Is hereby given, that persons desirous of entering into a contract for performing the duties of WASHING and ROLLING BOTTLES, &c., of this Department, for the term of one year from the 1st day of December next, may, on application at this Office from 11 A. M. till 5 P. M. daily, (Sundays excepted,) obtain copies of the Schedule, or List of Prices, and such information relating thereto as they may require.

2. Verbal offers for the contract will be received at this Office on Friday the 28th instant, at 2 P. M. precisely, when intending contractors will be required to bid a per-centage above or below the prices exhibited in the above list at which they will undertake to perform the whole of the work

embraced therein, on the understanding that it must be performed in a satisfactory manner, and that the materials used must be of unexceptionable quality, or of the usual description; that the work must be performed whenever ordered, free of all charges beyond the stipulated price; and that the same is liable to examination and rejection by the executive Commissariat Officer, or by the indenting or receiving Officer; or by a Committee of Officers appointed on the part of Government, in the event of the contractor being dissatisfied with the decision of the above Officers, or either of them; it being understood that the decision of such Committee is to be final, and binding on all parties.

3. No person will be allowed to bid for the contract unless he previously deposits in this Office, in cash, the sum of Rupees (70) seventy, which sum will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal on the part of the contractor to execute the necessary deed of contract, whenever required to do so, on his offer being accepted, in which latter case he must be prepared to give unexceptionable bonded security to the further amount of Rupees (281) two hundred and eighty-one, which, together with the amount previously deposited, will be held as a guarantee for the due fulfilment of his contract.

4. A contractor must comply immediately with all emergent orders for washing and rolling Bottles, &c., and other similar duties of less urgency must be complied with in the periods stated in the requisitions made upon him; in failure whereof, or if the work be con-

demned by a Committee of Officers as aforesaid, this Department may immediately cause the work to be executed at his risk and cost, if it be considered expedient to do so; and in all such cases (30) thirty per cent. upon the amount of expenses incurred, or a fine of from Rupees (30) thirty to (100) one hundred, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract; it being understood that the simple condemnation by a Committee of any work performed constitutes such a breach of contract, whether the work in question be afterwards executed by the contractor or by this department; in every such case, also, it is to be understood that the contract may be cancelled, at the discretion of the Commissary General, and that if the contract be so cancelled, the cash deposit of Rupees (70) seventy, mentioned in para. 3 of this Notice, will be forfeited to Government.

5. It is also to be understood, that any negligence, evasion, or refusal on the part of a contractor to perform the work, or any attempt on his part, or that of his agents, to use materials of an inferior quality in lieu of those he is bound to use, or any neglect on his part to perform the work at the time and place ordered, will subject him, in every instance, to be fined to the extent of (25) twenty-five Rupees, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, from whose order an appeal may be made to the Commissary General, whose decision is to be final; but in cases when it may be deemed fit to exact any of the penalties provided for in the preceding clause, no further penalty shall be leviable under this clause.

6. It is further to be understood that the contractor, or an accredited agent on his part, approved of by the executive Commissariat Officer, is to attend at this Office during the usual hours of business, i. e. from 10 A. M. to 5 P. M. daily (Sunday excepted), also at such other time or place as may be indicated by the executive Commissariat Officer, when he may consider it desirable for the Public Service to require such attendance.

7. Any party whose offer is accepted will be required to produce his sureties for the approval of the Honorable Company's Solicitor, within fifteen days from the date of the acceptance of his offer, or the contract will be resold; no reason will be stated for rejecting any security offered.

8. Bills for work performed under this contract must be preferred within one month from the date of the performance of the work, in default of which the contractor will forfeit the full value of the work performed for which bills have not been so preferred, unless it clearly appear to the satisfaction of the Commissary General that the delay was unavoidable.

9. The amount of retrenchments made by the Military Board on the contractor's bills will be recovered from the first bills preferred for payment; but in the event of such retrenchments, or any portion thereof, being remitted, the amount remitted will be refunded.

10. Any party who, after offering for the contract, fails to furnish the necessary security, as provided for in Clause 7th of this Notice, will be interdicted from bidding on future occasions, unless he produce a certificate from individuals of unexceptionable character and sufficient means,

guaranteeing the due execution and performance of the contract, on his offer being accepted.

11. The annual outlay on the above contract is estimated at Rupees 1,406.

12. No reason will be assigned for the rejection of any offer.

The 16th September 1853.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 16th of September 1853 :—

ACT No. — OF 1853.

An Act to amend the Law for facilitating the Acquisition of Land needed for Public Purposes, within the Local Limits of the Jurisdiction of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras.

I. The provisions of Act XX. of 1852, as herein modified, shall be applicable to all lands situate within the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras.

II. The powers given to the Civil Court of the Zillah in Section XIV. of Act No. XX. of 1852 shall, for the purposes of this Act, be exercised by the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras either upon motion or petition; and the said Court, upon the investigation of any matter under the provisions of this Section, may compel the attendance of witnesses, and take their evidence, in the same manner as upon a trial of an action of law, and the said Court, upon such motion or petition, may award such costs as they may think just.

III. In all cases in which payment of any part of the purchase or compensation money, exceeding in amount the sum of five hundred Rupees, is held in deposit according to Section XV. Act XX. of 1852, on account of any lands taken for any public purpose under this Act, the Government Securities mentioned in the said Section shall be deposited with the Government Agents at Fort St. George, in the name and with the privity of the Accountant General of Her Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature at Fort St. George, to be placed by him to the credit of the persons interested in such lands, describing them as nearly as may be done, according to the course of proceeding in the said Court in matters and causes depending before it in Equity.

IV. The said Securities shall remain in the hands of the Government Agents, and the interest accruing on the Securities shall be, from time to time, received and paid under the order of the said Supreme Court, to the person or persons for the time being who would have been entitled to receive the rents and profits of the said lands if the same had not been taken as aforesaid, until there shall be some person or persons absolutely entitled to receive the principal sum of the moneys so reserved, and thereupon the said Government Securities, with all interest then due thereon, shall be transferred and paid to such person or persons under the like order of the said Court; and so long as no person can be found entitled to receive the interest of the said Government Securities, the Government Agent shall continue to receive, and from time to time to invest, the accumulation of interest due thereon, in the purchase of other Government Securities, to be held and applied by him on the same trusts as the Securities first purchased.

V. The right to receive payment of all sums not exceeding five hundred Rupees, which shall be held in deposit under the said Section XV. Act No. XX. of 1852, may be determined by the Madras Court of Small Causes, and the said Court may make an order for the payment thereof, which order shall be a sufficient indemnity to the Government, and all persons acting in obedience thereto.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 16th day of December next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 16th September 1853 :—

ACT No. — OF 1853.

An Act to amend the 38th Article of War for the Native Army.

Whereas it is expedient that any Native Soldier who shall make away with or pawn any medal granted to him for service in the Field, or for general good behaviour, should be punished for such unsoldier-like conduct, It is enacted :

That there shall be added to the 38th Article of War for the government of the Native Officers and Soldiers in the Military Service of the East India Company the words following—that is to say : “or who shall make away with or pawn any medal or decoration granted him for service in the Field, or for general good conduct.”

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 16th day of December next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 30th of September 1853 :—

ACT No. — OF 1853.

An Act to abolish the Office of Assessor to the Court of Petty Sessions at Bombay.

Whereas it is unnecessary to continue the Office of Assessor to the Court of Petty Sessions at Bombay, It is enacted as follows :

I. So much of Article 2, Title 2, of the Rule, Ordinance, and Regulation I. of 1834, passed by the Right Honorable the Governor in Council of Bombay, as enacts that the Court of Petty Sessions at Bombay therein mentioned shall constantly be attended by a Barrister-at-law, as and by way of Assessor to the said Court, such Assessor to be a Justice of the Peace and an Advocate of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay, and to be appointed and removable by the Honorable the Governor in Council, is hereby repealed.

II. It shall not be necessary for the said Court of Petty Sessions to be attended by any person as or by way of Assessor to the said Court.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 30th day of December next.

The 23rd September 1853,

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 23rd September 1853 :—

ACT No. — OF 1853.

An Act to provide for the Levy of Duties of Customs in the Province of Pegu.

Whereas it is expedient to provide for the levy of duties of Customs in the Province of Pegu; It is enacted as follows:

I. All goods, except salt and opium, which shall be imported by sea, into any part of the said Province of Pegu, from any port or place not subject to the Government of the East India Company, or from the port of Aden, or from any of the ports in the Straits of Malacca, shall be charged with the same rates of duty as those charged on goods of the same description imported into the Province of Bengal. Salt so imported shall be charged duty at the rate of six annas per maund, and opium shall not be landed, except under a pass from the Collector of Customs.

II. The Governor General of India in Council may from time to time, by notice to be published for general information, fix a rate for the valuation of any article, liable under this Act to ad valorem duty on importation, and the value so fixed shall, until the same shall be altered by a like notice, be deemed the value of such article for the purpose of levying such duty thereon.

III. Unless the Governor General of India in Council shall fix any different rate of valuation, by notice to be published as aforesaid, articles of import liable to ad valorem duty under this Act shall be valued, for the assessment of such duty, at the rates, if any, fixed in the Tables established from time to time by the Governor of Bengal, for the valuation of such articles for the assessment of Customs duty thereon at the ports of the Presidency of Bengal.

IV. No duty shall be levied on the export by sea of any goods from any part of the said Province of Pegu to any port in the territories subject to the East India Company, except the port of Aden, and any of the ports in the Straits of Malacca.

V. Goods exported by sea from any part of the said Province of Pegu to the port of Aden, or to any of the ports in the Straits of Malacca, or to any port or place not in the territories subject to the East India Company, shall be charged with the same rates of duty as those charged on goods of the same description exported from any of the ports of the Presidency of Bengal. But grain, and pulse of all sorts, likewise salt and teak timber, shall be free of export duty.

VI. Articles of export liable to an ad valorem duty under this Act shall be valued for the assessment of such duty according to such rates, if any, as shall be from time to time fixed and published for general information by the Commissioner of Pegu, and approved by the Governor General of India in Council.

VII. No inward bound vessel shall pass the Hastings' Shoal in the Rangoon River, or such other place as the Collector of Customs at any other port in the Province of Pegu may appoint, until the Master has delivered to the Pilot on board, or to a Custom-house Officer sent to receive it, a manifest made out in the form marked A in the Appendix to this Act. If the said manifest shall not contain a full and true specification of all the goods imported in the vessel, the Master shall be liable to a fine of one thousand Rupees, and any goods or packages that may be found on board in excess of the manifest, or differing in any way from the specification contained therein, shall be liable to be confiscated, or to be charged with such increased duties as may be determined by the Commissioner; and if any inward

bound vessel shall remain below the Hastings' Shoal in the Rangoon River, or such other place as the Collector of Customs at any other port may appoint, the Master shall in like manner deliver to the Pilot, or Custom-house Officer, a manifest as above described; and if any such vessel entering the port shall be at anchor therein twenty-four hours, and the Master thereof shall neglect to deliver the said manifest, he shall be liable to forfeit the sum of one thousand Rupees.

VIII. No vessel shall be allowed to break bulk until the manifest shall have been received by the Collector of Customs, and an order shall have been given by the said Collector for the discharge of cargo; and the said Collector may further refuse to give such order, if he shall see fit, until any port clearance or other papers, known to have been granted at the places from which the vessel is stated to have come, shall likewise be delivered to him.

IX. The Collector of Customs may send one or more Officer or Officers of Customs on board of any vessel, to remain on board by day or by night, until the vessel shall leave the port, or until it be otherwise ordered by the said Collector.

X. Any Master of a vessel who shall refuse to receive on board such Officer or Officers of Customs, or shall not afford him or them suitable shelter and sleeping accommodation, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding five hundred Rupees for each day such Officer or Officers shall not be received and provided with suitable shelter and accommodation.

XI. The Collector of Customs may by a warrant or written order, addressed to any Officer under his authority, order any vessel to be searched, and any Officer so authorised shall be competent to require any Cabins, or Bulk-heads, to be opened in his presence, and if not opened on his requisition, to break the same open; and any goods found to be concealed, which shall not be accounted for to the satisfaction of the Collector of Customs, shall be confiscated; and any Master who shall resist such Officer, or refuse to allow his vessel to be searched, shall be liable to a fine of one thousand Rupees.

XII. If goods entered in the manifest shall not be found on board the vessel, or if the quantity fall short, and be not duly accounted for, or if goods sent out of the vessel be not landed at the Custom-house, or such other ghat, or place, as the Collector of Customs shall have prescribed, the Master shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five hundred Rupees for every missing or deficient package of unknown value, and for twice the amount of duty charged on goods deficient and unaccounted for, if capable of being assessed therewith. The Collector of Customs, however, may, at his discretion, permit the Master to amend obvious errors, or supply omissions from accident or inadvertence, by furnishing an amended or supplemental manifest, upon payment of a fee of five Rupees.

XIII. Any Custom-house Officer whatever, who shall demand or accept any gratuity not authorised by any existing Regulation or order of Government, in consideration of doing, or of omitting to do, any act in his official capacity, shall forfeit for

every such offence the sum of five hundred Rupees, and any person who shall offer a bribe to any Custom-house Officer, in order to induce such Officer to act in a manner inconsistent with his duty, shall forfeit a like sum; such penalties shall be adjudged on conviction before any Magistrate, or Justice of the Peace of the town or district in which the Custom-house to which such Officer belongs may be situated.

XIV. When goods shall be seized as contraband and liable to confiscation, the Collector of Customs shall investigate the case, and according to his judgment shall either release the goods, or adjudge them to confiscation; and whenever he shall deliver goods to be confiscated, he shall report his proceedings for confirmation and final adjudication by the Commissioner.

XV. Twenty days, exclusive of Sundays and holidays, shall be allowed for the discharge of the import cargo of vessels not exceeding six hundred tons burthen, and thirty days for vessels exceeding that burthen. The said periods to be calculated from the arrival of the vessel off town. If the whole cargo shall not be discharged by the expiration of the above stated periods respectively, the Master shall be charged with the tide waiter's, or other Officer's, wages for any further period that he or they may be detained on board; and if the owners, importers, or consignees do not bring their goods to land within the periods above fixed, it shall be the duty of the Master to do so; if any goods remain on board after the times above fixed for the discharge of the import cargo, the Collector may order the same to be landed and warehoused for the security of the duties of Customs chargeable thereon, and of any freight, primage, and other demands that may be due thereon, giving his receipt to the Master for the same, and in case any goods so landed and warehoused be not claimed and cleared from the Custom-house within three months from the date of entry of the ship in which they were imported, it shall be competent for the Collector to sell the same on account of the duties, freight, and other charges due thereon.

XVI. A further period of twenty-five days, exclusive of Sundays and holidays, shall be allowed for putting on board export cargo, if the vessel shall not exceed six hundred tons burthen, and thirty-five days if exceeding that burthen, when the lading and unlading thereof shall be continuous, and the Master shall not be charged with the wages of the Custom-house Officers on board until the expiration of such additional periods respectively.

XVII. If a vessel, after having discharged her import cargo, shall be laid up, the Custom-house Officer shall be withdrawn, so soon as he shall certify that no goods remain on board excepting messing stores and articles for use; and when a vessel so laid up shall be entered at the Custom-house for receipt of export cargo, a Custom-house Officer shall be sent on board, and if he shall certify that no goods remain on board save as above excepted, twenty days, exclusive of Sundays and holidays, shall be allowed from the date of such certificate for the loading outwards of a vessel not exceeding six hundred tons burthen, and thirty days for vessels exceeding that burthen; after which periods respectively the Master shall be charged with the wages and expenses of the Custom-

house Officer to the date of the vessel's sailing from the port.

XVIII. When a vessel having cleared out shall put back from stress of weather, or it shall be necessary, from any damage or other cause, that the cargo shall be unshipped or reloaded, a Custom-house Officer shall be sent to watch the vessel, and take charge of the cargo during such re-lading or removal from on board; and the goods on board such vessel shall not be allowed to be transhipped, or re-exported free of duty, by reason of the settlement of duty at the time of first export, unless the goods shall be lodged in such place as shall be allowed by the Collector of Customs, and shall remain while on land, or while on board of any other vessel, under special charge of the Officers of Customs, until the time of re-export; and all charges attending such a custody shall be borne by the exporter, or by the applicant for this advantage; provided that in all cases of return to port after port clearance on account of damage, or from stress of weather, it shall be lawful for the owner or for the Master to re-enter the vessel and land the cargo under the rules for the importation of goods, and export duty shall in that case be refunded, and the amount paid in drawback be reclaimed, and the goods be placed in all respects as before being passed for exportation; and if goods on account of which drawback has been paid be not found on board the vessel, the Master shall forfeit the entire value thereof, unless he account for them to the satisfaction of the Collector of Customs.

XIX. When goods shall be re-landed before the lading of the vessel is complete, and port clearance has been granted, the duty levied upon such goods shall be returned to the exporter; but no refund shall be made of duty paid on the export of any goods after port clearance shall have been granted for the vessel on which the goods were exported, unless the vessel shall have put back from stress of weather or from damage, and the goods shall have been re-landed under the provisions of Section XVIII. of this Act.

XX. Any Master of a vessel who shall without leave in writing obtained from the Collector of Customs put on board thereof any goods, or cause or suffer any goods to be removed therefrom, or put on board thereof, between sun-set and sun-rise, or on any day when the Custom-house is closed for business, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding five hundred Rupees.

XXI. When, under the provisions of Section XVII. of this Act, the Custom-house Officer shall have been removed from on board any vessel, if the Master of such vessel shall, before a Custom-house Officer have been again placed on board thereof, put or allow to be put any goods whatever, on board such vessel, he shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one thousand Rupees, and the goods shall be liable to be re-landed for examination at the expense of the Master or Shippers, on the requisition of the Collector of Customs.

XXII. When goods shall be sent from on board ship for the purpose of being landed and passed for importation, there shall be sent with each boat load a boat-note in the form marked B in the Appendix to this Act, specifying the number of packages, and the marks and numbers, or other description thereof; and such boat-note shall be signed by an officer of the vessel, and likewise by the Custom-house Officer on board; and if any imported goods be found in a boat proceeding to land without a boat-note, or, if accompanied by a

boat-note, they be found out of the proper track between the ship and Custom-house wharf, or other wharf, or place at which they may have been permitted to be landed, the boat containing such goods may be detained by any of the Officers of the Preventive Service of the Custom-house; and unless the case be explained to the satisfaction of the Collector of Customs, the goods shall be liable to confiscation.

XXIII. Upon the re-export by sea of goods imported, provided the re-export be made within two years from the date of import, according to the

Custom-house register, and the goods be identified to the satisfaction of the Collector of Customs, and provided the claim to receive such drawback be made at the time of exportation, and provided the amount due thereon be demanded according to the form of application marked C in the Appendix to this Act, within one year from the date of entry for shipment in the Custom-house register, there shall be retained one-eighth of the amount of duty levied, and the remainder shall be repaid as drawback; and if goods be re-exported in the same ship, without being landed, there shall be no import duty levied thereon. But no drawback shall be allowed on the re-export of goods from any port in the Province of Pegu to any port in the territories subject to the East India Company, except the port of Aden, and any of the ports in the Straits of Malacca.

XXIV. Katacs, dhonies, junks, and country craft, and other small vessels, shall be required to anchor or moor in the Rangoon River, or that part of it which lies between the Custom-house wharf and Godwin's wharf, and at other ports within such limits as shall be fixed by the Collector of Customs at such port; and if any such vessel shall anchor in any other part of the river, and the Master, or person in charge thereof, shall not immediately, on being ordered so to do, move his vessel to the place ordered by the Collector of Customs, he shall be liable to a fine of one hundred Rupees, and the vessel, or any part of its equipment, or cargo, may, by warrant under the hand of the Collector, be seized and sold in satisfaction of such fine. All goods shall be landed from such vessels and put on board for export according to such rules, and at such places, as shall be prescribed by the Collector of Customs.

Dhonies, &c. to anchor in a particular part of the river.

Wharf and Godwin's wharf, and at other ports within such limits as shall be fixed by the Collector of Customs at such port; and if any such vessel shall anchor in any other part of the river, and the Master, or person in charge thereof, shall not immediately, on being ordered so to do, move his vessel to the place ordered by the Collector of Customs, he shall be liable to a fine of one hundred Rupees, and the vessel, or any part of its equipment, or cargo, may, by warrant under the hand of the Collector, be seized and sold in satisfaction of such fine. All goods shall be landed from such vessels and put on board for export according to such rules, and at such places, as shall be prescribed by the Collector of Customs.

XXV. In addition to the general rules prescribed in this Regulation, the following special rules shall be observed in the collection of the duties directed to be levied on imports and exports by sea to and from the ports in the Province of Pegu.

Special rules.

XXVI. *First.*—A tide-waiter shall go on board every vessel that may come to anchor, and enter in his book her name, the nation to which she may belong, the name of her Commander, from what port she may have sailed, and every other necessary particular concerning her.

Imports.

Tide-waiters to go on board vessels on their arrival.

Second.—A notification in the following form shall be inserted in the tide-waiters' Book:—

Notification to be inserted in the tide-waiters' book.

"To all Commanders and supercargoes of vessels trading to the port of

"You are hereby directed, immediately on your arrival at this port, to transmit to the Custom-house a true manifest upon declaration of all the goods and merchandize loaded on board of your vessel, specifying at what port they were received, and to whom they belong, either on account of the owners, or on freight, together with their marks and numbers, agreeably to the annexed form. You will likewise be pleased to deliver into my office your pass, and other credentials

concerning your ship, which shall be returned to you, after they shall have been inspected.

(Signed) "A. B.,
Collector of Customs."

Third.—The form of the manifest marked A, in the Appendix to this Act, shall be subjoined to the notification.

Fourth.—As soon after the arrival of the vessel as may be practicable, the Captain, Master, or Supercargo, shall deliver in his manifest and last port clearance at the office of the Collector of Customs, and the Collector or his deputy shall annex to the manifest the form of declaration attached to Form A in the Appendix to this Act.

Fifth.—The Master or the Supercargo shall next proceed to the police office, and shall return to the Collector of Customs, with a certificate from the police office, purporting that he has delivered into that office a list of all the European and other sailors in his ship, specifying their names, and the countries to which they are subject; and has entered into a bond not to suffer any of his crew to come on shore with any kind of offensive weapons at any time of the day or night. No merchandize shall be permitted to be landed from any ship or vessel whatever until the above rules shall have been observed. When the above forms shall have been observed, and the prescribed duties shall either have been paid, or sufficient security shall have been taken for the amount of them, consisting either of a deposit of goods, or of Company's paper, from the owner or freighters of the cargo, they shall be permitted to land the goods. The form of application shall be according to the Form D in the Appendix annexed to this Act.

Sixth.—No permission shall be given for the landing of any cargo or goods belonging to the Captain or Officers of ships or vessels entering at any of the ports of Pegu, or of any baggage belonging to passengers that may come in them, excepting the cargoes, goods, or baggage of the persons named in the preceding and present clause.

Seventh.—All goods and packages, without exception, imported from sea, shall be landed at the Custom-house, and if landed, or attempted to be landed at any other place, either clandestinely or otherwise, they shall be liable to confiscation.

Eighth.—The duties shall be levied at the rates specified in this Act, and shall be paid within the period of three months from the date of the declaration annexed to the manifest; in default of which, the deposit which may have been made of goods or Government Securities under Clause 5, Section XXVI. of this Act, shall become forfeited to the Government. A Bill, in the Form marked E in the Appendix to this Act, shall be delivered to the importers.

Ninth.—No claim for a remission of duty upon liquors or other goods stated to have been found damaged shall be admitted, unless the condition of the goods shall have been ascertained previously to their passing the Custom-house. On examination of them at the Custom-house, should any of them be found not to be in a merchantable state, such goods must be sold on the spot, as the condition of any remission of duty; and the duty shall be settled on the proceeds of the sale. But no such damaged goods shall be permitted to be sold, until the proprietor or his agent shall have caused to be inserted in a local newspaper an advertisement, specifying the day and time of the sale, and the articles to be sold. All sales of damaged goods at the Custom-house

shall be made in the presence of the Collector or his deputy, and the goods shall be lotted with the approbation of the Collector.

XXIX. No packages, casks, bales, chests, or parcels of goods of any kind shall be received into the Custom-house godowns unless marked or numbered, and no receipts shall be granted for any packages not marked or numbered.

XXX. The Collector of Customs shall grant receipts on application being made for them, excepting in the cases specified in the preceding Section, for all goods landed from ships, and lodged in the Custom-house. The Collector of Customs shall be held responsible for delivering from the Custom-house all goods for which receipts shall have been so granted. If Captains, Officers, or passengers, omit to take such receipts upon their goods being landed and lodged as above-mentioned, they shall not be entitled to an indemnification for any part of them which may be lost in passing through the Custom-house. The receipts shall be returned on clearing out the goods.

XXXI. An account shall be kept by the tide-waiter of all packages received into, or delivered out of the godowns.

XXXII. Ships importing in ballast shall be reported accordingly by the Master.

XXXIII. The Collector of Customs shall report to the Commissioner whenever any arms or military stores, being private property (with the exception of fowling-pieces, pistols, or other arms for private use,) are landed from any vessel importing goods into Rangoon, or elsewhere in the Province of Pegu, specifying the nature, numbers, and quantity of such arms and stores, together with the name of ship, and of the Commander or Consignees; the above-mentioned report shall also state whether the arms or stores were originally shipped as private property, or procured from any of the Company's Governments in India.

XXXIV. Precious stones, though exempt from duty, shall nevertheless, whether on importation or exportation, be entered at the Custom-house, and their value stated, under a penalty of ten per cent. on the value at which they may be estimated after due inquiry by the Collector.

XXXV. The importers of goods landed expressly for re-exportation, or transhipped in port, are nevertheless to pay, or deposit security for the import duties. Should any Master of a ship or other person be desirous of

landing stores or other articles merely for temporary purposes, without any view to a sale of such stores or articles, they shall have the option of either paying or depositing security for the import duties thereon as above prescribed, or of landing them free of duty, upon making an application for that purpose to the Collector of Customs; provided, that in the latter case, they shall at the same time enter into a bond or note to the Collector, engaging to pay double duties on all such stores or articles (and which shall be entered at the Custom-house expressly for re-exportation), unless they shall be re-shipped on the same vessel within the period of three months from the date of their being landed.

XXXVI. All goods for exportation, the property

Goods for exportation to be shipped from the Custom-house.

of individuals (with the exception hereafter to be specified), shall be shipped from the Custom-house with a permit from the Collector of Customs, in the Form marked G in the Appendix to this Act. Goods brought for exportation from the interior of the country, previously to being shipped, shall be brought to the Custom-house Ghaut for examination.

XXXVII. Grain and timber may, by permission of the Collector of Customs, be shipped from private wharves after they shall have been duly entered at the Custom-house.

XXXVIII. All application for permits for exports shall be made to the Collector of Customs in writing, in the Form marked H in the Appendix to this Act annexed, and shall specify the name of the vessel on which the goods are to be laden, the name of the Commander, and the place to which the vessel is bound; and shall contain, or be accompanied by a chellaun or invoice, specifying the numbers and marks of the packages, the sorts and quantities of goods in each, the place of manufacture, and the rate of value or market price thereof at the place of exportation; after which official bills shall be made out for the duties, in the Form marked E in the Appendix to this Act annexed, unless goods be exempted from duty; and before the goods shall be allowed to be shipped, the amount of duty, if any, shall be paid, or security given for the payment thereof, within ten days from the date of such security.

XXXIX. If the Collector of Customs have reason to suspect any bale of piece goods not to correspond with the chellaun, he shall summon the shipper, and in his presence, if he thinks fit to attend, shall cause the goods to be examined by the examiner and appraiser of piece goods; who, if they appear to him rated below the market price, or rate of value fixed for such goods, shall proceed to appraise them according to such price or rate of value, according to the best of his judgment, and shall certify his appraisalment in writing under his signature to the Collector of Customs, who shall assess the goods agreeably to such appraisalment. Should the proprietor refuse to pay the duties upon such appraisalment, he shall not be permitted to ship the goods.

XL. If any bales be found to contain a greater quantity than shall be specified in the chellaun, the whole of the bales in which such excess may be found shall be liable to confiscation, and whatever goods the same person on the faith of his chellaun shall have before been permitted to ship on the same vessel without examination shall be subject to double duty in respect thereof.

XLI. On exporting gruff or other goods, not being piece goods, one or more chests, bags, or packages, at the discretion of the Collector of Customs, may be examined and weighed, subject to the same penalties in a case of difference from the chellaun as are specified in the preceding Section.

XLII. All boats laden with goods or merchandize from the interior of the country shall be brought to at the Custom-

house. All goods in any boat attempting to pass the Custom-house without permission from the Collector of Customs shall be liable to confiscation.

XLIII. Provisions and stores for the use of Her Majesty's Navy, or for ships in the service of the East India Company, provided such provisions and stores are the property of the Crown, or of the said Company, may be passed free of duty; but all such articles furnished by contractors, or their agents, are not to be exempted from the payment of the prescribed duties.

XLIV. Goods for exportation free from duty shall nevertheless be entered at the Custom-house in the same manner as if they were goods paying duties.

XLV. No claim to drawback shall be admitted unless the goods shall be exported regularly through the Custom-house, and be included in the manifest of the export cargo, delivered into the Custom-house by the Commander or owner of the vessel in which they are to be exported, with the application for a port clearance; nor in any case after the port clearance shall have been taken out.

XLVI. No drawback shall be allowed on the re-exportation of articles imported from sea forming only a part of a package in which they were imported; or on any package that may not be entire as imported.

XLVII. In every instance, either of imports or exports, where the duties have been paid without any objection having been made to the rate of valuation, no claim for a return of any part of the duties so paid shall be allowed.

XLVIII. The Collector of Customs shall not grant a port clearance to any vessel until all duties of import and export have been paid or settled, or the goods, if free from duty, shall have been entered at the Custom-house; nor until the Commander shall produce a certificate from the police office purporting that a list of all seamen embarked in the vessel has been delivered into that office.

XLIX. All goods seized in the attempt to ship them in a clandestine manner, and goods shipped clandestinely, shall be liable to confiscation.

L. All fines, penalties, or forfeitures under this Act, except where otherwise expressly directed, shall be adjudged by the Deputy Commissioner, or his Assistant, subject to revision by the Commissioner, on appeal.

LI. And any Officer by this Act authorised to adjudicate in any case hereby punishable by fine or penalty, or before whom any fine or penalty is to be recovered, may exercise all the powers vested in a Magistrate by Act II. of 1839 for levying or enforcing the payment of such fine or penalty.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 7th of October 1853:—

ACT No. — of 1853.

An Act relating to the Execution of Sentences in Petty Cases by Superintendents of Bazzars, in the Presidency of Bombay.

Whereas the rule which prohibits a Superintendent of Bazzars in the Presidency of Bombay from executing any sentence in the Criminal or Excise branches of his duties, until he has submitted his proceedings to the Commanding Officer, and which requires that trials before a Superintendent of Bazzars shall be recorded as usual on Courts Martial, has been found to be productive of unnecessary inconvenience and delay in petty cases, and it is expedient to abolish the rule in such cases; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

I. So much of Section XXX. Regulation XXII. 1827, of the Bombay Code, as enacts that the Superintendent of Bazzars shall not execute any sentence in the Criminal or Excise branch of his duties until he has submitted his proceedings to the Commanding Officer, and that his trials shall be recorded in writing, as usual on Courts Martial, is hereby repealed, so far as it shall relate to any sentence which shall hereafter be passed by any Superintendent of Bazzars, by which any fine not exceeding three rupees, or any imprisonment not exceeding three days, shall be ordered.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 7th day of January 1854.
