A Question having been raised as to whether the Delhi Prize Money, in course of payment, should be subject to Income Tax under the provisions of Act XXXII. of 1860, the Governor General of India in Council was pleased to declare the same exempt from the operation of that Act. (*Financial Department Order No. 25, dated 2nd January 1862.*)

ISSUED BY THE INCOME TAX COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWN AND ISLAND OF BOMBAY UNDER ACT XXXII. OF 1860, SECTION XXXVII.

**INCOME TAX**

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st JULY 1862.

Notice is hereby given, that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay, who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income, is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form (B), and to transmit such Return, duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective Offices within 15 days from the date of the delivery of the special Notice, under the Penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered to be liable to the Duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the said Duties, who may not receive such Forms, must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

When the Bills shall have been discharged and paid, Commanding Officers of Corps will be careful that the prescribed Acquittance Rolls are duly forwarded to the General Prize Committee.

The General Prize Committee will prepare, as soon as practicable, Statements showing the names of the European Officers and Soldiers entitled to share who have left India, and the amount payable to each, for transmission to Her Majesty's Secretary of State, for India, in order that the sums due to parties in England may be passed to them at the earliest possible date.

The instructions for the preparation and submission of claims for the Delhi Prize Money, published in Government General Order No. 1154, of the 17th instant, will equally apply to claims on account of Lucknow Prize Money.

"The following paragraphs of a Military Letter from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, No. 461, dated 30th November 1861, are published for general information :—

1. I have received and considered in Council your letter No. 148, dated 31st July 1861, in which you inquire whether, in case of the death of an Officer of the Staff Corps, who originally belonged to the British Service, any provision will be made for his family.

2. I have to inform you, in answer, that to the widows and families of such Officers, pensions will be granted not less than those to which they would be entitled under the provisions of the Royal Warrant of June 15th, 1855.

3. It remains to be decided from what funds these pensions will be provided."

“The following paragraphs of a Military Letter from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, No. 462, dated 30th November 1861, and the Royal Warrant therein referred to, are published in General Orders:—

1. “I forward with this Despatch copies of a Royal Warrant, dated the 30th October 1861, modifying the conditions under which, according to the Warrant of 1st July 1848, a discharged Limited Service Soldier shall be permitted, on re-enlistment, to reckon his former service.
2. The present Warrant has been made applicable to India, and you are authorised therefore to publish it in General Orders, and to give effect to its provisions.”

Whereas it has been represented to Us that it is expedient to cancel that part of the 27th Clause of the Pension Regulations in Our Royal Warrant of the 1st July 1848, which prescribes the conditions under which a discharged Limited Service Soldier shall be permitted, on re-enlistment, to reckon his former service: Our will and pleasure is that, instead of the before-mentioned conditions, which are hereby cancelled, any Soldier who has been, or shall hereafter be, enlisted for Limited Service, and

has been or shall hereafter be discharged before or after the expiration of the first period of service, and shall be permitted to re-engage or again enlist within twelve months from the date of his discharge, shall be allowed, under Clauses 4 and 5 of the regulations and restrictions hereunto annexed, or such others as shall, from time to time, be established by Our Secretary of State for War, and the General Commanding in Chief of Our Army, to reckon half the period of his former service toward his future claim to Pension.

Given at our Court at St. James', this thirtieth day of October 1861, in the twenty-fifth year of Our reign.

To be annexed to the Royal Warrant of 30th October 1861.

1. With a view to give full effect to the provisions of the Limited Enlistment Act, and at the same time to hold out every encouragement to time-expired Soldiers of good character to continue in the Service, it is hereby notified that, in addition to the privilege of being permitted on re-engagement to count the full period of their first term of service towards increase of Good-Conduct Pay and to Pension of discharge, and of receiving a fresh Bounty, as well as the regulated allowance in lieu of a free Kit, and twenty days' Pay of their rank, men who re-engage at the Head Quarters of their Regiment for a second term of service, will be granted a furlough, if serving at Home, for a period of two months, commencing from the date of re-engagement; and if serving at either of the Stations named in the margin, will be provided with a free passage to this Country at a convenient opportunity, at the discretion of the Commanding Officer, and a furlough for two months, commencing from the date of their arrival in the United Kingdom. They will also be provided with a free passage back to their Regiments, unless directed to join the Depôts thereof at the termination of their furloughs.

2. Soldiers who at the time of their re-engagement may be serving in India, China, Ceylon, the Mauritius, Australia, or New Zealand, will be allowed £5, and those serving in Canada, at the Cape of Good Hope, at St. Helena, and in the West Indies £3, in addition to the usual Bounty, as an equivalent for the furlough granted to re-engaged men serving at our Foreign Stations and at Home.

3. The Secretary of State also deems it expedient to point out that, although the re-enlistment of Limited Service Soldiers at any period within two years from date of discharge has been specially permitted under Clause 27 of the Pension Regulations in the Royal Warrant of the 1st July 1848, the Limited Enlistment Act does not contemplate such a proceeding; it is, therefore, to be understood that the system which has hitherto prevailed will be discontinued, and in lieu thereof the following will be adopted, viz:—

4. Soldiers who have been, or may hereafter be, discharged after the completion of the first term of Limited Service will, if of good character, and in possession at the time of their discharge of a Good-Conduct Badge or Badges, be permitted, as an indulgence, to re-engage within twelve months from the date of their discharge, provided those who had previously served in the Infantry are not above thirty-two years of age, and those in the Cavalry, Artillery, and Engineers not above thirty-four years of age at the time of their re-engagement; but men re-engaging under this arrangement will only be allowed to count half the period of their former service towards claims to Pensions. They will, however, be allowed to reckon the whole of their previous service towards Good-Conduct Pay, but will be required to serve for one year with uninterrupted good conduct from date of re-engagement before they can be permitted to resume their previous Good-Conduct Badges, when they will be entitled to receive Good Conduct Pay from the date of their re-engagement.

5. Soldiers of good character who have been discharged or may hereafter be discharged, during the first term of Limited Service, and who may again enlist within twelve months from the date of discharge, will be allowed the benefit of the preceding provision for reckoning former service, and resuming former Good-Conduct Pay.

No. 64 of 1862.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 10th January 1862, No. 36, is republished:—

“The following paragraphs of a Military Letter from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, No. 467, dated 3rd December 1861, are published for general information:—

8. As regards the succession to Colonel's Allowance, I entirely agree with you that it is most desirable to make some definite announcement to the Officers of the Army.

9. In my Despatch No. 27, of 18th January 1861, paragraph 30, I stated that the number of Staff Corps Officers in receipt of Colonel's Allowance “can only be filled up as the establishment of Colonels on the old footing diminishes, so that the aggregate number of Officers receiving Colonel's Allowance at one time shall never exceed the regulated number of Colonel's Allowance for each Presidency.”

10. It has been since provided, in connexion with the retiring scheme detailed in my Despatch No. 320 of 10th August last, that the names of Lieutenant-Colonels accepting that scheme shall remain in italics on the general lists of "Field Officers regimentally," to regulate the succession to Colonel's Allowance of those who do not accept the increased pension, so that one Colonel's Allowance will eventually be struck off for each retired Lieutenant-Colonel who would have attained it had he remained on the Effective List; the number of Colonels in the receipt of that allowance being, however, never brought below the proportion they now bear to the number of Officers remaining on the entire list, general and regimental.

11. It may safely be calculated that, under the operation of this measure, there will be a reserve of Colonel's Allowances in the Cavalry and Infantry Arms of each Presidency, available for the Senior Officers of the Staff Corps, and probably to a much greater extent than will be required for that purpose.

12. Her Majesty's Government have therefore decided that Colonel's Allowances shall at once be assigned to the several Staff Corps in the proportion of one Colonel's Allowance to every thirty Officers who have actually joined the Staff Corps.

13. To these allowances, Officers who have attained the rank of Colonel in the Army, and have served not less than twelve years in the substantive rank of Lieutenant-Colonel, will succeed according to seniority as Lieutenant-Colonels, until the proposed establishment is completed to the relative strength of one in thirty Officers of all ranks.

14. The necessity for a qualifying term of service will then cease, and Officers will succeed by seniority as vacancies occur.

15. Her Majesty's Government have further resolved that, upon succession to Colonel's Allowance, Officers of the Staff Corps shall vacate the appointment they then hold, being, however, eligible for re-appointment or employment in any other position at the discretion of their respective Governments, and with the sanction of Her Majesty's Secretary of State for India in Council.

16. Officers holding appointments, the tenure of which is limited to five years, will not be required to vacate, on attaining to the Colonel's Allowance, before the expiration of that period.

18. The fourth subject is the position and pay of a Captain in the Staff Corps, being a Major General in the Army.

19. The expressions in the Staff Corps Warrant may not be sufficiently definite, and I have therefore to explain to you that, in order to entitle an Officer of the rank of Major General to the unemployed pay specified in the Warrant for that rank, he must have actually served not less than six years in the substantive rank of Field Officer, the above six years being inclusive of any time he shall have been obliged to pass upon half pay in consequence of ill-health contracted in the service (as established by a Board of Medical Officers), or in consequence of wounds received in action.

20. Other Officers (of the Staff Corps) holding substantive rank in that Corps as Lieutenant Colonel (whether he have the Brevet rank of Colonel or not), Major, Captain, or Lieutenant, will draw only the pay of their respective ranks.

21. The last subject mentioned in your Despatch has reference to the request of certain Officers to be allowed the £50 extra pension, in anticipation of retirement in completing the required term of service.

22. Among the questions and replies lately published by you (No. 70), inquiry was made with reference to Officers who might still have a few months to serve, but without reference to such service being required in India or allowable in Europe. You decided in the negative, and your reply has had my approval. You now recommend that it be allowed in the case of Officers who are so situated as to be in a position to complete their time in England.

23. I cannot observe that this one class of Officers have more claim to a relaxation of the rule in their favour than the other. Under the regulation of the service, Officers are required to serve a given number of years for a given pension, such period of service being inclusive of a stated amount of leave. It has suited the convenience of one Officer to take that leave, and he may have two years more to serve in India.

24. Another has chosen not yet to take his leave; he may have two years more to serve in England, if he pleases. As far as the interest of Government are concerned, it may be more expedient to relax the rule in question in favour of the latter; but in point of equity, I do not consider that he has more claim to the indulgence than the former.

25. I must therefore reluctantly decline to accede to your recommendation that the rule should be relaxed in the manner and to the extent proposed.'

Karkoons in the Forest Department possess the power of Franking their Official communications to the Conservator wherever he may happen to be and to Mamlutdars and Mahalkuries within their own immediate Districts.

Postal Officers are hereby informed that Vaccinators in the District possess the privilege of Franking their Official communications to their Superiors only, wherever the latter may happen to be.

District Vaccinators are likewise empowered to frank letters to the Superintendent of Vaccination of their Divisions wherever he may be.

**Sardinia.**—The rates of Postage applicable to Letters addressed to Sardinia are extended to the correspondence for Naples and Sicily. All Letters, Newspapers, &c. posted in the East Indies, addressed to Naples or Sicily will therefore be treated and charged precisely as Letters addressed to Sardinia, and be sent in the Mail for Malta, whence they will be forwarded to their destination.

**United States.**—The Public are informed that Her Majesty's Post Master General has intimated that Letters from India for the United States, transmitted through the United Kingdom, can now be registered as far as England by prepayment at the rate of 15 annas the half ounce, and 8 annas Registration Fee.

**Venezuela.**—Notice is hereby given that, from the 1st of January 1862, Letters forwarded from Bombay to Venezuela through the United Kingdom, *via* Southampton, will be charged at the reduced rate of 11d. or 7 annas 4 pies for a letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, and so on; and to the above Postage a French rate of 3d. or 2 annas the quarter ounce will be added when the letters are intended to be forwarded *via* Marseilles.

2. The above Postage must in all cases be prepaid.

**Registered Letters.**—Letters may be received for registry at every Post Office at any time during Office hours. Should any particular Mail be closed and despatched, either in the morning or in the noon, Letters brought after the despatch of such Mails, and tendered for registry, must still be received during Office hours, and kept and forwarded with the next despatch.

**Exemption of Postage.**—Postal Officers are informed that the Governor General in Council is pleased to sanction the exemption from Postage of all communications to and from the Secretary of the Central Committee on the subject of the collection of Works of Industry and Art for transmission to the Exhibition to be held in London in 1862.

**Alteration in Rates of Postage.**—The Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury having revised and altered the rates of Postage on Letters passing between the United Kingdom, Penang, Singapore, and China, and between those places and any of the Australian Colonies or New Zealand, without passing through the United Kingdom, the following rates of Postage are published for general information:—

I. On every Letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted by the Post *between the United Kingdom and Penang, Singapore, Hongkong, or China*, there shall be charged and taken a uniform British rate of One Shilling.

II. On every Letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in or addressed to Penang, Singapore, Hongkong, or China, transmitted by the Post *between Penang, Singapore, Hongkong, or China, and any of Her Majesty's Australian Colonies or New Zealand, without passing through the United Kingdom*, there shall be charged and taken a uniform British rate of One Shilling.

2. Also the following additional rates:—

I. On every such Letter exceeding half an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of Postage.

II. On every such Letter exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of Postage.

III. On every such Letter exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of Postage.

IV. On every such Letter exceeding three ounces, and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight rates of Postage.

V. For every ounce in weight above the weight of four ounces, two additional rates of Postage will be charged, and every fraction of an ounce above the weight of four ounces will be charged as an additional ounce; and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this Clause will be estimated and charged at the sum which any such Letter would be charged with if not exceeding half an ounce in weight.

3. Letters posted addressed to China *must be prepaid*, and if not, every such Letter shall be *detained and opened*, and shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof.

4. Letters posted addressed to Penang, Singapore, or Hongkong, *must be prepaid*; if not, every such Letter shall be *forwarded* charged with the amount of the Postage to which it would have been liable if the Postage had been paid when posted, together with a further and additional rate of Postage of One Shilling.

5. Letters posted, having Postage Stamps, the value of which may be less in amount than the regulated rate of Postage to which such Letter would be liable, will likewise be *forwarded* charged with the amount of the difference between the value of the Stamp or Stamps and the Postage to which it would have been liable if the Postage had been paid when posted, together with a further and additional rate of postage of One Shilling.

6. Letters which, under the regulation of this Warrant, shall be forwarded through France shall be chargeable in addition to the British Postage to any French transit rate which may be chargeable thereon.

7. The rates of Postage chargeable on Letters and Packets under the provisions of this Warrant shall be in lieu of any rates of British Postage now chargeable by Law thereon.

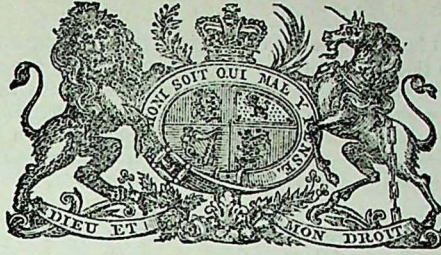

THE following Extract from the Proceedings of His Excellency the Governor of Bombay in Council, assembled for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations, is hereby published for the information of all whom it may concern.

“ B O M B A Y , W E D N E S D A Y , 2 2 N D J A N U A R Y 1 8 6 2 .

His Excellency the Honorable SIR GEORGE RUSSELL CLERK, Knight of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, and Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and President in Council of Bombay, having, in accordance with Section 29 of the Act passed in the 24th and 25th years of Her Most Gracious Majesty, Chapter 67, appointed the following Gentlemen to be additional Members of his Council for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations, namely:—

M. R. Westropp, Esq., Acting Advocate General.  
W. B. Tristram, Esq.  
H. H. the Nawab of Savanoor.  
Rustomjee Jamssetjee Jejeebhoy, Esq.  
Madhoorow Vittul Vinchurkoo.  
Jugunath Sunkurshett, Esq.  
Shet Premabhaicee Hemabhaicee.

And His Excellency the Governor having, in accordance with the 35th Section of the said Act, summoned to the first Meeting of His Council for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations the additional Councillors so appointed, as well as the other Members of his Council:

There were present this day—

His Excellency the Governor,  
His Excellency Sir W. Mansfield, K.C.B., Commander in Chief,  
The Honorable Mr. Reeves,  
The Honorable Mr. Frere,  
The Honorable the Advocate General,  
The Honorable Mr. Tristram,  
The Honorable the Nawab of Savanoor,  
The Honorable Mr. Rustomjee Jamssetjee Jejeebhoy,  
The Honorable Madhoorow Vittul Vinchoorkur,  
The Honorable Mr. Jugunath Sunkurshett,  
The Honorable Shet Premabhaicee Hemabhaicee,  
And the Secretary.

The aforesaid additional Members made the necessary affirmations of office and declaration of allegiance which were ordered to be recorded.

The PRESIDENT spoke as follows :—

“ I have called a Council in order to open the Legislative Department in accordance with the Act of Parliament which restores to this Presidency the power of making its Laws and Regulations. The new form in which this Government will exercise the power consists principally in the appointment of Non-Official Members. Such Members have therefore been appointed, and have now taken their seats. I feel satisfied that the zeal which some of them have at all times manifested for the public good, and the high character borne by the others in the management of their estates and Chiefships will ensure their undertaking these responsibilities with a due sense of their importance.

On the manner in which these duties may be performed, it will depend whether many millions of our subjects enjoy contentment and security, or lead a life of uncertainty and confusion. On the one hand, by over-legislating, you will be liable to keep the people in a state of doubt and alarm. On the other hand, by bearing in mind that none know better to govern themselves individually and parochially, you may be constantly in the course of ameliorating their condition, while safely maintaining Her Majesty's just sway over a contented people. And be assured that your Consultations will lose nothing of safe guidance, by occasionally looking for it in Native discernment.

Although your functions will be important, they need not be difficult. The several races subjected to our Laws in this Presidency, and generally throughout India, are not of a restless character, unless rendered restless by misgovernment—and, everywhere they have an innate respect for authority, whenever authority is respectable and wise.

You will remember, that you owe to those whom you represent a strict account of the fulfilment of your duties—to a people who reasonably desire your protection of their acknowledged rights, and to live in peace.

An assembly on this scale has naturally a tendency to expand; and, seeing it has pleased Her Majesty's Government to consider that the time has arrived for conferring this privilege on you, it will doubtless, in due time, be enlarged; provided that, in its early exercise, you give proofs of sound judgment and discretion in your views of British Dominion in India.

During a short rule I have endeavoured to see something of all classes. I find those of our Countrymen who, in this wealthy Settlement, are engaged in commerce, enterprising and enlightened as they always are when they have fair play, and the best feeling subsisting between them and the Government. I find the Native Merchant active and prosperous; our many Native Chiefs loyal, and most grateful for the liberal and just measures adopted towards them by the present head of the Government of India; while the agricultural classes are steadily advancing from poverty to better prospects, by means of well-regulated reductions in a land tax which had been exceedingly burdensome. In these favourable circumstances, this Government was transferred to my hands by my lamented Predecessor, whose unprejudiced and single-minded course of administration was such as always serves to improve British India, and to satisfy all classes of its inhabitants. With the aid of my experienced colleagues, I have sought to uphold that system. It will now devolve mainly on your counsel to preserve so satisfactory a condition of affairs in this Presidency.

I have directed the Secretary to lay before you some Bills which appear to me to require your early attention. With these, and others which individual members may propose to move, you may find your duties at present more laborious than it is probable that they will be hereafter; for there are a few of our projects of Law to consider, which there has not been time in the Legislature entrusted with them in Calcutta. These must of course come back to us. And there are some which I have not transmitted to that Council because I foresaw that they must ultimately be disposed of here.”

The President then declared the Meeting to be adjourned until Tuesday next the 28th of the present month of January.
