Surcharge,

When by mistake fixed too low, Government must suffer the loss.
Act XXXII. of 1860, Section LIV.

If in making a Surcharge an Assessor shall commit a mistake by fixing his Surcharge too low, the Government, supposing there to be no fraud in the matter, must suffer the loss until the next Assessment when the mistake can be rectified.—(Financial Department Order, No. 4533, dated 13th April 1861.)

whether the arrears of “Wuseeka” Pensions in Oude, payable after the 1st August 1860, though in some instances the arrears extended over many years, were chargeable with Income Tax, it was held that under the spirit of the Order, dated 26th November 1860, such sums only should be assessed with the Tax as became due and payable on and after the 1st August 1860, that being the date fixed by Act XXXII. of 1860, for the commencement of the Income Tax year in respect to all descriptions of property and profits mentioned in the four Schedules of the Act.

A Mercantile Firm in India represented that their business was purely an Agency connection; that

Mercantile Firm

In India carrying on Agency business in connection with and as Partners of a Firm in England, what to return to Income Tax and how to be Assessed.

Act XXXII. of 1860, Schedule II. Section XCVIII. Rule I.

that the Partners in England were entitled to deduct the usual commission chargeable upon consignments sent out to India; that in Exchange business their constituents derived the entire benefit or otherwise, as the rates of the day might rule, the Home Partners and themselves neither deriving any benefit when the rates were in favor of, nor caring when the rates were against India; that in Exchange operations carried on with other countries, India formed only one of a circle necessary to carry through any one transaction and that agencies had to be employed wherever the operations extended. The Firm in India, therefore, contended that they should be allowed to confine their Returns either to the proportion of profits belonging to the India Partners, or to the commission upon proceeds of business less the usual amount allowed to English Agents.

Upon this representation it was held—

1st.—That the whole of the commission realized in the course of the year in India by the Indian Partners on account of the Firm (less the losses, if any, sustained by the Firm upon the consignments by reason of the insufficiency of the goods to repay the advance or of the insolvency of the person on whose account the goods were shipped) was liable to be assessed with duty under Schedule 2, Act XXXII. of 1860; but that the profits of the Firm accruing from interest upon the sums advanced in England were not so liable, though the exemption would not extend to the share of the Indian Partners in the last-mentioned profits which must be regarded as chargeable under the 1st branch of Schedule 2.

2ndly.—That although Act XXXII. of 1860 did not expressly entitle the Firm to any deduction in respect to the English portion of the commission, which was attributable to the taking charge of and shipping the goods in England, the return of the Indian Partners of the commission earned by the Firm and received by them in India, after deducting such proportion of the commission as fairly represented the remuneration to the English Firm for the purchase and shipment of the consignments in England, might be accepted; in other words that the Indian Firm might be allowed, as proposed by them, to confine their Returns to the commission on the proceeds of business less the usual amount to the English Agents, but that any deduction made should be limited to the shares of the English Partners, the Partners resident in India being chargeable with their share of the whole commission realized in India without deducting any portion on account of English charges.

3rdly.—That although the Firm in India might make no profit from their Exchange business, the whole profit and loss being, as stated by them, that of their constituents, this would not of itself exempt them from making a Return or from being charged under Sections LXXVIII. and LXXIX. as Agents or Factors, having the receipt in India of profits belonging to persons not resident in India, and—

4thly.—That in the Exchange operations carried on with other countries when India formed only one part of a circle necessary to carry through any one transaction, the whole profits were not subject to the Income Tax

merely by reason of India forming one place in that circle, and that, indeed, where the operation commenced in England and were completed by the final remittance to England, no portion of such profits would be liable to Indian Income Tax.

The present case being one of Agency only was considered quite distinct from that of a business in which purchases were made in England by the English Partner of a Firm and sent out for sale to a Partner in India on account of the Firm itself, the chief seat of the Firm being in England, and all the Capital of the Firm being there. (For the rule to be observed in such cases see Construction No. 100.)

1. EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT.

The Director of Public Instruction requests that, in order to prevent disappointment, Native Authors and Translators will give him the earliest intimation, with full particulars, of any Work for which Governmental patronage is to be solicited. At present it happens sometimes that a person commences the translation of a book in ignorance that the same work has been already taken up by some one else.

The Director of Public Instruction further wishes to check the inconsiderate publication of new elementary school-books, especially in Mathematics, which are not likely to supersede the excellent text-books now in use. He would suggest that other classes of literature may be more usefully taken up, such as standard works of History, Biography, and General Literature; books of reference on a complete scale in various branches of knowledge, especially such as are not likely to become soon obsolete. Works of fiction, poetry, dramatic literature, and generally such publications as are likely to command numerous readers, will be looked upon with as much favour as books designed to inform or instruct; indeed, they will be even more welcome.

GENERAL ORDERS

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

No. 321 of 1861.—The Articles of War for the Royal Forces are to be the guide in Estate matters in the case of Officers and Men dying after volunteering for the new Royal Artillery and new Cavalry and Infantry Line Regts.

The Regimental Accounts connected with Estates must consequently be rendered to the War Department by Regimental Pay Masters, when the new arrangements shall have been made.

No. 322 of 1861.—The Government Resolution No. 4663, of 27th September 1859, sanctioned special arrangements for the comfort of the Families who, having been left in England, came to India at the end of 1859 in unusually large numbers to join their Regiments.

The provisions of that Resolution have been treated as permanent Regulations. This was not intended. They are hereby cancelled for the future.

On any future occasion of Families marching without their Regiments, special arrangements will again be made according to the circumstances of the case.

No. 323 of 1861.—The following promotions are made in the Regiment of Artillery, subject to Her Majesty's approval, with effect from the 18th February 1861:—

The Governor in Council having received the opinion of the Law Advisers of Government and of the Judge Advocate General of the Army on the trial, is pleased to direct the return of Assistant Surgeon Cockell to his duty on the Medical Establishment, as it appears that grave doubts are entertained of the liability of an Officer of H. M.'s Land Forces to be tried by a Naval Court Martial for offences committed on board ship so long as he is amenable to the Army Mutiny Act and Articles of War, and liable to be tried for those offences by a Military Court Martial.

No. 86 of 1861.—The following General Order, dated Fort William, the 19th April, No. 347 of 1861, is republished:—

“His Excellency the Governor General in Council is pleased to publish, for general information, the following paragraphs of a Military letter from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, No. 106, of the 28th February 1861.

Her Majesty has been pleased to give directions that a Medal should be prepared to commemorate the successes of Her Majesty's British and Indian Forces, Naval and Military, employed in the Operations in China, which terminated in the Capture of the City of Canton on the 29th of December 1857, and also in the operations which have recently terminated in the Capture of the City of Peking, and the Restoration of Peace.

Her Majesty has also been pleased to command—

That a Clasp, to be attached to the said Medal, inscribed “Canton, 1857,” be granted to such of H. M.'s Forces aforesaid as were employed in the Operation undertaken against the City of Canton.

That a Clasp, to be attached to the said Medal, inscribed “Taku Forts, 1860,” be granted to such of H. M.'s Forces aforesaid as were employed in the Capture of the Taku Forts; and

That a Clasp, to be attached to the said Medal, inscribed “Pekin, 1860,” be granted to such of H. M.'s Forces aforesaid as were employed in the Capture of Peking.

Her Majesty has further been pleased to command that the Medal be the same as that already granted by Her Majesty in commemoration of the Operations formerly undertaken in China, omitting the date (1842) inscribed thereon, and that it be suspended from a Ribbon of the same width and pattern as that worn with that Medal: and that a Clasp, to be attached to the Medal, inscribed, “China, 1842,” be granted, in addition to the Clasps already enumerated, to such of H. M.'s Forces aforesaid then employed in the service of Her Majesty and of the East India Company who have received the Medal granted by Her Majesty in commemoration of the former operations, and have served in the operations which have recently terminated, in order that they may not lose the reward and record of their former service.

The requisite instructions will be issued by the General Commanding in Chief to Officers Commanding H. M.'s Forces in China, to enable His Royal Highness to give effect to Her Majesty's gracious intentions, by the preparation of Medal Rolls.

In the event, however, of any of the Corps having returned to India before the receipt of such instructions, your Government should direct the preparation and transmission of the Medal Rolls of such corps.

In the preparation of these Rolls care should be taken to particularize the Officers and Soldiers who may be in possession of the China Medal of 1842, as in such case Clasps only are on the present occasion to be awarded.

With reference to paragraph 5 of the above letter, the Governments of Madras and Bombay and His Excellency the Commander in Chief in India, are requested to adopt early measures to furnish the Rolls of the Officers and Soldiers of Corps already returned to India, who are entitled to the Medals and Clasps, now authorized by Her Majesty.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all *single* cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

For Letters exceeding the weight given above, in the case of those addressed to Sardinia, &c. 2 Annas and 4 Pies are to be added for every additional quarter of an ounce, in addition to 5 Annas and 4 Pies for every additional ounce or fraction of an ounce. In the case of Letters addressed to the States of Italy not under Sardinian Postal rules, *i. e.* Sicily, Naples, Rome, and the Papal States, 1 Anna and 4 Pies are to be added for every additional quarter of an ounce, and 1 Rupee 8 Annas for every additional ounce or fraction of an ounce.

Newspapers addressed to Sardinia, Tuscany, Parma, Modena, and the Romagna, cannot be prepaid in India to their destination. The India Inland rate of Postage of one Anna for each Paper, not weighing more than six tolas, must be therefore prepaid on all Newspapers not posted in Calcutta, Madras, or Bombay.
