The following Notification by the Government of India is republished for general information:—

NOTIFICATION.—Read a Despatch from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, No. 159 of 1860, dated 17th October.

Read also paragraphs 5 and 6 of another Despatch, No. 165 of 1860, dated 24th October.

The Governor General in Council is pleased, with the approval of the Secretary of State for India, to promulgate the following rule for regulating the time to be allowed to Covenanted and Uncovenanted Officers when proceeding to join their appointments either by Railway or by Sea:—

“ For the portion of the journey traversable by Railway, one hundred miles a day are allowed; for the portion traversable by Steamer, one hundred miles a day, or the time actually occupied in the voyage when, by accident, the duration of the voyage exceeds the time calculated at the rate of one hundred miles a day.”

FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

The attention of all Collectors and other Civil Officers of Government is drawn to the Civil Auditor's Circular, No. 1351, dated 29th October 1858, and they are requested to attend to the instructions therein contained.

The letter of the Government of India (No. 4500 of 1858), referred to in the Civil Auditor's Circular, and the Resolution of the 21st February 1856, are reprinted for information.

To The CHIEF SECRETARY to the GOVERNMENT of BOMBAY,

FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

SIR,—I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 538, dated the 11th June last, with its enclosure, from which it appears that the Government of Bombay has ruled, with reference to the case of Nilkanut Shastree, a Sanscrit Professor attached to the Poona College, who having, in November 1856, been declared by the Civil Surgeon of Poona to be unfit for further service, was recommended to the Honorable Court for Pension, and who was subsequently allowed, notwithstanding this declaration, to retain his appointment, pending the Honorable Court's decision, that the proper course to have been adopted in his case, and all similar cases, was, to grant the applicant for Pension sick leave under the Absentee Rules, for the period intervening between the date of application under a certificate of unfitness and a final decision thereon.

2. This ruling, I am desired to state in reply, seems to the President in Council to be clearly wrong. He considers that, when an officer has, on application for pension, been declared by the Medical authorities to be unfit for further service, that officer should at once be discharged; and that, if a pension is subsequently granted to him, it should count from the several dates mentioned in the Resolution of this Government of the 21st February 1856.

Extract from the Proceedings of the Most Noble the Governor General of India in Council in the Financial Department, under date the 21st February 1856.

Read a letter from the Assistant Secretary to the Government of the North-Western Provinces, No. 266, dated the 26th January 1856, regarding the date from which any pensionary allowance is to have effect.

RESOLUTION.—The Honorable the Lieutenant-Governor of the North-Western Provinces, observing that a diversity of practice prevails as regards the dates from which pensions granted by the Honorable the Court of Directors or the Supreme Government in India should be payable, requests that a definite rule may be laid down for his guidance as to the date from which any pensionary allowance is to have effect; adding that the more ordinary practice in those provinces seems to have been to permit the pension to be drawn from the date of the letter of the Supreme Government communicating sanction, or from some later date, the first, occasionally, of the month in which the order was issued by the Local Government.

The Most Noble the Governor General in Council observes that—

I. In cases of pensions sanctioned by the Government of India or the Local Governments, in which the parties applying for pension are still in the employment of Government, it has been usual for the pensions to commence from the date on which the pensioners may cease to be borne on the effective establishment.

II. In cases of pensions sanctioned by the Government of India or the Local Governments, in which parties are not in the employment of Government at the time of applying for pension, the pensions commence from the date of the orders sanctioning the pensions.

III. In cases of pensions sanctioned by the Honorable the Court of Directors, the pensions, like other charges sanctioned by the Court, are payable from the date of the receipt of the Court's Despatches by the Governments to which they are addressed.

IV. In cases in which dates are specifically mentioned, the pensions of course take effect from the dates specified.

The above Rules appear to His Lordship in Council to be unobjectionable, and he is pleased to direct that they be made generally known and acted on.

ORDER.—Ordered that a copy of the foregoing Resolution be transmitted to the Government of the North-Western Provinces, in reply to the Assistant Secretary's letter above mentioned.

Ordered also, that a copy of the Resolution be sent to the several Foreign, Home, Military, Public Works, Departments of this Government noted in the margin.

Ordered further, that a copy of the Resolution be forwarded to the Governments of Bengal, Fort Saint George, Bombay, and the Eastern Settlements, respectively.

Ordered lastly, that a copy of the Resolution be furnished to the Civil Auditor of Fort William.

“ FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

SUMMARIES OF CONSTRUCTIONS OF INCOME TAX ACTS XXXII. AND XXXIX. OF 1860.

A question having been raised as to whether any or all of the Funds enumerated in the List given below, or the persons drawing annuities or pensions from those Funds were liable to Income Tax, and if so, how the amount was to be assessed, it was held that the Managers of all the Funds so enumerated, as well as of any similar Funds, except such Funds as should have been specially exempted as “ Charitable,” should be subject to Income Tax on the available Income of the Fund from all sources, including subscriptions as well as interest, the Managers deducting the Tax so paid *pro rata* from the payments made by them in India, and claiming exemption in the case of annuities and pensions paid in England, which it was not intended to place upon a different footing from other annuities or pensions paid at home, although the strict conditions of the law might possibly make them liable, as being in the first instance paid by the Fund in India.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT.

The Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to publish the following Rules for general information:—

Rules to regulate applications to Government for grants of land or other concessions, required by Companies associated for the purpose of carrying out any public undertaking, project, or scheme within the Presidency of Bombay and its dependencies.

1. That notice by the Promoters of such undertaking, project, or scheme, of their intention to apply to Government shall be published in at least one English, one Gujarati, and one Marathi Newspaper, and also in the *Government Gazette* in the three above-named languages, at least four (4) weeks before the said application be received.

2. That, if it be the intention of the Promoters to apply to the Legislative Council for permission to levy any tolls, rates, or duties, or to alter any tolls, rates, or duties, or directly or indirectly to affect the rights of those having the power of levying tolls, rates, or duties, then the notice specified in Rule 1 shall clearly specify such intention.

3. That a written notice shall be served on each and all parties, or on their legal representatives, whose rights are affected, or are likely to be affected by the proposed undertaking, project, or scheme, at least four weeks before any application to Government be received.

4. That a plan, on a scale of not less than four inches to the statute mile, shall be deposited in the Office of the Collector of the district in which the said undertaking, project, or scheme, may be situated, four weeks before any application to Government be received; which plan shall describe clearly the situation of the proposed undertaking, project, or scheme, and the situation of the adjoining lands, accompanied by a book of reference, showing the names of existing proprietors, and of the tenants of the lands or properties intended to be occupied by the proposed undertaking, project, or scheme, and of the adjoining lands and properties; and the Collector of the district shall, at the time of receipt of the said plan and book of reference, endorse upon each of them a memorandum stating the date of receipt by him. The said plan and book of reference shall be open to public inspection on all lawful days, between the hours of 10 A. M. and 4 P. M., without fee or reward.

5. That an estimate of the expense of the undertaking, project, or scheme, shall be furnished, signed by the Directors of the Companies or parties promoting or projecting the same; and that such estimate shall be deposited with the aforesaid plan and book of reference at the same time and under the same conditions.

6. That the application shall be accompanied by the list of subscribers to the said undertaking, project, or scheme, which shall contain the name in full; the description and the place of residence or business of each subscriber; the amount of his subscription, with the amount he has paid up; and that the amount subscribed for shall amount to a sum equal to one half the amount of the estimate before application be received.

7. That a sum equal to ten (10) per cent. of the total estimated cost of the undertaking, project, or scheme, shall be deposited, before application to Government be received, to the credit of the Accountant General, in a Government Bank, either in Cash or approved Security, with an agreement that such sum is not to be withdrawn, except with the consent of Government, certified by the Secretary in the Public Works Department, that the undertaking, project, or scheme has been sanctioned by Government, or has been rejected or withdrawn.

8. That, previous to the application to Government, an alphabetical list, in the English language, of subscribers, the amount of subscription, and the amount paid up, be printed at the expense of the Promoters of the said undertaking, project, or scheme, and that one copy of such printed list shall be deposited with each of the following parties:—

A Secretary to Government

The Chamber of Commerce, Bombay.

The Collector of the districts in which it may be proposed to carry out the said undertaking, project, or scheme.

9. That the date of the proposed commencement of the works, dating from the sanction of Government, and also the estimated date of completion of certain defined portions of the same, shall be set forth by the promoters of such undertaking, project, or scheme, in their application to Government.

10. That the sanction or approbation of Government shall not be considered as conveying approval of any undertaking, project, or scheme in an engineering or in a pecuniary point of view.

11. Further, it will rest with the promoters of any undertaking, project, or scheme, to satisfy, by purchase, compensation, or otherwise, all the proprietors whose rights may be damaged by the execution of such undertaking, project, or scheme, and also to provide similar satisfaction for any consequential damages to surrounding properties. In case of any dispute arising between such parties and the Promoters or Directors of any undertaking, project, or scheme, Government will lend their aid in adjusting and settling such disputes.

12. That the Promoters of any undertaking, project, or scheme, shall also submit to Government a table showing the maximum rates which they propose to levy, binding themselves not to increase them without the sanction of Government.

13. It must be understood that Government reserves to itself the right to disallow or to reject any undertaking, project, or scheme, which may be presented or submitted to it; and also Government reserves to itself the right to impose such terms or conditions before according their final approval, as in each case may appear to it to be requisite.

I.—Monthly Lists of Receipts, Issues, and Remains of Stores.

1. This document, if by Arsenals, Store Depôts, or Barrack Departments, should be on "Demy" paper, in the Form A, and if by Regimental or other Officers, on "Foolscap," in the Form B.
2. The former should be transmitted within fifteen days after the close of the month to which it may appertain, the latter within five days.
3. The valuation columns should be left blank by Accounting Officers.
4. Only articles in which transactions occur during the month should be exhibited.
5. The same article should not appear twice; the aggregate number or quantity remaining in hand, or received, or issued, should be shown by one entry; and the vouchers connected with the Receipts and Issues should be quoted, opposite such entry, in the columns set apart for that purpose.
6. A duly sanctioned Voucher should be submitted for every Receipt or Issue of Stores; and any change, affecting either the quantity or state as borne on Returns, is to be looked upon as a Receipt or Issue and vouched for accordingly.
7. No Receipt or Issue, unsupported by voucher, should be included.
8. The designation of articles in Monthly Lists and Vouchers should agree, and the entries in both should be in strict accordance with established nomenclature.
9. But when any article for which no designation may have been fixed is necessarily entered in Monthly Lists from Arsenals, Store Depôts, or Barrack Departments, the circumstance should be specially reported by the accounting Officer, in submitting such List; and he should fully describe the article, and state what denomination appears to him to be most appropriate, and the Examiner will communicate the same to the Inspector General of Ordnance and Magazines, or to the Quarter Master General of the Army, as necessary, for publication, so that all Officers may be aware of the additions made to the established nomenclature from time to time.
10. The state of all stores received or issued should appear in the Monthly Lists of Arsenals, Store Depôts, and Barrack Departments, as in the present Monthly returns of Arsenals.
11. All stores due on Indents should be shown "Due" on their face, in red ink, in submitting them as vouchers, and authenticated, in all practicable cases, by the initials of the Receiving Officer.
12. Any document submitted as a Voucher, which may have reference to an authority recorded in the Examiner's Office, should clearly denote that authority.
13. All recoverable articles used in packing should be treated as *bona fide* Issues, and be entered on a fold of the Voucher, and the entry should be authenticated by the signature of the Receiving Officer, if no separate receipt accompanies.
14. Recoveries from unpacking should be similarly treated on the receipt side.
15. The number and month, and the Department in support of whose accounts they are sent, should be entered conspicuously, in red ink, on the back of Vouchers: the number should also appear conspicuously on the face of Vouchers.
16. Receipts on sanctioned Indents should be supported on the accounts of the Receiving Officer, by the Returning Indents duly completed, and on those of the Issuing Officer, by the Receipts of the Receiving Officers.
17. Issues on sanctioned Indents should be supported, on the accounts of the Issuing Officer, by the Indents duly completed; and on those of the Receiving Officer by Statements bearing the signature of the Issuing Officer and his own countersignature.

18. Transactions between Regimental Officers should be supported, on the part of the Issuing Officer, by Receipts from Receiving Officers; and on that of the Receiving Officer by Statements signed by Issuing Officers and countersigned by himself.

19. Transactions between Quick and Dead Stock should be supported by Drawing and Returning Indents.

20. Issues of Stores broken up, and recoveries therefrom should be supported by authenticated statements.

II.—*Monthly Reports of Conversions accompanied by Returns of Works from Arsenals.*

1. These Reports (*vide* Form C.) with the usual Returns of Works (the latter transmitted, as at present, through the Inspector General of Ordnance) from Arsenals, should accompany the Monthly Lists of Receipts, Issues, and Remains, and should be prepared on the same description of paper.

2. They should show in detail all materials expended, and workmanship incurred for each description of article made up or repaired, and their value.

3. Conversions for articles of Ordnance Stores made should appear first, in alphabetical order; then should follow those for making articles of Camp Equipage; and then those for making Barrack Furniture, afterwards the conversions for repairing stores in the same order; and then those of packing and general expenditure.

4. Stores repaired, or expenditure incurred, for other Departments, &c., should be exhibited distinctly under appropriate headings, in order that the necessary debit may be made against the Departments, &c., concerned.

5. The Conversion Statements should be numbered; and where two or more Statements may appear under one general heading, they should be lettered for facility of reference.

6. The column "Made up, or repaired and received," should show the number and kind of articles made up or repaired.

7. The column "For what purpose wanted" should exhibit the authority for each conversion.

8. The column "Voucher number" should contain the numbers of the Vouchers on which the Stores made up or repaired are taken into the List.

9. When metal is used in a conversion for the manufacture of an article, its finished weight should be given beneath the proper entry in the column "For what purpose wanted," to enable the Auditor to check wastage.

10. When peculiar circumstances render a greater wastage than that below shown unavoidable, a special explanation should accompany the Report of Conversions, in view to its admission by the Audit Department.

For tools of iron, 25 per cent.

" " " entirely pure steel, 12½ per cent.

" " " brass, 8 per cent.

11. No wastage will be admitted for tools requiring little or no working, but simply pointing the edges with steel.

12. When brass is used in conversions, the filings should be carefully collected, melted down, and then returned into Stores.

13. All recoveries from conversions should appear in an authenticated Statement, and their amounts should be duly deducted from the total of the conversions from which they were made.

14. The width of all cloth used in conversions should be quoted.

15. Repairs to Carriages, Carts, Platforms, and generally all repairs of a heavy nature, should be detailed in a separate list, to be appended to the Report of Conversions.

16. An Abstract of the materials used for conversions should be prepared, as at present, and will form a Voucher for their issue on the List of Receipts, Issues, and Remains.

17. All excesses in conversions, unless satisfactorily explained, should be retrenched through the Pay Department.

III.—*Annual Lists of Remains.*

1. This list should be prepared by Arsenals, Store Depôts, and Barrack Departments, on "Foolscap" paper, in the Form D, and transmitted within one month after the close of the year. It should contain the remains of Stores in hand, as taken from the Ledger and Half-yearly Returns respectively; but the Valuation Columns should be left blank.

2. This list dispenses with a copy of the Arsenal Ledger; but Ledgers to be now kept in Form E by Arsenals, Store Depôts, and Barrack Departments, should be posted daily, so as to exhibit the total Receipts, Issues, and Remains on the last day of each month, in view to the prompt transmission of monthly lists. If the headings of Arsenal Ledgers for the ensuing year have already been filled in, Commissaries may continue to keep them in the old form until the succeeding official year, but well up to date, the monthly balancing being, of course, strictly attended to, in view to the correct preparation of monthly lists.

IV.—*Annual Returns of Military Stores.*

1. This document, also prepared on "Foolscap" (*vide* Form F) should be rendered by Regimental and other Officers within ten days after the commencement of the year to which it may appertain.

2. It should show the Balance of Stores with which the year is commenced.

3. The fourth to the eighteenth columns should be left blank, by the Accounting Officer, in the copy furnished for audit; but the office copy should be regularly completed month by month, as the Lists of Receipts, Issues, and Remains are framed. The Valuation Columns are not to be touched.

2. The Returns rendered to the Examiner in the Ordnance Department should contain an account of all Ordnance and Military Stores, Camp Equipage, and Barrack, Office, School and Hospital Furniture, entered, under the several letters and headings to which they belong, agreeably to the established nomenclature, which should be strictly adhered to; and any Officer who may receive Stores, and be unable to render a satisfactory account of them, will be held responsible for their value, which should be retrenched through the Pay Department.
3. All entries in these Returns should be perfectly legible, and on no account crowded. Extra sheets should be added as necessary.
4. All alterations or corrections in Returns or Vouchers should be authenticated by the initials of the Officer authorised to make them. Erasures are strictly prohibited.
5. When articles are accounted for as "Complete," the entry of their component parts, separately, should be guarded against, as spare appurtenances only should be so entered.
6. No article should be completed from component parts in Store, without the transaction being shown under Conversions, and in the Receipts and Issues.
7. Stores on loan with Regimental Officers should, as heretofore, be continued on Arsenal Returns, and they should be carefully excluded from Returns of Regimental Officers.
8. Arsenals and Store Depôts should render separate Returns of Home Government Stores.
9. The Quick and Dead Stock should also be accounted for separately.
10. One General Return, as at present, should be rendered by the Head Quarters of each Regiment, or Troop, or Company of Artillery; but separate Returns should be furnished for each Battery, as the mixing up, in one Return, of Battery Stores with Stores of the Company attached, tends to much confusion.
11. Any Return, not prepared in strict accordance with the foregoing instructions, will be returned, for emendation, at the expense of the defaulting Officer.
12. The Valuation Columns of Returning Indents should correspond with those under "Receipts" in Form A.
13. All information which may avert audit remarks, or assist the Auditor in passing a charge, should not be withheld, but voluntarily afforded in the Column of Remarks, or by means of Foot-notes.
14. The utmost promptitude and exactness should be observed in replying to all audit remarks, and calls for information, from the Examiner, and in transacting business with him generally.
15. It being of the utmost importance that the introduction of a new system of accounting should be freed, as much as possible, from all confusion, Officers in charge of Stores are hereby directed to adopt measures for a general verification of the Stock in hand; that found being at once adopted as the Balance.
16. The Stock in Regimental charge on the 1st May next, should be carefully counted by Quartermasters under the inspection of Commanding Officers, and shown as opening Balance in the Return for 1861-62, to be rendered within ten days' after the commencement of the official year; and that the verification of Stock was personally made, should be certified by both, on honour, at the foot of the Return.
17. Arsenals should, after the close of the official year now current, prepare a List of the Balances in hand on the 30th April 1861, according to their Ledger, and transmit it to the Examiner, after a careful comparison, as no subsequent alteration of the document will be allowed, in lieu of a copy of their annual Ledger for 1860-61.
18. This done, Ordnance Commissaries should at once proceed with the counting of the Stock in charge, verifying item by item according to the dates on which such verification may be made; and they should make all necessary adjustments connected with the counting when the taking of Stock shall have been completed; but they should admit of no alteration of the Balance shown in the Ledger from which the List of Remains was prepared.
19. While Commissaries are engaged in this operation, the Senior Officer of Artillery at the Station should frequently inspect the process, and afterwards countersign the Stock List, with a certificate, on honour, thereto appended by the Ordnance Officer that the Stock was personally verified.
20. Barrack Officers will carefully prepare their List of Remains in hand on the 1st May next from their Return for the second half of the current official year, and then adopt the same plan as Arsenals for taking Stock, the verification of which, in the Barrack Department, should be made under the frequent inspection of an Officer of the Quartermaster General's Department, or of the Station Staff Officer, who, as inspecting officer, should countersign the Stock List, with a certificate, on honour, thereto appended, by the Barrack Officer, that the Stock was personally verified.
21. Officers in charge of Ordnance Store Depôts, and all other Officers in charge of Stores, will personally count their Stock in hand on the 1st May next, and also append to their Returns a certificate, on honour, that the verification was personally made.
22. No surplus or no deficiency, will thereafter be admitted, except on the most satisfactory explanation, failing which, payment of the value of deficiencies will be insisted on, and any officer taking up an appointment involving the charge of Stores should therefore satisfy himself that the Balance of articles in store or in use agrees with that on the Returns; and if no discrepancies are at the time reported, he will be held responsible for every article on the Books, a similar course being adopted if the taking of Stock on the 1st of May next be overlooked.
23. Blank Forms of the new Returns will be printed, and may be had, on indent, from Commissaries of Ordnance; but the want of *printed Blank Forms* should not delay the preparation and transmission of Returns which may become due.
24. This order must not be considered to relieve Officers from the duty of rendering their Returns, Arsenal Ledgers excepted, under the old Forms, up to the 30th April 1861.
25. Agencies should complete the transmission of their Returns for each official year by the 31st of July following its close, the Forms now obtaining being continued. Their Monthly Returns should be rendered within fifteen days after the close of the month; their Quarterly Returns within one month after the expiry of the quarter.

position and functions of the Military Finance Department, as detailed in the Resolutions of Government dated 6th July and 16th November 1860.

No. 172 of 1861.—The following Resolution is published for general information and guidance :—

Military Department, 5th March 1861.

RESOLUTION.—His Excellency the Governor General in Council has had under his consideration the letters and reports in which the Military Finance Commission discuss the question as to the number of Horses which it is necessary to keep up for the permanent Establishment of the Mounted Corps of the Army.

Owing to the number of men who are in hospital, or on duty, which does not allow them to turn out on Parade, or who are otherwise incapacitated from attendance, the number of Horses required to mount every available man in a Dragoon Regiment is always considerably below the number of men borne as effective on the Returns, and, if a Regiment has to proceed on active service, the difference is, of course, increased when there are large numbers of Horses supernumerary to the actual requirements of the Regiment and requiring attendance in Stables.

For this reason, as well as from considerations of economy, the proportion of Horses allowed to a Mounted Corps in England is always considerably below the effective strength of the men. The reasons which have of late years rendered it necessary to import Horses in unusually large numbers no longer exist. The ordinary sources of supply are amply sufficient for the ordinary wants of the Indian Army; and His Excellency the Governor General in Council has therefore resolved that a similar rule to that which obtains in England shall be acted on in India, with regard to the proportion of Horses to men allowed to all Mounted Branches of the Service.

It appears that some months ago His Excellency Lieutenant General Sir William Mansfield, with the concurrence of the Government of Bombay, ordered the Establishment of Horses for European Cavalry in that Presidency to be reduced to 10 per cent. below the effective strength of the men as an experimental measure. His Excellency the Governor General in Council has lately had the results of this experiment before him, and finds that the Reports of Lieutenant Colonel Shute, Commanding Her Majesty's 6th (Inniskilling) Dragoons, and Lieutenant Colonel Seagar, Commanding Her Majesty's 8th Hussars, two experienced officers of Her Majesty's Service, are so entirely favourable as to the results of the experiment in their respective Regiments, that His Excellency the Commander in Chief at Bombay has recommended a still further reduction, and that the proportion of Horses be, in future, fixed at 15 per cent. below the effective strength of men in every Mounted Corps, whether European or Native Cavalry.

His Excellency the Governor General in Council has resolved that this proportion be fixed for the future, as the established strength of Horses in time of peace in the Cavalry of the Regular Service, whether European or Native, in India, with this further restriction that, whatever the effective strength of men, the total strength of Horses shall not exceed 500 Horses per Regiment of British Cavalry, 175 per Troop of Horse Artillery, and 120 per Battery of Royal Artillery, and 105 per Battery of Indian Artillery.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief in India, and the Governments of Madras and Bombay, will be requested to carry out the reduction to the extent proposed by weeding out and disposing of the least efficient Horses, corresponding reductions being also made in the number of Syces and other Attendants.

} Ordered, that copies of this Resolution be sent to the Governments of Madras and Bombay for information and guidance, and to the Departments noted in the margin.

DRAFT OF BYE LAWS for the INSPECTION and MANAGEMENT of MARKETS in the TOWN and ISLAND of BOMBAY, made by the MUNICIPAL COMMISSIONERS for the TOWN of BOMBAY, under authority of Section 96, Act XIV. of 1856.

1. Every Market being private property, whether used as a Public or Private Market, shall be under the control of the Municipal Commissioners for the Town of Bombay and their Successors, and such Commissioners and the Inspector of Markets, or any other Officer appointed by them, may, either with or without their or his Servants, enter every such Market at all reasonable hours, and inspect the same, or may depute any other persons to enter and inspect the same.

2. The Gates of every such Market shall be opened at Gun-fire in the morning, and shall be closed at 9 o'clock at night.

3. The Proprietor or Proprietor's Farmer or Farmers of every such Market shall have a pipe laid on from the nearest water main, and shall cause every such Market to be thoroughly washed and cleansed once in every twenty-four hours.

4. Every Market shall be kept thoroughly clean, and shall be paved and provided with covered drains for the conveyance of wastage water to the nearest public drain or sewer, which drains shall be constructed in all respects to the satisfaction of the Municipal Commissioners for the Town of Bombay.

5. The Municipal Commissioners or any other officer appointed by them may place in every such Market one or more Peon or Peons to preserve order therein, and to seize and detain any Meat, Vegetable, or other article or thing intended for the food of man, if the same shall appear to such Peon or Peons to be unfit for such food, and the expense of such Peon or Peons shall be paid by the Proprietor or Proprietor's Farmer or Farmers of every such Market.

N.B.—This table is an extract from a more extensive yearly Return that is prepared for statistical purposes, and chiefly for the detection of any removable sources of disease, with a view to improving the healthiness of the Island. As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons of all stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendants the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners, particularly, are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all *single* cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

A Sub-marine Telegraph Cable having been laid between the Ports of Akyab and Khyouk-Phyoo, the attention of Commanders of Vessels anchoring in its neighbourhood is requested to the following instructions, prepared by Captain Burbank, of Her Majesty's Bengal Steamer *Fire Queen*:—

INSTRUCTIONS.

Vessels proceeding in or out of the Khyouk-Phyoo Harbour, should, on no account, anchor to the Westward of the Reliance Buoy, for the following reasons:—

1st. The legitimate passage is to the Eastward of the Buoy.

2nd. The Sub-marine Telegraph Cable is laid from Circuit House, or Flag Staff Point, along the Western side of the Channel; and when the Pagoda Rock bears N. E.; Non-degree N. by E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E.; Reef Island N. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.; Saddle Island S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ S.; Flag Staff Point S. E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E., there is a large bend in the Cable to the Eastward, consequently all Vessels should be prevented, for the safety of the Cable, from anchoring with the above bearings on.

Vessels anchoring with the Red Buoy on with Flag Staff Point will always clear the Cable, provided the Pagoda Rock is not brought to bear to the Eastward of N. E. by N., but they should on no account bring Flag Staff Point open to the Southward of the Red Buoy.

Vessels anchoring to the N. W. of Pagoda Rock will always clear the Cable by keeping Flag Staff Point well open to the Eastward of Red Buoy as far as it can be seen. Vessels anchoring off Pagoda Rock, should endeavour to anchor as near to the Rock as possible.

—The Public are hereby informed that the rule has been rescinded under which the prepayment of Letters between Great Britain and India was compulsory.

After the 1st of March it will be optional with the sender to prepay Letters addressed to Great Britain or to send them unpaid. *Unpaid or insufficiently paid Letters will be forwarded, charged with a fine of four annas in addition to the ordinary Postage.*

China.—Letters posted in India, addressed to any place in China, except Hongkong, can be registered only as far as the Port in India from whence they are despatched.

Letters on the Public Service.—Post Office Officials are authorised to receive and despatch, as on the Public Service, unpaid Covers to the address of the Senior Chaplain of the Church of Scotland, unprescribed "Sacred Returns for transmission to Government."
