, and his Disbursements had to be audited by the Military Board, or the Auditor of Public Works Accounts, from the beginning of February 1855. After the audits were brought up to the end of April 1856, and the balances due to and by the Superintendent of Repairs (in reference to the transactions between him and the administrators of the Municipal Fund) were ascertained, the accounts were worked up, in quarterly statements, to the 30th of September 1858, being fifty days later than the date to which the present Government audit extends. In the beginning of the following month (October 1858), the balance of cash in the hand of the Superintendent of Repairs was paid into the Government General Treasury on account of the Municipal Fund; the Quarterly Statements were sent to the Clerk to the Municipal Commissioners; also one showing that all the sums paid to the Superintendent of Repairs from the Municipal Fund, between the 1st of May 1856 and the 30th of September 1858, were brought forward in his accounts.

#### MEMORANDUM.

The two "inaccuracies" specified in the 2nd and 3rd paragraphs of the Auditors' letter to Government, are thus explained:—

2. The items in question were not deducted from the Outstanding Balances, because they did not belong to my assessment; nor could the articles which realised them be recognised in connection with any outstandings in my books.

3. The first item—Rs. 26-14-2—was made up (1), of articles which had come into the Office during the time of my predecessor, and between which and the books I failed to discover any relation; (2), of articles left as security for the production of a conveyance; (3), conveyances left to be registered and not redeemed; and (4), a bribe offered to one of my Tent establishment.

4. The other item—Rs. 23-12-0—was the proceeds of certain conveyances which had been brought to the tent to be numbered and registered, and not fetched away.

5. The whole were sold under the sanction of the Board, and the proceeds carried to the Municipal Fund; but it will be seen that they could not be deducted from the balances without making those balances wrong.
